Now, let's get on with the game

FOOTBALL in the West can now lift its head and regain some pride. Hopefully!

The administrative bunglings of the last week or so — even the last six months — have helped sink footy off the field to a low point not befitting our great game.

And that, in turn, hits at the heart of the game we love.

Put bluntly, footy fans have got sick and tired of the beaucroatic bungling and procrastination over this proposed restructuring of the game's administration.

The fans get bored with constant media coverage of administrative squabbles. That's not the media's fault; they simply report what the administrators are doing...or not doing, rather.

The restructuring campaign has been a long, drawn-out saga that never seemed to be getting anywhere.

It was continual bickering between people who, supposedly, had the game's best interests at heart and knew what they were doing.

We now, however, have some unification on the question of football's future path; the Government has apparently agreed to chip in and support the new Football Commission and all parties have, we're told confidently, agreed to work together.

That's much better than the disgraceful happenings of last Friday, Saturday and Sunday when footy's personality squabbles and power struggles went public.

Football needs to be under one administrative roof; the West Coast Eagles don't need a King's Park Road address — even though their public company owners, Indian Pacific Ltd might — and we certainly don't need two groups of directors, chief executives, secretaries and so forth.

And we certainly need to solve the three-year saga of our elite team not having a permanent home.

Surely, now is the time to put that situation right and move the Eagles into Subiaco Oval.

Pointing the finger

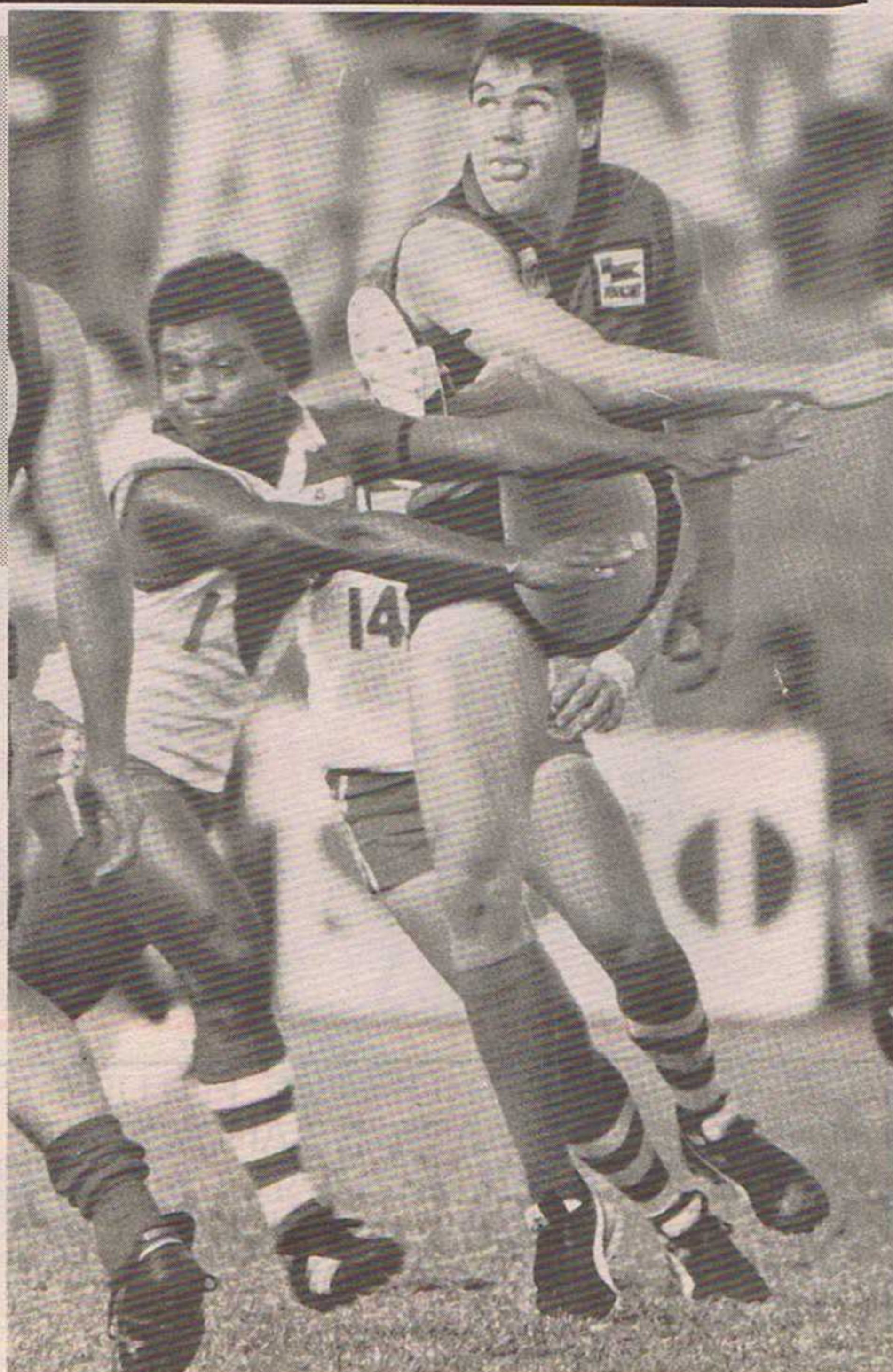

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POWER STRUGGLES

THE major controversy in WA football this season has occurred off the field.

The finances of the game are not in a healthy state and this has been made abundantly clear.

The people charged with finding those solutions would appear to have different interest at heart.

Perhaps football supporters, who by now are thoroughly sick of all the arguments about who is in control, would like to see a rundown from each group on what they perceive to be the problems and what action they believe should be taken.

In his book "Saturday Afternoon Fever: Sport in the Australian Culture," author Brain Stoddart says: "Many people serve their sports from a sense of civic duty, or from a desire to give back to the sport. Many, however, serve in order to pursue and exercise power. This pursuit and exercise of power gives rise to political struggles of great bitterness, remarkable resourcefulness, and sometimes long duration."

The FDT is encouraging and highlighting fair play in the youth competitions in our State.

