Turley turns it around



CRAIG TURLEY, regarded as one of the battlers of national football when he was first selected in the West Coast Eagles squad, could end up with a Brownlow Medal around his neck in September.

Turley's brilliant performance in eclipsing St Kilda's star centremen Robert Harvey — an effort that closely followed an equally valuable contribution against Carlton the week before — has stirred the hotly parochial Melbourne media to link him with football's most prestigious award.

The 25-year-old Turley has gone from being just a useful player to one of the super stars of the tough AFL competition as he dominates mid-field play week after week to be the Eagles most consistent and effective performer in 14 games this season.

And Eagles fans can expect another tireless display of ball gathering from the hard-working Turley in the game against Melbourne on Saturday.

He has shown he is equally effective on the soft and treacherous surfaces — like the MCG will be on Saturday — as he is on the wide open spaces of Subiaco Oval.

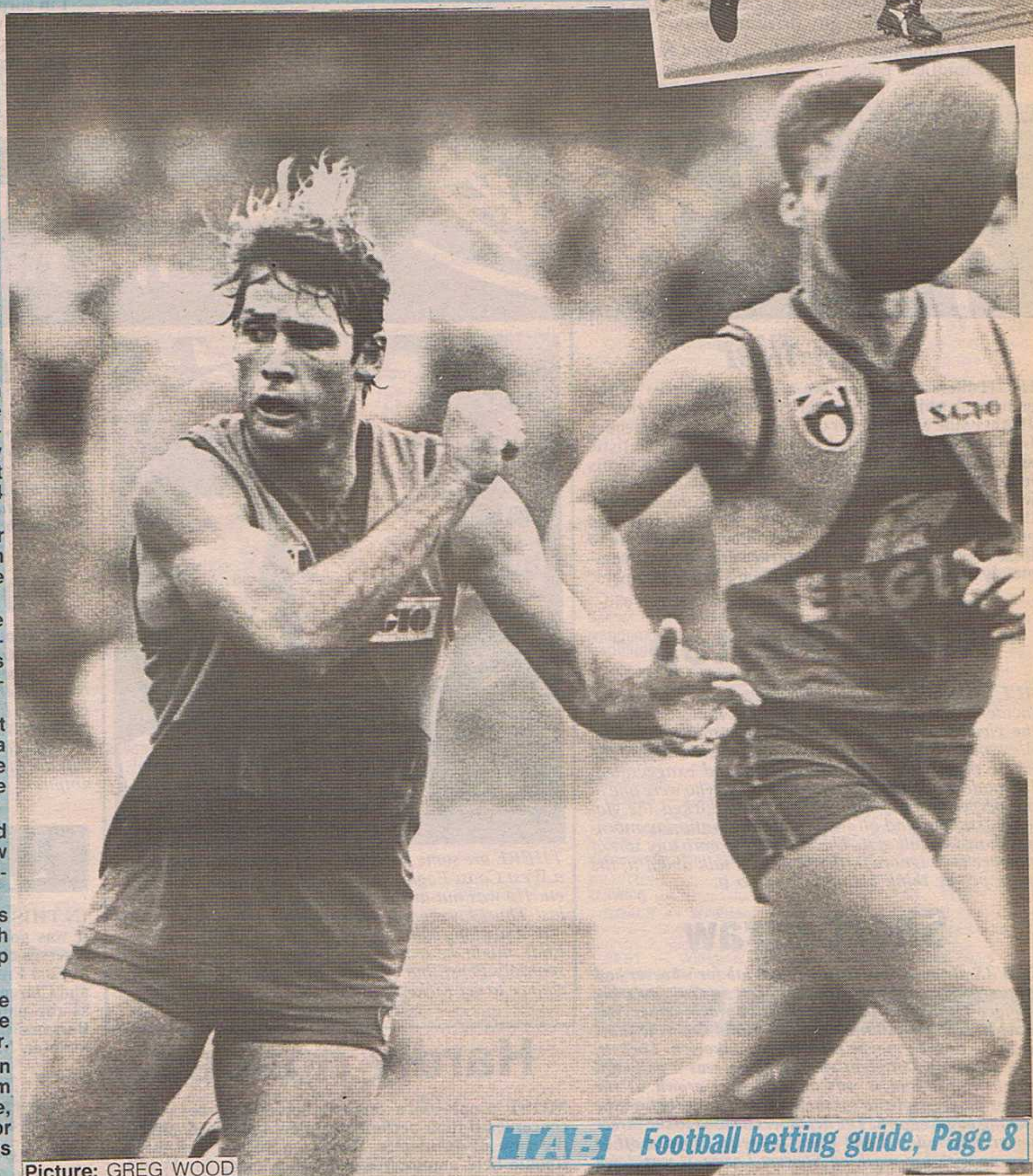
While Turley has shown he can cut the best players in the business out of a game when given a tagging task, there will now be a reversal of roles as the tagger becomes tagged.

But not all the attention this weekend will be focused on Turley and his fellow Eagles as they do battle with the highly-rated Demons.

At Bassendean Oval, Swan Districts and East Fremantle will be testing each other's mettle in the WAFL's Pepsi Cup match of round 14.

Swans have lost their last three games and are being challenged by the Sharks for second spot on the ladder.

To arrest their worrying mid-season slump, Swans will need a big game from their champion mid-fielder Phil Narkle, who will be playing his 150th senior game for the club where he started his illustrious career in 1978.

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Eagles lose a little polish

HAVE the West Coast Eagles gone off the boil?

Despite Sunday's win over St Kilda, they haven't been all that impressive in the past two weeks.

The performance against St Kilda was not as hot as some seem to believe.

The Eagles got off to a blinding start, but from then on, they had trouble keeping their foot flat on the accelerator.

How Mick Malthouse could say St Kilda were the best side the Eagles have played this season is beyond me.

MEDIOCRE

The Saints were mediocre performers on Sunday. In fact, if they hadn't had Tony Lockett they would have been very ordinary.

You need to measure the Eagles performance against that fact. The Eagles had a chance to bury their rivals on Sunday, but were unable to do so. Sure they kicked 21 goals, but they should have scored a lot more.

St Kilda were killed midfield and on the ball.

Robert Harvey was a quiet performer, Gilbert McDam lifted after half-time, but he was really the only player giving St Kilda any drive midfield.

On the other hand, the Eagles exposed St Kilda's lack of midfield pace.

The Eagles did not get value on the scoreboard for their dominance in this department.

While they are a potent side with Lockett up front, St Kilda simply weren't suited to the wide expanses of Subiaco Oval and it showed.

Their second-half performance, when they outscored the Eagles, was an indication of how much the Eagles went off the boil after half-time.

St Kilda didn't play much better; Tony Lockett did.

In the end it was virtually Lockett versus the Eagles. He made the most of limited opportunities in St Kilda's forward line.

After their initial burst, the Eagles became scrappy in attack.

Too many times they looked certain to score a goal only to muff it up.

And what's wrong with Peter Sumich? Is he carrying an injury?

In the past two weeks he has been only a shadow of the player who kicked 13 goals against Footscray.

Against Carlton and St Kilda he lacked spring.

Without him and Chris Lewis firing the Eagles looked disorganised in attack. Too often their forward line was congested and they were forced to rely on the individual brilliance and opportunism of Brett Heady to give them bite up forward.

While it is difficult to criticise a team that has only one narrow loss in 14 matches, the reality of the situation is — are the Eagles starting to go into decline while a couple of other teams appear to be on the rise?

Geelong are running hot at the moment. Colling-

wood appear to be getting their act together ... and Hawthorn look a far better team with Jason Dunstall and Dermott Brereton back in the team.

The next few weeks will show whether the Eagles have come back to the field.

Perhaps a couple of losses will do them good.

It would take the pressure off them and erase the belief that they have the premiership at their mercy ... and perhaps give them an opportunity to again sharpen up their act.

There are aspects of their game that need attention before they can be confident of winning the premiership.

