Derek, recovering from a series of knee complaints, showed he is on the verge of regaining full fitness and form, with a five-goal roving effort in the reserves against Subiaco.

**SUBIACO were far from pleased when suspended Eagle, Peter Sumich, lined up against them last Saturday while Peter Snow, also rubbed out, was ineligible to play.**

Snow, who received a six-week suspension during the 1991 finals series, has been forced to have a run with the amateurs over the summer, while Sumich, on a two-week AFL vacation, has been allowed to pull on a Bulldogs guernsey.

New WAFC football manager Trevor Howard says it depends on what terms the tribunal imposed regarding pre-season games and as Sumich was suspended from AFL games only, he was able to play WAFL pre-season matches.

Sumich could have been used by the Eagles in their last trial match against the Sydney Swans, but the Eagles match committee opted to stick with makeshift full-forward David Hynes, who would benefit more in preparation for the opening games of the season.

## Tigers returning

**CLAREMONT coach Gerard Neesham's persuasive powers have enticed little-known defender Bill Gill back to league football.**

Gill has not played football since leaving Claremont at the end of 1989 to work in the north-west.

The 22-year-old returned to Claremont early this year at Neesham's request, for another attempt at making it in the WAFL.

Gill, who took a number of strong overhead marks against Swan Districts in the practice match at Claremont last Saturday, showed he could be an instant success as Neesham battles to rebuild a side depleted by the AFL draft.

The strongly-built Gill combined superbly on the full-back line with another resurrected Tiger, Brad Smith, a dashing right-footer who played the last two senior games of 1989, before a crippling knee injury cut short his career.

Smith (21) did not play last season, but looks set to be a vital cog in the revamped Tigers defence.

PRESIDENTS of the eight WAFL clubs will strongly resist any moves to introduce a second AFL team in Perth next season.

The leaders of the domestic clubs will insist on a little more breathing space before sanctioning another national league side in WA.

Responding to reports that the introduction of a second team could be brought forward to next year, the presidents will unite in their opposition.

Generally, they claim that the local competition needs more time to recover from the damage suffered through the advent of the West Coast Eagles in 1987.

The club presidents believe that 1994, or preferably 1995, is a better starting date.

They claim that there are too many pressing issues which need to be solved in WA football before the second AFL team arrives.

Sensitive issues that need solving include:-

\* Club financial problems; the prospect of a team from Kalgoorlie joining the WAFL; national draft effects; dimin-

ishing crowds and membership support and the issue of clubs being relocated further out in the metropolitan area.

Even the two Fremantle clubs agree that they need more time to stabilise before a team from the Port enters the AFL arena.

However, South Fremantle president Ric Gloede says that if a second team from South Australia looks likely, he would support a push for Perth's next AFL team for as early as 1993.

Subiaco president David Williams has responded with a renewed call for the second Perth-based AFL team to be located north of the city.

Williams, who favours 1995 or 1996 for the launch of Perth's team, says the sporting complex planned for Joondalup should be the home base for the new team.

"The current trend of the Eagles is helping turn around the financial situation of the WAFL clubs and that shouldn't be disturbed," he said.

"The WAFL needs time to hold a line on attendances and membership and continue to stabilise after the effects of the Eagles introduction.

Swan Districts president Bill Walker also says the WAFL should be given more time to consolidate after the destructive effect the Eagles initially had on WA's football industry.

Walker, like his presidential coun-

terparts, is resigned to the ultimate establishment of a second AFL team.

"Los Angeles is a city of nearly 20 million and they only have one national football team," Walker said.

"We need to co-ordinate the WAFL better before the new team arrives.

"We are facing a major problem next year, when South Australia has no protection in the national draft.

"South Australia will be hit as hard, if not harder, than WA was last year and we could face an invasion of talent scouts from Adelaide.

"The SA clubs are financially sound and have no salary cap restrictions, as we do. They will be looking to replenish their player-depth from somewhere.

"How are we going to stop it if they look this way? We can't compete with \$30,000 offers under our current system."

East Fremantle president Len Hitchen says his club is determined to re-establish itself as a power in the WAFL ranks before forming a second side at the Port.

He concedes that the second team is inevitable and wants it based in Fremantle, but feels the two Port clubs should be strong and viable, both on and off the field, before the move.

"Our club is currently working on a three-year strategic plan for resurgence as a force in the competition," he says.

"I would like to see that come to fruition before a second side is launched.

"Our aim is for the bulk of any new side to come from Fremantle talent, rather than from around the nation.

"That structure is sure to get better support from the Fremantle community, which is an important aspect in our planning," Hitchen said.

New Claremont president John O'Connell shares the belief of his colleagues — Perth's Ted O'Connor, West Perth's Tom James and East Perth's Bob Pearson — that 1993 is too early for another team.

They all support the 1991 recommendations made in the Hatt Report that 1994 or 1995 would be better starting dates.

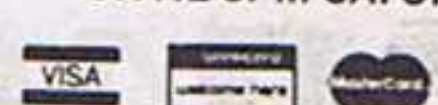

# OUR COLUMNISTS OPEN FIRE FOR SEASON '92

IT IS interesting to see how people in other states perceive the West Coast Eagles.

After their narrow loss on Sunday, former Sydney Swans defender Rod Carter said he detected an air of contempt for the opposition in the Eagles first-half play.

And for some reason bookies in Darwin seemed to think, before Sunday anyway, that the Eagles were something super-special for this season's flag.

The two observations can be linked.

Regarding Carter's comments, contempt isn't quite the right word. Arrogance would be more to the point.

There's nothing wrong with arrogance in sport, providing you have earned that right.

