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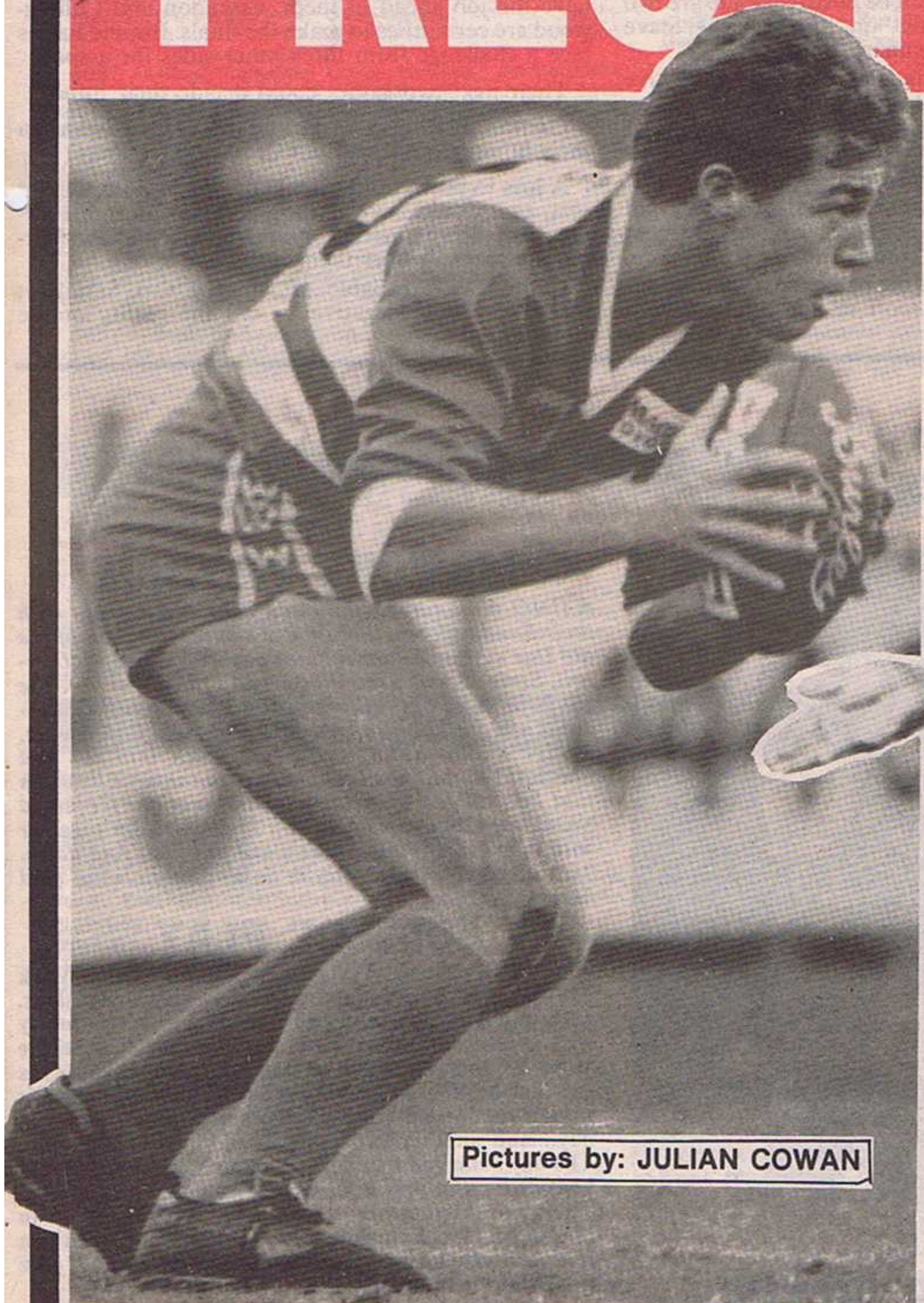
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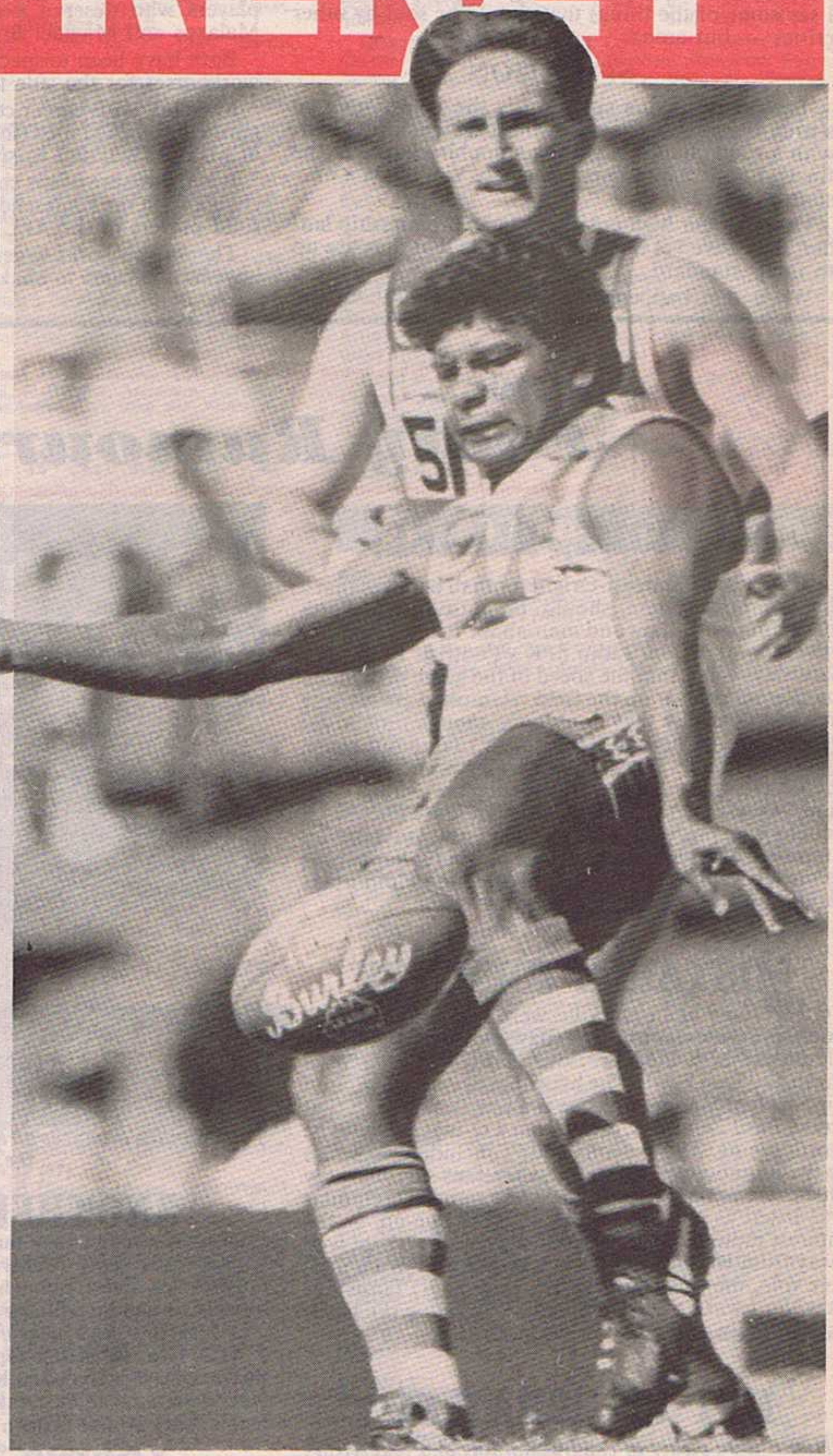

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POSITIVE POINTS

EAGLES coach and former Victorian Mick Malthouse doesn't like this column.

In fact, I'm told he wanted Westside Football banned from the Eagles dressing rooms because of one article I wrote.

Mick reckons I'm too negative.

Seems as though he feels that the media should get right behind the Eagles as they are the only team in town.

I can only presume from those comments that he would like only nice things written about his charges.

What a change from last year when Mick's predecessor, John Todd, grizzled about the media pumping up Eagles players too much and boosting the ego of some players.

I'm sorry if Mick feels I'm negative. I'd like to think I say some of the things that should be said by other critics — but aren't.

SITUATION

The reality of the situation is the Eagles may be sitting in third position on the premiership ladder, with a good chance of getting a double chance in the finals. But at the moment, they are viewed as a one-state wonder.

Despite their high position on the premiership ladder, they have yet to prove interstate that they are up to finals standard.

When that happens then we can crow about the

Eagles. But till then, there's no point patting the players on the back and letting them believe they are as good as the position they occupy on the premiership ladder.

Just as Malthouse analyses each performance to alleviate weaknesses, I will continue to put in my two bob's worth as to some of the deficiencies I see in the team.

POSITIVE

But just to show that I can be positive, there are two players who deserve a pat on the back — Steve Malaxos and Michael Brennan.

Both have been unspectacular, but highly-effective workhorses for the side this season.

