# TIGERS PLOY?

**DID Claremont throw the game against Swan Districts?**

It's a conclusion some fans could easily arrive at — particularly down Fremantle way.

Despite having the wood over Claremont, Swan Districts appear to be the side most of the other three teams would prefer to play in any finals shoot-out.

On their form in the last series it would seem Swans are lucky to have finished in second position.

Before Saturday's game against Claremont they were looming as the easy-beats in the finals.

## NOT TOO CONCERNED

But while Claremont coach Gerard Neesham is a tricky customer and probably wasn't over-concerned with the loss — in fact, it's the kind of situation that will help him fire his side for yet another grand final appearance — I doubt if it would have bothered him who he played in the second semi-final.

Swans were playing for their football life last Saturday; Claremont, on the other hand, had little to gain from a win. They certainly didn't have the same desperation as Swans.

Claremont appeared to have Swans measure till the closing minutes of play.

But that also appeared to be the case when they kicked inaccurately to go down by three points to Swans at Bassendean Oval the previous time they met.

Some Claremont people believe the Tigers should have won both games.

## Claremont in the box seat

Instead, they now go into the second semi-final against a team they haven't beaten in three encounters this year.

In fact, Claremont appear to have wilted when the pressure has really been applied by Swans in each of their three matches.

So do Swans have the measure of Claremont?

While the other teams may have preferred to play Swans in the finals, I have a sneaky suspicion that Swans coach John Todd would much rather be playing Claremont than the other two teams in the second semi-final.

The Tigers have a pretty ordinary record against Swans in the finals when Todd has been coaching the Bassendean team.

He seems to know how to beat them.

When Swans won a hat-trick of premierships under Todd in 1982-83-84, they twice beat Claremont in grand finals.

In at least one of those grand finals, Claremont appeared to have the better side. Yet they were never a chance.

So perhaps Todd has the wood over Claremont.

Whatever the case, the SFL couldn't have asked for a better draw for the first two finals.

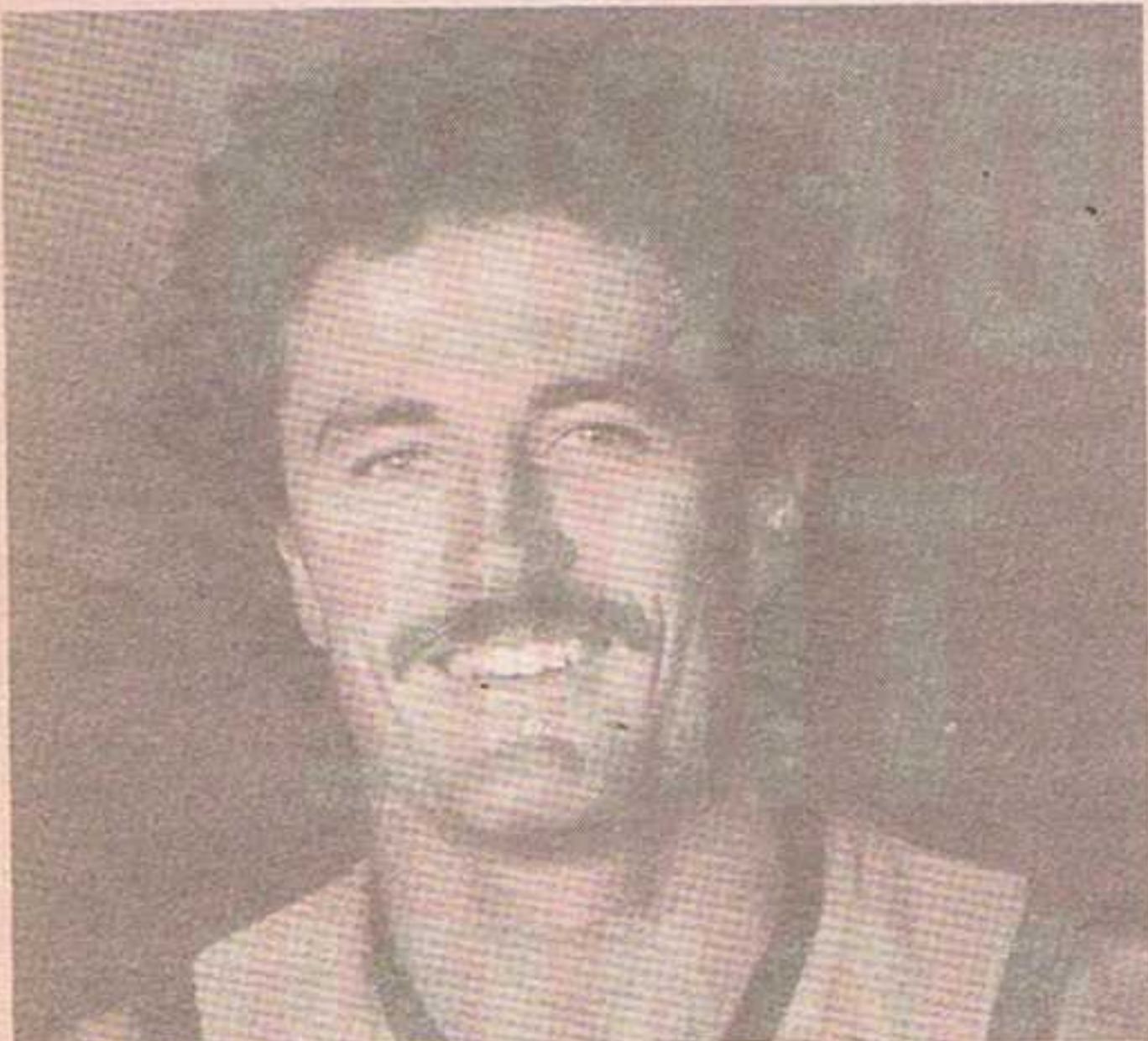

## GOSSIP FROM AROUND THE CLUBS

### DEMORALISED DEMONS

YOU have to admire Perth supporters who look to the future with confidence! Against East Fremantle last Saturday, the Demons lost in all three grades at East Fremantle Oval. The Sharks compiled a total of 55.51, compared to Perth's tally of 13.24 — with each team losing by an average of 93 points.

### NOT SO KEEN

LAURIE Keene must be wondering where his football future is headed after being overlooked by the West Coast Eagles last Sunday. He's a chance for the Geelong game this week, but time's running out if he is going to be a finals contender. Keene has courageously fought back from his continuing Achilles heel problems over a 16-month period, but coach Mick Malthouse appears reluctant to include him in the side. Last weekend Keene travelled with the Eagles to Queensland, but was 21st man for West Coast's clash with the Brisbane Bears. With Subiaco out of the State League finals, he's going to struggle for match fitness and unless he plays against Geelong he may as well hang his boots up and watch the Eagles from the comfort of his armchair.

### UNDER-MANNED

PERTH'S losing effort against finals contenders East Fremantle wasn't helped by playing most of the last quarter with only 17 players. Already 65 points in arrears, the Demons lost their best player on the day when Jeff Moore left the ground at the five minute mark of the final term. He joined Steve Lally (ankle) and rookie Darren Clement (knee) on the sidelines as the Demons season came to a disappointing end with an 84-point loss at the hands of the Sharks.

### DOUBLE DUTCH

IT WAS a commentator's nightmare at East Fremantle Oval and Claremont Oval last Saturday as the match callers battled to get their tongues around a couple of hairy ones. Radio 6WF had to contend with rookie Perth defender Tim Lester playing on the Sharks goalkicker Neil Lester-Smith for most of game and Radio 6PR had to deal with Swan Districts full-back Brent Hutton marking Claremont's John Hutton for a half.

### GRATEFUL ROYALS

EAST Perth have ended their most successful season since 1984 when they won 10 league games — and they are thanking Subiaco for a lot of their joy. The Royals reluctantly cleared two of their most experienced players in Grant Campbell and Gavin Hawkins to the Lions this year — who managed just six and seven league games respectively. In turn, a number of former Lions players emerged to be real stars of East Perth's strong finish to the season — ruckman Stephen Hooper, defender Leigh Willison and midfield mobile players Andrew Slade, Paul Evans and Daymon Port, who summed up the feeling of the five players on Saturday night when he told Royals members: "I'm glad I'm at Perth Oval; it's a club with great tradition."

### SWANS SPY

SWAN Districts were well-prepared for Claremont last Saturday. When Swans were being beaten at Bassendean Oval by East Perth the week previous, the black and whites had a spy at Claremont Oval to watch the Tigers take on East Fremantle. "We've been doing that a lot this year," the spy said after Swans produced their amazing seven-point win over the league leaders.

### ACTION NEEDED

WA Football Commission will let the game down badly if they don't force strict action over last week's incident where a spectator tackled field umpire Phil O'Reilly after the Claremont-Swan Districts match. With the push towards better-educated coaches, accreditation schemes and a commonsense approach towards umpires, the Commission needs to act quickly over this incident. How can coaches of junior footballers — or the coordinators who are trying to implement better attitudes in junior ranks — stand up and encourage respect for the men-in-white if the game's ruling body doesn't act strongly on this issue? It's all very well for the police to decide not to prefer charges; the WAFC should be wielding the big stick one way or another.

### MELESSO'S DILEMMA

WEST Coast Eagles big-man Peter Melesso could be the first player to have his career ended by video evidence. Melesso copped a tough five-week suspension for stepping on the head of Melbourne forward Earl Spalding and after being on the outer as far as the Eagles are concerned for so long, it will take a monumental effort to earn back his spot next year. The big man's contract also runs out this year and it's unlikely to be renewed. Melesso admitted after hearing the AFL tribunal's decision that his career was virtually over...which may be good news for East Perth, who are keen to sign him up permanently.

# Browning's the tip

EAST Fremantle key position player Clinton Browning is Westside Football's tip to win WA's most prestigious individual football award — the Sandover Medal.

The Medal count — to be held at the Burswood Convention Centre Showroom on Monday night — promises to be one of the most wide open for years, with public and media opinion clearly split over the outcome.

Browning gets Westside's nod by a narrow margin from East Perth midfielder Lucio Baroni.

