

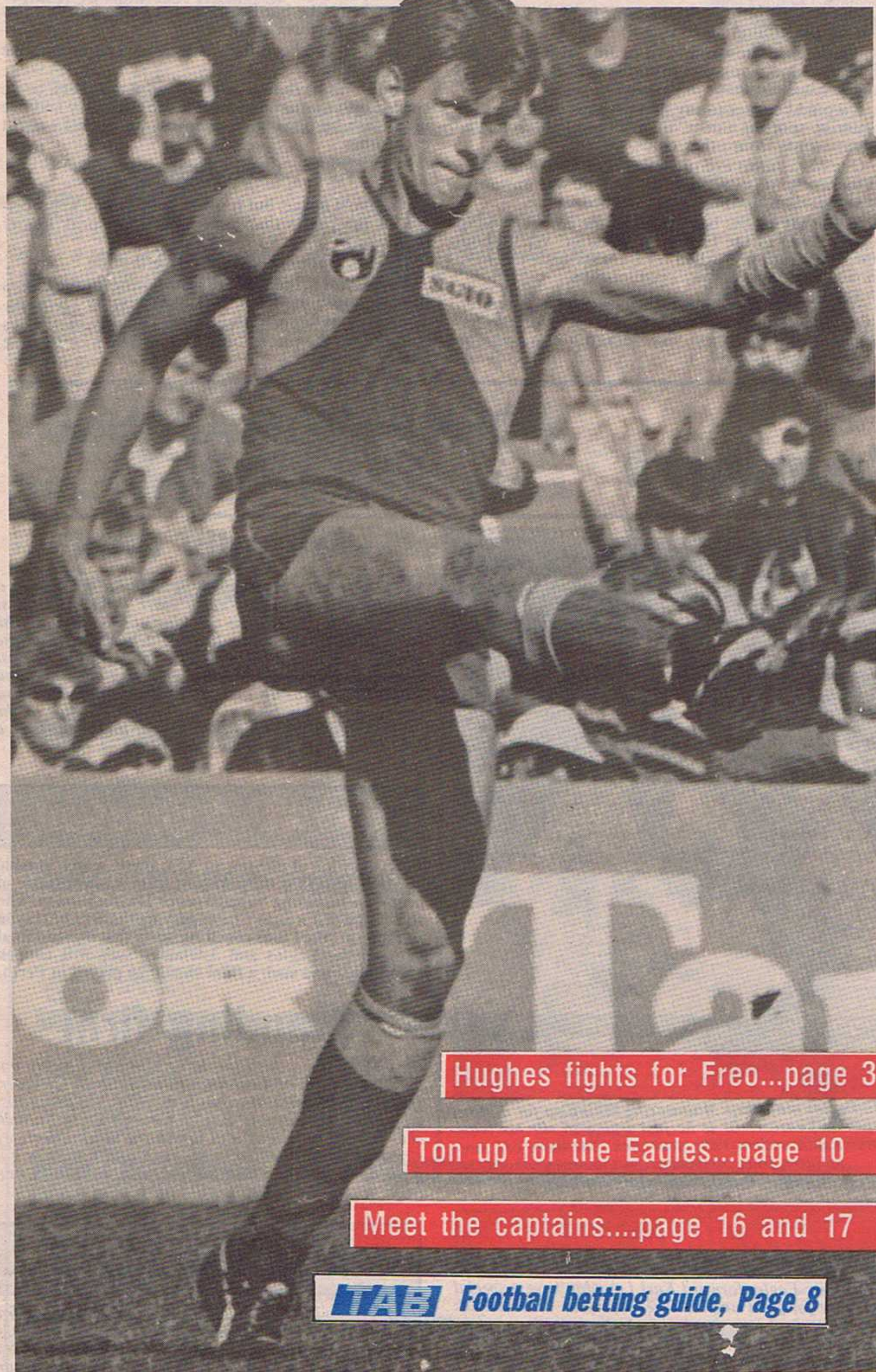

BOMBS AWAY



GIANT West Coast Eagles ruckman Dean Irving may well find himself on a strict diet of raw meat over the next couple of days.

And he shouldn't be surprised if coach Mick Malthouse takes every opportunity to poke him with a sharp stick in the lead-up to the game against Essendon.

The plan for the Eagles will be to make the powerful young ruckman charge onto the unfriendly Windy Hill ground this Saturday feeling as angry as a wounded bull.

If the Eagles are to shoot the Bombers down in flames they need Irving in a savage frame of mind to take on one of the greatest ruckmen in the history of Australian football — Essendon's 355-game champion Simon Madden — in the clash of the AFL's only two undefeated teams.

Transforming Irving from a gentle giant into an aggressive giant-killer is a priority for the West Coasters as they attempt to stretch their winning run to seven consecutive victories.

The Eagles don't need reminding that Madden has the potential to take control in the ruck at the centre bounce downs, thus bringing his ground level teammates into the game. There's been ample evidence of just that in the previous eight games between the two clubs.

At 33, Madden may be ageing and he may carry the battle scars of 18 seasons of top Victorian football, but he is still a tough, fearless and dangerous competitor.

But the 22-year-old Irving will be under instructions to throw all of his 200cm, 105kg bulk into Madden and fellow Bomber giant Paul Salmon whenever the opportunity arises. Hawthorn ruckmen Paul Dear and Steve Lawrence had a sample of the more aggressive Irving approach when the Eagles thrashed the Hawks by 82 points at Princes Park last week.

Some critics claim the Eagles ruck division is its Achilles heel and could stand in the way of the club's first premiership. A decisive victory over Madden and Salmon by Irving might just change that mode of thought.

So what if Essendon have been playing with a seconds side? So what if the Melbourne media are down-playing the Bombers winning streak? So what if the Eagles are being pumped up as the team to beat for the AFL premiership?

The fact is, matches still have to be won. And no amount of huffing and puffing is going to give a team four premierships points.

They may have half their senior list injured, but Essendon have still won six on the trot.

They obviously have a lot of depth.

INJURIES

The Eagles have some notable injuries too. How would they be with Laurie Keene, Mark Hepburn, Scott Watters and Phil Scott available?

An Eagles win will no doubt see the bleating from the East become even louder. They are already claiming that the Eagles have a State side.

But what if the Eagles lose?

It won't be the end of the season.

Quite frankly Mick, I don't see your rationale in saying the media has taken a lot of pressure off

Essendon coach Kevin Sheedy.

It's an old adage, but it could not be more appropriate for the Eagles than now — actions speak louder than words.

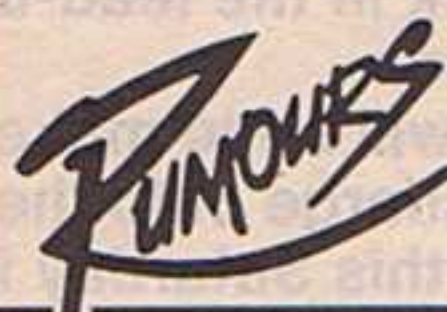
The Eagles don't have to prove a thing.

Advantage is no help

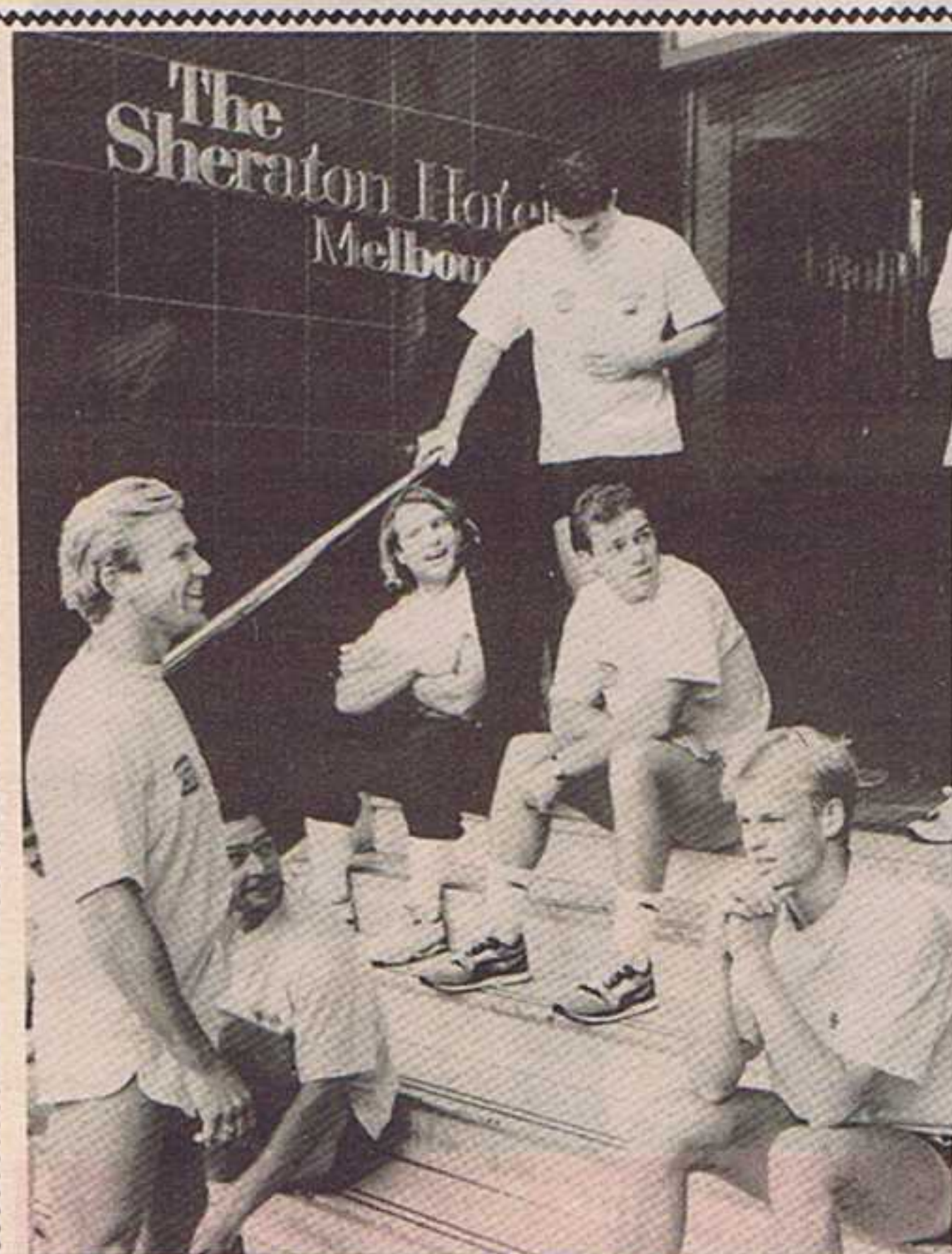

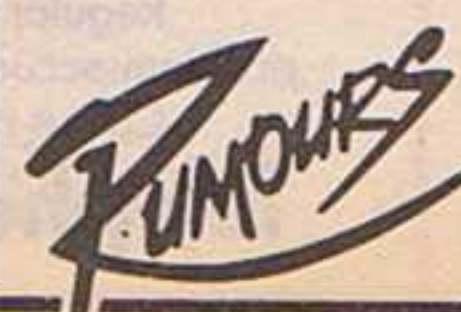

HUGHES SAYS FREO COULD COPE

FOCAL POINT

with **ROBBIE BURNS**



BILL Hughes, South Fremantle's energetic president and champion of anything remotely Fremantle-ish, is hopping mad after reading the WA Football Commission's task force recommendations on a second WA-based AFL team.

