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QUIT WARNING

MEMBERS of Perth's board of directors will resign unless they get more co-operation from the club's supporters.

That was the message at a special media briefing this week in preparation for tonight's (Thursday) emergency meeting of supporters at Lathlain Park following revelations that the Demons face bankruptcy if urgent action is not taken.

Perth could be \$250,000 in debt by September.

Demons vice-president and former player Mike Redenbach urged people to attend tonight's meeting, describing it as crunch-time.

Perth directors want more help

"The directors will stand aside unless we get some more help," Redenbach said.

"Some people have come forward to help us, but basically the work-load is being borne by the same people.

"We're targetting the 20 to 40-year-old age group at the meeting because there are not

enough of them getting involved and taking some responsibility.

"There's no use in us doing some band-aid work on the club, if there aren't people coming along behind us who are prepared to take over Perth's reins.

"We have to get things right now, or it'll be too late."

Perth are expecting 500 people at the meeting, to be held in the Demons social hall at 6.30pm. Footscray club president Peter Gordon, who was behind the fight to save the AFL Bulldogs from a similar fate last year, will be the guest speaker.

THE West Coast Eagles have as much chance of beating Collingwood at Victoria Park this Saturday as the average Joe Blow has of getting a tax concession from Paul Keating.

Even when they are playing ordinary football, Collingwood are hard to beat at their home ground.

Though the Eagles walloped the Magpies in Perth in the opening round of this season's fixtures, Collingwood have been running hot ever since then.

The fact that they are vying for premierships favouritism with Essendon is an indication they are playing their best football for a number of years.

So if beating them on their home heap is usually a daunting task, it will be doubly so on Saturday.

And Mick Malthouse, more than anyone, is aware of that fact.

IMPORTANT

When I fired a question at him after the Fitzroy game as to how important this match was to the Eagles, he suggested that you had not played football until you had beaten Collingwood at Victoria Park.

That comment must have come from the Richmond book of hard knocks — a story published alongside my Eagles match report in Monday's Australian was one about the Richmond match against Collingwood at Victoria Park.

It quoted former Richmond player and president Graeme Richmond. He said you hadn't played the game till you had met the Magpies at Collingwood.

It was rather ironic that both these former Rich-

mond players should use the same quote on the same weekend.

If it was tough in their days when Richmond were one of the VFL's power teams, you can imagine what it's like for a team that finds it difficult to win in Melbourne at the best of times.

There are a number of factors why Collingwood are difficult to beat at home — and a rabid crowd that intimidates opposing teams; supporters and even the umpires is a starting point.

QUAGMIRE

And it's a ground that can turn into a quagmire after a bit of fairly-normal Melbourne July rain.

Back in 1970, when the WA team went the closest it has ever gone to beating the Vics on the MCG — a six-point margin — the side trained at Victoria Park. Though it was a fine day, the ground was nice and spongy and as you walked out, the mud squelched up through the grass.

Those kind of heavy conditions can take the life out of legs in a tough match.

But it's the oval that is the most daunting challenge. The ground takes on the appearance of a gladiatorial arena with the Collingwood supporters screaming for their players to lop heads.

A brave thing to do knowing that the next time they met would be at Victoria Park.

But then Worsfold is no wimp. And the Eagles will want to be made of the same stuff if they are to make a contest of it at Victoria Park.

What I am saying is, don't expect too much when the Eagles meet Collingwood on Saturday at Victoria Park.

A win would provide the Eagles with perhaps their greatest moment since they joined the AFL.

To take them to the wire would be a great achievement.

TOUGH CHALLENGE

This match will provide the Eagles with the kind of challenge they need if they are to be finals contenders — and not pretenders — this season.

If they can be competitive and make Collingwood fight all the way, that will be as good as a win.

Anything more will be the biggest bonus the Eagles could hope for as it would show they have what it takes to win against the most daunting odds.

And it will leave them equal on premierships points with Collingwood and provide them with the springboard to leap into the top three at the end of the qualifying rounds.

FINALS FIGHT ALIVE

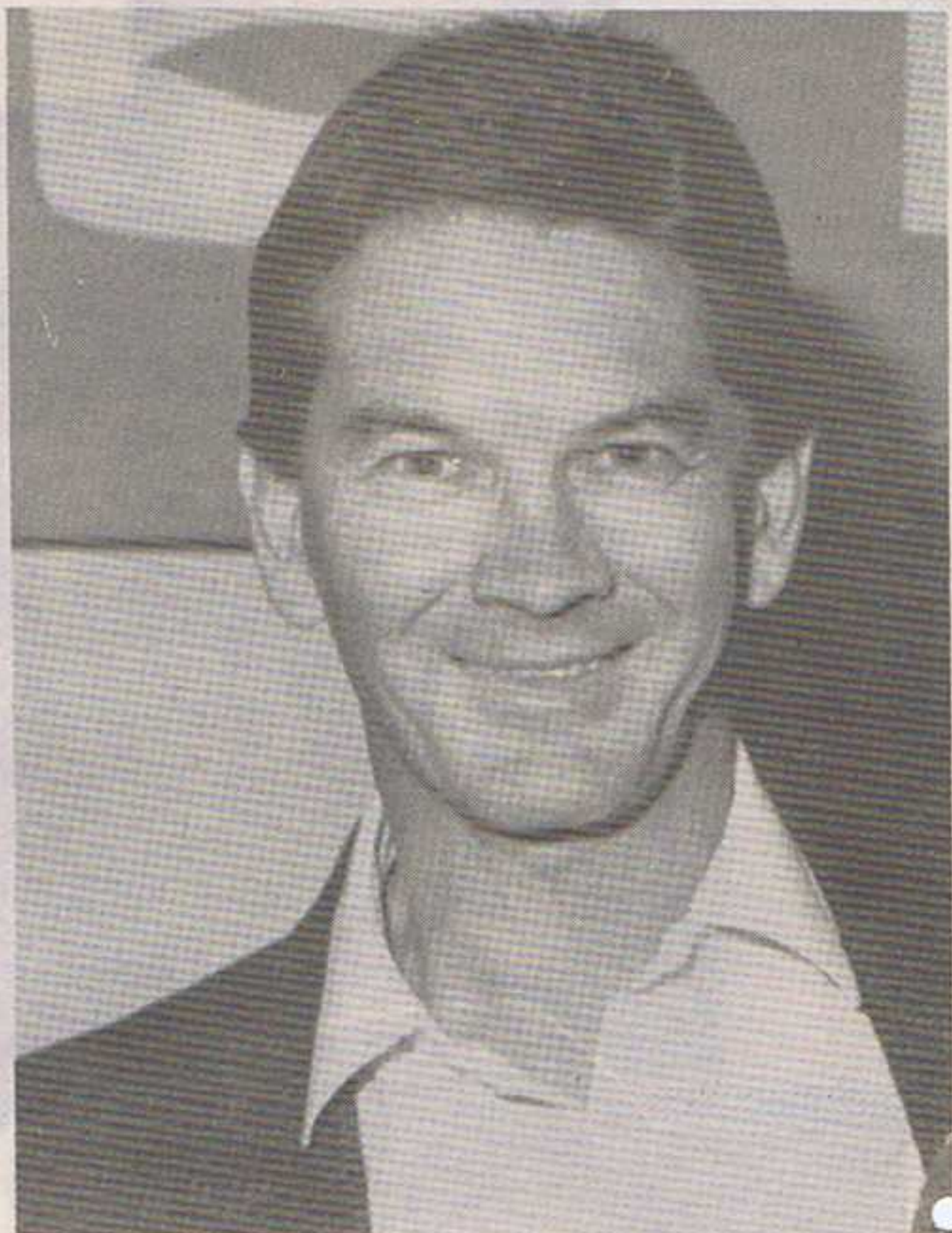

Collard trio set sights on a flag

SOUTH Fremantle are emerging as strong challengers to Claremont's premiership crown with a mid-season run that has seen them climb into third spot on the Pepsi League ladder.

A driving force behind this surge has been a trio of real Bulldogs — the Collard brothers, Brad, Derek and Cliff.

Brad, 26, and Derek, 24, experienced the pain of losing a grand final last year, when South were over-run by Claremont and they are determined to see the Bulldogs in the winner's circle this September.

Cliff, 23, watched from the sidelines nursing a broken jaw, but it was equally as painful.

"Everything's starting to fall into place for us now and we'll win the flag this time," agreed the trio of tough-as-nails brothers from the hard breeding ground of Quairading.

"We have guys coming back from injury at the right time and by the finals we'll all be in form."

And South Fremantle do not plan using the long route, via the first semi-final and preliminary final, to the grand final either.

"We're only one game behind Claremont now with seven matches to go we can still get a second semi-final berth," said Brad, who skips the side from midfield.