Malaxos' AFL career could easily have been extinguished when he failed (for a variety of reasons, not all of his own making) to succeed at Hawthorn.

It is a measure of his character that, given a second chance with the Eagles, he has become one of the most solid players in the AFL competition.

The way he works to get the ball makes you wonder how he manages to shake off all the soreness each week.

The feature of his game I like is his kamikaze approach to the ball. He is prepared to throw himself on top of the ball, rather than let it spill free. Even though it exposes him to a lot of punishment, he can be relied on each week to give 120 per cent for his team.

Brennan is probably the unsung hero of the side.

He tends to be unobtrusive, but he does a top job of blocking his opponent out of the game each week.

The percentage performances these two players put in each game provides the example the Eagles need to succeed in the finals, should they make it.

CERTAINTIES

And there's no guarantee that they will. They still have the job ahead of them. Essendon and Collingwood are certainties to make the finals. But the Eagles face a challenge from three other sides for a spot.

Their next two games could decide their future.

Carlton, at Princes Park and the Sydney Swans on their home ground will not be easy opponents.

A loss to both could tumble the Eagles into the hot seat, as it would have Carlton and Hawthorn breathing right down their neck and possibly allow Melbourne to vault over them into third spot.

Carlton look capable of winning this Saturday; that's not being negative — it's the reality of the situation.

GOSSIP FROM AROUND THE CLUBS

NO MORE, PLEASE!

THE creator of State-of-Origin football believes that a three-umpire system should be introduced. Perth marketing consultant and man-about-town, Leon Larkin — speaking on Radio 6PR's Football World last Saturday — felt that the speed of the game demanded another adjudicator on the field. "Umpires are missing free kicks because they don't have enough time to get into position," he said. Outspoken Claremont coach Gerard Neesham put a different viewpoint. "We will then have three people all making the wrong decision," Neesham said. "The problem is we encourage people who have not played the game to take up umpiring. They have no real idea of what is happening in the lead-up to a free-kick and often miss important things and the free goes the wrong way."

MISTAKEN IDENTITY

FOOTY fans at Leederville were watching the ruck duels with interest last Saturday, particularly in view of the rather heated previous clash involving West Perth and East Perth. The hype that developed around big Stephen Hooper and the man he flattened in that game, Basil Zempilas, meant that a re-match would be worth seeing. Probably the only person not happy about the event was the football writer at The West Australian who got "conned" by the West Coast-ers. Someone at the club — no-one's too sure exactly who — told The West that Lamb was wasn't at training because he was under a cloud with a groin injury and had gone swimming instead. Readers of the paper were told on Thursday morning that Lamb was in doubt for Friday's match — and that was attributed to the coach. The only swimming Lamb did on Wednesday was in champagne after spending the evening at his wife's bedside.

Other top-line goalkickers sidelined this year have included St Kilda's Tony Lockett (knee), Hawthorn's Jason Dunstall (fractured skull) and Geelong's Gary Ablett (knee).

LOSING WINNER

FOOTSCRAY coach Terry Wheeler is a happy-go-lucky chap who seems to have coped pretty well with the traumatic role handballed to him over summer when Mick Malthouse severed ties with the club. At one stage Wheeler didn't even have a club to coach, but he survived and before last Friday's game, the battling Bulldogs were in the top five — and way well return. Speaking to the media after the loss to the Eagles, Wheeler wasn't too unhappy and felt that the players had worked hard. He handled the post-match questions with a great deal of humour and pleasantness and even reversed the role on the interviewers a couple of times. A pleasure to deal with.

MEMORY MAYHEM

RADIO 6NR turned the clock back a few years with their Sunday football show and the resurrection of the old Dad's Army Channel Seven panel of Marty McDonnell, Steve Marsh, Fred Woods and Frank Sparrow. The two hour show was full of fascinating revelations, interviews and flashbacks...and some old-style fire! Marsh, always a hard-hitting critic, got stuck into the WA Football Commission enough times to convince listeners that he's no fan of today's administration. He urged South Fremantle president Bill Hughes to get together with a few other club officials and put their foot down. "It's disgraceful what they're doing to the clubs," said Marsh.

TALKING about West Coast Eagles coach Mick Malthouse...he was far from happy on Friday night, even though the team had beaten Footscray pretty well. STAR STATUS



FOOTBALL stardom and rookie status don't often go together, but the case of Gary Smallridge is looming as an exception.

But despite the highlights that have accompanied the tough first-year player's entry into the State League, he's also learning how to cope with some of the lows in football.

At the half-way mark of the season, the happy-go-lucky footballer was leading several media awards, was odds-on to be named rookie-of-the-year, was being touted as a good Sandover Medal chance and was in the State team winging its way to Adelaide, where the inevitable AFL talent scouts would be waiting.

But how things change! His performance in the interstate arena was a day he wants to forget; his Sandover Medal aspirations went out the window two days later when he was found guilty of an offence at the tribunal and then his club form slipped to where he was watching a game from the interchange bench.

But there's no shaking this ever-smiling, mop-haired character from down Rockingham way.

He'll bounce back and there's no doubt that the resilience Smallridge has displayed in his debut season will be repeated.

Smallridge enjoys his rookie season

Football has always been something of a hobby to indulge in when nothing else was happening in the Smallridge life. But now, at the age of 25, Smallridge realises that football offers him some new challenges.

His sporting loves have traversed a rival code (rugby union), motocross, running, swimming, cycling and gymnasium work. And he's been no mean performer in all arenas.

"It wasn't too hard to give motocross up," jokes Smallridge. "I kept crashing and had two shoulder operations, five broken bones and more than 50 stitches."

Smallridge was flirting with danger when he tackled rugby union — at the same time as he was playing football with Gosnells; rugby on Saturday and football on Sunday.

FLIRTING WITH DANGER

"I knew all the blokes down at Rockingham and enjoyed rugby," says Smallridge. "I didn't regard it as being dangerous, but I guess my footy coach might have had a different point of view."

Smallridge is quickly learning the ways of a top State League player and while he was disappointed with his game against South Australia, he concedes that it was a good learning experience. Likewise, his flirtation with the tribunal, getting off with a reprimand, but losing his chance of a Sandover Medal a charge of unduly rough play was proved.

"I realise I've still got a lot to learn; a long way to go," says Smallridge. "Now that I've got an opportunity in league ranks, I realise in a way what I've missed. But I've got no regrets about my late arrival."

"Looking back, maybe I could have given league footy a go earlier. But sometimes it's better to mature a little and I think I learned a few things before making the move."

"I never thought I'd do as well as I've done; I thought I'd go okay and then at the end of the season review what's next."

LIMELIGHT

"But I must admit I'm enjoying it; the limelight is fantastic and everyone's got an ego, so it's only natural that you enjoy the success. I guess now that I've enjoyed some success, I've got to look ahead. If an AFL opportunity comes up, then I'll certainly give it every consideration."

Smallridge's football career actually started when he was a five-year-old; a junior in the Rockingham area. But at the age of 17, like many youngsters, he shunned the football arena and took up motocross...for its thrills and its spills.

"I had two elder brothers in motocross and thought I'd give it a go as well," says Smallridge. "But I had a tendency to ride the bike faster than my capabilities allowed!"

Smallridge returned to the football scene in 1984, back at Rockingham where some fairly prominent names were involved — Brian Cook (now the Eagles

Interstate debut for Gary Smallridge (general manager) was coach, former South Fremantle full-back Gavin Carter and former Subiaco coach Brian Douge were players and current Subiaco general manager Wayne Loxley was coach of the reserves side.

In 1987 he was enticed to Sunday Football ranks, playing with Gosnells, after a tentative stint with Kwinana. But a fairly uneventful season made it pretty easy to give the next year a miss as he headed overseas for a working holiday.

Even on his return in 1989, he wasn't handed the welcome mat. Being a South Fremantle fan meant that he fancied a career with the Bulldogs. But some unanswered telephone calls to Fremantle Oval gave him the impression that he was no great recruiting material, so back to Gosnells for a Sunday afternoon kick.

But as the season unfolded and Smallridge's play in the middle of the ground, where he relished the tough going and the fierce ball-getting competition, his presence became noticed — particularly by the umpires, who voted him the league's fairest and best player, a handsome winner of the Bowden Medal.

The influence of his Gosnells coach, Steve Hargrave, obviously affected his football as it became more efficient and he developed into a key team-man. It also gave him a State League future. Over summer Hargrave accepted the challenging role as assistant coach at East Fremantle... and Smallridge became a Shark.

Smallridge still spreads his sporting talents around.

CAMARADERIE

He indulges in triathlon events — running, cycling and swimming — and during summer he hopes to tune-up his achievements in local events. He has been known to ride his bicycle 22kms to work, spend his lunch-time swimming in a 25-metre indoor pool at Rockingham and visit the gym for some weight-lifting on the cycle home.

A plant operator with Alcoa, at Kwinana, Smallridge loves the camaraderie in football.

He works with tough South Fremantle rival Arthur Maskos, but feels a little sad at the lack of friendly spirit among opposing clubs.

The recent State trip to Adelaide convinced Smallridge that footballers of all clubs and colours do get on well together. But the current club barriers, especially with a lack of after-match get-together facilities, doesn't encourage greater friendships.