Hughes was pleased the task force recognised the need to have the team based in Fremantle and that the club's name should incorporate the word "Fremantle".

But he is furious at the recommendation that the team's home games should be played either at Subiaco Oval or the WACA Ground.

"The very thought of a Fremantle team playing its home games anywhere but in Fremantle is unthinkable — it would be like telling the New York Yankees they have to be based in Detroit," is Hughes' adamant response.

"Yes, I admit to being parochial when it comes to Fremantle, but with good reason. Football is synonymous with this town. We produce the best footballers in the State and we have the most vocal and well-informed fans.

SIGNIFICANT

"On top of that, Fremantle is the most historically and culturally significant centre in WA and it's the most thriving. It's vibrant, it's living, even in these times of recession. The Tourist Commission has found that 91 percent of visitors to WA want to come to Fremantle.

"Football is an integral part of the city's culture and Fremantle Oval is the centre of that culture."

"It's only fair that Fremantle should benefit from any financial spin-off that a Fremantle-based team produces. We don't want those benefits going north of the river.

Hughes says his strong stand on having home games played at Fremantle Oval is not based purely on sentiment.

"We can revamp Fremantle Oval so

that it will comfortably accommodate a crowd of 35,000 and we believe we can do it at relatively low cost," he said.

"We are meeting with architects this week and they will be giving us preliminary plans and cost estimates for the changes needed to the ground.

"We also have the verbal backing of the Fremantle City Council and expect to have their written support within the week. We successfully handled hundreds of thousands of people during the America's Cup, so the city is well geared to take any crowds an AFL match would produce."

But where would a second WA-based team leave South Fremantle?

Would it be seen as sell-out of the club Hughes' father, the late W.J. "Dooza" Hughes, spent a life-time working to build up.

"No, on the contrary, my father would see it as another progressive step in the life of football in Fremantle," Hughes said.

"He would expect it. South Fremantle and the other clubs would feed players into a Fremantle team. It is hoped the AFL would make provision for the nucleus of the club's players to come from this area."

Don't write off the Demons

EAGLES fans who discounted Melbourne as being a 1991 AFL danger will have to think again, according to expatriate West Aussie Earl Spalding.

Spalding says Melbourne's embarrassing 13-goal loss to West Coast in the opening round was not a true indication of the team's worth; a fact underlined several times since then with some courageous performances.

"We may have gone in against the Eagles with a slightly under-done side," said Spalding. "And our attitude certainly wasn't as good as what it was last season.

"You have to really be on the ball to do well at Subiaco. They play the ground so well and if you're second to the ball, you're going to get carved up."

FREEDOM

Spalding, in his fifth season in Victoria, produced one of his best games recently when they over-ran Carlton. He started in defence against the inform fellow West Australian Jon Dorotich, but later revelled in the freedom of centre-half-forward in the final three quarters.

"It's good to come from behind and win games like that," he said. "We realise we are good enough. It's a matter of getting our attitude right.

"When you're playing well and the side is balanced it's good to play up forward," he adds, mindful of that fact that his goal-scoring needs to straight up a little.

Melbourne coach John Northey agrees that Spalding is better off in attack.

"He's more suited to a forward line position where he can show the flair he's got," says Northey. "He gives us a target to look for, particularly when he moves around a lot and wears his opponent out."

Spalding said he and fellow Melbourne players were inspired by the victory over Carlton, especially the example of Simon Eishold, who played the whole match out, despite breaking his thumb in the first quarter.

The Demons finished the game with 16 fit players and the courageous performance has set the pattern for some tough performances since then.

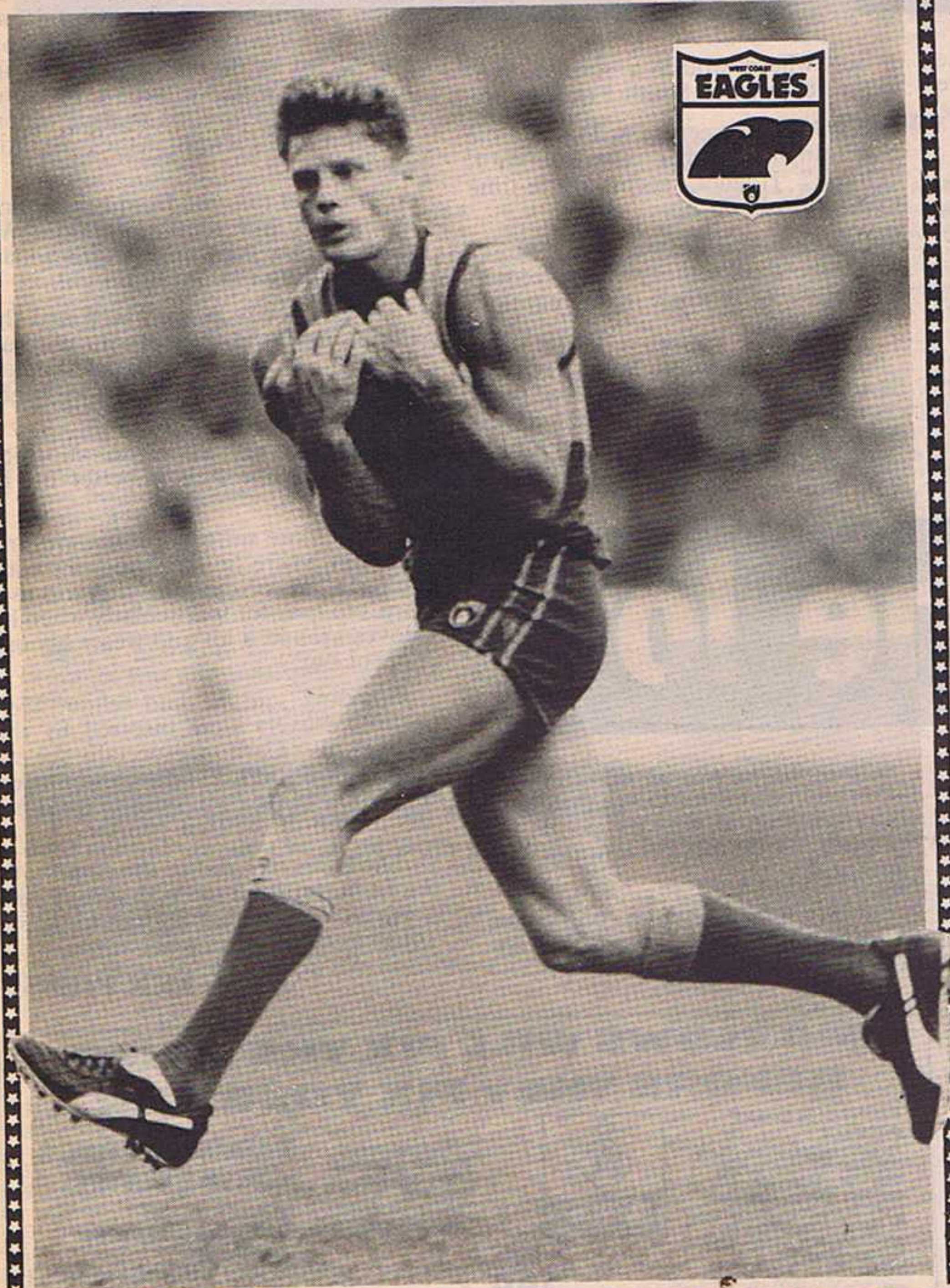

IT'S like music to my ears when the Victorians bleat about how strong the Eagles are.

Collingwood, Essendon, Carlton and Hawthorn reckon the system has been fixed to give the Eagles an unfair advantage.

It's interesting that the bleating is coming from the traditional top-of-the-ladder clubs, not those who are struggling. They obviously feel their power is being threatened.

You never hear the big four complain that teams such as the Bears, Richmond and Fitzroy are too weak and don't provide enough hard competition. And there's little effort by the big clubs to help rivals like North Melbourne, the Tigers or the Lions re-establish themselves.

Salary cap can be by-passed

THE SALARY cap was introduced to try and even out the competition — and up to a point, it has worked.

However, there are ways of getting around this salary restriction, indicated by the number of players who still leave a bottom club to join a top club.

Clubs with a strong sponsorship base can get away with a lot more than weaker clubs and there are more perks for players at top clubs than the average footy fan could ever begin to comprehend.

Players are given jobs by sponsors, but never have to turn up to work, or receive payment for promotional work that is never done.

If there is a way around a salary cap, football clubs will find it.

A big day at the Park

RUMOURS abounded before last week's game that Hawthorn had really set themselves up to knock the Eagles off their perch and it was always going to be a tough assignment at Princes Park.

The result was a real credit to the players total team commitment and discipline for four quarters.

The Eagles kicked their highest score for the season and broke that 20-goal barrier for coach Mick Malthouse.

In doing so, they disproved the theory that the Eagles have only one avenue to goal in Peter Sumich. There were 10 goal-scorers last Saturday with Suma kicking 2.5 and having a hand in four others.

Debutant Ryan Turnbull, who started on the interchange bench, transferred his good WAFL form into the AFL arena when he went onto the ground during the second term.