"We're taking every game as it comes, but if we win the last seven matches, we'll play in the second semi for sure.

TIGERS CHALLENGE

"Claremont are the only side we haven't beaten this season. But both times the result could have gone either way in the closing stages.

"We're out to get them next week. It won't be easy though, because Gerard Neesham's a shrewd coach and always seems to have something up his sleeve for us."

It has been the Collards' tough, intuitive game that has helped lift South Fremantle, who slipped to fifth spot five weeks ago.

Cliff, out of a back-pocket, has been coach Stan Magro's most consistent player and he leads the Bulldogs S. and D. Jewellery best-player award (not to be confused with the club's fairest and best medal).

The Collards epitomise one of football's well-worn adages. They say that players who live together play well together and Cliff says that moving in with brother Brad has lifted his game.

"Brad's pulled me into line a bit," Cliff said.

"I'm now a senior player and he's brought it home to me that I've got to be more disciplined and responsible in my game."

STATE TEAM

That has certainly been the case and it is not surprising that Cliff was given a late call-up for the State squad to play South Australia this Sunday.

"It's been frustrating, but hopefully it'll go right for me this time," Brad said.

"I haven't played for WA yet and it'll be an honour when the time does come."

ON-FIELD BOND

The bond between the Collard brothers is obvious on the field.

They have the ability to find each other with the ball, sometimes without even looking and when one is in trouble, a brother is often first on the scene to help.

"We don't deliberately look for each other," said Cliff. "We just read each other's game so well that we know what they're going to do."

This can all be traced back to the trio's roots in Quairading, some 160kms east of Perth.

They played a lot of junior football together and were coached by their father, Cliff Collard snr.

"Our father was a tough disciplinarian, which helped our football a lot.

"Beating an opponent man-to-man gets down to the individual," Cliff said. "If you want the ball enough, you can win it."

AMBITIONS

The Collards have ambitions of playing AFL football, though Brad believes the 1990 November draft could be his last chance.

"I'm 26 now, so I'll be too old next year," Brad said.

"But I think Cliff has an excellent chance this year.

"He's had a good season and is the right age to make a start at that level."

Derek, too, would like to play AFL. But after a long run with injury, he realises that he would be a gamble for any coach.

His aggression and dash from a back-pocket constantly rebounds the Bulldogs into attack and few opponents this season have got the better of him.

Brad's performances have not gone unnoticed by the State selectors and he is a likely starter on Sunday.

It is also true that South Fremantle play better when injury-prone Derek lines up in a forward pocket.

He was one of the injured senior players at the start of this season and his skills low to the ground and his ability to keep the heat on defenders as well as snapping goals has earned him a healthy respect.

"Ever since juniors, I've roved in the forward line," Derek said. "And Stan (Magro) has drummed it into us that if we get the ball into the forward line, we must score."

Though Brad has been one of the State League's most consistent performers in recent seasons, he has had his share of bad luck.

Brad has been in State squads before, including making the last 25 for the 1989 State-of-Origin clash with Victoria, only to miss selection because of injury or an untimely loss of form.

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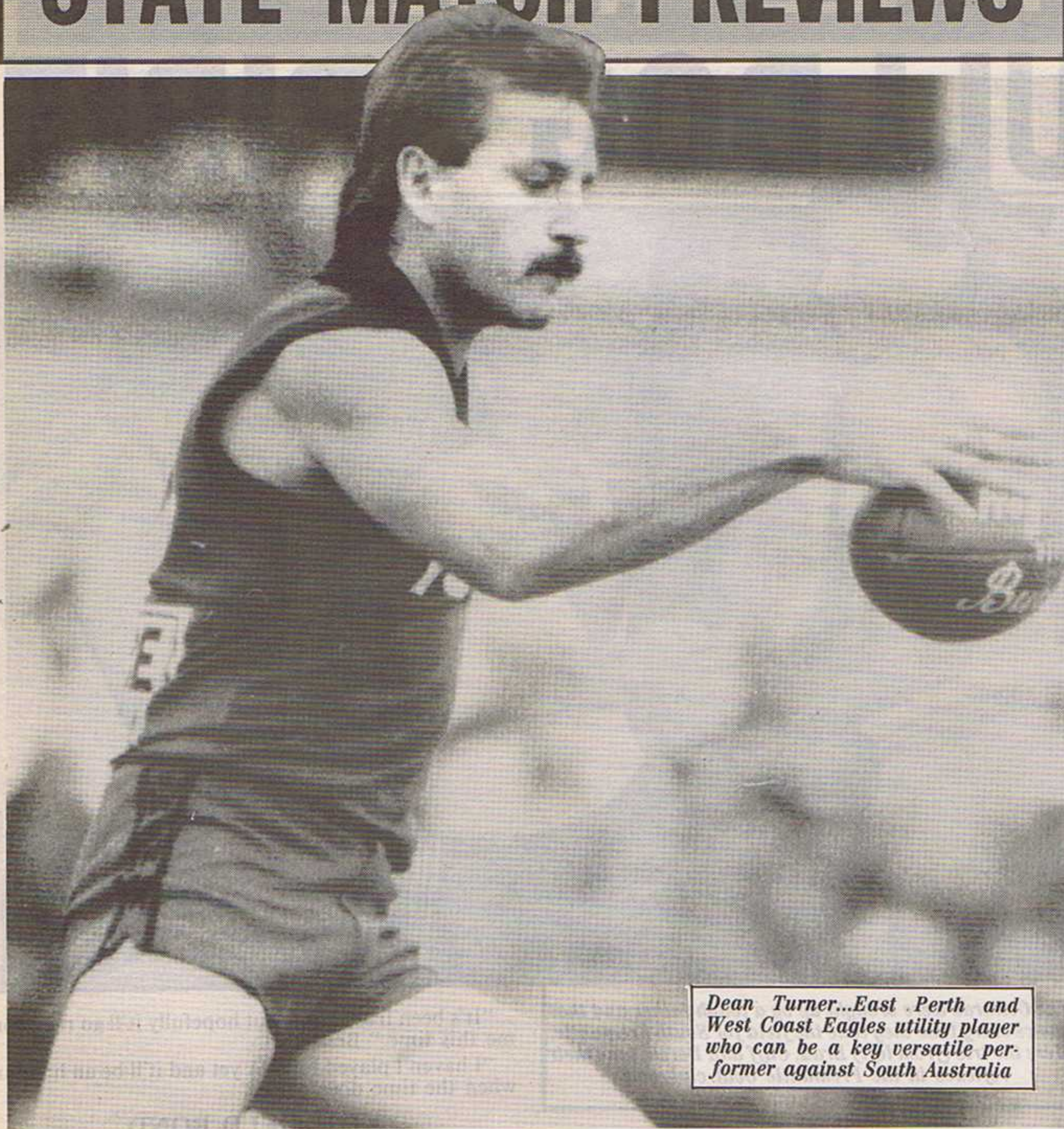

SA have good blend

A GOOD blend of youth and experience and big and small men will give South Australia the edge over WA in the interstate clash at Football Park this Sunday.

The SA selectors — coach John Cahill, Barrie Robran and Dave Boyd — have picked a strong, in-form squad which will leave the Sandgropers in their wake.

The key to SA's "engine room" will be brothers Andrew and Darren Jarman, who will again team up after going their separate ways at club level this season.

Andrew joined Norwood amid much controversy, while Darren stayed at North Adelaide, but is tipped to join the Redlegs next season.

INSTINCT

Their "antenna-like" instinct is similar to that of Jim and Phil Krakouer and big performances are expected from the dynamic duo.

North captain Darel Hart and Rooster team-mate Steve Sims will also be key ball-getters for the Croweaters.

Much attention will focus on South utility Nigel Smart, who is being chased by several AFL clubs, with Collingwood making him their No. 1 target for 1991.

Smart, 21, is an outstanding young player who can run like a hare and leap like a gazelle. He has talent to burn.

Nineteen-year-old Matthew Robran, the son of former North Adelaide triple Magarey Medallist Barrie, will also be one to watch.

Robran has been drafted by Hawthorn and has had a wonderful season in the back pocket, showing maturity beyond his years.

Pacy Simon Tregenza is expected to join Footscray next season and the Bulldogs will be watching his performance with interest.

Tregenza hasn't had the sort of season he has hoped for, but is keen to show his class in this encounter.

The in-form 1985 Magarey Medallist Grantley Fielke should hold down the other wing, giving SA plenty of pace around the flanks.

Andrew Johns, who this year joined Sturt from VFA club Box Hill, has been a minor sensation and, along with Tregenza, is probably the fastest player in the SA side.

MEDAL FAVOURITE

Early Magarey Medal favourite Richard Champion, who is being hotly pursued by the Brisbane Bears, can play in various positions and it will be interesting to see where he lines up.