Both players have had outstanding seasons and with Browning's Sharks team-mate Gary Smallridge out of the running because of a reprimand, it looks as though Baroni and Browning can fight it out.

Westside Football writers, State coach Ron Alexander, Alan East, George Temple and Bill Mather-Brown all selected Browning as their winner, while 1972 Sandover Medallist Ian Miller, Gary Stocks, of The West Australian and Tania Armstrong chose Baroni.

Former champion Perth and Carlton forward Peter Bosustow believes reigning medallist, South Fremantle ruckman Craig Edwards, will win back-to-back awards.

## BUCCANEER OF YEAR

Browning featured strongly in Westside's Buccaneer of the Year ratings award where all players from each week's fixtures have their performances rated out of 10.

Browning finished third in the ratings with 134

points, just one behind Smallridge and Claremont skipper Mark Hann, who tied for first place on 135 each.

Baroni, who won Radio 6NR's TEAC award and the Daily News McInerney Ford player-of-the-year, was not far away from that group on 130. His effort on Saturday also earned him enough votes to wrap up the Football Budget's Pepsi Player-of-the-Year award.

He took that award from Smallridge, with Browning and West Perth veteran David Palm — another strong Sandover Medal contender — finishing equal third.

Palm has had an excellent season and will be assisted in the medal count by the fact that few other Falcons will poll votes.

## TEAM-MATES

Hann will have no such luxury. Team-mates Tony Evans, Joe Cormack, Brian Beresford, Cam Lewis and Kevin Mitchell will have all earned votes throughout the year, with Peter Thorne, Scott Rowland and Darrell Panizza grabbing the umpires' attention late in the season.

Swan Districts quartet Mick Grasso, Shane Stremmel, Peter Hodyl and David Ogg could figure on the leaders board, while Cliff and Brad Collard and Glen Jakovich should poll well from South Fremantle.

Subiaco's strongest Medal contender looks to be wingman Damian Hampson, while an outsider from Perth could be John Zaikos.

# FINALS DANGERMEN

THE State Football League finals are here ... and the first premiership flag of the 1990s is up for grabs. The four top teams — Claremont, Swan Districts, South Fremantle and East Fremantle — all have strong claims to a premiership and over the coming weeks Westside Football will look at the credentials of some of the Finals Dangersmen.



Brad Collard...good disposal

**NAME:** Brad Collard, known as BC.  
**CLUB:** South Fremantle. Made his league debut in 1984 after graduating from country town Quairading. Skipped the club in 1987, but handed over the reins to Maurice Rioli the following year before getting the captaincy back this season. He was one of WA's top players on his State debut against South Australia in July.  
**POSITION:** Does best on the wing, with the odd run in the centre or ruck-roving. It doesn't matter where he plays, he's always damaging to the opposition and plays flat-out.  
**EXPERIENCE:** Has enough big-game experience behind him to understand the difference between the qualifying rounds and the finals. He was a member of Souths 1988 finals brigade and played in the 1989 second semi and grand finals.  
**STRENGTHS:** A consistent ball-getter, he is also a fine disposer of the ball. He has the strength to break open a pack and spear his team into attack.  
**QUALITIES:** His determination to never admit defeat, even when his side is losing heavily, makes him a good leader. He believes that something good will come of everything — even if it is just helping an inexperienced player improve his game.

**NAME:** Billy Krakouer, known as Shonky.  
**CLUB:** East Fremantle. Switched over from Claremont last season after coming up from Mt Barker, where his three brothers (Phil, Jim and Andrew) also learnt their football.  
**POSITION:** Rover, resting in a forward pocket with an occasional run on the wing.  
**EXPERIENCE:** Was a member of East Fremantle's finals team last year and that experience will stand him in good stead this time around. Krakouer has developed considerably since that time and is now a far more damaging player.  
**STRENGTHS:** He is fleet of mind and foot and has a touch of the Krakouer magic about his handpassing. He can find team-mates in the clear with a perfect handpass when he seemed to be locked into a corner. He has pace and tons of courage.  
**QUALITIES:** He is a quiet player who doesn't let the hard knocks wear him down. He goes about his work effectively and will usually play the percentages, rather than attempt something spectacular that could cost his team possession.

# Derby semi should be thriller

THIS Sunday's derby first semi-final between East Fremantle and South Fremantle at Subiaco Oval will surpass the three great clashes the port clubs have already staged this season.

Though Souths hold a 2-1 win/loss advantage over Easts this season, that means little with the prize of a preliminary final berth and a chance at making the grand final at stake.

For the loser, it will be mothballs for 1990 and big utility player Andrew Lockyer is confident that it will not be the Sharks who hang up their boots.

"We've had a lot of our experienced and running players come back from injury in the last series of fixtures and that has made a big difference to our side," Lockyer said.

### DIFFERENCE

"Clinton Wolf has made the biggest difference. Though Greg Hodson and Robert Zupanovich were working hard, our small players were always having to fight for second position from the ruck tap-outs.

"But Wolfy changed that for us last Saturday — he gave us front position."

Lockyer said the return to form of Gary Smallridge and the return from injury of skipper George Christie, coupled with continued strong performances from Darren Hammond and Billy Krakouer, helped lift East Fremantle in the second half of the season.

"We lacked the experience and run that these players give us," Lockyer said.

"If we can combat Souths running players and deny their forwards access to the ball from midfield, we'll stop them winning.

"On their day, South have the the most potent forward line in the league with both Glen Jakovich and Stevan Jackson holding down key positions."

Lockyer says that he will probably oppose one of these two players on Sunday.

"I think coach Ron Wilcox has a key defensive role in mind for me," he said.

### SOUL-SEARCHING

South Fremantle have done a lot of soul-searching this week after their loss to East Perth last Saturday, says defender Cliff Collard.

"You're only as good as your last game and ours wasn't too good," Collard said.

"We must put pressure on East Fremantle from the outset, which is how we beat them in the first two encounters this season.

"We must also cut out Clinton Browning — that's imperative. If we don't, it will make winning a lot tougher."

Collard believes that Stevan Jackson and Peter Matera should return from injury.

"Peter looked good in the reserves last Saturday and appears to be over his knee problem," Collard said.

"Jacko had a groin injury and should come straight back into the team.

"We tried Rob Solin at centre-half-forward last Saturday, which didn't work. We need a big guy like Jacko there."

### AGGRESSIVE

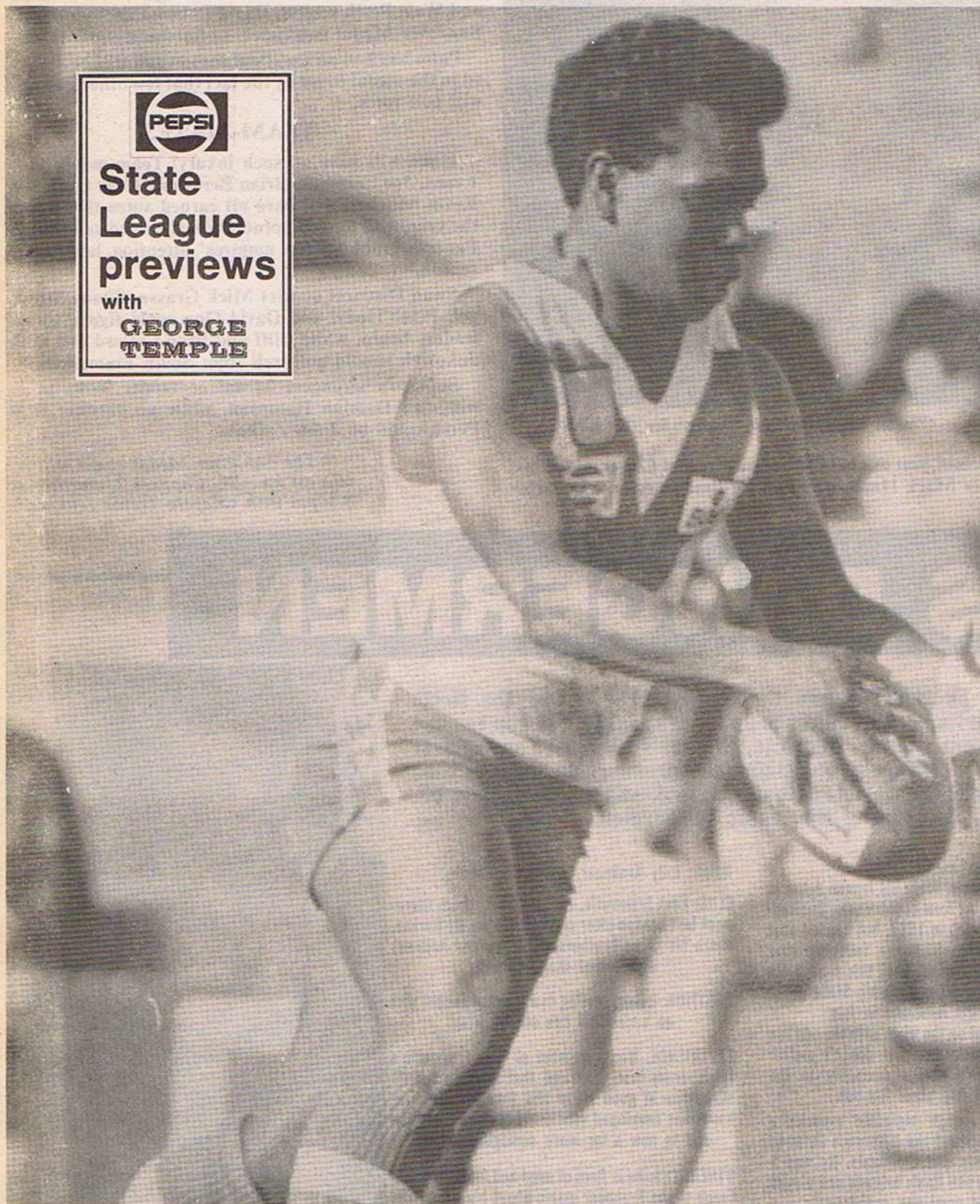
South will look to aggressive Peter Worsfold and Derek Collard for small-man presence in the forward area, Maurice Rioli to dominate the centre and for John Porter to continue his solid work in defence.

