New Indian Pacific chief Bill Kerr gets the football feeling.

**Bill's on the ball**

BILL Kerr might be a Victorian, but he's got the West Coast Eagles at heart from now on.

The 39-year-old property consultant has been appointed chief executive of Indian Pacific Ltd, the public company which controls the Eagles.

He sees football as being an entertainment exercise and his major objective will be to market the Eagles — and the game — to the public.

"I'm a marketing man, so that will be where my expertise will come into play," says Kerr, whose football playing was restricted to country teams in Victoria.

"The game has to be made attractive for people to want to go along and watch. Football is important to the people of WA and our job is to make sure that the Eagles succeed, on and off the field.

"I'll be working closely with Eagles chief executive Graham Moss and coach Ron Alexander and also with the WAFL.

"My advantage is that I'm not a football expert, nor do I intend to be. I'll be looking at things impartially."

THE West Coast Eagles will spend five days in a Gold Coast recreation camp next week. . . but it won't be any holiday.

The Eagles fly out of Perth this week on a do-or-die expedition to keep their 1987 finals hopes alive in their debut year in the VFL.

The prospect of playing lowly, but dangerous Brisbane Bears on the Gold Coast on Sunday is followed five days later by an even tougher clash at the Melbourne Cricket Ground against finals rival, Melbourne.

In between, the Eagles will check into the Tullebudgera camp on Queensland's Gold Coast to work on their tactics for the Melbourne match.

Eagles coach Ron Alexander admits that there is a lot of work needed on the team's playing efforts, particularly their consistency and their away-from-home record.

Tackling will be a keynote of the Gold Coast camp.

The Eagles have invited some Queensland rugby players to the camp to teach the rudiments of tough tackling.

However, the Eagles' precarious playing numbers — at last count they had 21 fit players — guarantees that there will be no "brutalisation".

"We can't afford any more injuries," Alexander said.

"We are taking 22 players with us on our trip East, so we've got to find another fit footballer before we leave."

The Eagles will also be looking at other aspects of their game, though Alexander would not be specific.

He said that strategy would be discussed and several "plays" would be looked at again.

"We tried several team-play moves during the year which were good ideas, but didn't work out because the players didn't know each other well enough," he said.

"The Eagles will be training at Carrara Oval on Tuesday night and will then fly out to Melbourne on Wednesday.

"On Thursday we will train at the MCG and on Friday we will beat Melbourne," he said.

Alexander added that the Eagles camp would not be all work and no play.

The players would be given time off and an "Olympics" had been organised. They will also be doing a skills assessment.

**Lions fight injuries**by

INJURIES have hit reigning premiers Subiaco, but there is no panic in the Lions den leading up to the finals.

Key players Glen O'Loughlin, Mick Lee, John Georgiades, Bret Hutchinson, Ian Dargie and Greg Wilkinson were notable absentees from the side that scraped home against an unlucky South Fremantle last weekend.

Officials are hopeful that O'Loughlin will overcome his puzzling knee injury and be fit for the last game of the year against West Perth.

Speedy rover Lee and hard-hitting wingman Dargie are nursing arm injuries, but both are expected to resume this week.

State defender Wilkinson should also play this week after dislocating a finger against South Fremantle.

He could have returned to the field last week had it not been for an unfortunate interchange of players early in the first quarter.

Georgiades is fit again after a groin injury and talented newcomer Hutchinson has fully recovered from a virus which prevented him from playing last Saturday.

Subiaco's Football Manager Trevor Nisbett is confident that the Lions have enough good players in the reserves to back up their senior side if injuries continue.

"We still have players like Bill Monaghan, Wayne Golding and Tony Fullgrave in the reserves and they are capable of performing well," he said.

# FOOTY PUNCHLINES

## POPULAR PEAKE

EAST Fremantle skipper Brian Peake was voted back into the league team last week by the players themselves. Peake, the hot favourite to win most of this year's media awards (and the Sandover Medal) had missed three games with a knee injury and was not quite fit for his return last week. But when the players agreed that they would rather have their skipper in the seniors than be given a warm-up run in the reserves, coach Graham Melrose was quite happy to go along with the decision.

## FLYNN'S LAMENT

RADIO 6NR commentator Tim Flynn was lamenting the demise of the game's tough guys last week. Flynn, who has been calling footy boots and brawls for 15 years or so believes that the game has lost its characters. "There's no big names nowadays, no big clashes between tough fullbacks and skilled full-forwards," he said. "Coaches don't help by not announcing team positions and the old pre-game speculation about how so-and-so will go up against such-and-such has gone out of the window."

## POOR EXAMPLES

ANOTHER radio man with concerns about the game and where it's going is 6PR's Frank Sparrow. Always a firm traditionalist and with high standards in his football, his coaching and now his commentating, Sparrow is often critical about the appearance of players. "It's a pity to see so many players with their socks down around their ankles and their guernseys hanging out," he said last week.

## FOOTY FUN

FOOTBALL fans get plenty of enjoyment out of watching the game regardless if their team's winning or losing. Such is the case with a group of young men who follow the Eagles, through thick and thin, from the old WACA Members' Stand. They can always see the funny side when things are going wrong — as the quip "when's the next Town and Country coaching clinic" after an Eagle spilled an easy mark.

## KRAKER-JACK TOPS

NORTH Melbourne coach John Kennedy was full of praise for the Krakauer brothers after the team's win over the Eagles last Friday. He particularly praised Jim, who he described as a great leader out on the field; a player who set an excellent example. "He goes in fearlessly and a lot of what he does is not always seen by everyone because he's so quick," said Kennedy.

## MARATHON MAN

THE reserves seldom get a mention in Punchlines, but the efforts of boundary umpire Stephen Jones should be recorded. Jones was the sole boundary umpire in the last quarter between West Perth and East Perth when David Metcalfe pulled a leg muscle. Despite the additional leg work, he kept up with the play. The field umpires handled the throw-ins on one side of the ground, but Jones had to do all the retrieving after goals were scored.