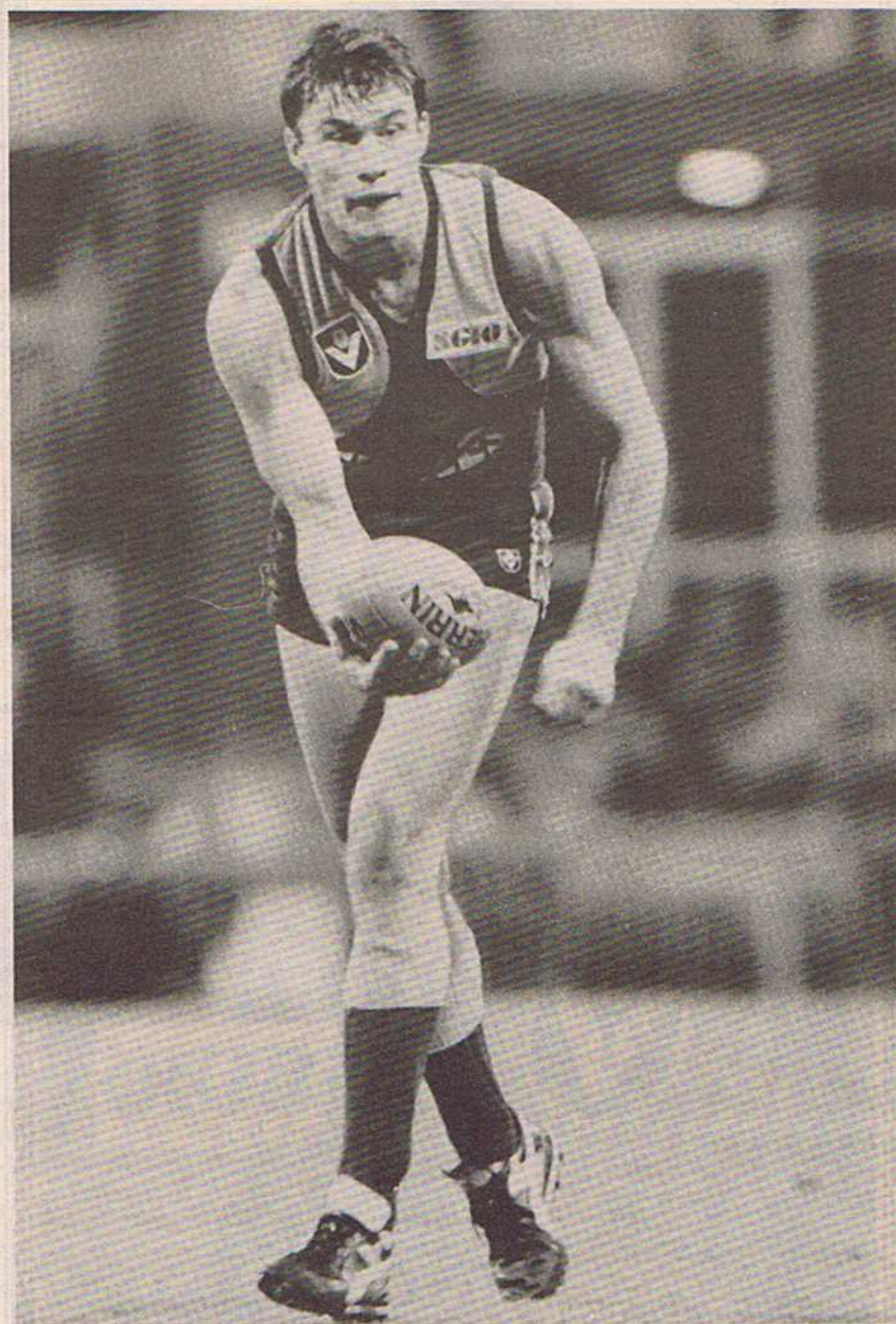
Many senior footballers are involved in carrying this message when they help out at junior clinics. Maybe they think about it when playing in league matches on a Saturday afternoon.

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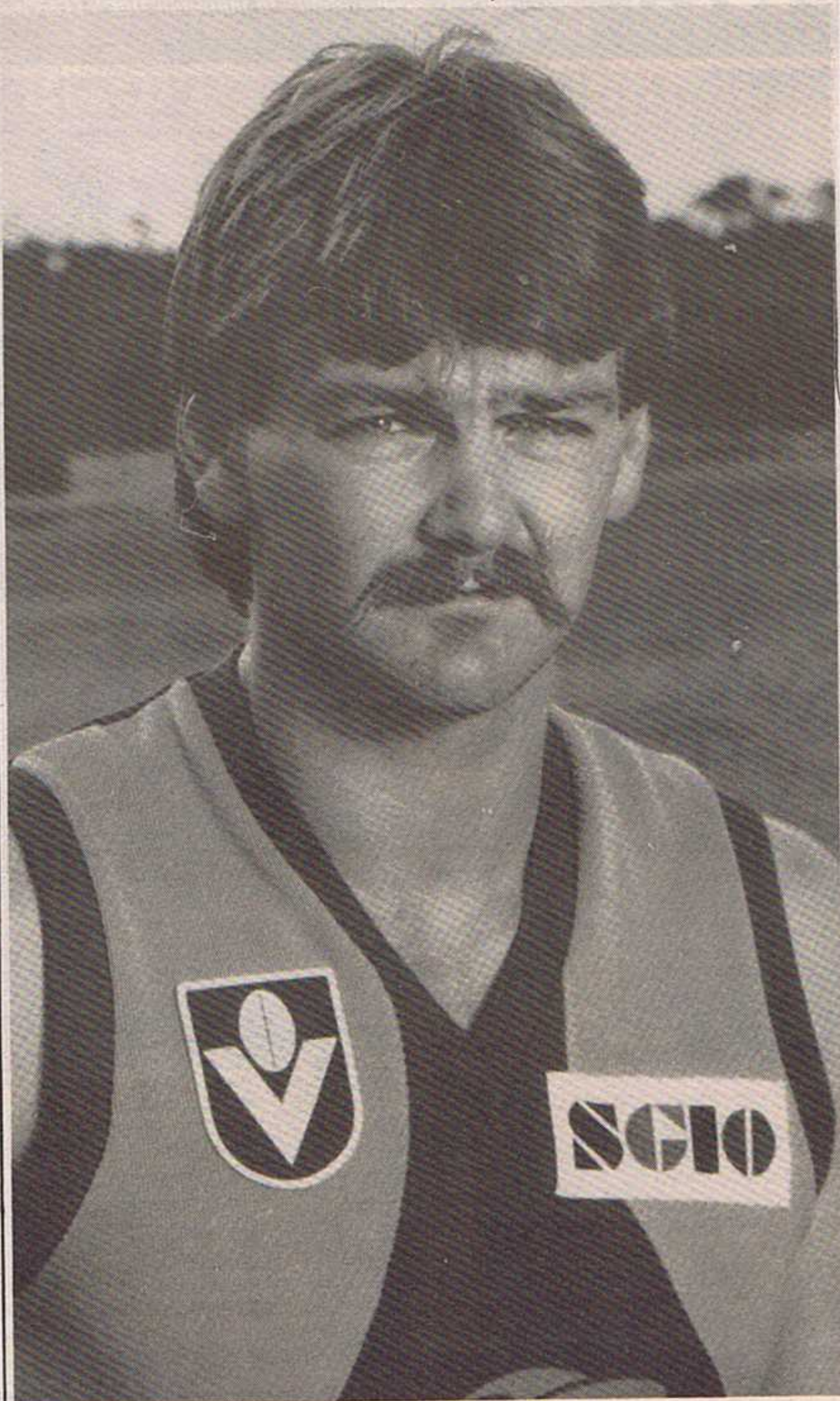

BULLDOGS READY FOR TIGERS

SOUTH Fremantle could be ready to clear the biggest hurdle of their football revival when they play Claremont at Fremantle Oval on Saturday.

The Bulldogs had a chance to prove their worth when they jumped Claremont at Albany on May 6, but could not convert the early ascendancy into victory.

With the prospect of having "Mr Magic" Maurice Rioli and clever rover Derek Collard back in action, the Bulldogs will have every incentive to beat Claremont, who are nestled comfortably at the top of the premiership tree.

When the first round clash was scheduled in Albany — and both sides were undefeated — there were sounds of disapproval from the city and suggestions

that the match could have attracted up to 12,000 if held in the metropolitan area.

This week we get the chance to see whether the public who were opposed to the fixturing were justified — they need to turn up at Fremantle Oval to prove their point.

Both teams boast some of the most talented and exciting midfield runners in the State.

For South, there are three Collards, the two Riolis and Peter Matera. For Claremont, there is Peter Thorne, Dale Kickett, Mark Hann and Julian Urquhart.

The Bulldogs will remember that it was Gerard Neesham who did the damage against them in Albany

and they will take some heart from the fact that he will be an absentee from this clash with a hamstring strain.

However, Claremont's strength is well spread and in defence they have the form centre-half-back of the competition in Mark Brayshaw and a handy full-back in John Scott.

South rely on their big-marking men to provide goals, while the Tigers use a variety of avenues ranging from the clever-marking Brendan Barrows to the electrifying skills of Kickett.

South are getting great service from their unheralded defenders, especially Steven Grant in his new role at full-back.

Royals face a let-down danger

Victory will not come easily because the Sharks are gaining momentum with every game and they are now realising the potential which saw them earn the label as pre-season premiership favourites.

