SHOOT-OUT

ROBBIE BURNS previews a huge weekend of football

GARGANTUAN St Kilda full-forward Tony Lockett stands alone in the way of a West Coast Eagles comeback victory at Subiaco Oval on Sunday.

And while the top-of-the-ladder Eagles have every reason to fear the awesome strength and goal-kicking feats of the 25-year-old Brownlow Medallist, they also have reason to be grateful to him.

The Saints goal-kicking machine is one of the biggest crowd-pullers in Australian sport and the record crowd at an AFL game in Perth — 38,274 against Collingwood in 1987 — is certain to be smashed because of Lockett's presence.

Not that the Eagles players or the expected revenue-boosting capacity crowd of 43,500 will be showing gratitude after the 2pm bouncdown. Both players and the majority of the parochial West Aussie fans will be wanting to see Lockett go down.

But if he does, it's a sure bet he'll take some of the Eagles with him in what is building up to be a brutal physical clash.

Lockett has fearsome strength and he doesn't mind how he uses it — just ask Eagles defender Guy Mckenna who was KO'd by a swipe from the giant during a game at Moorabbin in 1989.

While the Eagles have an equally efficient goal-kicker in Peter Sumich at the other end of the ground, the feeling is that the Eagles can win without a major contribution from their ace.

However, there's an equally strong belief that if Lockett is stopped, the Saints can't win.

The 120 minutes of frenzied football action on Sunday will determine whether that theory is fact or fiction.

And if WA footy fans need a warm-up for the big AFL clash, they have the perfect recipe in the 13th round of Pepsi Cup matches on Saturday.

To make sure the Subiaco Oval surface is in top shape for the Saints-Eagles clash, the crucial game between Subiaco and Swan Districts has been shifted to Bas-sendean Oval.

Then there is the shoot-out between top-of-the-ladder premiership favourites Claremont and the fast-improving challengers East Fremantle at East Fremantle Oval; the battle of survival between ailing early-season trendsetters East Perth and Perth at Perth Oval and the clash between the inconsistent South Fremantle and West Perth, the team which beat Swans last week.

St Kilda giant Tony Lockett will be the danger man for the Eagles on Sunday . . . while West Coast full-forward Peter Sumich (inset) will be hoping to match his rival goal-for-goal.

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

Eagles have a lot to learn

THE West Coast Eagles are not — and never were — certainties to win this year's AFL premiership.

And I'm not just saying that because they lost to Carlton last Saturday.

The Eagles should have won that match.

Some people are viewing that performance as virtually a win, because of the way they came back from the grave to almost snatch victory.

A good side goes on with the job after making up so much ground.

Having hit the front on more than one occasion in the last quarter, the Eagles should never have let the game slip back to Carlton.

They still have a bit to learn if they are to win the flag.

The way the Eagles have been pumped up, not only in Perth, but in Melbourne, as invincible is not a true indication of their ability.

As Saturday showed, they are anything but invincible.

There is a glaring weakness in the side that has been exposed twice in recent matches.

The Eagles are vulnerable if they allow the ball to be taken from the bounciedowns.

The Sydney Swans showed that a couple of weeks

ago when they got back into the match in the third quarter and Carlton absolutely savaged the Eagles in that department on Saturday.

DEFENSIVE

Mick Malthouse has also been able to get away with playing Dean Irving in a defensive role and allowing his forwards, Stevan Jackson and Karl Langdon in particular, to take the knock.

It's a stop-gap measure that was exposed against the height of Justin Madden.

I don't go along with Malthouse's comment that the Eagles would have stolen the game if they had won.

Carlton are a side that can tear an opponent apart if allowed possession of the ball.

But, as was shown against Footscray — when they managed only one goal and that was in the last minute of the game — and in the second half against the Eagles, they can be shut down.

The Eagles had them on the ropes from the first few minutes of the last quarter, but could not deliver the knockout blow.

