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## No advantage for Eagles

**BOUYANT** West Coast Eagles coach Mick Malthouse rejects suggestions that the team has a home ground advantage in their WACA Ground clash with Carlton on Friday night.

"Just because the match is being played in Perth, doesn't mean we have an automatic advantage," he says.

"The WACA isn't our home ground — we only have seven home games this season and they're at Subiaco Oval.

"That's our home, not the WACA."

Malthouse says his Eagles game plan is developing steadily.

"It's significant that we have the lowest total score recorded against us in the competition," he says.

And the West Coasters will need to be at their defensive best to combat Stephen Kernahan — the best centre-half-forward in the AFL — and his talented forwards who emerged in impressive style against Eagles conquerors St Kilda on Saturday.

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# CROWD CONTROL UNDER FIRE

THE State Football League's decision to telecast a club game live across the State each Saturday has back-fired and is proving to be an embarrassment to the sport.

The problem is brought about by the hordes of people flocking onto the ground before the match and during the breaks between quarters.

ABC television commentators Wally Foreman, Trevor Jenkins and Keith Slater were highly-critical of the situation during last Saturday's Derby clash between East Fremantle and South Fremantle.

What should have been a showcase of talent and a great advertisement for the sport, turned out to be a shameful situation with a complete lack of crowd control and a total absence of player-security.

In an incident-packed afternoon:

\*League officials contacted the East Fremantle Football Club several times urging them to try and control children climbing over the fence encircling the playing arena.

\*Players and children were endangered by groups of youngsters crowding behind the goals — inside the arena.

\*An East Fremantle player was hit on the head with a wayward football kicked into the Sharks group at the three-quarter time break.

\*Women and children mixed among the Sharks players at the three-quarter time break preventing coach Ron Wilcox from properly addressing his players.

\*Both sides were prevented from doing a proper pre-match warm-up as the oval was crowded with fans, young and old.

"It's an absolute Mickey Mouse situation," said

Foreman, the executive director of WA's Institute of Sport and one of the nation's most experienced sports commentators.

"It's not only dangerous, but it's disgraceful to see. This is supposed to be the showpiece of our local football; not something that you would expect in an out-back country game.

"We're heading for real trouble unless the crowds are controlled. We have seen some particularly dangerous situations and something serious will happen shortly. Allowing kids onto the ground is great for the game;

for their participation. But it has to be controlled and not be allowed to interfere with the game."

Subiaco coach Haydn Bunton refused to address his players at three-quarter time a week earlier when the milling crowd included many women and children. He said that he didn't want to discuss situations with his players while fans were listening. It wasn't fair to "dress" guys down when people who looked up to them were standing by.

Slater, a veteran of four decades of football and cricket playing and commentating, was highly critical of the kids being allowed behind the goals at East Fremantle Oval.

"Someone is going to get hurt and then maybe the league will do something," he said.

## Not impressed

**EAST Fremantle football legend and current club patron, Jack Sheedy, is unimpressed with the Sharks school of 1990.**

Following last Saturday's clash with South Fremantle, the former tough and unyielding centreman criticised the endeavour of some Sharks.

Sheedy was disappointed with the players who

finished the losing derby unmarked.

"You must commit everything in the game," he said.

"We'll have better days then and the club looks forward to them.

"I started off as a messenger boy and then became a player, skipper and coach.

"I hope that's the aspirations of every player."

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## Footy Rumours

### WHAT A TURNAROUND?

FOOTBALL officials of bygone days would turn over in their graves if they could hear what today's hierarchy are planning to do. Encourage soccer to flourish in the West! Never! THE West Coast Eagles have made a considerable fuss about after-match control in relation to fans running onto the ground. More security men than footballers were at Subiaco Oval after the Collingwood game and the kids were kept off till the players had exited the arena. The Eagles said that this was an AFL ruling — not their decision. How come, then, that it doesn't apply at the Western Oval? The ground was invaded by kids when the final siren went — with the Eagles home easy winners.

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### UNWELCOME SHAKE

EAGLES coach Mick Malthouse was delighted with the win over his old side Footscray at his former beloved Western Oval. While he enjoyed some genuine good wishes from former club-mates, he did cop a barrage of spittle and other abuse. How about the youngster who ran up to Mick after the game and shook his hand? Mick quickly had to wipe his hand on his track suit pants — one wonders what the tricky kid had on the inside of his palm!!

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### DEDICATION LACKING

RON Wilcox seems to be unhappy with the dedication of some of his senior Sharks. Six players who lined up against Swan Districts the previous week were dropped or unavailable to play against South Fremantle last Saturday. Out were skipper George Christie (sore back), Brian Peake, Revis Ryder, Bryce Forman, Peter Quill (hamstring) and Robert Zupanovich. It was ironic that the club's best players in the reserves the previous week — Robbie Weber and Billy Krakouer — received the same awards in the league side last Saturday.

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### NERVOUS START

YOU would never accuse a league footballer of being a coward, because it takes some degree of courage to run over that white line. But any casual observer of Saturday's Derby would have been excused for thinking that some of the blue-and-white guernsey-wearer were a little afraid of those menacing red-and-white Bulldogs! 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# The Cable legend changes venue

**RUNNING** down the players' race onto Lathlain Park alongside each other is something the Cable brothers, Barry and Shane, have always cherished doing.

At the end of the 1988 season they were in Perth's league team together for three games, but none at Lathlain Park, the ground where their famous father reigned supreme for most of the 1960s.

But when Barry and Shane Cable finally achieved that dream as they ran onto the ground on Easter Monday, it was the end of an era — they ran down the visitors' race wearing the colours of the Subiaco Football Club.

The departure of the Cable family from the Perth Football Club was complete and while father Barry and mother Helen were sitting in the Lathlain Park grandstand as normal, they were not barracking for the home side.

The last remaining link between the Cable family and Perth was broken late last month when WASFL arbitrator Brian Sierakowski intervened in a clearance wrangle between the Demons and Subiaco and cleared Shane Cable to the Lions.

The Cable name has been synonymous with the Demons since the 1960s when Barry snr set this State's football arenas alight with his quality roving displays and sons Barry jnr and Shane had carried on the family ties at Lathlain Park since they began playing in Perth's minor grades in 1985.

## SUCCESSFUL

Shane, the younger at 20, has been the more successful of the two Cables so far, playing 34 league games with Perth since making his debut in 1987 and a further three with Subiaco this season. In 1989 he gained selection in the West Coast Eagles squad and he made his debut for the Eagles in the same season.

Shane became the first Eagles player to change his WASFL home base — a move now duplicated by Peter Melesso and Joe Cormack — and a transfer fee of \$7500 was set by Sierakowski.

Shane was surprised that the settlement took so long and he admits that the conflict hampered his build-up to the season.

"It's been going on since last November and I really don't think it should have carried on for as long as it did," he said. "I'm just happy that it's over and I can get on with playing football, which is what I'm here for."

"Because of the clearance trouble, I could only play one pre-season practice match when the Eagles second side played Subiaco, as well as two intra-club games."

## STRUGGLING

While Shane was cementing his place in Perth's league side and earning Eagles selection, Barry (21)

was struggling to come to terms with league football after making his debut in 1988. When he was approached by Subiaco at the end of last season, he decided it was time to make the change.

"Subiaco asked me to come and have a try, so I said why not?," Barry jnr said.

"I had been at Perth for five seasons, playing only six league games, so I decided that the opportunities just weren't there for me."

The brothers are the only children in the Cable household and coming from such a close-knit family was the main reason why Shane followed suit and packed his bags for Subiaco Oval.

"Barry and I have been playing football together since we were 10 years old at Kenwick and we didn't think that link should be broken," Shane said.

The brothers admit that making the decision to cut their ties with Perth was not an easy one, but since the switch they haven't looked back.

Barry, who at 183cm and 82kgs is 3cm taller and 6kgs heavier than Shane, played his first senior game for Subiaco on Monday after some outstanding performances on a wing in the reserves. Shane has been among Subiaco's best players this season and was doing well on Monday until he left the ground with a shoulder injury in the second quarter.

## UPSETTING

"It was very hard leaving Perth and a bit upsetting, but I felt that I had done my service there," Barry said. "I had been there for five years — it's not as though I only gave it one shot and then left."

Another well-documented reason for the duo leaving Perth was to play under Subiaco coach Haydn Bunton, who, like the Cable brothers, had to pursue a football career with the added pressure of a father's illustrious football career hanging over his head.

Bunton and his assistant coach Bryan Cousins, also an outstanding player at Perth before taking up coach-

ing duties at Subiaco this year, were quick to understand the challenges ahead of the Cable brothers and Barry and Shane have responded to their new environment in fine style.

"When I was playing at Perth I was regarded as a defender and played most of my football in the back-line or as a tagger," Barry said. "Whereas at Subiaco I've been in an attacking role, as a ruck-rover or on the wing."

Shane is enjoying playing football under Bunton and hopes he can earn a recall to the Eagles side in the near future.

"Bunton seems very understanding and it is good working with him," says Shane. "But I hope I don't have to work with him too much — I want to work with Mick (Malthouse)!"

"I want to get back into the Eagles side and play as well as I can at the highest level for as long as I can. To win a premiership with the Eagles would be the ultimate."

## WORTHWHILE

The brothers have not only benefitted in their on-field performances, but agree that the off-field change has been worthwhile.

"Subiaco are a very professional club and I seem to get on with the rest of the guys here a lot better. Everyone hangs around together and they all get together after the game," Barry said.

Shane echoed his older brother's sentiments and said the players, supporter, members and management at Subiaco had made them feel welcome.

"The two clubs are obviously different as there are different people around which makes it hard to compare them," Shane said.

"Subiaco's administration is great and everyone is really right behind the players and I'm all set to start all over again."

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# ARE THE TIGERS TOO COCKY?