Central's Scott Lee is the most reliable back pocket in the State and will make the WA rovers work overtime for their possessions, while rugged Tom Warhurst is expected to hold down a key defensive position.

He is the tightest checker in the State, but is lucky to be playing after being reported for striking and subsequently reprimanded two weeks ago.

Darren Smith, Essendon's No. 1 draft choice from last season, is expected to hold down centre-half-forward and his strength and aggression will be vital to SA's chances.

Strong rebounding will come from experienced centre-half-back Greg Phillips and the dashing Bruce Abernethy, who both had successful stints at Collingwood, while players like North veteran Mike Redden, Torrens captain Bruce Lindsay and outstanding Glenelg ball-getter Chris McDermott will provide the experience necessary to settle the side down.

WA FLAVOUR

Three players with WA experience are in the SA squad — brilliant rover Stephen Rowe, who is enjoying his best season with Norwood since crossing from South Fremantle in 1987, the 1989 Magarey Medallist Gilbert McAdam, who played three games with Claremont and has already signed for St Kilda next season and fast-leading full forward. Allen Jakovich, who started at South Fremantle.

South Australian officials know that this WA side will be competitive, but they players also know how important it is to win, with State pride at stake.

That knowledge, plus the home ground advantage, should see the Croweaters win comfortably.

Underdogs can spring a surprise

WESTERN Australia go to Adelaide this weekend as the interstate underdogs — but the Sandgropers are ready to shock South Australia.

The Croweaters are confident that their more experienced combination will blast WA off Football Park, but beware a West Aussie down on his luck.

WA may be inexperienced in comparison to the South Australians, but Ron Alexander's side is packed with skilful, quality ball-getters and an enthusiastic will-to-win.

In fact, Alexander is confident of repeating WA's 1986 performance when they beat South Australia at Football Park under similar circumstances.

WA could field up to 12 West Coast Eagles players, most of whom have AFL experience.

KEY POSITIONS

Alexander has several options for most key positions and they look particularly healthy in their forward line.

Claremont's West Coast Eagle Peter Mann and South Fremantle's 17-year-old Glen Jakovich — a brother of Woodville's Allen, who will head the SA attack — will vie for the key centre-half-forward position, while East Perth's Glen Bartlett and Swan Districts' Shane Stempel can play at full-forward.

Alexander has the option of also using Bartlett and Stempel in either of the key defensive positions, together with Eagles trio Geoff Miles (if available), Peter Melesso and Brad Gwilliam.

South Fremantle's 1989 Sandover Medallist Craig Edwards will lead the ruck with back-up from Eagle David O'Connell and Stempel.

Edwards, who had hoped to be drafted into the AFL last November, is determined to prove he can survive at national level.

Though shorter than his South Australian combatants at 192cms, Edwards is a tough 100kg player who works hard around the ground and is difficult to shift once he sets himself for a mark.

GROUND LEVEL

While the big men can all be solid contributors, it is at ground level that Alexander expects to win this clash.

Rover Tony Evans, who like Mann elected to play with Claremont this season and delay their Eagles debut, looms as a match-winner, particularly as he should team well with fellow-Tigers Joe Cormack, Mark Hann and Peter Thorne.

Evans' skills, his ability to read the ball off hands and his dangerous goal sense make him an ideal forward-line player, while Cormack is regarded as the SFL's No. 2 rover and can handle big games.

The favourite for this year's SFL Sandover Medal is East Fremantle rookie centreman Gary Smallridge. The tough, no-nonsense 25-year-old will be a handful for any opponent and his duel with Chris McDermott will be a match highlight.

Strongmen Peter Hodyl (Swans) and Peter Worsfold (Souths) — a brother of tough Eagle John — will provide WA with plenty of aggression across the half-forward line, while Claremont's Cam Lewis and Eagle Todd Breman (if available) are sure to add bite and dash to the half-back line.

The State selectors may have to toss a coin to decide whether Bulldog Cliff Collard or Swans Mick Grasso lines up in a back pocket. Both are aggressive and excellent at rebounding from defence.

DAZZLE

Tigers skipper Mark Hann and Souths Brad Collard will ensure plenty of pace on the wings and livewire Claremont half-forward Kevin Mitchell promises to show the same dazzle as does brother Michael at Richmond.

Eagles recruit and experienced Fitzroy player Craig McGrath becomes eligible as he completes a term of suspension with Saturday's Collingwood appointment and he will probably start in a pocket, but can fill a variety of key positions.

Veterans Thorne (Claremont), John Annear and Dean Turner (both Eagles) are all big possession-getters and will share the ruck-roving responsibilities.

Alexander wants to use players who tackle hard and run all day.

West Aussies still held in respect

THE establishment of the West Coast Eagles has certainly stemmed the flow of talented young West Aussies across to Victoria — but Sandgroper skill is still much in demand.

The Big V might have recorded a hard-fought win against WA in the recent interstate challenge, but first-year WA players in the AFL guarantee that there's still plenty of respect for the West.

There were seven West Australians who accepted a draft call-up over summer and though the success rate hasn't been over-whelming, there's enough good form among the WA contingent to keep familiar names high in the best-player lists.

The man heading the recruiting-coup list must be Essendon's import from East Perth, footballer-scientist Peter Cransberg.

He has been an outstanding rookie, being unfortunate to be ruled out of WA's team for the Victorian match.

Cransberg, 22, has been playing exceptionally well on the half-forward line or at half-back, providing the ver-

satility coach Kevin Sheedy demands of his top players.

Brisbane's mop-top rover Brad Rowe and Fitzroy's homesick forward Dale Kickett have also been prominent.

Cransberg's WA team-mate, Brad Fox, from Perth, is yet to play this year, along with Swan Districts recruit Greg Jones, who has joined St Kilda.

Claremont's Grant Povey, who started last year with Carlton, still cannot break in for a senior game.

DISAPPOINTMENT

The biggest disappointment has been Claremont centreman Ben Allan, best afield in last year's WAFL grand final, but only able to play two matches (mainly as an interchange player) this year.

Here's how the WA newcomers rate:

Ben Allan (Hawthorn): Has played only two matches and appears too slow for Victorian football. He just hasn't picked up the tempo yet, disappointing the Hawks, who were ecstatic to name him as their No. 1 draft choice in late 1989.

Mark Brayshaw (North Melbourne): Has taken time to settle in to a defensive role, but he will be a valuable player. He has an outside chance of

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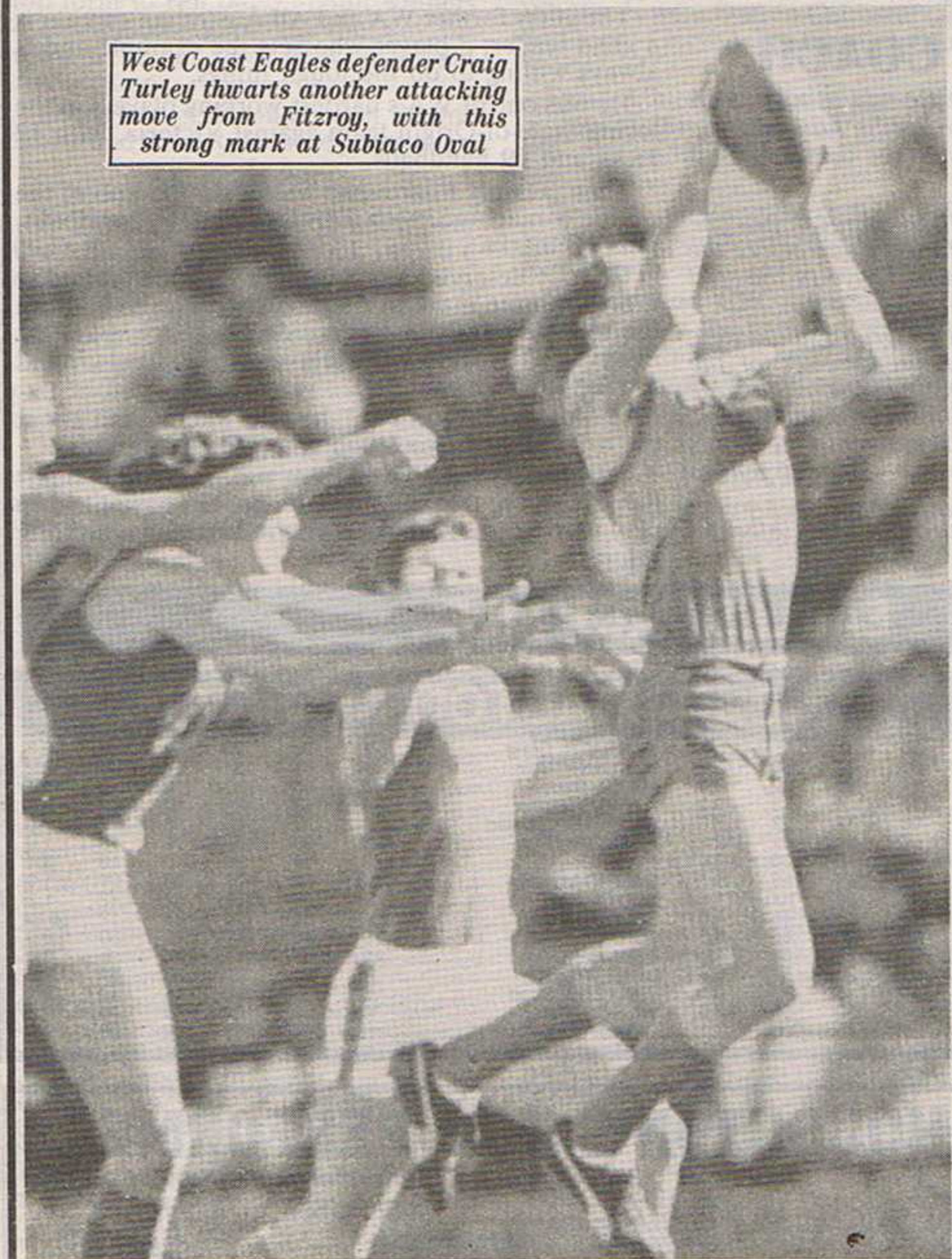