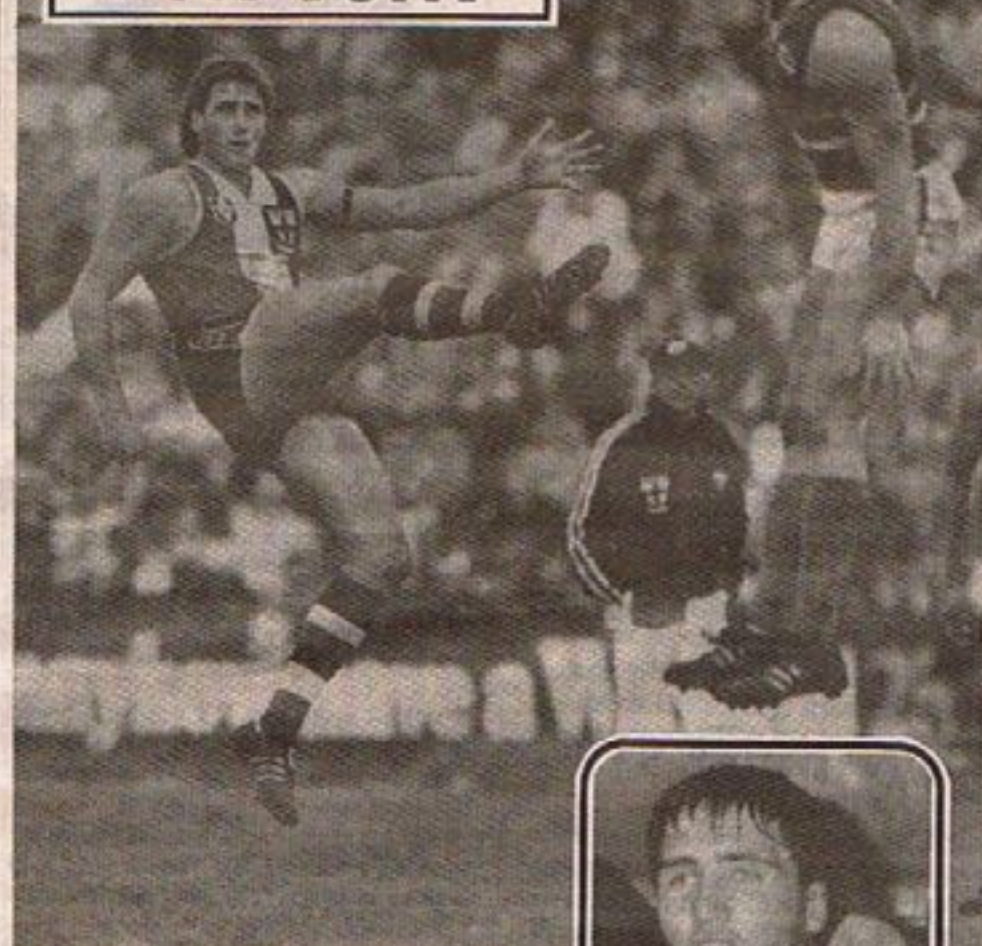

### West Aussies show their bias

**YOU** West Australians may not know it, but the Eagles are not the only team in the VFL.

There are 13 others and 12 of them have been around for quite some time.

Mind you, the way your newspapers and radio stations report things, you can't be blamed for believing that VFL football stretches no further than the most eastern point of Subiaco Oval.

Take as an example a game earlier this season at the Western Oval when Footscray were playing host to your Eagles.

Four or five WA journalists had travelled over to cover the game and when the final siren sounded they, along with the local scribes, moved out of the press box to interview the coaches, Michael Malthouse and Ron Alexander.

#### REPORTED

Given that Footscray won, we made our way towards their rooms, only to be halted by the WA reporters who announced that they weren't interested in Malthouse and only wanted to interview big Ron.

Now it's beyond me how a game of football can be objectively and comprehensively reported on when the comments of the winning coach are totally ignored.

As a second example, take the ABC radio coverage of games played in Perth.

I quote from the Melbourne Sun newspaper and a discussion between John "Sam" Newman and Bob "Woof" Davis, who both hailed from a Victorian country team called

Geelong, and Peter "Krackers" Keenan, former Melbourne, Essendon and North Melbourne player.

**Newman:** "You didn't happen to catch the Perth-based ABC commentators on radio did you? It's frightening that people can be so emotional and one-eyed about a side. When they're trying to broadcast across Australia you'd think they would give a nice balanced view of what's going on."

**Davis:** "Did you feel they were a bit hard on Brereton?"

#### NOT INTERESTED

**Newman:** "It's all right to give an opinion, but when it is colored by everything they say... when Ishchenko got reported, they harped on about all the incidents involving Hawthorn guys. You're meant to commentate the game as it goes and not keep referring back to incidents. It's annoying for a start and it's unprofessional."

**Keenan:** You'd have thought Dermott Brereton was a murderer by the time they had finished their character assassination of him."

This isn't the first time this season that WA commentators have distinguished themselves with obvious bias.

There are numerous other examples. Like *The Western Mail's* nice color photo of its "Star Player" who just always happens to be an Eagle and *The West Australian's* cover of team line-ups. You get the Eagles and whoever they play, but forget the other 12 teams.

It all makes you wonder what will happen if West Coast fails to make the finals.

Will WA media coverage end after Round 22? Will you West Aussies ever get to hear who wins the grand final?

## The AUSTRALIAN Game

### LUCK'S A FORTUNE

THE West Coast Eagles haven't had all that many breaks go their way this season, but their struggle to make the finals continues to spur the team along. Friday's loss to North Melbourne didn't help their cause, but, again, another team came to their rescue on Saturday when St Kilda downed Footscray. That leaves Footscray out of the five, with Geelong sneaking in, two points clear. North now seem fairly safe on 48 points and the Eagles, two games behind Geelong, need to win their three remaining matches.

### DIFFICULT TIMES

KEEPING the Eagles on a consistent path is proving to be a difficult role for coach Ron Alexander and his support staff. After the Eagles thrilling win over Hawthorn, Alexander was quick to bring the players back to earth, with North Melbourne just five days down the track. "We talked about complacency, but maybe we talked about it too much," said the coach.

### COOL CUSTOMER

EAGLES games in Perth have attracted a variety of media people to the West for commentary purposes — and some famous football names of past VFL history are among them. Former players like Bob Skilton, Peter McKenna and Kevin Bartlett have all agreed on one point — Chris Lewis is the Eagles most exciting youngster. The electric skills of Lewis have put him on the same crowd-pleasing level as North Melbourne's Krakouer brothers. It's Lewis' coolness in a crisis that stamps him above the "ordinary" player and when you remember that he is still only 18, he has some sort of future ahead of him.

### DANGER SIGNS

RIVAL VFL coaches have become acutely aware of the dangers of last-quarter easing off when it comes to playing the Eagles in Perth. Hawthorn coach Allan Jeans said that his side were hoping to avoid a close match because he knew the home-town crowd would lift the Eagles — as they did. North Melbourne's John Kennedy expressed similar concerns and he really revved up the Roos at three-quarter time, even though they were almost 10 goals in front. "We knew the Eagles would run on strongly," said Kennedy.

### THE BOB AND LOU SHOW

PRIME Minister Bob Hawke was the butt of some Lou Richards jokes when he was guest at the official free-benefits luncheon at Carlton last Saturday. Lou quipped: "Bob will do anything for the worker, except become one. When he first got elected to Parliament he went home to Hazel and said 'I just got elected' and she replied 'Honestly?' and he said 'For god's sake don't start that'."