It is indicative of the way they are playing that Peter Quill was dropped to the reserves last week — and young vice-captain Michael Broadbridge had the same experience a few weeks earlier.

West Perth gave one of their best performances of the season when they disposed of Subiaco and they will need to be at their best this week.

It is the work of Neesham at the top and a proven junior development campaign at Claremont that was in place long before he arrived at Tigerland.

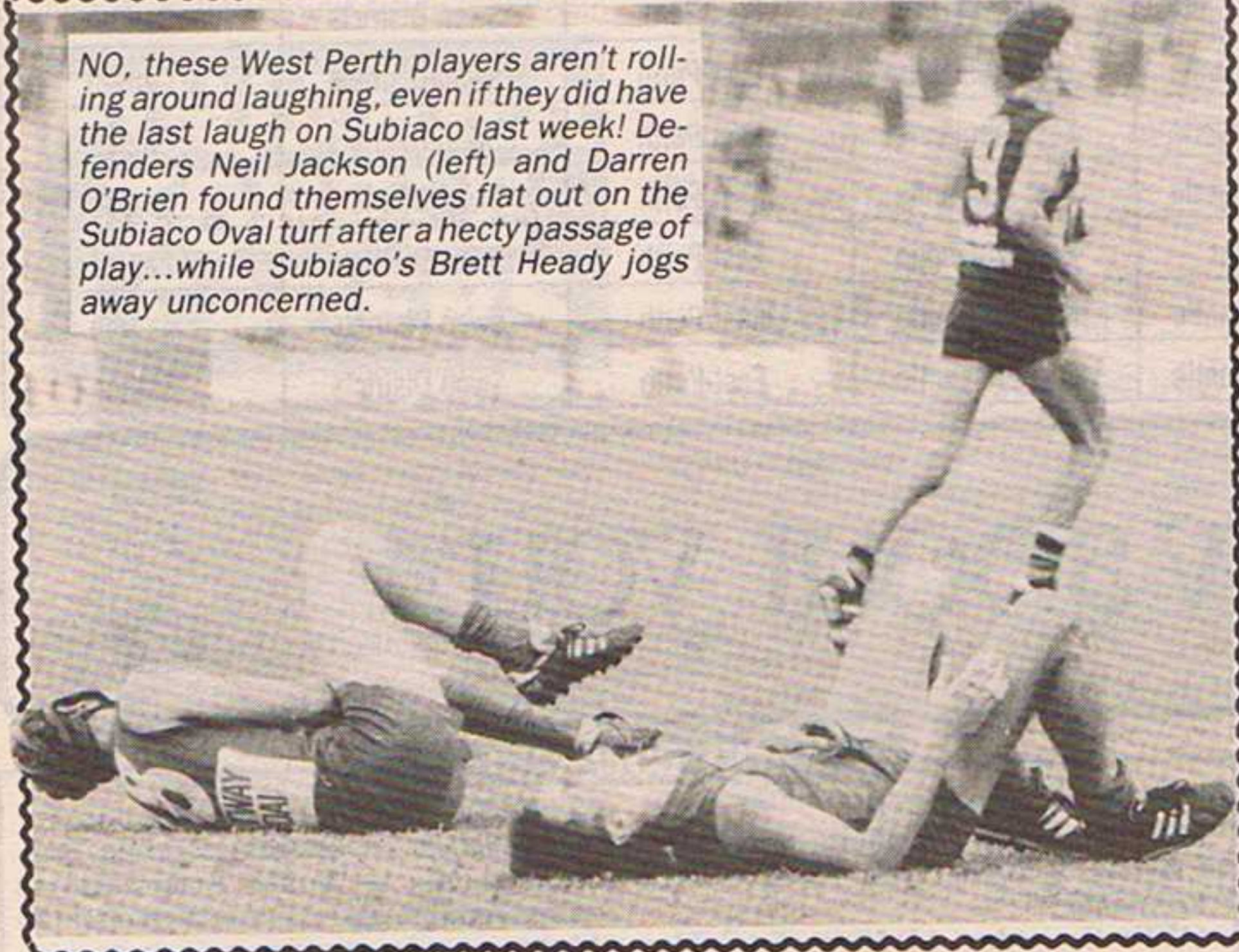
But love or hate Neesham, as so many fans choose to do, he is good for the game.

One wonders how the current Perth administration would have coped with the unpredictable Malcolm Brown in his recent coaching days.

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Peter the Great

PETER Sumich's mid-season purple-patch has impressed everyone, even harsh Eastern States critics who say he's now one of the VFL's most impressive rookies.

"Suma's" eight-goal effort against Footscray followed some greatly improved efforts both in defence and attack in the past month.

The 21-year-old from South Fremantle is genuine recruit-of-the-year material.

East Perth's David Bain has been a success with Brisbane, while East Fremantle's Darren Bennett (Melbourne) and Subiaco's John Georgiadies (Footscray) have also had their good days in the first half of the season.

Several of the first-year South Australian players are also highly rated, especially Sturt's Andrew Underwood (drafted in 1986) and West Torrens' Kieran Sporn, who are both at Essendon.

Brisbane's Phil Walsh says Bain would win the Bear's best and fairest award if votes were counted now.

Georgiadies kicked eight goals in his VFL debut against Carlton but has since spent time in the seconds.

Sumich and 1988 draftee Todd Breman have been among the most impressive new Eagles and are genuine players of the future with their adaptability and long kicking.

Wrensted in top gear

MURRAY Wrensted had 31 possessions for Collingwood at VFL Park last Saturday and may at last be settling into something like his best West Australian form.

He has played only three senior games, one in Sydney, one in Perth and the other at VFL Park.

This Saturday he will appear at his new home, Victoria Park, Collingwood, for the first time.

Another West Australian, Mark Bayliss, kicked 3.2 for the Magpies, being played off the interchange bench.

MCG just a bog

SPECULATION is mounting that the long-awaited Victoria-South Australia clash set down for the Melbourne Cricket Ground on July 1 should be transferred to VFL Park.

For many, it's the only viable option with the MCG in such a disgraceful condition.

Even if next weekend's two games were moved from the MCG, it's doubtful whether the ground could recover in time for the interstate game to be a good spectacle.

The condition of VFL Park was remarkably good last weekend, despite heavy rain in Melbourne for the past fortnight.

Football fans would understand the move, even if fewer could attend, because of Waverley's inferior public transport facilities.

Geelong keep rolling along

GEELONG recorded their sixth win in a row, all by nine goals or more, in Saturday's match against Melbourne. It is the first time for nearly nine years that the Cats have won six consecutive games.

The last time they did so was in 1980, when they put together a sequence of nine wins, commencing in Round 10. Geelong finished the qualifying rounds on top of the table in that year.

Their nine wins have been by an average of 33 points; their last six by an average of 95 points.

AS Geelong's percentage continues to climb, they are on target to become the first team for 18 years to finish the qualifying rounds with a percentage of over 150.

The Cats percentage is presently 170.7%. Hawthorn finished the qualifying rounds in 1971 with a percentage of 153.7%.

MELBOURNE's score of 2.8 against Geelong was the club's lowest for over 29 years. They scored 2.7 against Collingwood in Round 4 of 1960.

Their lowest scores since were 26 points, on two occasions, both against Carlton — an extremely inaccurate 2.14 in 1978, and 3.8 in 1984.

AT the 19-minute mark of the second quarter of the West Coast Eagles-Footscray match on Friday night, Peter Sumich became the fifth Eagles player to score seven goals in a VFL match.

Twenty five minutes into the third quarter, Sumich broke the Eagles club record, by kicking his eighth goal — a feat that had eluded the four other players to reach seven goals — Don Holmes, Chris Lewis, Ross Glendinning, and Phil Scott.

Sumich's five first-quarter goals — at the 10, 13, 16, 18 and 22 minute marks — are a record for one quarter for the Eagles, as is seven goals in a half.