Eagles build impressive winning run

THE West Coast Eagles stretched their winning sequence in Perth to 12 victories with their 37-point triumph over Fitzroy on Sunday.

It was the Eagles eighth consecutive win at Subiaco Oval, among which have been four wins at the WACA Ground.

The last team to beat the Eagles in Perth was Collingwood — this week's Melbourne rivals — who won by 35 points at Subiaco Oval on June 11 last year.

The Eagles best run of home-town wins previously was six, at the end of the 1988 season.

The Eagles have now won 31 of the 42 games that they have played in Perth.

Speedy Sumich

THE six-goal performance by Eagles full-forward Peter Sumich last Sunday helped him become one of the fastest players to kick 100 goals in his career in recent times.

Playing in his 32nd game, Sumich took his tally to 101 goals, becoming the second player to kick over a century in the 80 games played by the Eagles.

Former captain Ross Glendinning reached 100 goals for the Eagles in 38 games, after spending much of his first year as an Eagle playing in defence.

Star forwards of the 1980s, Tony Lockett and Jason Dunstall, both reached 100 career goals in their 35th VFL matches. Gary Ablett kicked his 100th VFL goal in his 37th game.

Sumich's six goals against Fitzroy enabled him to become the first West Coast player to head the goalkicking ladder since the Eagles entered the VFL at the start of the 1987 season.

Glendinning had been second in the goalkicking, with 25 goals, after round 5 of 1988.

COLLINGWOOD'S 59-point win over Richmond was their sixth consecutive victory, giving the Magpies their longest winning streak in a season since 1981. In that year, they were undefeated after seven rounds.

THE Eagles have now been in the five for 10 rounds, their longest consecutive run in the top five. In 1988, the Eagles were in the five after each of the first eight rounds.

In total, the Eagles have been in the five after 29 of their 80 games since entering the VFL.

Big bucks to the winners

THE West Coast Eagles are playing for some big rewards as the AFL season heads for the business end...the finals.

The club's major sponsor, SGIO, has announced incentives totalling \$500,000 if the Eagles can win the premiership this year.

Along the way there are three other incentives — \$100,000 to finish in the top five; \$250,000 to make the top three and \$350,000 to reach the grand final.

The scheme, announced by SGIO chairman Frank Michell, does not accumulate, with the maximum pay-out being \$500,000.

Eagles coach Mick Malthouse believes the incentives will help the players stay on track for their premiership target.

"First and foremost they should all be playing for their pride," says Malthouse.

"But they certainly appreciate the support from football's major sponsors. They are well aware of how much the SGIO puts into football in WA.

"But their finals destiny is still in their own hands."

The SGIO support will flow on to football generally if the Eagles took out the AFL premiership as it would be a huge bonus to the coffers of the club, which, in turn, flows through to the WA Football Commission.

MACCA'S EASY CHOICE

AS long as high-flier Troy Ugle plays in the Eagles team, football sponsor Denis McNerney won't have much trouble deciding who should enjoy the dinner for two at his Macca's Seafood restaurant for the mark of the day.

Ugle stamped yet another claim on Channel 7's mark-of-the-year with a huge leap over a pack at Subiaco Oval on Sunday.

And just to confirm that he could tackle all opposition, the pack included big John Ironmonger, one of the giants of AFL ranks.

Other trophy winners at the Eagles after-match presentations saw Brett Heady win the cheer squad's best-player trophy; Michael Brennan and Peter Sumich won the two awards from coach Mick Malthouse and Bond Brewing representative (and Eagles chairman of selectors) Trevor Sprigg awarded the Emu Export man-of-the-match trophy to Chris Lewis.

EXCLUSIVE COACH

EAGLES coach Mick Malthouse could have been forgiven recently for thinking that he had become redundant.

The full-on coach found himself in charge of just one player at the training session on the Friday before the weekend that the Eagles had an AFL bye in the split round.

The Eagles players in the State-of-Origin squad were training with Ron Alexander in preparation for the Victorian match; Eagles players going back to the State League for that weekend were training with their clubs; the injured players were getting treatment in the rooms and only one player was left over — the suspended Craig McGrath.

The two had kick-to-kick in one of the most informal training sessions ever.

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Adrian Barich...elusive Eagle

MYSTERY PLAYER

TALKING about training sessions, the name Adrian Barich crops up in conversations occasionally...but few people ever see him!

While Barich is working hard to recover from his knee reconstruction, he doesn't see much of his team-mates at training.

He goes for special physiotherapy treatment after work, arrives at the Subiaco Oval clubrooms after most players are on the track and leaves for further treatment before they finish their session.

Coach Mick Malthouse sent out an appeal recently to find out if Barich was still with the club!

SKIPPER'S EXAMPLE

YOU can never under-estimate the work-load capacity of Eagles skipper Steve Malaxos.

The gutsy former WA and All-Australian captain is a great leader; a player who sets the example and is always willing to do the tough things.

He was one of WA's hardest-working players in the losing State-of-Origin team against Victoria, with 12 kicks and 19 handballs.

Then, against Fitzroy, he was again the hub of the midfield machine, with 14 kicks and 18 handballs, plus 10 marks.

He fully deserved a rest when he left the ground at the 15-minute mark of the final term, as he had ran himself to a standstill. But it didn't last long as a slight injury to Troy Ugle saw Malaxos back on the ground for the final 10 minutes.

"I didn't feel too tired," he said when asked about the difficulty of two tough games in five games.

"I pulled up pretty well from the State game, but it helps if you're free of injury. I wouldn't have liked to play two games like that if you're carrying a niggling injury."

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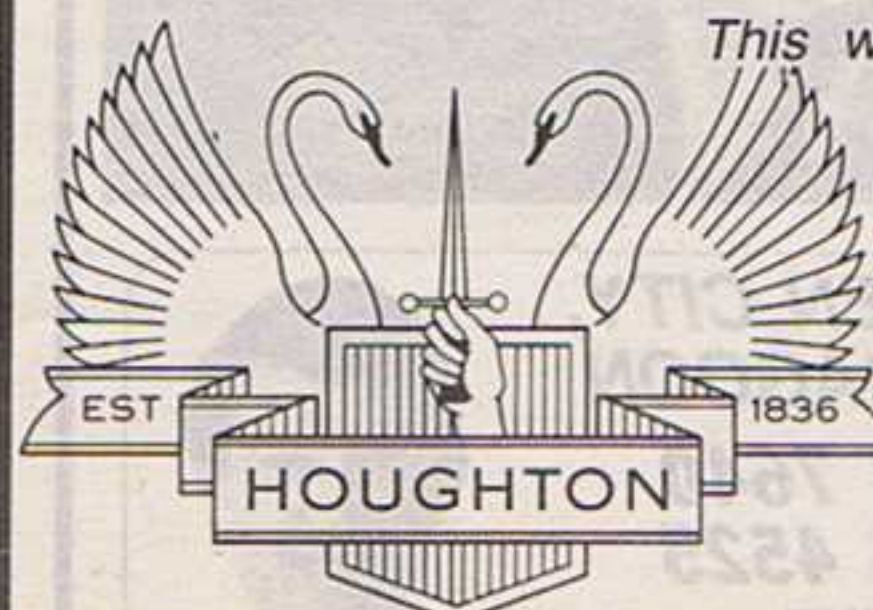