### SCHIMMA COMEBACK

NORTH Melbourne captain Wayne Schimmelbusch will play again this season — if the Roos reach the grand final. Schimmelbusch is steadily recovering from a knee injury he sustained on May 31 against the Sydney Swans. "The knee is slowly, but surely coming along, but there is little chance that I will play again this season," he says. "That is unless we make the grand final. Then there is a slight chance that I'll play again." If North fail to make the September 26 appointment at the MCG, then Schimma is expected to decide his football future during the summer.

### BROWNLOW BLUES

BOTH of the 1986 best and fairest players in the VFL, dual Brownlow Medal winners Greg Williams, of Sydney and Hawthorn's Robert DiPierdomenico have now been booked this season on striking charges. The Big Dipper was reported last Saturday for allegedly striking Fitzroy's wingman Keith Thomas at VFL Park. Williams was reprimanded on his first striking charge, but was suspended for one week for attempting to strike in the State-of-Origin match against WA. He is still eligible for the Medal count.

### THE BIG NIGHT

THE West Coast Eagles will be represented by five players at this year's Brownlow Medal count. Captain Ross Glendinning, Dwayne Lamb, Chris Mainwaring, Steve Malaxos and John Annear have all earned invitations. Hawthorn will be the best represented club this year with 11 invitations, followed by Sydney with nine and Carlton and Essendon with eight.

# Tough year for our media, too

WITH just three home-and-away fixtures left in the VFL competition, I thought it would be opportune to look back on some highlights of the media coverage in this the "Year of the Eagle."

IT'S been a tough first year for the Eagles — and an even tougher year for many of my friends and colleagues in the football media.

With no malice intended this is how I see their efforts with the new team and the new competition.

**RAY WILSON** (Sunday Times sporting editor and special Eagles reporter): The season was highlighted by his fascinating fortnightly reports on the Eagles in-flight breakfast menus, backed up by coach Ron Alexander's emotional outpourings on fumbles, wet grounds and biased umpires. It gave a whole new meaning to the Sunday Times price hike.

**GARY STOCKS** (West Australian Eagles mostly stay-at-home reporter): Got the scoop of the year when he discovered the Eagles training in a Bellevue claypit in preparation for their match against St Kilda at the tricky Moorabbin ground. As it turned out, we should have played them at Bellevue.

**GARY CARVOLTH** (6PR announcer and part-time Eagles public relations man): Absorbing daily interviews with Graham Moss when the Eagles lost and with Ron Alexander when they won. WATTS** (Full-time Eagles public relations officer and part-time 6PR announcer): Unbelievable, exciting live coverage of Eagles home games kept emotion-free by concise and accurate descriptions of Eagles goals. **FRANK SPARROW** (6PR Eagles commentator): Thought he would retire this year and just broadcast the occasional local game. **GRAHAM MOSS** (Eagles manager promoted to chief Guru mid-season): His Saturday morning review of Eagles night game losses added a whole new dimension to sports radio. Listening to a grown man cry on air is an ideal way to start the weekend.

**JOHN TODD** (Swans and State coach): Speaks with a stutter when anyone mentions Eagles. Next year coaching Richmond, Swans, East Perth, Fitzroy, combined East and South Fremantle. . . Anyone except the Eagles.



**DENNIS COMETTI** (Sports Centre Seven compere): Great Sunday morning comedy show. Ad-lib gags and one-liners had us all rolling around the lounge room floor. This show must go to air later; the later the better.

**GEOFF CHRISTIAN** (Head football writer for The West Australian): Settled into the swing of fortnightly travel, two competitions, extra tribunals and league meetings with typical efficiency. When asked about this social life he said "What social life? Every time I go out I'm going to the football."

**BOB MAUMILL** (Sports Centre Seven compere and out-of-work talk show host): Adopted to his new role like a trained seal. Responsible for big upsurge in the sale of blue lounge suits. Put many players on the spot with hard hitting questions like: "How are you enjoying playing with the Eagles?"



**HARVEY DEEGAN** (Radio 6IX sporting editor and former public address expert at Subiaco Oval): Emerged in the year of the Eagles to broadcast everything except the Melbourne Cup. Looking forward to meeting up again with his wife and family in three weeks time.