East Fremantle midfielders Glen Moir, Hammond, Peter Quill and Smallridge will have their work cut out combatting Souths runners, while Jon Derecourt and David Rankin should continue their good work in defence.

Browning will be a big threat at centre-half-forward for East Fremantle, but Michael Broadbridge must offer more as goalsneak.

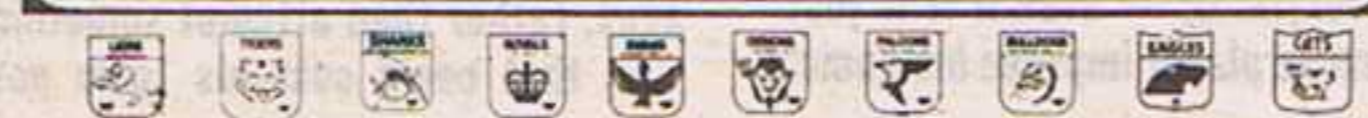

## Longmire aims at the century

**NORTH Melbourne full-forward John Longmire is poised to become the fifth player in as many years to post a century of goals in the qualifying rounds.**

Longmire, who has played in every game this season, requires four goals in Saturday's match against Collingwood at VFL Park to reach 100 goals for the season.

That will be an amazing achievement because in 10 of his 21 games, he has failed to kick more than three goals.

If Longmire reaches the century, he will be the first North Melbourne player to do so since Malcolm Blight in 1982. Blight ended the qualifying rounds with 98 goals and added a further five goals in the finals.

\*\*\*\*\*

PETER Sumich's four goals against the Brisbane Bears on Sunday lifted his tally for the season to 73 goals from 18 matches. That total matches Ross Glendinning's season record for the West Coast Eagles, established in 1988.

Sumich's best performance so far this season was against the Sydney Swans in round five, when he kicked eight goals. He has kicked six goals in a match on five occasions during 1990.

\*\*\*\*\*

**COLLINGWOOD'S Peter Daicos has established a personal record for goals in a season, with his 78-goal total after round 21.**

Daicos, who has now kicked 392 goals in his 202 senior games, last kicked more than 50 goals in a season in 1982, with a tally of 76 goals in 25 games in 1981.

In the intervening seven-year period, his best tally was 32 goals in 1983.

\*\*\*\*\*

HAWTHORN'S Dermott Brereton has become the 10th AFL player to kick more than 50 goals for the 1990 season.

He reached the tally last Saturday, making it the first time since 1987 that the number of players to reach 50 goals in the qualifying rounds has been in double figures.

If Fitzroy's Paul Roos and St Kilda's Stewart Loewe can each post one goal in this week's final games, 1990 will be the first year since 1979 that a dozen players have kicked 50 goals or more.

He played well as a rover, kicking 1.2 for the match.

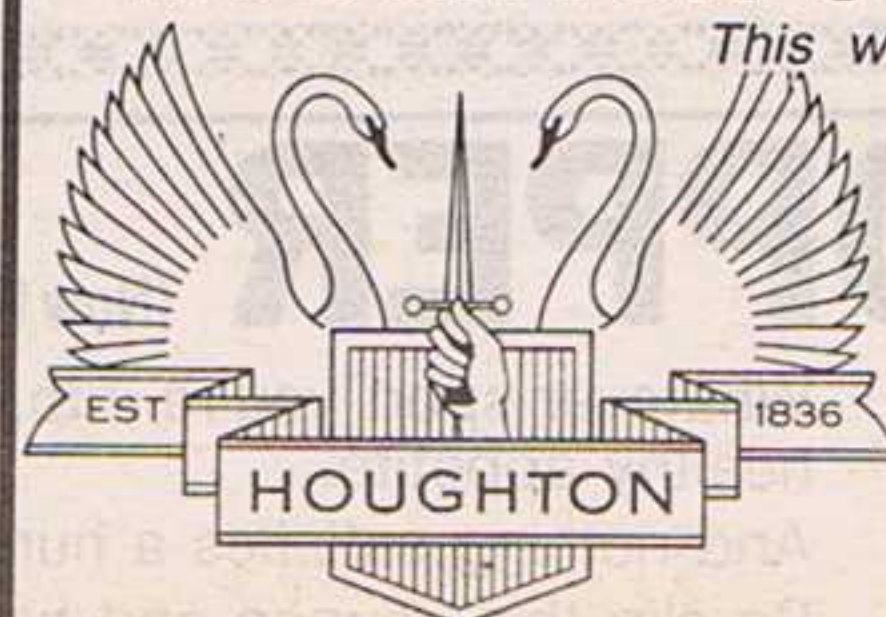

# Ablett the challenge

**Malthouse must curb Super Cat**

THE capacity of West Coast Eagles coach Mick Malthouse to successfully negate dangerous opposition players will be tested to its fullest at Kardinia Park this Saturday against Geelong.

One man stands between the Eagles and a place in the qualifying final and Malthouse will ponder long and hard before settling on the opponent for the game's most remarkable athlete.

The problem-man is Geelong forward Gary Ablett and Malthouse must curb the superstar before the Eagles can claim their highest end-of-season position on the AFL premiership table.

Geelong are far from being a one-man-band, but Ablett is the man who stands between the Eagles and a place in the top three.

Ablett is capable of producing sensational bursts of brilliance and if he decides to have a day out, most defenders are powerless to curb his impact.

But Malthouse has proven something of a tactical genius in his first season with the Eagles, continually nullifying dangerous players in opposition teams and last week's game against the Brisbane Bears was no exception.

### BALL-GETTERS

David Bain and Peter Davidson, two prolific ball-getters for the Bears in lead-up games to Sunday's clash at Carrara, were effectively shut out of the game by David Hart and Steve Malaxos.

And Phillip Walsh, Mike Richardson, John Gastev, Brad Rowe and Brad Hardie were all restricted by the close-checking tactics implemented by Malthouse.

With the defence led superbly by John Worsfold, Murray Rance, Karl Langdon, Michael Brennan and Guy McKenna, the Bears were never really in the hunt, though the Eagles were not impressive.

One of those players will be given the onerous task of minding the mercurial Ablett, who is tall, strong in the air, quick off the mark and uncanny around the goals.

It would be nice to have the special talents of each of those defenders rolled onto one player.

But Malthouse doesn't have such a player at his disposal, so it comes down to a question of who is best suited to the task.

Either Worsfold or McKenna appear the most capable player to eclipse Ab-

let, with perhaps Worsfold getting the job because he has the strength to compete bodily with the Super Cat.

Geelong, runners-up to the mighty Hawthorn in last year's grand final, have been extremely disappointing this season. It is difficult to understand their slide, which was emphasised by a two-point defeat at the hands of Sydney Swans last Saturday.

### LOSSES

The Cats have lost star midfielders Mark Bairstow (back home to Lake Grace) and Andrew Bews, with a serious injury and that has not helped their 1990 cause.

As well, last year's Brownlow Medalist in Paul Couch has come in for closer attention and the Cats method has fallen apart.

Just the same, the Eagles will need to be on their mettle if they are to win this clash and ensure they hold off the challenges for third spot from Melbourne and Hawthorn.

# Bulldogs can shrug off poor form

**SOUTH** Fremantle flew home in the final series to take the lead in the race for a second semi-final berth, only to stumble at the final hurdle.

The Bulldogs were beaten away from home by fifth-placed East Perth and with Swan Districts pipping Claremont at the post, South were relegated to third spot and must now beat East Fremantle in the first semi-final to stay in the running for the premiership.

Head-to-head, Souths hold a 2-1 win/loss ratio over the Sharks this season, but it was East Fremantle who won last start — 18.20 (128) to 10.14 (74), at East Fremantle Oval.

## FAVOURITE NUMBERS

**THE** favourite numbers to watch are 6, 10, 14, 17, 27 and 35.

Maurice Rioli (6) could be the key to the first semi-final. A seasoned performer, he must dominate the centre position against East Fremantle rookie Gary Smallridge, to force the Sharks wide onto the flanks.

Rioli's experience will be crucial, as will that of Craig Edwards (10) and skipper Brad Collard (35).

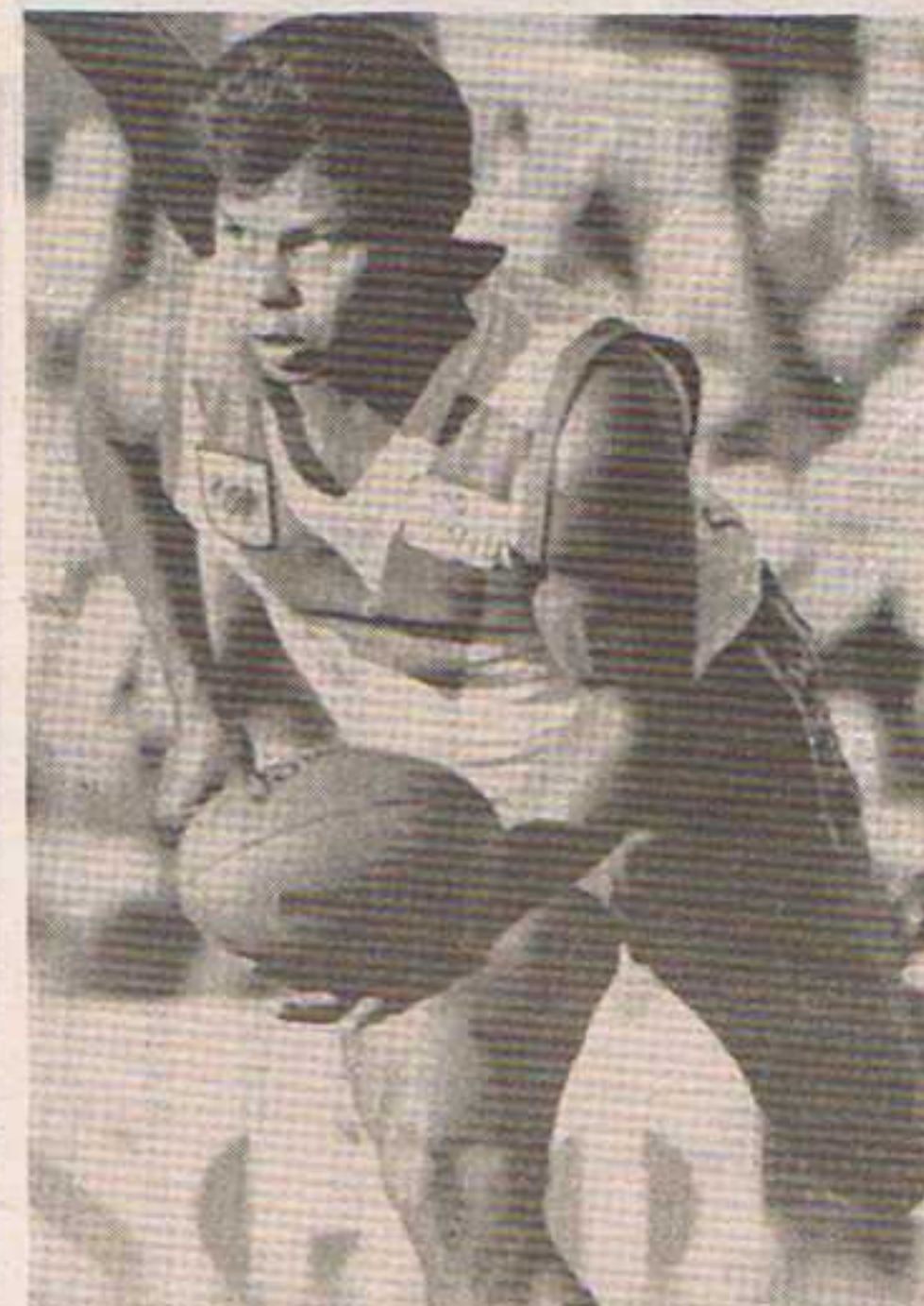
Edwards is the Bulldogs link-man. Souths run the ball through their big man, either out of the backline, in the middle of the ground or up forward.