Ryan supplemented the team's versatility by playing in the ruck, centre-half-forward and centre-half-back and he will remember his No.1 encounter with the Hawks.

Improved facilities

THE Eagles players had the use of the Carlton changerooms and facilities at Princes Park last Saturday, which was much appreciated by the players — especially the spa after the game.

All of the lockers have names on them, right down to trainers and the coach.

When the Eagles moved into the rooms, runner Rob Wiley moved swiftly past the runner's locker and took up residence for the day in the coach's locker...seem's old habits die hard for the former Perth coach.

Strong support base

IT'S great to see a huge increase this year in the Eagles Melbourne based membership, which is up around the 500 mark after sitting on 100 last year.

Many of those supporters ventured back to the Hotel Marquis in Fitzroy for trophy presentations after last week's game and it was packed to the bar.

Two of the visitors there were David Hynes parents, who had travelled to Melbourne by bus to see David play for the first time. The former South Australian produced the goods, kicking three goals from centre-half-forward...but missed an absolute sitter in the final term.

He is part of the old school of football, but his lateral and progressive thinking has enabled him to stay in touch with modern trends. You could say Merv has the best qualities of both eras.

While he's an easy-going sort of bloke, he's far from being a "yes" man. He will continue to make a strong contribution to football.

Salmon targets the Eagles again

THEY call him the 'Big Fish' and this Saturday Essendon's Paul Salmon is aiming to weigh in with yet another big performance against the West Coast Eagles.

Salmon has helped tip the scales in the Bombers favour seven out of eight times the two sides have met and no-one would dispute the fact that he has been the difference between the teams, both at home and away.

News that the gentle giant was under a slight injury cloud with a corked thigh early this week would have been closely monitored by the Eagles hierarchy in recent days.

The ruckman-cum-forward exerted his ascendancy over the Eagles in their inaugural clash against the Bombers at Windy Hill in April, 1987 and who could forget that night at the WACA Ground 13 rounds later when he won the game for the Bombers with an 11-goal performance at full-forward.

CASUALTIES

Mark Zanotti, Michael Brennan and Michael O'Connell can vouch for the might of that match-winning performance and that list of defender casualties has grown over recent seasons.

"My form against West Coast has been pretty good," said a guarded Salmon at the weekend.

"If I can play well and the team goes well, then that's great and hopefully I'll be able to continue the form I've shown against the Eagles."

At a towering 206cm and 104kg, there are few players in the AFL capable of stopping Salmon in full-flight and Brennan, Lockyer or maybe rookie Ryan Turnbull could be given the job against him on Saturday.

He knows how to dominate in the ruck, in the air and in front of goals and finding a minder for him will be high on the agenda for coach Mick Malthouse and his selectors.

Salmon was a thorn in the side of Carlton last Saturday when he did the bulk of the ruck work in the first half against Justin Madden, allowing Bombers coach Kevin Sheedy to use Simon Madden at full-forward and later in defence to curb the influence of Carlton's Stephen Kernahan.

INFLUENTIAL

Madden and Salmon are the most influential ruck combination around and with more than 480 games between them, they complement each other perfectly.

"I've been playing on the ball a lot more this season, whereas Simon did most of the ruck work last season," said Salmon, though he dismissed the suggestion that this may be a sign of the changing of the guard at Windy Hill with Madden now heading for his 34th birthday.

"We have still been alternating through the forward line — nothing has changed in the last two or three years...and I think Simon has got another couple of seasons in him yet."

Salmon says his team has been impressed with what they have seen of the Eagles this year and they are determined to end the visitors unbeaten run while they have a home-ground advantage.

"We just have to do well against them on Saturday because we come up against them at Subiaco Oval later in the year and we are expecting that to be very tough," he said.

"With today's technology we are fortunate enough to see quite a bit of the Eagles and all the boys got together at our hotel in Brisbane after our game against the Bears and saw their display against Geelong...in between naps that is.

"They look like they have got a very good team and that seems to be their strength, their overall strength as a team.

"We obviously respect every opponent and we'll go into the game with a level of confidence knowing that we can do well against them. Essendon have a pretty good record against them and we want that to continue."

Eagles boost scoring records

SATURDAY'S game against Hawthorn saw the West Coast Eagles record both their highest score and greatest winning margin over the Hawks. It was also the Hawks lowest score versus the Eagles.

The win gave the Eagles a 4-3 record over Hawthorn and two wins from three matches against them in Victoria (all at Princes Park).

West Coast's record against all opponents at Princes Park is now three wins from seven matches.

Winning the first six games of 1991 has given West Coast their best winning sequence. The most consecutive wins previously was five, recorded in rounds 18-22, 1988 and equalled in rounds 15-19, 1990.

IN making his AFL debut against Hawthorn, Ryan Turnbull became the 66th individual to play a League game for West Coast.

He is the 15th Claremont player to represent the Eagles; clearly the biggest representation of any WAFL club. The next highest is Subiaco with 10, while the lowest is Perth with three.

ST KILDA'S 131-point win over Adelaide was the biggest winning margin in the club's history.

It is only the third time the Saints have won a game by 100 points plus, whereas they have been beaten 37 times by that margin.

The record margin came against new AFL team, the Adelaide Crows and St Kilda make a habit of setting records in "first" games.

The previous record of 110 points was set in Round 2, 1970, when St Kilda were playing as visitors for the first time at the Junction Oval (Fitzroy were playing their first home game there) a ground which had been their home 1897-1964.

Tony Lockett kicked 12 goals for the third time in his career at Moorabbin on Saturday.

Previously he had done so in Round 4, 1987 (in a

losing side) versus Melbourne at the MCG and in Round 9, 1989 versus West Coast at Moorabbin.

By kicking three goals against Carlton, Essendon veteran Simon Madden broke John Coleman's record of 537 goals for the Bombers.

Coleman, a true full-forward, scored his goals in 98 games, while Madden the ruckman has played 355 games.

Winning the first six games of 1991 means that Essendon have had their best start to a season since 1962, when they won their first seven matches and went on to win the premiership.

WEST Coast managed to increase their already high percentage when they beat Hawthorn by 82 points.

It is now 206 percent and only one side, Essendon in 1898, has ever finished a home and away season with a percentage of over 200 — it was 202.1%.

In the last 60 years only Essendon (1950), Melbourne (1955), Collingwood (1966) and Hawthorn (1971 and 1989) have finished with a percentage higher than 150.

WEST Coast remain the only team to have won after a bye this season. Richmond became the fourth side to have lost after their week off.

THIS coming Saturday West Coast play at Windy Hill for the fifth successive season...and they are yet to win there.

The Eagles have lost their last five games against Essendon, by a combined total of 287 points. Their only win against the Bombers was by 99 points at the WACA Ground in Round 2, 1988.

Have you heard...

EAGLES full-forward Peter Sumich is leading in the Sunday Age player-of-the-year award, which has a Dunk Island holiday courtesy of Australian Airlines as the major prize. In addition to \$1000 in spending money, Sumich could also make a clean sweep of the Melbourne newspaper's awards — he has his eyes on the AFL goalkicking honours, which carries a holiday at Brampton Island, plus another \$1000.

GEELONG'S West Australian country champion Mark Bairstow is an early favourite for this year's Brownlow Medal. The Sandover Medallist from Lake Grace has made a triumphant return to the Cats this season and has shortened from a 40/1 price to favourite at 14/1. The best Eagle is Peter Sumich at 50/1.

ESSENDON veteran Simon Madden has added another record to his imposing career. After breaking club legend Dick Reynolds' long-standing games played record of 320 games, he has now put another Bombers legend behind him. Last week was Madden's 355th senior game — and when he kicked his third goal for the match, he passed the tally of 537 which has stood as Essendon's record, credited to the great John Coleman.

ADELAIDE Crows coach Graham Cornes wasn't angry at his players after their humiliating 131-point loss to St Kilda last week. In fact, he said that he was frustrated because he couldn't get out there and do it himself. "There is a time and place for ranting and raving and accusation and it wasn't today," he said after the loss.

WHATEVER happened to former Claremont utility player Grant Povey, an early choice in the national draft after the inception of the AFL? Well, he didn't quite make it at Carlton, but he has not only successfully moved to the VFA, playing with Brian Taylor at Prahran, but he has carved out a career in the Melbourne media. One of his roles is as a special reporter for the Sunday Herald-Sun and last week he bobbed up with a feature article on whatever happened to...and his subject was former WA and Geelong champion Gary Malarkey.

BRISBANE Bears coach Robert Walls is singing the praises of his much-improved side and tips that a big win isn't that far away. After the Bears wilted in the closing minutes last Saturday to give Melbourne a late victory, Walls said that he thought his players played their hearts out and didn't get the result they deserved.

