### **CHAMP'S TRIBUTE**

WEST Perth will pay tribute to former Captain Courageous Les Fong on Saturday, April 9. The Falcons are holding a prawn night at Leederville Oval and admission is only \$10. Knowing how popular prawns are in West Perth territory, the average patron will only be paying about 20c per prawn. Proceeds of the night will be to the Les Fong fund. Fong played 284 League games and represented his state three times. He has now shuttled back to the more leisurely pace of amateur football and Trinity/Aquinas will be the richer for his experience and dedication.

### **BACK 'EM IN!**

FOOTY fans who reckon that their teams are certainties every week can put their money where their mouth is from now on. The TAB are launching football betting with the introduction of "Footo" - and it kicks off this Monday. For 50c, footy punters can try to pick the margin that their favourite team will win by. The bets are bracketed in three-point margins and the dividends are calculated on the number of winning units. The profits from Footo will be credited to a sports betting account and distributed under the direction of the Minister for Sport, Mr Graham Edwards. Initially funds will assist with the cost of the southern stand at the WACA Ground.

### STALWART DIES

FOOTBALL lost one of its stalwarts in March with the death of former South Fremantle president and patron Billy Hughes. Commonly known as Dooza, his connection started with the Bulldogs in 1925 as a player and went through till 1978. He played 47 league games with South and then served on the committee from 1929 and the club won premierships under his presidency in 1952 and 1970. He severed his official connection with the club in 1978 when he handed over the role of patrol to his son-in-law, Alan Bond. Mr Hughes was 84 when he passed away.

### **MARTIN SETBACK**

SOUTH Fremantle's injury-plagued Ken Martin is on the rehabilitation trail once again. The talented forward was hailed as one of WA's most promising players back in 1982 when he came up from Wickepin, via Wesley College, to make his debut as a 17-year-old. But constant knee problems restricted him to five league games over the next five seasons. A comeback campaign last year saw him add another eight league games to that tally, but now he is facing a year off as he undergoes a pelvic bone graft — which has apparently been the major cause of all his problems.

### **BIG BONUS**

EAST Perth coach Gerard McNeill allowed the WA squad members in the Australian amateur team to train with the club at Perth Oval in the lead-up to the Bicentennial Carnival in Adelaide. And for that he was rewarded with a ruckman! Dave Higgins, who played with North Beach last season, liked what he saw at Perth Oval and decided to stay on and try his hand at league football.

### **NO PROMISES**

SOUTH Fremantle have certainly started the season with plenty of promise, but coach Stan Magro pleaded to a large gathering of supporters at Fremantle Oval to avoid talking about premierships. He said that things were going to be tough and although he was pleased with the early progress there was a long way to go. "But please don't start talking about a premiership," Magro asked of the big crowd at last Sunday's guernsey presentation.

### LIGHT-HEARTED

IT'S just as well our Minister for Sport, Graham Edwards, has a good sense of humour. Channel 7 interviewer Dean Hopewell posed the question: "I guess it's a while since you've played footy?" to Mr Edwards during the official launch of Footy Week. Mr Edwards, a Vietnam war veteran who lost both legs in a mine explosion, replied with a quick quip: "Yes, it's a while since I've had a kick."

### **BIG FAMILY**

TALKING about the Footy Week opening; it was a unique situation with so many people representing EVERY facet of football in the one place at the same time. Representatives from all walks of football, city and country, junior and senior, umpires, trainers, officials etc. were all there — as well as the elite Eagles. The big family spread into a semi-circle behind the Minister for Sport Graham Edwards as he officially launched the ambitious week of activities.



### **NUMBERS GAME**

WEST Coast Eagles vice-captain John Annear has had a guernsey number change in the second year of VFL action. He has switched to the No. 2 vacated by Rob Wiley, who has returned to coach Perth. Eagles rookie rover Joe Cormack, who started in No. 16 at Swan Districts before changing to No. 2, has adopted Annear's No. 16 in the Eagles squad.