If they had won and then given St Kilda a hiding on Sunday, which is quite on the cards on the spacious Subiaco Oval, the Eagles would have lived up to the invincible tag some are wanting to hang on them.

So, in that respect, the loss was a timely reminder that they are fallible.

The Eagles badly need another big man in the side if Malthouse is to continue to use Irving in a defensive role.

Despite Laurie Keene's optimism about returning to the side for the finals, the immediate answer appears to be Mark Hepburn.

Langdon simply is not tall enough for the ruckwork in the forward line and Jackson tends to be too easily brushed aside by some of the more experienced AFL followers.

And what some have been saying about the forward line also proved valid on Saturday. Without Sumich firing, the Eagles can be brittle in attack.


While he will be a much more difficult player to contain on the wide expanses of Waverley, it was disconcerting the way he was out-manoeuvred by Peter Dean in the last quarter, when the Eagles should have sealed the match.

The Eagles are a good side, but they have weaknesses. Malthouse is astute enough to work on them.

But one thing should be remembered. There have been better sides than the Eagles who have not won the premiership.

As Saturday showed, they may be a good side, but they are not head and shoulders above all their opponents, as many seem to think.

That was the lesson to be learnt from their loss.

Every time the Eagles goaled in the final term, a roar went up from the grandstands and there was a general sigh of disappointment when the final siren went leaving the gallant Eagles losers by three points.

Costly uniform

SUBIACO found themselves on the end of a steep \$1000 fine from the WA Football Commission recently simply because they wanted to retain their lace-up guernseys. A number of Lions players have used the lace-ups since Haydn Bunton brought the style in from South Australia. Taste-less Tigers



The one-eyed group will certainly be in a vocal mood this Sunday when the Subiaco Oval full-house gives the visiting St Kilda side heaps.




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TOP OF THE LADDER IN THE NIGHT CLUB LEAGUE



Eagles hit back at

'favours'

GOOD management, rather than good fortune or AFL favours, is why the West Coast Eagles is the envy of every major football club in Australia.

The Eagles off-field management, in particular some decisions made late in 1989, set the foundations for the club's current position of strength.

Much of the Eagles current playing strength can be traced back to the 1989 November draft.

Astute recruiting, as opposed to poor appraisal of WA talent by some Melbourne clubs, scooped the pool for the West Coasters.

The signing of coach Mick Malthouse fine-tuned the playing skills and mental toughness of the Eagles squad, but the depth of talent was inherited before he arrived.

The Eagles collected Peter Matera, Dean Irving, Brett Heady, Dean Kemp, Ashely McIntosh and Tony Evans in the 1989 draft; all talented youngsters who slipped through Melbourne-based clubs.

WASTED PICKS

Matera was one of the hottest properties in the game and was snapped up at No. 4 as the Eagles first choice. But some Melbourne clubs, though restricted to just one WAFL registered player, wasted their picks.

St Kilda opted to draft little-known Swan Districts defender Greg Jones, while Footscray picked up West Perth back-pocket player Dennis Repacholi. Both clubs have continued as harsh critics of the draft concessions given to the Eagles.

The Eagles traded two draft choices with Richmond in return for Peter Wilson, but the Melbourne Tigers, one of the loudest critics of the Eagles pre-draft choices, failed to recruit a West Australian in 12 draft picks, as did Melbourne and Geelong.

The Eagles then collected Irving at No. 50, Evans at No. 64 and the now potentially-brilliant Heady at 92.

The exciting Kemp and defenders Tony Begovich and Brad Gwilliam were signed up after Richmond, Melbourne and Geelong failed to execute their option to draft a WAFL player.

Melbourne clubs, content to accept their share of WA's \$4 million licence fee to join their expanding competition, are now moaning about the so-called favours offered to the Eagles.

PRIORITY CHOICE

The biggest objection is the Eagles pre-draft priority choice.

The AFL has cut the Eagles pre-draft choices from two players last year to just one before this year's November nation-wide draft.