At this stage of the season they should be starting to add the polish, but there are still some rough spots in their game.

RUCK WORRY

An observation was made on Sunday by another critic ... what would happen to the Eagles if they lost Dean Irving?

What indeed?

There is no-one else in the team to take the ruckwork.

I'm surprised that Malthouse isn't using either Phil Scott or Ryan Turnbull off the bench at the moment as a backstop for Irving.

Perhaps I'm being too harsh on the Eagles.

But there's no point finishing on top of the premiership ladder and then falling away when it most counts ... in the finals.

FOOTY RUMOURS

GOSSIP FROM AROUND THE TRAPS

High-flier

HIGH-fliers in football are a spectacular part of the game and while the big marks are important, there's another side to the aerial contests. East Perth defender Gavin Rose was credited with an interesting statistic against Perth on Saturday when he produced 18 spoils in his role as full-back. Rose, a former State junior high jump champion, has taken some fantastic marks above the packs in his career, but last week his role was purely defensive. Coach Ian McCulloch paid tribute to Rose by saying that he had turned his football completely around to be one of the team's top performers.

Over the top

ALL THIS talk about football violence and after-match incidents has been blown out of proportion...mainly by the electronic media. Former coach and player Ron Alexander summed it up on Saturday when he said the whole thing was being over-played and exaggerated. He made the comments on Radio 6PR, who were one of the perpetrators of the over-kill. 6PR kicked the violence issue around all week and their Saturday morning show was full of it. The best way to curb any sort of violence is to ignore it; the more you talk about it, the more people think about it...and do it.

Short straw

IT WAS always going to be a tough job for whoever had to guard danger Saint Tony Lockett in Sunday's big Subiaco Oval shoot-out. The question was whether Michael Brennan or Andrew Lockyer would draw the short straw — or even maybe rookie Glen Jakovich. Lockett, with an average of eight goals a game, was a potential match-winner and it was an expectant crowd as the Eagles players split to go their various ways before the opening bouncdown. The defenders headed to the three-tier grandstand end and when Jakovich dropped off to man-up with big-marking Stewart Loewe, it was down to Brennan and Lockyer. There was some amusement as the pair seemed to play to the crowd, with a couple of change-of-mind movements, but finally Lockyer toed-up to the man-mountain.



THERE are some pleasant perks associated with being a West Coast Eagle...just ask exciting rover Dale Kickett. He was out at the Beechboro Farmer Jack's store last Thursday signing autographs for the hundreds of fans and along came this pretty young admirer. Kerryn Eddy might be a promotions lass for major football sponsors Pepsi, but she also loves the Eagles and the chance to get Kickett's autograph in a prominent place was too good to refuse.

Hardly noticed

MOST people on a football field would be a little concerned if their performance went unnoticed...but in the case of an umpire, that's not such a bad thing. Rookie field umpire Wayne French made his WAFL debut last Saturday and as Radio 6WF commentator Glenn Mitchell said, he was most unobtrusive and hardly noticed. "That's the sign of a good umpire," he said.

Little winner

AMIDST all the pre-match hype over who would have to face up to giant Tony Lockett, little Don Pyke didn't come into calculations. But the much-improved Pyke, whose physical approach to the game has made him an Eagles regular, wasn't daunted by the man-mountain. Right on the half-time siren Pyke faced Lockett in a one-on-one situation, but bundled the big man out of position and bounced off him with the leather safely tucked under his little arm.

Dashing Demons

PERTH may not have won the four premiership points at Perth Oval on Saturday, but they did have one win on the weekend — the Pepsi relay during the half-time break of the West Coast Eagles clash with St Kilda. Using a litre bottle of Pepsi as a baton, Demons rookies Matt McMurray and Ian Wells teamed with second year players Darren Rigby and Mark Grogan to win the race from the other seven WAFL clubs and the umpires.

Sporting fellows

IN THIS day of fierce competition on the football field, it was good to see some sportsmanship in the Pepsi reserves clash between East Fremantle and Claremont at East Fremantle Oval. East Fremantle's Revis Ryder and Claremont's Brendan Barrows clashed heavily and as the pair struggled to their feet, Ryder picked up Barrows' mouth-guard and placed it back in his mouth for him. 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Boris the terrible

KARL Langdon is Western Australia's most maligned footballer.

At a time when WA is firmly in the grasp of Eagle-mania and anyone wearing a West Coast guernsey is elevated to film star status, Langdon is the odd man out.

He cops more derisive comments and abuse from rival supporters than any other Eagle and even home-town fans get some perverse pleasure in venting their spleens at Langdon's expense.

Opposition players don't like him very much, either. Whenever there's an on-field squabble, it's a toss up to see who is the first to get a knee in the groin — Langdon or Peter Wilson.

MISTAKES

His ugly duckling image probably stems from the fact he lacks the grace and flair of a Chris Lewis or a Brett Heady. His ball-handling skills don't quite measure up to a Dean Kemp or a Chris Waterman and his impetuous nature means he makes more mistakes than other players appear to.

There are times when Langdon runs around with the purpose and direction of a headless chook.

In fact, his uncle Don Langdon, that great East Perth and WA centre-half-forward of 30 years ago and one of the most accomplished overhead marks imaginable, must shudder every time he sees his nephew drop a sitter.

BOTTLE-BLOND

And then there's that bottle-blond hair that makes him stand out like a beacon. While the mistakes of some players can go unnoticed, Langdon advertises his.

So why, the casual watcher asks as Langdon knocks over one of his teammates waiting to take an uncontested mark, doesn't Mick Malthouse "get that bloody idiot" off?

The answer is simple. Langdon provides the Eagles with the energy, the enthusiasm and the competitiveness that, at the end of the day, all the skill in the world can't stack up against.

RESEMBLANCE

With a nickname of Boris — based on his earlier resemblance to tennis great Boris Becker before a hair-colour change — Langdon doesn't go out of his way to win friends on a football field.

Whenever there's a pack to be split open, Langdon's the man to do it. Or a ball to be slapped out of a pack to a teammate (a la Heady's early goal against St Kilda). Or a player to chase and harass.

Langdon always finds himself at the point of contest. He may not win that contest, but there's a better than even chance one of his mates will, via the prior work of Langdon.

...but he's worth his weight in gold

He's a player who thrives on putting his body on the line to get the ball out to a teammate.

Anyone who has played a bit of footy can tell you the hardest blokes to play against are those who are unpredictable. It's a worry being in the vicinity of an opposition player who gives the impression that crossing the white line leaves him a few bricks short of a load.

The only thing predictable about Langdon is that, regardless of how badly he's playing, he'll never chuck it in. He has the capacity to put in a shocker for the first half and then cut loose; just as he did against the Saints on Sunday.

Langdon isn't fancy. But if you were about to leap out of the trenches, he's the sort of bloke you would like to have going over the top with you.

That's why Malthouse will always find a place for Langdon.

Seminar will plan for the future

It is with a degree of apprehension that the eight club general managers, major sponsors, media personalities, politicians and other special guests with a football interest will meet with League officials to formulate a blueprint for the future of WA football.

The past 20 years will be reviewed in the hope of making firm and positive assessments for the survival of the game into the 21st century.

Similar think-tank meetings and special committees in recent seasons have resulted in plenty of hot air on directions WA's second tier of football should take.

ACTION

But WAFL clubs want action on previous recommendations, rather than more paper-work and more discussions.

The hottest topic will be the rationalisation of Perth's nine football venues.

The virtual closure of some WAFL grounds and the prospect of playing

matches away from traditional venues will be strongly resisted in many quarters.

However, the current football industry is battling to adequately service the existing grounds. Club members are failing to utilise grounds as often as they did in the past.

Subiaco, the richest WAFL club, are tipped to lead the push for reducing the number of playing venues...an ironic twist as the Lions were once urged to move to Wanneroo, but resisted the change.

The Lions hierarchy want WAFC representatives to communicate with AFL clubs Hawthorn, Carlton and Fitzroy to establish their formula for successfully sharing Princes Park over the past decade.