"It would be nice to have a drink and get to know your rivals after a tough game," says Smallridge. "A couple of clubs do it, so maybe the other clubs might get the after-match thing back to how it used to be."

Smallridge, still single and very much the eligible bachelor, has slotted neatly into guernsey No. 17 at East Fremantle.

Ironically, his favourite guernsey in junior days was No. 3 and two of his idols were tough men who wore that number, Stan Magro at Souths and Leigh Matthews at Hawthorn.

While Smallridge hasn't got his favourite number, he's got the same fierce desire to succeed as his two former idols had.

Maybe that could be a message for the Hawks when it comes to this year's end-of-season draft...

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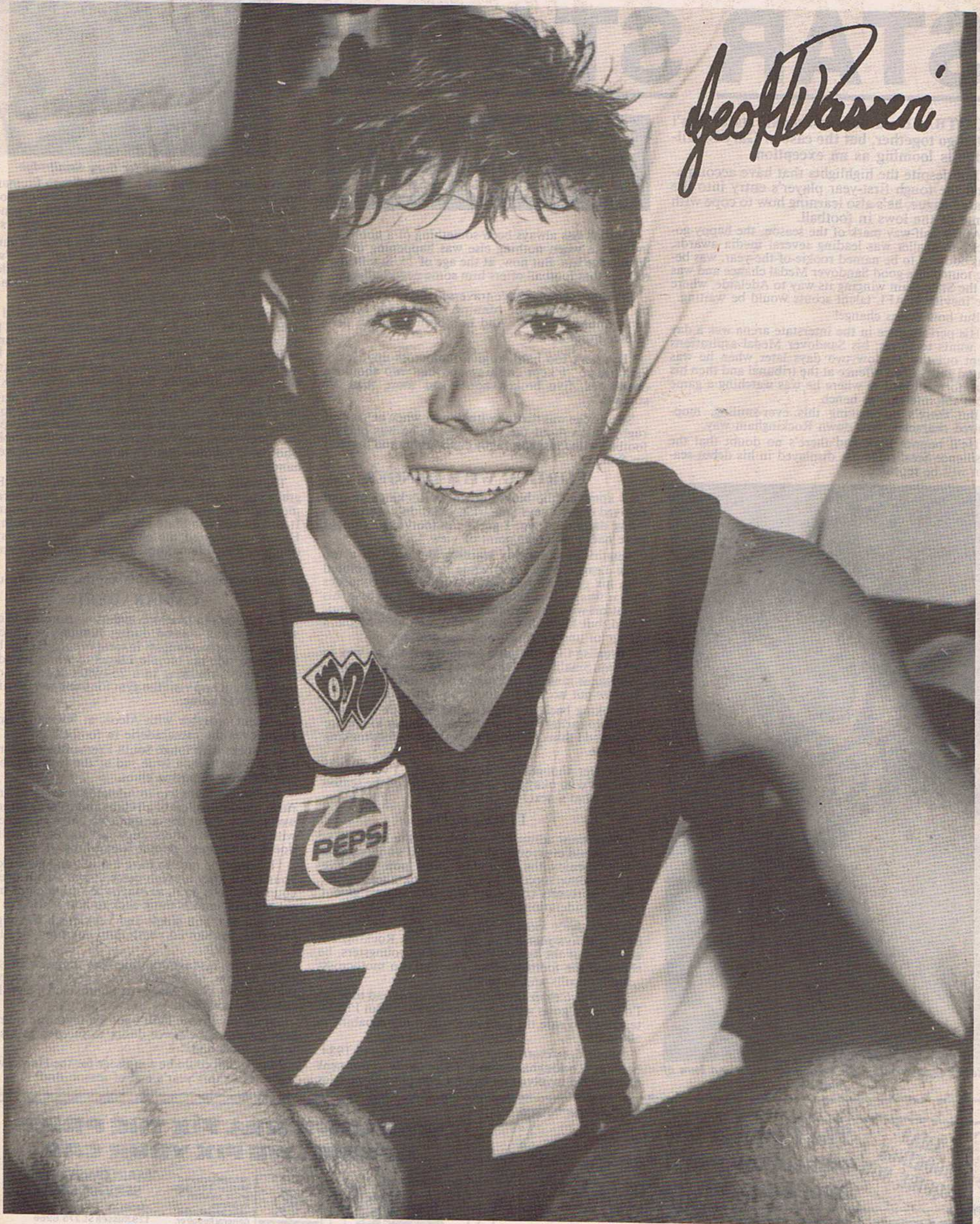
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We have started training on Tuesday each week, which is an extremely important factor in Claremont's push for back-to-back premierships.

Ruckman Peter Higgins was best-on-ground, rover Don Pyke showed a welcome return to form, David O'Connell was playing well until injured and John Annear did well when he went on in the final term.

And while we're talking about Annear — there's definitely no friction between myself and JA, as reported in The West Australian newspaper.

He's keen to get a place back in our starting line-up and eventually reclaim his spot with the Eagles and I'm happy to help him achieve that.

Though the Eagles hierarchy aren't happy about the extra training night involving their players, they are co-operating.

The Eagles players are only being asked to train the same number of nights as those in the Claremont squad.

We can now practice our ruck work, kicking out of goals and general team play, which is important if we are to win another flag.

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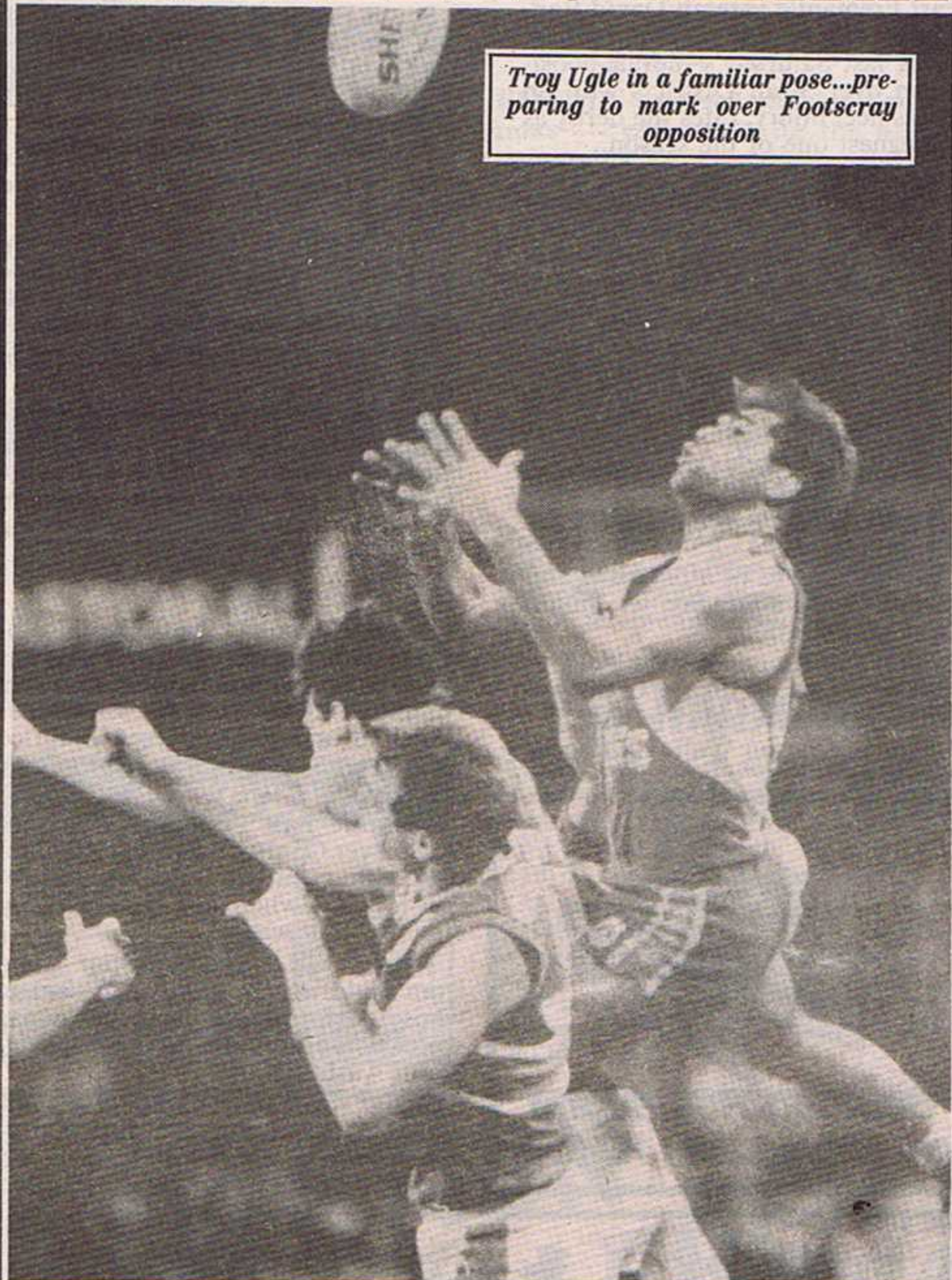

TOUGH BREEDING

DURING the last few months I've played my football in the country and it's easy to see why our rural territory has been such a great breeding ground for footballers all around Australia.