Last week's "secret" meeting among the 11 Melbourne-based clubs highlighted the paranoia raging in Victoria at the favours they believe the West is receiving from the AFL.

Eagles football manager Trevor Nisbett, who joined the club in October 1989, has answered the criticism in typical straight-shooting fashion.

"We would gladly swap any pre-draft choices for a metropolitan zone of our own, just as all the Melbourne clubs have," he says.

"Every club has got to have somewhere from where they can make an assessment of the players coming through.

"Melbourne clubs have zones, where they can develop junior competitions, have the coaching clinics and the like.

"They also have the under-19 competitions through which they can develop players. They can list and delist senior players as they like; we can't."

Nisbett pointed out that Richmond, Collingwood and Essendon all have extremely strong under-19 teams.

"If the AFL gave us a chance to recruit some of the kids in the Richmond under-19s, we'd be happy with that," he said.

"But young footballers developing at Richmond want to play with that club.



"We don't care where our zone is. We just want one and would swap all our pre-draft choices to have somewhere in the West we can develop for the sake of the club's future," Nisbett said.

Melbourne clubs all have metropolitan zones of around 300,000 people and it's estimated that each zone averages just under two recruits a year for their senior club.

Nisbett also emphasised that the Eagles had to survive their early years with a 35-man squad, while all other clubs had 52 players.

The Melbourne clubs can also add and delete players at will, while the Eagles are not permitted to alter their list.

Michalczyk and umpires in frank exchange

WEST Perth coach George Michalczyk had two important victories last weekend.

Not only did Michalczyk collect four crucial premiership points at Swan Districts' expense, but the Falcons boss also succeeded in staging a successful meeting with senior WAFL umpires.

Relations between clubs, their players and umpires has hit rock bottom in recent weeks with numerous complaints from officials and coaches.

The state's most decorated coach John Todd led the rebellion last week when he called for action against head-high tackles.

Umpires coach Ron Buckey took a positive stand. He is believed to have told his umpires before last Saturday's Round 12 fixtures, to "get out the books" and report head-high infringements.

Buckey's call resulted in three reports last Saturday for striking... all considered to be frivolous.

East Perth pair John Scott and Eric Maroni and West Perth's Todd Curley were found guilty of the charges but escaped match penalties when they were reprimanded.

Michalczyk, one of 12 senior Falcons reported in the first half of this season, wanted to get to the bottom of his club's relationship with the men in white.

He emerged from the meeting convinced his players will be "more disciplined" for the remainder of the winter.

"The meeting was something that had to happen," Michalczyk said.

"There are a few things that West Perth as a club and as players have been doing that, according to the umpires, wasn't right.

"In a frank, but constructive manner, the umpires accused us of a lack of discipline in certain areas and perhaps that's why we have had players


reported and some free kicks given against us."

Michalczyk called the meeting, inviting umpires' coach Ron Buckey and any senior umpire who wished to attend.

George Michalczyk...called a meeting with the umpires



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



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Hate campaign heads West

WEST Coast officials have been warned about a "hate" campaign against the Eagles which has been going on at St Kilda's Moorabbin headquarters all season.

St Kilda are coming West this week determined to beat the Eagles, but also seeking retribution for several incidents that have occurred in recent clashes between the two clubs.

The Saints will almost certainly use revenge as a tool to motivate their players.

However, the Eagles will be ready and waiting for any attempt by the Saints to upset their players.

"It will probably work against them if they try to upset our players," Eagles football manager Trevor Nisbett said this week.

GRUDGE MATCH

"We have heard the rumours about this being a grudge match for several weeks now."

Because of their success this year, the Eagles are hated at most Victorian-based clubs, especially at St Kilda.

The bitter animosity towards the Eagles is manifest not only among Saints supporters, but among players and officials.

It's likely that the intense feeling will erupt at Subiaco Oval on Sunday.

"It could be a bloodbath," one leading Melbourne football journalist said this week.