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The new coach of the West Coast Eagles football team, Mick Malthouse will examine the latest coaching trends and innovations necessary to succeed in the all-Australian football code. Malthouse, who played 174 VFL games between 1972 and 1983, was a member of the 1980 Richmond Premiership team. He was appointed coach of Footscray in 1984 where he achieved the club's best win-loss ratio as coach.

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ANYONE who saw the scores, but not the match, between Claremont and East Perth on Easter Monday could ask themselves the question — are the Tigers cocky, or maybe not as good as everyone thought?

On previous results this season, Claremont should have romped this game in.

For instance, Subiaco walloped East Perth by 17 goals in the first round and the following week Claremont gave Subiaco a nine-goal drubbing.

So anyone going to the game on Monday would have expected the Tigers to give East Perth something of a hiding.

But it didn't work out that way, did it?

So were Claremont over-confident or just not as good as most would have thought?

### DISCARDED

The cocky theory could come from the fact that Claremont might have lost a lot of players from last season, but were still prepared to discard players this season, among them Peter Melesso, who would have been handy against big and gutsy Royals skipper Glen Bartlett on Monday.

But that wasn't the reason why they lost.

Neesham has a policy of giving young players a go — but that could have been questioned with the use of Eagles pair Don Pyke and John Annear, both ordinary performers against the Royals.

So are they not so crash hot this season?

Obviously they aren't as good as last season, but they are still a pretty good team, even though they lost.

Which brings me to the point of the story — East Perth are no longer the duffers of the competition.

They are a very competitive combination and I'm blown if I know why they took such a beating in the opening match against Subiaco.

For too long this great traditional club, which has given VFL teams so many top players over the years, have been down.

They managed to win only three games last season. Their form over the past five years has kept them in the basement of the league, copping the wooden spoon twice and just avoiding it another two times by winning their last match of the season.

While one win doesn't make a good winter, the Royals are going to be a real stumbling block to other teams this season.

Their three Darwin recruits in Brian Stanislaus, Russell May and Noel Long are very exciting players.

They may not get it as easy as the season progresses as other teams will

devise plans to try and cut them out of the play.

But they won't be easy players to tag.

### EAGLES ASSET

Craig McGrath is a big asset, but if he continues to play as well as he did against Claremont, then he's not far away from a game with the Eagles and once he's in the team he strikes me as a player who will stay there.

East Perth supporters have had little to cheer about in recent years, so it wasn't surprising to see them mob their players after the game as though they had just won a grand final.

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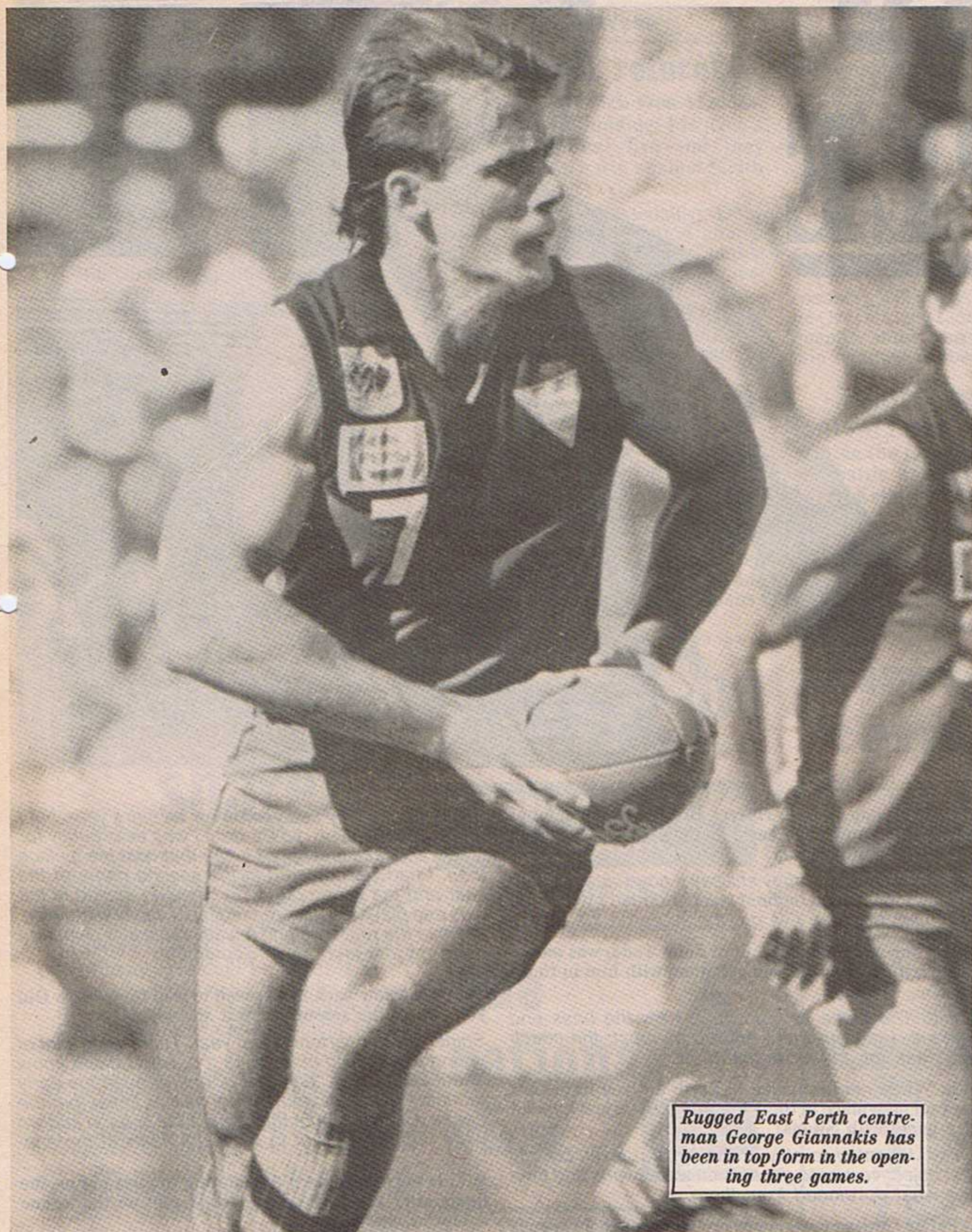
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# ROYALS SEEK REVENGE

EAST Perth captain Glen Bartlett says it Royals pay-back time and Perth can expect a full-frontal assault in their clash at Perth Oval this Saturday.

The Demons are without a win in their 1990 campaign and the Royals, following their sensational victory over reigning premiers Claremont on Monday, will be keen to make it three in a row.

Bartlett was always confident of beating the Tigers, but realises that this contest with Perth is a real danger game for the Royals.

"We've been in a rebuilding mode for a few years now, but with the recruits we've picked up, things are changing for us," he said.

"We've got some skill now to finish our work off, especially around the goals and it makes all the hard work worthwhile when things are polished off nicely."

## GOOD STRENGTH

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## FAI Talking football

**SWAN Districts skipper Brad Shine is one of the toughest customers around. When the going gets tough, the no-nonsense ruck-rover throws his body fearlessly into the fray. Shine shared in league premierships with Swans and reserves flags with Carlton in the VFL. Throughout his career he has been plagued by injury, but has always bounced back with true grit. Westside Football's GEORGE TEMPLE caught up with Shine before training last week for this interview.**

**WESTSIDE FOOTBALL:** Three games and three wins Brad — you must be happy with the way things are going?

**Brad Shine:** I'm pretty happy about that. At the start of the season we set ourselves a goal to win the first three games. We knew we could beat East Fremantle in round two, even if a few other people didn't.

**WF:** There's a lot of young guys around the club at the moment and it resembles the late 1970s when John Todd culled some experienced players out in preference for younger guys. A bit of de ja vue for you, maybe?

**Shine:** New young players are the basis for the club's future. You don't really know these days what will happen because if a youngster has a good year, he gets snaffled up by the AFL.

**WF:** Yourself and Don Langsford were among the newer faces in the early 1980s when Todd opted for the youth policy. How do you look upon the newer blokes coming up with eyes on your spot?

**Shine:** It's the same as anything; you've got to earn your stripes and if you don't play well enough, you don't get in.

**WF:** How do you rate the young blokes?

**Shine:** I rate them all highly, otherwise they wouldn't be playing league footy. There's a big future for all of them and for some of the more experienced guys too who've been around for a few years now. There's still a chance they could go to AFL ranks. The big clubs have people out watching players all the time.

**WF:** How would you sum up your own career?

**Shine:** Good question; a lot of hard work and a desire to win.

**WF:** You came up from Harvey-Brunswick and a lot of critics said you lacked basic football skills. Did those comments motivate you?

**Shine:** Not really — they still say it now. I just wanted to play footy at the highest level. It doesn't worry me too much because I've got the score on the board.

**WF:** Your coach then and now, John Todd, was one of those critics. How did you get along with him in those days?

**Shine:** The same as I do now. He's the boss and that's it. I get out there and do my best; the coach can't ask for any more than that.

**WF:** When you first came to Perth did you have your eyes set on a place in the VFL, or were you just hopeful of a game with Swans?

**Shine:** I wanted to play at the highest level, but my first objective was to get a game with Swans and then see what developed from there.

**WF:** Did Carlton contact you or did you offer them your services?

**Shine:** They didn't actually contact me because I was away on holiday at the time. I had been negotiating with North Melbourne and Footscray at that stage and Carlton hopped in. Following that, the other clubs went cold. I had no hesitation in joining Carlton. They're very professional in the way they go about things and every time you go out on the track, be it for training or for a game, you're not going out there to try and win; you're going out there to win. That follows from John Elliott at the top right through to the bootstudders and it makes a big difference.

**WF:** Did your knee injuries hold you back at all? Could you have played in a few of Carlton's grand final teams with a better run with injuries?