Shane Cable on Friday night became the 10th player this year to make his debut for the West Coast Eagles and the 52nd player to represent the Eagles since they entered the VFL in 1987.

In their first year in the VFL 33 players represented the Eagles. Of the 33 players to play for the Eagles last year, nine hadn't played in 1987.

So far in 1989, 36 players have taken the field for the Eagles, 26 of whom had played last year.

The Eagles played an impressive brand of football in beating Footscray at the WACA Ground last Friday night.

The return of Phil Scott, John Worsfold, Andrew Lockyer, David O'Connell and Dean Laidley gave them a far greater physical presence than the previous week when they were knocked easily off the ball by Collingwood.

Todd is unlikely to make too many changes to that team for this week's show-down, though he will spend plenty of time choosing the player to mind Blues captain Stephen Kernahan.

The WAFL voted the Eagles and all their associated problems into existence — helped in no mean way by an "independent board" set up under Government support.

It's taken them a mighty long time to get back some negotiating power, but hopefully the leadership of Peter Tannock, John Fuhrmann and Kevin Edwards will now enable the two divisions to forge a beneficial relationship — and not rob each other to pay each other.

The financial woes of football have to be addressed immediately, with some stiff bullet-biting decisions taken; especially on ground rationalisation.

Eagles chief executive Bill Kerr is not yet on the new Commission, though he can become a member

(along with WAFL hard-liner John Cooper) when the initial financial dealings between the WAFL and the Eagles over ownership (and the price) are resolved.

But you can bet that Kerr will be pulling most of the strings...as he has done to date; and naturally so with the Eagles dominant influence.

The appointment of current WAFL chief executive Brian Cook — a man who has tried to get things done in the last six months — as Commission secretary gives the WAFL strong organisational input.

WAFL people steeped in tradition and demanding equal rights with the Eagles are living in the past. There's still a place for WAFL club football, but it's not the power-broker any more; the paying public have decided that.

What is needed now are some positive moves to heal the rifts; re-organise club funds (and that includes our ninth club, the West Coast Eagles) and bring the whole operation under one united roof.

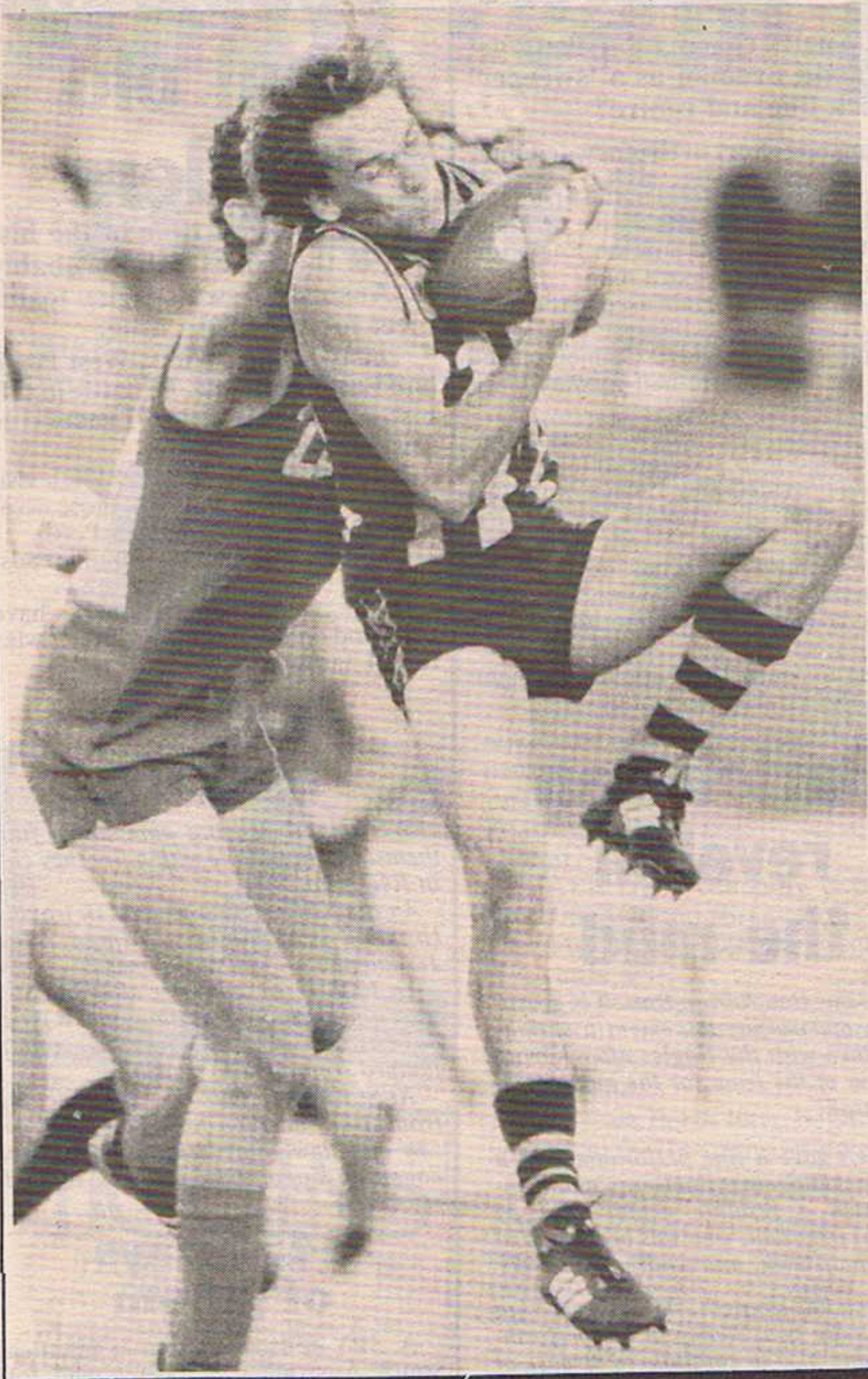

JOHN Cooper and Harry Morgan have something in common — they have both been chief administrators of premiership clubs.

For Bill Kerr to allege that they are not objective is an indication that his knowledge of them is shallow.

They have worked long and hard over many years to maintain the reputation of two of the most successful clubs in WA.

Kerr's objectivity goes as far as the Eagles and possibly so it should.

Next year the Eagles will have access to only two players from our local competition, which by the rules has become a breeding ground for all VFL clubs.

Kerr's interest is with the Eagles and to remove people from the Commission who may be more interested in the local competition would make things easier for him.

John Cooper has had extensive experience in the area of finance and Harry Morgan's successful business record speaks for itself.

History

Both these men have had a long connection with the game and their ability to administer the sport is written in the history books.

But I believe that for him to have no previous knowledge of the game and then be able to carry out administrative duties properly would be extremely difficult.

Cooper and Morgan have had a lifetime of experience and more than their share of success in football. To lose their qualities and expertise from the Commission would be a blow to West Australian football.

I THOUGHT for one moment on Saturday that Nicky Yarran was going to kick the winning goal for East Perth and have the last laugh.

Yarran's pre-season at Claremont was outstanding and the difficulty of breaking into the league side saw him opt for another club.

Assured in his mind that he would get a game at East Perth, his confidence soared and his three-goal tally on Saturday was his lowest score for the new club since changing over.

East Perth were more than competitive and at the 10-minute mark of the last quarter it was hard to see us getting up for a win.

They are still a slim chance for a spot in the four and I don't think anyone will be taking them lightly, especially with the imminent return of Grant Campbell.