### ANOTHER FLAG

BIG Ron Alexander has not stopped winning despite being out of the football limelight. The former coach of the Eagles and East Fremantle has just put in a winning summer in men's basketball, helping take out the D-grade premiership at Perry Lakes. Playing with a Department of Sport team known as the Good Sports, Big Ron took on the role at centre — one of the few positions he couldn't fill in his long footy career.


East Perth coach Gerard McNeill will be hoping that David Bain settles into a good year for the Royals.

FORGET the Bicentennial carnival in Adelaide and forget the Eagles failure against Essendon two weeks ago and their win over Melbourne last weekend.

After all, they have been the usual pre-season hit-outs that really only offered John Todd the chance to look at what he has available to him for the 1988 VFL season.

I don't think the new West Coast Eagles boss will have liked a lot of what he saw in March.

The WA team was let down badly in Adelaide by some of the players who didn't seem to want to be there.

Toddy has his problems and it's no secret that the WAFL has a few also.

On the interstate scene it will be in the court of Claremont's Gerard Neesham to restore some of our lost pride when he puts together a side in a little more than two months to play reigning Australian champions South Australia on their home soil.

But look at what Neesham, the WAFL and the footy public, have to service their needs in 1988.

The potential of this new-look league is enormous, given the chance to develop and support from local sponsors and fans.

Look at Claremont, under Neesham, with some of the most exciting youngsters, not only here in WA, but in the nation.

Ben Allan, Don Pyke and Brian Sutherland will all be hit between the eyes and in the pockets with offers from VFL clubs when the new draft system gathers the cream of Australia's footballers into the national competition.

And that's just for starters.

Look at some of the other top youngsters who will grace the turf of WAFL grounds each Saturday this season.

At South Fremantle, my tip to be the big improvers, Mark Bayliss, Scott Watters and Peter Sumich could be sensational.

Perth fans, keep your eyes on Warren Nicholas, Grant Hatch and Troy Davis for some thrills this year. East Fremantle should see a lot of Chris Waterman and together with Lance Durack and John Derecourt, could be stars this season.

At Swan Districts, keep a watch on Kernutt Thorne and, for a roughie, my old Perth teammate Len Gandini to have his best year in league footy.

And new Subiaco skipper Greg Wilkinson, although not one of the younger brigade, should relish the leadership responsibility and have a great year. Karl Langdon and Todd Breman will be top players for the Lions.

East Perth should get plenty from young forward Peter Cransberg, who could prove a top goal-scorer this year and little rover Dean Bertram has great skills.

West Perth have recruited well from their country zone and any one of a host of players will bob up as their recruit of the year, just as Paddy Madafarri did in 1987.

And don't forget Buzz hopes to be around the league arenas too ... from the inside.

# Paul Mifka — picking up the pieces

WEST Coast Eagles coach John Todd may not want West Perth defender Paul Mifka - but threequarters of the League clubs in South Australia do.

West Torrens led the charge, and they have been trying to entice the discarded Eagle to South Australia to look over the club and have a training run.

Central District, Port Adelaide and Woodville are among the other clubs chasing Mifka, who played just one match with the Eagles last season before being told by Todd that his services were not required this year.

Mifka has also been told that Hawthorn have him high on their list for 1989 under the VFL draft.

The sudden interest in Mifka has left the amiable defender in a dilemma. He's busy carving out a career in the WA Police Force and he has been married for only a few months. Wife Linda works for the Tony Barlow company and is not keen on a move interstate.

Mifka's omission from the Eagles squad of 35 came as a shock to many people, but Todd says he had every chance. He described Mifka as a fine touch player, but not physically up to the rigours of VFL football.

The Eagles coach says Mifka didn't want the hard ball and "danced around the edges" in the National Panasonic Cup match against Essendon.

Todd says Mifka had the chance to win the interstate match against NSW earlier this month, but made four crucial mistakes.

The remarks have angered Mifka, who says if anyone should be blamed for the loss to NSW it should be midfielder Chris Mainwaring, who insisted on shooting for goal from 60 metres out rather than passing to forwards on the lead, of which Mifka was one.

"There was a lot of players who did 10 times worse than me in the State match," said Mifka. "But as far as I'm concerned, John Todd's words are like water off a duck's back."