PROPOSALS

Some of the seminar proposals will call for regular double-headers in WAFL ranks and for invitations to be extended to Perth's league soccer clubs to use WAFL grounds when they are not being used for Aussie Rules matches.

Maximum use of premises is seen as essential to continue to service the enormous debts facing WAFL clubs.

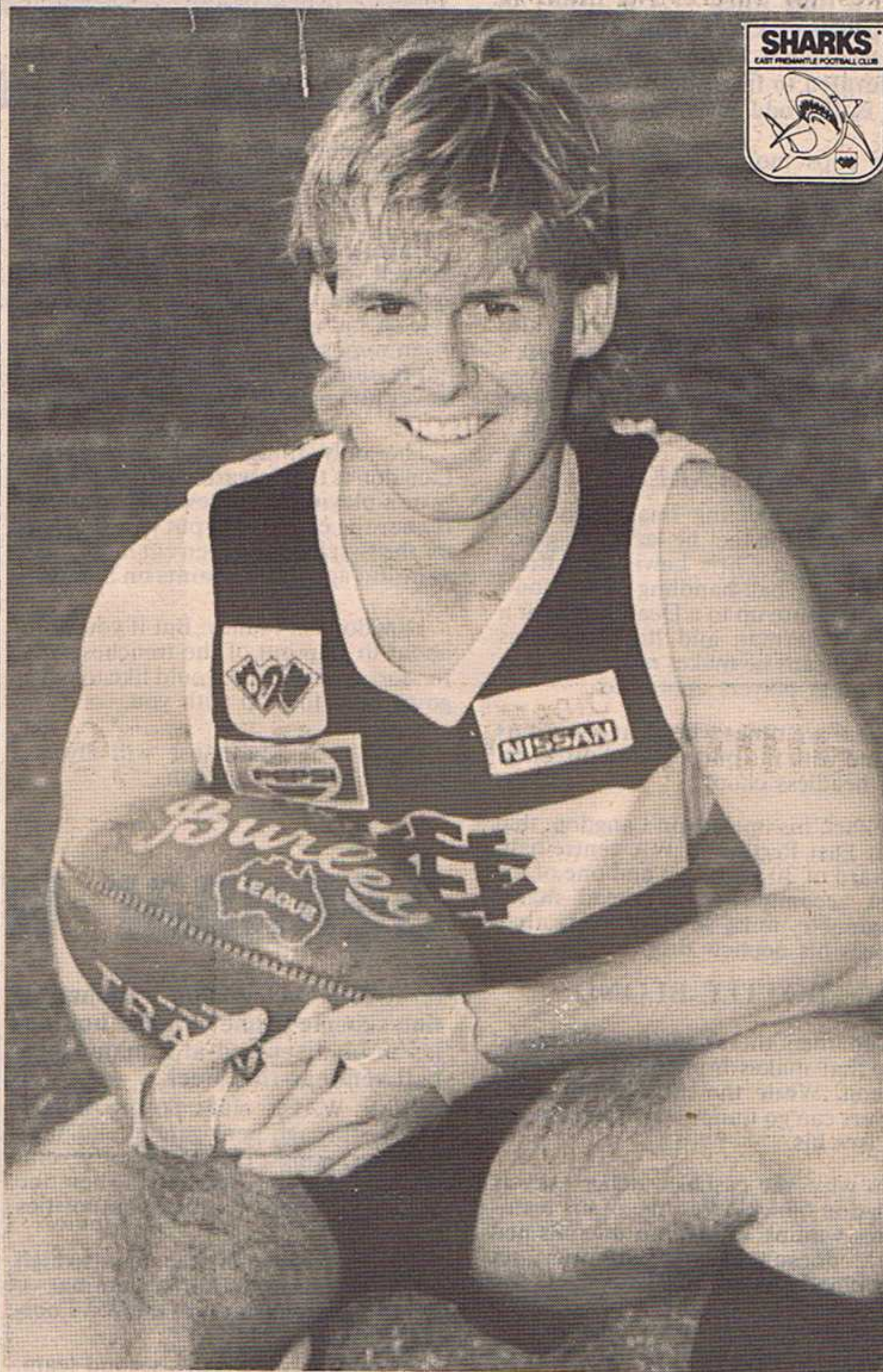

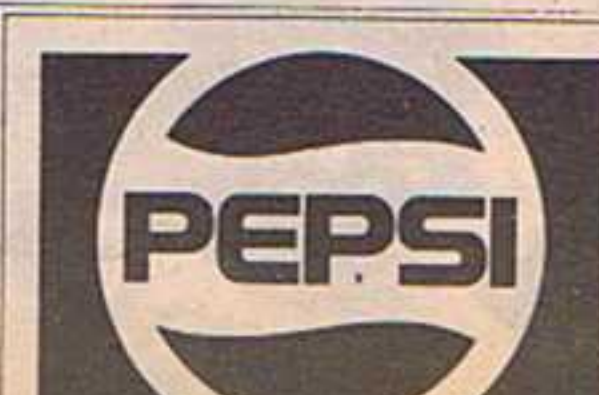

CLUB Bay 13, that infamous hot-spot near the forward pocket at the Melbourne Cricket Ground, has come to Perth — and an afternoon in the Subiaco Oval equivalent makes for interesting football viewing.

Perched in a prime position on the generous grass banks of Subiaco Oval, even a match between the top-of-the-table West Coast and third-placed St Kilda can become a sidelight to the live entertainment offered by the 152 members and their guests of the Eagles' newest supporters club.

The boisterous activities of the crowd in the MCG's Bay 13 are notorious internationally and they are well-remembered for vocal chants aimed at New Zealand fast bowler Richard Hadlee during the 1987-88 cricket season, which did little for Australia's relationships with our Kiwi neighbours.

But back to the Bay 13 Subiaco Oval style.

Eagles business development officer Peter Wilson toyed with the idea of creating a similar gathering place on local territory after playing in front of Bay 13 in his three seasons with Richmond and he teamed with Eagles mar-

keting services manager, Ken Magee, to get the plan in motion for the start of this season.

An attractive admission price for a prime-viewing spot and your own private bar are two of the attractions, but the biggest value is the entertainment from within the white picket fence.

An unsuspecting opposition leader, Barry MacKinnon and wife, Pam, were special guests in Club Bay 13 for the St Kilda match and were given an immediate welcome to the hill before they even had time to get their rug in place.

"Hey, did you pay to get in here?" inquired a voice from the back of the stand.

EASY TARGETS

"Yeah, I swapped my ticket for a postage stamp!" replied a sharp Liberal leader, in reference to recent Royal Commission findings...and much to the delight of the gathering.

Anyone venturing into, or within earshot of, Club Bay 13 is a target for a quick jibe, as Saints coach Ken Sheldon discovered while inspecting that

corner of the ground before Sunday's kick-off.

"We hate Victorians!" came the cry.

A group of St Kilda fans were early starters in the marquee and they ensured an interesting afternoon would be had by all.

Brave supporters of rival clubs occasionally find their way into the pro-Eagles gathering, like the young lady who was game enough to wear a Sydney Swans guernsey into the Bay in Round 10.

The St Kilda fans even had their own version of their favourite son, spearhead Tony Lockett.

A man sporting a St Kilda guernsey, complete with pillow stuffed in the front, spent a good deal of the day entertaining the crowd by mimicking Lockett as he lined up for numerous shots at goal.

Like the MCG crowd's penchant for mirroring the warm-up actions of Aussie bowler Merv Hughes, Club Bay 13 obviously brings out the actor in everyone.

Friendly police officers patrolling the boundary line in front of the Bay don't escape some mild-mannered attention either and a grin and a nod of acknowledgment from the men and women in blue showed that it's all in good fun.

CHORUS LINE

The sighting of a male and female member of the force on patrol is the cue for a group of guys in the rear to launch into the familiar chorus of an old Joe Jackson hit.