Before the State-of-Origin series was invented to change the balance of power in interstate football, the Vics oozed arrogance every time they ventured onto a football field.

But they were allowed to be — they were rarely beaten.

The Eagles, on the other hand, have not yet won the right to think they are that flash.

If you deduct their home wins from their overall strike-rate, then their form in the AFL has really been mediocre, despite looking reasonable in the past two final rounds.

But, because of their style of play; the way they swing the ball around and

appear to be very confident when they are in possession, the Eagles look, at times, as though they are lairs.

While some think the Eagles are arrogant, I don't see it on the playing field.

There are too many people in the Eagles camp who think they are something special when, in reality, they would probably be struggling for recognition elsewhere.

I find it surprising that some say the Swans win was one of the biggest upsets in recent times.

Apart from last year, when they scrambled home against the Swans in Sydney, the Eagles form over there has been very ordinary.

That was one of the reasons I had a dabble on the Swans at 7/2, when it was offered two days before the game.

Just as the Eagles are a more potent side at home, so are the Swans.

No doubt the Eagles will bury that loss when they run out before a home-town packed house at Subiaco Oval this Sunday to do battle with St Kilda.

And if they do, it will only rekindle interstate the paranoia about the Eagles that I feel is unjustified.

In Darwin, where the bookies appear to do a roaring trade in AFL punting, there appears to be a misguided belief the Eagles are supermen.

How else could you rationalise the odds on offer pre-season (5-2) about them and Hawthorn (3-1) for premiers, even though the Hawks have carried on from their premiership form in the Foster's Cup?

Last Sunday may have taken heads out of the clouds and placed feet firmly on the ground for the Eagles.

Sure they're a good side, but so far there has been nothing to suggest they will be any better than last year.

Despite their recruiting, they still

have a massive problem at centre-half forward.

If I was a punting person, I certainly wouldn't be dashing out to plonk money on them to win the premiership, not at the current odds.

And not because of last Sunday. There are still a few holes that need to be plugged before you can be confident they will even emulate last season's effort of playing in the grand final, let alone winning the flag.

Perhaps that's not such a bad thing. Last season they made a rod for their own back by winning so many games.

It created an unrealistic expectation in the minds of supporters and a big percentage of people in other states that they only had to run on to the ground to win the premiership.

History proved differently.

## Sydney win has many omens

ONE of football's adages sprung to mind last Sunday when Sydney staved off the challenge from the West Coast to scramble home by three points. And the more one thinks about it, the more it rings true — the result is good for football.

And not just from a Sydney Swans viewpoint, either.

The shock loss won't do the Eagles any harm.

There is no doubt West Coast played their best football before the finals arrived last season. Indeed, after the State game, when so many Eagles helped to make WA unofficial Australia-

lian champions, things were never quite the same.

Actually, it's a pity the Swans did not win by a few more goals, if omens can be carried into football.

When Collingwood won the premiership two years ago, they started with a demoralising defeat by the Eagles at Subiaco Oval.

Last year Hawthorn were humiliated by Adelaide in the opening round, when the Crows made an emotion-charged start in the AFL.

It's a long season and first-up defeats mean little when the pressure goes on at the end of 22 qualifying rounds.

Sydney must be commended for their ferocious approach to the football and their tremendous desire. Gary Buckenara has made a great start to his onerous task, not just for Sydney, but for the prosperity of Australian Football.

His appointment was significant because Sydney needed a high-profile leader and Buckenara is a fine ambassador for the sport.

For the AFL to succeed and flourish, it is imperative that the stranglehold rugby league has on the nation's biggest city is broken.

When the Sydney Swans were one of the game's glamour teams, the SCG was packed to the rafters. It was a great sight to see 35,000 fans jammed into the ground and putting their weight behind the team.

On Sunday, there were less than 10,000 devoted supporters and they were rewarded when many people gave the Swans little chance of success.

The task for Buckenara and the rest of the people involved with the Swans is to continue to build.

Hopefully, they can carry the momentum throughout the season and once again become a force.

In 1986 and 1987 the Swans were disappointing when they bowed out of the premiership race without winning a finals match. But they had made big inroads into rugby league territory.

That hold has been lost as they have struggled in the last couple of years. But now with Buckenara at the helm, they can carry on the good work.

Lockett rarely fails twice and the man-mountain is coming off a disappointing 3.7 against Footscray last Sunday.

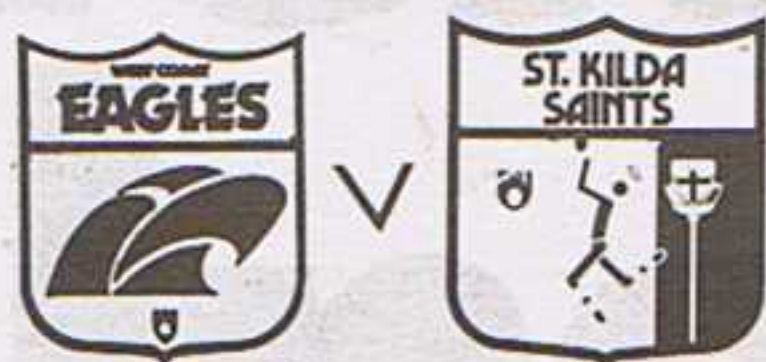
Lockyer's task at full-back is the most crucial of the match.

## THREATENED

Malthouse pulled no punches when he threatened changes following West Coast's shock three-point loss to the less-fancied Swans.

Even the exciting Chris Lewis could face the chop and 1991 club champion and Brownlow Medal runner-up Craig Turley was locked in deep conversation with Malthouse for half an hour, before Monday night's training post mortem.

The normally brilliant Lewis has been too inclined to play the man, rather than concentrate on his sensational natural flair to spark the Eagles running game.