They appeared in the winner's circle in July when winter dished out some horrible weather and their 14 wins show what they can manage when the track is firmer.

It should be hard and fast this Sunday and Souths band of runners are capable of carrying them over the line, just a nose ahead of their opponents.

## THE ODDS

**THE** unofficial market has South Fremantle at 5/4 on. The Bulldogs have shown this season that they make better use of the ball than East Fremantle.

They have worked harder around the ground and have the added incentive of losing the 1989 grand final — they are determined to go one better in 1990.

Last week's upset loss to East Perth should not be over-rated; it was a blow to their premiership aspirations as it cost them a second semi-final berth, but that's the reason why they will bite back as fierce as ever.

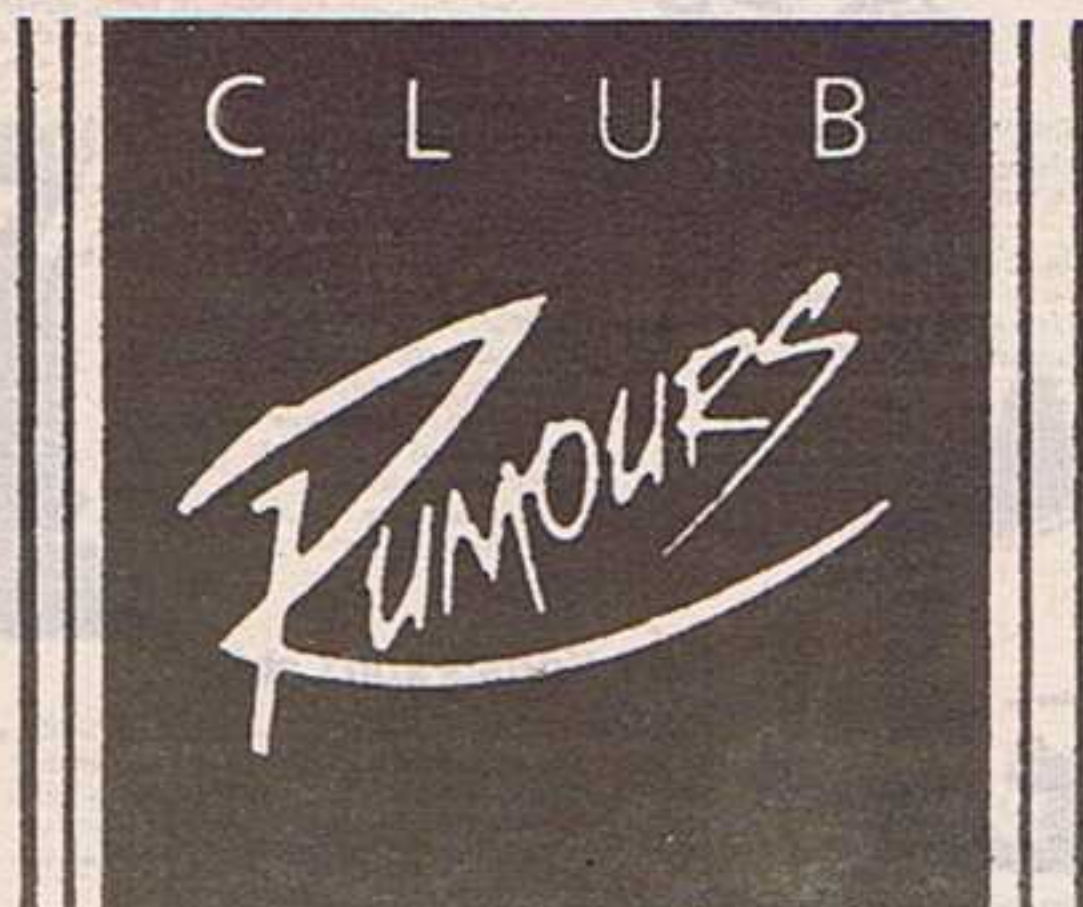

Overlooked by his AFL club, the West Coast Eagles, all season has made Browning that much more determined and at 28 years of age, he is playing the best football of his career.

No. 17 Gary Smallridge has been the find of the season since joining the State League from Sunday football ranks.

After playing in a Sunday League premiership-winning Gosnells side last season and taking the Bowden Medal for the League's fairest and best player, Smallridge has dominated the midfield for the Sharks.

Though he is untested in finals football, his tough, no-nonsense style in the centre and his good disposal into the forward line will make him a valuable contributor.

Skipper George Christie (40) has missed most of the season with injury, but it is no coincidence that the Sharks have won seven out of the eight games that Christie has participated in.

The Sharks have a good blend of youth and experience and as one of the oldest members of the side, Christie's role on a half-back-flank is a vital part of Wilcox's bid for premiership success.

Numbers 15 and 18, John Lawrence and Neil Lester-Smith, are seven years apart in age, but they can be bracketed together as they play the same style of football.

Lawrence regularly works harder up-field, but Lester-Smith, who is never far from goals, is capable of having little influence for half a game, but finishing with six goals for the match.

No. 1 is rover Billy Krakouer, under a slight injury cloud after last week's walk-in-the-park against Perth.

Krakouer has shown his full potential this season and with an abundance of natural ability, he can answer any challenge that the Bulldogs can throw at him.