High marks earn top marks

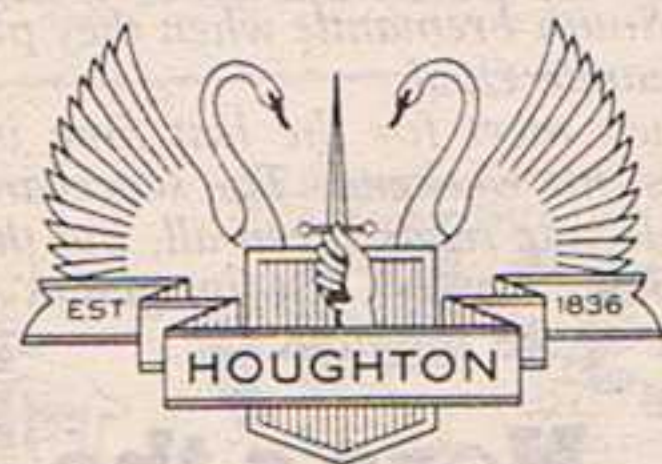
THE high marking at the East Perth-Claremont game was as good as anything I've seen for a long time.

Eagles face a muddy weekend

The Eagles will not be able to train on Princes Park on Friday afternoon, but will have a run on the adjacent park which will be just as heavy underfoot.

Against Footscray Breman was again used in the same role, this time with greater success because the Eagles forwards held their marks and David O'Connell played up the ground from the true centre-half-forward position.

This created space for Peter Sumich, who was in sensational form, and he used it to good advantage.

In effect the move provided the Eagles with two centre-half-forwards with Stevan Jackson a third alternative at full-forward.

The Breman factor is still a worry because while he picks up kicks, the forward line is continually one short and Breman never seems to guard any opposition player at all.

It will be interesting to see if Todd applies the same strategy this week in the Princes Park mud.

Flanked by Brad Tunbridge/Lance Durack at full-forward and Neil Lester Smith, he made up an imposing forward line.

And what about the skill of rover Bradley Rowe?

I've sung Rowe's praises all year, and again on Saturday, in the first half before he collected a heavy knock, he showed his class.

He is a true rover with pace, skill and balance. With class rovers at an absolute premium around Australia, Rowe will prove to be the No.1 draft choice out of WA at the end of '89.

Shining example

SWANS coach Ed Blackaby's decision to start captain Brad Shine on the interchange bench was a little bewildering, but, according to Blackaby, his form had been down and he also had a minor knee problem.

Certainly Blackaby's decision to put Shine on the field three minutes into the second quarter was nearly a match-winning move.

Shine immediately took control for Swans midfield, and the gutsy skipper led by example, setting up many a Swans forward drive.

Shine's best role for Swans is midfield as a ruck-rover, with the occasional burst in the centre, where he can direct the traffic and get the hard ball.

It will also be the Sharks' 100th visit to Leederville but on two of those occasions they didn't meet West Perth.

So their record at that ground reads: 39 wins, 57 losses and one draw.

In the overall tally the Sharks have the wood on the Falcons, with 172 wins to 124 and two draws.

Jeza to rescue

WHEN oil drilling companies find themselves in trouble with a fire they call in Red Adair.

In the VFL when a team is in trouble they call in a chap named Alex Jesaulenko — well sometimes.

Sumich and Jackson can be a double take

WHAT a difference a full-forward makes!

Since Ross Glendinning hung up his boots over summer, the West Coast Eagles have struggled to kick goals — a fact that obviously has played on coach John Todd's mind.

He tossed that fact up after the Eagles had been cleaned up by Collingwood at Subiaco Oval two games ago.

He pointed out how the Eagles had battled to kick more than 12 goals in most matches... and to win they needed to restrict the opposition to a score under that.

That comment is brought right into focus when you look at the Eagles two wins this season — against the Brisbane Bears and last Friday against Footscray.

Reliable

It's no coincidence that on both occasions the Eagles had someone in attack who was a reliable goal-scorer.

First it was Stevan Jackson in his debut and on Friday it was Peter Sumich.

Interestingly, both were hailed as the possible saviour of the Eagles after their top performances.

Unfortunately for Jackson — and the Eagles — he was given far too big a wrap after his effort against Brisbane.

But that was not surprising; the Eagles had little to glow about until then and the media had little to write about.

But Jackson did not prove to be the answer, even though he is developing into a valuable member of the side.

Is the same going to happen to Sumich?

There is no doubt that both have enormous potential. But they still have a long way to go before they can be considered to be in the Tony Lockett of Jason Dunstall class.

But that's not Todd's immediate headache.

He really has to decide which of these two players is going to be the focal point in attack and simply persevere with him.

It compounds the problem when you realise they have a totally different approach to full-forward.

Sumich is best leading, while Jackson likes to lurk around the goal square and take the strong mark.

It's taken a long while, basically though necessity, to realise that Sumich is a forward, not a defender. He prefers to attack the ball and seems at sea when he has to check an opponent. But injuries in defence forced Todd to play him there.

Tactics

While it could be good tactics to employ both men in the forward line, with Sumich leading because of his speed off the mark and ability to kick over long distances, leaving Jackson in a man-to-man situation in the goal-square, it comes unstuck when the ball comes in long and high and both are competing.

The Vics are too adept at spoiling in that type of situation.

In the long term the Sumich-Jackson situation could provide a bit of a dilemma.

Though he has shown he can be used in the ruck, Jackson is essentially a full-forward, while Sumich has more flexibility and is equally at home at centre-half-forward.

Deciding which of these two players will provide the answer in the long term will not be easy.

I would opt for Sumich in the short term, but in the long term I'd be looking at using him at centre-half-forward and Jackson at full-forward.

While they are both still learning about Victorian football, they provide the Eagles with hope for the future in respect to their forward line.

It's the kind of headache that the Eagles will be able to live with once they adapt. But for the time being, not too much should be expected of these two players.

There are some very good and experienced defenders in the VFL and they will continue to give both players a torrid initiation.

More often than not, the Eagles pair won't have things their way. But give them a season or two and they could turn into two of the outstanding forwards in the competition.

Send-off can be tough ... but it certainly works!

THERE has been plenty of talk over the years about the value of a send-off rule in Australian Rules football — and I've been supportive of the idea many times.

The send-off rule would help umpires control the game far better than the present method.

But I must admit there can be some severe reactions — such as this example in local soccer.

John Stubbs, a workmate of mine, plays soccer for Canning City, currently the top team in the A-section of a Sunday amateurs competition.

During a recent match, something upset John and he said loud enough for the Ref. to hear: "You've got to be '.....' joking".

Being a gentle soul, the Ref. took umbrage and presented John with a red card and an immediate trip to the showers.

Canning City finished the last 20 minutes of the game one man short, but they went on to win 3-0.

Exodus

Stubbs's exodus was pretty sudden-death stuff and he took the matter up with the Ref. when they had a friendly chat sometime later. The Ref. simply said that he hadn't liked the tone of John's voice.

The Ref. pointed out that he was responsible for the send-off; not the two week suspension that followed. The Soccer Federation applied that after reading the Referees match report!

In fairness to the Ref., he had called both teams in before the game and told them that he wasn't going to tolerate certain things — and bad language was one of them! The Ref. warned that any wrong-doers would cross the boundary line...and Stubbsy found out that he wasn't kidding.

Now, this particular incident might have been a bit over-done, but there are a couple of things that do appeal to me in such cases.

The first is that the Ref. must submit a written report after each game and the Federation, or tribunal, can act upon that. He does not have to be present to defend his actions and concerns himself solely with the conduct of the match.

Authority

Players don't have the right of appeal and they are therefore pretty wary of the Ref. and respect his authority. They know that if they are charged, their chances of getting off are zero — in other words, his word is law.

One wonders how a soccer referee would have viewed Michael Christian, sitting on Chris Lewis and over-doing the physical side of the game in the Collingwood-Eagles clash.

Christian's feet wouldn't have touched the ground on the way over the boundary — and his vacation time would have been a lot longer than two weeks.

It would be interesting to see how those same Referees might handle all-in brawls that Australian Rules administrators condone week after week.

And they can't be blamed for that.