"Is she really going out with him? Is she really gonna take him home tonight? Is she really going out with him? 'Cause if my eyes don't deceive me, there's something going on around here..."

A blush and shake of the head from the young officer answers those questions and it's all eyes back to the football action as Brian Wilson takes his position on the half-forward line.

The former Melbourne player isn't a popular figure in the West and the vocal Bay 13 crowd continuously let Wilson know the scoreline.

The final siren spelt an end to the action on and off the field and the white marquee is folded and put away awaiting its next airing on Sunday, August 18 when the Eagles take on Hawthorn.

Hawks stars Dermott Brereton and John Platten will be the likely targets of Bay 13 jibes that day and the members are probably already preparing a few unforgettable one-liners.

A good sense of humour is the only pre-requisite for a Club Bay 13 member and with limited space available, names are already being taken by the Eagles office for next year's membership which will be bigger and better than the 1991 debut.

Saints still a danger

DON'T write St Kilda off as premiership prospects after their loss to the Eagles on Sunday.

To do so would be foolish and the Eagles will certainly have great respect for them if, or when, we meet them in the finals come September.

Apart from the first quarter when the Eagles played sensational football, it was a fairly even game throughout.

Any team that boasts a player of Tony Lockett's awesome strength and goal-kicking ability has to be regarded as a threat.

It is almost unbelievable that a player can average eight goals a game under the pressure he faces in a game.

Andrew Lockyer had the unenviable task of stopping Lockett and he did a pretty good job in the first half. Once Lockett got on the lead, it was almost impossible to stop him getting the ball.

MCG will be different

THINGS will be a bit different for the Eagles this week when they run onto the MCG to play Melbourne on Saturday.

Last week they ran onto Subiaco Oval to the cheers of more than 42,000 parochial supporters and there's no doubt that had a lifting effect on the players after their loss to Carlton at Princes Park the week before.

Melbourne have a strong and vocal following and there is plenty of "feeling" between the Eagles and the Demons over recent years.

The pro-Melbourne crowd will add to this — they love to rubbish the top dogs.

On this basis, winning is going to be a much tougher assignment than most people think.

Whose kidding!

ST KILDA coach Ken Sheldon must have been kidding in his pre-game statements that he was worried about the Saints having to travel to Perth for a match.

He was basing this on the fact the Eagles travel every second week, which helps them get used to frequent long flights.

Jakovich grows in stature

GLEN Jakovich's status as a potentially outstanding player grows with every game.

Jakovich was given the tough assignment of playing on Stewart Loewe, the man they claim can fit three dozen eggs into the palms of his hands.

There is no doubt Loewe is one of the finest marks seen in football and his average of 10 marks a game is testimony to that.

In fact, Loewe has been a real problem for the Eagles over the past couple of seasons and last year he took 32 marks against us in two games.

So we were delighted when Jakovich kept Loewe down to just seven marks on Sunday.

It was important to get an idea before the finals as to how some Eagles players can perform against very good players and Jakovich has now faced some talented rivals in his brief stint as a centre-half-back.

He did well against Stephen Kernahan the week before and it's doubtful if he will find many better players than the Blues skipper.

Mind you, things could get really tough for him against Melbourne this week if he has to line up on his older brother Allan, a key forward for the Demons and an eight-goal performer last week.

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SATURDAY'S game between Perth and West Perth at John Dunn Reserve in Kelmscott is the first WAFL fixture ever to be played in the Southern corridor which makes up a large part of the Perth Football Club's local zone.

The experiment is a continuation of WAFL policy to share the State's highest level of local football around which has also seen games played in Geraldton, Dampier, Bunbury, Mt Barker and Wanneroo in recent seasons.

"It's a bit of a 'PR' exercise in conjunction with the Sunday Football League, Kelmscott, the Perth Football club and the WAFL," said new Perth general manager Trevor Riley.

Riley, a life member of Kelmscott, has been involved with Kelmscott for the past 20 years and before joining the Demons a few weeks ago he enjoyed a stint as president and 12 years as general manager.

He was also on a taskforce to examine the feasibility of the Perth Football Club switching its base to the heart of the Demons zone, a topic which is still a hot subject among Demons fans.

INEVITABLE

Many Demons supporters think it is inevitable that Perth will one day move to the Kelmscott area and the sooner they make the switch, the sooner the club can establish stronger support in the surrounding suburbs.

In the other corner, red and black loyalists cringe at the thought of departing from their beloved Lathlain Park after working so hard at making it a home after early years, and two recent seasons, spent at the WACA Ground.

Whether Perth one day call Kelmscott home or not, Saturday's game at John Dunn Oval will strengthen the strong links that the Demons already have in the area.

There is a possibility that Kelmscott and Perth will split the gate and bar takings from the match, depending on the size of the crowd which Perth and WAFL officials hope well-exceeds the 3,500 mark.

"People in the Kelmscott area are football mad and they will turn up just because there is a football match on," Riley said.

An indication of their liking for football in the southern suburbs is the fact that Sunday Football League attendances have not dropped off since the introduction of the West Coast Eagles in 1987.

Former Eagle and East Fremantle star Darren Bennett and one-time South Fremantle forward Allen Jakovich kicked the Demons back into the finals race with an 83-point win over Sydney Swans last Sunday.

Jakovich, in only his fourth senior AFL appearance after joining the Demons from

Woodville, in South Australia, kicked eight goals and Bennett seven.

Melbourne's win ended a five-week horror stretch of losses and primed the famous club for another showdown with the Eagles.

Irish ruckman Jim Stynes is a Demon who reserves something extra for his shoot-outs with West Coast.

Brilliant South Australian follower Andrew Obst is running back into his best form and shapes as a possible opponent for Eagles sensation Brett Heady.

IRVING

Irving has taken on the AFL's best big men over the past two months and seldom been forced to lower his colours.

Heady, Craig Turley, Chris Mainwaring and Chris Lewis, can counter anything Melbourne have on the ball and through the middle of the ground.

But the Jakovich-Bennett connection could prove a headache if the exciting pair are allowed to break loose early, as they did against Sydney.

Andrew Lockyer, wiser and mentally hardened after his unenviable battle with Tony Lockett last Sunday and Guy McKenna shape as opponents for Bennett and Jakovich.

DEFENDER

Even the prospect of playing in-form rookie defender Glen Jakovich on his older brother Allen, will cross Eagles coach Mick Malthouse's mind this week as he ponders how to counter the Demon forwards.

The brilliant Peter Sumich seldom suffers successive matches without a swag of goals and after just a two-goal haul against St Kilda last week, he looms as a danger-man for Melbourne.

In five seasons, the two clubs have had some titanic battles, with the Eagles taking the honours in last Septem-

ber's first semi-final and repeating the feat at the start of 1991 when Melbourne managed just two goals in an afternoon of one-sided football at Subiaco Oval.

This week might not be as one-sided, but the Eagles can make it three-in-a-row on the Demons.