"They are really fired up at Moorabbin for this game. They have been for weeks. Their officials have been worried that they have not been focusing on more immediate games lately.

"This is the one they want to win."

The ill-feeling against the Eagles at St Kilda was freshly activated at the first official AFL fixture of the 1991 season.

When St Kilda beat the Eagles in the first Foster's Cup night match this season, the Saints were furious over injuries to full-forward Tony Lockett and defender Dean Rice.

Lockett injured his back and missed the first six AFL games and Rice suffered concussion and was out of action for a couple of weeks.

There were claims made in Melbourne that the Eagles broke the rules. But there were no reports, nor did the AFL call for any trial by video.

However, several St Kilda players have since watched video tapes of the incidents and the father of one player said publicly that he would never let his son forget an alleged head-high tackle laid on him by one of the Eagles.

That kind of build-up to Sunday's game has been prevailing at Moorabbin for several weeks.

There is no doubt that Sunday's game will be a bitter grudge match, with the Saints out for revenge against several Eagles players.

HIT LIST

Players on the Saints "hit list" are supposed to include Guy McKenna, Michael Brennan, Andrew Lockyer and Dwayne Lamb.

The Saints blame these Eagles players, in particular, for suspensions and injuries suffered by some of their stars in previous games.

The Saints are still blaming McKenna for a suspension Lockett incurred in

1989 when he was convicted of unduly rough play against the Eagles.

McKenna was tagging Lockett and was crudely felled half-way through the game by a back-hand swipe delivered by the giant Saints full-forward, knocking the Eagle unconscious.

However, St. Kilda are not playing the Eagles this time in front of a deeply-biased Moorabbin crowd.

Subiaco Oval will be packed to the rafters on Sunday with fiercely loyal West Australians and they will let the world know if the rules are broken.

Neither side can expect any leniency from the umpires should there be any brawls or head-hunting.

When the Eagles play at Moorabbin, the players are subjected to the worst imaginable verbal abuse by the spectators. The Saints fans are notorious for their poor sportsmanship.

They cheer if an opponent is injured and they scream obscenities at players, officials and supporters from visiting clubs.

That's not the fault of the St Kilda players. But if ever a team deserved to get some of its own back, the Saints deserve it this Sunday.



How do you stop the man mountain?

JUST how do you stop Tony Lockett, St Kilda's 17-stone goalkicking superman?

It's a question hotly debated by all AFL coaches and the one Eagles mentor Mick Malthouse must answer this Sunday afternoon.

In just eight games this season, Lockett has kicked 63 goals, an average of almost eight every time he steps onto the field. And his conversion rate is even more threatening — just 18 points from 81 scoring shots.

On the eve of his recent 12-goal blitz against rough-and-tough WA expatriate Wayne Henwood, now with Sydney, Lockett declared he was still only "60 to 70 percent fit" and it would be a month before he would be at his best.

That month is well and truly up — and now it's the top-of-the-goalkicking-table shoot-out with Eagles counterpart Peter Sumich.

TACTICS

When Brownlow Medallist Gerard Healy was asked if Henwood should have tried to rough up Lockett and unsettle him, the former Sydney Swan said: "Rough him up? Who would be game to do that! He steamrolls anything that gets in his way!"

Essendon full-back Anthony Daniher says anyone who can restrict Lockett to single figures — nine goals or less — could feel proud of the achievement.

After missing the first five weeks with a badly bruised lower back, Lockett's barnstorming return includes tallies of 12, 10 and 12 goals in consecu-

tive weeks, the biggest goal blitz seen in Victoria since the halcyon days of South Melbourne's 1930s high-flyer Bob Pratt, one of only two men to kick 150 goals in a League season.

Lockett had nine goals at half-time in his comeback game against the Adelaide Crows. He had actually kicked a 10th, but it was disallowed when the umpire ruled he had to kick again from over his mark, with his second attempt ploughing into the man on the mark.