City derby has lot at stake

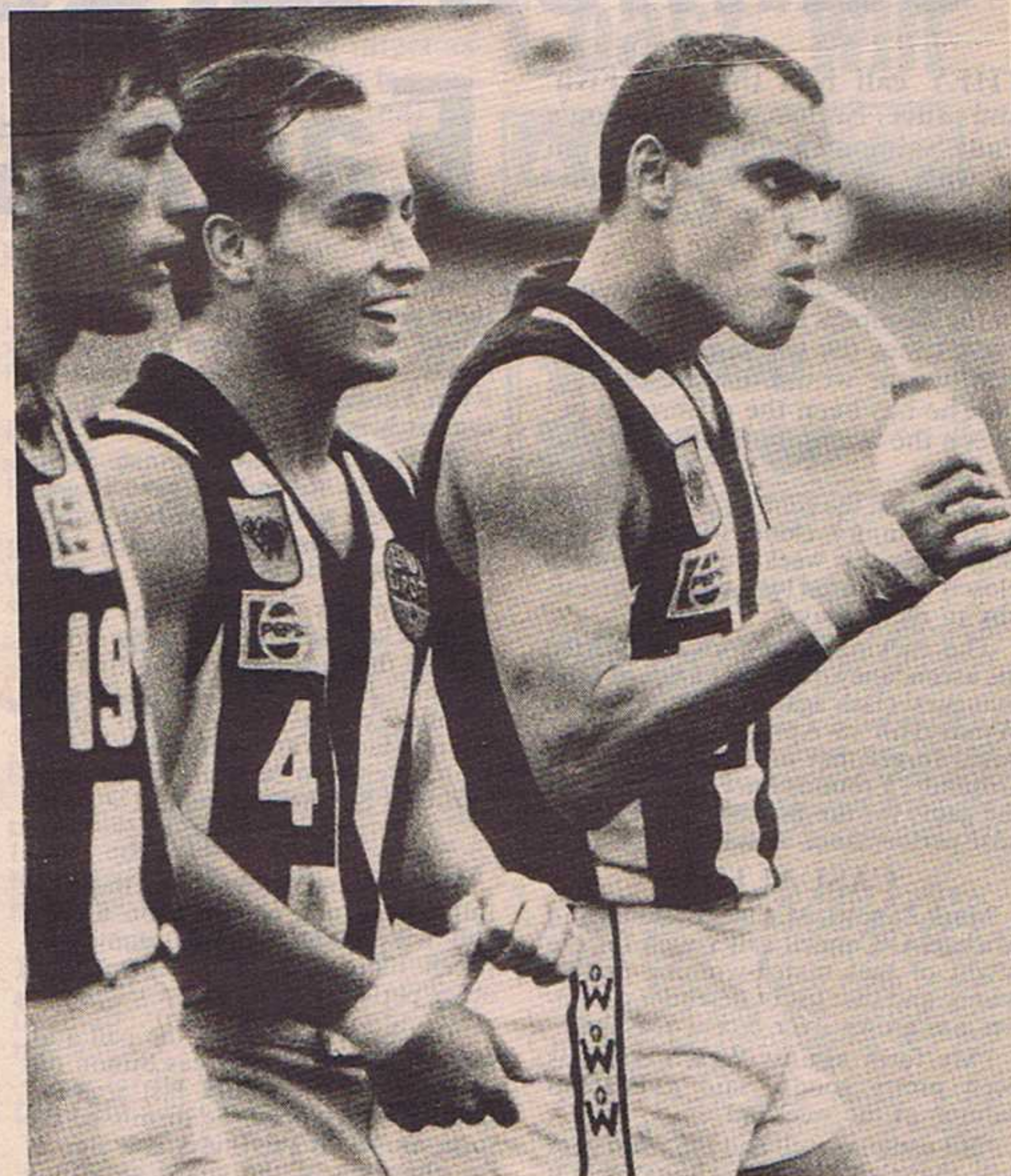
Consistency worry

Pressure on Bombers



MICK Malthouse claims that Essendon have escaped the pressure as the Melbourne media ignore their run of six straight wins, focusing instead on the success of the West Coast Eagles.

This week, however, there will be no escape for Kevin Sheedy and his Bombers.

The clash of the season sees the undefeated AFL teams meet at Windy Hill; not a popular ground for the Eagles.

The Eagles were expected to find life difficult with three games on the road, but they have brushed aside class opposition in Geelong and Hawthorn without missing a beat.

They were slow to start in both games, but once they moved into top gear there has been no stopping them.

SEQUENCE

The Eagles, through their 82-point demolition of Hawthorn, created another record by winning their sixth game straight.

To extend that winning sequence they must achieve another first, having never won at Windy Hill.

And if they win this game the Eagles could win nine games on the trot, with home encounters against the hapless Fitzroy and the improving Sydney Swans.

While much attention has focused on the Eagles brilliant midfield ball carriers and forward Peter Sumich, the defence has been resolute and again

the six-man unit has a big task against the Bombers.

Michael Brennan and Andrew Lockyer have led the defence superbly in the opening six matches, though Brennan must be in some doubt for this week's match with a hamstring strain.

Lockyer and Brennan have been well supported in their rebound work through Guy McKenna, Chris Waterman and captain John Worsfold, who is playing courageous football with an injury.

The Eagles have a superb midfield running unit comprising Craig Turley, Dwayne Lamb, David Hart and Don Pyke, who have done all that has been asked of them.

The impressive aspect of their play has been their ability to shut down key opposition players and at the same time pick a number of possessions themselves.

Everything the Eagles have aimed to do has fallen into place.

They have winners in almost every position and in the last few weeks their centreline — Chris Mainwaring, Chris Lewis and Peter Matera — has torn their opponents to shreds.

CHARACTER

Essendon have been accused of being an aging team this season, but their character must be measured by their unbeaten run.

Even with up to six of their key players sidelined, they have managed to produce some irresistible football.

They gave a fine display to ward off the challenge from Carlton last Saturday, but they received further injury

problems with champion centreman Tim Watson and forward Paul Salmon emerging from the game under a cloud.

Bradley Plain has been in outstanding form in attack, Darren Bewick gives them midfield pace, Shane Heard has returned to top level football in style and Simon Madden always ensures his team's running players get plenty of the ball.

Just the same, it is difficult to see them disposing of an Eagles combination which has taken all before them. The Eagles must again rate as favourites in another test of their resolve.

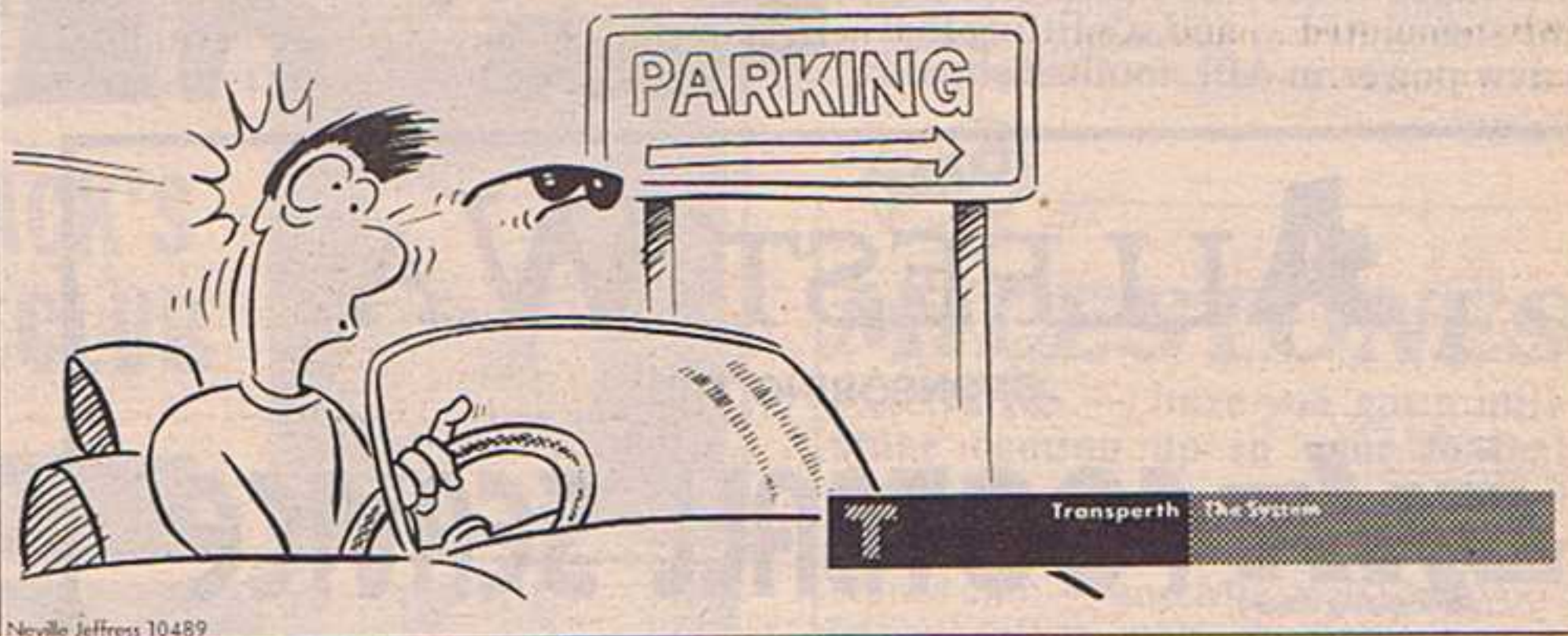

HOW the wheel has turned...

A few short years ago the West Coast Eagles were labelled the squibs of the expanded Victorian football competition.

They couldn't come to terms with playing on Melbourne grounds; they didn't like the hard physical stuff handed out to them by the seasoned Victorians; they didn't run hard at the ball and when they got it they messed around with it.

That was in the early days after the birth of the WA-based team five years ago, when the VFL finally admitted it needed the money.

The Eagles have now played 99 games in the revamped national league since that historic day at Subiaco Oval in March, 1987 when, under coach Ron Alexander, they beat Richmond in their first VFL game.

be heading for a clash with the Bombers, also undefeated this season. Of all the AFL clubs, it has been Kevin Sheedy's boys who have proved the biggest hurdle for the Eagles.

With a 54-win/44-loss record (don't forget that drawn qualifying final last

year) the Bombers record of seven wins from eight games stacks up magnificently against the Eagles.

There should be no better time than Saturday for the Eagles to show their new-found maturity and make that a 7-2 record to celebrate their 100th game.

Palmer wasn't backwards in coming forwards when criticising a few proposed rule changes which the former State coach will have a say in. Palmer's major gripe was over talk about bringing in more interchange players which he believes will be yet another break with tradition.

Tongue-in-cheek....

MICK Malthouse must have had his tongue firmly planted in his cheek when he lashed out at the treatment his West Coast Eagles are receiving from the Melbourne media.

Those who have followed Malthouse's coaching career over the past eight years, will be aware that he doesn't give a damn what the media think, say or write.

And why should he, with his team now clearly the one to beat for the 1991 AFL flag?

Like most football coaches who have been around a while, Malthouse has learned how to exploit the media to his advantage — it's one of the acquired skills.

So, if Malthouse has any feeling on the matter at all, it will be one of delight, not outrage as he pretends, at the "biased and negative" media he is receiving in Melbourne in the lead-up to Saturday's top-of-the-ladder clash with Essendon at Windy Hill.

JUSTIFIED

Following their 82-point annihilation of Hawthorn at Princes Park last Saturday, the media — both in WA and in Melbourne — are more than justified in claiming such things as "premiership favourites, enormous depth, skill, discipline" and the countless superlatives associated with a team that looks as impregnable as do the Eagles after six rounds.

Brown deflated

MAL Brown reckons he is trying to be a nice bloke in his new role as an ABC comments man — but obviously someone hasn't accepted the good guy image...or maybe they have vivid memories of when he wasn't so nice!