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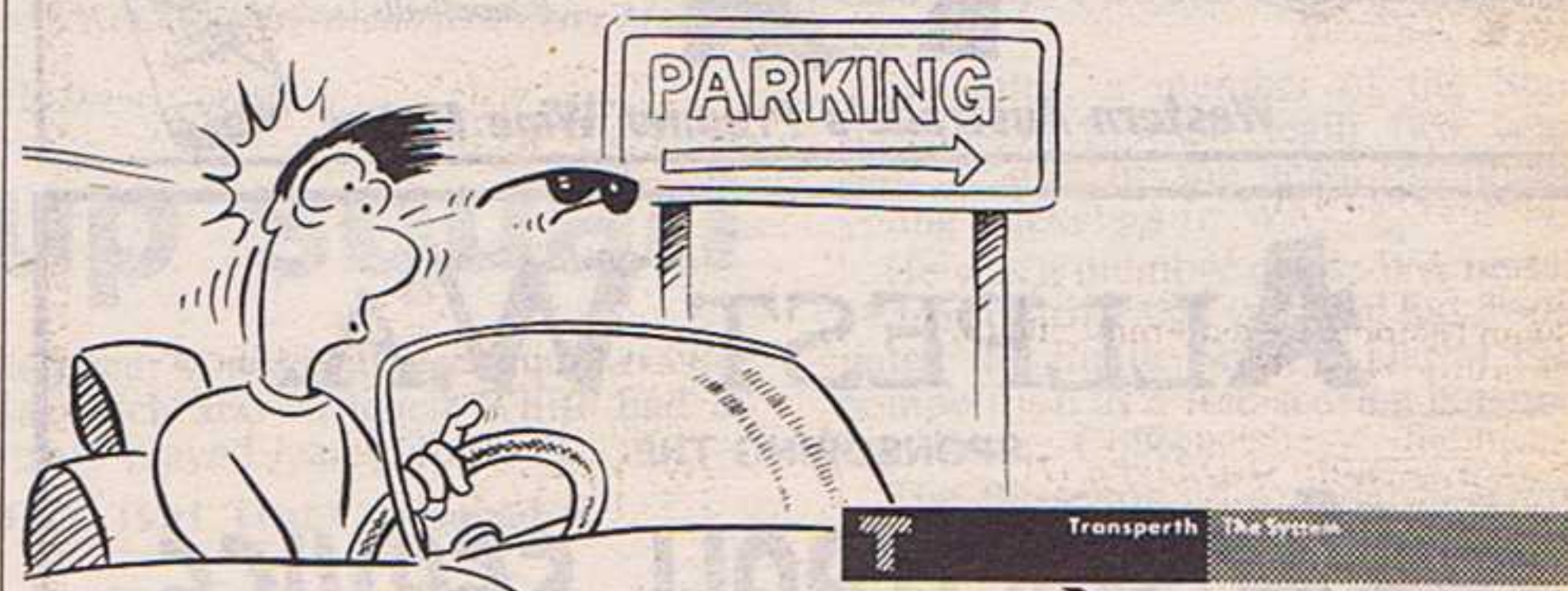

Tough pill for Malaxos to swallow

A CRUEL twist of fate is looming for former West Coast Eagles and WA captain Steve Malaxos as the big State-of-Origin clash against Victoria draws closer.

Malaxos, captain in WA's stylish 44-point victory over South Australia at Subiaco Oval last month, could prove a victim of the anomalies of the modern-day structure that centres around national football.

Players in the veteran category can dominate WAFL matches, but be considered "over the hill" for AFL or interstate duty, whereas teenagers can turn in performances of lesser quality and be classed as potential national draftees.

Malaxos, the discarded Eagles skipper, a former club fairest-and-best winner and a joint winner of the 1984 Sandover Medal, will probably miss selection to play Victoria for the same reasons he has failed to win an Eagles berth in 1991.

Eagles and State selectors believe Malaxos is too slow for the big-time.

That firm belief among the decision-makers remains Malaxos's biggest hurdle in his endeavours to win another Eagles and State guernsey.

The WA team will comprise primarily of Eagles players with a sprinkling of Melbourne-based West Australians.

Geelong's hot Brownlow Medal

prospect Mark Bairstow, St Kilda pair Nicky Winmar and Paul Harding, Essendon trio Darren Bewick, Peter Cransberg and Derek Kickett (if fit), Collingwood's duo Craig Starcevich and Michael Christian and Brisbane's David Bain and John Gastev are strong candidates.

The "too slow" tag Malaxos is wearing remains intact despite his weekly collection of more than 35 possessions in five appearances for East Fremantle since leaving Claremont — not forgetting the 28 touches he had against the Croweaters.

Malaxos isn't the only WAFL-based player who could be sitting in the WACA Ground stands on July 16 after coach Mick Malthouse and his co-selectors construct the State side.

Brendon Retzlaff, the Simpson Medallist for his brilliant performance against SA on June 11 and in top form with Swan Districts, could be overlooked in what would clearly be viewed as a "political" decision.

Retzlaff has been drafted by Eagles arch-rivals Collingwood and he plans to join the Magpies next season.

In the current frenzied war of words raging between the Eagles and Mel-

bourne-based clubs, why would Malthouse and WA football offer Collingwood's crack recruit valuable big-match exposure before his departure to Victoria Park?

The WA Football Commission may intervene and suggest that Malthouse and chairman of selectors Malcolm Brown recognise the local league by finding a selection of the calibre of Peter Matera and Glen Jakovich; WAFL men included in State-of-Origin teams in the past two seasons. pace and electrifying skills could cope with big-time football.

A careful glance through the current crop of potential AFL draftees in local ranks, sadly, does not reveal any such future stars.

Claremont's Jason Norrish and Andrew McGovern showed in their interstate debuts against SA they have a way to go.

Depending on form and how hungry Swans follower Geoff Passeri is to attract an AFL draft invitation later this year, he could be the outsider to win the WAFL representation nod.

Passeri's Swans teammate and captain Peter Hodyl and livewire Claremont forward Kevin Mitchell also have claims for consideration with two polished performances against SA in the past 12 months.

However, like Malaxos, the pair could be considered "past it" for the big occasions.

Magic reward for Sharks fans

BEING loyal supporters of East Fremantle — and their major sponsors, Magic Nissan — has paid off handsomely for Coogee couple Kevin and Kay Jones.

They won a trip for four to Disneyland when their name was pulled out of the competition barrel at Subiaco Oval just before the big bouncdown in the Eagles-St Kilda game.

While some 42,000 people sighed in envy as Magic Nissan principal Ron Bennett named Mrs Kay Jones as the lucky winner, she was home in her Coogee garden, tending the cabbages.

"But we quickly headed for the champagne when we heard," she said this week.

Mrs Jones had bought a Nissan Pulsar from the Melville dealership that has been the major sponsor of East Fremantle since the mid-1980s and her name went into the barrel that was rolled out onto Subiaco Oval before the big game.

"We often follow the Eagles, but we didn't make it to Sunday's game," she said.

"However, a representative from Magic Nissan telephoned us straight after the draw and that was the end of the gardening. We're just over the moon."

The couple have strong family ties with East Fremantle, with Kevin's father Ron Jones being a former vice-president of the Sharks.

Kevin played his junior football with East Fremantle, before joining North Fremantle in the amateurs.

HOUGHTON'S TOP PERFORMER

IT'S called professionalism and it comes with the high-profiled role as coach of an AFL club.

It comes to the fore after your team has been flogged — at a time when a coach wants nothing more than a cosy corner in which to sulk. But he has to put on a brave face when he's confronted by the post-match media conference.

There's a gaggle of microphones thrust into his face; an assortment of television cameras focusing in and half-a-dozen or more journalists asking questions that a coach would rather weren't asked.

Tolerance in this area, or professionalism, is a quality most AFL coaches develop. St Kilda coach Ken Sheldon has it in abundance and it appears to come naturally.

At a time when he must have been bitterly disappointed by the way in which the Saints were destroyed by the Eagles, Sheldon had the grace to be constructive and positive when he faced the media at Subiaco Oval.

There were no grizzles, no excuses and he was happy to give credit where it was due — and to look forward to the day of retribution.

"I was very impressed by the Eagles ability to pressure us early and you can't give quality sides a start like

that," Sheldon said. "They are certainly worthy of top spot.

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Goggin looks West

BILLY GOGGIN regards his interstate football involvement as a "real privilege".

As coach of the Victorian team, he heads a venerable Big V braintrust which includes two of the most famous footballers of all, Ted Whitten and Ron Barassi.

However, he realises that this clash with WA involves a different set of circumstances and victory will be difficult as they play the top team in the AFL.

"After 30, people say you're nearly finished," he

said. "If enough people say it enough times, long enough and loud enough, you start to believe it yourself."

"You have to be careful with that."

"My football career is limited. I have only limited time left so I want to make the most of it."

