Vics have the superstars

IT'S victory for the Vics...

Victorian coach Bill Goggin's face in the Julian Cowan photograph above tells the result of Tuesday's interstate clash at the WACA Ground.

The Vics got home by 37 points in a tough, slogging match in front of 22,000 spectators. The final score-line of 14.13 to 8.12 didn't really do WA justice as they had more than their share of the play.

But the Victorians were simply too efficient in attack and with superstars like Simon Madden, Gary

Ablett, Paul Salmon and Tim Watson in control, WA played catch-up football all night.

Ablett was at his sparkling best with six goals and several sensational marks, while Salmon the gentle giant was dominant with four goals.

But the real honours went to 32-year-old Madden, who produced one of his best interstate performances to be a unanimous winner of the Simpson Medal with a best-on-ground display of ruck artistry.

There were some high moments for the West — especially this sensational mark by Nicky Winmar as he soared over Gary O'Donnell.

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WHAT A JOKE!

STATE-of-Origin football matches have become something of a joke — and that's not just because Victoria have been rolled by NSW and Tasmania.

There has to be something wrong with a system that allows a player to represent two States in the one year.

It's absurd that North Melbourne's John Longmire should play for NSW against Victoria and then turn out for the Vics against Tasmania. Brett Allison also played for NSW and Victoria, while Graeme Wright made it a double with Victoria and then Tasmania.

And Fitzroy's John Ironmonger is a case closer to home. He must become the only player in history to represent two States against the common-enemy, Victoria, in the one year.

He was deemed eligible to play for NSW as a former Sydney Swans player and was a natural selection for this week's WA side.

How is it that the rules can be bent to allow players to be shunted around from team to team to suit the selectors — and the organisers?

The interstate games in Sydney and Hobart were really no more than exhibition matches.

So let's call them that. Don't fry and dress them up as a test of strength between the respective States.

The Victorian selectors were too cock-sure of themselves and paid the price in those two games.

They sent a pretty ordinary side to Sydney and the restrictions placed on the selection criteria for the one that went to Tasmania made it anything but their second-best side.

They're changing the rules again

A cynic might suggest that the Vics were happy to lose those games and help rekindle Aussie Rules interest in NSW and Tasmania.

A realist knows that the Vics don't like losing.

The State-of-Origin concept, devised by Leon Larkin in Perth in 1977 (despite current claims that the Vics conceived the idea), gave Aussie Rules a big shot in the arm, particularly in WA and SA.

The Vics had become almost invincible because they were pinching the best players from interstate. It rubbed salt into the wound when they selected expatriates to play against their own State. Who can forget a couple of big interstate performances by Graham Moss — wearing the feared Big V guernsey.

So something had to be done...and the concept of allowing our very best to be "loaned" back to the West worked magnificently.

But it's probably time for a change.

The concept has become a bit tired and since the inception of the West Coast Eagles, it has certainly lost some of its appeal in WA.

Virtually every time the Eagles play a Melbourne team, it is "us" against the Vics. And because the

Eagles win most of their home games against other AFL teams, there is not that once-in-a-year thrill of going up against a Victorian side in WA.

Because the Eagles are playing in a vital game against Fitzroy on Sunday, there were some WA players who missed the match against Victoria because of the risk of aggravating an injury. And some players were also rested for this weekend's fixtures...from both States.

IMPORTANT GAME

The reality of the situation is that the Fitzroy game could be the difference between the West Coast Eagles finishing high enough on the table to earn a second chance — or decide if they make the finals or miss out completely.

And for some people in the Eagles camp, that is far more important than winning a State game.

And you can't blame them.

Maybe a full-on interstate carnival is probably the best idea. But even that has its problems.

NSW and Tasmania, despite their wins this season, don't have enough players to match it with the big three Aussie Rules States — Victoria, WA and SA.

So perhaps States such as NSW and Queensland should be allowed to use all their AFL players as the basis for a team in an interstate carnival and have the other four States select their players on a restricted State-of-Origin basis.

WELCOME HOME

HANDY forward Gavin Howlett, who has floated between Perth Oval and Leederville Oval in recent seasons, is pleased to be back at the home of the Royals. Howlett resumed with East Perth a few weeks back and has quickly regained his place in the senior side. After receiving a trophy on Saturday night, Howlett said that he never wanted to leave East Perth three seasons ago — but had been told to go. "I'm glad I'm back and pleased about the way I've been accepted here again," he said.

AND INCONSISTENT

YOU don't mind umpires making errors or missing free kicks, as long as they are consistent. There was one terrible case of inconsistency at the WACA Ground that could easily have cost East Perth a winning goal. Late in the third quarter, Royals forward Peter Melesso delivered a great hip-and-shoulder to Swans defender Paul Gow, who apparently objected to the physical punishment and wanted to start a fight. The brawl was ignored, but if the umpires had been consistent, it should have been a free kick to Melesso — inside the 50-metre line and with his team trailing by just one goal. Earlier in the third quarter a similar incident occurred in Swans forward line when the Royals player, who had gone on with a bit of scragging, was penalised.

OUT OF POCKET

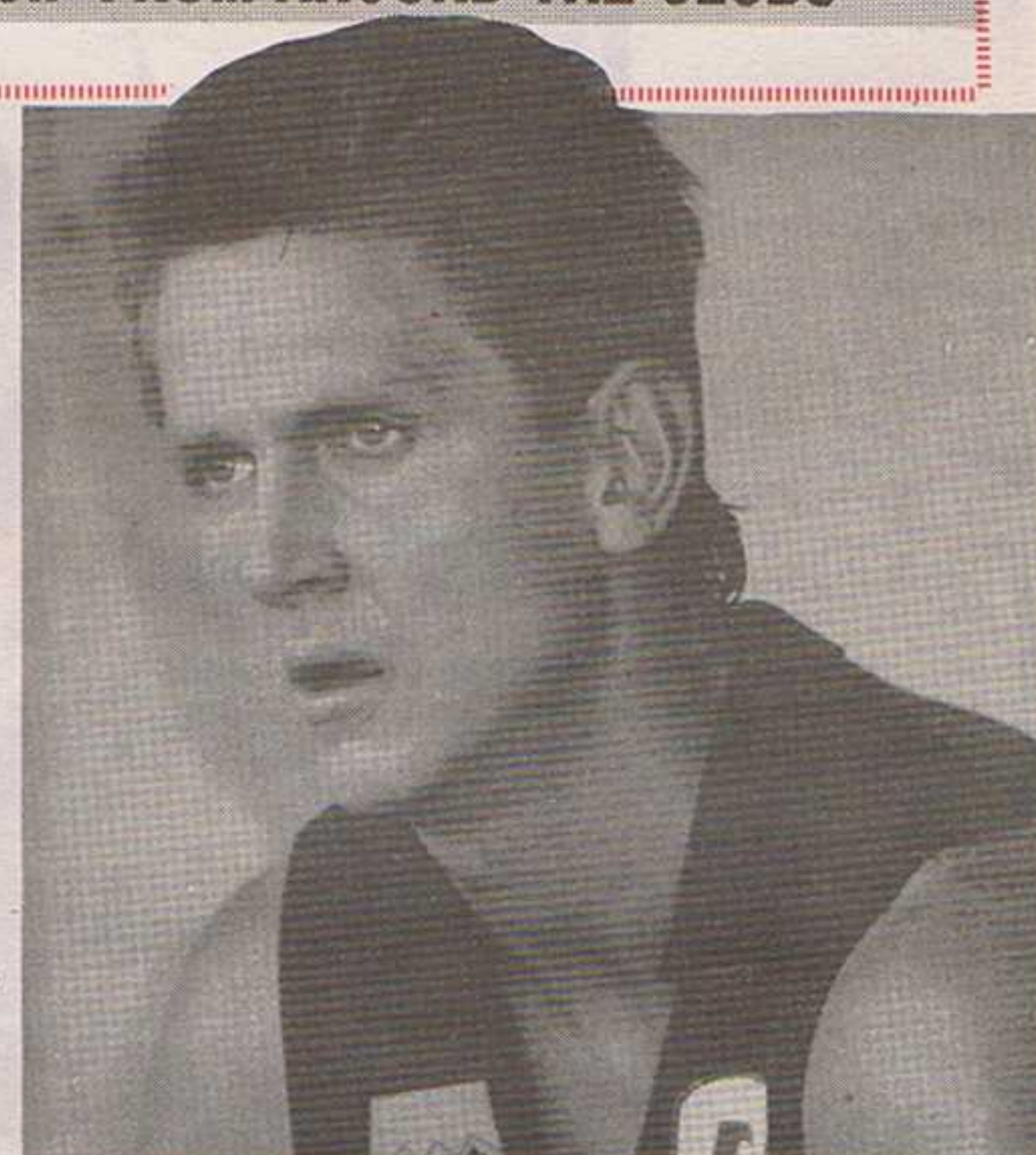

RADIO SILENCE

Madden's Medal popular choice

THERE wasn't much surprise about the choice of the Simpson Medal winner — Victorian captain Simon Madden stood head and shoulders above the other 43 players in Tuesday's State-of-Origin match.