Brownie went back to his car after the East Perth-East Fremantle game at the WACA Ground on Friday night to find all four tyres on his Mercedes had been staked.

Mind you, there's been a couple of umpires that big Malcolm has been less than complimentary about recently...and another from a couple of decades back who would relish the sight of Malcolm Gregory Brown trying to change a tyre in the middle of a puddle on a wet night.

Tough line at Subiaco

SUBIACO coach Haydn Bunton and his co-selectors were faced with a difficult dilemma last week when a question of team discipline was really put to the test.

They had to handle the question of punishment after key mid-fielders Ian Dargie and Brett Hutchinson failed to turn up to a compulsory Saturday training session after their Anzac Day loss to East Perth.

It left the match committee in an awkward situation regarding disciplinary action. The easy thing for Bunton to do would have been to fine the wayward players and forget the matter.

The tough decision was to drop them for the match against Perth and face the prospect of being without the instigators of most of their mid-field drive in a crucial match.

There was strong opinion in the Lions camp that too many soft decisions have been taken over the past couple of seasons regarding disciplinary action against players. In view of the Lions last quarter fade-out against the Demons, the loss of Dargie and Hutchinson would have been a contributing factor in their loss.

But on a long-term basis, the strong stand may well prove worth while.

Malthouse uses the media to advantage

Ironically, it wasn't all that long ago the media were being severely chastised by Malthouse's predecessors, Ron Alexander and John Todd, for undermining the Eagles confidence.

The bottom line for Malthouse will be his team's continued winning form — the rest is irrelevant.

Jackson must learn to work harder

BIG STEVAN Jackson didn't do his chances of an early recall to the Eagles much good in the game against Claremont last Saturday.

Coming just seven days after his highly productive and hard working four-quarter performance against Swan Districts, he lacked all the qualities that are required at AFL level against the Tigers.

While Jackson dominated in a winning team against Swans, he just didn't assert the same influence in the final three-quarters of a losing effort, despite a promising start.

Playing well in a winning team is one thing, but coming up in a losing team when the ball is not running your way is something else again.

Jackson, one of the most skilled big men in the Eagles squad, has to learn to do the hard things every week.

Neesham angry over McIntosh suggestions

CLAREMONT coach Gerard Neesham has reacted angrily to suggestions that promising young Eagles draftee Ashley McIntosh was included in the Tigers senior team at the insistence of the Eagles — and not on his own ability.

"That's simply not true," says an emphatic Neesham.

"There has been no pressure brought to bear on us by the Eagles. McIntosh is an outstanding young player and has earned his place on his merits — and he's going to be hard to displace."

McIntosh, in only his second senior game, played with enormous authority when shifted to centre-half-forward in the second term. His strong marking overhead and his ability to be in the right place at the right time backs up Neesham's assessment of the 18-year-old. The left footer's only blemish was a wasteful 1.4.

Souths were lucky Malaxos left the ground with a calf muscle injury early in the third term. Otherwise the end result may have been even more embarrassing for the Bulldogs.



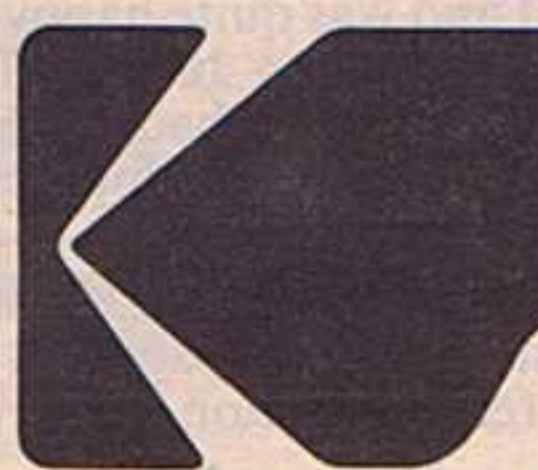

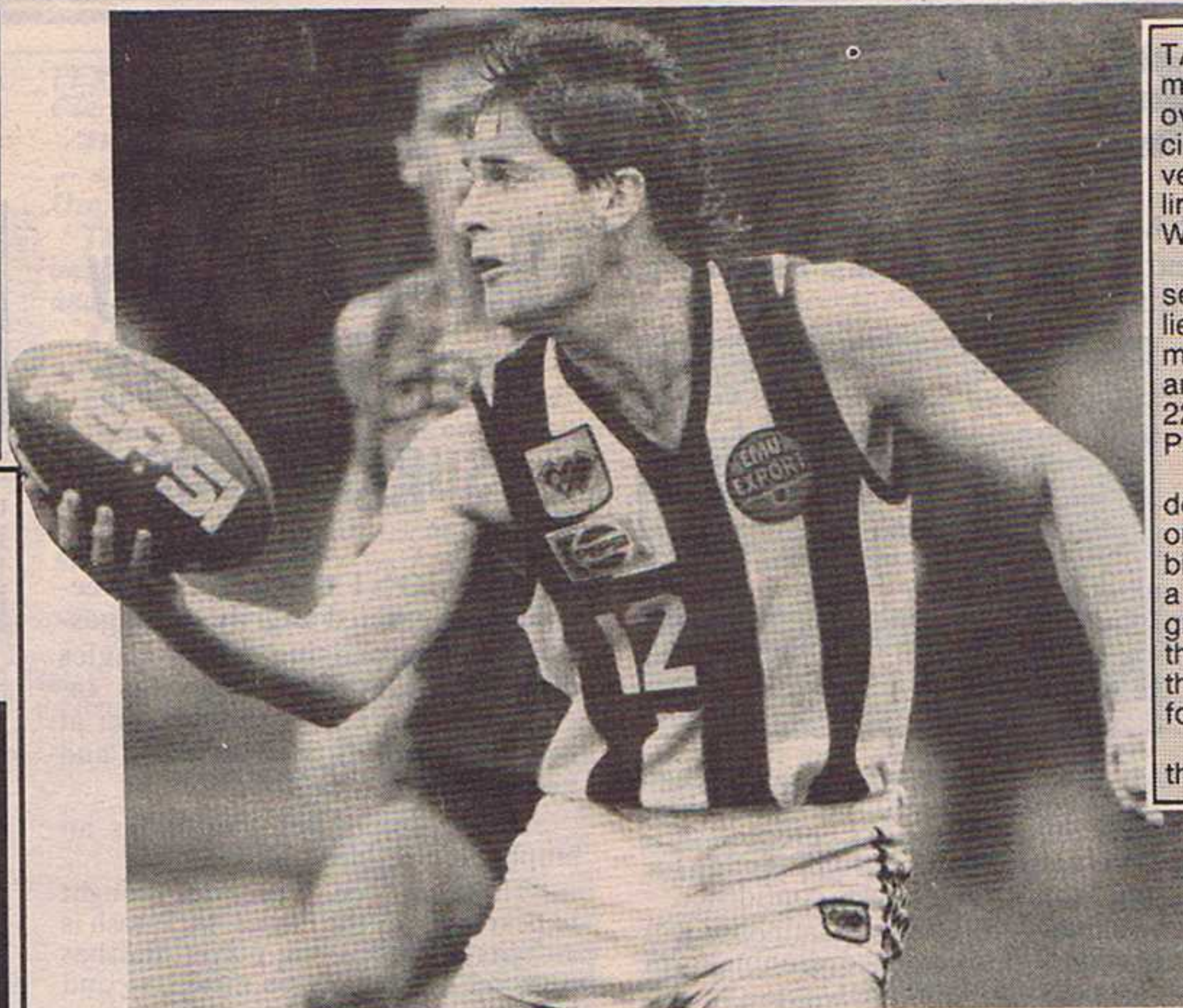

Quick change of colours

ONE of the quickest change of colours in local football must surely be this week's success story of Scott Annandale.

The 23-year-old utility player from Melville went from the verge of a league debut with Perth to being a successful "prodigal son" with East Fremantle in the space of just a few days.

Annandale was the first coaching success story of new Sharks mentor Ken Judge when he plucked him out of Perth's reserves side to play a prominent role in East Fremantle's first league victory, against East Perth on Friday night.

Because Annandale wasn't on Perth's official list of 52 contracted players, he was able to accept the invitation of Judge to return to East Fremantle Oval without any clearance hassles.

The same rule had allowed him to move to Lathlain Park just six weeks earlier when East Fremantle coach Ron Wilcox had told him that his prospects were limited with the Sharks.

Annandale had played well in several Demons reserves wins (including a best-on-ground against his old club) and must have been pressing for a league berth...but as a dedicated East Fremantle fan, he had no hesitation in switching back to the Sharks pen when the call came.

SURPRISE

"It was a real surprise," says Annandale, referring to a late-night telephone call from Judge last week.

"I had trained with Perth on Monday night and was quite happy with the Demons. But when Judge offered me the chance to move back to East Fremantle and play league football, then I had no hesitation."

Annandale made his league debut with East Fremantle back in 1987, but a knee reconstruction had restricted

Eagles target

6NR's latest Melbourne recruit, former Collingwood and Richmond full-forward, Brian Taylor, has thrown up a prospect draft choice name for the West Coast Eagles. The former Mandurah junior star, who is now captain-coach of VFA side Prahran, suggested that one of his players, former Claremont half-back Grant Povey, could be a likely June draftee choice for the Eagles. Taylor said the Eagles had shown interest in Povey, who had failed to impress at Carlton, as it would be easier for them to bring him back to Perth, than relocate a Melbourne recruit.

TALENTED Swan Districts wingman Brendon Retzlaff agonised over the most important football decision he would ever make last November — whether to move to Collingwood or have one more year in WA.

After an outstanding premiership season with Swans, the former Collie star was chosen by the AFL premiers as their fifth draft choice — and the Magpies were anxious the 22-year-old should move to Victoria Park immediately.

"I gave it a lot of thought, but decided I would be better off having one more season here to develop a bit more," Retzlaff said. "Football is a three-tier learning process — I graduated from the South West to the WAFL and I want to make sure that when I go to the AFL, I'm ready for it."

Judging by his form this season, that time is not far off.

Snipping away

SCISSORS played a big part in the off-field action at Lathlain Park last week when coach Ken Armstrong did a couple of 'deals' with his players.