"If part of making the most of it is gaining selection in a Victorian side at 33, well that is definitely a very good thing to happen to you."

"Sports people aspire to play at the very highest level possible."

Milestones for top forwards

RIVAL full-forwards Peter Sumich and Tony Lockett achieved personal milestones in the final quarter of Sunday's West Coast Eagles-St Kilda game at Subiaco Oval.

At the 11-minute mark of the final quarter, Sumich kicked the second of his two goals for the game — his 200th goal for the Eagles.

Just over eight minutes later, Lockett became the only present-day player to register 600 goals when he kicked his seventh for the game.

Sunday's game was Sumich's 55th for the Eagles. He reached the milestone in seven less games than Lockett, who took 62 games to kick his first 200 goals.

The AFL's other star full-forward, Jason Dunstall (Hawthorn) kicked his 200th goal in his 60th game, while Geelong's Gary Ablett reached the 200-goal mark in 59 games.

Dunstall beat Ablett and Lockett to 300 goals (a mark he reached in 78 games) and 400 goals (98 games). Dunstall kicked his 500th goal in his 113th game, four games quicker than Lockett.

Lockett, who has played one less game, passed Dunstall on the weekend and has kicked three goals more than his Hawk rival.

TONY Lockett's eight goals set a record for an opposition player at Subiaco Oval and matched Peter Sumich's record tally for the ground.

Eagles half-forward Brett Heady went within one goal of equalling the record, with his tally of 7.3.

In the first quarter, Heady kicked the Eagles 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th goals. It is only the second time an Eagles player has kicked five consecutive goals.

The first player to do so was Sumich, who kicked the Eagles 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th goals in the first quarter against Footscray at the WACA Ground on June 16, 1989.

FOOTSCRAY'S run of inaccurate scoring continued on Saturday when they kicked 11.23 against Essendon.

It was the third time in their past four matches that the Bulldogs have kicked more than twice as many points as goals.

After totalling 140.125 in their first 10 games of the season, Footscray have kicked 30.60 in their last four matches.

Excluding an accurate 7.5 against the Eagles in Perth, the Bulldogs have totalled 23.55 against St Kilda, Carlton and Essendon.

NORTH Melbourne failed to break their 10-game losing streak against Hawthorn when they went down to the Hawks last Friday night.

Unless they meet in the finals, the Roos will now have to wait until 1992 for another chance to beat the Hawks for the first time since 1984.

Footscray's win over Essendon at the Western Oval on Saturday was their first over the Bombers since 1988.

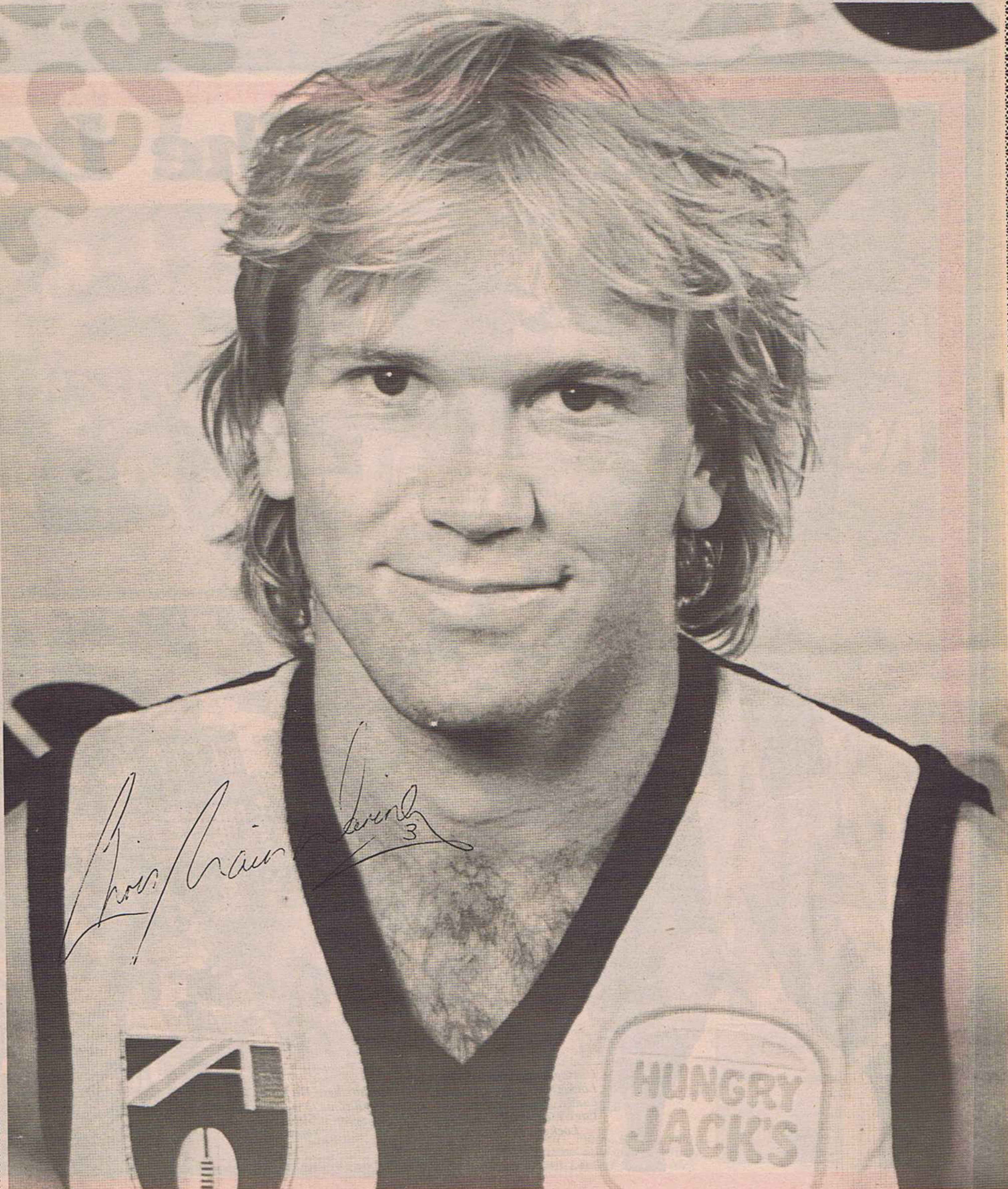

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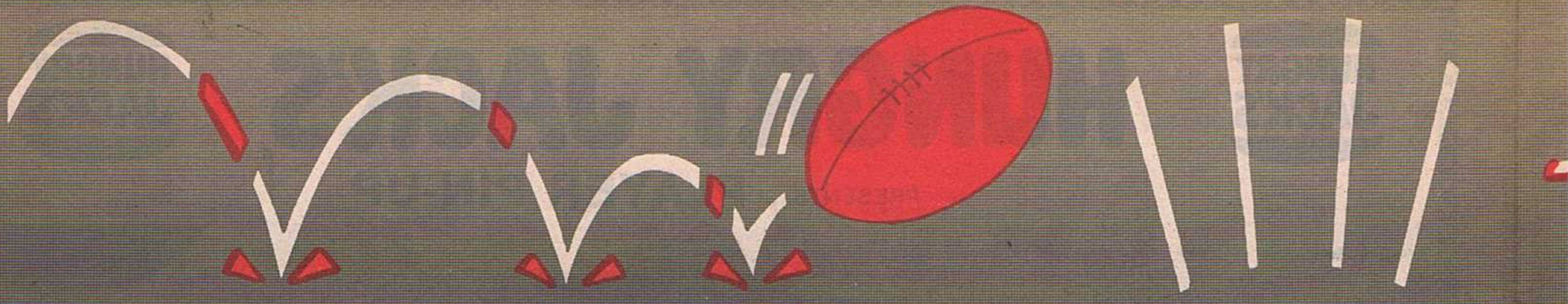

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FOOTBALL clubs acknowledge many heroes as the years go by and the honour boards pay tribute to the fairest and best winners and leading goalkickers each year. In this special series, Westside Football looks at those achievers in the modern era.