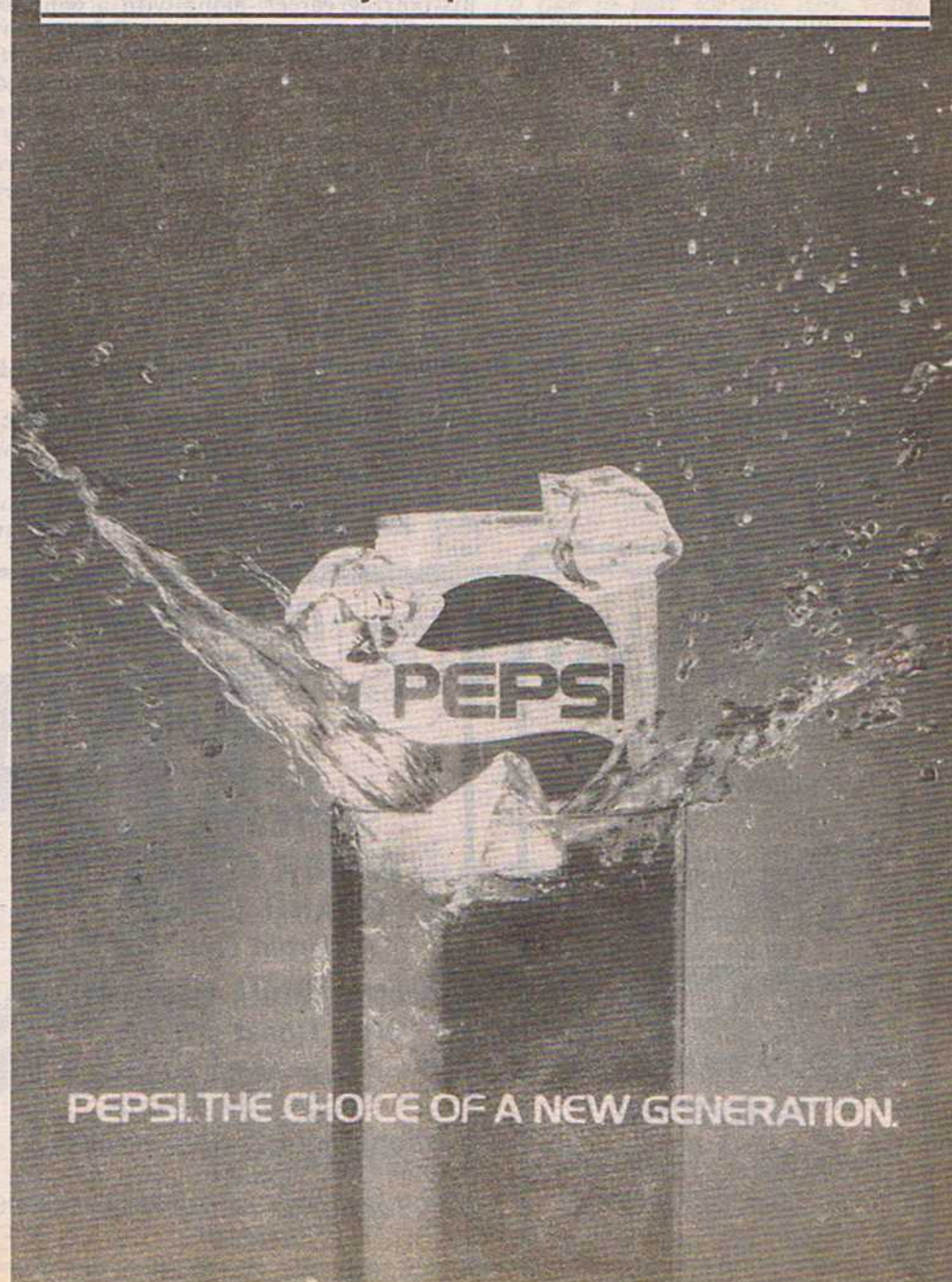

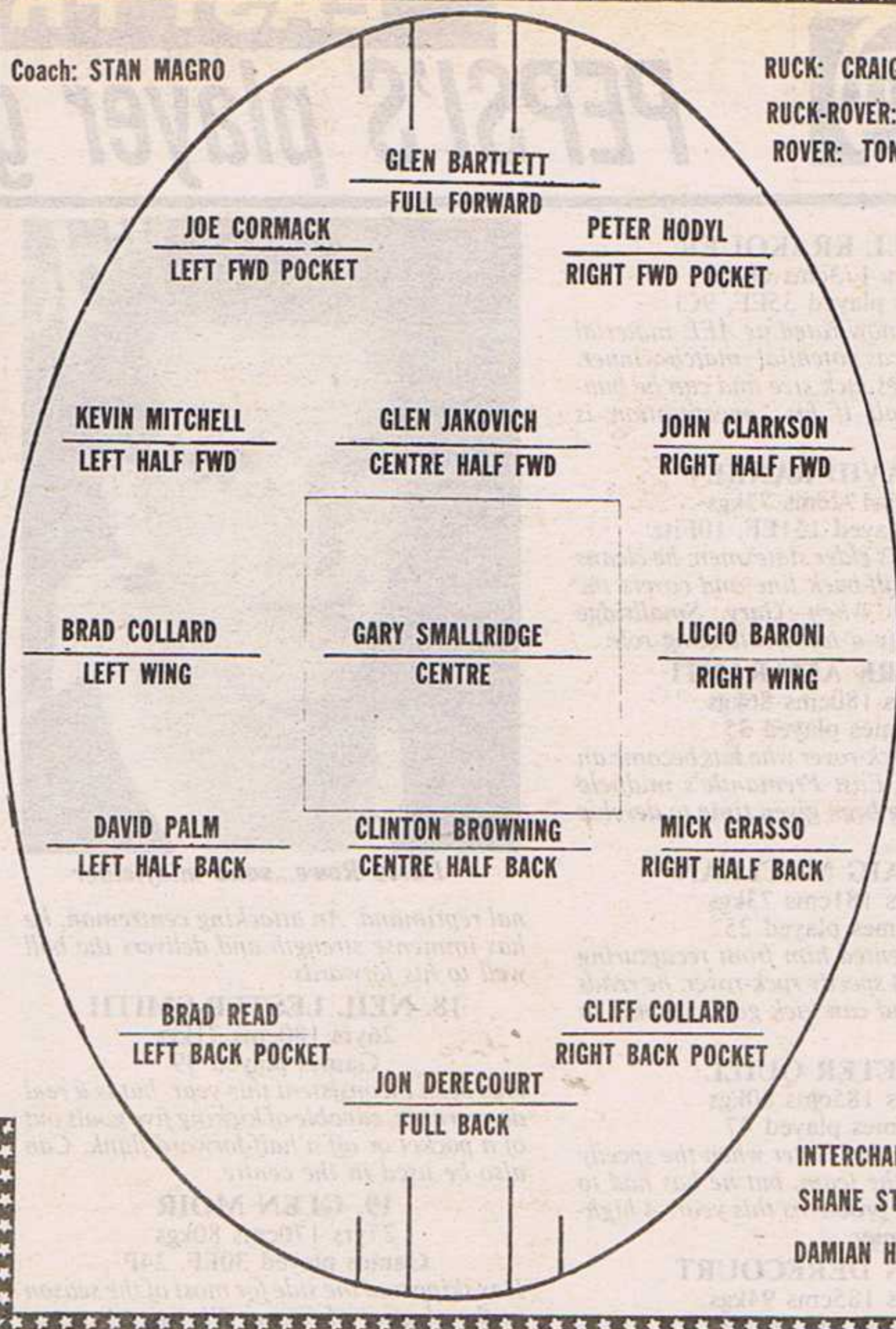

## Taylor's milestone a little different

SUBIACO celebrated skipper Brian Taylor's 200th game last weekend in the best way possible.

Not only did they present Taylor with a win — something the side had failed to do for Clinton Brown, Peter Featherby, Phil Lamb and brother Neil in recent big-game milestone performances — but they rose from the bottom of the ladder and handed West Perth the wooden spoon.

"It was great to have a win," Taylor said after the Lions first victory in 11 games.

"We couldn't have asked for a better way to end the season and it was good to get off the bottom of the ladder with a view to next year."

### BRIGHT FUTURE

The 1985 Simpson Medallist (for his performance in defence against East Fremantle in a losing grand final side) says the future of Subiaco looks bright if the club can hold onto their young players.

"A lot of young guys came through in the last round and we'll be a force again next year if we can hang onto players like Mitchell White, Matthew Burton and Damian Hampson," he said.

On top of his Simpson Medal, Taylor has shared in the individual awards, finishing runner-up in the 1986 Sandover Medal count and collecting the club's fairest-and-best award in 1988.

The slightly built defender, at 29 years of age, isn't confident of his body standing up to another few seasons of punishment on the football field, so he says his brother's games-played record with Subiaco looks pretty safe.

"I need another 60 games and going on my injury rate, I figure I'd have to play another four seasons," Taylor said.

THE Claremont Football Club has won the Rodriguez Shield for the fourth successive year after good performances in all three Pepsi State Football League grades.

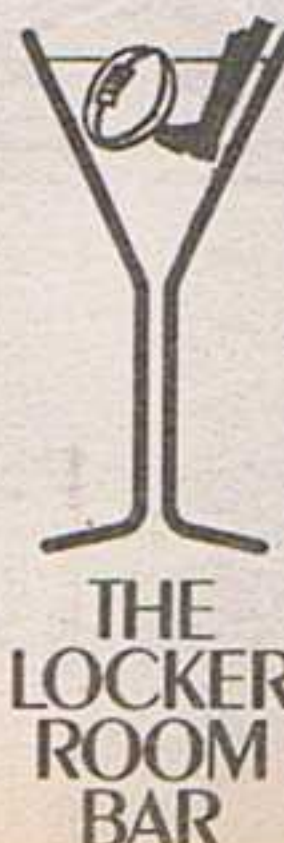

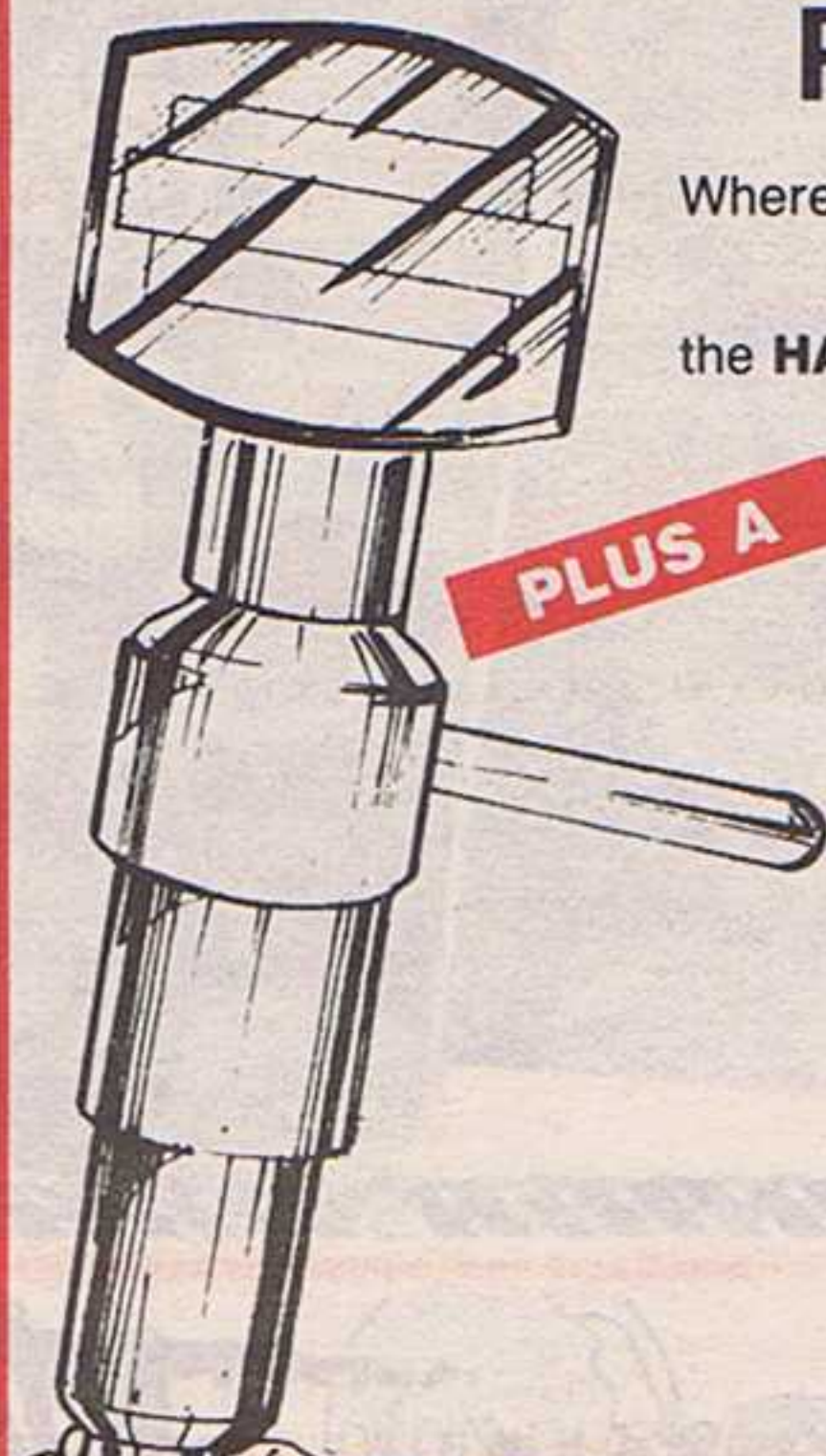

WITH the State League finals kicking off this Sunday, I'm going to change my tip for premiers!