He needs a shake-up and relegation could be that spur.

Lewis, whose fire sometimes lays dormant for too long, is a gifted footballer, but he must improve and regain his wonderful touch, slick creative disposal and hunger for the ball, if the Eagles are to match the clever Saints running football.

Midfielder Scott Watters, Irving and last Sunday's first-gamers Jason Ball and Trent Nichols also face relegation as Malthouse revamps his team in search of four valuable premierships points.

Ball was thrown to the wolves on the small, crowded SCG — notorious for its casualty rate among centre-half-forwards.

In a bid to counter St Kilda's running centre-half-back Russell Morris, Langdon should return to centre-half-forward.

Malthouse must also stop the ball-getting brilliance of young follower Robert Harvey, who still managed an incredible 42 possessions as the Saints lost to Footscray last Sunday.

Lamb could get the tough job of tagging Harvey.

The steady improvement of gutsy captain John Worsfold, recovering from groin surgery and the need for Guy McKenna's ball-gathering skill and expert disposal through the midfield, could see the two star defenders further up the ground.

The Saints are not perturbed by the Eagles home ground advantage at Subiaco Oval.

If there is an AFL side which has the capacity to use the expanses of the big ground, it is the mobile Saints.

St Kilda football manager and former Hawthorn goal-kicking legend Peter Hudson says that all clubs are now adequately coping with the variety in AFL grounds and the travel aspect.

"Subiaco Oval doesn't worry us now, that's for sure," he said this week.

"Hawthorn did every AFL club a favour last year when they beat the Eagles in that final at Subiaco. Nobody in their wildest dreams thought that would happen there, but it did.

"We play well at Waverley, which is big like Subi and we've had plenty of experience at the Western Oval, which is much the same size as Subiaco.

"In fact, we're a bit concerned that we are getting used to playing on the bigger grounds better than our own ground at Moorabbin.

"We haven't played much at Moorabbin lately."

Hudson said that tough follower Frank Coughlan would be unavailable due to a hamstring injury, but he expected an almost full-strength squad from which to select their side.

## LATE ARRIVAL

The Saints will arrive in Perth late on Saturday night and fly out again on Sunday immediately after the match.

"We believe that is the best way, rather than get to Perth for a training session on Saturday afternoon and then have the players sitting around in foreign surrounds for the night," Hudson said.

"It's better to get there, sleep and play the match.

"It's a very important game for both clubs now after suffering losses last weekend.

"The only good thing about our losses last week though, is that everyone else around us got beaten and so we haven't lost too much ground at this early stage.

"But it's a different matter to the loser on Sunday, isn't it."

# Melbourne Calling

**BEN ALLAN**, the West Aussie who won Hawthorn's club champion award in last year's premiership-winning team, writes from Melbourne exclusively for Westside Football



ONE OF the hardest things in AFL football is adjusting to Melbourne conditions — often playing and training on atrocious surfaces.

Pre-season games and Foster's Cup matches (apart from Darwin's heat) have been played in ideal conditions and the surface at Waverley Park is in fantastic shape.

But do not be deceived.

Though most of the summer games are played on lush turf with a high bouncing ball, the Melbourne "pitches" change quickly once the pre-season is over.

Unlike Perth, where grounds can absorb heavy rain, Melbourne's playing fields simply cannot.

The ovals here have clay as a base, rather than sand and the water lies on, or just below, the playing surface.

Melbourne clubs train in atrocious conditions at times.

Running out on a cold, wet night, warmed by up to three jumpers on a muddy, grass-less track becomes the norm for Victorian-based players.

Interstate teams, at first glance, would seem to be

disadvantaged by not being exposed to these heavy grounds on a daily basis.

However, on a wet day physical endeavour and determination are what is required to be successful, rather than an amazingly high skill level.

In contrast, teams travelling to Perth, Adelaide or Brisbane during a wet period in Melbourne may not have trained or played with a bouncing ball for weeks.

Suddenly players have to contend with a seemingly uncontrollable ball on a hard, fast surface.

With this in mind, it seems easier to revert to the football basics and adjust to a heavy ground, rather than from one.

Adapting to different conditions is now a required

skill for the emerging AFL professional. Why, then do players, officials and supporters groan when their team is subjected to a rapid change in ground conditions?

Golfers, for example, have to combat unforeseen elements each week in their "globe-trotting" professional existence. They may need to change their style of play to suit a particular course or country they have not previously visited.

Footballers should be no different when confronting new grounds and conditions and they need to modify their game plans accordingly.

The weather to date has permitted spectators to enjoy highly-skilled games being played in Melbourne.

Be warned, this scene will rapidly disappear and be replaced by a tougher, more physical game once the Victorian wet sets in.

## Lockett faces painful day

TONY Lockett, St Kilda's lynchpin in their bid to upset the Eagles at Subiaco this Sunday, is having pain-killing injections in his groin before he plays.

However, he says while the injury doesn't worsen, he will be able to contribute and hopefully, reach 100 goals for the third time in six seasons.

"Once I get out on to the field, I generally feel good," he says.

After kicking eight goals (out of 14) against West Coast in round 15 last year, Lockett is keenly awaiting Sunday's clash.

But he's aware of the enormity of St Kilda's task, considering the Eagles have not been beaten in a home-and-away game in Perth for almost two seasons.

"It's always going to be hard to beat West Coast over there, the same as it is winning in Adelaide," he said.

Despite a limited preparation because of hamstring, knee and groin niggles, Lockett has 10 goals in his opening two games.

But it could have been so much better.

On Sunday against Footscray he kicked 3.7 and saw his side lose by five goals in one of the many upsets of the League's first full round.