Royals trio share dual honour

ACHIEVING the rare double of a fairest and best medal and the club's leading goalkicker is a feat recorded by three players in East Perth's long history.

Two of those achievers were home-grown heroes in Malcolm Brown and Peter Spencer, while the third was one of the club's most successful imports in Fitzroy's Brett Stephens.

The Royals have produced some outstanding footballers in terms of fairest and best winners, with six of their previous club champions also winning the State's highest individual award, the Sandover Medal.

In addition, three of the club's 100-goals-a-season performers topped the WAFL goalkicking ladder in the same year.

GOOD YEAR

The year of 1972 was one that Brown will long remember.

After claiming a Sandover Medal in 1969, one of football's youngest winners at the age of 22, he went on with that form to captain-coach East Perth to the 1972 premiership, winning the club's fairest and best award and being their top goalkicker, posting 51 majors from his centre-half-forward position.

It was Brown's third F. D. Book Medal as the club champion, claiming the honour in 1969 and '70, but it was the only time he was the team's leading goalkicker even though he started his career in 1965 as a full-forward, kicking four goals on his debut.

"I loved playing at full-forward," recalls Brown, now chairman of the State selectors. "But as my career developed,

I played more as a centre-half-forward or in the ruck."

Spencer, one of the most courageous players to ever don the blue-and-black, followed in the fairest-and-best winning footsteps of his father Jim, who claimed the honour in 1953, just as the Royals were about to embark on their golden era of grand finals.

The young Spencer won the fairest and best in 1975, his second year in league ranks and it was a season when the Royals lacked a real spearhead, enabling the elusive rover to top the club's goalkicking with a tally of 34 majors.

He repeated the fairest and best effort the next year, collecting the Sandover Medal as well to confirm his dominance of the local competition.

In 1982 he added another goalkicking achievement to his East Perth record, with the Royals, again struggling in attack, relying on Spencer to top their tally with 37.

The arrival at Perth Oval of Stephens, a strong-marking forward from Fitzroy — where he now plays mainly in defence for the Lions — gave the Royals a focal point and he succeeded in his first year, winning the club champion trophy and topping the goalkicking with 69 majors.

GOALKICKERS

East Perth's three WAFL leading goalkickers were Bill Mose, Neil Hawke and Phil Tierney, all of whom finished with tallies well past the coveted century.

Mose and Hawke took the WAFL honours in successive years, the former kicking 115 goals in 1958 and the latter following up the next year with 114.

Tierney was East Perth's next century-achiever with 119 in 1967, the first of two years when he reached that tally. However, his second effort was overshadowed by the record-breaking 157 goals kicked by Subiaco's Austin Robertson jnr.

The achievement of winning the Sandover Medal in the same year as the champion club award was claimed by four other players in addition to Brown and Spencer.

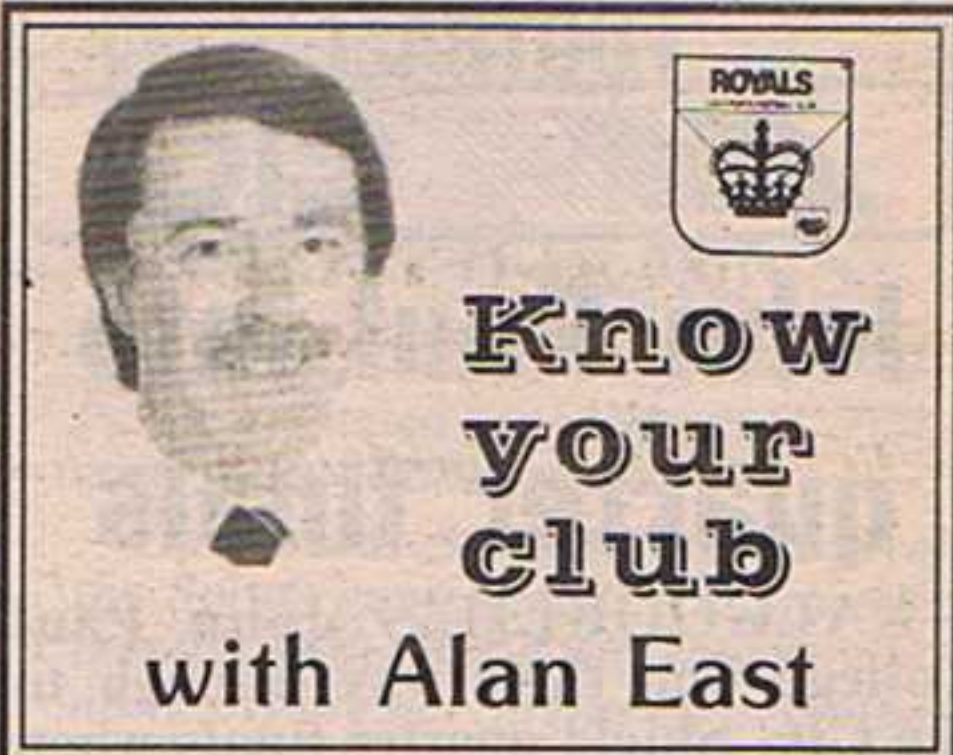
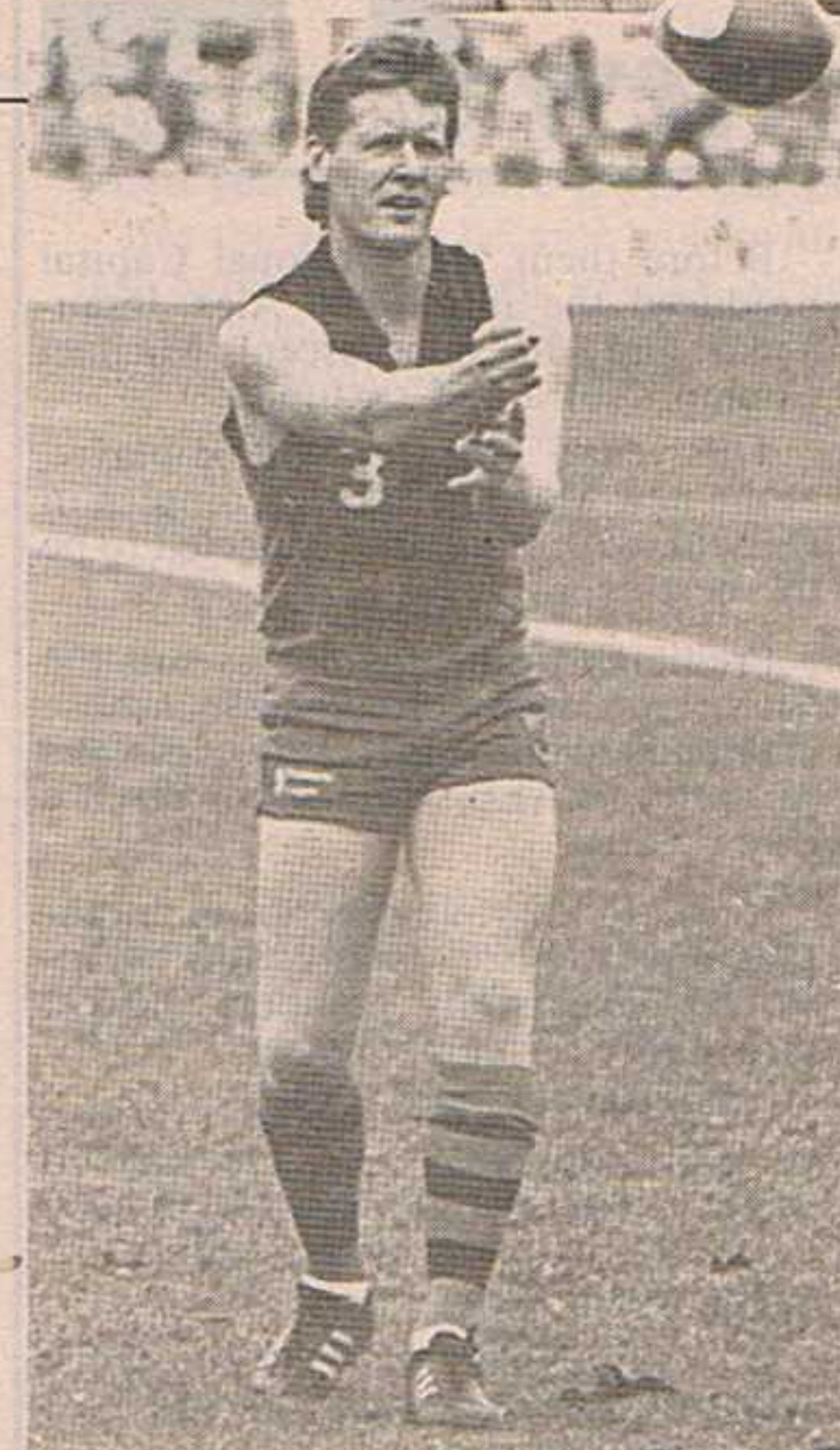
One of them — the club's greatest player in Graham Farmer — achieved the honour twice, in 1956 and 1960. His co-champion of the same era and fellow Sister Kate's Orphanage colleague in Ted Kilmurray, notched the double in 1958.