**Shine:** That's why I stayed on for an extra year, but I broke down and so did Carlton. I was emergency for one grand final and it was injury that cost me a place then. I had been injured in the second game of the year and the young guy who came in stayed in the side and played in the premiership. I had two premierships in the reserves and it was magic just being out there on that last day in September.

**WF:** You came back last season to lead the Swans. Did you expect the season to start so well?

**Shine:** It was heartening last year. There were a lot of young blokes and older ones too, who I didn't know and it was enthusiasm that got us through the early games. We just lacked a bit of skill at times, but the desire was there right throughout the season and we were unfortunate not to be in the finals at the end.

**WF:** It must have been devastating to miss out on the finals after having been in second spot on the league ladder at one stage?

**Shine:** It was a bit of an anti-climax, but we can only blame ourselves, no-one else. Football and life is a learning curve and if you don't learn you don't survive.

**WF:** You played with an injury, particularly towards the end of the season and critics questioned your ability to perform for the team. In hindsight, did you do the right thing in playing all 21 league games?

**Shine:** I don't really know that. I just like playing the game. I've played in grand finals with injuries and come off the ground and been best. What do you do, you don't know. A lot of it get backs to the mind. I was out there just trying to show the way.

**WF:** At the end Ed Blackaby wasn't re-appointed as coach and Todd got the job. Was Ed hard done by do you think?

**Shine:** It's not my place to comment on that.

**WF:** How successful was the knee operation at the end of last season?

**Shine:** All he did (the surgeon) was clean it out. The knee was gummed up with cartilage fibre. I've got a lot more movement this year and I can run unrestricted. It's ironic that I strained the ligament in that knee which has kept me out of the last two games. Even if I'd played, it would have still been better than it was last year.

**WF:** Since you came up from Harvey, a lot of other players have followed in your footsteps. What's the secret down there?

**Shine:** When you live in the country, there isn't a lot else to do but play footy. So you work at it and hope to make it to the city.

**WF:** Do you have any coaching plans for the future?

**Shine:** I've had country offers, but I want to finish playing first and then I'll think about it.

**WF:** Have you considered retirement?

**Shine:** I just take it year-by-year. I've not really even thought about it at this stage.

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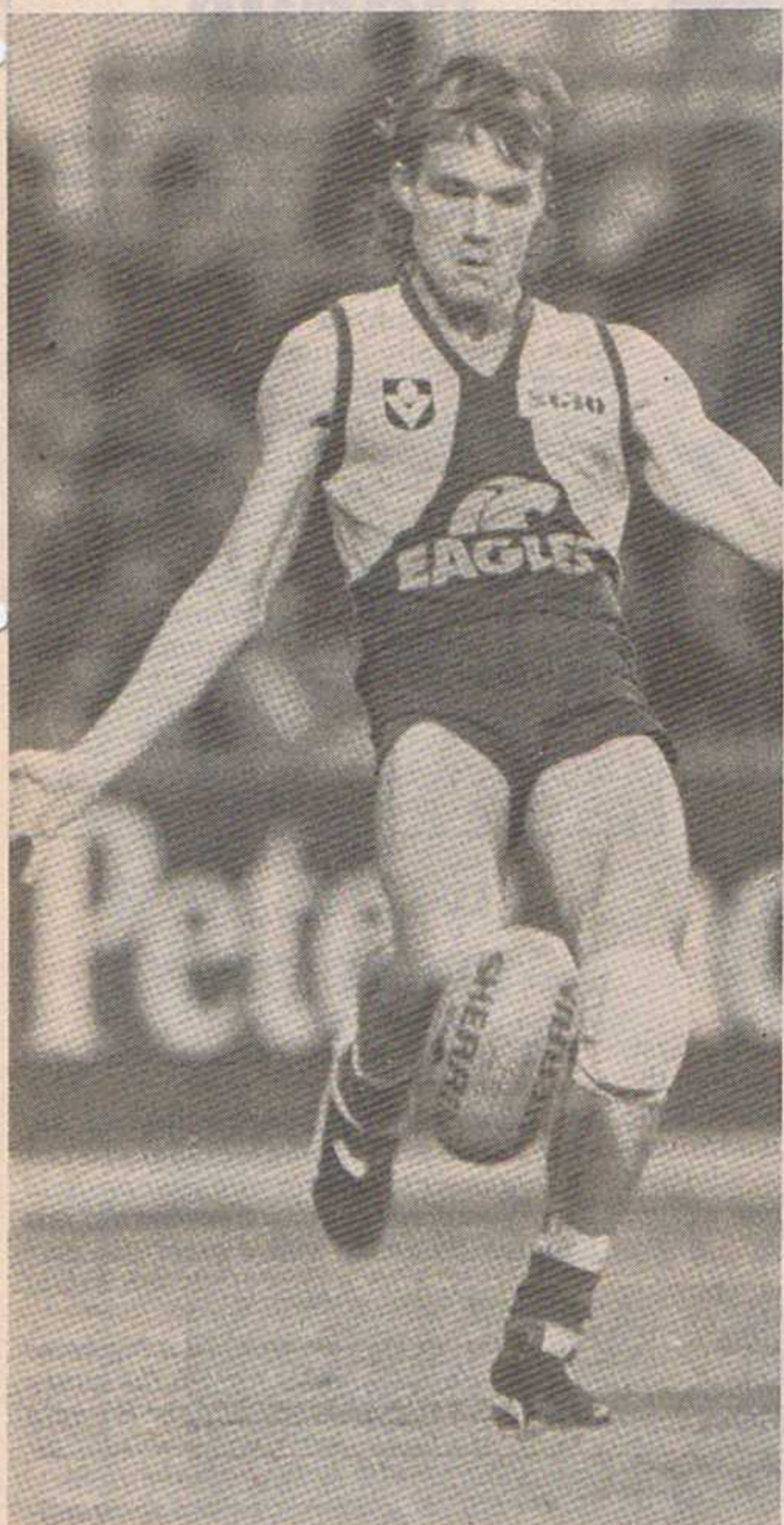
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# Confident Carlton will be

To add to this player allocation, an internal draft system could be conducted towards the end of the first series of seven games.



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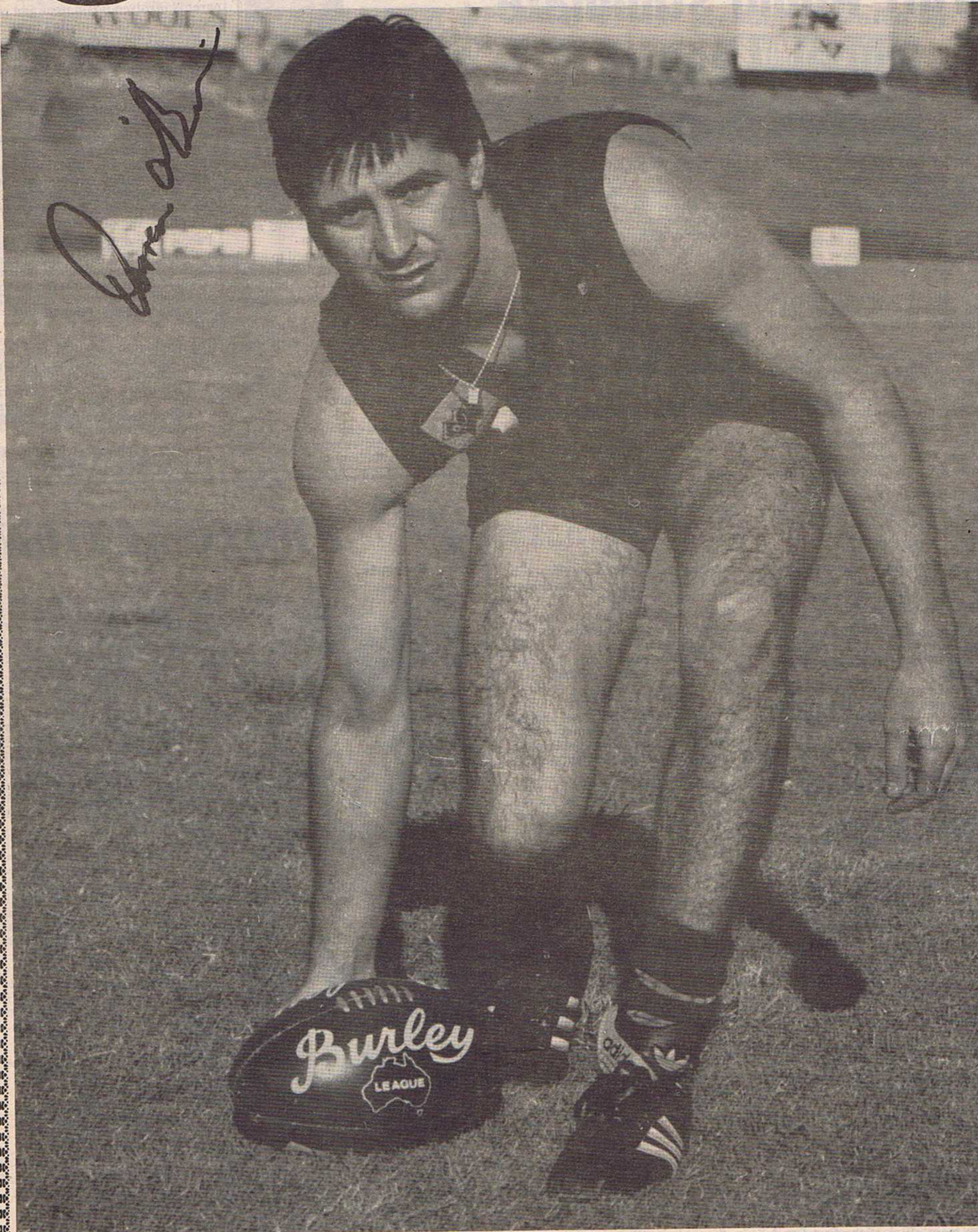
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# Eagles come up trumps with their

## recruits

THE 1990 AFL season might only be three games into the season, but the West Coast Eagles recruiting staff have already had some of their recruiting efforts vindicated.