The game is played in a hard and direct style, whether you are 15 years old — or 35!

There are no beg-pardons or allowances made for anyone, which explains why young players from the country are generally physically better-prepared for their age compared to city-based players.

The other area that is more interesting is the attitude to football in the country.

It is the central focus of the whole community, whereas in the city there are so many other distractions.

Coming from a country background teaches people to be very single-minded about succeeding at whatever they do.

Statistics show that a big majority of our league football population has come from the county over the past 20 years and the continual stream of Sandover Medal winners alone is firm proof of that.

Tigers are off target

CLAREMONT'S goalkicking has been less than perfect in recent matches with tallies of 9.21, 6.18 and 15.19.

It's not uncommon in sport for players to go through a period of missing putts, first serves or whatever. But football is a team sport and when the whole team struggles, it's a problem a lot more difficult to remedy.

Geelong, for example, could easily have been firmly entrenched in the top five of the AFL table and brimming with confidence if it hadn't been for some poor kicking.

Their inaccuracy in front of goals

has probably cost them at least five possible victories — which almost certainly has attributed to their demise for 1990.

Missing goals not only creates this team phobia, but also tends to keep the spirits of the opposition up.

The worst kicking display I've ever encountered was while playing for the Australian Amateurs in a Sydney carnival in 1974.

It was their wettest winter for many years, playing on nothing better than a bog heap and WA kicked 1.26 in the second half against NSW — to lose by two points.

Derby battle will have no weak hearts

THE two traditional Port clubs will take centre stage this Sunday in a derby struggle at East Fremantle Oval that will be no place for the faint-hearted.

Victory will encourage the winners to surge ahead and wrest a second semi-final berth away from Claremont or Swan Districts.

South Fremantle and East Fremantle occupy third and fourth spots respectively on the Pepsi State League ladder and both want the double chance at making the grand final.

While the Bulldogs are level on points with the second-placed Tigers, East Fremantle are two games adrift and must win to maintain any hope of grabbing second spot.

They must also be wary of East Perth, who are hoping to snatch fourth place from the Sharks, despite being three games in arrears.

WHITE-WASH

East Fremantle will want to avoid a white-wash at the hands of their neighbours, who beat them by 21 points at East Fremantle Oval in round three and by 15 points in the Foundation Day derby at Fremantle Oval in round 10.

East Fremantle veteran David Rankin, who will resume on Sunday after missing last Saturday's morale-boosting win over Swan Districts with an Achilles heel injury, rates the derby as the toughest one of the season.

"We lost the first two derbies, but we're not about to lose this one," said Rankin, who dismissed the suggestion that his side would have a home-ground advantage.

"That doesn't apply in derbies," Rankin said.

"They are tough matches between two single-minded teams.

"South always fight the derbies to the end and if we relax after 115 minutes, we could lose.

"You've got to concentrate for the full 120 minutes.

"This is going to be a big game and now that it's on a Sunday, we should get a huge crowd."

Rankin and Shane Ellis are likely to be the only changes from coach Ron Wilcox's team that beat Swans.

Ruckman Clinton Wolf will also be

considered, but with both Greg Hodson and Robert Zupanovich in excellent form, Wilcox is unlikely to risk the injury-prone high-leaper, opting to give him more time in the reserves.

South Fremantle skipper Brad Collard is a definite addition to Stan Magro's side, who had to rely on all their resilience to shrug off the Perth challenge last Saturday.

"The chance of getting second place is the driving force behind us," Collard said.

"To do that we must beat all the top sides and a win over East Fremantle will give us a huge psychological advantage in the finals."

The ruck duels will be a highlight of this game.

Souths have Sandover Medallist Craig Edwards and the promising Richard Graham in top form, but the Sharks duo of Hodson and Zupanovich will be eager to atone after being beaten in the first two clashes.

AGGRESSIVE

South will look to the Collard brothers — Cliff, Brad and Derek — for defence, midfield and forward drive, complemented by the aggressive Peter Worsfold and the evergreen Maurice Rioli, whose last-half was inspirational last week.

Versatile East Fremantle key-position player Clinton Browning will line-up at either centre-half-back or centre-half-forward, where he has been highly effective this season.

Wilcox will expect a better game from midfielder Gary Smallridge, whose performances have been below-par since his appearance for WA against South Australia.

Sharks rover Billy Krakouer is a potential match-winner and Chris Waterman is showing signs of finding top form after a long lay-off with injury.

Royals can make their task easier

EAST Perth could make their difficult task of snatching a finals berth in the Pepsi State League just a little more realistic by beating reigning premiers Claremont at Perth Oval this Saturday.

"A win would see the Royals, cellar-dwellers a fortnight ago, camped just eight points behind fourth-placed East Fremantle if the Sharks lose the crucial derby clash with South Fremantle on Sunday.

Gavin Howlett, who just a year ago was a member of the West Perth team that produced an amazing finish to storm into the finals, is now seeking a repeat — but in different colours.

INSTRUMENTAL

The former East Perth player became a Royal again midway through this season and last Saturday he was instrumental in helping destroy the Falcons by 94 points.

"There's no reason why we can't go on with it," said Howlett after an impressive 25-kick, 16-handball display at Leederville Oval.

"We just have to keep winning, as West Perth did last season."

GOALS TARGET

A swag of goals from leading full-forward Glen Bartlett will set the scene for the Royals do-or-die effort and strongman Stephen Hooper is giving the team great confidence with his ruck work.

His clash with Tigers duo Peter Higgins, who was best-on-ground against Subiaco last Saturday and David O'Connell will have a big bearing on this match.

Tigers rovers Tony Evans and Joe Cormack, ruck-rover Peter Thorne and skipper Mark Hann are a formidable unit that is hard to control.

VICTORY NEEDED

SWAN Districts must beat West Perth at Bassendean Oval to safeguard their place in the second semi-final.

Table-topping Swans slipped to fourth-placed East Fremantle last Saturday, a loss that dangerously reduced their margin over Claremont and South Fremantle, who share second spot, to one game.

Swans coach John Todd said his side was too soft against the Sharks and they will be eager to rebound against the bottom-placed Falcons, who tipped them out of the finals last season and beat them by 35 points in their last meeting at Leederville Oval in round 10.

Soundly beaten in the Perth derby with East Perth last Saturday, West Perth will again look to the experience of David Palm and skipper Paul Hasler.

Rugged Swans forward Peter Hodyl should fire up the Swans, with support from ruck-rover David Ogg, key defender Paul Gow and wingman Steve Bazzo.

DETERMINED DEMONS

IMPROVING Perth should out-gun a disappointing Subiaco at Lathlain Park.

A lot was expected of the Lions this season, but they have delivered little, except for a short spell in the top four midway through the campaign.

Perth, who are suffering a cash crisis, appear more committed and with midfielders Warren Mahoney, Joe Santostefano and Jeff Moore in good touch, they should have too much run for their opponents.

Subiaco, looking ahead with a rebuilding programme, will need young players like Damian Hampson, Tony Godden and Craig Hunter to add to the solid football coming from Garry Kemp and Clint Brown.

Bennett joins the 100 club

FORMER West Coast Eagles full-forward Darren Bennett kicked his 100th goal in the national football arena on Saturday, as Melbourne over-ran AFL leaders Essendon at Windy Hill.

Bennett, one of the stars in the Demons final-quarter fightback, kicked four of his five goals for the day in the fourth quarter. He reached his century in his 33rd game and has now kicked 102 goals.

In doing so, Bennett took one game more than current Eagles full-forward Peter Sumich to reach triple figures — but was two games quicker to a career century than both Tony Lockett and Jason Dunstall.

PETER Sumich's current good form continues to help him reach new targets.

The six first-half goals that he posted against Footscray on Friday night (out of a team tally of seven) allowed him to join former skipper Ross Glendinning on the record tally of 111 goals for the Eagles.

Glendinning played 40 games for the Eagles before retiring, while Friday's game was Sumich's 35th since making his debut last year.

Sumich, who reached his century of AFL goals in 32 games, seemed set for a great haul on Friday before his third-quarter hamstring injury sidelined him.

FOOTSCRAY might have had an edge in experience over the Eagles last Friday night — mainly through the presence of veterans Terry Wallace and Doug Hawkins — but the Bulldogs team was significantly younger than their Perth rivals.

The average age of the Eagles players was 25 years, compared to Footscray, with an average of 24 years and two months.

While Footscray had seven players with more than 100 senior AFL games to their credit compared to the Eagles one (Dean Turner), 12 members of the Footscray team are yet to reach 50 games, compared to only seven in the Eagles lineup.

SINCE beating Geelong by nine points at the Sydney Cricket Ground in round eight, the Sydney Swans have failed to record a victory as they suffer their worst losing sequence since relocating north in 1982.

It is the club's longest losing sequence since 1975, when — as South Melbourne — they lost 10 games in a row.

NORTH Melbourne's victory over the Brisbane Bears gave the Roos four consecutive wins for the first time for three years. They won rounds 12 to 16 in 1987, the last year that they played in the finals.