East Perth had to wait for two decades before another fairest and best winner won the Sandover, this time it was Phil Kelly in 1979 — the second of his back-to-back Medals — and it was nine years later that David Bain claimed a similar honour.

Teal Cup growth is impressive

THE Commonwealth Bank Teal Cup championships are here again and I'm about to oversee my 13th successive series — after which I am retiring.

And how it has developed — from a two-State competition to the present nine-team showpiece involving the country's elite under-17 footballers.

It's a series attended by every professional recruiting agent and assessor of talent.

IMPROVEMENT

The most gratifying development has been the improvement in skills of players from the "developing States".

In Brisbane last year, New South Wales lost to West Australia by five points, thanks to a Mitchell White goal kicked after the final siren from near the half-forward boundary.

NSW's best player, Ben Doolan, who is now starring with Sydney, wasn't even playing in that game.

Six or seven years ago, when WA played NSW, the scoreline usually showed about a 20-goal win to the Sandgroppers.

Individually, about two-thirds of the NSW team would have been basically one-sided skill-wise and several would have had a rugby background.

Now NSW, the ACT, Queensland and the Northern Territory would collectively boast half a dozen of the top 17s footballers in Australia.

This reinforces my argument that there are talented players everywhere.

A good illustration of this emanates from the ACT — not the most fashionable of Australian Football areas.

Currently in the AFL are ACT-produced Shaun Smith and Brett Allison (North Melb), Michael Werner (Essendon) and Adrian Barich (Eagles) — all former ACT Teal Cup players.

Before them, the National Capital produced the inimitable Alex Jesaulenko and the effervescent Michael Conlan. Not a bad sextuplet!

This year's Teal Cup will be played at the new Marrara Sports Complex in Darwin, with standards expected to be the best ever.

They are endorsed and firmly entrenched in the National Development Plan, recognised as the pinnacle of elite talent and sponsored by a sympathetic, co-operative and realistic corporate sponsor.

This Friday we head to Melbourne for our first chance to redeem ourselves on foreign soil after that loss to Carlton at Princes Park.

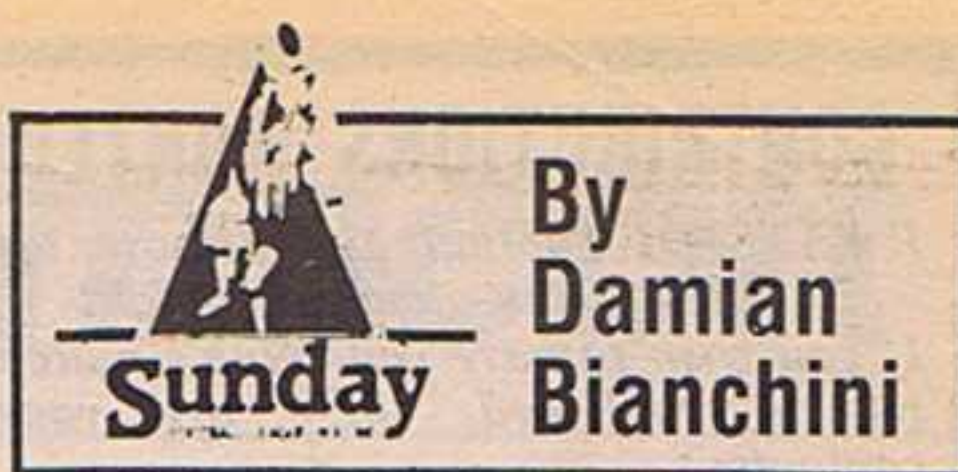

Malaxos tackles a new challenge

TRUE grit has long been a trademark of Steve Malaxos...and he's tackled his latest challenge head-on in what some critics would rate as a bold gamble with his career.

By launching into the world of publishing as the author of a book on the Eagles, Malaxos has taken a calculated gamble about where his career is headed.

"Inside the Eagles, the Untold Story" has been written with the help of Sunday Times sports editor Ray Wilson and captures some of the highs and lows of the West Coasters in their five years of national-league football.

While Malaxos freely admits that the book isn't a witch-hunt and there have been no 'buckets' poured on anyone, there are some hard-hitting facts revealed...especially about coaches and administrators.

INSIGHT

He talks openly about John Todd — the good and the bad — and gives an interesting insight to the thoughts and feelings of the players as they went through the highs and lows of their 1988 year; from a sequence of mid-season losses to an appearance in the finals.

He avoids a lot of criticism of administrators — though the temptation was obviously there — but he does make some passing references to the 'high-fliers' and talks about over-generous contracts, restricting his words to player-attitudes.

By unveiling some behind-closed-doors thoughts, does it mean Malaxos is conceding that his career with the West Coasters is over?

"I don't see it as a problem," says the former Eagles skipper.

"Right from the outset of the book we made it clear that it wasn't going to be a sour-grapes summary; we have simply tried to portray the thoughts and feelings of the players over the last five years.

"Cricketers write books while they are still playing and I don't see it as a termination of my career simply because I've reviewed some of the Eagles happenings."

Co-author Wilson, who has travelled regularly with the Eagles and covered almost every match, both at home and away, since 1987, was aware of the Malaxos gamble.

"We were always mindful of the fact that Steve is still a member of the Eagles squad," says Wilson.

"We didn't avoid the sensitive issues; simply handled them cautiously. It doesn't detract from the book. In fact, we believe that tipping a bucket on people in the West just wouldn't be accepted by fans of the Eagles in a one-team town."

It's not a biography about the author, but he does discuss some of the controversial aspects about his own career — especially his loss of the Eagles

captaincy, which left a bitter hurt and his relegation from the team during last year's finals.

Malaxos has had to do things the hard way.

Early in his career he was forced to lament in the Claremont colts side for three years as the league selectors felt that he wasn't quick enough to be a senior player.

SETBACKS

One of the biggest setbacks in his career was the year that he won virtually every media award in town after a great season with Claremont, only to be ignored by the umpires; his Sandover Medal votes — or lack of them — hurt deeply.

So too did his time at Hawthorn, where his ball-getting skills weren't recognised at a talent-laden club. And he has had to walk a difficult tight-rope at Claremont, where he became something of a delicate filling in the sandwich between the Tigers and the Eagles.

Little of that comes out in the book of course, but it is a measure of the man that he has put all those bad days behind him as he now wears a jumper of a different colour and gives East Fremantle real hope of contesting this year's premiership.

And he hasn't conceded that his national league career is over....but maybe it won't be with the Eagles. Malaxos doesn't rule out the possibility that he could be drafted by another AFL club before he hangs up his boots.