Solid debut performances from rookies Dean Irving, Dean Kemp, Brad Gwilliam and Peter Matera have confirmed the direction the Eagles staff adopted over summer — and there are plenty more would-be stars waiting in the wings.

In a recruiting drive which delved into WASFL ranks, as well as the playing lists of Melbourne clubs in the AFL November and March drafts, the Eagles added 14 new names to their squad; providing the player depth required to lift the team up the ladder.

### EXPERTISE

Wilson (26) spent three seasons with Richmond, playing 54 games with the Tigers after his departure from East Fremantle at the end of the 1986 season. He has already shown why he was labelled the Eagles most valuable recruit with three sound games in the forward line.

Wilson was a member of East Fremantle's 1985 premiership team and he has played four State games for WA, as well as his 94 with the Sharks. 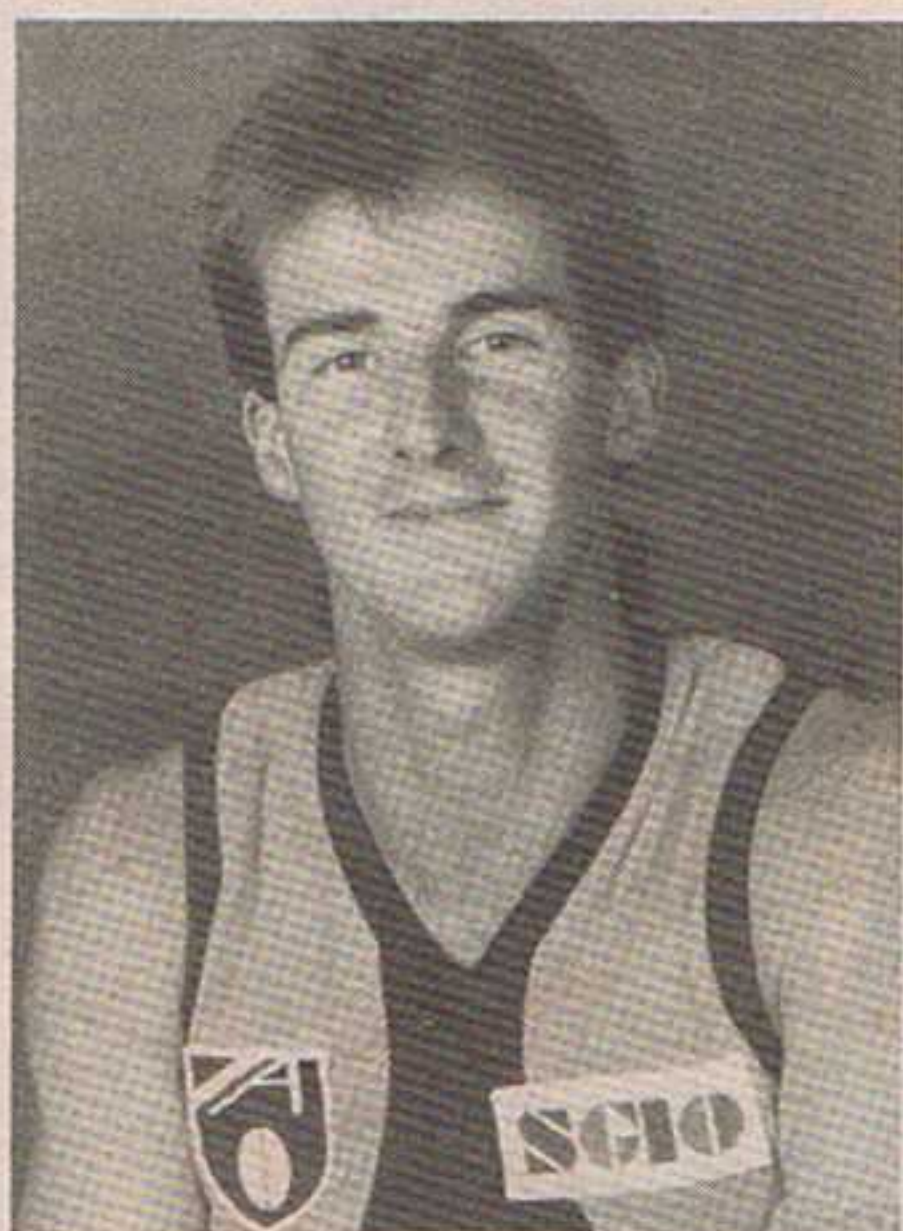

He played 32 games for Melbourne between 1987 and '89, on top of his 78 with Subiaco and he made a welcome return to football action last Monday, after throwing off a troublesome knee injury, when he lined up in the Subiaco reserves side at Lathlain Park.

McGrath was the Eagles surprise draft selection and he is still an unknown quantity to many football followers in WA. He has played the first three games of the season with State League club East Perth, where his form is improving with every outing.

McGrath (26) was drafted from Fitzroy, where he played 58 games with the Lions after making his league debut in 1984. His body strength and height give him the potential to become a handy key position player or a pinch-hitting ruckman with the Eagles.

Kemp, Subiaco's rookie of the year last season, followed his brother Garry to the city from Kalgoorlie and the pacey 21-year-old hasn't looked back since, having been recruited by the Eagles after only 20 games of league football.

He made his AFL debut against Collingwood at Subiaco Oval in the first game of the season and his ability to adjust to the tempo of AFL football so rapidly suggests he has the potential to become one of the Eagles star players.

Matera (21) also debuted for the Eagles against Collingwood, but injury has kept him out of the side since then. He shone out in WASFL ranks last season and was honoured as the only club player chosen to play against Victoria in last year's State-of-Origin clash at the WACA Ground. He has played 52 games with South Fremantle and his ability to kick valuable goals should see him earn a recall to the side.

Gwilliam (23) is a high-leaping, strong-marking player who stared at full back and centre-half-back for West Perth last year and he has made a good start with the Eagles, having played the first three games.

He has played 50 games with the Falcons and he has a cool head on young shoulders which will see him grow as a key position player.

South Fremantle's injury-prone Irving was preferred to his ruck teammate Craig Edwards in the draft and with only 31 games behind him at the Port he is still inexperienced as AFL ruckmen go.

Irving (23) has performed soundly in Eagles matches this season and while he is still learning his craft, he has shown the ability to succeed.

### PRIORITY

Tough Claremont defender Begovich has thrown off the injury which kept him out of Claremont's 1989 premiership side and he is starting to regain some of the form which made the no-nonsense player a high priority on the Eagles recruiting list.

Begovich (22) has played 71 games with Claremont, mainly as a back-pocket specialist and his gutsy brand of football will be a valuable part of the Eagles side when he gets his chance.

The talents of brilliant Subiaco forward and mid-fielder Brett Heady will no doubt be called upon in the near future if his form in the State League continues.

Heady (20) overcame a leg injury to take the field against Perth last Monday and he set Lathlain Park alight, first in a back-pocket and later in the centre. Heady, after 34 league games with the Lions, may even get his chance this Friday night against Carlton be-

cause of an injury to mid-fielder Paul Peos.

The Eagles caught everyone by surprise — including Subiaco — when they recruited premiership player Bret Hutchinson in March.

### ATTACKING

On hearing of his pending return to Perth from business in Sydney, the Eagles left at the chance of gaining the speedy defender's services. He has been in scintillating form in the Lions back-line in the opening games of the season and his desire for the ball, along with his pace and his attacking runs out of defence, make him an adequate replacement for any defender or mid-fielder in the Eagles side.

Turnbull, Claremont's 18-year-old 198cm ruckman, was recruited for the club's long term future and his services are unlikely to be called upon this season.

The Eagles will have to wait another year before they can gain the services of Mann (19) and Evans (20) as the two exciting youngsters have opted for another WASFL season under Claremont coach Gerard Neesham.

Star of the future and 1989 Teal Cup forward Ashley McIntosh will make an impact in years to come, but at this stage the 193cm 17-year-old is still untested in WASFL league ranks.