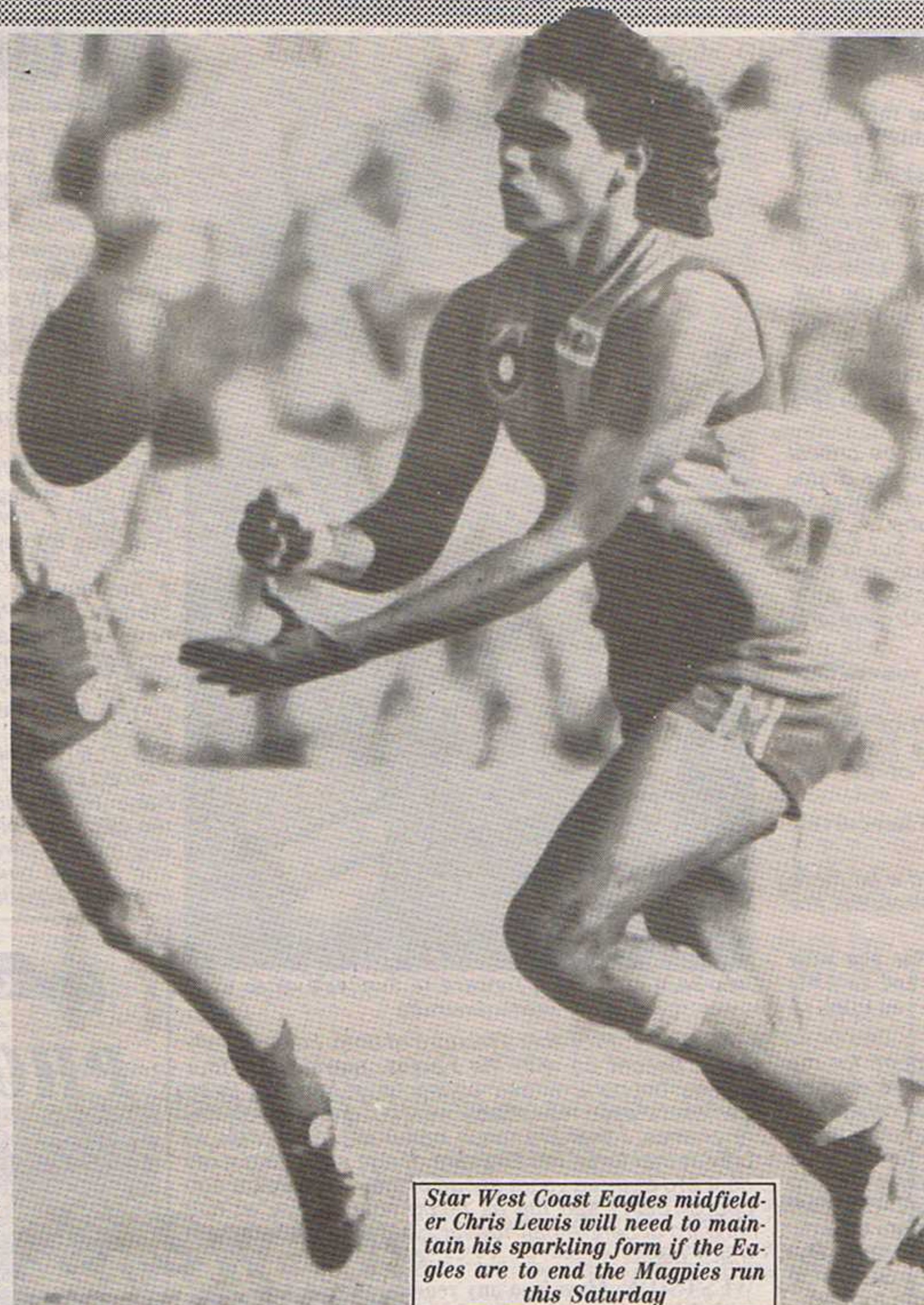
It is time that the Eagles produced an upset win on Melbourne soil and proved that they are not just in the AFL to make up numbers in the top five, but are serious finals contenders.

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TARGET MAN

BIG-hearted East Perth captain Glen Bartlett has emerged as a leading WA forward since being dropped from the West Coast Eagles squad two years ago. Bartlett is enjoying one of his best seasons, being recognised by the State selectors for this Sunday's clash with South Australia and by the Brisbane Bears, who drafted him last month and hope to entice him to the Gold Coast next year. Bartlett took a break from his demanding law studies for this interview with Westside Football's GEORGE TEMPLE.

WESTSIDE FOOTBALL: Where do you think WA can hold the edge over South Australia this Sunday?

BARTLETT: WA has a good band of skilled, fast-running players like Tony Evans, Joe Cormack, Mark Hann and Gary Smallridge, who can give us the edge. There's good strength up and down the middle in players like Glen Jakovich and Peter Melesso, with Craig Edwards and Shane Stempel on the ball. They're all strong players and certainly good enough to win this State game.

WESTSIDE: WA have had a bad run in State matches in recent years, how important is it for us to win this one?

BARTLETT: Very important. It's easy to be critical watching from the sidelines, but in last week's State-of-Origin game there seemed to be a couple of guys more interested in playing for their clubs. A State game isn't a big deal for some of them, but for the State League guys it's a step up in grade and they want to perform. The selectors have picked a good squad, maybe not a lot of fancy players, but guys who will do the job.

WESTSIDE: In what position do you feel you can best serve WA?

BARTLETT: At the moment full-forward or centre-half-forward, because that's where I've played all year. But I'm happy playing in either of the key defensive positions or even on the ball.

WESTSIDE: What do you owe your good form to this season?

BARTLETT: Persistence, confidence and a bit more experience. I've worked out where my strengths are furthest thing from my mind.

WESTSIDE: It's been an eventful year for you with East Perth's erratic form, State selection and an AFL call-up from the Brisbane Bears. What do you think of it all?

BARTLETT: I didn't expect much to happen for me personally this year. In previous years, I've worked hard to either play State football or get another AFL call-up. This year there's been a major change in my life off the field, in that I've given up my full-time job and gone back to studying law. After going back to University, I resolved to finish my football with East Perth and really concentrate on helping them do well. I even thought about retiring at a young age. But getting drafted and earning selection in the State side has rekindled my enthusiasm to play at the top level.

WESTSIDE: It was obviously disappointing to be dropped off the Eagles list, so there must be some satisfaction now that another club has shown interest in you?

BARTLETT: Regardless of whether I go to Brisbane or not, I'm happy to get the recognition. The Bears feel I can help them and be part of their future plans, so it's good to know another club is interested. But there's no feeling of having shown the Eagles up. When I got dropped I was determined to prove them wrong, but in the last 18 months, that has been the furthest thing from my mind.

WESTSIDE: Is your improvement a question of a big man taking time to develop or weren't you given enough opportunities in the Eagles?

BARTLETT: Probably a mixture of both. I didn't really get a decent go with the Eagles, playing just four games, but none of them consecutive. In two or three games, I played reasonably well, but didn't get another chance. I feel I'm much better equipped now to play at that level. I'm 25 years of age and I've got my best two or three years ahead of me. Three years ago people didn't see me as being able to play at full-forward or centre-half-forward, but I think I've proven that I can.

WESTSIDE: Have you any regrets about taking legal action against the Eagles over your contract termination?

BARTLETT: None whatsoever. I'd do it again if I had to, because I was given no other choice. People get it mixed up. The action wasn't over getting dropped off the list and that I had sour grapes. I had a three-year contract with the club and wanted to be paid out. They had stopped my monthly payments and when I took action, they recommenced those. But they wouldn't pay the contract out. That's what it was over and in the end, the court ordered them to do so. In hindsight, I'm happy the way things worked out — I wasn't after reinstatement because that wouldn't have worked. All I wanted was my payments.

WESTSIDE: Were you surprised when the Bears drafted you and will you join them next season?

BARTLETT: I was a bit surprised, but I knew they had watched a game where I played well. In turn, I watched their game against the Eagles and saw that they needed a bit of strength down the middle of the ground. They told me that they would take a gamble on me, knowing that I might not go up there. To get there, I'd have to transfer my studies and they'll have to sort out my contract with East Perth, which doesn't expire till the end of next season. My wife's employment must be guaranteed also. But, above all that, we've just bought a place in Perth and we're a little reluctant to move. The Bears are keen to get me up there, but I've made it clear that it will take a lot to get me to move.

WESTSIDE: Will it be tough to leave East Perth with them still struggling in the SFL?

BARTLETT: It will be hard, because my main goal this year was to play in a successful side at East Perth. I had thought about retiring if we had been able to win a premiership next year, for example. But even though East Perth are on the way back, things haven't swung around yet. I'd be worried about missing out on their success if I left.