While literally he was overshadowed in the height department by giant Paul Salmon, it was Madden's aerial work and his ruck supremacy that gave Victoria a huge advantage.

The 32-year-old veteran was running around like a rookie schoolboy as he took 14 marks, had 15 kicks and three handballs and recorded 29 effective tap-outs.

It was Madden's 16th interstate match and while he rated his game against South Australia in front of a home-town crowd in Melbourne last year as probably a better performance, Tuesday's victory was most satisfying.

"There was certainly plenty of pressure on us in this game," he said.

"With two losses to NSW and Tasmania, things weren't looking all that good and it was a great game to win.

"There was plenty of tough pressure football out there; it was a hard game and I felt it was really only in the last quarter that we started to get good use of the football.

"I enjoy playing State-of-Origin football with the best players in the country and it's pleasing to win a Simpson Medal."

FROM THE COACH'S BENCH

STATE coach Ron Alexander swung numerous player changes in an effort to beat Victoria at the WACA Ground on Tuesday night.

Player moves can often be the key to a win or loss — particularly in State-of-Origin football with four interchange players.

Alexander and his co-selectors were alert to the changing patterns in the game and this is how the State brains trust operated from the coach's box.

FIRST QUARTER

6min: Earl Spalding (centre-half-back) is switched with Wayne Henwood at full-back.
14min: Brett Heady off injured; Peter Wilson to a half-forward flank and Steve Da Rui to a back-pocket to mind Gary Ablett.

18min: Peter Sumich to centre-half-forward; Karl Langdon to a half-forward flank.

21min: Wilson off; David Bain to a half-forward flank.

23min: Bain and wingman Chris Mainwaring to swap positions regularly to break up Michael McGuane's game.

At quarter time, Mainwaring was taken off and Michael Mitchell was put onto his wing, with Bain swapping sides.

SECOND QUARTER

10min: Darren Bennett off; Glen Jakovich to centre-half-forward, Sumich back to full-forward.

12min: John Ironmonger off; Dean Irving into the ruck.

16min: Darren Bewick off; Mainwaring to interchange with Mitchell between half-forward and a wing.

20min: Mal Brown said: "If we kick the next two goals we're in with a chance of winning — they've really lifted their rating."

24min: Langdon off; Bewick on.

At half-time Wilson came off; Derek Kickett went to a half-forward flank; Bewick and Irving into forward pockets; Mainwaring to a half-forward flank; Nicky Winmar into the centre and Ironmonger back into the ruck.

THIRD QUARTER

13min: Bewick off; Wilson into a forward pocket.

15min: Ironmonger off; Irving onto the ball; Bennett to full-forward; Sumich to centre-half-forward; Jakovich into a forward pocket.

23min: Mark Zanotti onto Dermott Brereton.

At three-quarter-time Alexander said: "Bennett must always lead and someone must drop into the space behind him." Wilson came off and Langdon back on.

FOURTH QUARTER

2min: Jakovich to pick up Simon Madden.

6min: Irving off; Ironmonger into the ruck.

14min: Langdon off; Wilson into a forward pocket; Jakovich to a half-forward flank

21min: John Gastev to a half-forward flank, Kickett onto the ball.

State game sidelights

IT WAS a tense Ron Alexander who took his seat with co-selectors Mal Brown, Noel Carter, Jon Fogarty and Simon Beasley at the top of the Southern Stand. Upon sitting down, Alexander asked Brown how he felt? "I've never felt calmer," was the reply.

MAL Brown, WA's chairman of selectors, felt that the forward line didn't work as efficiently as they had hoped. "We didn't run enough or provide sufficient opportunities in attack," he said. "But they did have a real good go and we didn't make the most of our opportunities."

TED Whitten, Victoria's chairman of selectors, praised the commitment of the players. "They pledged themselves to a real four-quarter effort and that's what they gave," he said.

SOME of the more impressive statistics from the game included: Steve Malaxos 12 kicks, 18 handballs; Michael McGuane 26 kicks, 11 handballs, Gary Ablett 14 kicks, seven marks, two handballs; Tony Shaw 21 kicks, nine handballs; David Hart 21 kicks and Paul Couch 17 kicks and nine handballs.

THERE were some interesting non-stats as well — Peter Daicos managed just one handpass, Peter Wilson had just one free kick and John Ironmonger didn't take one mark.

THE Victorians out-numbered WA all night, so it seemed. They even out-numbered the West with their team runners. While WA's Peter Gianoli was matched by Victorian (and Essendon) runner Peter Power, the Vics had two other runners dressed in black track suits (not the white pants of trainers) who continually fed out messages. At one stage all three Vic runners were on the ground together.

THE two field umpires presented an interesting contrast as they took to the arena. WA's Mike Ball was dressed in traditional WA gear with black socks, while his Victorian counterpart Rowan Sawers had the AFL colours of blue socks.

WHEN WA forward Peter Sumich brought tough Victorian defender Steve Silvagni to the ground in the second quarter and earned a free kick with a great tackle, he also earned some free drinks for all his team-mates. At Monday's pre-match dinner, chairman of selectors, Mal Brown, in a typical light-hearted prod at a few players had promised to buy for the team if Sumich laid one tackle on a Victorian.

VICTORIAN coach Bill Goggin rated the match as a tough, hard-fought victory for Victorian pride. "They played their guts out; there was no room for weakies out there," he said. "It was a tremendous game and Simon Madden's leadership was superb. His first-quarter bump of Brett Heady was the example we wanted; hard, tough and fair."

THORNE READY TO BURST SWANS BUBBLE

IT'S payback time for Claremont this Saturday.

The Tigers are still smarting over their Series One loss to Swan Districts at the WACA Ground and Gerard Neesham's team wants to show Swans up as pretenders to their premiership crown.

Dynamic Claremont ball-getter Peter Thorne says the Tigers have been looking forward to this match for some time.

"I didn't play last time we met, but I know the guys didn't like losing to Swans," Thorne said after the Tigers 32-point win over East Fremantle last Saturday.

"It won't be easy to win at Bassendean Oval, but we have the right players to do it."

Coach Neesham will welcome back centre-half-forward Peter Mann and rover Tony Evans for this match, both of whom were sidelined with injuries in Round 13.

It's up to midfielders David Ogg, Brendon Retzlaff, Len Gandini and Steven Bazzo, who continue to be Swans most dominant players, to stop the Claremont run and create chances for the home side.

BROWNING BOOST

EAST Fremantle can bounce back against lowly Perth at Lathlain Park on Saturday despite their 32-point loss to table-topping Claremont last week.

But the Demons will be no push-over for the fourth-placed Sharks, who will welcome back Clinton Browning from injury.

Perth lifted themselves out of the cellar with a convincing 35-point win over West Perth last Saturday and they appear to be highly-motivated.

Coach Tom Mullooly will look to midfielders Kim Fancote and Mark Watson and forwards John Clarkson and Warren Nicholas to continue their good form, while East Fremantle, with Browning at centre-half-forward, will be a more cohesive unit.

BULLDOG BITE

LACK-lustre South Fremantle should still have enough bite in their attack to account for a determined East Perth at Fremantle Oval on Saturday.

The Bulldogs rallied from a five-goal deficit to virtually end Subiaco's final-four hopes last Saturday, while the Royals staged an amazing second-half revival to almost beat high-flying Swans Districts at the WACA Ground after trailing by 43 points.

The Collard brothers — Brad, Derek and Cliff — will provide South's bite at ground level, while Craig Edwards, Glen Jakovich and Stevan Jackson (if not required by the West Coast Eagles) should supply big-man dominance.

LIONS TO GAMBLE

SUBIACO can say goodbye to a finals berth if they lose to bottom-placed West Perth at Subiaco Oval on Saturday.