ALLOWANCES

Answering criticism that Lockett was overweight and unable to see out matches, football legend Ron Barassi said allowances should be made for Lockett because of his massive build.


"He looks pretty fit to me," said Barassi, knowing full well the value of a fully committed, in-form goalkicker.

The last time Lockett had an injury-free season was 1987 — the year he won the Brownlow Medal.

With his sensational start this season, critics are predicting that he is capable of not only kicking 100 goals, but even winning another Brownlow despite giving the rest of the field a start.

But Lockett's football ambitions centre more around being in a winning St Kilda grand final side — and playing 250 games.

The 25-year-old is at the peak of his

career and thanks to his awesome form, St Kilda are looking forward to their first finals series since 1973.

Club president and former All Australian champion Travis Payze says Lockett's on-field presence adds thousands of fans to every Moorabbin home game.

The fans scream every time he even goes near the football.

St Kilda worked for months to tie up his future and ensure that he would finish his career as a Saint. The result was a long-term "mega" contract, which can make Lockett one of the wealthiest footballers in the game.

Lockett has a management firm looking after his interests; that's the way he likes it.

Country-born and bred, he is retiring to the point of being shy, especially with people he doesn't know.

But he has made an effort to be more accessible to the media this year, part of a new image his manager Michael Wilson has been promoting.

As a youngster, Lockett had wobbly legs and wore calipers, being extremely skinny till he was first invited to St Kilda to train.

He has suffered from asthma since he was a child and always packs his Ventolin spray in his match-day kit-bag; often using it before and during a game. That's a genuine explanation for those times he is seen doubled over in mid-match gasping for air.

Lockett has been a headline player since he started as a 17-year-old and is now one of the game's biggest drawcards, along with Hawthorn's Dermott Brereton and Geelong's Gary Ablett.

Lockett missed the recent Victoria-SA interstate game and is keen to play against WA in Perth on July 16.

A top effort in the West this Sunday will no doubt boost his case for a Victorian guernsey.

ST KILDA'S much-improved season has them on target for a hefty profit if they make the finals for the first time since 1973. The tills at Moorabbin are expecting a profit anywhere between \$50,000 and \$200,000, depending on when their season comes to a close. The round 12 match against North Melbourne was the Saints fourth sell-out home game in a row and the club nets around \$100,000 from those gate receipts.

Eagles lose a tight one

THE West Coast Eagles three-point loss in Saturday's game against Carlton at Princes Park was the first match the Eagles have lost by under a goal for over two years.

Apart from the draw with Collingwood in last year's qualifying final, the last Eagles game with a margin of less than a goal was against Hawthorn at Subiaco Oval in Round 10 of 1989, when West Coast lost by five points.

The Eagles have lost five games by under a goal since last winning such a close match. Their last win by six points or less was against Hawthorn, by one point in Round 18 of 1987, also at Subiaco Oval.

In their five years in the AFL, the Eagles have played in 11 games where the final margin has been a goal or less. Of those games, the Eagles have won two, drawn one and lost eight.

GEELONG supporter Gary Ronan has sought verification of his belief that the Cats have the worst recent record in close games.

The Cats have won only one of their last 10 games when the margin has been a goal or less, making them the only team in the AFL to have lost nine of their last 10 close games.

But since the entry of the Eagles and the Brisbane Bears in 1987, the Eagles are the worst-performed team in close encounters. Their two wins from 11 close games compares to Geelong's four wins from 14.

The best-performed team in close games is Sydney, who have not lost one since losing the 1986 first semi-final to Fitzroy by five points. Since then, the Swans have recorded eight wins and a draw in nine close games.

In percentage terms, Hawthorn are the next best club, with eight wins from 10 close games since the start of the 1987 season.

Carlton have played 19 games since the start of 1987, where the final margin has been a goal or less. Satur-


The Demons, in each of the past four seasons, have made a habit of recovering from prolonged slumps to reach the finals.