There were a little more than 13,000 people at the game and surely that number would have been bigger if the fixture had been played on the Sunday at Subiaco Oval.

Facilities

The facilities do not cater for the public — and the media have been left out in the cold as well.

It is the media's responsibility to bring all those people at home up to speed with what's happening, but that is almost impossible at the WACA Ground.

When the Eagles were admitted to the VFL, one of the conditions was to have a facility for night matches, but the WACA Ground has not proven a winner.

From a spectator's point of view, it is comfortable during the pre-season and early rounds, but it is a bit rich to ask the fans out on a freezing Friday night in the middle of June.

If the game quota for the WACA Ground has to be adhered to, let's get them over as quickly as possible.

ONE of the most important areas of coaching is the need to continually look for new methods, ideas or thoughts on how to handle players.

The statement that "you never stop learning" is paramount to all areas of life, not only with football.

Collecting football articles is one of the best methods of developing your own football library — and a recent browse through my collection of comments from other coaches emphasised why Guy McKenna is a key part of the West Coast Eagles team.

An article by Essendon coach Kevin Sheedy on the retirement of a former great Richmond team-mate of his in Francis Bourke gave an ideal comparison to McKenna.

Premiership

Bourke was one of Richmond's favourite sons and a backbone of their golden premiership years; factors that Sheedy pointed out in his tribute.

Clubs are always looking for the "premiership success recipe" and Richmond had it because of the quality of men in the team.

Looking at the Eagles efforts to become a football power, there is a strong comparison between Bourke and Bluey McKenna.

Sheedy's article says it all ... simply change the name Francis Bourke to Guy McKenna and it's a look into the future.

"Francis Bourke was the complete team man and I never felt uneasy playing alongside him because of his strong, disciplined and courageous approach to the game."

"I was always confident that Francis would be around to help when needed because of his leadership qualities and coolness under pressure."

"That sort of player instills confidence into his team mates and, in my case, it was morale-boosting just to have him around in a tight match."

"When I think of Francis's great on-field qualities I believe that they started off-field. Everything he did was based on a genuine love and commitment for his club — he bred the greatest team characteristic — HONESTY."

Watching McKenna play each week and having the pleasure of knowing him as a friend, the qualities that have made him into one of the game's youngest stars are so evident in Sheedy's analysis of Bourke.

Little, who started as a ruck-rover and then had a turn in the centre, played a steady game to be among the Sharks better players in an even team performance.