Mifka says his attitude to football won't chance because of Todd's remarks.

"It certainly wouldn't do my football any good if I worried about what he thinks," said Mifka.

South Australian clubs may be vying for Mifka's services, but West Perth won't give him up without a fight.

The Falcons made no secret of their delight at having Mifka back at a recent weekend camp, at which all players and officials were very supportive of the discarded Eagle.

The omission of Mifka from the Eagles - and the inclusion of several Swan Districts players - has revived the old accusation levelled at Todd that it's earlier to reach the top in a black and white jumper than it is in cardinal and blue colours.

"That's rubbish," says Todd.

"Swan Districts have a crop of young, exciting and dedicated players and that's why some have made the Eagles squad this season."

Todd says another fact to be remembered is that clubs like Claremont and Subiaco have their full quota of players and East Fremantle is almost in the same position.


"The West Coast Eagles selectors had to look to the other clubs and it just so happened that Swan Districts had several players who filled our requirements," said Todd.

But West Perth followers still wonder.

They remember five years ago when Craig Nelson and Dean Warwick were in sparkling form, but could not be placed in the Todd-coached West Australian State side.

The Falcons flew the pair interstate to watch a State game as a consolation.

If the Eagles make the VFL five this year, Todd's selection process will be vindicated. If not, the allegations of bias will again be trundled out as a reason for failure.

# EAGLES LOOKING GOOD FOR 1988


Considering all the possibilities, can see the Eagles winning 14 games and filling fourth or fifth position.


They have made a solid contribution already.

So why shouldn't they win an extra game or two that will elevate them into the finals.


One simple reason. Their recruiting has not provided them with the players to succeed Melbourne in the heart of winter ... and that's where their finals hopes will live or die.





But much will depend on the composition of the West Coast Eagles side.


Should he have Troy Ugle, Brent Hutton and Kevin Caton available then his chances of success will increase dramatically.



Subiaco have a new injection of pace with a couple of likely recruits and they will be a difficult team to beat in 1988.







Clubs are always keen to allow as many players as possible to try out for football's highest honour.

At this time of the year some players just do not have the ability and have to be "moved on".

Telling them that their time has run out can be a very emotional part of coaching.

In many cases these players are the men who are not blessed with natural ability, but have great character and a burning desire to get to the top. Stopping that desire is something all coaches dislike.

He also finished off the last half of the season with a fractured spine that did not allow him to train with the team until February this year.

John Todd and his selectors had the task of deleting someone from the squad, a job they did not look forward to.

Like everyone who knows Bartlett, they obviously respect his character. But it was a job that had to be done.

Bartlett will overcome this setback and continue to prove that commitment and desire will reward his efforts. He will be an enormous asset as skipper of the young Royals.

As a strong supporter of the Eagles (our State's VFL team), I hope those talented players who did not get deleted from the squad can look at a "real goer" in Bartlett and appreciate that for the Eagles to succeed, natural ability is not enough.

There is no doubt that the football public can and will support the WAFL and Eagles as long as they get value for money - competitive games, not onesided stories that see one team dominate a game and it]s all over on the scoreboard by half time.

Any fair-minded supporter can cope with a three or four-goal loss if his side puts in for four quarters. Like it or not, there is plenty of young talent in the WAFL and that is still where the future life blood of any WA-based VFL team lies.

### KICKETT OUT -THORNE IN

IT is history how, unfortunately, the magic of Claremont's Derek Kickett has been lost to WA football; not only at club level, but with the Eagles.

But as the saying goes - when one door closes another one opens and in has walked Swan Districts country recruit Kernut Thorne.

I'm not putting Thorne in Kickett's category, but I was impressed with the football skills he showed in the Kresta Cup. He takes a strong mark, has great goal sense, a good long kick and, above all, a top leap and strong pair of hands.

There is no risk that the boy from the South West will pull down a few big screamers' for the football public in 1988.

### **HOW THE CYCLE TURNS!**

THE recent loss by WA in Adelaide was a big disappointment not because of the magnitude of the defeat, that's happened before, but how the team lost, particularly against a good NSW combination.