Midfield battle will be superb

The star-studded line-ups include some of the most exciting and explosive players in the AFL.

Curbing Chris Mainwaring, Chris Lewis, Peter Matera, Brett Heady, Dean Kemp and Sumich will be just the start of Saints coach Ken Sheldon's problems on Sunday.

BRILLIANCE

But Sheldon knows that the brilliance of Nicky Winmar, Gilbert McAdam, Robert Harvey, Dean Rice and Jim Krakouer can match the ball-getting capacity of the West Coasters.

St Kilda plan a hit-and-run mission to grab their Perth glory.

The Saints will fly into Eagles territory late on Saturday and hope to return home straight after the match with victory behind them.

It is an ambitious plan by Sheldon, who sat high up in the Lillie-Marsh Stand at the WACA Ground one Friday night in July last year and watched his side turn an amazing 50-point lead just three minutes into the second term, into a 28-point loss.

The brilliant Harvey and Winmar loom as key figures in their side's hopes for midfield control. Lockett relishes the bullet-like passes Winmar fires his way, just as Sumich thrives on the delivery of Lewis, Heady, Mainwaring and Matera.

Tagging tactics have been the feature of Malthouse's success and should prove significant in his game-plan. Craig Turley, Dwayne Lamb, Don


Pyke and David Hart should all get minding roles.

The toughest assignment, however, should go to Andrew Lockyer, who was out of touch against Carlton after a tentative training week, but is the leading candidate to watch man-mountain Lockett.

Sharks forwards are hungry

THE growing stature of the East Fremantle forward line is proving ominous for rival clubs — and it is a touch of defensive work that is helping them.

The co-operation between key forwards Clinton Browning and Jeff Davidson, a combination of the new and the old, is looming as a major asset in their march to the finals.

Browning, a veteran of 11 seasons and Davidson, a rookie in his first year, are both country players, the former from Mingenew in the Great Northern League and the latter from Collie, in the South West NFL.

Collectively, they gathered 10 of East Fremantle's 21 goals last Saturday and, together with ace sharp-shooter Neil Lester-Smith, now give the Sharks three representatives in the WAFL's top 12 goalkickers.

EMPHASIS

It is the emphasis on tackling, a trait generally better associated with defenders, that is helping East Fremantle's forward line.

"The team is aiming at 40 tackles a match," says Browning. "We achieved that target against East Perth for the first time and that's a great improvement. The week before against West Perth we had 39 tackles.

"It's my main aim to lay on four good tackles a game and if all the forwards do that, then we can keep the ball in our attacking zone a lot longer."

The 21-year-old Davidson was the leading goalkicker in the SWNFL last season — posting his 65 goals from just 11 games at centre-half-forward, playing the rest of the season at centre-half-back.

His five-goal haul against East Perth was his best this season, though he has posted four goals in four previous outings.

"I enjoy playing at centre-half-forward; there's more room to move around in, especially the way we have organised our attack," says Davidson.

"It's especially good with Camel (Clinton Browning) at full-forward; he organises everything; he's always talking and telling us what to do.

"We think we've developed a pretty good system of teamwork and creating space and we seem to have quite a few options to goal now."

Davidson is one Sharks player looking decidedly fitter now than he was in pre-season work, when he was carrying some 'puppy fat' as he arrived in the city to follow the league footsteps of brother Peter, a former Claremont and Eagles wingman.

"I've lost a few kilos," says Davidson. "But it's mainly been fat, I seem to have put on some muscle around the legs."

RECORD FEAT

Browning, now 28, is one of those players who is a coach's dream; he doesn't mind where he plays as long as he is getting a game....and contributing.

With 308 goals from his 184 games with the Sharks, he has been a pretty handy forward and kicked his way into the club's history recently.

His 10-goal haul against West Perth a fortnight ago not only took his club total past 300 goals, but gave him the honour of being the first East Fremantle player to post a double-figure tally against the Leederville rivals.