WESTSIDE: East Perth are short on experienced players, but is there light at the end of the tunnel for the Royals?

BARTLETT: I think so. They've picked up some experienced players in Peter Melesso, Craig McGrath and Steve Richardson. But it really depends on whether the club can hold those players and maybe pick up a few more. There's such a fine line between the top and bottom clubs that East Perth will recover and improve regardless of whether I'm there or not.

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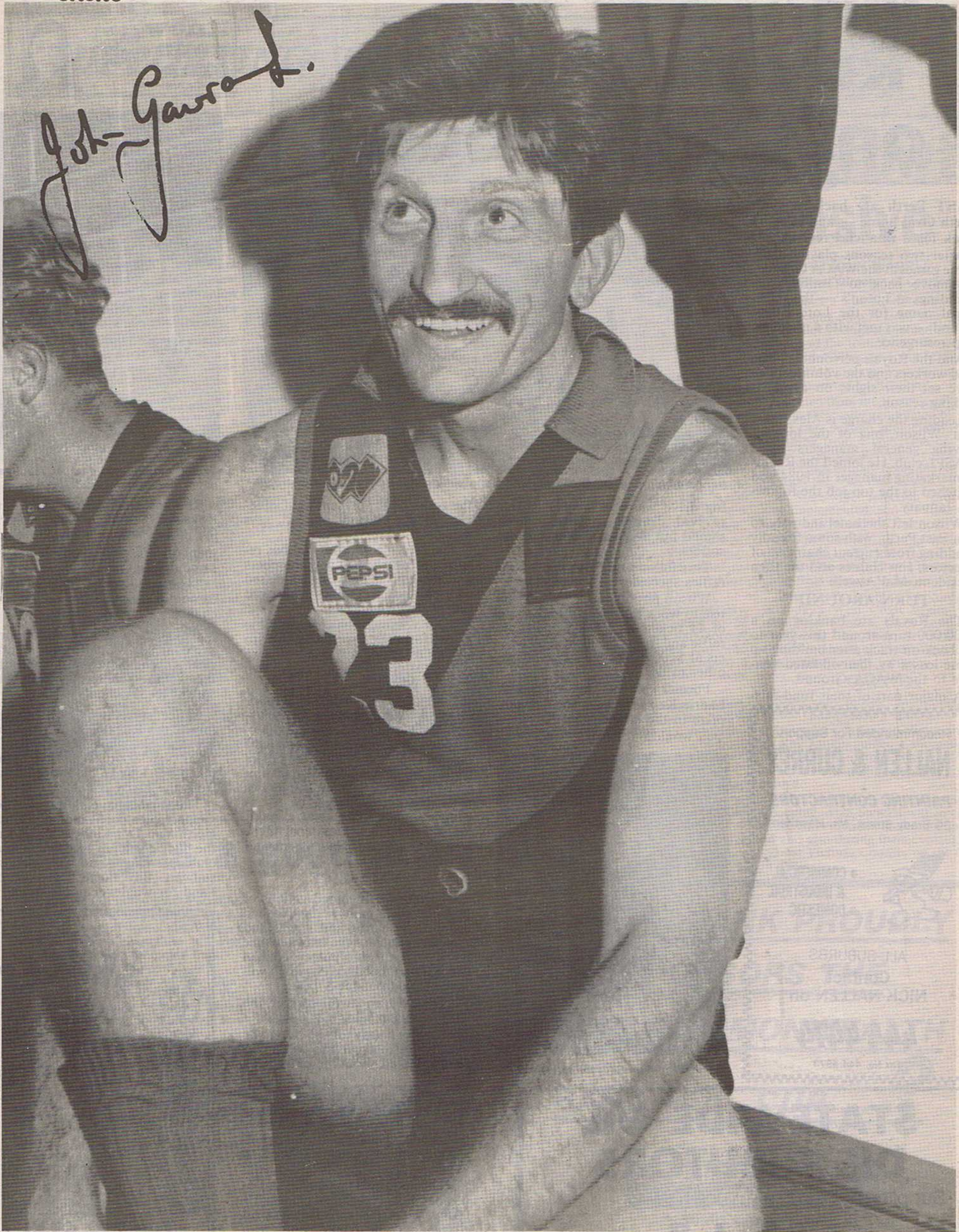
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Royals thriving on home ground

EAST Perth are back at their Perth Oval home — and back on track for a financial revival.

After two seasons playing their home games at the WACA Ground, the move back to familiar surroundings at Loton's — the traditional name for the Lord Street ground — was met with a membership resurgence.

And the Royals personnel — the paid workers and the volunteers — have set their sights on a profit-making season.

Leading the charge is Alex 'Marbles' Wilson, one of the longest-serving general managers of a WASFL club. He joined the Royals as marketing manager in 1984 and switched to the top job the following January.

Wilson left the hotel industry to join East Perth, with some friendly prodding from current chairman of selectors, Jim Haines and the then president, Mal Atwell.

TURN-AROUND

The Royals are banking on a \$100,000 turn-around this year to get back on track after building up some losses by their ill-fated venture to the WACA Ground.

A major part of their fund-raising

drive was this week's Royals revival dinner auction, which should put about \$70,000 into the coffers.

This follows on from two major raffles successes.

Wilson put his marketing expertise to work to orchestrate the sale of 44 tickets at \$100 each in one raffle and followed up with 60 tickets at \$1000 in just 20 days in another raffle.

Former player and president Laurie Kennedy took the \$10,000 prize in the latter.

"I wouldn't like to try those raf-

fles again in our present tight situation in the corporate area," says Wilson.

The return to Perth Oval has resulted in nearly 500 new members and the club is enjoying increased off-field support and improved player performances.

"Our volunteer base really came to the fore when we came back to Perth Oval and had to get it up to scratch after not being used for two years," Wilson said.

The volunteers are led by Trevor Gibson, president of the Past Players' Association and football director and ground controller Geoff Smith. They were two vocal critics of the WACA Ground situation and have since put their energies where there criticism was by organising repairs to Perth Oval; a major face-lift in the facilities department and the introduction of ground control workers.

FACE-LIFT

The face-lift included gallons of blue and black paint being splashed around on seating and fences and now that much of the maintenance work is over, the volunteers control the gates on match days, which will save the club about \$7000.

"They do an awful lot for the club," Wilson said.

"They're happy for the club to be back at Perth Oval and we're certainly pleased about the move back home."

Football and development manager Cam Robbins, like all modern-day football personnel, has a busy schedule and he often finds himself working more than 70 hours a week.

Robbins joined the Royals in December last year after graduating from a sports administration course and he found himself a stranger in the East Perth camp, having played under-19s and reserves football with Subiaco.

Robbins first heard about the Royals job through Gary Rogers, the Perth Football Club's development officer, who is completing the same degree.

"The opportunity at East Perth came up and I jumped at the chance," Robbins said.

He spends a lot of time conducting clinics in East Perth's country zone in the South-West and the football message has recently been spread to 31 schools.

Office secretary Cheryl Sachse joined the Royals camp in February and though she is originally from New South Wales, it hasn't taken her long to be enticed away from the rugby codes.

The Royals have plenty of office support with part-time accountant Keith Van Der Linden controlling the books; veteran Eric Smith as club secretary and long-serving stalwart Bill Forrest always on hand for whatever needs doing.

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'Worth coming back to'

'Worth coming back to'

THE struggling Perth Football Club are determined to win their battle against insolvency.

The Demons recently revealed their dire financial problems and their need for a huge cash injection to remain afloat.

But rather than forecast the end of the club, the crisis could be the start of a new era, says general manager Steve Woodhouse.

"This is bringing a lot of people out of the woodwork," said Woodhouse.

INVOLVED

"A lot of our former members are again getting involved with us and are taking up positions in a new fundraising group called the Demons Plight committee that we've got organised.

"I'm talking about the likes of Greg Brehaut, Bernie Hughes, Mike McPhee, Noel Wilson and Ted O'Connor and, not surprisingly, Jack O'Dea is also involved again."

In doing this, Perth have followed the lead of South Fremantle and Swan Districts by introducing a 52-week-long raffle, with weekly prizes of \$500, \$250 and \$100. All the tickets are to be pre-sold to as many as 3000 people.

"If it works out well, we should be able to raise enough cash to erase our debts," Woodhouse said.

"There have been a lot of other ideas put forward and we'll get to those in time."

PROJECTS

Perth have several other fund-raising projects already under way.

Their 'buy-a-brick' campaign has yielded \$1100 and on Monday, July 16 the PFC's Businessmen's Association has a special golf day at Gosnells Golf Course.