From what I saw on television, a few of the players left a little to be desired in their approach and attitude.

## **TOUGH SEASON**

JOHN Todd and his Eagles will be well prepared for season No. 2 in VFL ranks, but even with a better draw than 1987, this season is going to be tough.

It will be tougher because the opposition have now had a good look at them - the Eagles aren't a new surprise anymore.

The team's success on Melbourne soil is limited to one day game and one night game.

Key positions at both ends of the ground are still vulnerable, though Ross Glendinning will fill one and probably Murray Rance another - but that still leaves two.

This year, of course, there can be no excuses. The Eagles are part of the VFL and the successful players and teams in the competition are naturally and physically tough and play aggressive and relentless football week after week.

Time will tell how the Eagle will fly in 1988. It should be a pretty interesting season.



## WAFL must be competitive to survive

Realistically though, the bulk of the players representing the State had limited experience at VFL level; State level and me even at WAFL level.

The expectations of these players was too great against the opposition. The cycle has certainly turned when you consider the type of player, experience-wise, that came back from Melbourne between 1977-1985 to represent the State.

### **BOTTOM FEW** START WELL

PRE-season form can more often than not be misleading, but it is encouraging to see last year's bottom-of-the-ladder-teams such as South Fremantle, East Perth and Perth show good form in the Kresta Cup competition.

South Fremantle have some good young talent. With the experience gained last year - the hard way - and an injury-free year, plus the return of Maurice Rioli, they are looking good.

East Perth have lost little and gained Glen Bartlett and Wayne Dawson and hopefully Ken Seymour can solve their centre-half-forward trouble spot.

Perth, under new captain coach Robert Wiley, look to have a good blend of experience and youth.

Wiley, Sandover Medallist Mark Watson, Joe Santostefano, Mick Rea, Stephen Mount, John Gavranich and others form a solid foundation, especially in the big-man department.

# Bayens takes to umpiring

IT'S rare to find a State footballer who decides to become a field umpire - seven years after his retirement.

It's also rare to find a field umpire still blowing the whistle as his age creeps towards 40 - and about to tackle a new challenge.

But Ron Bayens is the exception.

He's now training with the West Australian Football League umpires panel after playing 184 games for Subiaco and seven for South Fremantle between 1969 and 1981.

The former key position player was in Subiaco's 1973 premiership side coached by Ross Smith and represented Western Australia three times, once in 1973 and twice in 1977.

Last year Bayens started his career as a field umpire with the WA Amateur Football League, adding to his football achievements by umpiring 11 A-grade games and a C-grade colts grand final.

This season Bayens could again add to his list of football feats, with his 185cm frame looking as fit and lean as ever.

After a training session in 35-degree heat, Bayens still looked composed. With his mop of thick brown hair, he could have easily passed for one of the younger members of the group. He simply wants to keep an interest in the game he has come to love.

My parents are Dutch, but we migrated to Australia when I was very young," he says. "I've been involved with football ever since I can remember."


"I wanted to keep an interest in footy. After coaching in the country and playing Superules in 1986, I was finding it too difficult physically."

"But I still wanted to be involved, but in a less demanding role."

Most first-year umpires find their tasks a little daunting, but not the Willagee Primary School deputy principal.

"A few of the players knew me, so I got on pretty well with them. It's hard to say if this rubbed off on their teammates, but I had no control problems," he says.

"I was instructed well by the ama-

teurs umpires coach Noel Clements."

That rapport befits the way Bayens played. He was never reported or required to be a witness at a tribunal during his career.

"I never took much notice of the umpires as they would never change their minds. You could on expend unnecessary energy arguing with them energy you could use to get a kick," he said.

But there is one change in this area of abuse.

His wife Helen, who watched every game Ron played, used to give the umpires "heaps".

"I only went to half a game last year," she said. "I didn't have the interest in the amateurs, but the shoe was on the other foot.

"While I laughed at the comments, I didn't like what I was hearing. But if Ron gets to a decent standard with the WAFL I will go along."