At one stage Lockett, normally masterfully accurate, had 1.7, including five points in a row in the third term, before he finished with two majors in the final quarter.

"I always like to kick more goals than behinds," he said. "If I have seven shots, I like to kick at least 5.2."

"If I kick 4.3, I'm not happy. Anything like 2.5 is a disaster."

"I want to be really at my top by round six, being in a position from

there to maintain my form. I don't want to struggle through the season. You can only stay up so long."

Admitting he had "run out of legs" after half-time against Essendon in round one (when he kicked seven goals), Lockett was happier with the way he won the ball after the main break against Footscray. But he again let himself down with kicking.

Now he and the Saints have set their sights on two of their biggest games of the season — against West Coast on Sunday and Hawthorn, at Moorabbin on April 11.

Despite all the speculation, Lockett says beating the AFL record of 150 goals in a season is not a motivating influence in his play.

"I'm more interested in playing in successful St Kilda sides," he said.

"However, I don't think the 150 goal mark is an impossible target. You would have to have things working in your favour to do it. Not many players kick more than 80 goals in a year. I would have to almost double that to break the record."

## Hawkins new approach is a winner

UP TILL 12 months ago, Doug Hawkins was a self-confessed "hard drinking tearaway."

Now he is captain of Footscray, one of the form sides of the AFL and a virtual teetotaler.

"I'm still no saint, but my drinks are few and far between," he says.

After a five-goal near best-on-field display which helped bring down St Kilda on Sunday, Hawkins was home by 9pm, preparing for Footscray's next match, against Essendon this Sunday.

He admits to having once indulged in 24-hour — or even 48-hour — drinking binges, which almost cost him his career.

Hawkins, now 31, has set his sights on becoming only the second Footscray player (after "Mr Football" Ted Whitten) to reach 300 games. In 15 seasons, he has played 267 senior matches, which leaves him surviving for two more years.

**Eagles maintain poor record in tight ones**

THE fifth anniversary of the West Coast Eagles entry to the VFL was marred by Sunday's three-point loss to the Sydney Swans.

Five years to the day since the Eagles came from behind to beat Richmond at Subiaco Oval, the loss to Sydney continued their poor record in games decided by less than a goal.

The Eagles have now played in 14 games with a final margin of six points or less. Of those, they have won only three — all of them in Perth.

The Eagles are yet to win such a close game outside Perth. Their record from nine close games played in the Eastern States is one draw and eight losses after Sunday's game.

Of the Eagles last nine close games (at all venues), all they have been able to salvage is one win and a draw.

That record may suggest one of two things — either the Eagles don't perform well in a close contest, or they are good enough to get back into tight games without winning them.

\*\*\*\*\*

BY CONTRAST, the Sydney Swans are clearly the specialists in close finishes.

Since the start of the 1987 season, Sydney have not lost a game with a margin of a goal or less. Sunday's win was their 10th in that time. Their record is only blemished by a draw with Footscray last year.

The Eagles record in tight ones is the worst of all clubs in the AFL, but only marginally behind Geelong.

performer will be based on the ratings system that sees every player rated out of 10 each week.

It is an award that goes to the most consistent performer; a player who displays the ability to poll well every week; not just the occasional best-on-ground effort.

# New names will lead WAFL sides

A BAND of new faces will lead the eight WAFL clubs into action this Saturday with leadership duties being spread between talented youngsters and veterans of the football field.

The youngest of the new leaders is Claremont's 24-year-old Brian Beresford, who has been given his first taste of captaincy in his sixth season at Tigerland.

The young lawyer replaces veteran Mark Hann, who had his moment of glory in 1991 when he held aloft the Pepsi Cup, while Beresford's deputy will be talented defender Scott Edwards, another youngster at just 23 years.

East Perth broke with tradition when they named Craig McGrath as club captain early in the week.

The move may be considered a risk, as McGrath is yet to play a pre-season match — though he is making steady recovery from surgery. He acted as team runner for the first half of East Perth's final practice match against Perth last Saturday and is confident of being ready to play by round two.

Nelson proved to be a stalwart for the Falcons last year, returning to the club after a one-year stint in Adelaide. He was a leading contender for the Sandover Medal before injury cost him four games and a setback in his form.

Perth appointed former Swan Districts premiership player Shane Renfree as captain, replacing John Gavranich, who has retired.

The Demons appointed talented

centreman Merv Kelly as Renfree's deputy.

### TOP CLUBMAN

South Fremantle have rewarded Ned Fimmano for his years of devoted service as a clubman and team player by naming him captain for 1992.

Fimmano, one of the most consistent and fair defenders in the WAFL, will have former Eagles and Fitzroy rover Wally Matera as his vice-captain.

Swans have gone for experience in the form of 'Magic', new skipper Phil Narkle. His deputy will be former Eagles teammate Murray Rance, who also captained the Eagles in 1989.

Subiaco rewarded Rod Willet for his long service to the club when they announced his captaincy on Tuesday night, with Andrew Macnish his deputy.

East Fremantle cannot be accused of rushing into anything as far as the 1992 club captaincy is concerned... coach Ken Judge is delaying naming the skipper till the eve of the season on Friday night!

The likely choice appears to be between the experienced pair of Clinton Browning and Neil Lester-Smith, but there is speculation that former Eagles skipper Steve Malaxos may get the nod.

## Todd not over-confident

VETERAN Swans coach John Todd isn't getting swept away by the pre-season form of his talented squad or early predictions of a premiership.

Swans enter the new WAFL season as red-hot premiership favourites.

However, Todd isn't under-estimating any rival contender and rates South Fremantle as the big improver.

"I sure wouldn't say Swans are any certainty," Todd said.