Woodhouse, whose general managerial duties are a seven-day-a-week occupation, might be one of football's nomads, but his commitment to Perth's revival is full-on.

Between 1975 and 1977 he played as a ruck-rover or half-forward with Subiaco and a decade later he was Perth's football manager.

Woodhouse moved to West Perth in 1989 to fill the same role for the Falcons and in April this year he returned

to the Demons as general manager when the position became vacant.

NEW SECRETARY

Woodhouse's secretary/receptionist, Nikki Shepherd, is also a new face on the block.

Miss Shepherd started work just seven weeks ago and she says she's never experienced a job like it.

"It's been a big learning experience," Miss Shepherd said.

"I've never done anything as hectic as this before — there's just so much happening at the moment."

The former tax agent's assistant has been liaising with sponsors, directors, club members and the media.

"It was a new experience dealing with the media," Miss Shepherd said. "I even got on the television news, which was something different."

Football manager Gary Rogers is a product of the Football Development Trust's administrative training scheme.

EXPERIENCE

He gained experience in junior development through the scheme with East Fremantle before accepting a developmental role with Perth in 1988.

Rogers' role now encompasses football affairs such as recruiting, player contracts, clearances and junior development.

A former A-grade player with amateur clubs Innaloo and Scarborough, he is nearly finished a degree in recreation at the Nedlands College of Advanced Education.

Bar manager Mike Ashfold has been a one-eyed Demons supporter since he was born in the district 35 years ago.

He's always quick to share a joke with the members and believes the club is on the way back as a football force.

Sumich faces another test

In Sumich's case, that means another bag of goals against Collingwood.

Fees would be a huge boost for our game

A RECENT two-day seminar staged by the newly-constituted National Planning Committee has laid down some impressive thoughts for the future of Australian football.

The intensive deliberations produced a series of recommendations for the promotion and development of football into the 20th century.

Obviously, more finance will be required if the structure is to be achieved and this will need to come from increased revenue generated from television rights and corporate sponsorships allied to growing attendances.

However, bearing in mind the magnitude of the task confronting the national code, there will never be enough finance generated from traditional sources.

FUNDING IDEA

This where one of my particularly-favourite funding theories comes into the act.

For many years our game has ignored an enormous source of potential income which should be available for developmental initiatives — player registration fees.

When you examine the structures and participation of other sports, it's obvious that many cost a lot more to play than Australian football.

SUPERSTARS

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At any national forums or NAFC meetings when I have promoted the concept of a registration fee for developmental funds, the reaction of administrators has been conservative; if not negative.

If such a scheme was properly structured and promoted, I'm convinced footballers at all levels would be happy to contribute to a registration-fee fund ranging from, say 50c to \$10 according to age, playing status and earning capacity.

We are ignoring a potential source of annual funding of up to \$800,000. Just imagine what Australian Football authorities could do with finance like that available on an annual basis.

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Strempel is ready-made for WA side

BIG Swan Districts utility player Shane Strempel is ready to make his WA debut.

The versatile Strempel, 21, is ideally suited as a back-up ruckman to 1989 Sandover Medallist Craig Edwards and should be included in Sunday's 22-man team to play South Australia at Football Park in Adelaide.

The rookie from South Bunbury, who has kicked 35 goals this season, performed exceptionally well in defence against reigning premiers Claremont last Saturday and was instrumental in lifting Swans to a three-point win.

After the win, Strempel said he preferred a role in defence rather than in attack, even though he has played in the forward line for most of the season and headed the WASFL goal-kicking ladder at one stage.

"I like the ball coming straight at me and it doesn't matter if you don't get a

The athletically built Swan is very mobile for his 197cm, making him ideal for a back-pocket/ruck role at State level. Coupled with his proven goal-kicking ability, State coach Ron Alexander has a player with several options.

However, the idea of playing State football is not new to Strempel — it was put there by coach John Todd before the season even started, when Strempel was still a country 'rookie.'

"Toddy told me there were two State games this season and that I had the ability to get into the side for at least one of them," Strempel said.

Todd admitted the blond-haired utility was better suited to the backline following his top game against the Tigers.

"He has good skills on either side of his body and is better with the ball coming downfield," Todd said.

SUPPORTING WA'S TEAL CUP TEAM

Fund-raising idea was a Cup winner

WESTERN Australia's challenge in this year's prestigious Commonwealth Bank Teal Cup campaign was made possible after a chance conversation between two friends.

The tight football financial situation had put the team's trip to Brisbane in jeopardy — and it was a media campaign that solved the problem.

It was at a barbeque last January Teal Cup team manager Ken Godwin mentioned to friend David Ahern, a keen football supporter and a director of Allpest WA, that a lack of funds would probably prevent the Teal Cup side taking part in the national under-17 championships.

Ahern suggested that the Football Development Trust should seek corporate sponsorship to fund the trip and he would be happy to kick off a fund-raising drive with a \$500 donation.

Weeks later Ahern raised the idea with Radio 6NR commentator Colin Minson, who launched Allpest's Teal

Cup fund appeal on air the following day in an interview with the FDT's general manager at the time, Grant Dorrington.

This was the catalyst behind a subsequent appeal being launched by Radio 6PM's John Burgess and the support from the public and the corporate sector influenced the WA Football Commission to approve the trip.

"It was great that so many businesses got behind the idea," Ahern said.

"Junior football, particularly the Teal Cup, is very important and it would have been criminal had WA not sent a side to compete.

"It is at the Teal Cup that many players gain valuable experience for their future careers.

"I would particularly like to thank Colin Minson and John Burgess for taking the appeal on and encouraging businesses to get involved."

Teal Cup's growth is impressive

THE Teal Cup story is a spectacular chapter in Australia's football development.

From an obscure two-State competition played before a few dedicated parents and voluntary officials, to a nine-team showpiece culminating in a final with 92,000 spectators.

That is where the Commonwealth Bank Teal Cup competition for the nation's best 17-year-old footballers is now at.

It was back in 1951 that Queensland Roy Phythian dreamt of increasing the almost non-existent interest in Australian Football in the Sunshine State by organising an under-17 fixture against nearest rivals, New South Wales.

The problem was, there was no money and little interest in the "southern game" in Sydney — and not enough finance to tap into the rich talent resources available between the Murrumbidgee and Murray Rivers.

Sydney sent a team and, predictably, were thrashed and continued to be beaten even after a stalwart former Victorian supporter named Teal, who was domiciled in Sydney, donated a cup for the annual competition between the game's "Cinderella States".

Despite slightly increasing interest, the Sydney connection of the "NSW team" were beaten on 12 successive occasions.

DEDICATED

Enter Arthur Bridgewater — a dedicated official who worked for starvation wages for the NSW Football League as a development officer.

He became restive at the inability of NSW to realistically contest the series, so he convinced Riverina officials to

help select a true NSW team.

So, young players from that Australian Rules stronghold joined the campaign and the team broke the drought to record NSW's first win in 1974.

In 1975, a team representing Victoria competed in Brisbane.

Selected from the Victorian Football Union, they were annihilated by NSW — 33.19 to 9.9 and, predictably, such a thrashing from a collection of "farm boys" from the Riverina, supplement five former Sydney rugby players, galvanised the Vics into action.

A State-wide selection procedure was implemented and Victorian victories in 1976 and 1977 were the result.

In 1985, an outstanding West Australian side under the astute coaching of Grant Dorrington won the Cup in a great final against Victoria.

That team's potential was confirmed in today's West Coast Eagles squad with Peter Sumich, Chris Lewis, Guy McKenna, Paul Peos, Scott Watters, Chris Waterman and John Worsfold all graduating to AFL ranks.

COACHES

Some outstanding coaches operated in the championship sphere.

Legendary under-age Victorian coach Ray Jordan guided a succession of VFL teams to victory, with only WA's 1985 effort spoiling a 100 percent record.

South Australian State Director of Coaching, Alan Stewart was in charge of the Croweaters in their halcyon period and also during their exciting final against Victoria Country on the MCG in 1989.

Manning believes that the programme has helped improve junior football in South Perth as children have adapted to modified rules, which allows them to develop their skills at their own pace.

Teams rotate in opposite directions so children play against three different sets of opponents.

Freeball rules apply with players being required to kick the ball to opposite zones; they must always kick to the forwards, who attempt to score (centres cannot score).

A gentle tackle is permitted, but a rough tackle will result in a free kick.

The battle for championship honours this year was won by the Tasmanian side, from Queensland, South Australia, WA, NSW and Victoria.

Mighty Milo says...



RECOVERY

THERE is a lot more to football than marking, kicking and handball...and recovery is an important part of the game.

When a player is knocked off balance or loses possession of the ball, it is vitally important that he recovers immediately.

Don't let your opponent get off easily after he has bumped you out of position or taken the ball off you.