In my pre-season predictions I had tipped East Fremantle to go all the way this year — but after seeing them play Perth last Saturday, I will renege on that.

My tip is now a Claremont-South Fremantle grand final, with the Tigers winning the second semi-final and the flag...again.

The Sharks didn't impress last Saturday and several of their players lack the finals experience to combat the Bulldogs; regardless of last week's respective winning and losing form.

After the interstate clash with South Australia, I decided to reserve judgement on East Fremantle's star rookie Gary Smallridge till finals time.

Last Saturday he wasted the football a lot and I'll be watching him very closely this Sunday. What Smallridge needs to do is concentrate more on his use of the ball, rather than just getting possession as often as he can.

He tends to sink the slipper into the ball instead of looking for options up-field. He should steady and measure his passes.

### GOALSCORER

Neil Lester-Smith, the League's leading goalscorer last season, should be tagged out of the first semi-final. Souths have shown all season that they have him worked out, while Peter Quill is just one Sharks player whose lack of experience will be shown up in the finals.

The Bulldogs have plenty of depth in experience — the Collard brothers, Brad, Cliff and Derek, are all tough customers, while Maurice Rioli and Craig Edwards give them a big edge.

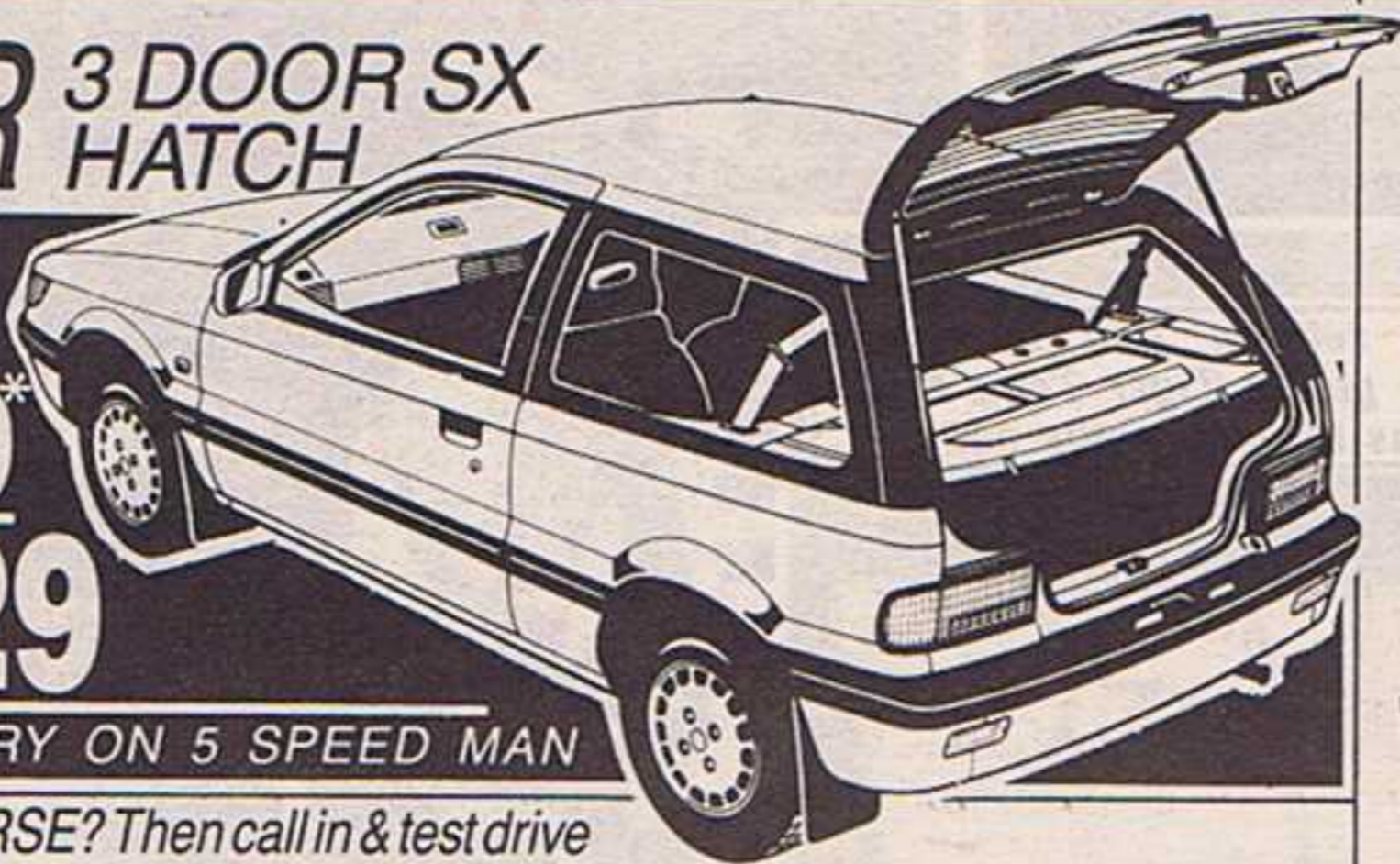

# BULLDOG WITH BITE!

**WESTSIDE FOOTBALL:** How do you feel about South Fremantle's chances in the first semi-final against East Fremantle this Sunday?

**PETER WORSFOLD:** We'll be a good chance because we've worked even harder this year than last season and we're better prepared for the finals because of it. We also lost last year's grand final and want to make amends for that.

**WESTSIDE:** Will it be a close game throughout or will one side capitulate in the second half?

**WORSFOLD:** It will either be close or we'll win by a lot — it will depend how long East Fremantle can stay with us. We are a much stronger side than they are and are better prepared for the finals than them.

**WESTSIDE:** Who will be the toughest side to beat in the finals?

**WORSFOLD:** All the sides will be tough, but Claremont will be harder to beat than the other two.

**WESTSIDE:** Has Stan Magro done anything different this year in an attempt to avoid the grand final fade-out that South suffered last year?

**WORSFOLD:** Not really. He's organised us to be ready for the finals in a similar manner to last year. It's fresh in our minds what happened last year and we're better prepared mentally.

**WESTSIDE:** Are you a better team than you were last year, with the likes of Dean Irving and maybe even Scott Watters and Peter Matera out of the side?

**WORSFOLD:** Yes we are. We're more consistent around the ground and better balanced.

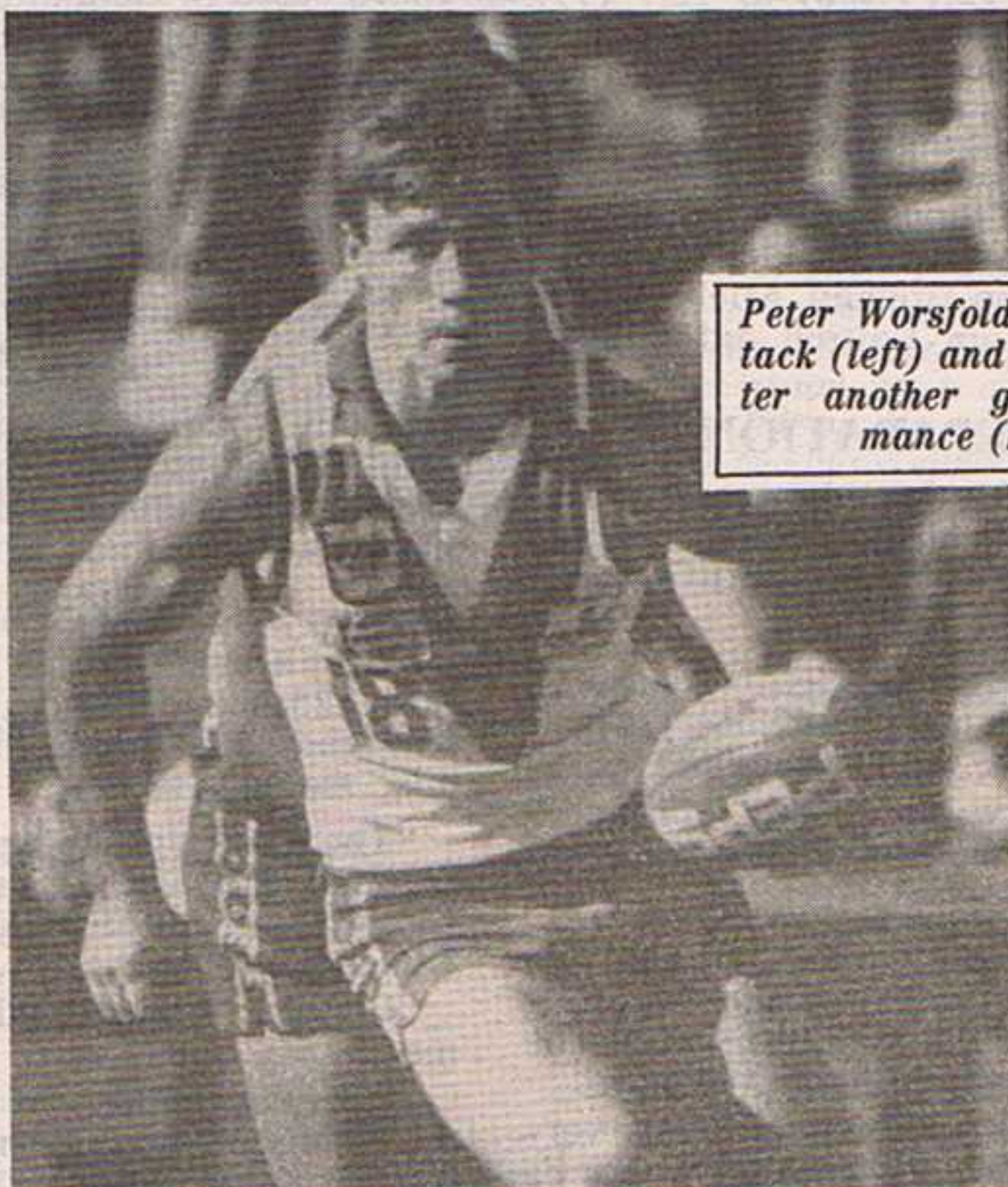
**WESTSIDE:** East Fremantle's big-man division was expected to give them supremacy in the finals in recent years, but it didn't happen. Likewise, do you think Souths could be a bit top-heavy?