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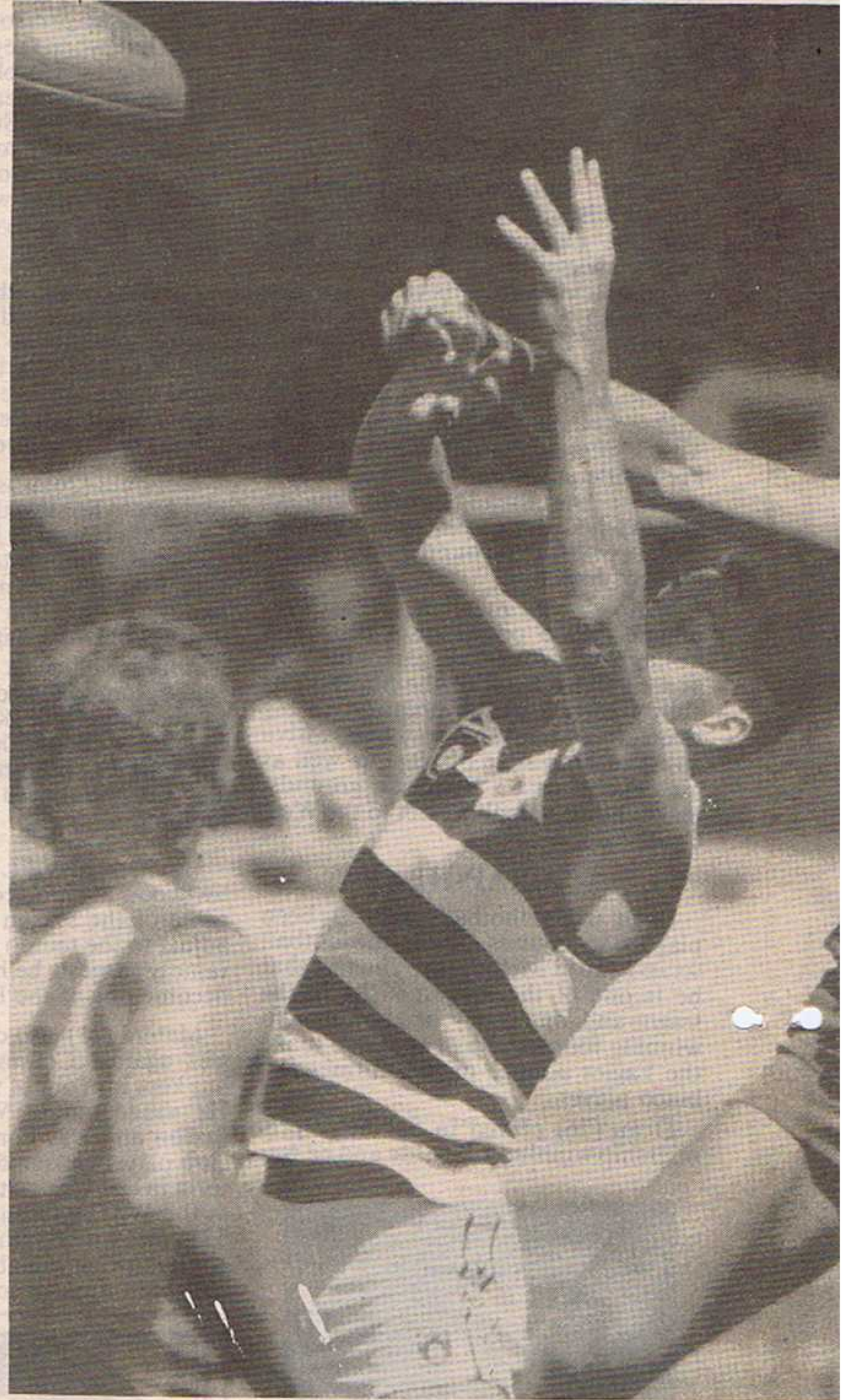

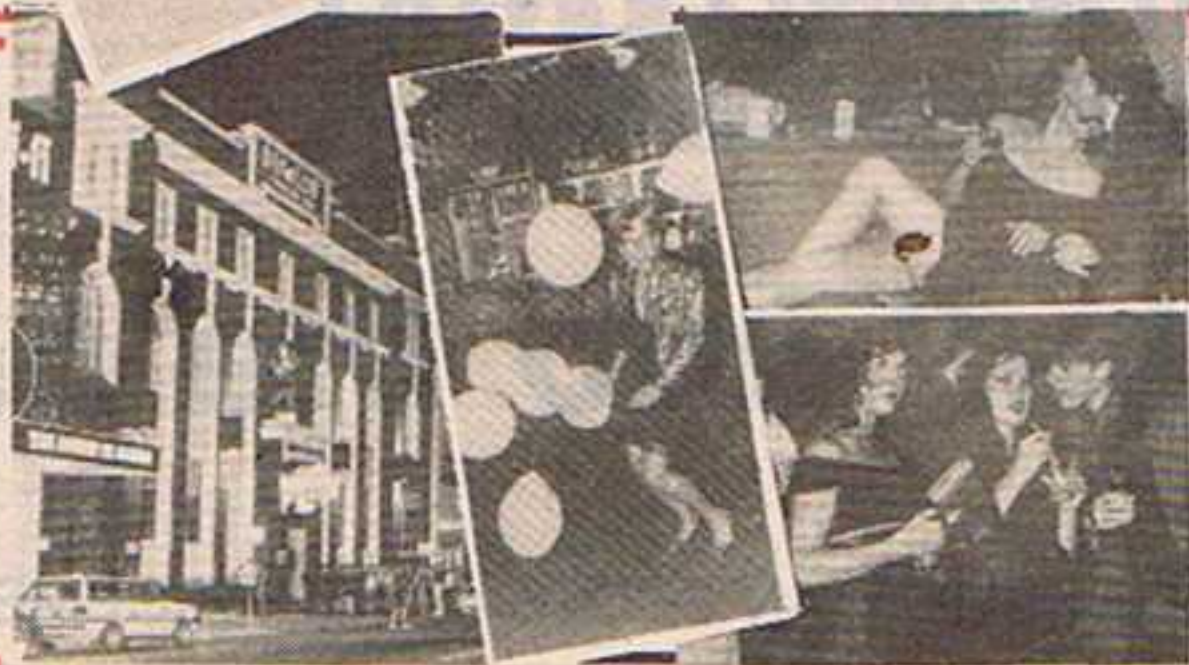

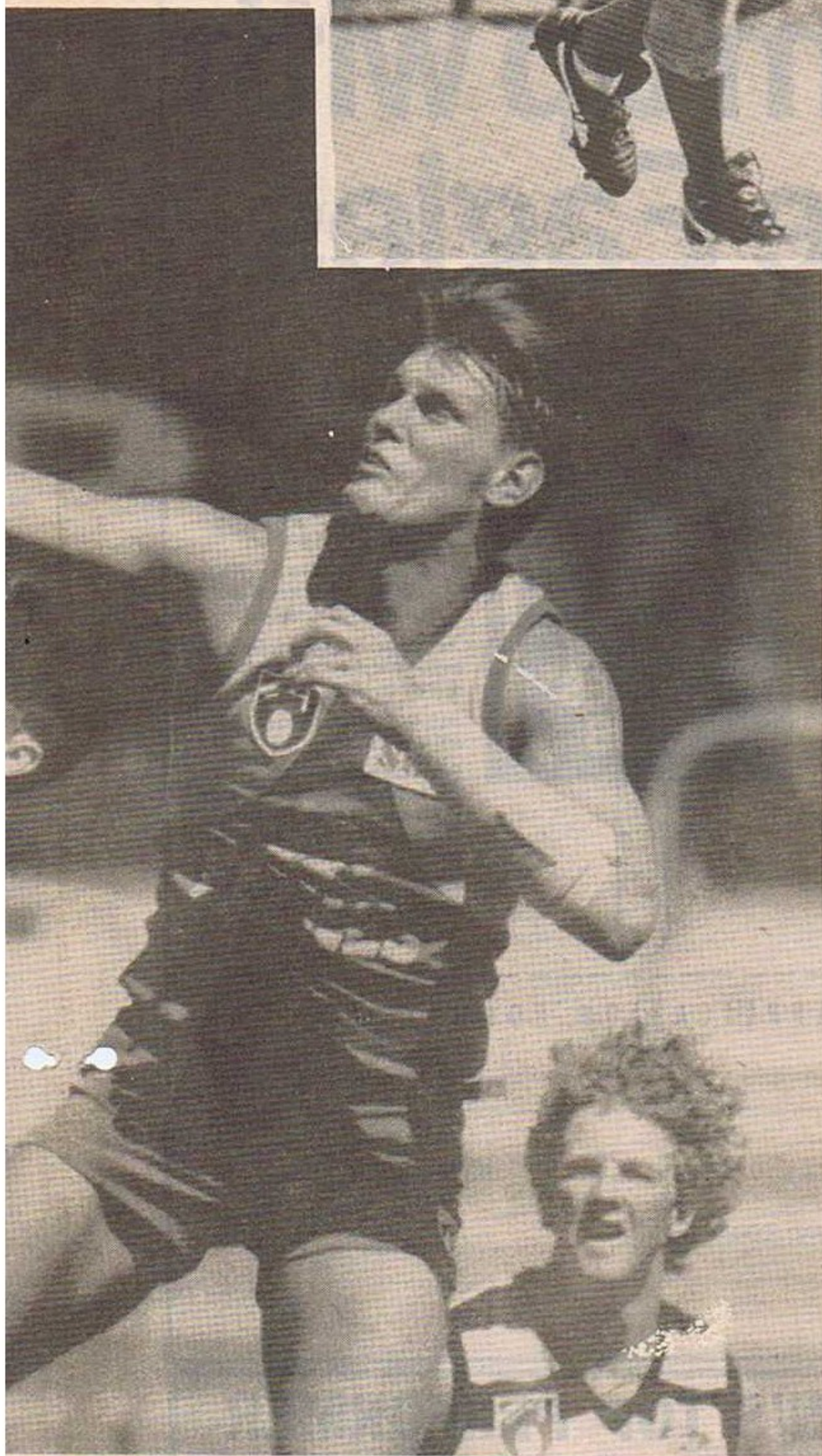

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# Milestone game for Dwayne Lamb

THE West Coast Eagles clash with Carlton at the WACA Ground on Friday night is an important contest for the local boys...especially Dwayne Lamb.

The powerfully-built utility will be playing his 200th league game in a career that has been noted for its consistency.

Lamb made his WAFL debut with Subiaco in 1980 and played 133 games with the Lions over a seven-year period before being selected in the original Eagles squad.

The back-pocket specialist, who has been converted into an attacking ruck-rover, won fairest and best awards with Subiaco in 1982-84-85 and was an automatic inclusion in Ron Alexander's Eagles squad of 1987.

It is testament to his consistency that Lamb became the first Eagle to reach the 50-game milestone and was the club's leading games-played achiever going into this season.

Wilson, who has given the Perth-based side some real bite in their forward area in his three games, played his 150th league game against St Kilda in round two.

Wilson started his career with East Fremantle in 1982 and after 94 games, joined VFL club Richmond, where he chalked up a further 54 league games before opting for the Eagles this season.

Versatile key position player Andrew Lockyer will have cause to remember his 100th league game — it was with East Fremantle last Saturday.

After showing poor form in the opening two AFL rounds, he was dropped back to the Sharks for the first time since he was selected in Alexander's squad.

"It was great to be back at East Fremantle, but with all due respect to them, I'd rather be in the Eagles side," Lockyer said after the Sharks lost the Port derby against South Fremantle.