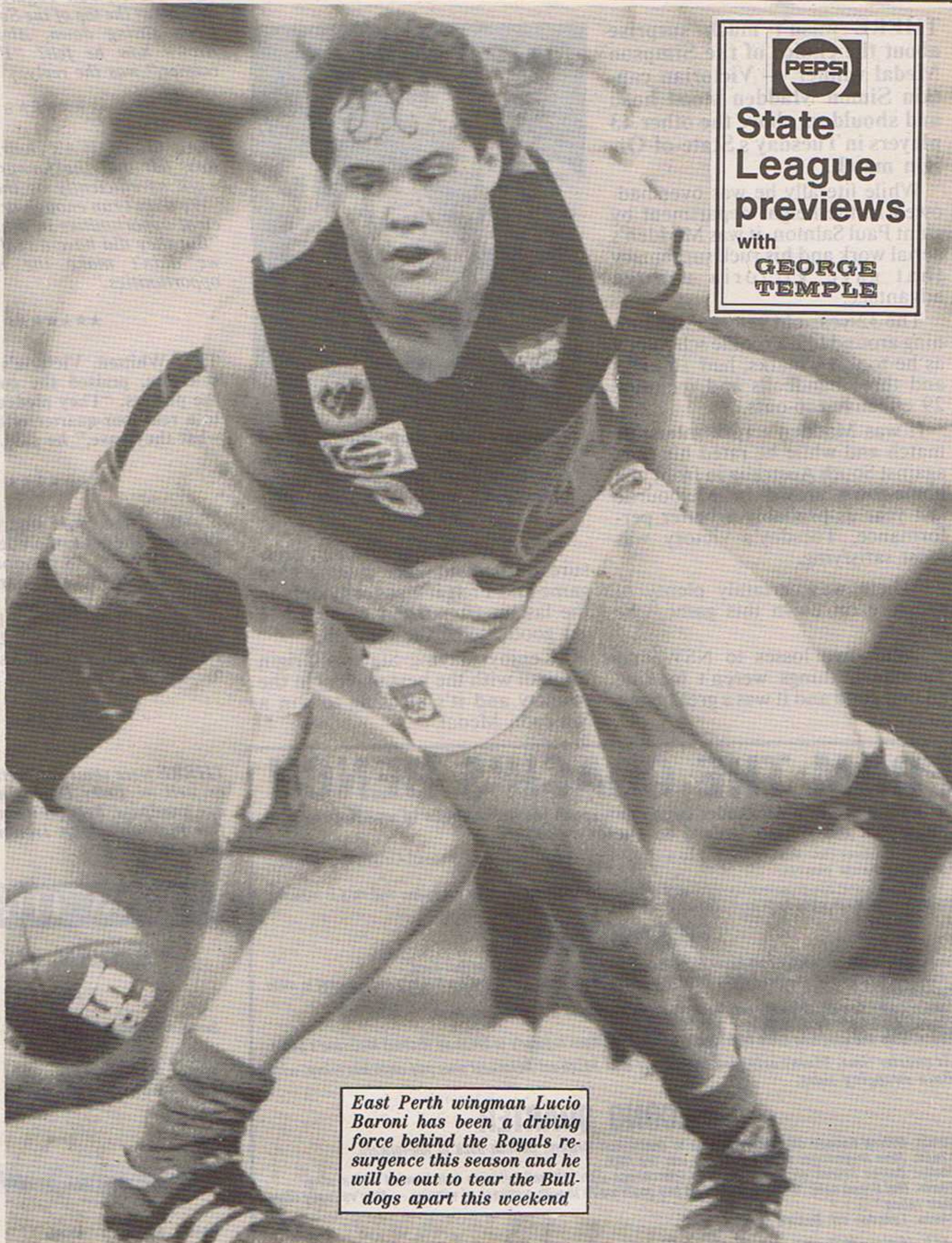
The Lions are two games adrift of fourth-placed East Fremantle and with the Sharks likely winners at Lathlain Park, the Lions cannot afford to slip up.

Vic forwards too slick

FORWARDS generally win football matches — and the Vics just had more potency in their attack than Western Australia did on Tuesday night.

The 37-point loss in the State-of-Origin clash wasn't as one-sided as the final scoreboard indicated.

I was most disappointed with two segments of WA's four-quarter effort — at the end of the second term when we just didn't make the most of our opportunities and in the final five minutes when we let the Vics kick those last few goals.

There was a lot of endeavour shown by the West Aussies and there weren't too many players who didn't give their all.

We had a lot of the play; in fact at half-time we had recorded more kicks than the Vics; they just made better use of the football, particularly in attack.

In the second term, we put in a huge effort, but we didn't have the reward on the board. To be four goals behind after that effort was a little sad.

AWESOME TASK

We started a little roughly in defence. It was always going to be hard to curb Paul Salmon, Gary Ablett and Dermott Brereton and then when they brought in Stewart Loewe as well, our defenders faced an awesome task.

We swapped Earl Spalding and

Wayne Henwood around a couple of times, trying to find their best spot and, in the end, I think Spalding did a fair job on Salmon and Henwood came back strongly against Loewe.

I rated the effort of Mark Zanotti very highly.

Sure, his disposal was a little erratic a couple of times, but he did see off Brereton, Peter Daicos and then Shane Morwood.

We did gamble on the use of Peter Wilson up against Ablett.

We were aware of the fact that Steve Da Rui had done well on him last Saturday when Carlton played Geelong. But we felt that Wilson's physical presence might worry him.

It didn't work out, but I thought Da Rui took him in check when switched onto him.

OFF TARGET

We didn't have a lot of luck shooting for goals; but then we didn't make it all that easy for our forwards, either with the way we fed the ball into attack. And we were off target. At one stage we had two more scoring shots than the Vics, but were nearly 30 points behind.

I thought Peter Sumich worked extremely hard; he chased and tackled and put in a big effort without much reward.

We were unlucky to lose Brett Heady in a fair bump and Darren Bewick was hampered after he hurt a leg when he ran into a chair on the boundary line.

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HERE'S how I rated some of our better players:

Michael Mitchell: He worked extremely well on a wing; he ran hard and did some courageous things.

Mark Zanotti: He never stopped trying, his effort was great and he gave us plenty of run out of defence.

Chris Lewis: He did well, particularly in the first half. His ball skills were quite exciting.

David Hart: He produced a tight-checking game; doing an excellent job on Dale Weightman and got plenty of kicks himself.

Steve Malaxos: Our State skipper always gives more than his 100 percent; he worked extremely hard.