"But I would be very disappointed if we didn't make the finals. I expect us to be around the place at the end of the season.

Many Claremont attacking moves last season came from constant dashes off the half-back line and little seems to have changed.

The lynchpin of defence is veteran centre-half-back Darrell Panizza, who will renew his battle with Subiaco centre-half-forward John Georgiades on Saturday, a battle the Tiger won easily last season.

Phil Gilbert, November draft pick No. 19, remains the leading full-back in the league after delaying his move to Melbourne and his offsideers remain Paul Burton (delaying his move to Sydney), Scott Edwards and Dale Ballantyne.

SINCE WA entered the controversial AFL draft scheme in 1988, the bulk of new talent to Eastern States clubs has been produced in the West.

This season, even though the moratorium on South Australia will be lifted for the November draft, young WA footballers are certain to again be in strong demand.

The attitude on the East Coast is that the firm WA grounds and strong football traditions produce skilful players capable of success in the AFL.

The array of outstanding coaches in the WAFL is another factor contributing to the development of young players in WA.

All eight WAFL league coaches have good credentials and football backgrounds, strengthening the competition and nurturing young stars.

Veteran Swan Districts coach John Todd has the finest band of potential 1992 AFL draftees.

Defender Rod O'Neill, untried rookies Peter Kelly and Scott Cummings, and Michael Sidebottom and Michael Castledine will all be keenly watched by eastern states and West Coast Eagles talent scouts.

Claremont coach Gerard Neesham has demonstrated more than once in his five-year coaching career that he can overcome massive player-losses to the national draft.

The Tigers boss, with three premierships in five seasons, is sure to be tested again.

Big ruckman-forward, Rob Izgerald, creative follower Brian Sutherland, new skipper Brian Beresford and Scott Edwards should attract constant attention from AFL clubs.

They will also attract interest from scouts, who will see a big improvements in ruckman Bil Zempilas, key position player Paul Dean, rover Nathan Higgins and Wodonga recruit Darren Harris.

Subiaco, under the shrewd, tough coaching discipline of Haydn Bunton, are notorious for their production of skilful players.

Many of the young Lions have already been drafted by the Eagles.

But 1992 could find Scott Kettlewell, Andrew Grieve and David Snow attracting attention from the big AFL clubs.

East Fremantle, under developing coach Ken Judge, also have their share of potential AFL players.

Dashing mid-fielder Peter Quill appears to have recovered from constant hamstring trouble that has plagued his career and forward Jeff Davidson looms as a definite national prospect.

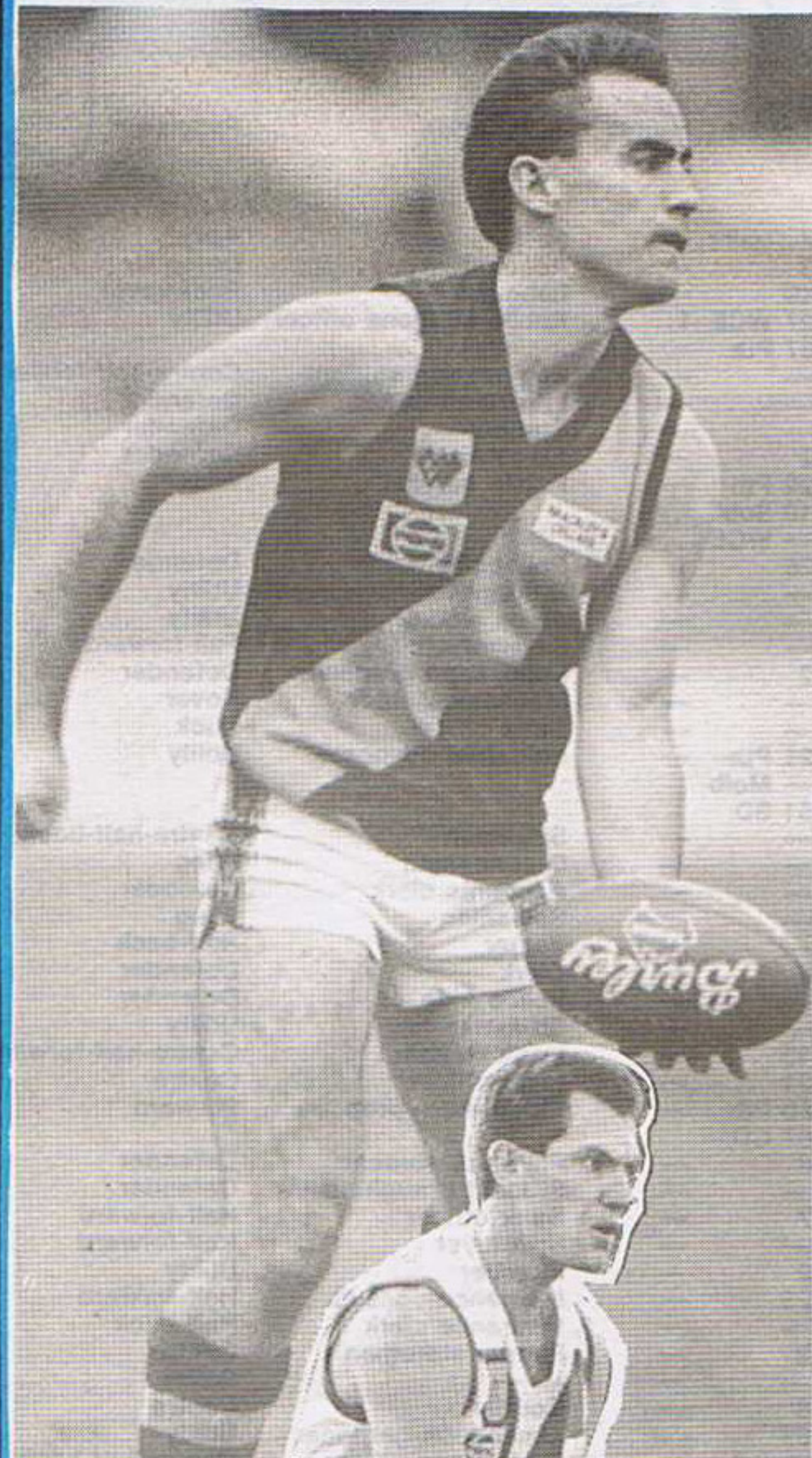
The Sharks also have gifted rover Billy Krakouer, who will be keenly sought if he continues to impress in the WAFL.