Recruiting zone becomes reality

THE West Coast Eagles are set to get Perth as their own recruiting zone...but not before the 1990 November draft.

At a recent meeting of AFL club general managers, it was unanimously agreed that the Eagles should get a Perth metropolitan zone of 250,000 people in line with the Melbourne-based clubs.

AFL executive commissioner Alan Schwab said this was a better option than giving the Perth club two priority choices before the draft.

"Players outside the zone can be drafted by the other clubs," said Schwab. "But these players would not be able to move out of WA till they are 19 years of age, allowing the kids to go through the ranks of the SFL system."

"This could come into effect next year, in time for the 1991 November draft."

Schwab said it was impossible to stop any club moving a promising young player from one zone to another. But there were strict penalties — a minimum \$100,000 fine and an exemption from playing with that club — for any club guilty of tampering with the draft.

The 1990 November draft will be held on the Wednesday after the Melbourne Cup — November 7.

MIGHTY MILES

DASHING Geoff Miles was given a big incentive to perform well against Footscray at the WACA Ground last Friday night.

Eagles coach Mick Malthouse started Miles on the interchange bench, telling him to play his natural game when his chance came.

"We are lacking dash out of the backline," Malthouse told Miles.

"If you can give the side some run out of defence, you could cement yourself in the side."

With the AFL finals fast approaching, that was a huge incentive for the exciting Eagle...and no wonder he almost set himself up for a couple of shots at goal!

Miles went into a back-pocket in the first quarter, replacing full-back Brad Gwilliam, who had struggled to contain 17-year-old Bulldogs sensation Chris Grant. Michael Brennan became the custodian, while Miles picked up Danny Del-Re, who managed just one point on Miles before being switched to full-back to cover free-scoring Eagle Peter Sumich.

Miles' next opponent, Adrian Campbell, also managed just one point as the defender produced his best dash from the backline.

Miles repeatedly ran through the centreline before delivering some perfect passes to the forwards.

"I was happy with my game and I've just got to keep it up," a jovial Miles said after the match.

Strong influence

THE influence that Eagles vice-captain John Worsfold has on the team is enormous — and not always evident.

His mean and keen approach to competitive football is always a standard-setter and no better examples were available than his two first-quarter smotherers against Footscray.

Twice he hurled himself onto a Bulldogs foot and prevented a clear kick away — and when he applied two shoulder-wrenching tackles in the one passage of play in the first quarter, it was obvious that the Eagles were in a physical mood.

Laidley mobile

EAGLES fans were delighted to see dashing defender Dean Laidley in the rooms for Friday's clash with Footscray.

He has discarded his crutches and his reconstructed knee is making excellent progress. He hopes to be back running in four or five weeks — and football next year is his burning desire.

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HERE WE GO AGAIN

Another side desperate to beat Eagles

THE task confronting the West Coast Eagles each week seems to be looking a little repetitious.

As the AFL season approaches the business end, each round produces an opposing club facing a crisis point of their own — a team that must beat the Eagles to keep their final-five hopes alive.

First it was St Kilda at the WACA Ground three weeks ago. They came and lost and bowed out of the finals race.

Last week it was Footscray. They weren't good enough and were sent packing back to Melbourne, losing their top-five spot.

And this Saturday it's Carlton — but the difference is that the Eagles do the travelling. The game is at Princes Park, where the Melbourne advantage will be important and a bumper crowd is expected.

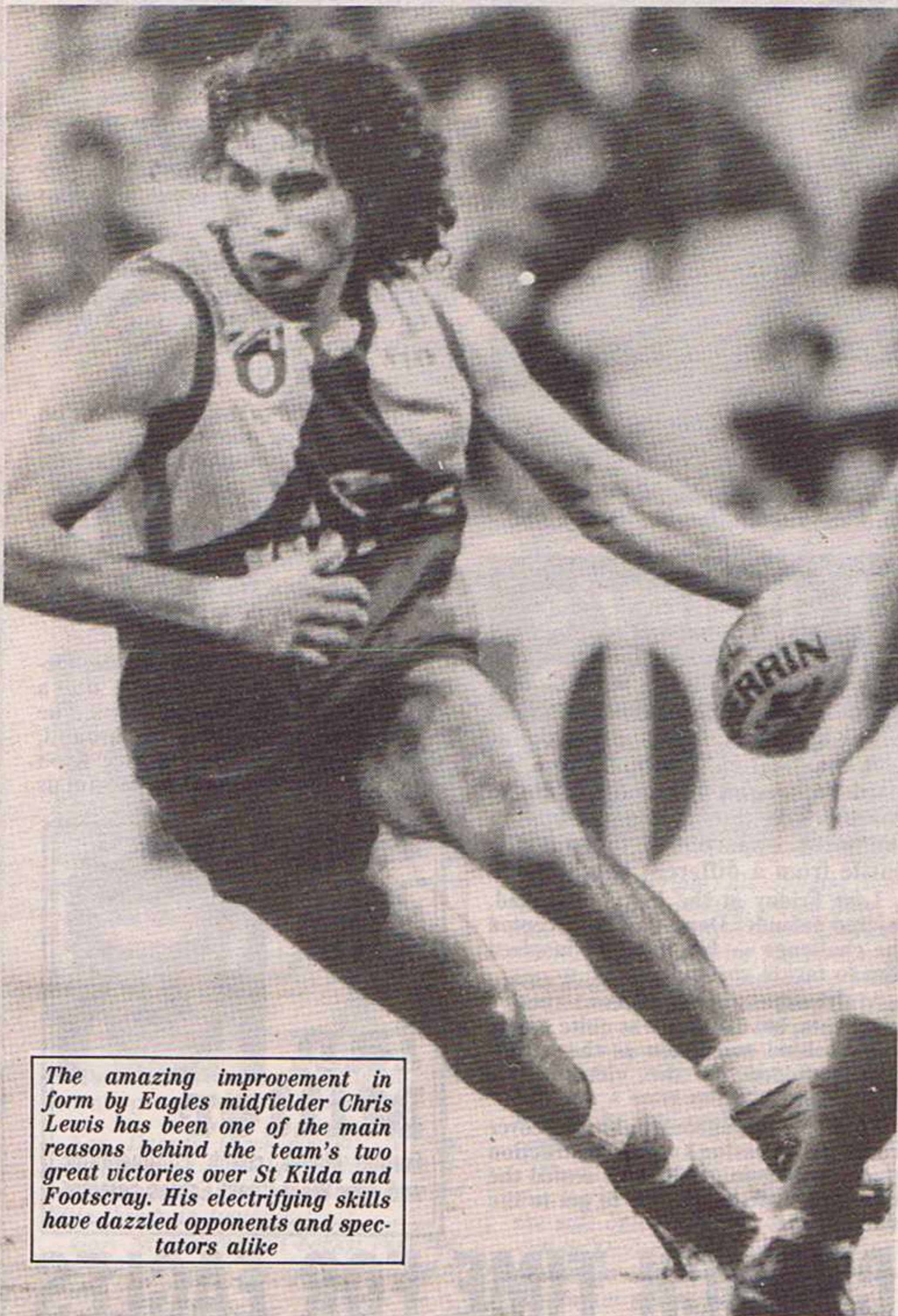
CONSOLIDATE

The Blues must win to keep alive their prospects of sneaking into the top five, while the Eagles would love the four premierships points to consolidate their plans of finishing in the top three.

Carlton are vulnerable at the moment, with several of their stars on the injured list. But they never lose without a fight, particularly at Princes Park.

When looking at the Blues' prospects, it's only natural to search for a likely opponent for champion forward Stephen Kernahan, the player in the Carlton line-up best-equipped to dominate a game.

In the past, the Eagles lion-hearted ruckman, Phil Scott, has been given

the task — and done it well. He again has strong claims to fill the role; as does regular full-back Michael Brennan, who has been in impeccable form.

But the best way to restrict Kernahan's goal-scoring opportunities is to eliminate his feeder-service by closing down the damaging Carlton midfield unit led by Craig Bradley, David Glascock and Wayne Johnston.

HEROES

And that's where some of the unsung heroes of the Eagles team come into play.

David Hart, who has been in devastating form in the last six weeks, Steve Malaxos, Craig Turley, John Worsfold and Dwayne Lamb have been respon-

sible for getting the Eagles into a winning position recently.

Not only have they nullified dangerous opponents, but they have then run free themselves and presented goal-scoring opportunities for the likes of Peter Sumich.

Obviously the Eagles will miss Sumich on Saturday and they are faced with an interesting problem as they search for his replacement.

After Sumich's departure last Friday night, Eagles coach Mick Malthouse swung his ruckmen through the key attacking spot. But it seems more logical for either Stevan Jackson or Peter Melesso to return to the team.

Wingman Dean Kemp should be fit to resume, adding further bite to their midfield department and the Eagles are not without a chance against Carlton.

DISAPPOINTING

They have done everything this season other than beat some top-class opposition outside of Perth and this match presents an ideal opportunity to make up for some disappointing efforts in Melbourne.

Malthouse will have the players fired up for a big performance and confidence in the Eagles nest could not be higher.