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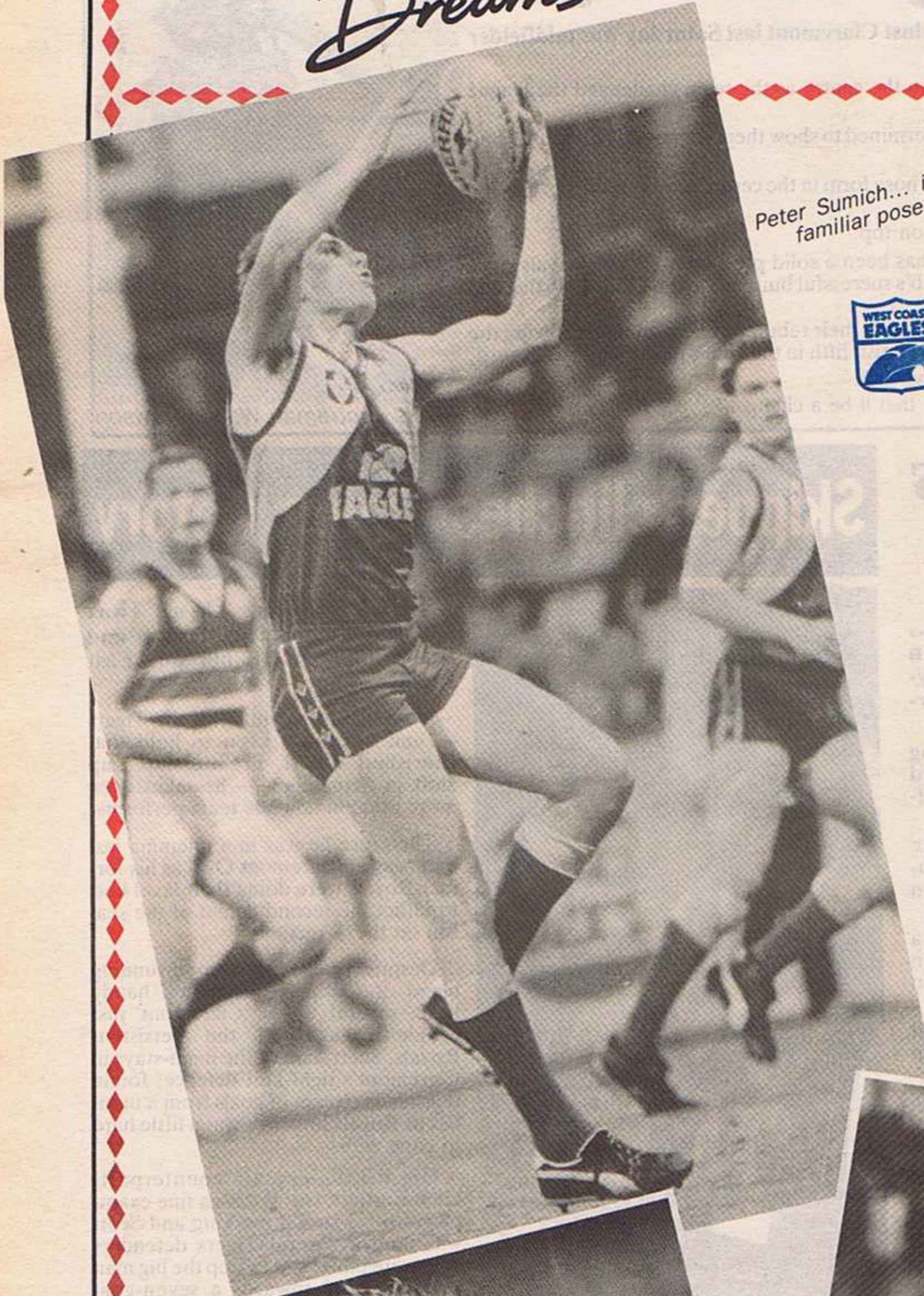
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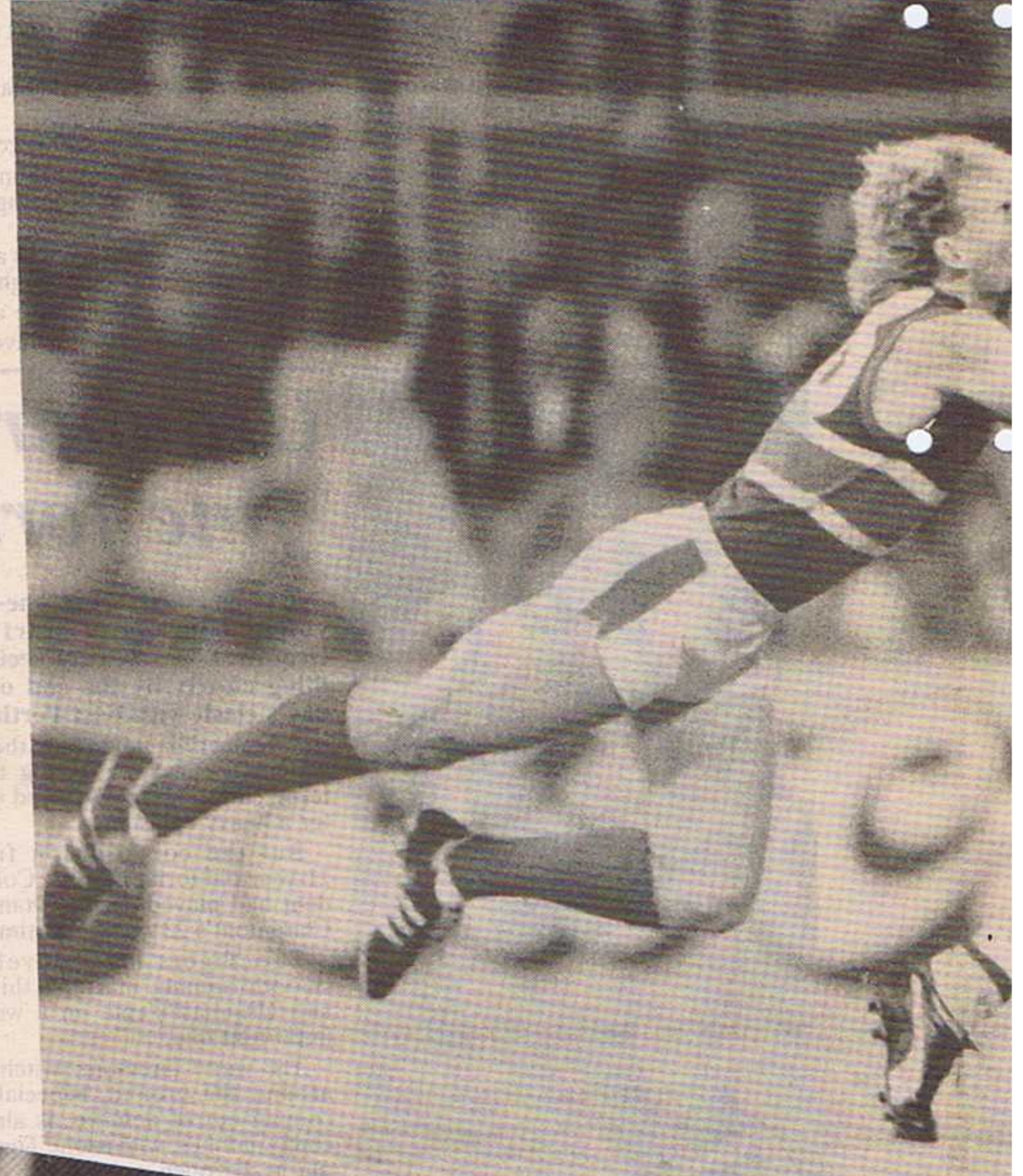
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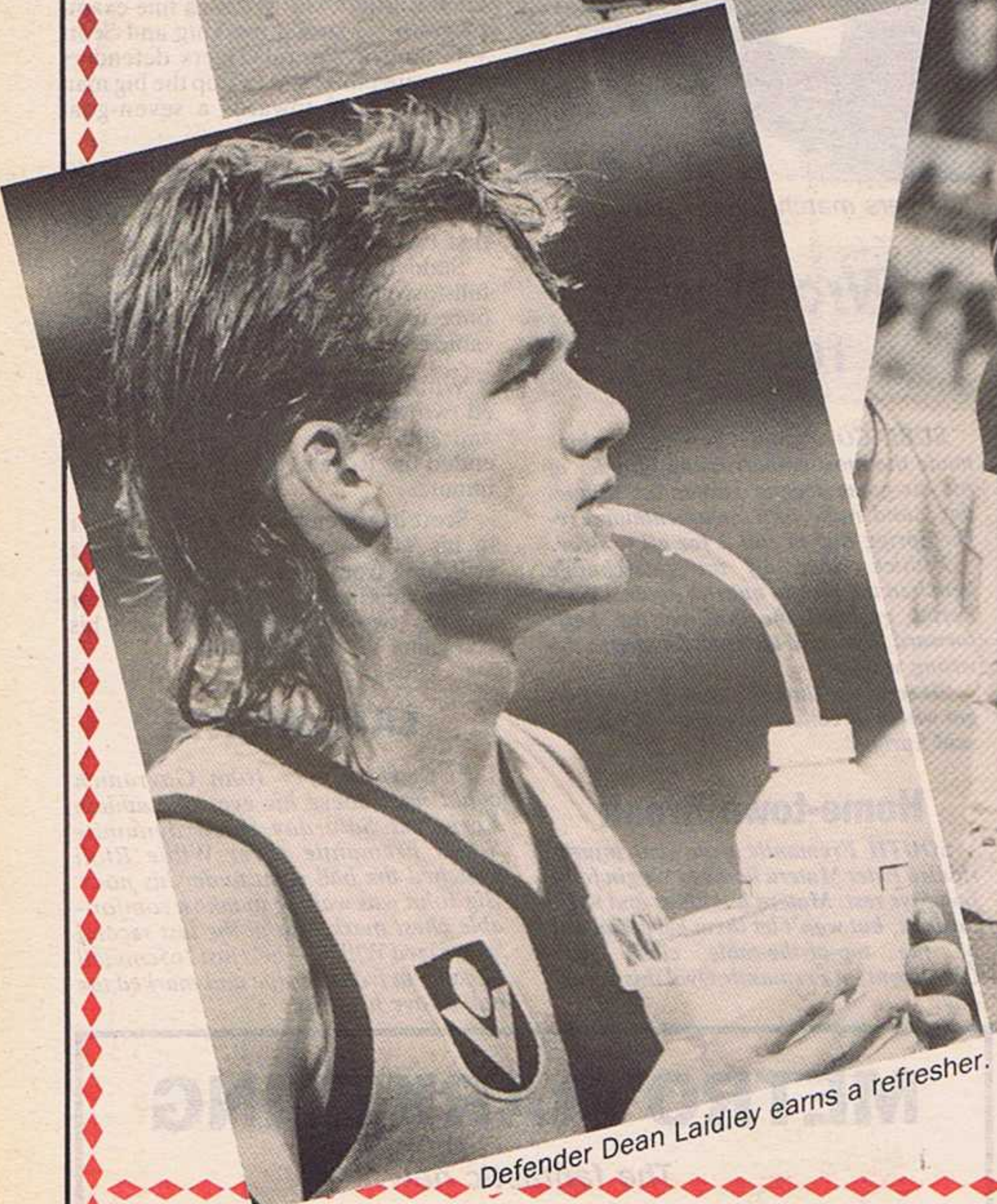

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Small team gets big results for Royals

THERE could be fewer more dedicated people to the cause of WAFL survival than East Perth's general manager Alex Wilson.

Known as Marbles to one and all, Mr Wilson believes that ample doses of continued hard work will soon see the Royals hold the WAFL premiership flag again.

When that might happen only time will tell. But in the mean-time, the hard-working G.M. is overcoming the harsh realities of money-tight football, 1989 style.

Gone are the four office people who used to keep the Royals administration running — there are now just two — and missing also is the healthy WAFL end-of-season dividend.

WAFL clubs can only expect a \$50,000 dividend this season, compared to the \$265,000 they received two years ago.

"With operating costs of \$555,000, we must find another \$505,000 by our own means," Mr Wilson said.

And East Perth have begun well with \$250,000 in sponsorship deals.

Great support

"We're very thankful to our sponsors," he said. "From top to bottom, they are very loyal to us and we appreciate their support."

The Royals expect to raise the remainder of their cash short-fall via gate receipts at their adopted home ground, the WACA, weekly bingo sessions at Cannington, general fund-raising and by having the West Coast Eagles based at Perth Oval with the de-licencing of their function centre, enabling the venue to be used for a variety of outside events.

Membership has grown to a healthy 1750, generating some \$40,000 to East Perth this season.

When Mr Wilson joined East Perth as general manager in 1984, there were four other members of the staff. Now, as with other clubs, there are just two.

Receptionist

The G.M.'s only full-time assistant is receptionist Liz Van Leeuwen, who has worked for the Royals since 1984.

With the departure of her former office work-mates, Miss Van Leeuwen is now also the office secretary — and that job incorporates just about every other office duty imaginable.