Derek Kickett: I thought he gave us

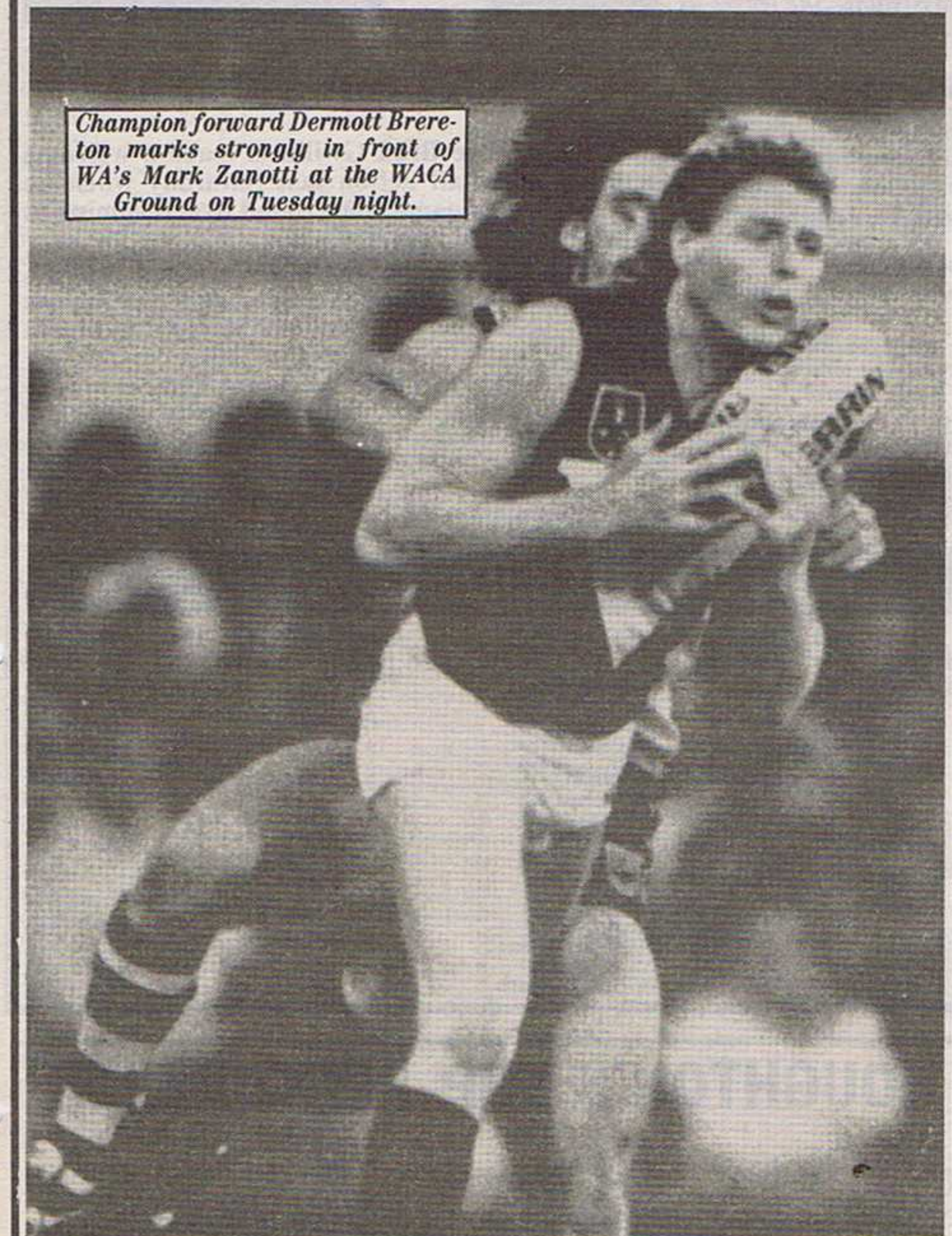

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Interstate Update

Memories of two big comebacks

THE top-class clash last Saturday between Carlton and Geelong at Princes Park would have brought back memories for supporters of both teams.

Geelong fans needed only to cast their minds back to round six of last season, when the Cats lost to Hawthorn at Princes Park after leading by 49 points at half-time.

Hawthorn kicked 17 goals to Geelong's eight in the second half, to win by eight points.

For Carlton fans, it would have revived memories of their most famous recovery from a big deficit — when they recovered from 44 points down at half-time in the 1970 grand final against Collingwood, to win by 10 points.

VICTORIA Park reader Brett Symons has asked for details on current AFL players who have played for the most clubs.

The retirement of Geoff Raines from the Brisbane Bears has deprived the League of the only recent player to have represented four clubs in senior football.

Raines played a total of 245 games for Richmond (134), Collingwood (45), Essendon (16) and Brisbane (59) between 1976 and 1989.

Nine current players have worn the colours of three clubs at senior level.

The Brisbane Bears have three players who have previously represented two other clubs — Kevin Caton (West Coast Eagles and Fitzroy), Mike Richardson (Collingwood and Essendon) and Phillip Walsh (Collingwood and Richmond).

Sydney and Footscray each have two players presently at their third club.

Sydney's Mark Eustice (Essendon and Richmond) and Mark Kellett (St Kilda and Footscray) and Footscray's Terry Wallace (Hawthorn and Richmond) and Glenn Coleman (Fitzroy and Sydney).

Melbourne have Brian Wilson (Footscray and North Melbourne) and the Eagles have John Annear (Collingwood and Richmond).

Wallace, who played 175 games with Hawthorn, is the most experienced of the nine to have played with three clubs.

Caton is the only player in the group not to have played over 100 games, while Annear is the only one to have notched more than 40 games with each of his three clubs.

Coincidentally, a lot of Peos' work-mates are injured footballers.

He works at MLC Insurance in the city with fellow Eagle Chris Waterman, who is just returning from a badly-damaged ankle and East Fremantle players Clinton Wolf, Lance Durack and Peter Quill, all of whom are sidelined with different complaints.

MLC employees who have escaped the injury jinx are Eagle David Hart and Shark Dean Cole.

Holiday time

THE West Coast Eagles office will lose a valuable staff member at the end of the week when Angela Lyle, one of the last remaining original staff members, departs for a long-term holiday around Europe.

Angela started as a casual worker a week before the Eagles played their first game in March, 1987 after moving to Perth from rugby country, New South Wales.

She held a number of positions during her stay, including marketing secretary, communications manager and the football director's assistant. She leaves as the Eagles promotions and functions co-ordinator.

IMPRESSIVE

The Lions players will be fresh and anxious to enhance their impressive record against the Eagles.

It's surprising that in the last four seasons, Fitzroy — who haven't finished in the top five since 1984 — have performed extremely well against the Eagles.

Last year they caused an upset when they came from behind to dump the West Coasters at the WACA Ground — a night when Craig McGrath gave a glowing performance for his former club. Unfortunately, he'll be sidelined through suspension this Sunday and won't be able to reverse the situation.

Given that Fitzroy were able to do that when the Eagles had not come off an interstate game, Fitzroy must rate their chances pretty highly this week,

Giant ruckman John Ironmonger was the only Fitzroy player involved in Tuesday's match — which leaves their whole team fit and fresh after a week's break.

The Eagles contingent will have just five days to rest up and prepare for their important AFL clash and there are sure to be a few players feeling a little sore.

The last time the Eagles had just five days between matches, they travelled to Melbourne to tackle North Melbourne under lights at the MCG — and returned to Perth after an embarrassing five-goal defeat.

Fitzroy are not without their stars — key players like Paul Roos, Gary Pert, Brett Stephens, Dale Kickett, Ross Lyon and Ironmonger are all influential performers and often hard to curb.

And to cap things off, champion forward Richard Osborne should return for his first game of the year.

Osborne underwent knee surgery during the off-season and was expected to miss the whole season. But he has made a remarkable recovery, kicking eight goals in the reserves match against the Sydney Swans in his last outing.

GIFTED

He is one of the most gifted players in the AFL and Eagles players will remember his exploits in several matches against them — especially in last year's victory when he and McGrath were most damaging.

The Eagles will have some players to benefit from the break, with key performers like Dwayne Lamb, John Worsfold and Guy McKenna, who have carried injuries for much of the season, coming up fresh and ready for the second half of the year.

The Eagles will need to have Peter Sumich in goal-kicking form, but the task will not be easy against the close-checking Fitzroy defence.

The Eagles should win the match — they are always tough to beat at home. But this will be much closer than many people are predicting.

THE DEMONS PLIGHT

THE PERTH Football Club — once premiershipt trend-setters of the 1960s and 1970s — are facing financial ruin. The Demons are well behind budget for this year and the club has called a crisis meeting of members and supporters at Lathlain Park next Thursday night (July 5). The Demons are struggling for player-quality on the field and crowd support through the gates. But are they finished? Westside Football's **GEORGE TEMPLE** talks to newly-installed general manager, Steve Woodhouse.



It's time to rally to the aid of Perth

WESTSIDE FOOTBALL: Does the Perth Football Club still have a football future?

WOODHOUSE: Most certainly. It is very important that the Perth Football Club is maintained because of their great tradition. The club has been around for 91 years and there's no reason why they cannot continue on for another 91 years or even longer.

WESTSIDE: What steps will Perth take to alleviate their financial predicament?

WOODHOUSE: We'll run a similar campaign to what South Fremantle and Swan Districts have done; based on a weekly \$2 donation from 3000 people. Some participants will pay the \$100 up front and if we get 400 supporters each getting nine people on a sponsor card, that's \$400,000. Take away what we'll pay out in prizes and we'll make more than \$300,000 in profit, which will clear our debts.

WESTSIDE: Were Vince Pental's recent comments regarding Perth's finances merely scare tactics to get people to help Perth, or is that the actual state of affairs?

WOODHOUSE: The directors acted very responsibly. The club has debts of more than \$100,000 and, according to budget, we'll lose another \$50,000 before the year is out. If our home match attendances get worse, it'll be more than that. Realistically, come October we could be around \$200,000 in debt. This is just in payments to creditors and on top of that there's the lease arrangement with the Perth City Council to pay. If we can't break even on a yearly basis, something has to be done. We've got to be in a position where we earn more than we spend.

WESTSIDE: Has there been much feed-back from the public or the Football Commission regarding Mr Pental's comments?