"I'm quite happy to stay at home with our two daughters, Sarah (10) and Jessica (8) — they are not big football fans either."

Bays admits he sets his sights high and would like to achieve a WAFL senior game this year.

"I've found umpiring to be a little easier than playing," he says.

"When the ball isn't near you as an umpire, you're not under the same pressure that you were when you are playing. You always had to check your opponent when playing.

"But that will change as the two umpiring system in the WAFL looks to be more demanding."

One of the inhibiting factors could be that one skill that makes or breaks umpires - bouncing the ball.

"I'm pretty ordinary, I have a bit to master. I only get three out of five to go straight," he said.

With a smile, Bayens added: "I'm not

sure how long I can keep going - until my moving parts stop moving." If his body can reflect his enthusiasm,

life as a league umpire might just begin at 40.

Brisbane and Fitzroy have the ability to fill the remaining two spots.



## Hoodoo first-up for the Tigers

TIGERS BEWARE! The opening game of the new season is becoming quite a hoodoo game for the premiers from the previous year.

For the last five years, the reigning premiers have failed to win first-up.

However, there is an omen for Claremont - they were the last titleholders to win first-up back in 1982.

The 1988 football season will be the shortest season for 43 years — I make it one day short of 24 weeks. The only other post war year that didn't last 24 weeks was in 1945.

Perth face a difficult first-up task for new coach Robert Wiley - they have not beaten East Fremantle at the WACA Ground for over 30 years! The Demons last win there was on August 10, 1957 - 14.12 to 13.9. Their record isn't all that bad, however, as they haven't met the Sharks at Lathlain

Attendance figures at this week's opening WAFL round will have a crucial significance on the whole season. Will the crowds drift back after last year's spectator drain to the Eagles?

Park for 28 years.

Last year less than 15,000 watched the first round. Go back to 1981 when 50,000 saw the first round — a split one perhaps. Go back to 1964 where the first three rounds drew over 40,000 each week.

Perhaps the 1964 season opened so well because three teams with new coaches brought fresh hope to their supporters.

Subiaco recruited Keith Slater as coach, Claremont recruited Jim Conway and Ray Sorrell switched from East Fremantle to South Fremantle after an unheard-of transfer fee of 2500 pounds had been paid.

### **OPENING ROUND RECORDS**

HERE are some opening round records to keep in mind this weeked:

Highest score 1986 Claremont 33.18 v South Fremantle. Lowest score (since 1921) 1949 Subiaco 3.6 v Swan Districts. Biggest win 1986 — 147 points by Claremont over South Fremantle. Most goals — 13 by Austin Robertson in 1968 v Swan Districts. Most goals by a nonfull forward — nine by Les Fong (West Perth) v South Fremantle in 1985.

Only three draws have occurred on day one in the last 50 years - and they all involve the Falcons.

In 1956 it was against Perth; 1969 against Claremont and 1960 against Perth again.

The hottest opening day? Perhaps day one in 1962 when the temperature reached 34 degrees celcius.

Here's a line for Swans new coach Ed Blackaby, who takes over from John Todd. It came from Fred Castledine when he took the reigns from Haydn Bunton in 1965. "Don't think the magic has gone just because the magician is not here any more."







### Concrete-like pitch hits players for six

Many players in the semi-finals last Tuesday were critical of the hard surface saying it was "too dangerous". This fuels the controversy over using the WACA for football before the end of the cricket season.

Henry caught the eye with some outstanding performances in country football last year.


He won two C-grade fairest and best medals at the Wesfarmers country championships for his efforts in both the regular competition and grand final.

Colts players Gavin Perry and Malcolm Williams have been given league opportunities pre-season and performed well.


Perry is a hard working rover who was always at the drop of the ball, while the slightly built Williams lacks no courage and could seriously press for a league berth on a wing.







AUSTRALIA'S inaugural Footy Week has heralded the beginning of another exciting football season.

WA's entire football world fully supported a week of activities designed to promote the game, its people and all the areas it encompasses.