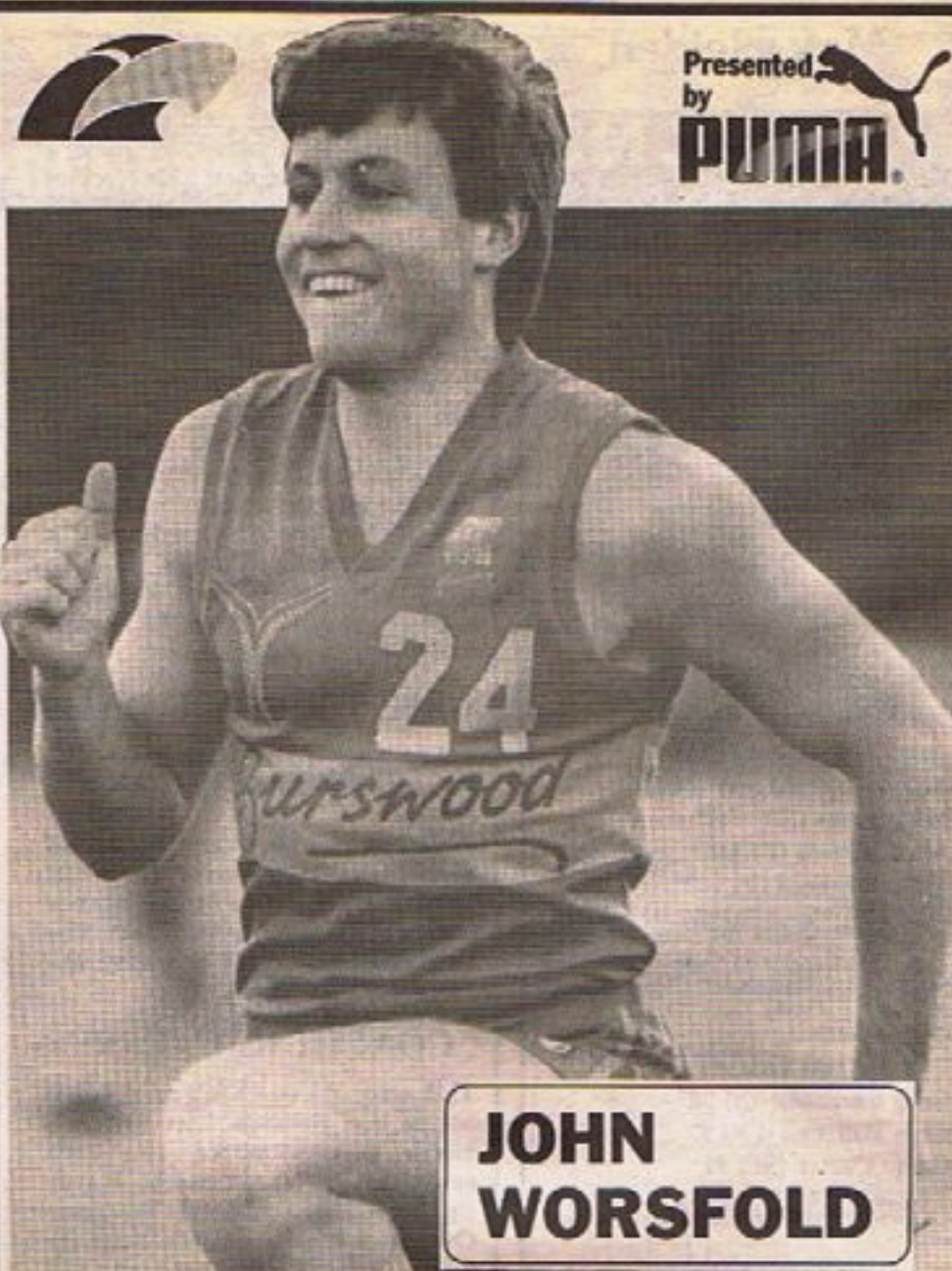

## Neesham has it all worked out

THERE are certainly no flies on Claremont coach Gerard Neesham. Almost since the end of the first round, he has known that he has a team capable of winning this year's premiership.

The longer the season has progressed, the more obvious it has become that the Tigers have a stranglehold on the flag.

But that doesn't guarantee them the premiership.

A lot of people have been waiting, almost expecting, the Tigers to go off the boil. But they seem to have gone through their flat spot and not lost any premiership points.

The only time they have looked ordinary this season was when they scraped home by a point from South Fremantle and then were given a tough game by Perth the following week.

Claremont's performance this season has made a comment by Graham Melrose, after the Tigers beat them in the second round, a bit hollow.

If you remember, he said Claremont did not deserve to be on top of the premiership ladder because they were a team of kids.

I wonder how he feels now? I think a few other clubs in the competition would like to have the kind of "kids" produced by the Tigers this season.

But back to Neesham.

There are a number of reasons why I say he hasn't any flies on him.

For a start, he has deliberately made it difficult for his young team.

He was quite prepared to sit back and give players a go early in the season. It ensured, whether by design or not, that the youthful team he coached did not rely on him as a player.

And by his actions this week, he wants to ensure that his players aren't stopped by behind-the-play tactics.

Being such a young team it is natural enough for other teams fighting for the premiership to believe they can harass Claremont off their game.

I doubt they can do that.

Claremont have some pretty tough cookies, despite their age.

The thing that stands out in the Tigers line-up is the way players are pre-

pared to commit themselves when going for the ball. A prime example is John Hutton. He gives the impression he would bulldoze his way through a tank to get the ball. He is just one of a number of fearless players in the team.

Neesham also has good back-up. Have you noticed how he and his brother Harry get their heads together during a game?

It would be interesting to know just how big a part Harry has played in the Tigers success this season.

On their performances so far this season, the Tigers should wrap up the flag. But Claremont have been in that position before. They could have won a hat-trick of premierships after their 1981 win, but didn't.

And veteran Claremont supporters will look back to 1972 when the Tigers fielded one of the best post-war teams assembled in this State.

It comprised a lot of talented imports.

Though they won 19 of 21 qualifying games, they did not win the premiership.

It will be interesting to see whether the Tigers get the stumbles again at the wrong time of the season.

"Our players don't seem to play at their best till they are forced into a corner." Eagles coach Ron Alexander.

"The WACA drove a hard bargain and clearly is the big winner in the exercise." Geoff Christian, writing in The West Australian, about plans for the southern stand at the WACA Ground going ahead.

"I've been working with Laurie and you'll see a much more aggressive player; you'll see a fired up player who attacks the ball more aggressively." Eagles assistant coach Barry Cable about Laurie Keene's new-found form.

"There is no suggestion at this stage that Robert Wiley will not be with the Eagles next year." Eagles chief executive Graham Moss on rumours that the veteran rover would be dropped off the squad.

"When it's mathematically impossible for us to miss out on the finals then I'll concede that we can stay in the five." North Melbourne coach John Kennedy.

"Why do we adopt this stupid parochial attitude that we can't recruit players from other VFL clubs." Bob Cribb, suggesting on radio 6PR that the Eagles should recruit some big names from other teams.

"We have to address a lot of problems in football; umpires are just one of them." Perth coach Mal Brown.

Today the sport has realised that dedication is the major contribution required for working in the game, not what sex you may be.

Gerry has done a magnificent job for the game. It would be great to see more women with such a love of football working at the grass roots; that's the type of dedicated person football needs for it to grow even further.

# Well done, Barts

NOT over-endowed with natural ability, but possessing great character and heart — that's Eagles utility big man Glen Bartlett.

Bartlett has only played only a handful of games with the Eagles, but he has maintained a fiercely competitive attitude and desire to succeed.

Having coached him in East Perth special squads, I've always had great respect for Bartlett, a young man with enormous sincerity.

As a tall, slimly-built youngster, he was advised to develop upper-body strength and his dedication saw him regularly in the Royals gymnasium.

His performance at centre-half-back against North Melbourne was creditable, especially early in the game when the Eagles defence was under maximum pressure.

So in the meantime, WA football lovers just have to marvel at the home-grown talent we have produced — even though it's working against our side!

# Brown brings the curtain down

JACK Sheedy, probably the most colourful character on local football before Mal Brown, never won a Sandover Medal.

"Jungle" or "Reverend Jack", as he was known, was a little inclined to mix his football brilliance with more than a smidgen of mayhem and it was no surprise that he never achieved the ultimate in football.

Brown played a lot of his football in much the same manner as Sheedy, but there was one major difference — Brownie won a Sandover Medal.

How he did remains one of football's mysteries, because though gifted enough to be rated with the best of the medal winners, his volatile temperament had to weave its way past the guard of the umpires.

I can remember a number of occasions when Sheedy, unintentionally, of course, found that he had been misjudged purely because someone had seen fit to place their jaw in line with his errant fist. Brownie probably has a few misgivings of a similar nature.