WOODHOUSE: The Commission hasn't contacted us at all. All we know of their viewpoint is what we've seen in the media. However, the public has shown a lot of concern. Members have rung in offering assistance and even some members at the Claremont Football Club raised a couple of hundred dollars for us by passing the hat around. The member I spoke to said none of them were Perth supporters, but they couldn't bare to see us go under. What we'd like to see at Perth is more past players and members coming back and helping out in some small way.

WESTSIDE: What about businessmen and former club people — have they come up with rescue plans?

WOODHOUSE: Some people are suggesting ideas, but unless we have the people to carry out those suggestions, there's not much we can do. We've had our own ideas in the past, but have not had the support to see them through. This time we're going for one major thrust called 'Demonic Plight' to get rid of the financial burden in one go. This is a last-ditch effort to save the club and, if successful, we've got to get it right next year. There can be no going back to the people with the same excuse because we'll have no credibility left. It's this or nothing.

WESTSIDE: How badly have you been affected by poor attendances at home games?

WOODHOUSE: We budgeted on \$9000 in gate receipts per home game, which represents about 4000 people. Our last two games were 2100 against East Perth and 1900 against South Fremantle, which is about \$4000 and \$3700 respectively in cash terms

and that's a long way short of budget. The first three games weren't too bad, but now that the club is near the bottom of the table, crowds are dropping off. If we continue to average \$3500 in gate receipts for our last five home games, we'll get \$20,000 instead of \$60,000 in income.

WESTSIDE: How long can you survive if you don't get help?

WOODHOUSE: I can't answer that — that's one for the finance director. If we don't get help, we'll definitely have to consider our options which include calling the creditors in for a meeting.

WESTSIDE: How did Perth's two-year stay at the WACA Ground contribute to this situation?

WOODHOUSE: It was disastrous. I've had several phone calls in the past week from people wanting to get things off their chest. They've said one of the reasons why they didn't renew membership was because of the shabby treatment they got at the WACA and not necessarily from our people. They thought the conditions weren't good enough, they didn't like the venue — it's seating, facilities or atmosphere — and once you lose people, it's very hard to get them back again. Once they start doing other things with their families on a Saturday afternoon, it takes a lot of persuasion to return them to their former habits. When we came back to Lathlain Park at the start of last year, there was an initial boost of returning members, but we never got them all back.

WESTSIDE: How has the news affected the players and coaches?

WOODHOUSE: They're all concerned about the club's future, but no-one has come forward to query their match payments. The greatest concern has

been whether or not the club will survive. It will be a good test for the players to see how they respond on the field. All our teams are on or near the bottom of the ladder. But they are no longer playing for their own pride, they're playing for the club's future.

WESTSIDE: Did last Saturday's win over West Perth, which lifted you off the bottom of the ladder, help the club's morale?

WOODHOUSE: There was a lot of emotion in the win which augers well for the future. It took some of the pain away from the previous week — it was fantastic to win an away game.

WESTSIDE: What lessons have you learnt from this situation; what would you do differently?

WOODHOUSE: I haven't been here long enough to comment on the mistakes of the past. The lesson I've learnt is that we control our own destiny. We now get all the gate receipts, where they previously went to the Commission and we shared in a yearly dividend. Next time we must budget for a lower weekly attendance, say 2000 people, at home matches and spend the resultant revenue accordingly.

WESTSIDE: Will Perth resort to shaking tins on street corners like Subiaco did in the late 1970s?

WOODHOUSE: I was playing with Subiaco at that time. People stood on street corners and went into pubs shaking tins and we'll do that. I've spoken to a fellow from Footscray and he's said that's what they did too. There is nothing wrong with that.

WESTSIDE: Did you realise Perth's financial strife before you returned to the club this year to take over the job?

WOODHOUSE: Not fully.

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Sharks aim to be debt-free

EAST Fremantle are turning their Moss Street headquarters into a debt-free environment.

The Sharks have reduced their borrowings from \$300,000 at the end of 1988, to \$175,000 last season and a further \$10,000 has been erased from the books this year.

And that could be boosted by an additional \$10,000 next month, with money raised through the club's highly-successful brick donation project which costs members and supporters just \$50 and gives them a brass plaque placed on a brick in the clubrooms.

"There's a lot happening or about to happen at East Fremantle," says general manager Bob Uittenbroek.

SUPER RAFFLE

"Apart from our ordinary weekly raffles, the Super Raffle will get under way soon. Lasting for 10 weeks, it has prizes totalling \$150,000 and we hope to make up to \$25,000 in profit.

"The main prize is a \$3500 trip to any Malaysian Airlines destination around the world."

East Fremantle also act as a ticket-selling agency for several local cinemas at a greatly reduced cost to members.

Uittenbroek says the club's success off the field in recent seasons has been due to the effort put in by everyone involved and he especially commended his office staff.



"We have a good team here," Uittenbroek said. "They know their jobs well and go about them efficiently as well as being very pleasant to work with."

FAMILY TIES

Uittenbroek's secretary for the past five years has been Lois Martens, whose husband is also a club sponsor.

And there's more to being a football club secretary than typing letters. Mrs Martens must organise the president's lunch on home match days and ensure that all the sponsors are looked after properly.

"It's busier than ever at the moment," Mrs Martens said. "Clubs need more and more fund-raising activities to keep going and they take time to organise."

Helen Fuller is one of the few new fixtures in East Fremantle's office. She's the club's part-time receptionist and like Mrs Martens, her husband is also tied up with the Sharks.

"Barry's on the business club committee," said Mrs Fuller, who has been a Sharks supporter for 25 years.

LONG-SERVING

Treasurer Ken Bateman and barman Mike Butterfield have been at East Fremantle for five and six years respectively, while barmaid Nora McDonald is something of a fixture after 13 years serving the members.

"Mike and Nora do an excellent job in the bar," Uittenbroek said. "They look after the members well in addition to running a tight financial ship."

"The bar made \$89,000 profit last year and it's on budget to do likewise again this year."

Clinton Pike — a former Swan Districts player — has emerged as a key man in the club's football activities. He combines senior football affairs with the Sharks with junior development work and in the last four years his role has become most important.

Uittenbroek described all his people as 'invaluable', especially the dozen volunteers who can be seen working around the office on different days.

Don Hume is a full-time volunteer and he's always on hand to do odd jobs.

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Falcons machine teams together

THE Leederville Oval football machine is located underneath the Len Roper Grandstand — with the huge workload divided between three full-time staff members all dedicated to the West Perth cause.

Football clubs have been tightening their belts for a number of years to cut down their financial burdens and a small band of office workers at WASFL clubs have become the norm, rather than the exception.

West Perth's newest recruit is Matt Tweedie — and he has quickly learnt the meaning of hard work and long hours.

He handles junior and senior football affairs in his dual role of development officer and football manager, been putting in 11-hour days, six days

a week since he joined the Falcons in April.

Tweedie left his position as Youth Education Officer with Eastern Hills Senior High School to tackle football full-time and coming from a teaching background, he especially enjoys his involvement in the development of young players.

"The last few weeks have been particularly hectic with the State junior championships, country 17s, CIG Shield and Quit Cup games, on top of our regular country and metropolitan coaching clinics," Tweedie said.

ENJOYABLE

Alan White, the club's general manager, also defected from the Education Department. Initially, he combined his work as Youth Education Officer at Como Senior High School with part-time development work at Leederville before taking over the GM's job in mid-1987.

"It's very enjoyable work," White said.

"I like meeting people and bringing new people to the club."

The world of management was totally foreign to White before he joined West Perth, but he is gradually coming terms with the financial side of the football business — with some help from the club's accountant.

"Despite the financial situations of clubs, there will always be the need for a general manager-type person," White said.

"It is a big challenge to get the team onto the field every week and make sure that everything is functioning. Winning a few more games would be a boost though.

SECRETARIAL ROLE

Secretary Lorraine Cruickshank joined the club in September, 1987 after leaving another secretarial position with a surgical supplier.

"It's a pretty close-knit place to work and Alan and Matt are good to work for," she said.

"Everyone gets in and helps and you do whatever you can, whenever you can."

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Demons need to revive support

Fitzroy are a danger

THE first leg of what is a crucial month of football for the West Coast Eagles will be to overcome the Fitzroy Lions this Sunday.

My old side had a good win in Sydney two weeks ago and the open spaces of Subiaco Oval will suit their style of play.

We'll almost certainly see dangerous forward Richard Osborne back in the league team after coming through three games in the reserves following a knee reconstruction last year.