Top-ranked opposition doesn't worry the Eagles — they demolished the fifth-placed team in successive weeks in St Kilda (after spotting them a 50-point start) and then Footscray.

To beat Carlton at Princes Park would certainly send a scare through the other clubs looking at being part of this year's finals scenario.

BIG Peter Melesso is in two minds about his national football future. After being convinced that the West Coast Eagles had forgotten him, he was a near-miss selection for last week's game and a strong possibility of being in this week's team. While Melesso played well for Claremont last season and has performed admirably for East Perth this year — earning State selection against South Australia — his opportunities at AFL level have been limited. Westside Football's **GEORGE TEMPLE** caught up with the Carlisle Hotel bar manager for this interview.

WESTSIDE FOOTBALL: What has the last 12 months been like for Peter Melesso?

PETER MELESSO: They've been one of change. I had expected to play a few more West Coast Eagles games, but coach Mick Malthouse has seen otherwise. My form earlier in the year wasn't good enough for the Eagles either and with the team winning, it's always hard to get a game. Plus, there was the unexpected move from Claremont to East Perth. I was extremely happy at Claremont till I had the bombshell dropped on me.

WESTSIDE: What happened then — and has the move been beneficial to you?

MELESSO: Basically, I got the boot. But it's been much better for me in the long run. I would rather play for East Perth than be mucked around at Claremont. Gerard Neesham told me the night before the last practice match that he couldn't promise me a game this season, which was the last thing I expected to hear. I didn't go into it in depth with him, I just said I'd move on. Maybe Gerard thought I would play a lot more Eagles matches this year and he didn't want to have to change his side to accommodate me. His stand has become obvious in the last few weeks by dropping a few more Eagles players to the reserves. Tony Begovich is a good example.

Peter makes great Royal

WESTSIDE: This season has been an encouraging one for East Perth; can they bridge the gap to the top four next year?

MELESSO: There's a good chance we'll make the finals next year, but we haven't given up this year yet. A few injuries and a lack of depth have cost us a few games, but with some luck we could still make it.

WESTSIDE: So the players are still optimistic about their chances then?

MELESSO: We're still a chance, though it's a long shot. West Perth snuck in after the last home-and-away game last year and if we keep winning, anything could happen.

WESTSIDE: How do East Perth, Claremont and the Eagles compare as clubs?

MELESSO: The Eagles are a far more professional club; they have to be to contest the higher league. Training at Claremont was like a holiday because we had such a good side when I joined them in 1987; I couldn't believe how easy it was, though they've changed a bit this year now that they've lost a few games. It will be interesting to see how the extra night a week works out. At East Perth, training is really hard, as it is with all clubs when they're losing.

WESTSIDE: What's Gerard Neesham like as a coach?

MELESSO: A good one, especially with the younger guys.

WESTSIDE: Will you line up with the Royals in 1991?

MELESSO: I hope to, but it might not be up to me. I've only been leased to East Perth by Claremont and if they don't let me go, there's no way I can play for them. I'm not expecting any clearance problems, but there's no way I'll play for Claremont if they don't release me. If I can't finish out my career with the Royals, I'll play on Sundays somewhere.

WESTSIDE: What about the West Coast Eagles, do you have a future with them?

MELESSO: This is my last year. If I was a regular, I'd keep playing, but I haven't made an appearance this year and only had two games last season, so I know where I stand.

WESTSIDE: You did well in the recent State match against South Australia; did that boost your hopes of an Eagles recall?

MELESSO: I suppose it could have led to a chance because they were able to watch me at a higher level of football. They've always got their eye on you, but whether you get a game or not comes down to the coach — it's his decision and he knows what he wants from the team.

WESTSIDE: Has your career with the Eagles been one of frustrated ambition?

MELESSO: I was very frustrated last year; I thought I should have got more games.

WESTSIDE: Did you consider nominating yourself in the internal draft?

MELESSO: No, I'm too old and I want to stay in WA.

WESTSIDE: So what about next season?

MELESSO: Hopefully it will be at East Perth. They're a club with a great history and I'll just wait and see.

WESTSIDE: What will Peter MELESSO do away from football over the summer months?

MELESSO: I'm starting work with MLC insurers next week, but after the season, I think it's the beach for me. I haven't had a summer off for a long time. Last summer the Eagles only had a five-week break and I need a good few months off this year.