Brendan Baker, well-known for his extra long, flowing blond locks, had been among the best players in the reserves for a number of weeks and after the Demons loss against Claremont, it was time for a re-shuffle.

Baker was recalled to the league side for the first time since 1989, when Armstrong told him on Thursday night he would be playing against Subiaco — providing he shed two inches of hair.

Baker, who was contemplating a return to his old amateur club Nollamara if he didn't crack a league berth soon, not only had a hair cut but played one of the best comebacks in years when he collected 22 kicks and 11 marks.

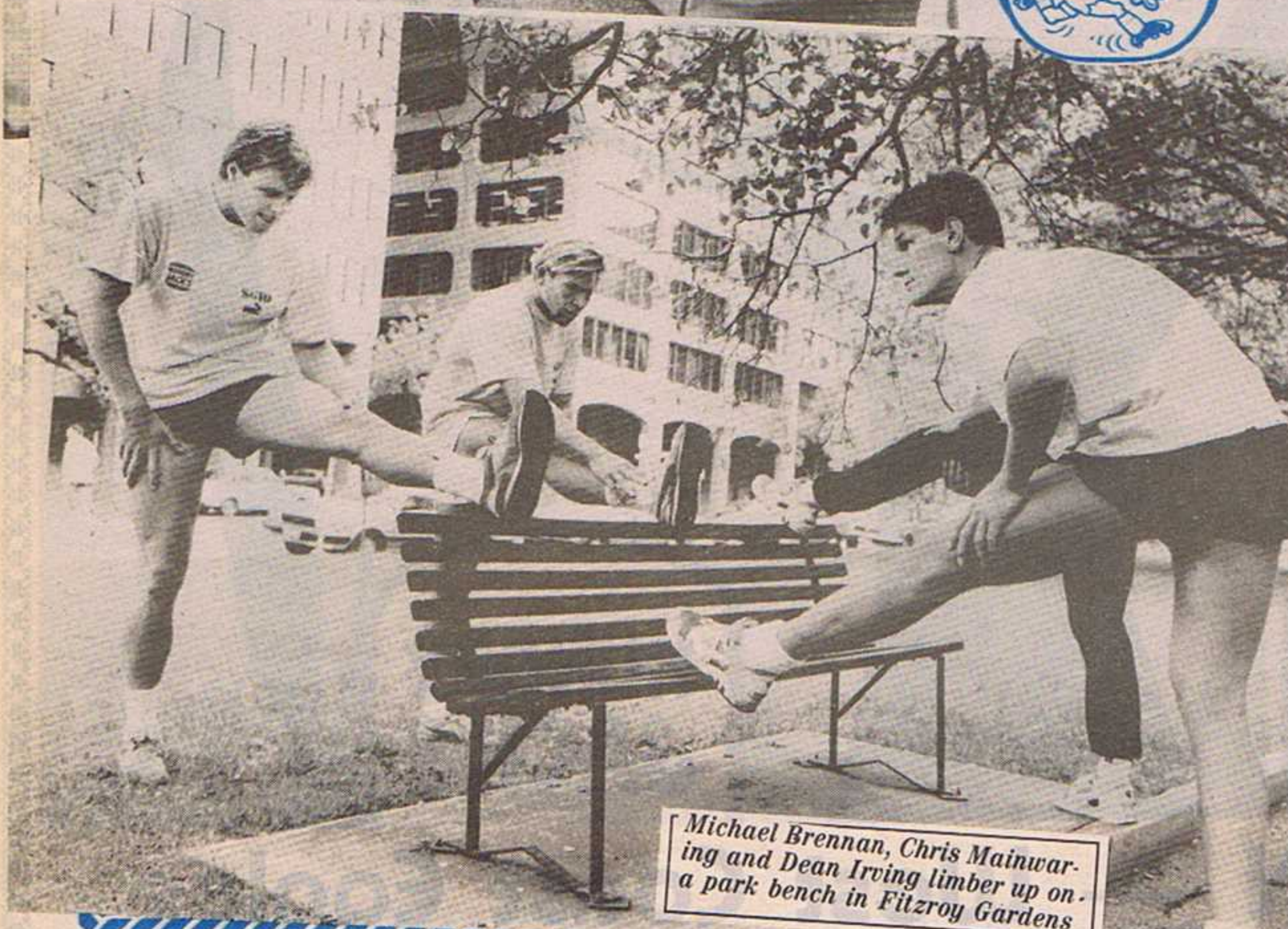

Bartlett thrives in his Royal role

BEING a senior player and handling the role of captaincy provides a double dose of football responsibility for East Perth's Glen Bartlett.

The big-marking full-forward has emerged as an ideal leader in his three years as captain of the Royals: showing strength on and off the field as the club rebuilds as a power in the WAFL.

Those three years haven't been easy for Bartlett, with his brief entree into the West Coast Eagles camp and then resisting the temptation to try again with the Brisbane Bears.

But through it all, Bartlett has had one major determination — to be part of a Royals revival and a premiership and that is why he is still with the blue-and-blacks.

RELATIONSHIP

He took over the captaincy in 1989, the year that Ian McCulloch was appointed coach and the two have developed an excellent working relationship.

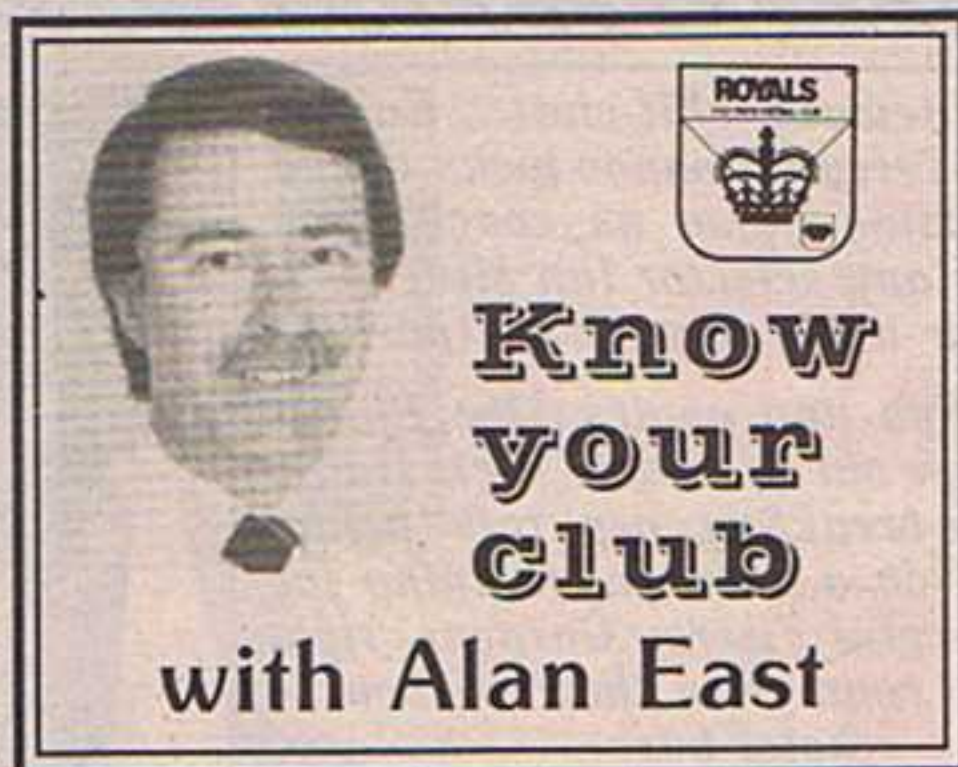
"It's an honour and a privilege to captain a club like East Perth," says Bartlett. "They are a great club and I guess there is a fairly high standard expected of the captain."

Bartlett, in his ninth year as a league player, has 134 senior games behind him, plus four games with the Eagles in their debut year of 1987.

His early days were not easy and one of his greatest contributions now is helping young players come to grips with the difficulty of maintaining league consistency — and holding a spot in the seniors.

"I played more than 60 colts and reserves games, so I know what it's like to be up and down," says Bartlett. "I can remember times when I thought I was being treated unfairly when it came to selection, so I can relate to the young guys today who are keen to crack the league side, but just can't get their opportunity."

Bartlett's grooming for the East Perth captaincy goes back to his junior days



when he captained a Dianella side to premierships in the 13s and 14s grades. He has also shown his leadership qualities by accepting the role of president of the revived Players' Association this year.

"There are a number of roles you have to accept as part of the captaincy," says Bartlett. "You represent the club at a lot of functions, especially trophy presentation nights and other junior club duties."

"But as far as setting an example on the field, I feel that if you are a senior player, you should always have pride in your performance anyway, regardless of being captain or not."

"Every player on the field is just as important as the next, but it does help if you can do the little things that benefit the side at just the right moment."

And, of course, Bartlett has the dream that every league captain possesses — to hold aloft that Pepsi Cup for the premiership victory on grand final day.

ROYALS CAPTAINS OF THE MODERN ERA

EAST Perth's honour board of captains boasts some of this State's great names, particularly in the role of captain-coach.

Jack Sheedy, the former East Fremantle rover, captained the side for seven years in their 1950s golden era, when grand finals and premierships were the norm.

Kevin Murray, Derek Chadwick, Mal Brown and Barry Cable were all top-line playing coaches, with the latter two achieving the club's most recent premierships — in 1972 and 1978 respectively.

Four of East Perth's modern-era captains went on to coach at rival clubs — all to subsequently coach a premiership side.

Mal Atwell, the 1965 captain, coached Perth to a hat-trick of flags; Mal Brown (1971-74) achieved a grand final victory with South Fremantle, while Ron Alexander (1976) and Brad Smith (1977-78) both coached East Fremantle sides to a premiership.

Frank Sparrow, who shares the distinction of being the son of a former captain in Val Sparrow, also coached elsewhere after captaining the Royals, moving to Swan Districts in the 1950s.

Hodyl takes on role ...officially

SWAN Districts skipper Peter Hodyl may be in his first year of official captaincy with the black and whites, but he has no shortage of experience in the leadership arena.

As Brad Shine's deputy last season, Hodyl was acting captain for all but three games while the veteran Shine struggled to overcome injury and regain a league berth.

As a sign of respect to the major contribution Shine made off the field in 1990 — and throughout previous years — the duo shared the captaincy honours when they ran side-by-side onto Subiaco Oval for the grand final contest with Claremont.