Osborne kicked eight goals against the Eagles last year at the WACA Ground and will team up with Paul Roos, Ross Lyon and Alistair Lynch to give the Lions plenty of bite up forward.

They have a strong defence led by an in-form Gary Pert, Brett Stephens and Michael Gale and the Lions can never be under-estimated.

After Fitzroy at home, it's Collingwood at Victoria Park and St Kilda and Footscray at the WACA Ground — four tough games in which the Eagles really can ill-afford to lose any because of the evenness of the competition.

But we shouldn't be worrying about games two, three and four — it's Fitzroy this Sunday that is a danger game, especially after a break for the State match.

THE Perth Football Club needs to have a close look at its district support-system in its bid to survive.

The Demons have lost their junior council — once one of the strongest breeding grounds in the State — and the club's supply of up-and-coming footballers has gradually dried up.

But, by strange comparison, the Sunday League clubs of Kelmscott, Maddington and Canning are all part of Perth's zone — and are in the top four of the strong 14-team competition.

As a former Perth player and coach, I'm certainly keen to see the Demons survive. I don't want to see 100 years of football tradition go into mothballs.

But before the Demons start their revival campaign, they need to determine if the members and supporters want the club to survive.

As a player who spent 10 years of my football life at Lathlain Park — not forgetting a much longer involvement through my father Bob — seeing the good times and the poor times, it is disappointing to see the club in this current situation.


PROBLEMS

But the problems haven't arisen overnight.

The Demons have struggled on the field for the last 10 or 12 years. They lost the 1978 grand final to East Perth by two points to signify the end of a successful era; three premierships in the 1960s and then two in the 1970s.

You can find many reasons for their troubled times, as with any football club. But Perth's player-supply has simply not been good enough to sustain the club in the 1980s.

They can hardly even blame the drain of players to the national arena, with very few stars joining the Eagles or other AFL teams.



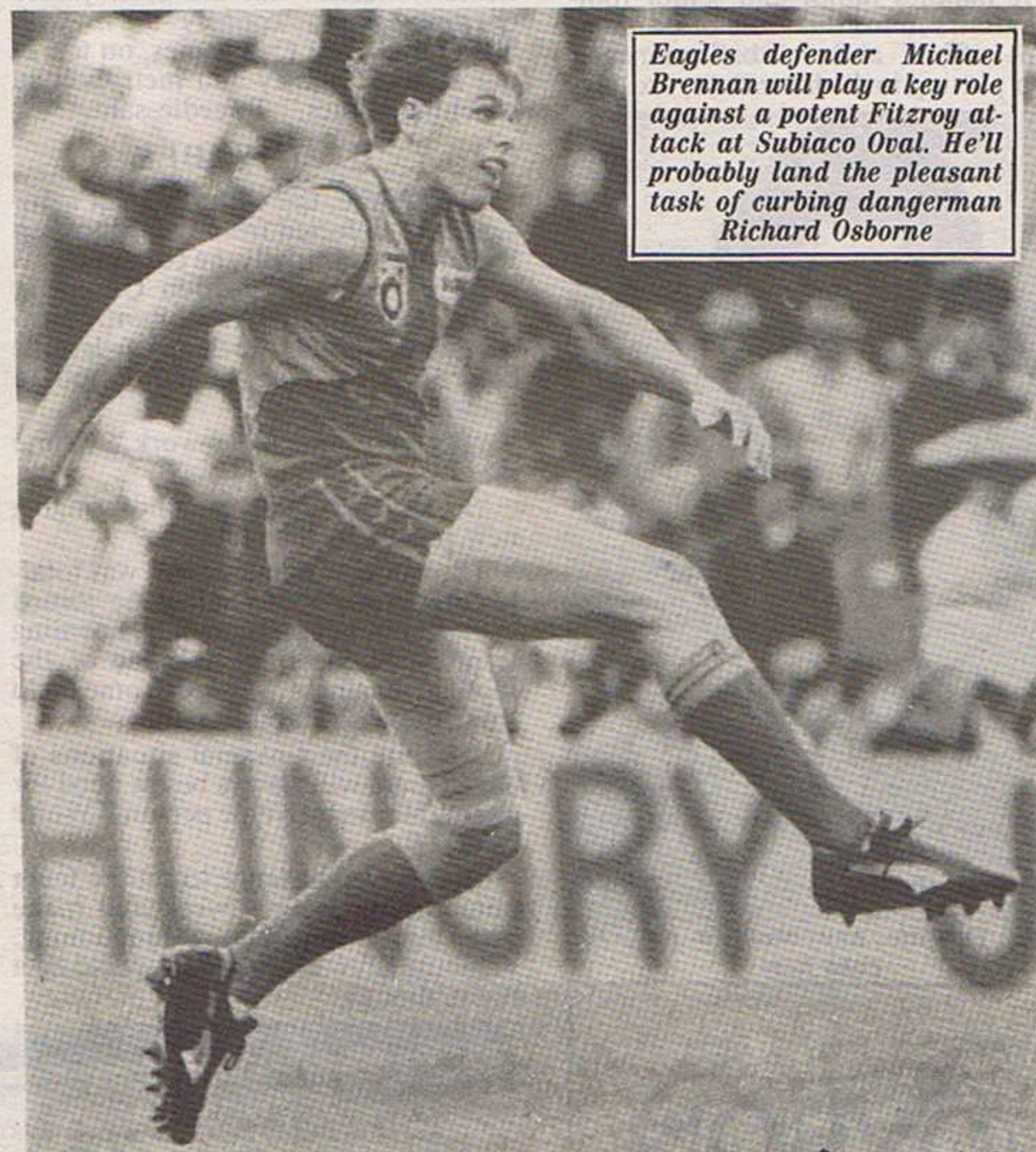

"But as long as I get a game, I'm happy now."



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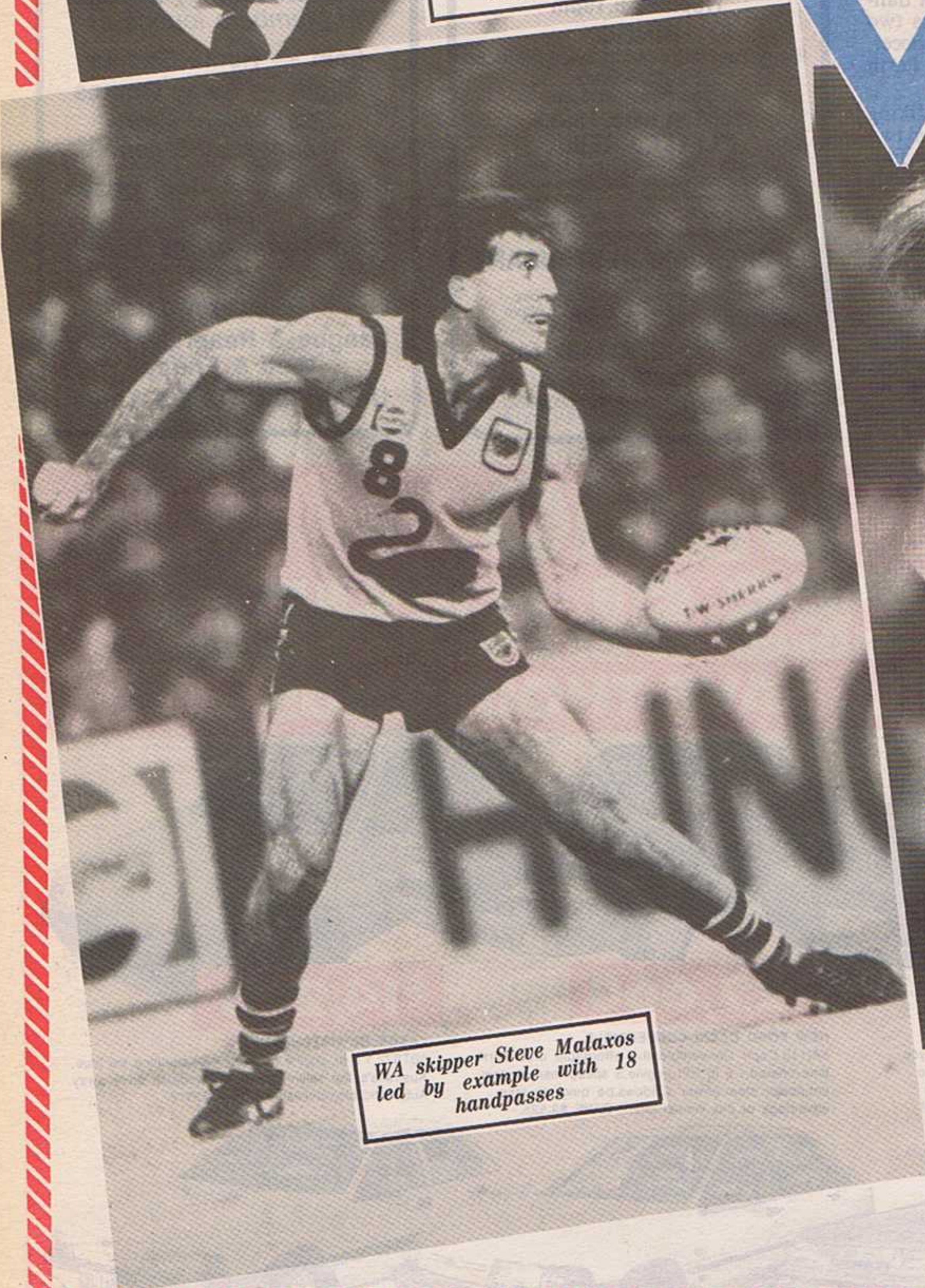