Take for instance, the game in Adelaide when the premiers of WA, South Australia and Victoria met. Poor Brownie copped a ripper from a Carlton heavyweight and as he reeled ar-

ound the ground, in the grip of amnesia and totally disorientated from the blow, his flailing fists, which were trying to hold and comfort his aching head, just somehow put five Carlton guys out of action.

Because of his unfortunate accident, East Perth went on to win the game and it was sad, really, that Brownie couldn't remember any of it. Such is life.

Like the Reverend Jack, Brownie will go down in history as one of the really colourful characters of the game; stories about him will be around for years to come.

I had a talk with him this week and asked about some of his highlights and disappointments.

### YOUNGSTERS

His biggest kick is to see youngsters who he has been involved with, playing good football — David Hart, Wayne Henwood, Jon Dorotich and Maurice Rioli, to name a few.

The interaction and friendships with people involved in the game are something that Brownie values.

It was an honour for him to be chosen captain of the All Australian team in 1972 and the thrill of winning the 1969

Sandover Medal was something he will always remember. But he admits to being disappointed when he was runner-up in 1972. Of 13 possible awards that year, he was 12.

Two premierships went his way — East Perth as captain-coach in 1972 and as coach of South Fremantle in 1980.

He counts the West Australian win over Victoria in 1981 as a great performance.

"We brought home only six expatriots; the rest were from the WAFL competition," he said.

Brown feels that the almost automatic clearances which have come into vogue lessen a coach's authority. If discipline is necessary, it is difficult to impose it under today's set-up. Try to pull a player into line and he is just as likely to quit the club.

He also admits to having a distaste for the way players are inclined to do each other in at tribunal hearings. In the early part of Brown's career, it was almost traditional that both parties suffered from "lapses of memories".

The innocent and the guilty usually went off and had a beer together after the hearing and it was looked upon as "just something" a footballer had to put up with.

## FROM WHERE I SIT

Summing up the game today, he feels that it is too fast and he would like it slowed down fractionally.

More than that, the likeable Brown is the type of person who is good for football.

## Geelong overcome internal strife

AN inconsistent Geelong overcame club politics and a revived Essendon to climb back into the top five this week.

Club president Dr Kevin Threfel was replaced during the week by Wayne Bannon, but coach John Devine denied that this move had any effect on his players.

"We are only interested in playing football," was Devine's quip when questioned on the upheaval.

But the question remains — can Geelong stay there?

They outpointed fifth spot, rivals Essendon by 27 points, but their three remaining matches are against the top three sides.

Carlton, Hawthorn and Sydney will test the Cats and if they can overcome those teams, then they will be worthy of a place in the finals.

But the internal strife in the Geelong camp continues.

Bannon, looking nervous in his first day on the job, could give no assurance that Devine would be coaching Geelong next season.

### POLICY

Bannon said that Devine's position would not be discussed until the end of the season.

He told guest at the luncheon before the Essendon clash that the Geelong policy in the past had been to review all performances, playing and coaching, at the end of the season.

"That won't change," said Bannon. "It's a non-issue. We are behind him 100 per cent."

Devine's future under a Bannon-led administration may be safe for the remainder of the season. But he is in a similar position to Tom Hafey two



years ago, when he too was under threat.

Eventually, he was deposed and observers believe that Devine will go the same way.

## Dorotich stands firm

THE Sydney Swans, decisive victors in their last three outings, ran into a stumbling block at Princes Park last Saturday.

The block was expatriate West Australian Jon Dorotich, who held down centre-half-back for Carlton like a fort under siege.

Dorotich was credited with 22 possessions, but it was the 10 tough marks that thwarted the Swans attacks and gave inspiration to his team-mates.

Coach Robert Walls naturally was reluctant to single any of the Blues out for their contribution, but Carlton officials were ecstatic over Dorotich.

After all, how often in league football do you see a team congregate around one of their own just to say well done? This happened at three-quarter time and full time.

### ROOKIE CHOICE

HAWTHORN'S Darrin Pritchard may be given consideration as rookie of the year. The Hawks drafted him at the end of last year, even though 12 other VFL clubs had selections before Hawthorn and of the 65 players in the draft, only seven had made senior debuts. Pritchard, who has put in some fine performances in illustrious company, was the 26th player in the draft. Other clubs have already admitted they made mistakes in the draft.

### NEW LIFE FOR PIES

THE Collingwood football club is about to sign a new 50-year lease with the Collingwood Council for Victoria Park. With all the talk about ground rationalisation, this must be good news for Pies supporters. There is stability in having a base of your own and it will help the club return to its former greatness.

### BP KANGAROOS

TONY Shaw, the Collingwood captain, has a new name for North Melbourne. Shaw says the club with no home ground should be called the BP Kangaroos, because they are quiet achievers. He says that after a slow start, they have moved slowly, but surely, up the VFL ladder.

## Sheedy shows his loyalty

ESSENDON coach Kevin Sheedy was disappointed with his team's second-half performance against Geelong at Kardinia Park last Saturday.

"The first half was good because they always had the ball down the forward line," Sheedy said.

Some of his players are coming back from injury tired in the second half, such as Tim Watson, Leon Baker and Paul Van Der Haar.

Sheedy felt that they ran out of legs. However, he said he was pleased with the performance of young Paul Hamilton.

"Selection for the next couple of weeks will be crucial, but I've always stuck with the boys and never been too ruthless," he said.

"I think Garry Foulds and Simon Madden put in good efforts too."

"History shows that after a premiership or two, things traditionally get harder."

## Carey set to topple Bartlett

VETERAN South Australian ruckman Peter Carey is set to become football's highest-games performer.

Carey, the gentle 33-year-old giant from Glenelg, is due to play his 436th game on September 19, the scheduled second semi-final appearance of his side in the SANFL finals.

It is generally acknowledged that the 435 games played by Richmond and Victorian veteran Kevin Bartlett is the highest achieved in senior football in the three major States.

# Captain's Courage

ON-FIELD leaders have an important role to play in football... and the eight WAFL captains in season '87 are no exception.

These are the men who have taken on the captaincy role this year.

**GERARD NEESHAM** (Claremont): As captain-coach Neesham's role is a little different to his rivals. The former East Fremantle and Swan Districts ruck-rover has always been an instrumental player in his team's success. He possesses the ability to read the play and link up attack and defence. Now 32, Neesham has revealed his skills as a coach, spending much of this season on the sidelines.

**NEIL TAYLOR** (Subiaco): The last few years have provided Subiaco veteran Neil Taylor with some satisfying achievements. Not only has he held aloft the 1986 premiership Cup, reached his own 200-game milestone and helped rejuvenate the Lions, but he has earned his own place in club history. This is the 30-year-old Taylor's sixth season as Subiaco skipper and next year should see him hold that job for the longest period in the club's history. As a wingman or rover, no-one gives more, both in terms of courage and commitment than Taylor.