**WORSFOLD:** We definitely won't be top-heavy. If Craig Edwards gets on top, that will give us an edge, but we have some good runners too and they are the key to our success.

**WESTSIDE:** What of your role this season; what were your thoughts when Magro shifted you to a half-forward flank and how much work did you put into your goal-shooting?

**WORSFOLD:** When I first started on the half-forward flank last year, I really liked it. But I was also having a run on the ball and couldn't settle. I hadn't been a stationary half-forward until this year and now I've settled a lot better, especially with the help and advice

that Stan gives me. I'm doing a lot of shooting practice, mostly on my own before training, but it hasn't been paying off recently — I've been kicking too many points. I've only got to get it right at the right time for it all to be worth while though, so I'll keep trying.

**WESTSIDE:** You have adapted well and almost forced your way into the State side to play South Australia. Did you ever expect that degree of improvement?

**WORSFOLD:** I wouldn't call it improvement — I've always believed I was good enough and could move up a grade once I got a break. I knew after the experience I gained in previous years that this would be a good year for me. I've put in a lot of hard work — I get to training early to do some extra ball work — so all I needed was the break.

**WESTSIDE:** Your brother John says that he developed his aggressive nature from playing in a losing junior team. He said being aggressive was the only way he could get possession of the ball. Were you a member of the same team, or did you have a similar experience?

**WORSFOLD:** I wasn't in the same team as John, but my team was pretty similar. Every second year we'd get thrashed in most of our games by 30 goals, which wasn't as bad as John's team — they got beat like that every week, year-in-year-out. There weren't a lot of players in my team who were very good and though they'd try, most of the ball-getting was left to just a few players.

**WESTSIDE:** Who have had the greatest influences on your game?

**WORSFOLD:** Definitely my father. He hasn't missed a game and advises me on what I've done wrong. My dad tells me to play the ball, to keep running and to play within my capabilities. John helps a bit and Stan Magro has also had a lot of influence. His ability and

knowledge demands respect and I'm grateful for what he's taught me.

**WESTSIDE:** How do you cope with comparisons between yourself and John?

**WORSFOLD:** That doesn't bother me. There's always going to be a comparison, especially in WA. I enjoy John getting the recognition he deserves — I don't even think about comparisons.

**WESTSIDE:** Have you been approached about a possible draft move into the AFL next season?

**WORSFOLD:** I've had some phone calls and that's all I'll say about that. The phone hasn't been running hot, but there have been a few callers.

**WESTSIDE:** If you can't join John in the Eagles, who would you like to play for?

**WORSFOLD:** I'd like to play for any AFL team. There's no specific club — all I want to do is to play AFL and I'll play for anyone who drafts me.

**WESTSIDE:** What chance is there of a South Fremantle player winning the Sandover Medal?

**WORSFOLD:** It would have to be someone like Cliff Collard for consistency throughout the year if the winner was to come from our club. He's the only bloke who'd have a chance.

**WESTSIDE:** You work with Sherborne ACA; what do they do?

**WORSFOLD:** They're a customs clearance and freight forwarding company. I enjoy working there and if I ever need time off for injury treatment, my boss is very good about it. I appreciate that very much. My ambition is to get a license to be a customs agent — I'm only a customs clerk at this stage — which will take about five years of night school. Any port in Australia is a good place for a customs agency, though Fremantle is probably the nicest place to work in Australia.

# Souths force Swans out of finals

# Ennis finally calls it quits

THE doyen of Western Australia's football trainers, West Perth's Roy Ennis, has officially retired because of ill health.

Ennis (82), who started as a West Perth trainer way back in 1933, actually retired at the end of the 1988 season, but continued on in a voluntary capacity till July this year, when ill-health forced him to give up completely.

### SPECTATOR

The West Perth stalwart has not attended a Falcons game since then — but he plans a return to Leederville Oval next year as a devout spectator.

Up till his illness, Ennis was helping to get the senior players onto the track three nights a week.

"I used to get there at 4pm and get home about 6pm," Ennis said.

Ennis retired as a player in 1926 when an ankle injury forced him onto the sidelines as a 19-year-old, while playing with Mt Hawthorn in the Metro Union (under 19) league.

"I was also the club secretary and first aid man then and had an interest in the St John's Ambulance," Ennis recalled.

### CYCLING

But he didn't go straight into 'training'. Ennis turned his attention to another sport — cycling.

He had a few seasons with the Maylands District Cycling Club before turning professional and joining the City Professional Cycling Club.

"I was never a State Champion or anything, but I won a few road races in my time," Ennis said.

"In the meantime, my friends from Mt Hawthorn had progressed to West Perth B grade football, via the WAFA competition, so I went to Leederville to help them out as a trainer in 1933.

"I never expected to stay there as long as I did."

Ennis was appointed head trainer in 1952 and held that position till his 1988 retirement.

# Motivation comes in many ways

THE subject of motivation is undoubtedly the most popular topic of inquiry from coaches at the offices of the National Australian Football Council.

Towards finals time, in particular, the office receives many telephone calls from coaches seeking ways in which teams and individuals can be encouraged to improve their performances.

Interestingly, many coaches seek the use of a blood and thunder "Rocky" type of video. Obviously, there are still many people unaware that the super hype contained in such presentations can "turn off" nearly as many players as they "turn on".

In fairness, it is only reasonably recent research which informs us that introverted personality types can be disadvantaged by what is commonly known as "hype" — and that generally extroverts are the only ones helped in such situations.

### KNOWLEDGE

With this reasonably new knowledge at our disposal, how many disappointing finals performances can be attributed to incorrect pre-match preparation of the various personality types.

There is one thing for sure — the old days of coaches sitting their 20 players down and literally screaming their guts out in front of them are gone forever.

In this context I have had several illuminating conversations over the past few years with some of Australian

# Knuckey takes the challenge

SOME people will do just about anything for junior football — at least, Mike Knuckey will.

The Elders Pastoral Mid West regional development officer will put his stamina to the test early next month when he begins a 500km run, all in the name of junior development.

Knuckey, a joint football and cricket coach based in Geraldton, will jog out of Carnarvon on Sunday, September 2, heading for Geraldton in an effort to raise money towards his programme.

football's most illustrious performers — all recognised as being in the introverted personality group.

Three of them came from clubs who were coached by very high-profile "super coaches" credited with the blood and guts, finger-prodding, table-slaming approach.

All three said they were totally turned off by such antics and found it difficult to perform to their satisfaction, especially early in the game.

Care should also be exercised in the motivation of the more outgoing types, especially with extreme hype.

### EVIDENCE

There is evidence aplenty that working up such players can result in them being over-anxious — over-running the ball, miskicking and even getting themselves reported early in the game.

Some coaches are even dividing their charges into appropriate groups before a big game. Obviously this can be inconvenient, but many believe it is effective.

Components based on the latest findings will be included in the upgraded "Psychology of Coaching" videotape which will be produced by the NAFC shortly. Some of these topics are Goal Setting, Relaxation Techniques, Reducing Anxiety, Mental Rehearsal and Imagery and Self Talk.

### MARKING THE BALL

THERE'S one sure, safe way to gain possession of the football — mark it!

And there are many ways to mark the ball, but the safest is undoubtedly the chest mark.

There are several very important points to keep in mind when it comes to marking on your chest.

\* Keep your eyes on the ball and line your body up with the flight of the ball.

\* Tuck your elbows into your stomach and extend your fingers and palms outwards — but keep your hands pointing a little sideways so you don't do some finger damaged.

\* Capture the ball in your arms and hug it into your chest; bringing one of your knees up underneath to stop it falling right through.

Overhead marking is naturally much harder.

You have to stretch your arms up above your head, keep your eye on the ball — and don't duck your head at the last moment.

Try to leap off the ground with one foot, lifting the knee to protect yourself.

The ball should be gripped firmly in the fingers, rather than trying to grab it with the hands.