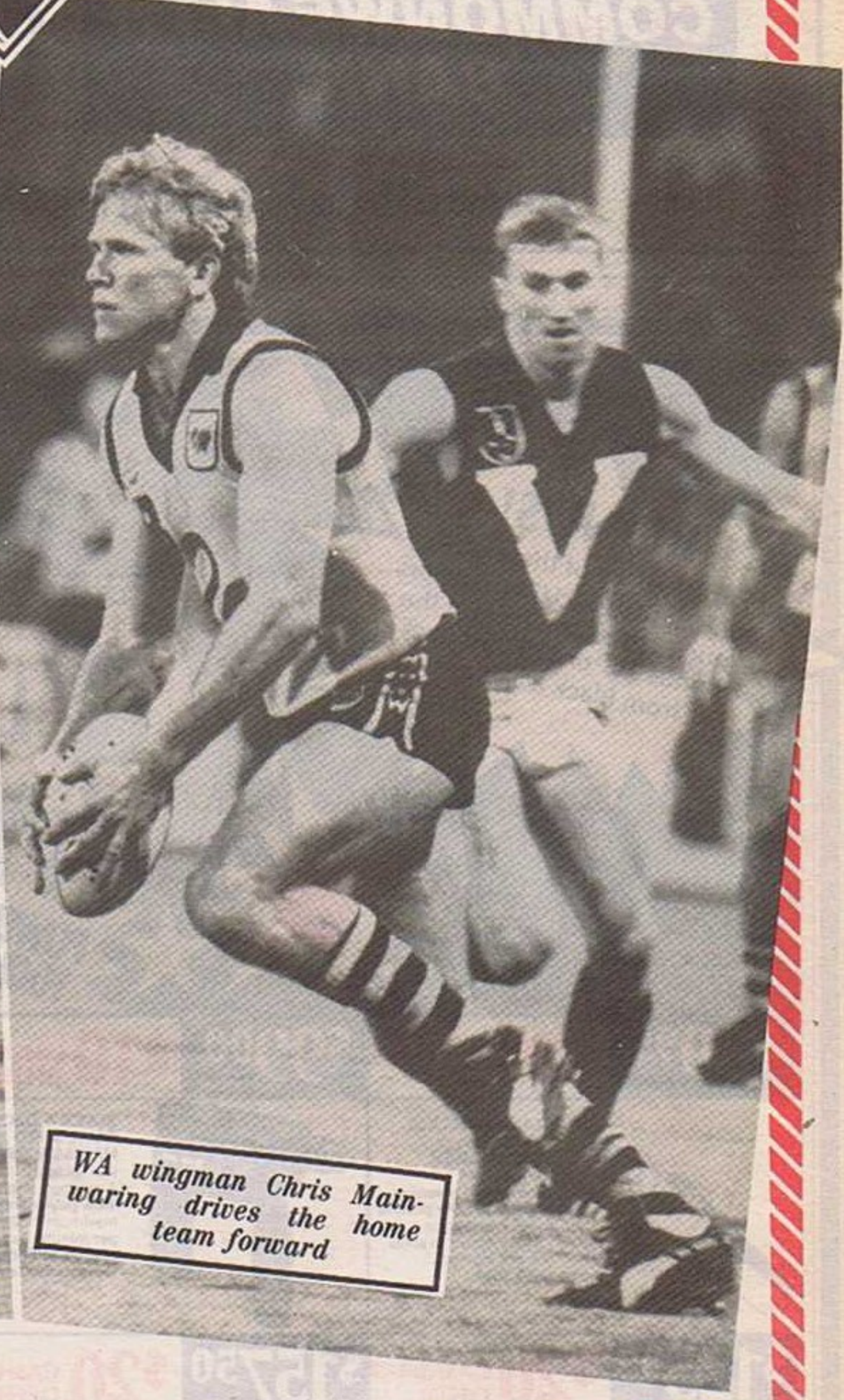

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LET'S LEARN FROM RUGBY

THERE is a well-worn saying that you are never too old to learn — and that applies to Australian Football, who shouldn't be afraid to learn from some rival codes.

Rugby League, that formerly much-maligned game which, of necessity, has now cleaned up its act and become a feared competitor in the big sport stakes.

While I have reservations about the entertainment value of the rugby game — particularly in comparison to Australian Football — there are certain areas where we can learn from them.

There is one area where we should admire their players — and it is in the very sphere where Australian Football's own adherents to sportsmanship are degenerating drastically.

DECISIONS

In rugby league, when a decision is given by the referee against a player, he, without question, "cops it sweet".

In 99 cases out of 100, the player philosophically trots off without batting an eyelid. Not so in our game.

Increasingly, Australian Football stars wave their arms around; go red in the face; stamp their feet; throw out their mouthguard and generally let forth with vocal objections.

One doesn't have to be an expert lip reader to interpret some of the choice words wafting out.

These reactions are becoming more common on television replays and are

the worst possible example for the thousands of juniors watching their heroes.

Apologists will say they are only words and that bad language and volatile reactions are an integral part of present-day life.

Some of our umpires are not blameless, either. They allow players to abuse them without resorting to reporting the offender.

RULE BOOK

The laws book states that a player WILL be reported for:

* 16.9.3 Disputing the decision of an umpire.

* 16.9.4 Unduly interferes with, or assaults, or uses abusive, threatening or insulting language or behaviour towards an umpire during the progress of a match or within or without the oval on the day of the match.

* 16.9.16 Is guilty of misconduct. Pretty clear isn't it?

Of course, there are some quite amazing attitudes prevalent within our communities in regard to umpires.

Some allegedly sensible people seem to think that umpires should be fair game simply because they represent authority. I even heard one idiot in the electronic media recently say that an umpire shouldn't be out there if he wasn't prepared to cop abuse from players.

What a joke!

Those big, bad and battered rugby players can teach us a lot.

His sister, Mrs Shelley Hurdle, said that their father had almost died in similar circumstances when he was aged 20. He collapsed on during a rugby game in Perth, but was revived with emergency treatment.

USE YOUR HANDS

THE game might be called 'foot'-ball, but the use of your hands is equally important.

Always use two hands when going for the ball; that provides a much more secure grip and reduces the possibility of fumbling.

If you're going for a mark — in the air, over your head or on your chest — two hands are much better than one.

A player with two hands firmly on the ball is in complete control to kick or handpass — and it takes a much stronger effort to knock the ball out of your possessiokn.

Use two hands for tackling. One hand clutching a guernsey heading off goalwards is not enough. Grab your opponent with both hands at the same time.

The same applies when you fly to punch the ball away; don't just go up with one fist clenched; put both hands together and really give the leather a thump.

When you're pushing the ball along in front of you, two hands placed side by side gives you greater coverage — and a better chance to grab the ball when it bounces up properly.

And here's this week's brain-teaser on the rules of football:

A kick for goal lands on the goal-line and bounces back into play to be cleared by the defenders. What does the umpire do?

Call play on — the ball didn't cross the goal-line, so there's no score.