**BRIAN PEAKE** (East Fremantle): The leadership that Brian Peake offers to the Sharks is inspirational. There would not be a more experienced or talented player in the State based on this year's form and the versatile former Sandover Medalist sets a great example to the newcomers in the Sharks line-up. Peake was obviously disappointed at not making the Eagles squad, but that

didn't stop him from dominating competition. A knee injury in the last of fixtures saw him miss three games, but he still leads most of the media as the 33-year-old has plenty of football.

**MICK REA** (Perth): Big Mick is something of a surprise choice as skipper this year, but it was his performance that his football resume has been completed. He has topped goalkicking table in the last two years, being recalled from country coach Mal Brown and his appointment confirms the high regard in which Rea is held. Rea's commitment for the big goals is a fine example to all and he often sacrifices his best interests for the team. At the age of 30, Rea's big men often don't show their age in their careers.

**PETER MENAGLIO** (West Perth): Peter Menaglio was given the captaincy after a seven-year role as Les Fong. But the gutsy rover, his skilful teammates deserved to lead the side and Menaglio's leadership is a fine example to all. There are few more committed players than Menaglio, producing some of his best football. One of Menaglio's attributes is the desire to perform. The side is being beaten — a never gives in.

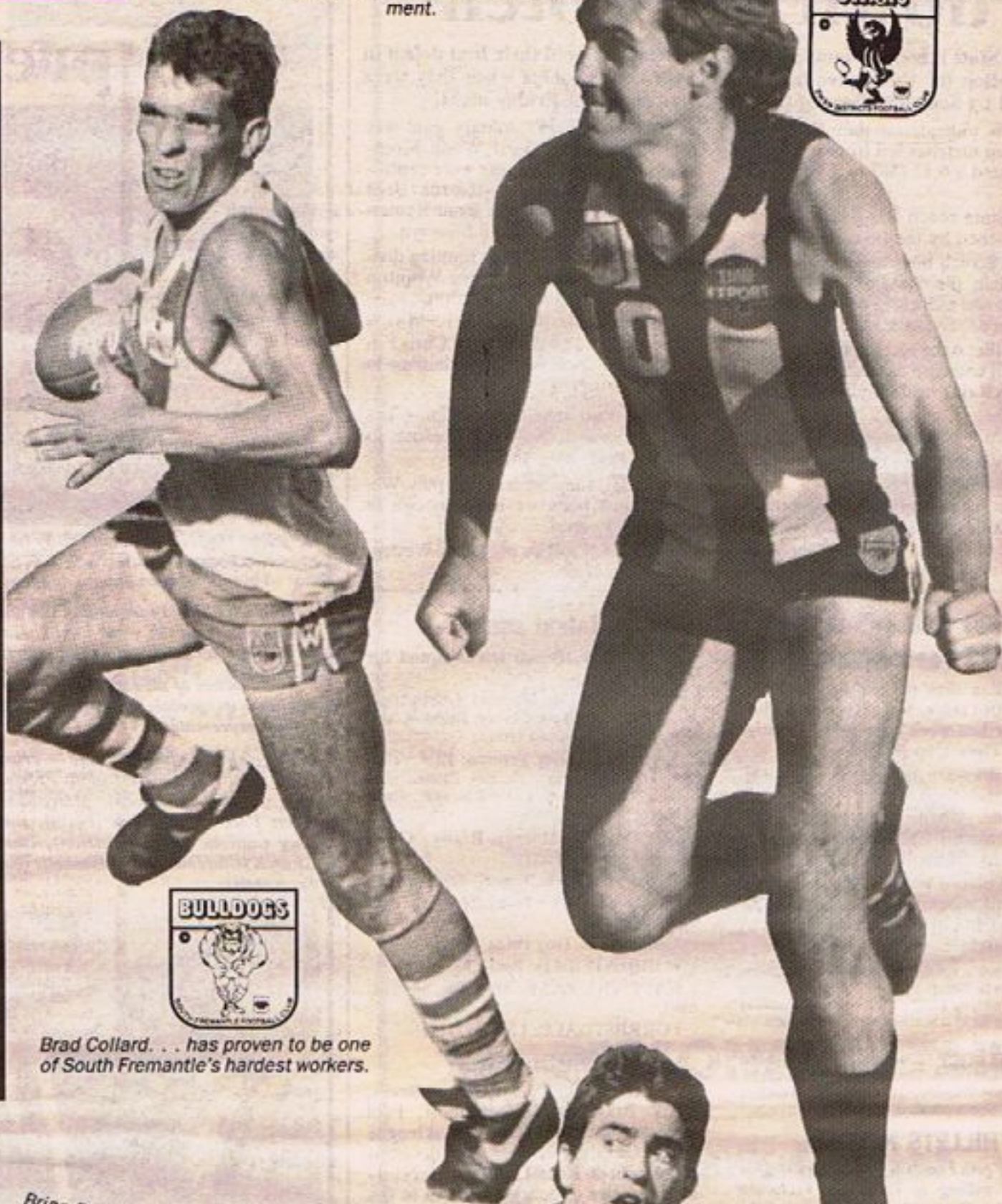

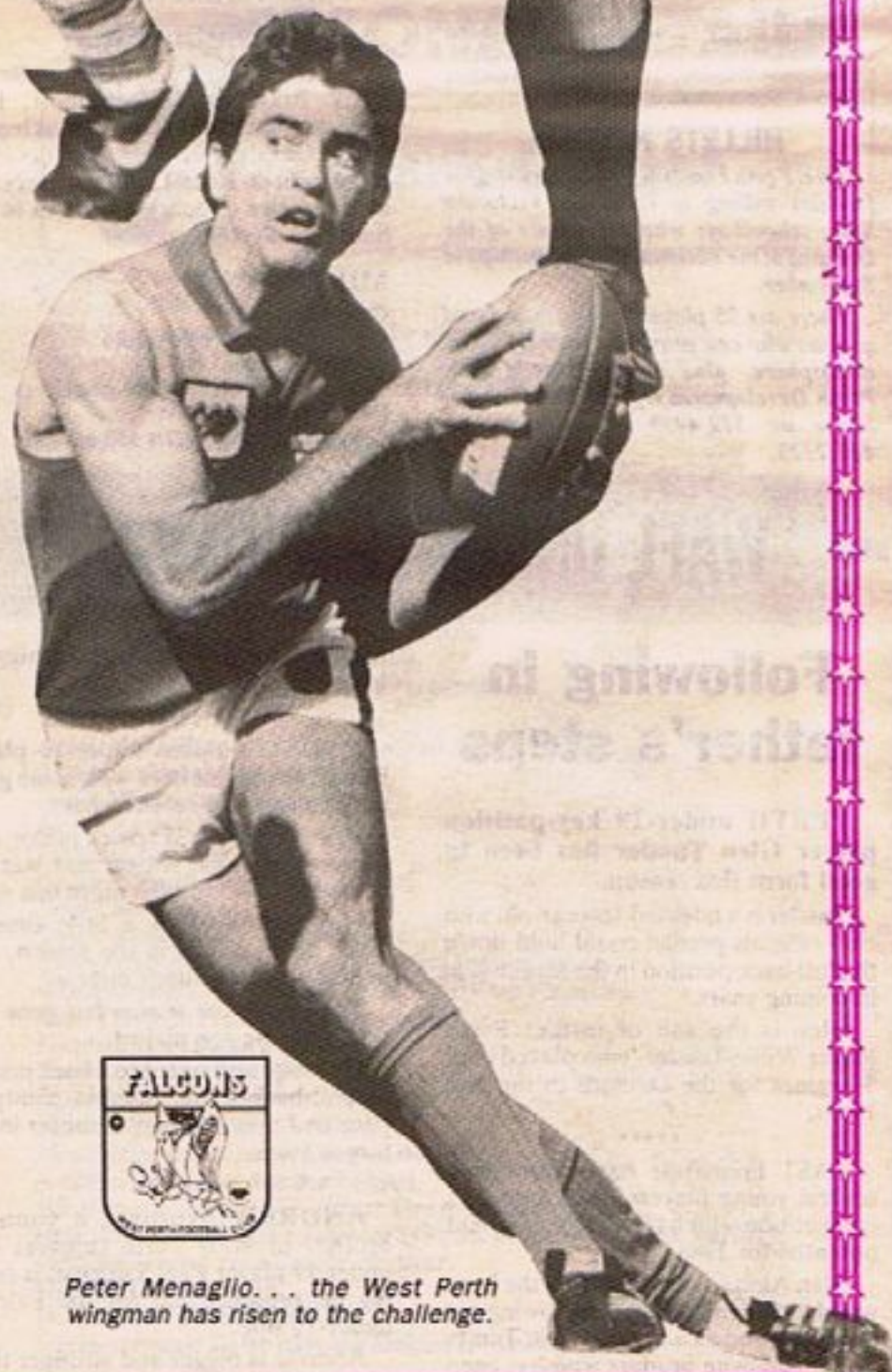

ANDREW Sanzone, a younger brother of West Perth reserves and under-19 player Paul Sanzone, is making his presence felt for the Falcons under-19 side.

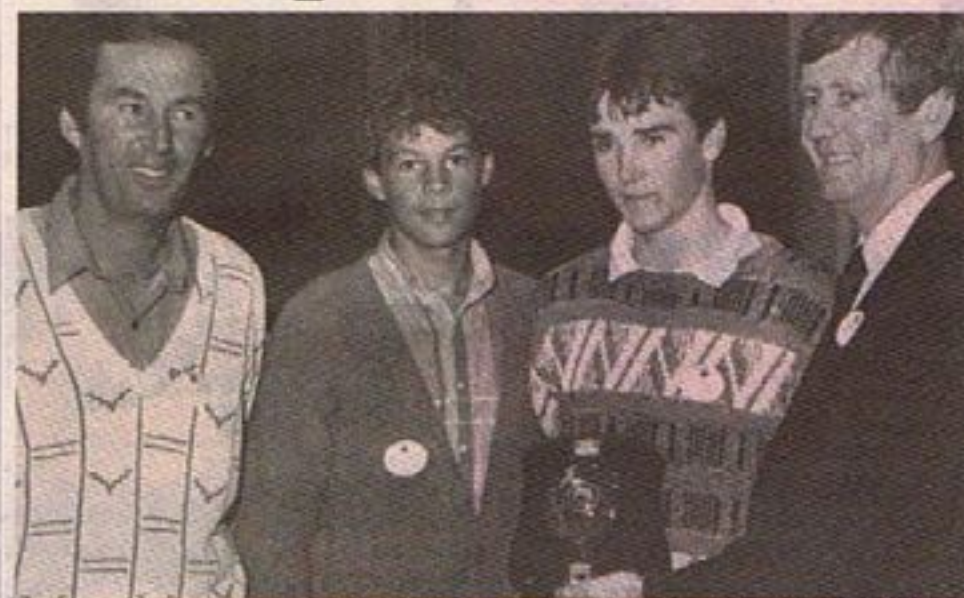
Andrew is bigger and stronger than Paul and has been successfully used in a variety of key positions.

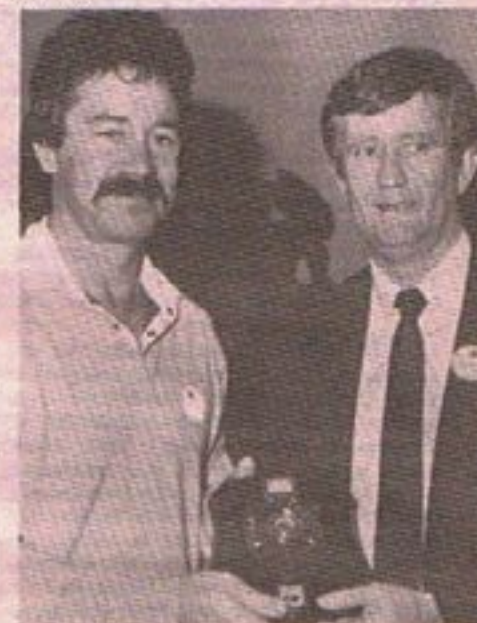

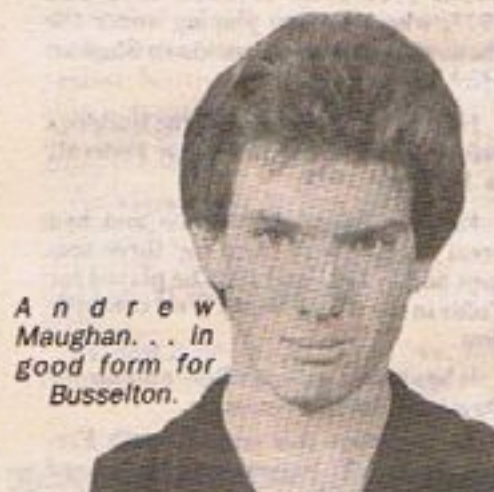

# Worthington tries out many rookies

RESERVES coach Kevin Worthington has done an excellent job for the Bulldogs in his first year of coaching.

Because the high number of injuries at the club this season he has been forced to try more than 70 players in the side.

At no stage has he been able to stabilise his team the way he would like to. However, things are on the improve.

Players are trickling back into the reserves after spending lengthy periods on the sidelines.