It's then that you really lift your game and chase him hard; follow him till he gets rid of the ball. You will be suprised at how many players will stumble, fumble or dispose badly when they are being chased hard.

It's important that you pick up an opponent who might be creating a loose man while one of your own teammates chases the player who has taken the ball off you.

And you should run hard to assist your team-mate who has come in to help you.

So, even though you may have lost possession of the ball, you can still play an important role by assisting your team-mates.

And here's this week's brain-teaser on the rules of football:

When is time-on called by the umpire?

The time between when a goal umpire starts waving the flags and when the full-back kicks off (after a point) or the ball is bounced in the centre (after a goal). At any other time when play is halted and the umpires need to officiate on matters other than free kicks; such as an injured player being treated.

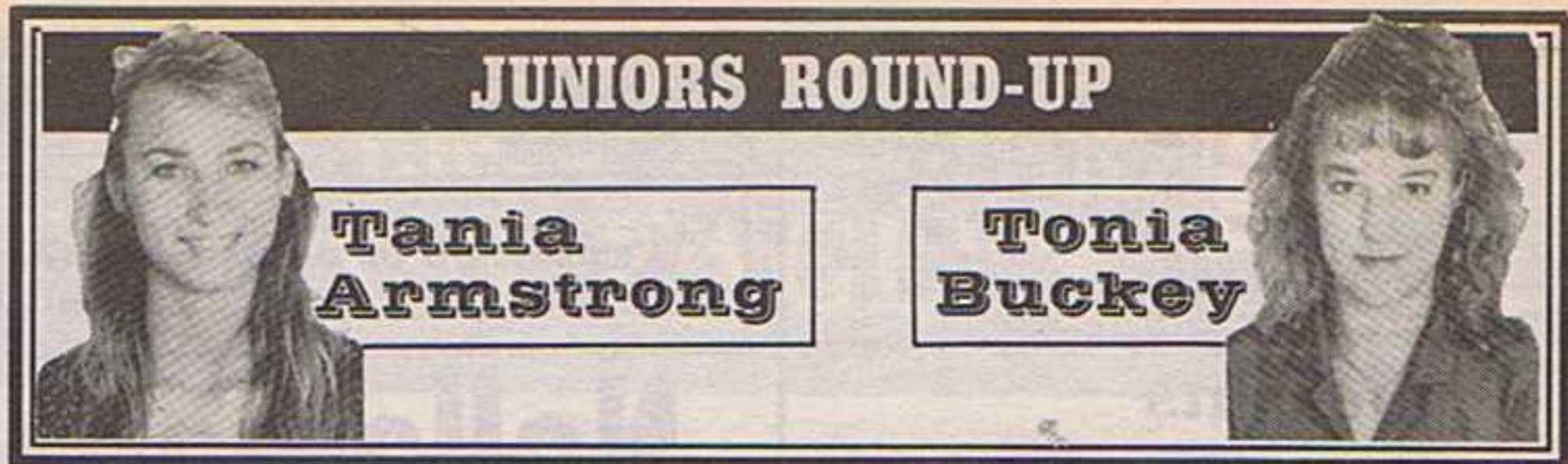

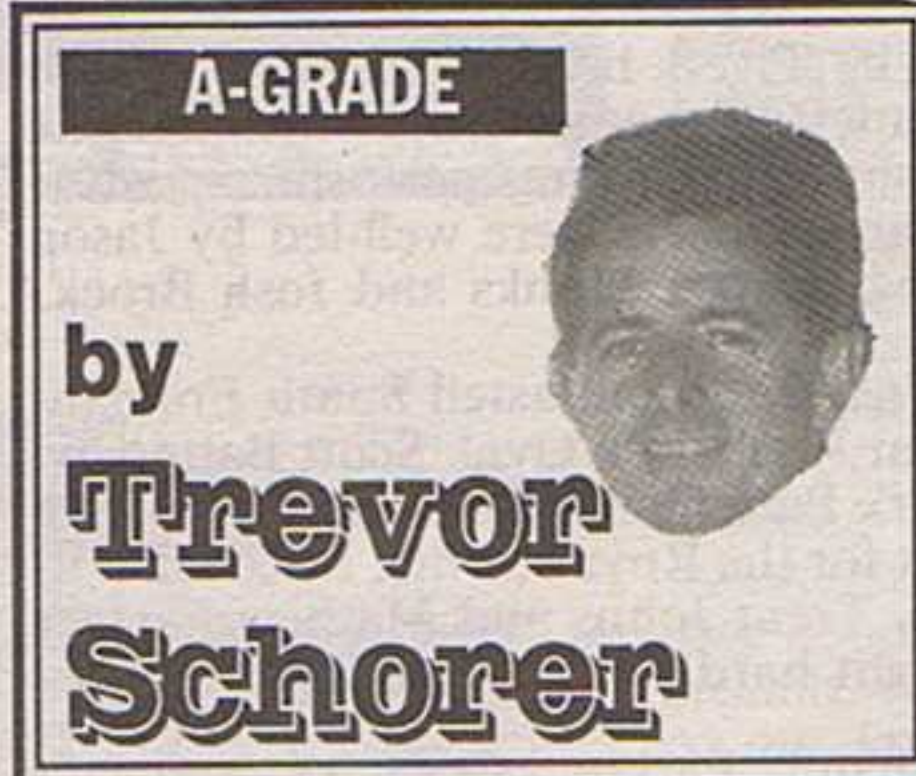

Trainers in profile

TRAINERS are the unsung heroes in football. Without them, teams would never take the field, but they receive little recognition for their efforts. In this series, Westside Football writers talk to the head trainers at the State League clubs.

Falcon has a long record

WEST Perth head trainer, John Magor, who is junior vice-president of the Football Trainers' Association in WA, describes his role as a full-time commitment.

"There is a lot of hard work involved in being a trainer," he says. "But that is far outweighed by the enjoyment we get from it."

"We are as much a part of the team as the players. We have an important role to play and if we do it well, we can help influence the outcome of a game."

"If we can get an injured player, who maybe was playing extremely well, back into action, it can make the difference between winning or losing."

"At the same time, an accurate, quick diagnosis of an injury can ensure that a player misses a minimal number of matches."

HEARTACHE

"Remember, we're only first-aid guys, but we're still 99 per cent right with our diagnoses. When we're wrong though and the same goes for doctors, it's a heartache."

"We rely heavily on the professional support staff like doctors."

Magor can be found at Leederville Oval most nights of the week, Sunday mornings and with the team on match days.

A West Perth player from 1956-58, he joined the club's Past Players Association in 1968 and was made a life member of that association in 1975. Three years later he became vice-president and in 1981, he took over as president and has held that role ever since.

ASSISTANT

In 1979, Magor became a trainer, assisting Roy Ennis and last year took over the top job when Ennis retired.

"Roy taught me a lot and he still comes down to help out," Magor said.

Trainers, who are only paid a small honorarium for the hours of work, must first have first passed the practical and theory sections of the basic St John's Ambulance course before being taken on by a club.

This course must be repeated every three years and there are also Level One and Level Two trainers courses run by the Australian Sports Medicine Federation.

Magor was head trainer for Ron Alexander's State-of-Origin team last year.

But some fond memories were revived with the focus on interstate football as WA prepared for battles with Victoria and South Australia.

Chairman of selectors Mal Brown is never short of a quick jibe; former State captain Noel Carter is a voluble footy personality and one-time Swan

Districts pair Simon Beasley and Jon Fogarty are two colourful characters who liven up any atmosphere.

There always needs to be someone like Brown, one of the sport's legends, around a successful team.

Brown is a man who is serious when he needs to be, but can also break the tension with a well-timed one-liner.

ASSOCIATION

His association with State coach Ron Alexander goes back to the days when Brown was Alexander's coach at East Perth 20 years ago.

That relationship is an integral part of the WA team and they will work together to settle the nerves of the young players in the squad.

Alexander will return to the scene of one of his great coaching triumphs.

It was in 1986 that a WA team — short on experience under SA conditions, particularly under lights — travelled to Adelaide to restore WA's football pride.

The WA team was not expected to perform particularly well. But Alexander, in a performance which probably went a long way towards securing him as coach of the West Coast Eagles, came home with victory.

A Subiaco Oval victory over Victoria a few weeks later gave WA the Australian championship and obvious-

ly Alexander will be looking forward to his return to Adelaide's Football Park.

Brown's most recent memory of interstate battles in Adelaide is not as cherished.

He was chairman of selectors when the WA team travelled to Adelaide for the Bicentennial carnival in 1988 and the squad returned to Perth in disgrace after losing games to Victoria and NSW to finish at the bottom of A-division.

AMBITION

Brown has made a habit of turning around poor results and that will again be his ambition in Adelaide.