While the pair led the team onto the ground, Hodyl was responsible for the all-important on-field role that day as Shine watched proceedings from the bench.

RETIREMENT

With the retirement of Shine after that triumph, Hodyl was the obvious choice to take over the role under coach John Todd.

Captaincy is no stranger to the 28-year-old ruck-rover who captained the Swans colts and reserves sides on his way to the seniors after playing his junior football with local side Bassendean.

He also captain-coached Bunbury in the South West Football League for three seasons between 1987 and '89, leading his side to a premiership in '88.

"There are a lot of young guys at the club this season and I like to give them a bit of leadership for them to follow," Hodyl said.

"Captaincy for me is also a lot of off-field work; you always need to give encouragement in the rooms during the week and on match days."

During his league career at Bassendean Oval, which started back in 1983, Hodyl has played under some of the best captains to pass through the club in Stan Nowotny, Graham Melrose, Keith Narkle and Brad Shine.

While Hodyl says captaincy is not something you can actually 'learn', some of the methods and philosophies of that quartet of stars have rubbed off on him.

"It's something you gain with experience as you go along," he said.

"You learn to identify when someone needs some talking to or a bit of encouragement."

"On the field, a player may drop a mark or miss a tackle and I know when

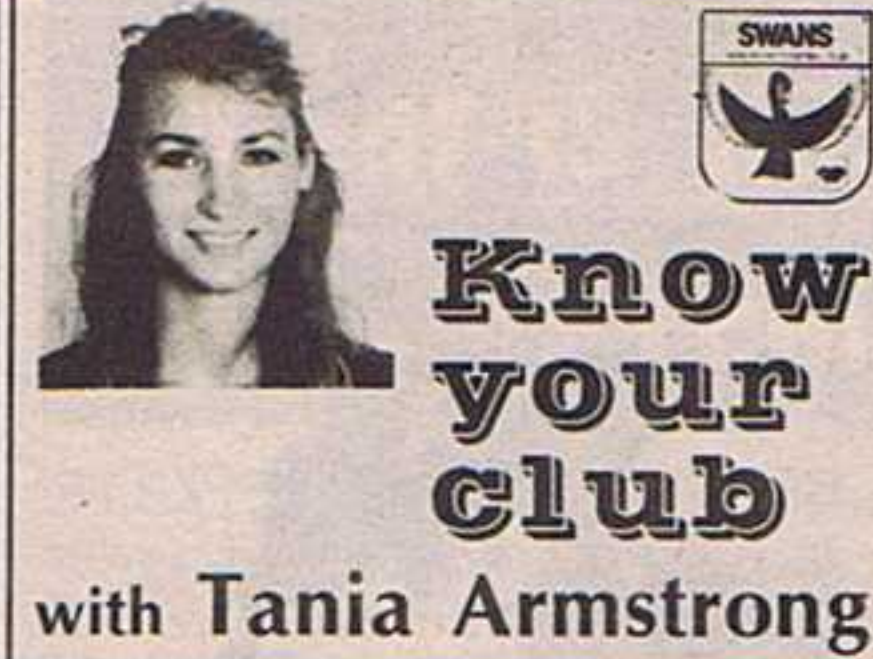

to go over and give them a pat on the back and tell them to go for it next time."

Hodyl is never far from Bassendean Oval as he runs his own plumbing business in the area and while he is an expert at patching up a leaky tap, he is equally as good at healing the odd rift in the changerooms.

"Toddy (John Todd) may have a bit of a go at one of the younger guys and then it's my job to have a chat to them after that," Hodyl said.

THE CAPTAINS

THERE is very little left for Bill Walker to achieve at Swan Districts and among his long list of credits is a seven-year reign as captain of the club.

The triple Sandover Medallist, highest games-played record holder and current president led the Swans side on the field from 1969 to 1975, the first three years of which were as a playing-coach.

Just behind Walker on the captaincy honour board is another courageous rover in Haydn Bunton jnr, who led from the front, taking the club to their first three premierships in 1961-62-63.

Swans have had a remarkable run of captain-coaches, going right back to their debut year in 1934 when Judda Bee was the on-field mentor. Since then some 16 players have held the dual role of captain and coach, including players such as Fred Castledine and Tony Nesbit, who were part of the successful playing era of the early 1960s.

The recent premierships years of Swans have seen a number of different captains have the honour — Graham Melrose and Keith Narkle in the early 1980s and Peter Hodyl last year.

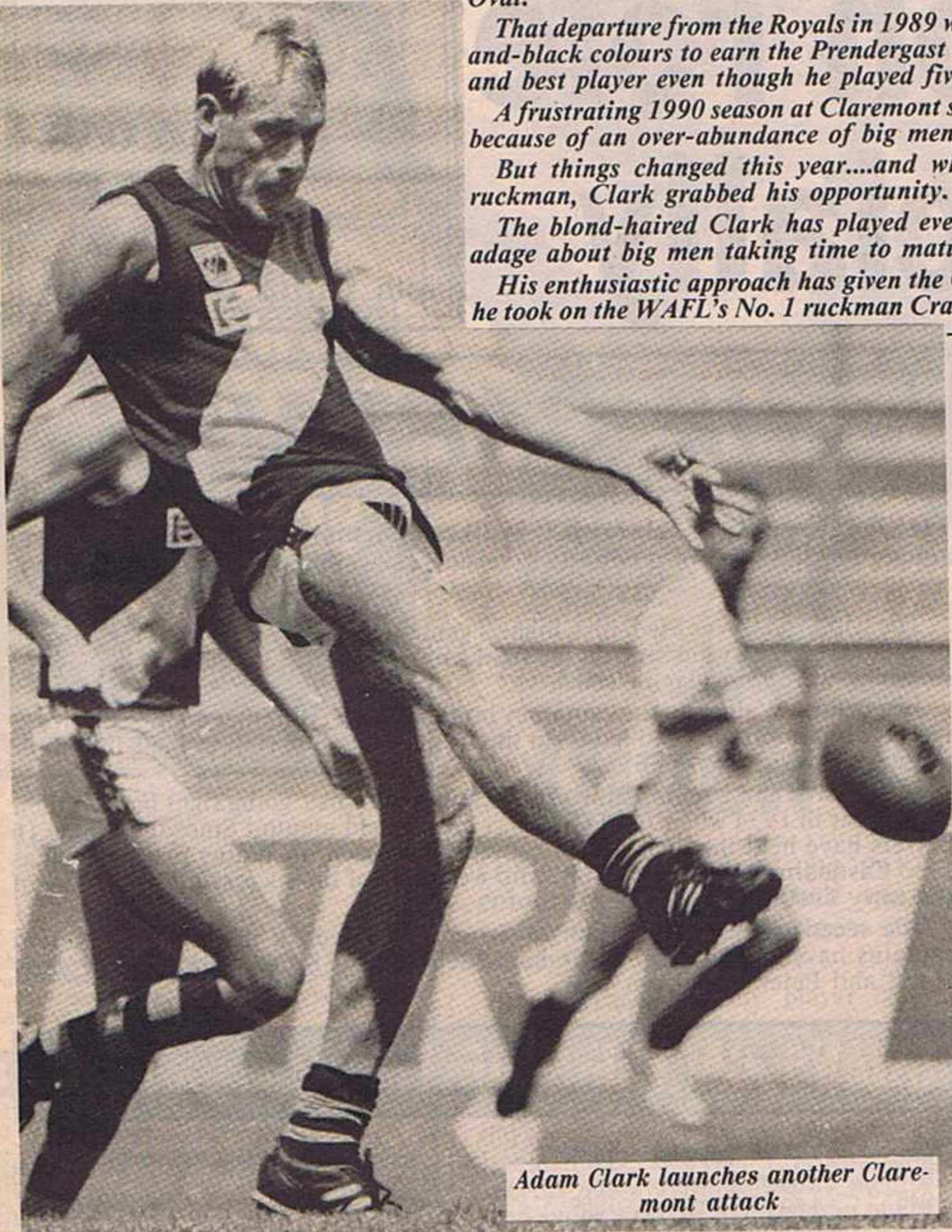

"I had gone to Melbourne with WA's 1979 Teal Cup side and some Richmond talent scouts saw the game," said Taylor.

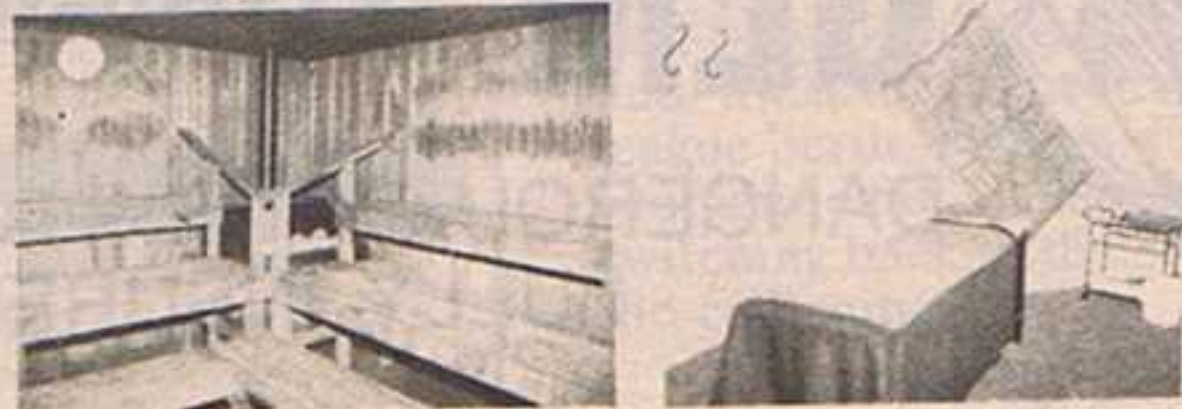
"No sooner had I arrived back home in Mandurah but three Richmond officials were knocking on my door with a contract in their hands."

Kicking football into the future



Aussie Footy day in the wheatbelt

THE Football Development Trust has laid another foundation stone in the development of junior football in country regions.

Paul Watson, a development officer from the FDT, travelled to rural districts Bencubbin and Mukinbudin in the Central Wheatbelt to conduct a two-day expo.

This was part of the Aussie Sports carnival which included cricket, touch football, tee ball, jump rope for heart, tennis and badminton.