"I do everything that needs to be done to keep the office going," Miss Van Leeuwen said.

Mr Wilson said that the highlight of East Perth's season was the long weekend the Royals had in Dampier when they beat Swan Districts.

"That weekend brought the players closer together and since then we have been playing better as a team," he said.

"We think that our recent form is a good sign for the club's future."

While East Perth have survived on a reduced office staff, Mr Wilson was quick to thank the huge team of Royals volunteers who have done a tremendous amount of work at the club again this season.

"I wouldn't like to single any one person out," Mr Wilson said. "But the social committee certainly warrants a mention. They've been great."

Royals members have traditionally been dedicated people used to winning; but in recent years they have had to suffer some lean periods.

But the club's recent good form — combined with the spirited off-field activities — proves that there is plenty of life left in the Royals.

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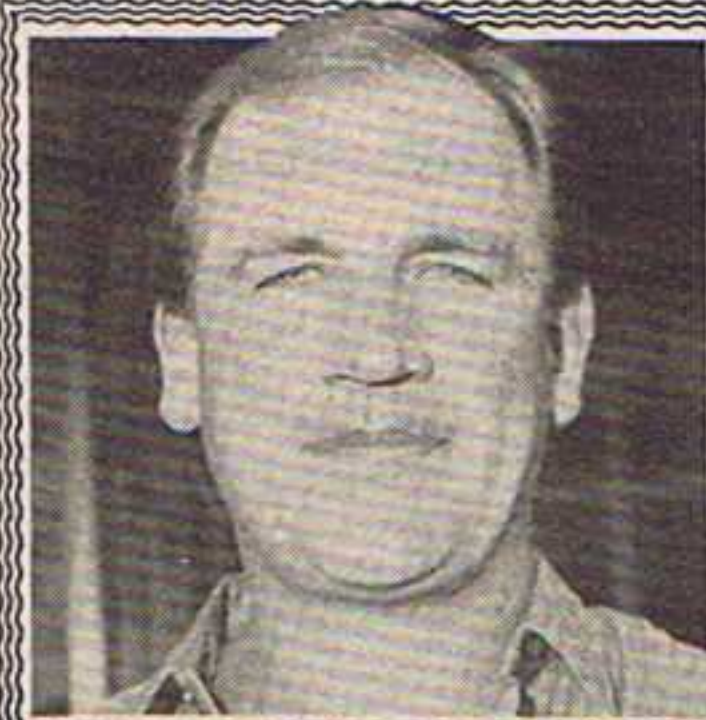

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TRIBUNAL FARCE

DAVID Rhys-Jones is a unique footballer in many respects.

He's the sort of player opposing supporters love to hate and opponents, or a least some of them, enjoy trying to unsettle by word or deed.

Last Friday, the VFL's most reported player put himself in line for another distinction.

He may become the first player in history who will be required to give the VFL prior notice of his intention to retire.

With suspended sentences being added to suspended sentences, Rhys-Jones could finish up with quite a backlog to clear before he has paid his debt to the football society.

VFL tribunal chairman Neil Busse is making a determined effort to clean up the game and, together with the VFL commissioners, will eventually get the penny to drop with even the dumbest players....don't do the wrong thing or you won't be playing next week!

However, it seems Rhys-Jones is the tribunal's achilles heel and reason enough for this whole suspended sentence business to be abandoned.

Not working

If the former Sydney Swan can be found guilty (having already received a two-match suspended sentence last season) and not miss matches, the system isn't working or the rules have changed.

I have no problems with the VFL commissioners acting on video evidence to enforce the laws of the game.

As if players evading report is paramount, surely protecting good players and potential matchwinners should figure prominently in a club's thinking when it comes to the tribunal and video evidence.

The day may come when clubs decide to isolate cameras on their own star players as a means of insurance.

More careful

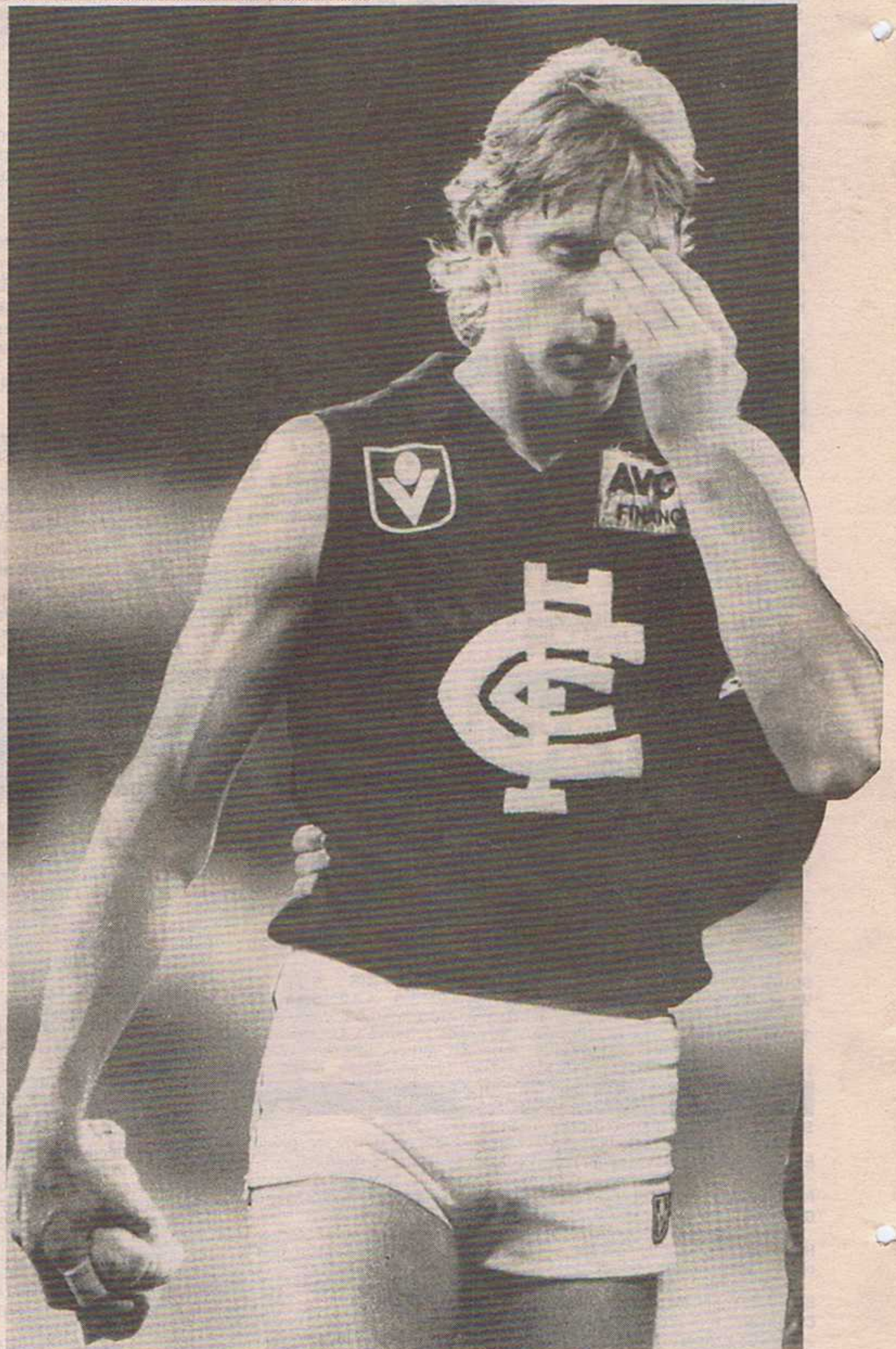
It may not be the ideal way of doing things but perhaps a fortnight ago Rhys-Jones and Williams would have been more careful had their respective clubs gone to those lengths.