East Perth stalwarts George Giannakis and Lucio Baroni both harbour ambitions to taste the AFL and will use this year as a last-ditch effort to make the step.

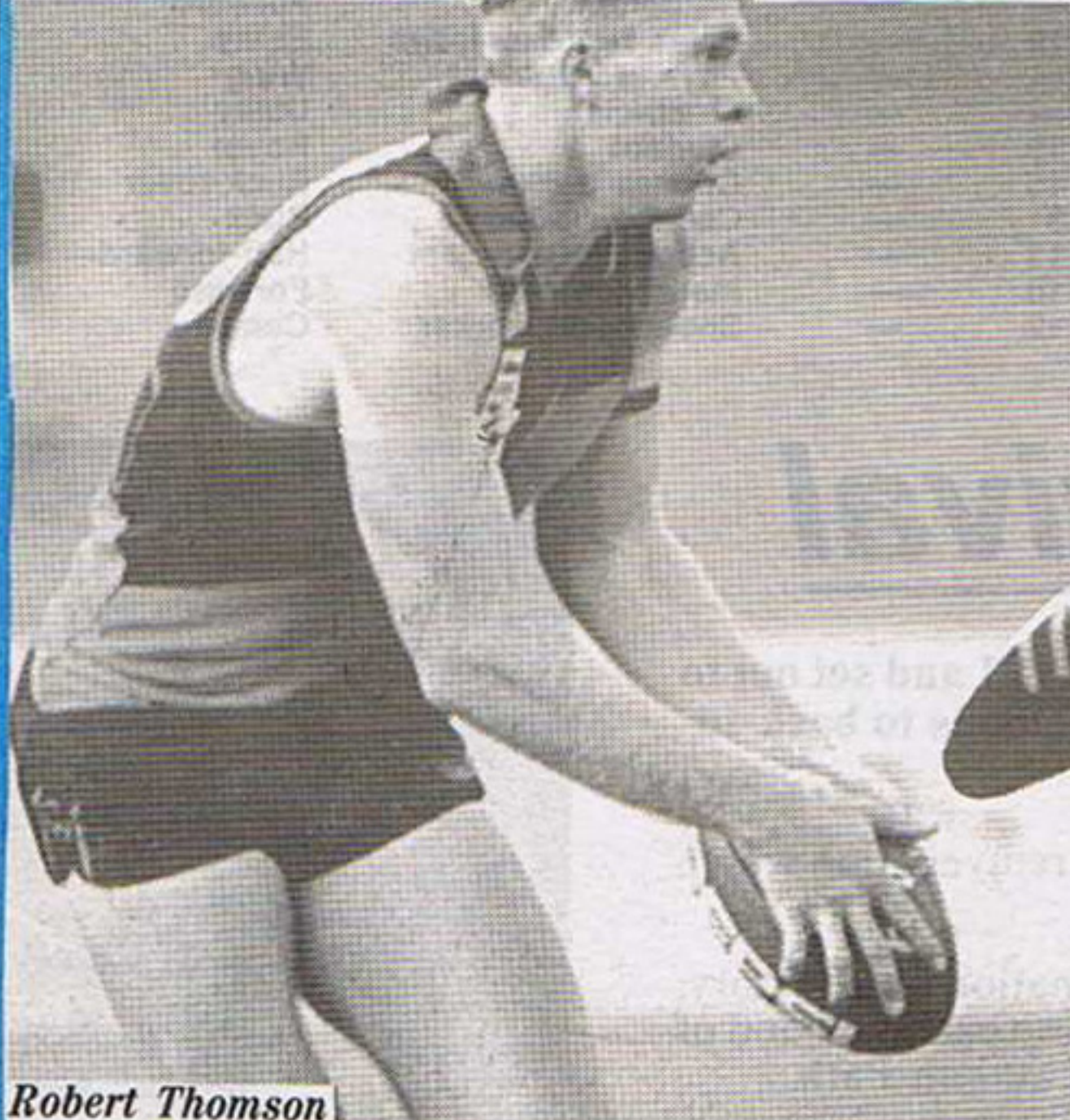

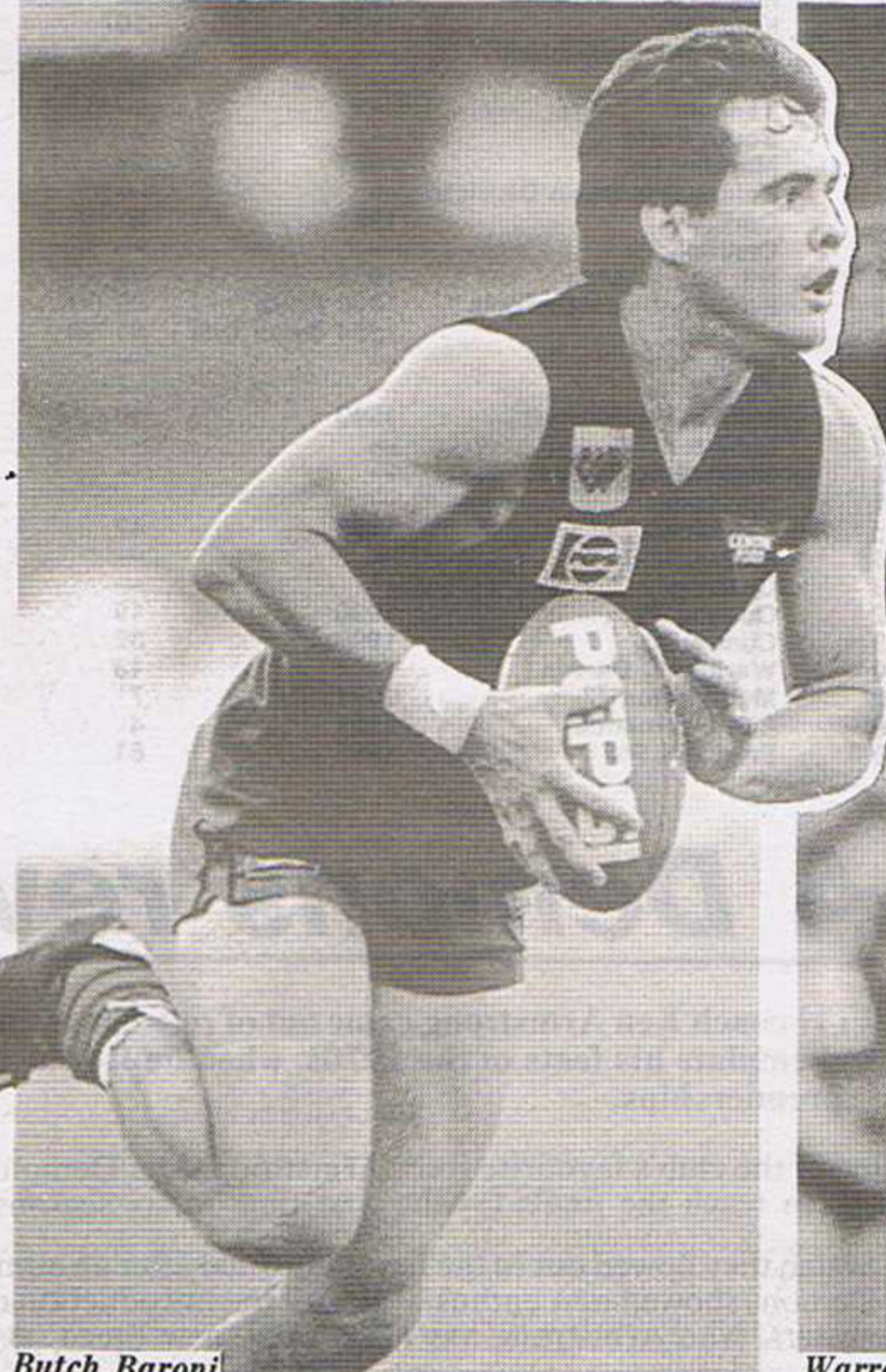

## Big Bird aims to fly higher



**UP AND AT 'EM...** big Eagles ruckman Dean Irving is keen to rise above all challengers this season — and he's pretty happy his prospects

DEAN Irving, the biggest bird in the Eagles nest, knows that some of the assignments he is likely to receive this season will be the toughest coach Mick Malthouse can hand out.

But the genial giant wouldn't have it any other way as he gears up to confront the AFL big guns.

Names like Essendon's Simon Madden, Geelong's Damian Bourke, Hawthorn's Greg Dear and Steve Lawrence, Carlton's Justin Madden, North Melbourne's Michael Gallagher and Collingwood's Damien Monkhorst are all in Irving's sights.

The season might have kicked off a little disappointingly last Sunday, with Sydney's Brad Tunbridge — a former Fremantle Derby rival — clipping Irving's wings in the shock Eagles loss at the SCG, but there will be plenty of chances to atone.

The Eagle they call 'Big Bird' has also targetted some of the nation's football critics... those commentators who have cast doubts on his ability to counter the opposition big men.

Irving wants to set the record straight and stake a permanent claim to the mantle as West Coast's No. 1 ruckman.

The arrival of former Hawthorn and St Kilda big man Paul Harding threw a challenge Irving's way that the big man willingly accepted.

He must now wait on the reaction from coach Mick Malthouse and his support staff over the shock loss to Sydney, knowing full well that the selectors will be tempted to rush Harding back for a shoot-out with his former AFL club.

Irving is acutely aware that he could well be dethroned as West Coast's premier big man... but his lion-hearted

efforts last year, when he was the instigator of so much midfield hard work, must surely count for something.

Harding's gutsy performance to win the Simpson Medal against Victoria in the wet at the WACA Ground last July certainly influenced West Coast to recruit him back home as a viable alternative to Irving.

He points out that there is no animosity between him and Harding in the contest for the top ruck position in the starting 20.

"I haven't given Paul's position any thought," Irving said.

"It is challenging enough to maintain your own Eagles spot. All I want to do is be the best big man we've got.

"To do that, I have to have my fitness at a peak and keep it there, work hard around the ground and make the play for our side.

"I'm aiming to be more dominant around the ground."

Irving knows that he must capitalise on two learning seasons and find a consistency to enhance his status as the side's mainstay on the ball.

"I don't look at this year as a make-or-break season, as some people might suggest," he says with authority.

"But I've had two developing years and now I have to cash in on them.

"My first season was a stepping stone from WAFL ranks into the AFL and last year I learnt a lot going up against the big names on a regular basis.