"Some of the guys in the side were in under 19s when I left.

"It was a tough match and at the start I was caught out by playing the wrong style of game.

"Mick (Mick Malthouse) has been telling us to kick the ball long, but in the State League it's a much shorter game, so I found it difficult to find my men with accurate passes."

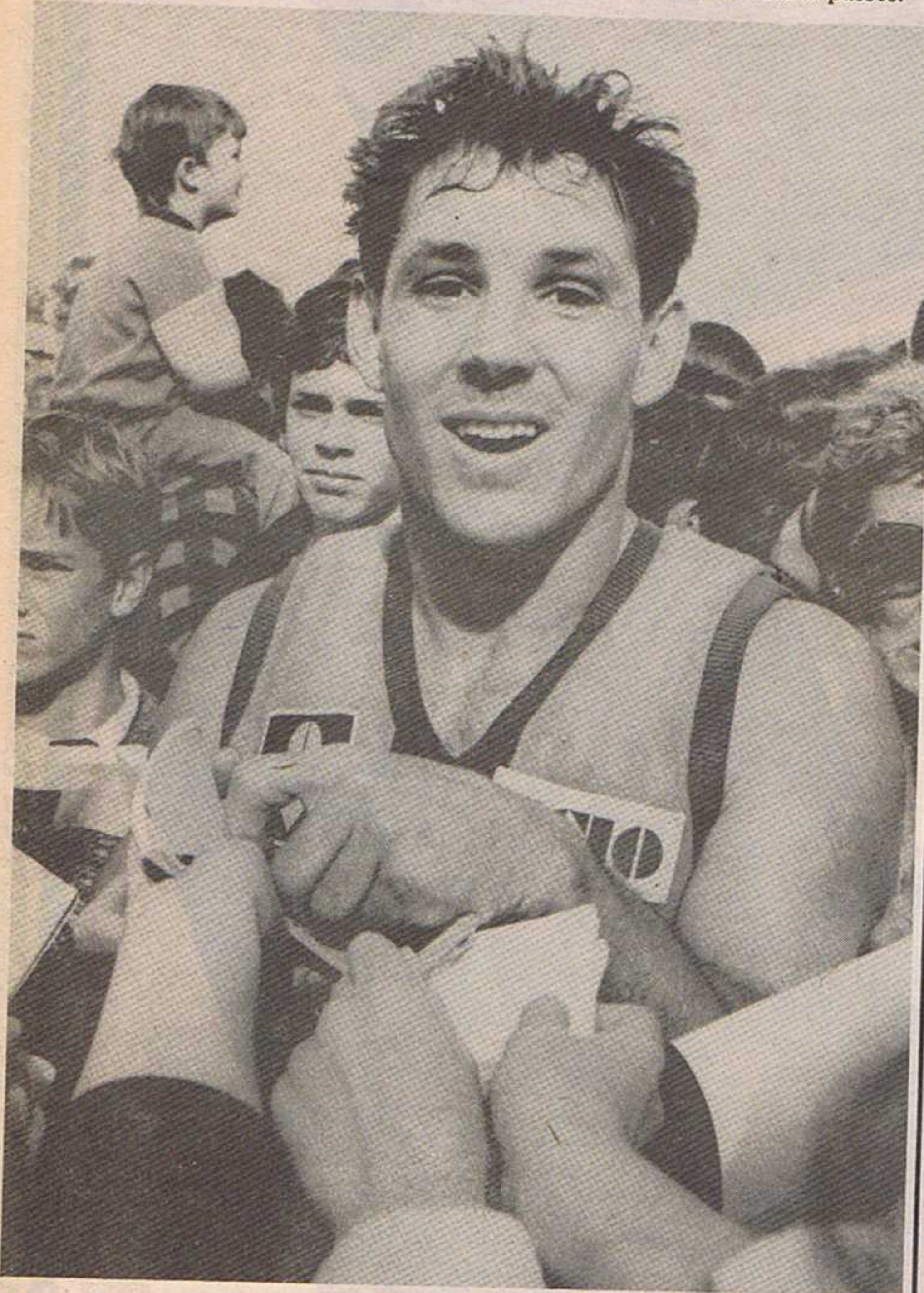
## TOUGH NUT TO CRACK

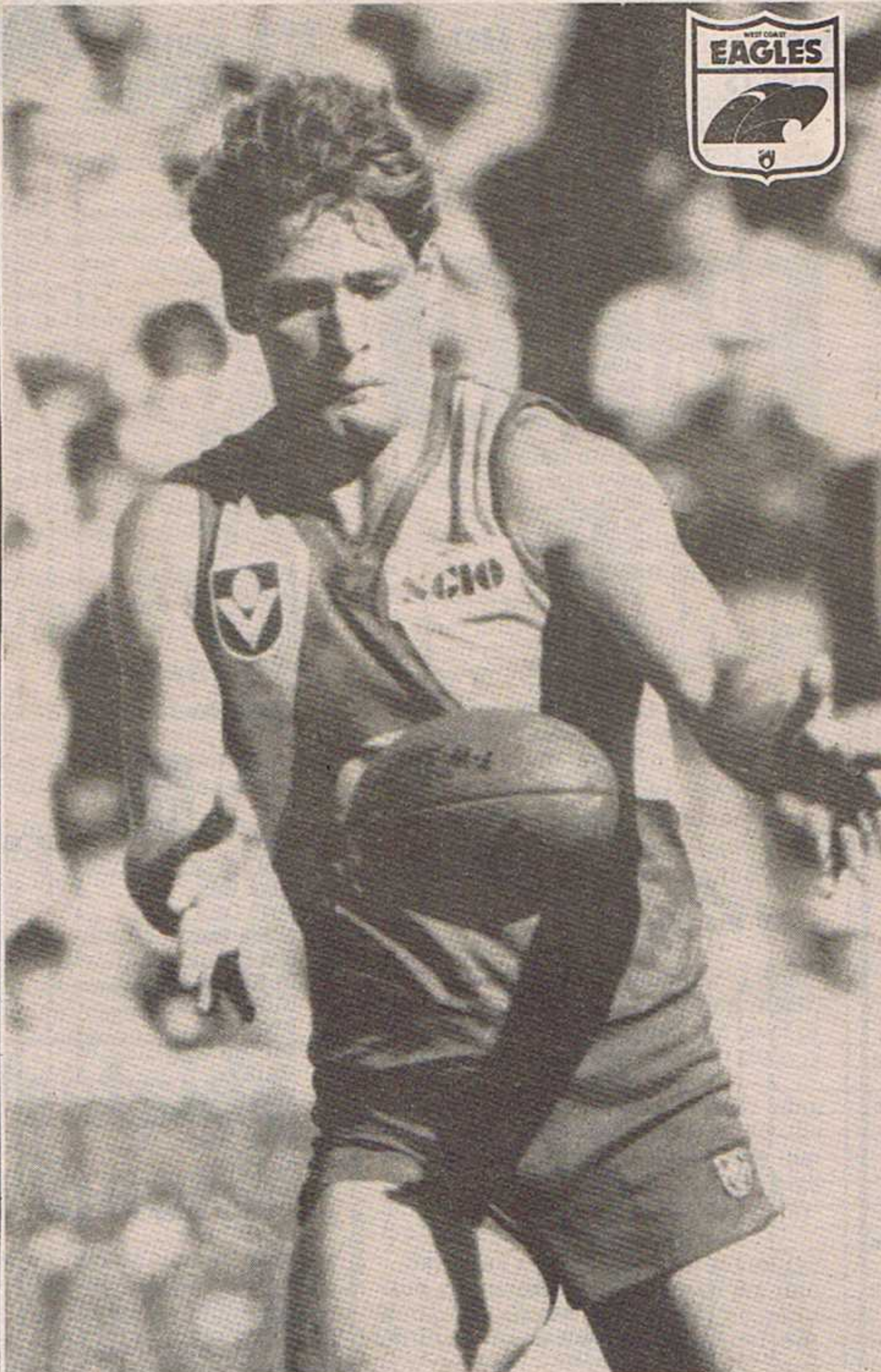

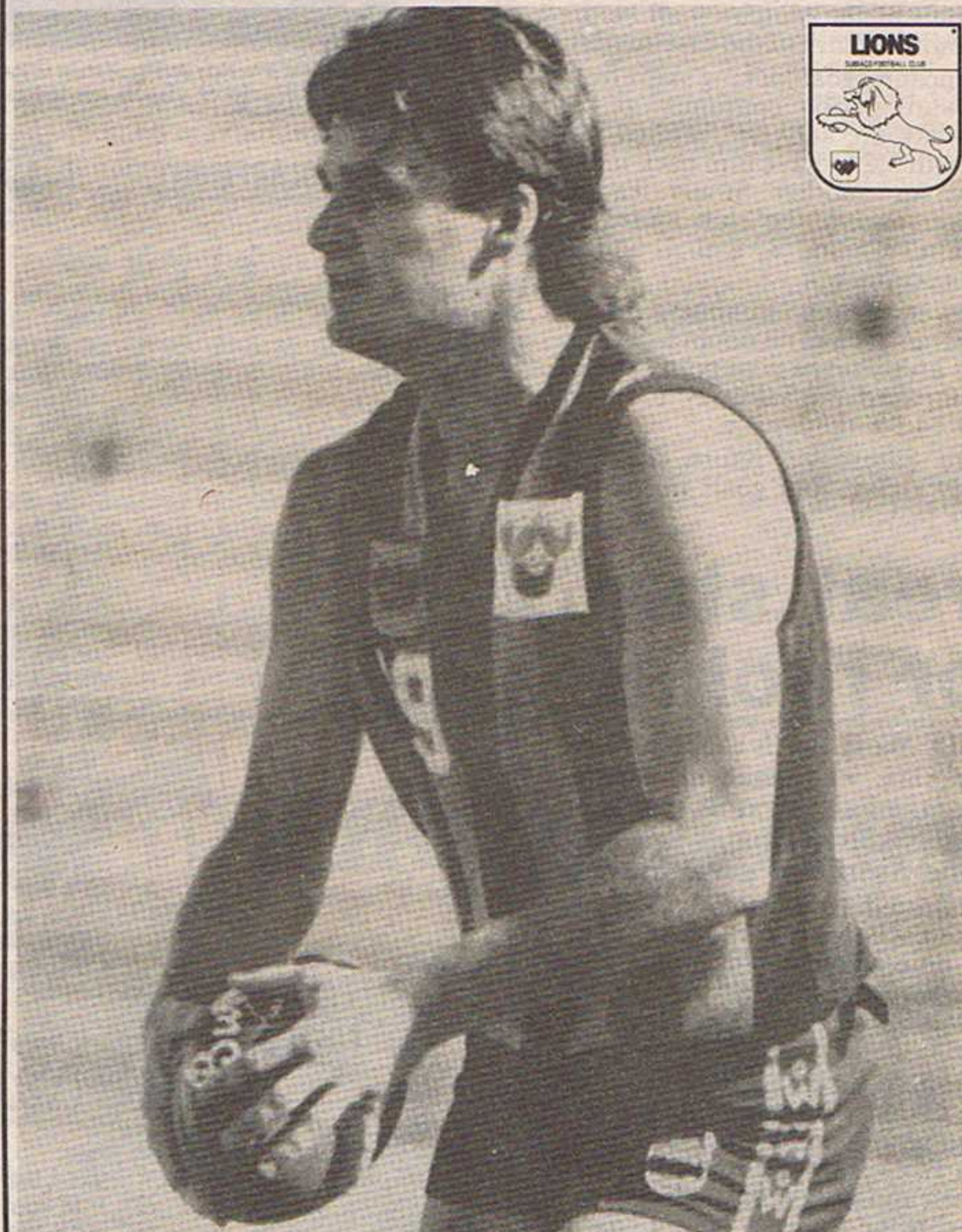

Swan Districts proved too strong for West Perth at Bassendean Oval.

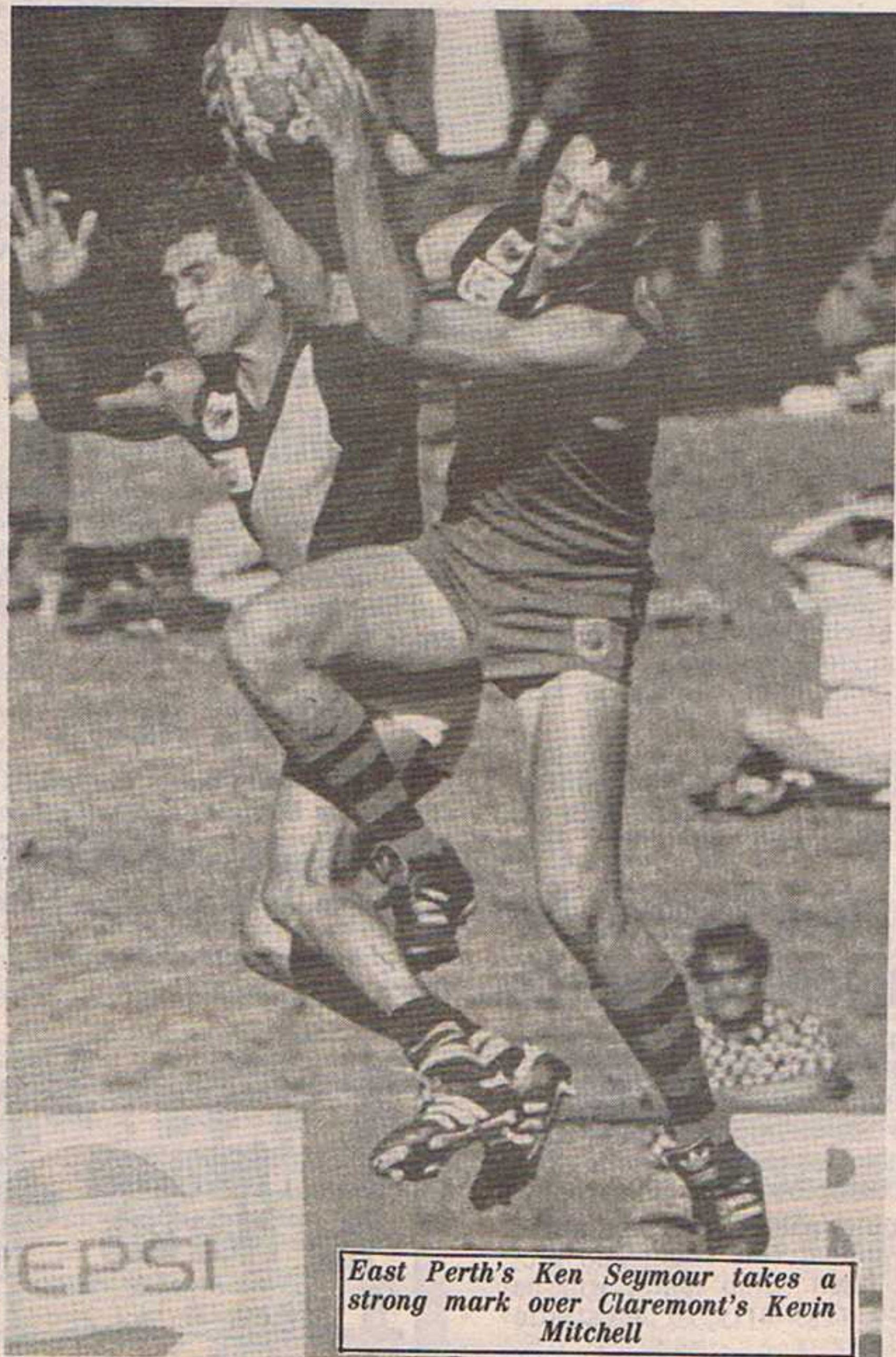
The Swans won their second match of the season by 49 points, largely due to best-on-ground performances by Grant Bradbrook, Darren Forbes and Jim Gray.

# Vote-casting should be shared

ONE of the most popular — and contentious — issues in football is whether field umpires should be burdened with the responsibility of casting votes for best player awards.

Firstly, it should be clarified that I am an unashamed champion of umpires. They are an integral and obviously totally essential element of our game.

It is ludicrous how some normally rational and sensible people connected with Australian Football become totally irrational and non-sensical when the subject of umpires is broached.

But mindful of that attitude, I do believe that umpires have enough to worry about without having the responsibility of casting votes in best and fairest awards. Or if they do cast votes, they should be supplemented by votes from other independent sources.