In 307 previous clashes between the two clubs going back for nearly 100 years, that's no mean piece of history.



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Top coaches come at a price

HOW important is a coach to a team's prospects of success?

That is certainly one of the most intangible, but frequently-asked questions involving Australian football.

And the answers are usually varied, but always heavily influenced by the success of a club at that time.

So in the case of Mick Malthouse, it has to be said he is regarded as the most crucial cog in the top-of-the-ladder Eagles mechanism. Conversely, in the case of lowly-ranked Fitzroy and Richmond, the roles of coaches Rod Austin and Kevin Bartlett must be questioned.

TOP SALARIES

This leads to the next most frequently-asked question — how much do top AFL coaches earn?

Former VFL media manager Mike Sheahan, a respected columnist with the prestigious Melbourne paper, The Sunday Age, has used his close AFL contacts to delve into the earnings of the game's most highly-profiled men — the 15 senior coaches.

According to Sheahan, Malthouse is one of five coaches who earn between \$120,000 and \$160,000 a year.

Others in this bracket are Hawthorn's Alan Joyce, Collingwood's premiership coach Leigh Matthews, Essendon's Kevin Sheedy and Carlton's David Parkin.

On the next pay bracket — \$90,000 to \$120,000 — are Malcolm Blight (Geelong), John Northey (Melbourne) and Robert Walls (Brisbane).

Richmond's Bartlett, Adelaide's Graham Cornes, Sydney's Colin Kinnear, St Kilda's Ken Sheldon and Terry Wheeler (Footscray) are reported to

earn between \$70,000 and \$90,000 a year.

On the bottom line of \$60,000 to \$70,000 are Wayne Schimmelbusch (North Melbourne) and Fitzroy's Robert Shaw.

With the exception of Parkin, who supplements his coaching fee with a two-day a week job as a university lecturer in physical education, Blight and Schimmelbusch, all are full-time coaches.

Of the coaches in the top-earning bracket, only Malthouse has yet to coach an AFL premiership-winning team.

But judging by the success of the Eagles this season, few would begrudge Malthouse his Prime Ministerial-type salary.

But there are a few others in the AFL who probably wish they hadn't given up their day jobs.

Jakovich improves

THE Eagles made young South Fremantle utility player Glen Jakovich work hard at Pepsi Cup level before they would give him an AFL game.

But having given him the chance to earn his stripes, the Eagles are certainly not easing him into the fray.

In two of his three games, he has been given the daunting responsibility of holding down centre-half-back — firstly opposed to Footscray's experienced Glen Coleman and on Saturday he had to play on the man considered the best overhead mark in the league, Carlton captain Stephen Kernahan.

Playing on Kernahan was a huge vote of confidence in the 18-year-old and he didn't let his backers down.

Kernahan averages about 10 marks a match and has the capacity to kick a bundle of goals. While Jakovich had a total of nine kicks, made four hand-passes and took only one mark, he reduced Kernahan to eight kicks, one handpass, six marks and two goals.

Jakovich still has some work to do on his pace and his recovery, but he is learning his craft at a rate that must be making a few top forwards in Melbourne a little jittery.

And the responsibility is not likely to lessen. On Sunday he will probably be asked to negate the one man who could challenge Kernahan as the best mark in the league — St Kilda's Stuart Loewe.

It will be a clash worth watching.

Wise decision

THE AFL knows what side their bread is buttered on — they have decided to put back the start of the Eagles-St Kilda game at Subiaco Oval this Sunday by one hour.

The game, given one of the season's top billings, will now start at 2pm Perth time to allow the huge number of arm-chair critics in Melbourne to watch the full match on Channel 7, instead of having to miss the first quarter in favour of the other telecast battle, between Melbourne and Sydney.

It re-confirms the fact that the Eagles are the most-watched sporting team in Australia.

Royals were inept

EAST Perth's first half against East Fremantle, at East Fremantle Oval on Saturday, was one of the most inept performances given by a senior team in WA in recent seasons.