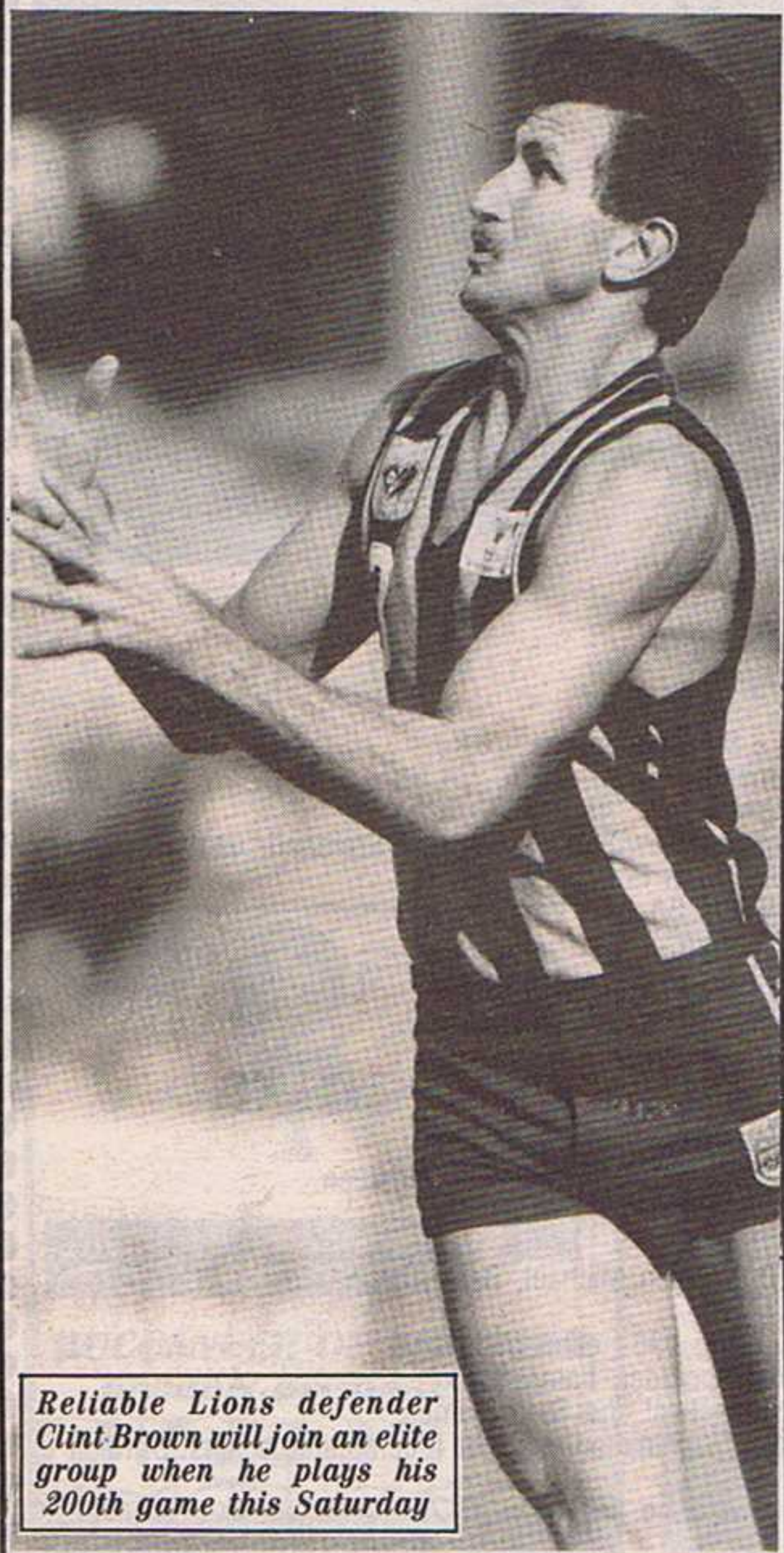

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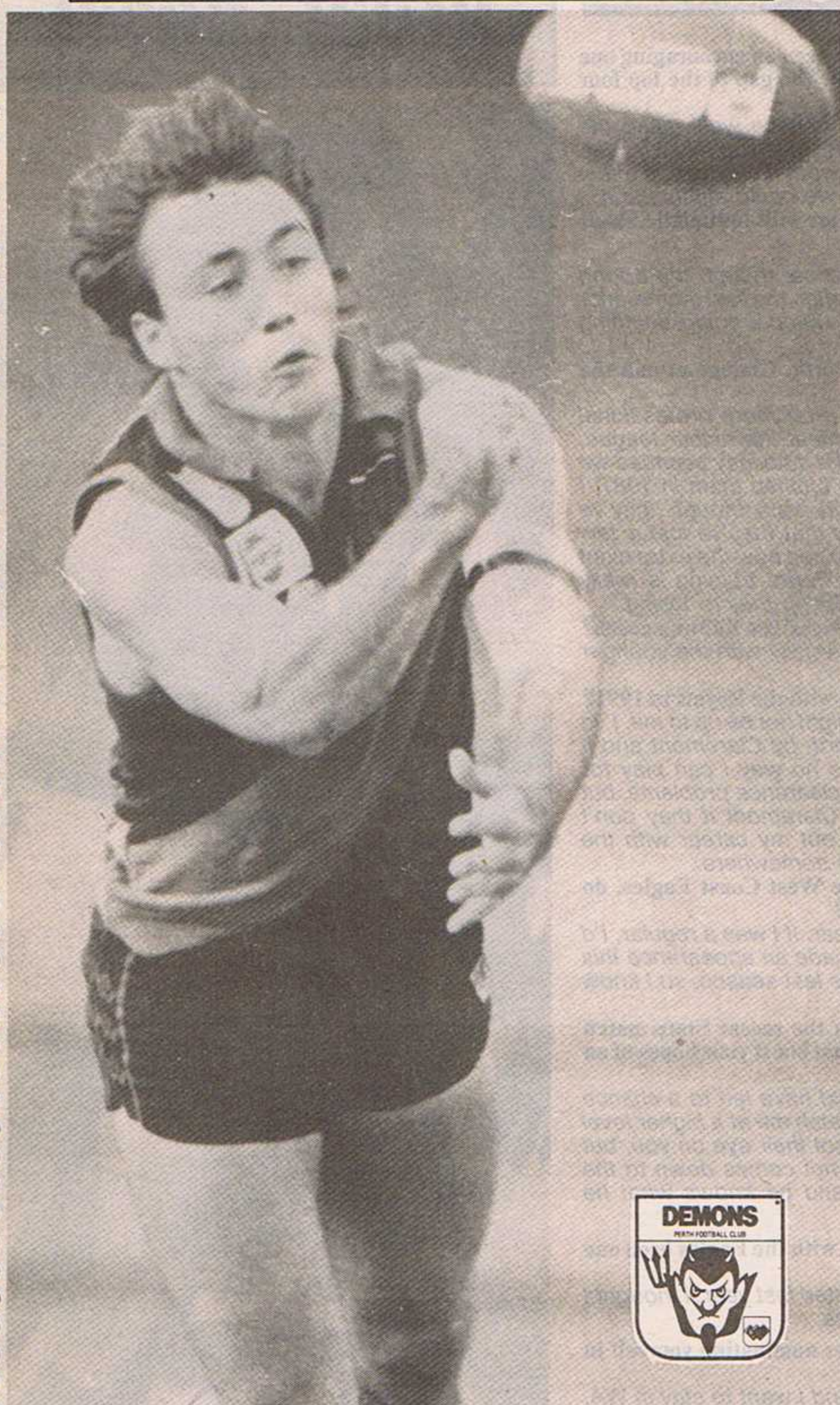

"If we lose sight of that fact, then we're in big trouble.

"You can't buy experience and that's why the State League is so important."

al arena too early and not always ready for such situations.

"If they don't kick on in their first 20 games, they can easily be lost forever," said Todd.

"They have to be sensational on day one to be seen as successful.

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Changes don't always help the game

MANY sports have changed considerably over the past 100 years or so, but maybe Australian Football has undergone the greatest metamorphosis.

Most fans would agree that the changes have contributed to a more exciting spectacle.

However, to change things simply for the sake of a change should never be a valid reason for the implementation of new methods.

New methods should be designed to improve the game and enhance a team's chances of victory. Sometimes one of these options is achieved, but very often neither objective succeeds.

OLD DAYS

It is dangerous to refer to the 'good old days' as one is immediately labelled as living in the past, being unrealistic, old-fashioned and of the same ilk as the elderly gentleman recently the subject of controversial remarks from our Prime Minister.

Despite all those risks, let's go on record as declaring that changes to the role of the full-back, for example, have been detrimental to the game.

Full-backs were once selected primarily because they were excellent kicks. They contributed significantly by being able to consistently place the ball (with the advantage of the kick-off line) out of the opposing team's scoring zone. They kicked long and usually very wide.

Today we have a situation where anybody, including short-kicking rovers, can take the kick-out after a point has been scored — and often it is a short pass.

They often do pass accurately to a team-mate who, hopefully, in turn, passes the leather further downfield. After three or four possessions, the ball should have arrived at a position where an old style full-back would have lobbed it!

POSSESSION

Those who apologise for the present system maintain that the team is retaining possession. That is true — at least on most occasions. There are many other times, of course, when the ball is carelessly lost through a mis-directed passes or a smart interception.

Another good example of how the game is being damaged by change is the dreaded huddle at centre-half-back/forward as the full-back kicks out after a point.

This ploy is now often favoured by coaches. All it really does it deteriorate Australian Football as a spectacle and, arguably, is seldom successful.

The huddle has certainly caused much heartburn among coaches as they search for counter-measures to the tactic — all of which further degenerate the game as a spectacle.

But coaches seldom worry about the game as a spectacle; their role is to win, no matter how.

One thing the huddle has done is provide football fans with the fascinat-

ing guess-the-move-by-the-full-back-game — be it a rover or what — as he engages in several false starts and considerable mind-changing in a vain search for kick-out options among the milling players.

Undoubtedly, as with all football fashions, the huddle will be replaced by some other innovation.

When that happens, it won't be too soon!

Trainers in profile

Rapid rise to the top

WHEN former Air Force man Keith Collins casually mentioned to his father that being a trainer with a league football club would be a lot of fun, he never envisaged the outcome.

Collins (40) answered a Perth Football Club call for assistance in 1988, expecting the task to be a temporary passing fad — he never dreamed that he would end up being Perth's top medical man.

He did his Level One trainers' first-aid course and completed the Level Two programme last season when he moved up to the club's senior medical position.

"The head trainer Bill Sertis fell ill and somehow the job became mine," Collins said.

"Not that I regret it — I've been a Perth supporter since I was old enough to recognise red and black."

ORGANISING

A storeman with the electrical retailing firm of Atkins Carlyle, Collins says there's more to the trainers' job than fixing injuries and taping players up.

TRAINERS are the unsung heroes in football. Without them, teams would never take the field, but they receive little recognition for their efforts. In this series, Westside Football talks to head trainers at the State League clubs.

"There's a lot of organising to do," he said.

Collins can generally be found at Lathlain Park on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights and with the team virtually all day Saturday, plus some Sundays back at Lathlain.

Swans flag was a sure thing

THERE was never any doubt in John Todd's mind that Swan Districts would win the 1982 premiership.

The black and whites were pitted against reigning premiers Claremont — but that held no fears for the astute Todd, who recalls his thoughts of grand final eve.

"I walked around the ground at Subiaco Oval and sensed that it was going to be our day, even though the team probably wasn't as potent as our 1980 and '81 sides," said Todd.

"The guys had been through too much to lose this one — they were ready to win at all costs.

"The players had come through the difficult late-1970s period and after the disappointments of 1980 — when we lost to South Fremantle in the grand final — and 1981, when they dipped out in the preliminary final, they had too much to play for.

TABLE BATTLE

"And I felt Claremont had run their race. We had been leading the premiership table all season, but they kicked a goal late in the last game to lift them above us on the ladder by about .01 per cent.

"In doing that, I felt they had already played their grand final. Their objective had been to head us off and in achieving that, they had developed a false sense of value."

History shows that Todd's gut feeling was right.

Swans beat Claremont convincingly in the second semi-final and the grand final was put beyond doubt by three-quarter-time.

"It was a comfortable grand final win," Todd said. "There was never any real tension in the coach's box and it was pleasant to win after those near-misses.

"It's also not very often that a coach has a team where the ruck, ruck-roving and midfield divisions complement one another as well as ours did.

"It was a shame that guys like Gerard Neesham, Craig Holden, Steve Gillespie and Simon Beasley had all left the club by that stage and missed playing in that match."

THE LINE-UP

Here is Todd's appraisal of his grand final line-up:

Peter Kenny (back-pocket): He was a key-position player who could be used at either end of the ground. We used him as a forward pocket in the grand final after starting him in defence.

Tom Mullooly (full-back): Tom was a brilliant user of the football and one of the best full-backs the club has had.

Bill Skwirowski (back-pocket): Bill was a real champion because he always sacrificed his own game to ensure the team won. Bill broke down the strengths of the other sides, including Steve Malaxos' game in the grand final.

Graham Melrose (half-back): Melly is the epitome of what playing football is all about. People thought he was finished when he came back from North Melbourne, but he ended up playing another 70 games with us and winning the Simpson Medal in this match before retiring.

Alan Cransberg (centre-half-back): Without him we would have struggled to win the 1982 and '83 premierships. Unfortunately, Alan retired after the '83 grand final at the tender age of 22, never to play football again.

Tony Solin (half-back): He was a tough man and a very good rebound player.

Phil Narkle (wing): He was an out-and-out champion. We could bet on Phil getting 30 possessions a game and he was one part of a great centreline.



Leon Baker (centre): Another 30 possession-a-game man and he went on to a very successful VFL career. After appearing in two grand finals with us, Leon played two more with Essendon which, if you include his three with South Bunbury, made seven-in-a-row.