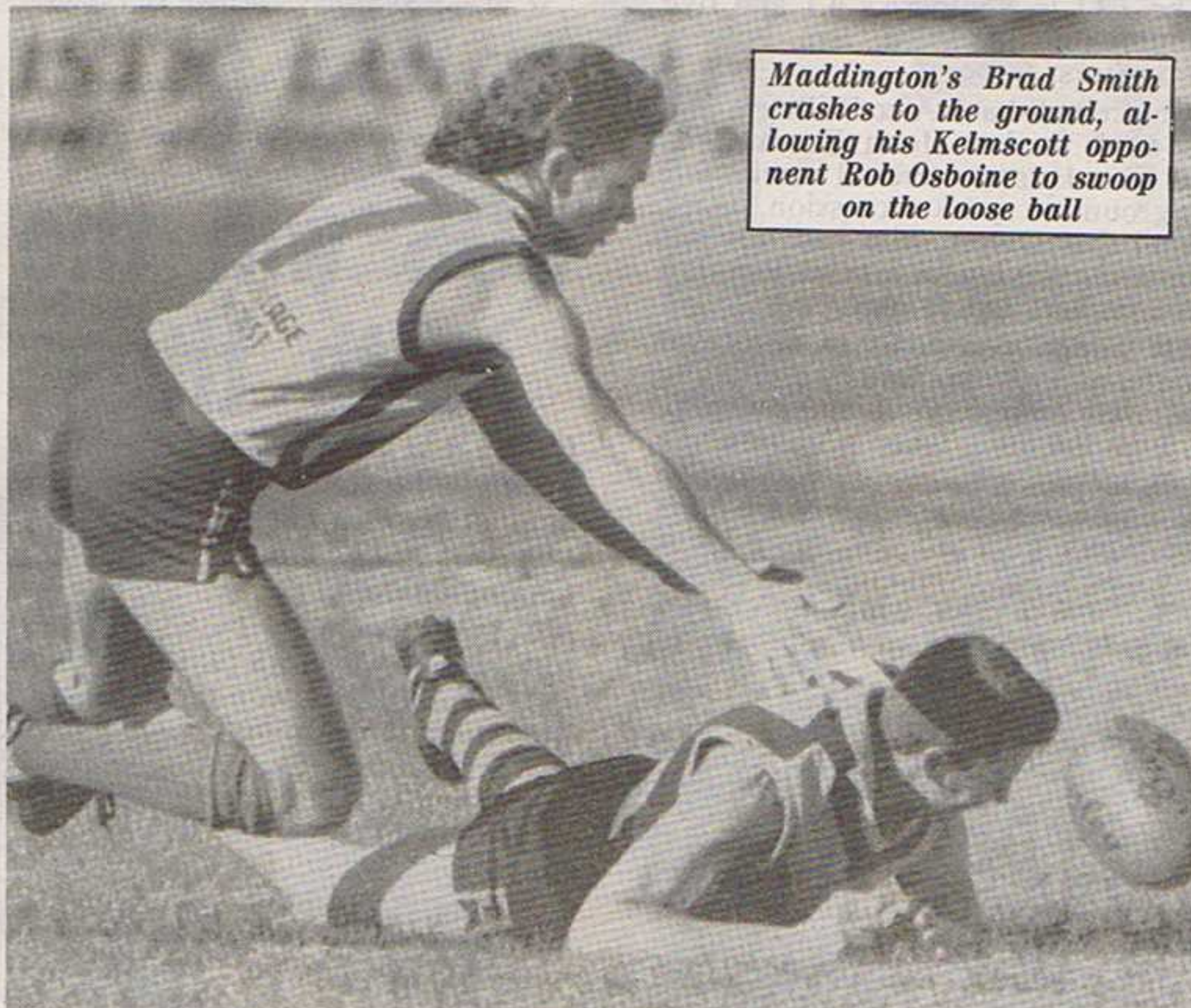

Aerobic capacity

A regular column on behalf of the Sports Trainers' Association, sponsored by Elastoplast.

Cardio-vascular, or aerobic exercises, involves continuous movement of large muscle groups for longer than five minutes.

The use of legs, or arms — or both — in such activities as running, cycling, paddling, swimming, rowing and rope skipping are examples.

Aerobic exercise requires efficient circulation of blood by the heart and blood vessels (cardio-vascular system) to lungs and large muscles.

The blood supplies oxygen and nutrients to muscles and removes waste products from muscle.

INTENSITY

Aerobic capacity reflects the body's efficiency to supply and use the oxygen and fuel available to muscle. As the intensity of exercise increases, so too does the need for oxygen.

Blood is the transport medium for oxygen, fuel and wastes.

Since the amount of blood in the body is fixed, the heart must re-cycle blood faster, as more physical work is done.

That is, as the exercise intensity (work load) increases, heart rate (beats per minute) increases. Thus, as intensity increases, more oxygen is supplied each minute.

Heart rate can be used as a guide to the intensity of aerobic activity for each individual.

Aerobic fitness gains are indicated if, after a period of conditioning (eg. 12 weeks), for a fixed intensity of work, the heart rate is lower than prior to the training.

DEMANDS

That is, the cardio-vascular system has adapted to the demands of the training.

The heart and circulation are more efficient so the heart doesn't need to beat as fast to do the same job.

Remember: measuring heart rate accurately requires practice.

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Albany win carnival

A SOUTHERN Districts side ravaged by injury produced a surprise victory in the Elders Pastoral Great Southern Carnival in Esperance at the weekend.

The Southerners courageously overcame the loss of their half-back line to win the grand final by 16 points.

They completed the match with 16 fit players, downing host team South East Football League, 8.6 (54) to 6.16 (52).

Southern Districts' former Claremont ruckman Mal Thomson was best-on-ground with a superb four-quarter effort.

Winning coach Larry Dwyer, who kicked two goals before tearing his hamstring, described the victory as "a most moving performance".

"I have played with South Fremantle and the effort these guys put in matched the emotion of a league match," Dwyer said.

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THE VICS ARE HURTING

State-of-Origin turns the tables

THE success of State-of-Origin has finally hit home where it hurts the hardest — at the heart of Victorian officialdom.

Last Sunday's victory by a Tasmanian State-of-Origin side over Victoria's so-called second team was a major morale-booster for the oft-forgotten Apple Isle, a breeding ground for some all-time footballing legends.

Add that victory to the success by New South Wales a month earlier and you now understand why Victoria's voluble chairman of selectors, Ted Whitten, wants to call a halt to the existing State-of-Origin format.

The strong victory at the WACA Ground on Tuesday helped restore some much-needed pride and, as Victorian legend Ron Barassi said: "There's nothing like a win, is there?"

But the Vics were still claiming that their player-resources were being severely taxed by having to field two State-of-Origin teams in the one weekend, amidst restricted selection because of an AFL split round.

What the Vics are really saying is that if you take their best imported players out of their club line-ups, they

struggle to field competitive sides.

The Tasmanians won 20:14 to 14:7 with a side that boasted plenty of top talent — but the Victorian side wasn't all that bad, either.

Just have a look at this line-up:

Not such a bad team, eh?

In fact, when you recall Victorian boasting of bygone eras, they always claimed their second team could beat any other side in Australia.

The Tasmanians were able to recall some of their best exports to the AFL in recent years with key players like James Manson in the ruck, John McCarthy at full-forward; Collingwood's wing duo of Graham Wright and Darren Pritchard, Brett Stephens at full-back and his Fitzroy team-mate in Alistair Lynch in attack.

Tassie stalwarts have bleated for years about being raped of their top players. But no-one listened.

When WA critics aired the same complaints, the Vics tended to take notice simply because the Westerners complained from a position of strength.

FORGOTTEN BIRTH

THE complete irony of this year's interstate match results is how the Australian Football League — better known to the sceptics as the Victorian Football League — has claimed the State-of-Origin concept as their own.

An editorial attributed to Ross Oakley, the chairman of the AFL Commission, in the programme for the Victoria-NSW match suggested that State-of-Origin football was "conceived of by the AFL."

Certainly, West Australian promoter Leon Larkin would have a chuckle over that claim.

He only too well recalls the battle he had throughout the 1976 year trying to convince the VFL to let his proposed inaugural State-of-Origin game go ahead.

Larkin, the Subiaco promotions manager at the time, wanted permission to bring WA's top players back home from Victoria and put them up against the best the Vics could assemble.

Spurred on by a trio of football writers from The West Australian — Geoff Christian, Colin Hopkins and this writer — and supported by the Daily News chief football writer in Ross Nicholas (now the Eagles promotions manager), Larkin kept at it.

He overcame all the VFL hurdles — such as obtaining special insurance coverage for all their players — and finally, a year behind schedule, got the game off the ground in 1977.

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