The Royals posted just 1.4 in the first half to highlight one of the problems that appears to plague struggling teams in the Pepsi Cup competition — the inability or unwillingness of players to run with opponents and to man-up.

These are the fundamentals of football, the basic instruction given to juniors when they play their first games.

So it was little wonder Royals coach Ian McCulloch was looking so perplexed after the game. It's no secret that there was a pre-season feeling among some Royals devotees that McCulloch was not the right man for the job. Four consecutive losses have done nothing to change these opinions.

However, in defence of the battling McCulloch, he went into the game without prime movers Lucio Baroni, George Giannakis, Paul Peos and Craig McGrath — a quartet hard to overcome in any side.

There needs to be a lot more commitment, discipline and direction if the Royals are going to halt their four-game losing sequence.

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Superules

Free tradition maintained

FREMANTLE were formed in 1982 when former East Fremantle and State player Laurie Watson, together with Fremantle stalwarts John Waters and Peter Dalgrin, decided to enter a team into a four-team Superules competition that featured Victoria Park, Northern Districts and University.

Midway through that season Fremantle folded but re-formed again in 1983 and have been part of Superules since, for the early part of the 1983 season Fremantle played in a set of jumpers donated to them by the East Fremantle Club.

This was a constant source of conjecture with South Fremantle legends John Gerovich and Tom Grijlusich so a hastily convened mid-season meeting was called and the players decided that a new set of jumpers would be needed featuring the colours of both Fremantle teams.

Those colours and jumpers still exist today.

MELBOURNE CARNIVAL
The inaugural interstate carnival held in Melbourne in 1983 included five Fremantle players, Watson, Ray Butler, Tony and George Ilich and Ned Pesich.

During the 1984-85-86 seasons Fremantle contributed to the carnival teams with players like John Gerovich, former East Fremantle coach Ron Wilcox, Len Glamuzina, John Pearce and John Branch.

However during that period Fremantle struggled to remain competitive and it wasn't until Bruce Tschirpig arrived in 1987 as captain-coach that Fremantle's fortunes changed.

At the end of the 1988 domestic season Fremantle were named "Team of the year. Their two "All-Australian" representatives have been full back Ray Butler in 1983 and centreman Tschirpig in 1987.

Let's get back to the basics

Additionally, peer group pressure, a fashionable and newly invented phrase, has ensured that people conform to standards decreed by the gurus of fashion. And nowhere is this more evident than in Australian Football where elasticised bloomers are the in-thing.

Several of the Collingwood players now wear these visual abominations and maybe that is why the team is going so badly!

MEDICALLY

One hopes that they are proven medically beneficial, as they are the thin edge of the wedge as far as the wearing of various accoutrements is concerned.

Isn't it funny how people are now prepared to, in the name of fashion, wear gear which by any reasonable judgement looks terrible.

Basketballers are a good example.

They used to wear shorts which by Australian Football standards, were fairly baggy and seemingly ill-fitting. But they were reasonable and of a style which was exclusive to that sport.

Now a couple of teams in the NBL are wearing "shorts" which are actually down to the knees.

The same trend is emerging with boxers with, I suspect, a return to the Long John imminent.

At least some Americans, from whose country many of these extraordinary fashions emanate, relate to the simple and classic lines of our Australian Football uniforms.

They literally drool over the Australian Football guernsey in particular, with the absence of padding and incorporating as they do traditional colour configurations which are unique to our code.

UNIFORM

Australian Football would be well-advised to ensure that the uniform worn by our footballers is not desecrated by fashion trends which have emerged from environments foreign to OUR game.

It would be a pity if it becomes mandatory to run up and kiss or jump up and put a scissor grip on a player every time he kicks a goal in our game.

"Over the top" congratulations are certainly becoming ever more common. More importantly — are they necessary socially or psychologically?

Players know when they have done a good job. A yelled out "well done mate" used to suffice. I think it still does.