## OTHER SOURCES

I have been privy to the votes cast by a wide spectrum of umpires in many different grades over a long period. Many have been cast in tandem with votes recorded by such observers as All Australian selectors and highly respected football officials.

What has been forcefully brought home to me is that umpires often favour completely different players to other voters. After doing some comparisons involving the votes cast by umpires in context with newspaper reports, it's fairly obvious that umpires are prone to voting for players who have performed well in the second half of a game — and especially the last quarter.

Ironically, very much the same applies in relation to many football journalists. If you want a mention in the write-ups, play well in the last 15 minutes!

It is also nothing short of ludicrous for votes to be cast on a 3-2-1 basis.

There is no way that the perceived best player on the ground should be credited with a vote which affords him a 2-1 majority over the second best and a 3-1 advantage over the third-best performer.

A much more democratic system is achieved with the awarding of votes on a 5-4-3-2-1 basis — and preferably by more than one person. The likelihood of ties is largely eliminated and the "right" person will win the award far more often under such a system.

Obviously it also gives more players the opportunity to receive votes; very seldom are there only three players who stand out in a game.

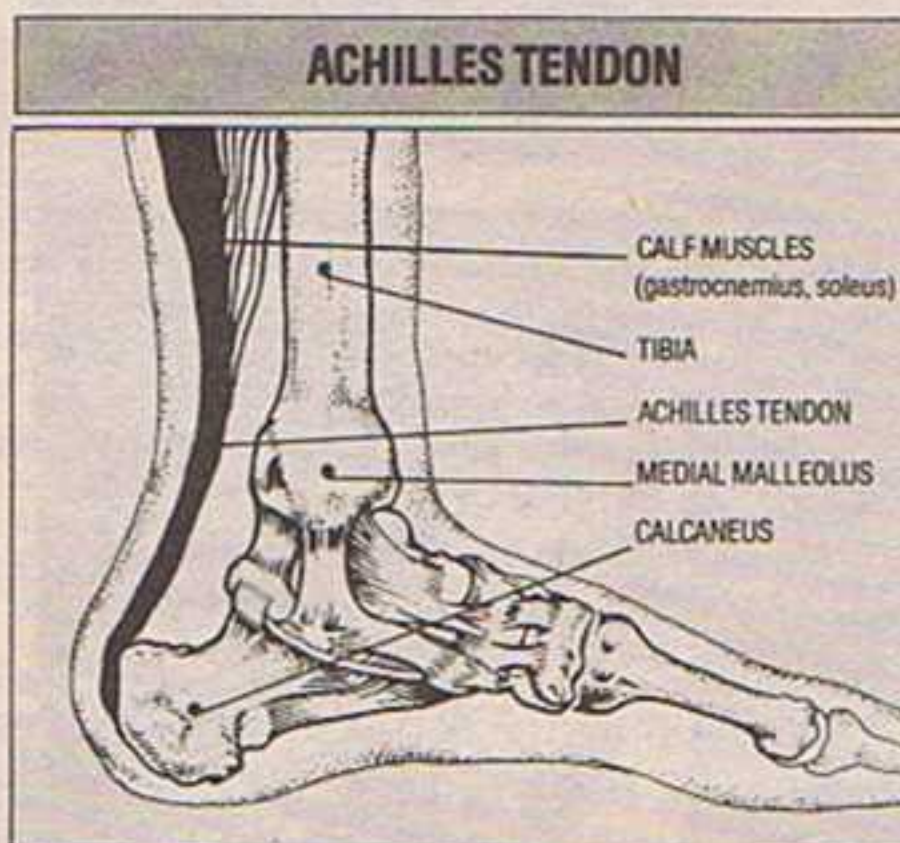
Another extraordinary situation still exists in many leagues, though not in the AFL or the WASFL, where the winner of the award in the event of a tie is the person who has received the greatest number of first votes.