The Eagles, the WAFL clubs, amateur clubs, Sunday and country football leagues, Super-Rules, women's and junior grades, schools, coaches, umpires, trainers and administrators all joined together for the first time to achieve the same goal for football.

Footy Week was the brainchild of the Football Development Trust and established to promote a great community awareness of Australian Rules football; to promote a meaningful, caring relationship between all areas of the game from juniors through to the Eagles.

The official launch was conducted by Graham Edwards, the Minister for Sport and Recreation, on Channel 7's World of Sport programme on Sunday, March 27.

Day one of Footy Week was Players Day, where each league sent senior players to their local juniors to take training sessions.

Coaches Day, Monday, March 28, saw a coaches seminar at the WAFL, co-ordinated by Brian Douge, with selected coaches from all leagues discussing "Assessing Coaches".

On the same day, Sunday and amateur league clubs invited former coaches to take training. The Coaches Code of Behaviour was released

through the media and a new Department of Sport and Recreation booklet on coaching presented to junior council coaches.

Day three saw the final of the Kresta Cup at the WACA Ground, with free entry for all juniors, a clinic at halftime.

THE 1988 CIG Shield enters its sixth year of round-robin and knockout football competition on April 18.

The Shield competition is open to all metropolitan and country Government and non-Government school students in years eight, nine and 10.

Grant Dorrington, a senior coordinator with the Football Development Trust, says that a record number of 99 secondary schools out of a possible 125 competed in the competition in 1987.

He said the FDT was committed to ensure that all available schools took part in the 1988 Shield. The closing date for nomination at the FDT was Friday, March 25.

Metropolitan schools will be grouped according to WAFL club resi-

dential boundaries, while country schools will be grouped geographically to minimise travel.

To assist with travel costs incurred by schools, \$2,500 will be distributed after the competition based on the distance travelled by each school.

Country schools will compete to decide three regional winners who will then play against their respective metropolitan zone winners to determine the league club zone champions.

Each league club's champion school will be awarded a zone shield at a function to be held before the final, while the coach and each player will receive a pennant.

Eight league club champion schools will battle it out in the finals series to decide the overall premier school and winner of the 1988 CIG Shield.

The premier school will also receive a \$500 voucher to be used for the purchase of sporting equipment to assist in the teaching of Australian football.

Runners-up will be awarded a \$250 voucher for the purchase of sporting equipment, while the best player in the grand final will receive the CIG Medal.

At this stage, three CIG matches are due to be played as curtain-raisers to Eagles games and the CIG grand final will be played before the State-Of-Origin match between WA and Victoria, at Subiaco Oval on July 5.

The CIG Shield, under the guidance of Grant Dorrington, continues to be a great example of a successful secondary school development programme. Its progression is due to support from the secondary school teachers of WA, the WAFL Development Managers and,

### Croweaters prove far too good

SOUTH Australia has proved beyond doubt that they are the leaders in State of Origin football.

By beating Victoria for the third successive year, and the fourth time in five years, the Croweaters can stand tall.

There is now a firm belief that SA football can survive any threat from the VFL and that the local competition has never been healthier.

With clever marketing, the SA hierarchy has wasted little time in capitalising on SA's second successive Australian championship by claiming the victory proves how healthy the domestic competition is.

Forget the fact that 14 of the players who represented SA in the carnival are now based in the VFL.

Blind parochialism, once considered the devine right of West Australians, is alive in SA.

How else can you explain why only 30,000 people turned up over the four days of the carnival to watch the best footballers in Australia, just days after 20,000 crammed Football Park to see a double-header which produced football similar to that seen in any pre-season trial game.

The poor crowds for the carnival have certainly raised doubts about such events being staged again.

Entry costs (\$12 for each game), timing of the carnival and hot weather on the opening day and cold weather on the closing day have all been blamed for the carnival being a financial flop.


It was even suggested that SA fans staged their own private demonstration against the VFL by staying away from the carnival.

The cost factor holds more credence.

Whatever the reason, the fans who stayed away were the losers, and ultimately, football will be the loser because if carnivals that attract the best footballers in the country can't draw big crowds then what sort of future is there for our national game.