Emphasis on the two day carnival was placed on having fun, learning some skills and meeting new friends.

Groups of children rotated from one sport to the next for 45 minute lessons, which included some enjoyable introductory activities and games, teaching children how to mark, hand pass and kick and concluded with a modified game.

"The basis of the expo was to subject primary school children from various country towns to the wide range of sports available," said Watson.

Students between the ages of seven and 12 came from surrounding schools Bencubbin, Beacon, Gabbin, Koorda, Kununoppin, Mukinbudin, Nungarin, Trayning and Wyalkatchem for the day.

A total of 183 children took part in the programme, with 14 teachers and parents being educated on Aussie Footy, a modified version of football for juniors.

"The inservice included an explanation and description of fundamental football skills, the teaching of a sample lesson, along with the theory behind the development of Aussie Footy," Watson said.

"Other areas covered were the aims and objectives of Aussie Footy, the reason for modification in children's sport and some clarification of common concerns and fears of modified rules.

"Generally, the response from the teachers and parents was extremely positive, with many teachers indicating they would like to develop or strengthen Aussie Footy in their school."

Resource packages distributed to schools provided a series of lessons and a skills booklet to assist teachers in developing and educating their students.

Watson says much of the credit for the success of the day must go to Aussie Sports organiser Connie Nelson and he expects the children involved to develop a hungry appetite to continue their football in the wheatbelt.

CIG Shield ready to kick off

PREPARATIONS are well under way for the 1991 CIG Shield inter-school competition.

The competition started with 33 teams in 1983 and has expanded to 100 schools this year.

Sponsored by Commonwealth Industrial Gases, the CIG Shield is designed for year eight and nine students this year — a significant change, with year 10 students moving up to the Quit Cup.

History was created in the competition last year when Aquinas College became the first school to win the CIG Shield twice, beating Trinity College to repeat their 1985 victory.

The Ross Davis Medal was awarded to Aquinas captain Ben Doyle, who was voted his team's fairest and best throughout the competition.

This year sees the introduction of new rule which means all teams must play a minimum of six year eight players.

The competition starts next Monday (May 13) and will be played at a variety of school and community ovals in the metropolitan area.

According to Football Development Trust organiser Ross Luckman, the CIG Shield is well established and is one of the major forces in the development of junior footballers throughout the metro and country areas.

NEWMAN College continued their unbeaten run in the Barry Cable division of the Quit Cup competition when they narrowly beat a gallant Carine at Leederville Oval last Wednesday.

In a low-scoring match Newman snatched the lead after kicking two quick goals with only three minutes remaining in the last term and ran out victors, 5.2 (32) to 4.5 (29).

"Our backline performed admirably throughout the game, particularly when the pressure went on," said Newman coach Shane Pill.

There's plenty of football talent around

SOME football officials are really amusing when they air their views on the subject of the talent, or perceived lack of it, available in Australian Football.

Specifically, it is becoming fashionable to bleat that such and such a competition should be reduced "because there are not enough good footballers around to sustain them in their present form".

What a load of rubbish! There is NO shortage of players talented enough to play AFL or elite football. All they need is the opportunity to perform.

There are plenty of cases in point. It should be admitted at the outset, however, that coaching and team styles obviously have a big influence on the type of player recruited to, and persevered with, at clubs.

I well remember seeing a tall ruckman playing in a grand final for North Hobart.

He performed exceptionally well and I wasn't surprised when told he was tied to Hawthorn. I was very surprised, however, when he was sent back to the Apple Isle and not recruited by any other AFL club.

History now records that Romano Negri was then recruited by Woodville and subsequently by the Crows...and he is now proving to be a top ruckman in the AFL.

Grantley Fielke, a less-than-moderate success at Collingwood with many games in the reserves, has been little short of sensational in his early games with Adelaide.

Without doubt, there are several players in both the West Coast Eagles and Adelaide teams who are performing to the highest standards who were

not considered good enough for other AFL teams. John Klug — a Richmond reject, is a case in point.

In the so-called lower stratas of the game there are many players who, once exposed to the regimen of AFL football, perform to a standard satisfactory for retention on senior lists.

The VFA and amateur competitions in Melbourne are good examples.

At any given time there are two or three players quite capable of being successfully recruited to AFL ranks. Rienits, Verbeek and Bassett (Carlton), Dyson (Melbourne) and Del Re (Footscray) are good recent examples.

The point I make is that it is rubbish to state that there are insufficient replacements in the lower stratas. They are there in their dozens just awaiting their chances to perform.

It is important that there is a genuine recognition of the overall talent available by football administrators, particularly recruitment personnel, when the open national draft is adopted without any form of moratorium for interstate clubs.

There's no logic in drafting someone who is thousands of kilometres away in another State simply because he is theoretically available, when in many cases, a player of similar ability is on the doorstep.

There are thousands of good footballers. Astute administrators and coaches recognise and develop them.

"Harold will be a huge bonus, with the vast amount of football administration experience he has," says Wyllie.

"He will be working on a long-term plan, such as attracting sponsorship and marketing the club in a fast-expanding city and helping formulate new extension plans to the club's changerooms."

Another major step towards ensuring the Mustangs future in the SFL, was the re-establishment of the local 16s competition, in conjunction with the South Fremantle Junior Council, which is sponsored by Alcoa.

This competition will be a feeder for the Mandurah Football club, as their colts sides have struggled in previous years.

Nowotny, the former Swan Districts premiership captain, is in his second year as senior coach, but was not impressed with his side's first two defeats.

The most notable recruits for Mandurah this year have been former South Fremantle players Paul Wilson

Armchair footy..it's a great life

IT'S not the same if you're not at the game...that's how the old football slogan goes.

But there can be exceptions, particularly if the game is somewhere you are not!

With the West Coast Eagles playing in Melbourne in the second leg of their hat-trick on the road and a Friday night game at the WACA Ground giving us an early start to the weekend action, it was time to take a break.

What better place to keep track of Saturday's football action than from a comfortable room high up in the Quality Langley Plaza Hotel, overlooking the city and with the tele fine tuned and the tinnies chilled?

Five hours of football were introduced by a couple of well-known West Aussie-produced stars in Channel Seven commentators Dennis Cometti and Drew Morphett, who both cultivated their craft at the ABC, just down the road in Adelaide Terrace.

They were joined by Bernie Quinlan, who cultivated his craft as a champion player with Fitzroy and obviously knows what he was talking about...and got out early, as the Lions are headed for extinction!

The banter between the three was first class; equally as good as the demolition job the West Coast Eagles were doing on Hawthorn, once the power team of the Victorian Football League.

"You're umpiring well today, Bernie," was a Cometti compliment as the comments man picked up yet another whistle-blowing technicality that no one else at the ground could see.

Boundary rider Gerard Healy, who would have stomped on any media man who ventured into his change-rooms at half-time in his playing days,

received a best-on-ground three-vote accolade from the commentary team when he reported a successful invasion of the Eagles rooms at half-time.

Morphett felt that the Hawks had been "absolutely poleaxed" by the Eagles and Cometti was pleased to report that Eagles coach Mick Malthouse had done an enormous job in getting so much out of his players since taking over the WA side...a fair comment especially as he had helped influence the Eagles hierarchy in their choice of a Victorian coach.

DIVERSIFIED

The Seven coverage wasn't restricted just to the Eagles juggernaut; it diversified at half-time to give us some great shots of that man-mountain Tony Lockett collecting goals like the WA Labor Party's fund-raising activities.

The TV game also taught us that the Eagles have some pretty spunky models in their camp.

Chris Mainwaring, Brett Heady and Craig Turley looked pretty cool in the Peter Shearer's commercial, especially in the leather gear, while Peter Sumich, David Hart and Mainwaring were on the ball in the Sports Locker commercial.

The TV trio had no mercy for the men-in-white, who seem to make a lot more errors on tele than they do in real life. It especially hurts when they replay the offending incident, which makes the commentators look even smarter when they picked it first time round!

Cometti was particularly critical of the rule that saw John Worsfold penalised for pushing the ball out over the line — deliberately, according to the rule-makers — suggesting that it was turning the players into actors if they had to camouflage such defensive actions.

"What do they want the players to do?" he posed. "Hit the ball back into play and give away a goal...and get dragged by the coach?"

POPULAR

Cometti did lament the absence of parochial Victorian commentator Don Scott from Eagles telecasts; he felt that 'Scott-bashing' in the West was almost as popular as car theft.

Cometti, who admitted to having tipped Hawthorn in last Saturday's power struggle, said the frightening thing was that the Eagles were starting to believe how good they really were.

But the former West Perth player and coach did admit that he had learnt one lesson during the day: "I will never tip against the Eagles again; please remind me about that."

As the curtain came down on the Channel Seven show, complete with up-to-the-minute scores at the other games, it was time to switch to good old Aunty and catch the local action on Channel Two.

Commentator Wally Foreman (minus his usual side-kick Trevor Jenkins, who was radio calling from Melbourne and missing some glamour on the boundary line with Tania Armstrong also covering the Eagles action) was paired off with all-time legend Barry Cable in a coverage that was in stark contrast to the earlier three hours.

The wet weather and an empty Subiaco Oval didn't help and despite Foreman's attempts to inject some life into the game, the players refused to co-operate.

Despite Two's attempts to keep viewers up to date with the other two games, the scoreboard wouldn't co-operate either. By the end of the Perth-Subiaco contest, the other games were apparently still in the third quarter!

The lack of atmosphere in the telecast wasn't the fault of the men behind the microphone ... and even statistician Ken Casellas tried to liven up the game with his succinct injections of kicks, marks, etc.

CONTROVERSY

Certainly, Saturday's commentary team was down in quantity and quality, but it really does need an injection of controversy.

Where are the marks and goals highlights; the action-packed interviews; the in-depth tit-bits of information that once flashed up before our eyes?

It is an unfortunate fact of footy life that our local game pales into insignificance when put up as a straight comparison to the national league. In fact, when they are unlucky enough to cop a bad game, it's detrimental to our local product.

Fortunately, last week's telecast game wasn't a true reflection of some of the high-quality we are seeing in the WAFL this year. The ABC coverage has highlighted some top matches this season.

Despite the gloomy weather and the downturn in TV tempo, it was still a great way to indulge in five hours of electronic football.

Followed by a sauna, a spa and dinner in the Langley's restaurant, who cares about live action!