That generally means the player who has received votes in fewer matches compared to the player tying with him. Surely it should be the other way around or, more preferably, as with the Brownlow Medal and the Sandover Medal — a tie.

## First-aid corner

### The Tendon

- Connects calf muscles to the heel (calcaneus).
- Moves heel upwards to point foot downwards (plantar flexion) when calf muscles contract.
- May suffer strain or inflammation due to overuse, poor footwear or hard playing surfaces, or to lack of warm-up and stretching prior to vigorous activity.
- More serious injury such as partial or full rupture can occur.



### Taping

- Should only be used for protecting a mild (1st stage) strain or, in the final stages of rehabilitation where controlled return to activity is allowed.
- Main purpose is to limit the amount of dorsiflexion (pointing foot upwards) so the injured tendon is not stretched to the point of pain.
- Elastic adhesive bandage is used to "check" the dorsi flexion (since it is usually only the extreme of dorsi flexion that overstretches the mildly strained tendon).

### PREPARATION

- Position lower leg with shin down, calf up for ease of taping (athlete lying down or kneeling).

A regular Sports Trainers' Association segment on first aid, sponsored by Elastoplast

- Skin should be clean, dry and hairless.

- Use Adhesive Grip Spray and underwrap if necessary (refer to Ankle Taping: preparation).

### ANCHORS

- Apply an anchor (38mm ridge tape) at the base of the gastrocnemius muscle, then a second, overlapping part of the first.

- Apply another anchor around the mid-forefoot.

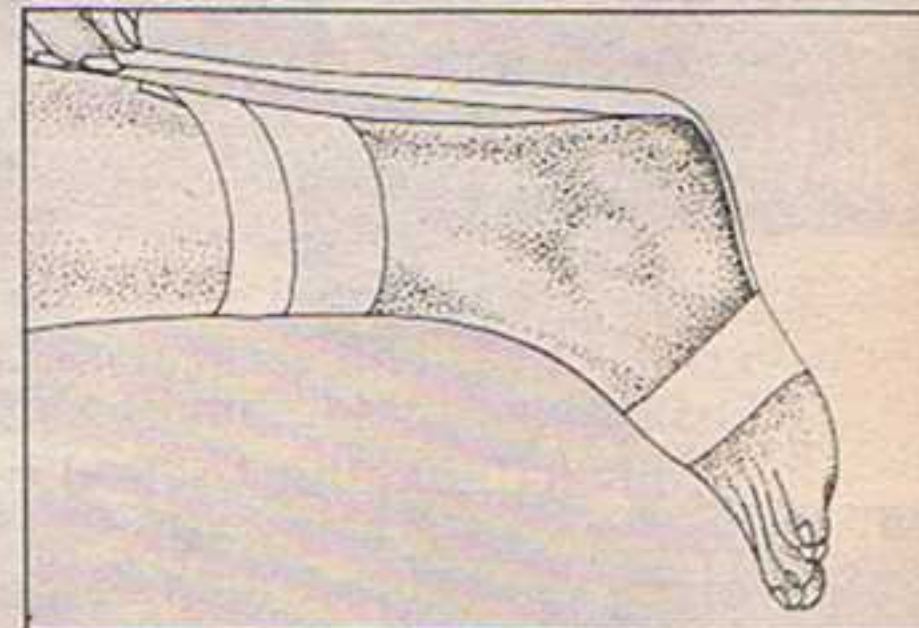
- Measure two lengths of 50mm elastic adhesive bandage to reach from foot anchor around heel to upper anchor.

- Lay one bandage along the foot and around the heel, 1/3-off centre.

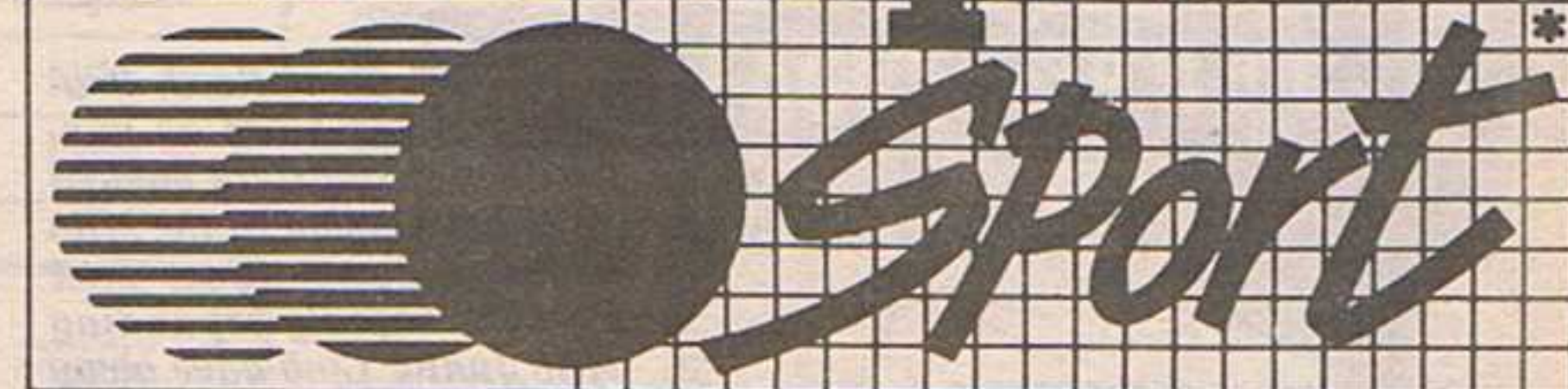
- Position the foot in slight plantar flexion (see diag.) and stretch the EAB moderately, up to the top anchor.

- Repeat with second piece 1/3-off centre to other side, and continue up to anchor (refer next diagram).

This week's coaching hint

**BOUNCING THE BALL**

YOU are allowed to bounce the ball as you run (only once in some of the younger grades) and this is a real skill. It's not much fun if you work hard to get the football and then lose it with a bad bounce.

Hold the ball with both hands, one slightly on top, the other along the side. The top hand is used to guide the ball as low to the ground as possible.

The ball must be thrown out in front of you, not right down at your feet because you have to stop and wait for it to come back. The faster you are running, the further out the ball must be thrown so that it is back up again by the time your feet get you there.

Try to throw the ball down towards the ground slightly flat so it bounces nearly on its end and comes back to you easier. Plenty of practice running around the park for this one, boys.

Remember, on wet days the ball will skid, so avoid the bounce. Or you can bend right down and simply touch the ball to the ground, maintaining a firm grip. The position of your body is similar to a two-handed pick-up, that is slightly side-on.

2. Go out and meet the ball. Always approach the ball at top pace; don't wait back for it to come to you.

# Some fans let the game down

FOOTBALL fans certainly are a fickle lot and it remains the most irritable part of a great sport.

Last Saturday at East Fremantle Oval, one of the fairest men ever to play the game, 1989 Sandover Medallist Craig Edwards, was subjected to some awful and unwarranted abuse from fans in the crowd.

One particular chap, who was

donned in an East Fremantle guernsey with a single number on his back (perhaps it was his IQ) referred to Edwards as a mongrel all afternoon.

### ABUSE

And the same spectator — you could hardly call him an East Fremantle supporter — was just as quick in hurling abuse at Sharks players.

The performance from the spectators was reminiscent of a day at East Fremantle Oval a few years ago when Laurie Keene was an emerging star with Subiaco.

It was early in Haydn Bunton's reign at Subiaco and the Lions were struggling against the might of one of league football's most powerful combinations. Big Laurie was not enjoying the best of days.

But when he was interchanged late in the match he was hooted and jeered by Subiaco fans sitting in the old stand at East Fremantle.

### COMEBACK

I wonder if those same people were at Subiaco Oval a couple of weeks ago when Keene, in the early stages of a traumatic come-back campaign, failed to exert his usual influence in a Pepsi Cup match against Claremont.

From all accounts Keene was again on the receiving end of some tasteless heckling. I wouldn't mind betting the same people were involved on each occasion. But they were probably also at Subiaco Oval in 1988 chairing him off the ground when the Lions won the premiership.

Keene has endured a tough campaign to even get back to playing football after a serious Achilles heel injury and supporters of both the Eagles and Subiaco need to be patient as he embarks on his rehabilitation program.

To draw some comparison to the Keene injury, we could look at the case of Australian tennis pro Pat Cash, who has also learnt the frustration of an Achilles injury.

Cash made a come-back to competition in roughly the same time frame as Keene and like the big Eagles ruckman, has been unable to

Vocal supporters have not been restricted to WA either — they were out in their droves at the Western Oval last Saturday to greet the return of Mick Malthouse.

The man who coached Footscray for six years was subjected to some unruly behaviour and, according to one report, was even spat on by Bulldogs fans after taking the Eagles on a rampage.

And Paul Peos didn't escape the banter either.

The young wingman, the centre of attention earlier in the week when convicted of a drink-driving charge, clashed with young Footscray winger Leon Cameron before the opening bounce.

A Footscray official then told Peos, over the public address system: "To have another drink."

### BEHAVIOUR

That sort of behaviour is barbaric and though most people would suggest it is all part of the game, it is a sad indictment on a great sport.

Everyone enjoys some good-hearted humour in the outer. But no-one should need to endure the barrage of abuse which Edwards, Keene, Malthouse and Peos have copped in the last couple of weeks.