## Schoolboys finish fourth

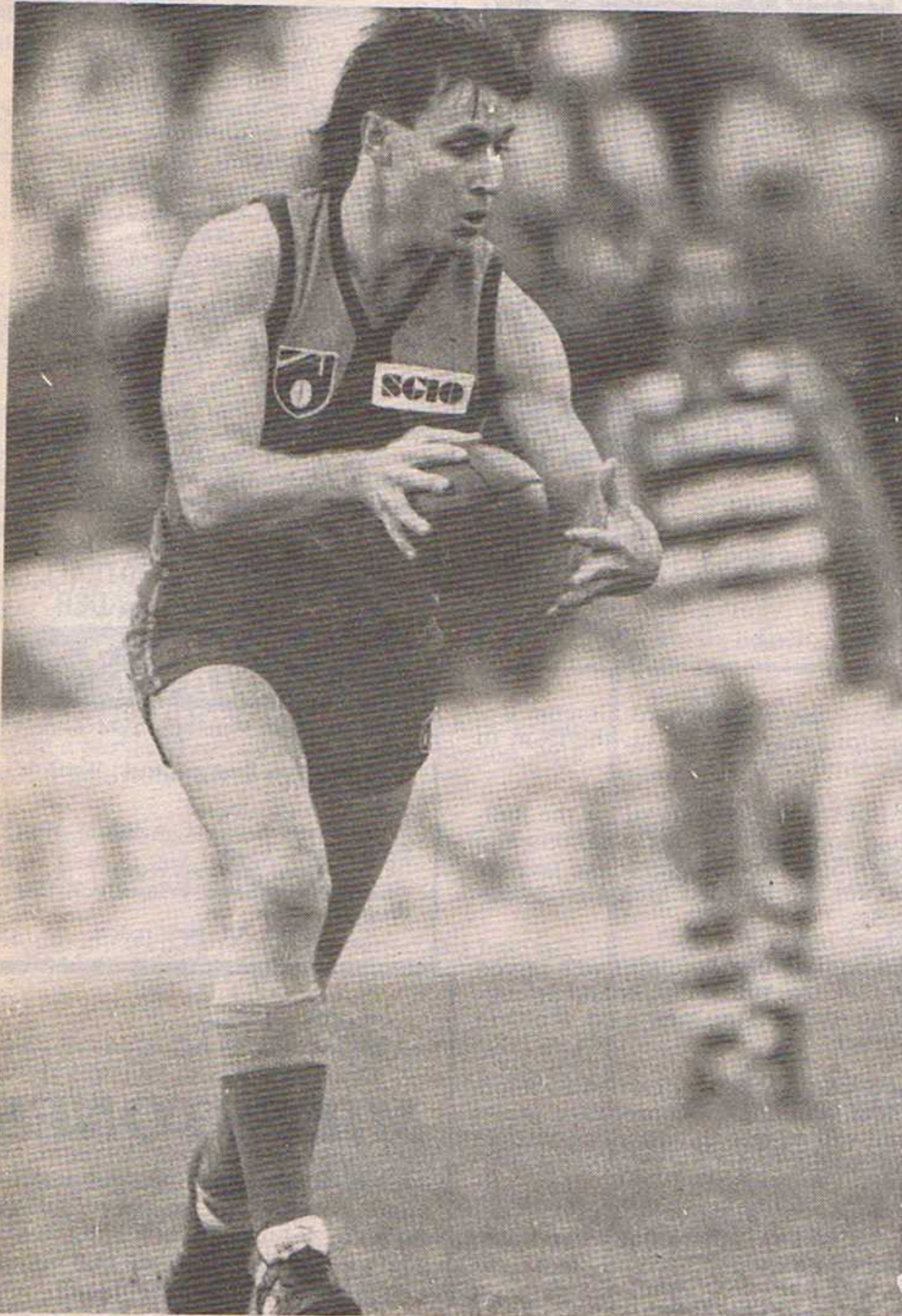

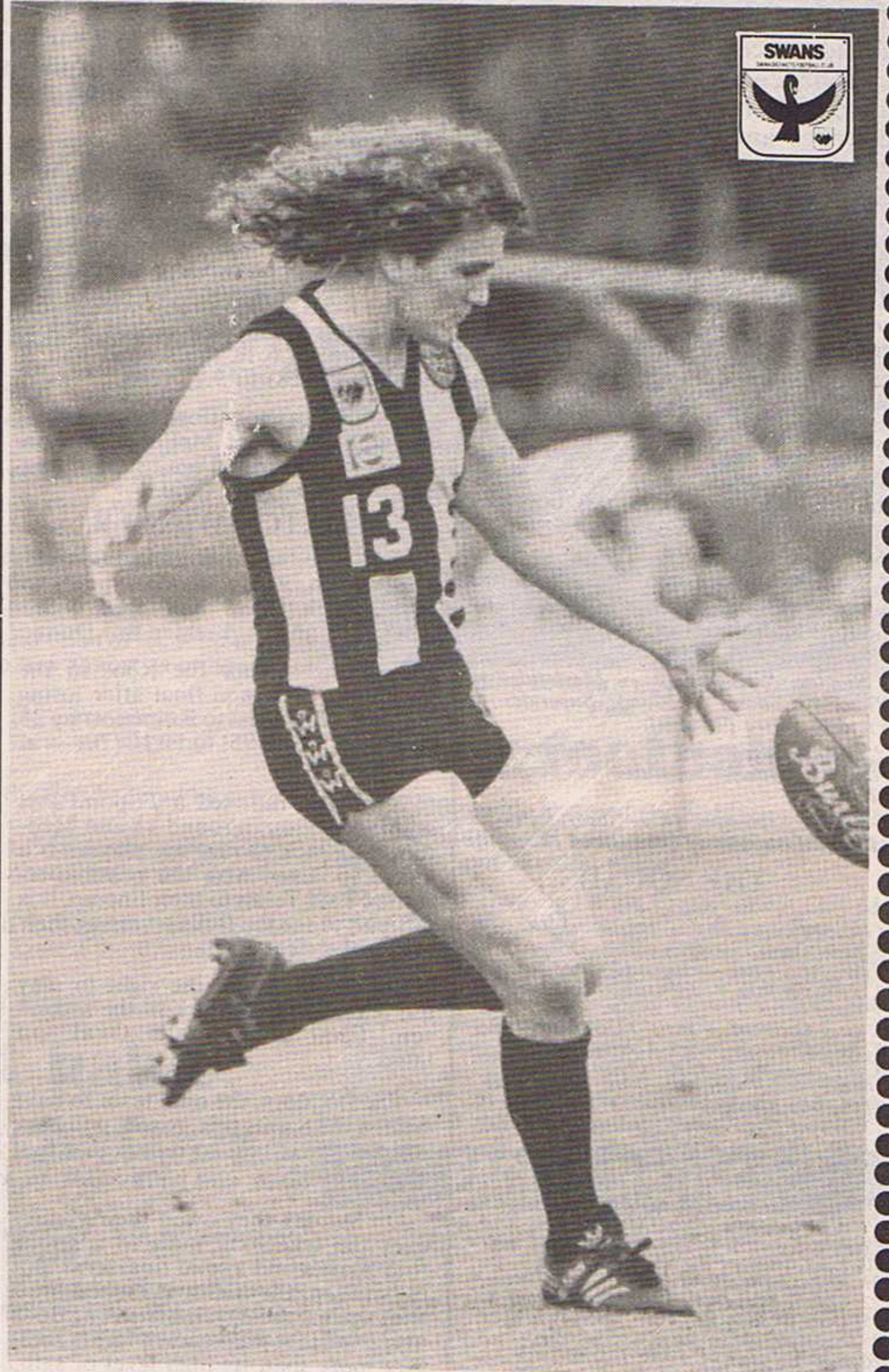

## ELBOW

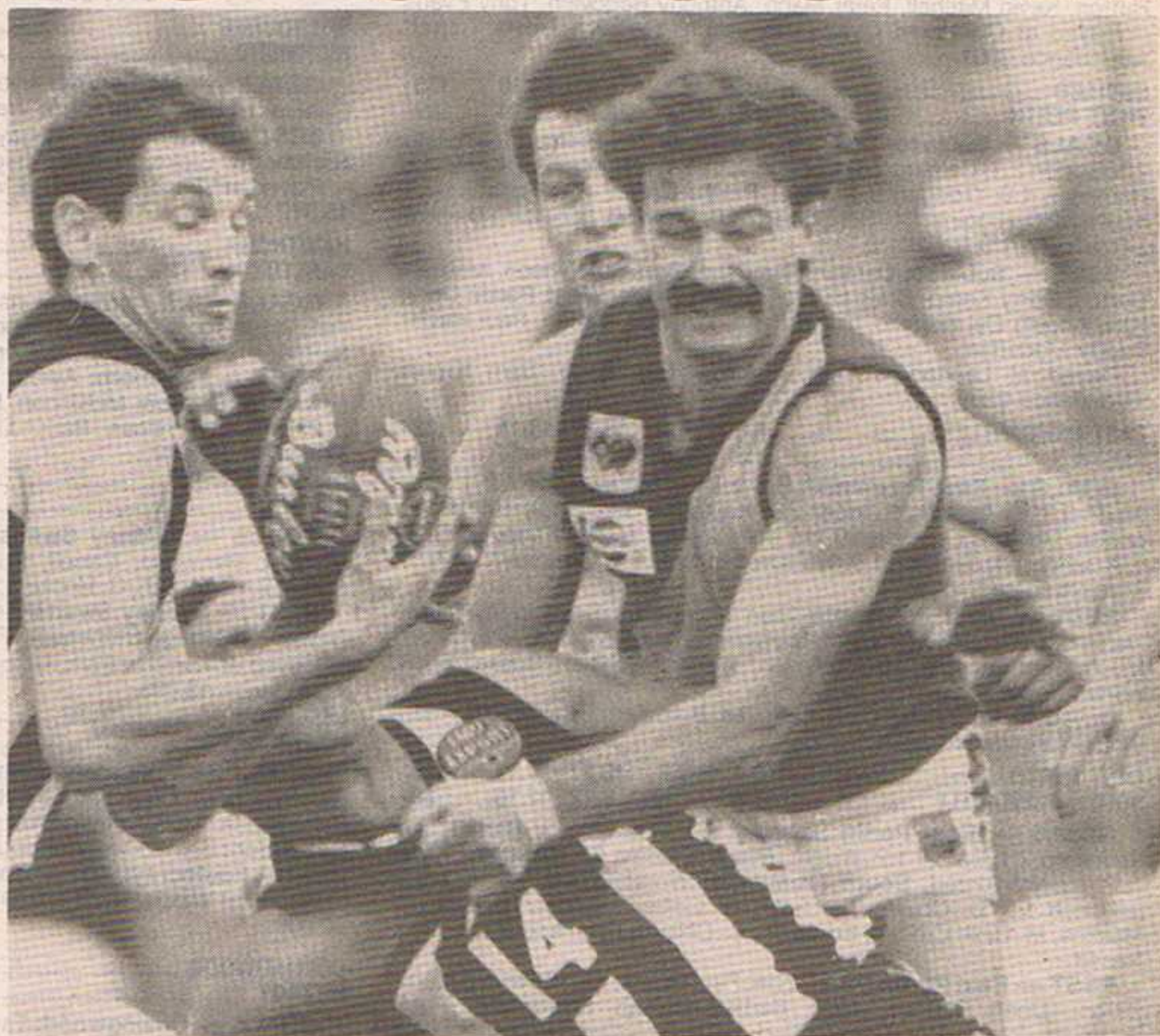