Jeff Davidson (wing): He suffered a few injuries that year and retired in 1983, but he was a classical high-marking wingman.

Brad Shine (half-forward): Brad could always win the hard ball and would never give up.

Murray Rance (centre-half-forward): Murray could be played at either end of the ground and responded to the challenge after joining us as a youngster.

Keith Narkle (half-forward): Had he been a bit younger, Keith could have succeeded in the VFL.

Alan Sidebottom (forward-pocket): Injury prevented Alan reaching his full potential. He could palm the ball well and complemented Ron Boucher and it was good to see him play VFL with St Kilda.

Stan Nowotny (full-forward): When we switched Stan to centre-half-forward people laughed at us, but he went on to play in that position for WA and full-forward for us in the grand final and became a top class ruck-rover.

Don Holmes (forward-pocket): An elusive, hard-running goalkicker.

Ron Boucher (ruck): Ron was the strength of our team and he went through some hard times.

Jon Fogarty (ruck-rover): Jon's finals-round football in 1982 was great; he was always tough.

Mike Richardson (rover): He could be used anywhere in the forward line and was a most dangerous player.

Don Langsford (interchange): A committed player who was hard and capable of playing anywhere. It's a credit to Don that he's still playing.

Ross Fitzgerald (interchange): He was a player who could have achieved more, but he was a key man in that team because of his versatility. It was sad he missed out on the '83 and '84 grand finals when he switched to Perth.



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IT WAS a case of sweet revenge when East Perth took the 1972 premiership flag from Claremont after finishing bridesmaids a frustrating five times in the previous six seasons.

The Royals had set some high standards from 1966, surging through the season to make that one day in September, only to leave Subiaco Oval as the runners-up.

But not 1972.

After getting away to a slow start with just one goal to Claremont's three in the opening term, the Royals fought back to down the highly-fancied Tigers 9.17 (71) to 8.8 (56).

Malcolm Brown had taken over as captain-coach from Jack Sheedy in 1970 and he stamped his name all over the Royals 1972 season, collecting the club's fairest-and-best award as well as being the team's leading goalkicker with 51 for the year.

"Looking at the two sides on paper, Claremont should have won the game comfortably," Brown says today.

"Though we had beaten Claremont in the second semi-final, that was a surprise in itself."

TOUGH CONDITIONS

The grand final was a tight affair in wet and windy conditions, with both sides struggling for ascendancy. There was nothing in it till East Perth half-forward Gary Bygraves broke lose in the third term to kick three quick goals.

"His burst was the difference between us winning or losing the game," Brown said.

"When we hit the front early in the second term, we basically played very conservatively and manned-up across the centre to try and hold onto the lead."

Conditions were blustery, which accounted for the Royals inaccurate scoreline and with 10 extra scoring shots, the winning margin could have been greater.

Claremont declared their hand early when they played St Kilda recruit John Evans as a tagger on Brown during the second semi-final and when he lined up on him again, Brown replied with another top performance in the ruck.

"It was a funny sort of season as we played Claremont in the last qualifying game and the second semi-final, so they had already shown us what they were going to do," Brown said.

repay the visit to the Geraldton region.

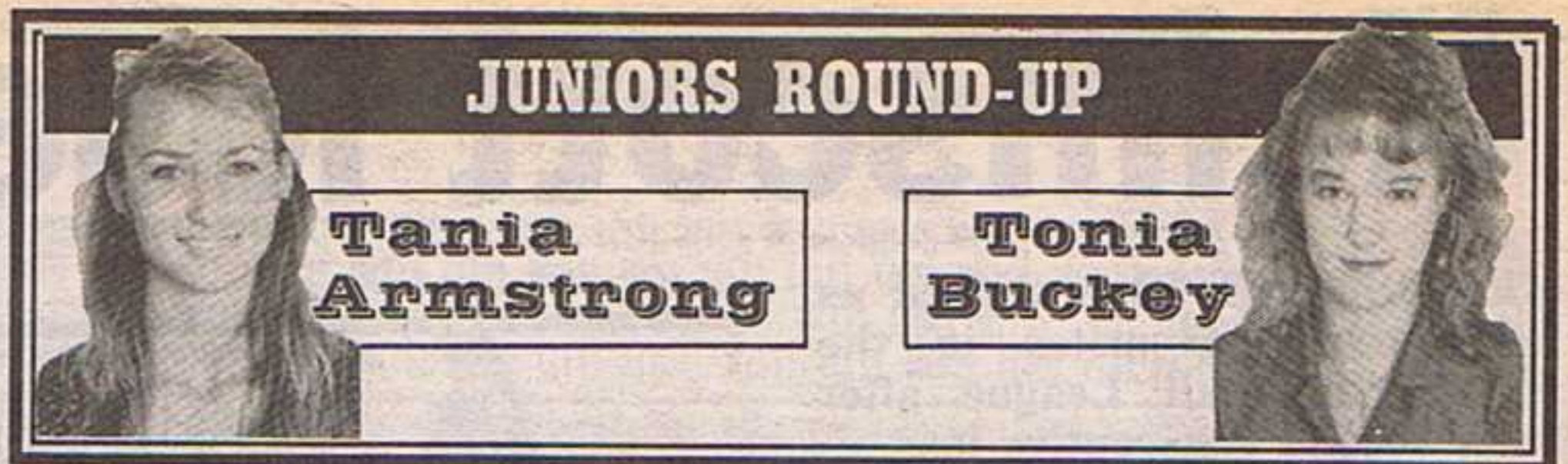

Mighty Milo says...



TYPES OF KICKS

THERE are several different types of kicks, but the most common one is the drop punt.

To do this properly you must hold the ball with one hand on either side, the fingers spread evenly along each side with the thumbs facing the lacing.

The ball should be pointed down to the ground, with the lace facing forwards.

When kicked, the ball should spin backwards, end over end.

That kick is best-used in all conditions, especially for accuracy over shorter distances.

The torpedo punt is not used all that often, but is good to gain distance when short leads aren't on offer.

The ball is held with the lace facing slightly sideways, one hand towards the front on one side and the kicking hand (that is, the same hand as your kicking foot) towards the back.

Both thumbs should be pointing upwards, almost touching the lace.

The ball is designed to spiral on its journey.

And here's this week's brain-teaser on the rules of football:

A player deliberately puts his foot out to stop an opponent running off — and trips him over. What does the umpire do?

Firstly, he reports the player for deliberately tripping and then awards a free kick. He can also add a 15-metre penalty if it's serious.

Where are the tough guys?

ASK any football follower the type of player the Eagles need most and generally you could bet on the reply being Dermott Brereton.

He's big, strong and aggressive and capable of turning a game with a five-minute burst of brilliance.

He is capable of playing under adversity and is one of the few genuinely tough players still prominent in a game that is constantly being threatened with change to eliminate the physical contact aspect from the sport.

Last year's Victorian grand final, when Dermie was flattened in the opening seconds, but came back to be a key factor in Hawthorn's win, proved how resilient he is. Then last Saturday, when he kicked 11 goals against Richmond despite a broken rib, confirmed again his status.

Few players would have even taken the field with that sort of injury, let alone kick 11 goals despite the discomfort of an inflatable vest.

RARE ABILITY

Players of Brereton's ability come along all too rarely.

But the chances of a man of his characteristics arriving with the Eagles via the WA system are even more remote.

The State League players simply don't do enough physical work on building up their body strength to ever be players capable of exerting an influence on a big game.

There are players who are naturally big and strong, but even those few don't do enough work in the weights room.

The West Perth-East Perth clash at Leederville Oval last Saturday had a number of players in action who could be on the shopping list of AFL recruiting officers. Yet none of them has the muscle definition to exert a physical influence in the Melbourne mud...maybe with the exception of Stephen Hooper.

And when it comes down to the crunch, that could cost the some players their chance at the big time.

DECISION

If it's a line-ball decision between a rather skinny prospect with heaps of skill and potential and a solidly-built youngster, there's only one way the AFL talent scouts will go — with the strength.

There seems to be a few players in the Eagles squad who have either not done the required weights work, or are not doing it correctly.

Full-forward Peter Sumich is a classic example.

Though he has made a fine entry into the national arena, he does find it tougher to kick goals in Melbourne, where the closer confines restrict his style. He just doesn't

have the physical strength to hold out tough defenders to take a strong mark — a feature of the football from Brereton, Jason Dunstall or Tony Lockett.

are others who would benefit from some lengthy off-season sessions in the gymnasium.

Perhaps the changing face of Australian Football has a bit to do with it, but there hasn't been a genuine tough man in WA football since Stephen Michael was running around late in his career picking guys off with some great bumps.

UPROAR

And even then there was an uproar, despite the fairness and legality of his football.

Other than Michael, the former South Fremantle champion who twice won the Sandover Medal, John Duckworth and Ron Boucher, WA football has been light-on for an aggressive and intimidating big man in the last two decades.

Perhaps Hooper, a powerful young man with a willingness to exploit his bulk, could be the next WA player to use his size to best effect. But he isn't agile like Brereton and obviously he has a long way to go.

Just the same, the big East Perth ruckman is sure to attract plenty of attention from the AFL talent scouts.