This has had an immediate effect on the team's performance — particularly last week against Subiaco where the Bulldogs were able to snatch a last-minute victory after losing control of the match in the time-on period of the last quarter.

Worthington believes his task is to

## Eagles could battle overseas

THE West Coast Eagles could be one of six VFL clubs taking football to the world in October — and chasing \$20,000 in prizemoney.

Exhibition Australian Rules football matches have been organised for Yokohama, London, Vancouver and Los Angeles.

Hawthorn will play Essendon at Japan's Yokohama Stadium on October 25 in Aussie Bowl II; the Sydney Swans will play Geelong, the Eagles or Footscray at the B.C. Place Stadium in Canada on October 7 and Carlton are tipped to play North Melbourne in the Foster's Cup Oval in London.

The winner of the Vancouver game and the Foster's Cup will play off the "world series" and \$20,000 prizemoney at The Coliseum — the venue for track and field events at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games.

The involvement of the Eagles depends mainly on their final VFL placing in 1987.

West Coast Eagles chief executive Graham Moss says that the WA-based team are extremely keen to take part in the exhibition series.

"We would not only have the chance of playing games in America and taking Australian Rules international, but we could take up educational type programmes as well," Moss said.

"We would have talks with American national football league coaches and administrators on training methods, injuries, promotion and general administration.

"Even if we don't qualify for the series, there is still a possibility we will go to the US for that purpose," he said.

VFL official Greg Durham says that a growing number of countries are keen to stage Australian Rules matches.

"Fuji Television is underwriting Aussie Bowl II after the enormous success of the initial match last year," Durham said.

"Aussie Bowl I was watched by 25,000 Japanese who quickly picked up the rudiments of the game. By the third quarter they were chanting Carl-don, Carl-don as the Blues made a comeback.

"Then as the players did a lap of honour, the fans rushed the fence to get a better look at their new-found idols.

"We sold more than 1000 team scarves and young kids even followed the players' bus through the city streets," he said.

Aussie Bowl I was the first time Australian Rules was played on astro-turf. When the VFL competition ventures on B.C. Place Stadium, it will be the first time Aussie Rules has been played at an indoor arena.

The roof at this stadium is 200 feet high.

Carlton played in both the Courage Cup and Aussie Bowl I in 1986. However, like the VFL grand final at the MCG, they were losers.

North Melbourne defeated the Blues by 47 points in London and Hawthorn were 46-point victors in Japan.

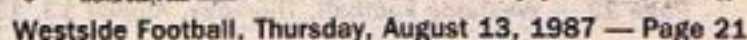

# Pam looks at the future

THE appointment of Pam O'Connell — wife of WAFL Football Affairs Manager John O'Connell — to the Football Development Trust this year caused numerous ripples of controversy.

Critics questioned the role that a WOMAN would play in a rough, tough MAN'S game.

What role could she possibly play in the development of Australian Rules Football?

Mrs O'Connell has been given the schools football portfolio which she shares with the Director General of Education in WA, Warren Loudon.

A physical education teacher for the past 16 years and mother of three footballers, Mrs O'Connell says she has no illusions about contributing to the technical and tactical development of the game.

"There are full-time employees of the FDT like Grant Dorrington, Brian Douge, Wayne Loxley and Brian Cook to do that," Mrs O'Connell said.

"I am no where near as knowledgeable as these men. They certainly know a lot about the game and where it should be heading.

"My contribution is in a different arena to theirs, but I think it has some bearing, particularly in under-age competition.

"My voice is just one of 15 in the

Trust and I offered my services hoping to shed some light onto areas that are continually coming up.

"For instance, the cost of a child playing each weekend often falls on the mother and match payments is just one aspect that we're looking into.

"We also want to involve boys in football who might otherwise give the game away when they reach their middle and late teens."

Mrs O'Connell says there is a lot young people could do if they wanted to give the game away.

"They could become umpires, administrators, trainers or coaches," she said.

"The FDT is looking into ways it could offer courses in these areas.

"The game is desperately short of this breed of person and we hope to end this shortfall by encouraging the "football

battlers" to remain involved in these important areas."

Mrs O'Connell said that a lot of people have the wrong impression about the FDT.

She says she is often asked: "What is the FDT doing for football now?"

"The answer is very little," she replies. "The FDT is for the future development of football.

"In the long term, Australian Rules will gain a lot from the Trust.

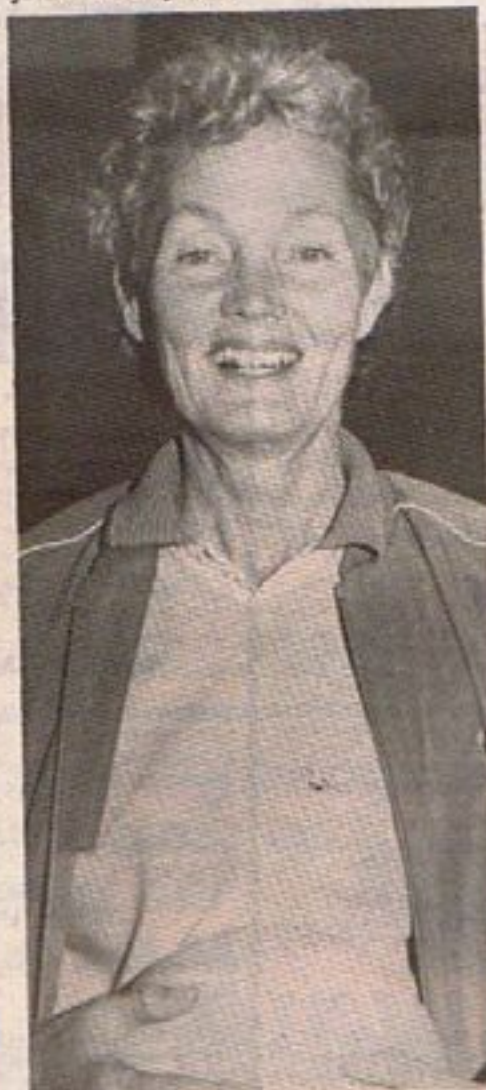
"Our aim is to see that football is properly administered and that all the separate groups (amateurs, country, WAFL and juniors) complement each other harmoniously as a tiered structure.

"It is not our responsibility to produce stars like Ross Glendinning or Mark Zamotti.

"But if the Trust achieves what it has set out to achieve, then these players will continue to emerge because the encouragement and incentive will be there. "All the WAFL clubs now have development officers and development squads and their junior coaches are far more qualified than they were, even five years ago.

"In fact, football has a tremendous opportunity to prosper.

"There was no-one full time in the game 10 years ago and now look at it. There are many full-time employees, particularly in club administration and junior development.