"This year I'd like to think I can step up and join some of the big names."

The off-season break saw Irving adopt a special weight-reducing diet and increase his fitness campaign since returning from an overseas holiday before Christmas.

Irving was the elected 'tour leader' as he travelled with fellow Eagles Brett Heady, Dean Kemp, Matthew Burton, Chris Lewis, Robbie West, Derek Hall and Ashley McIntosh on a brief European tour.

He confesses that the challenge of keeping that group on the straight-and-narrow was as big as the task of curbing the likes of the Madden brothers and their Victorian counterparts.

"We had plenty of fun, but it was a handful being tour manager," Irving quips.

"I came back a bit heavier than I should have been and I had to diet and train a bit harder."

Irving, now two kilograms lighter than at this time last season, is much fitter and stronger after a rigorous training schedule.

The popular Eagle is on the threshold of a season of heavyweight jousts that should see him emerge as one of the most respected ruckmen in the nation.

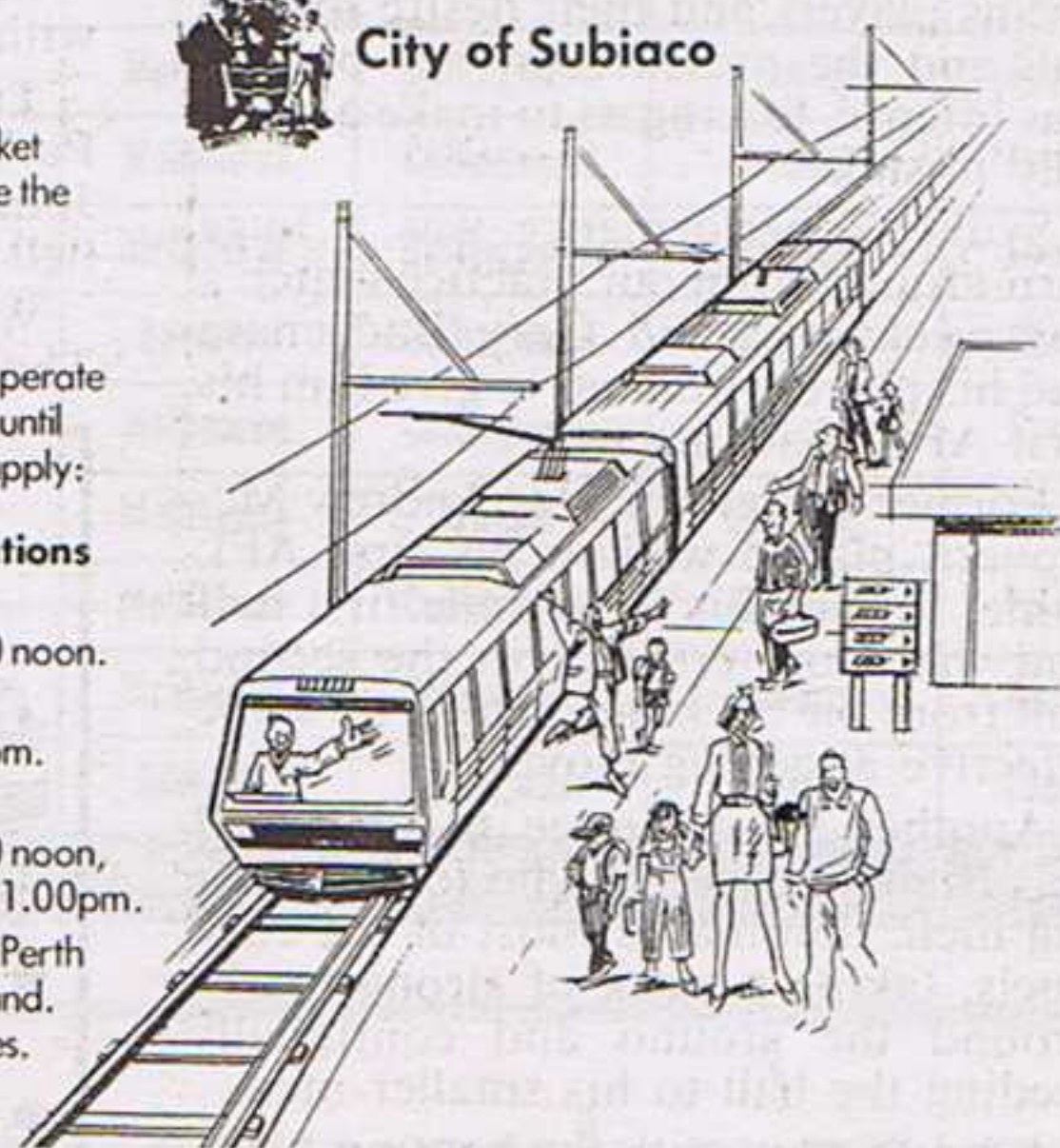

# Big improvers on show

THE 1992 Sunday Football League season starts this week with two games — South Perth against Armadale and Kelmscott versus Gosnells.

In a repeat of last season's first semi-final, South Perth, the big improvers of 1991, will renew rivalries with Armadale at Lathlain Park in what promises to be a tough encounter.

Souths coach Brett Symons says the game will be a tough one and will be a gauge to see how far his side has improved on last season.

Key players for South Perth will be 1991 Bowden Medal winner Laurie Liddelow, wingman Jamie Giancola, Tony Watson, Graham Hampson and Robert Saylor.

The home ground advantage of John Dunn Oval should see Kelmscott win a close tussle with Gosnells.

Though the Bulldogs lost three key players in goalsneak Matthew Congleton, Damien Eves and Brad Gaiger to

WAFL ranks, new coach Ray Witt has recruited well.

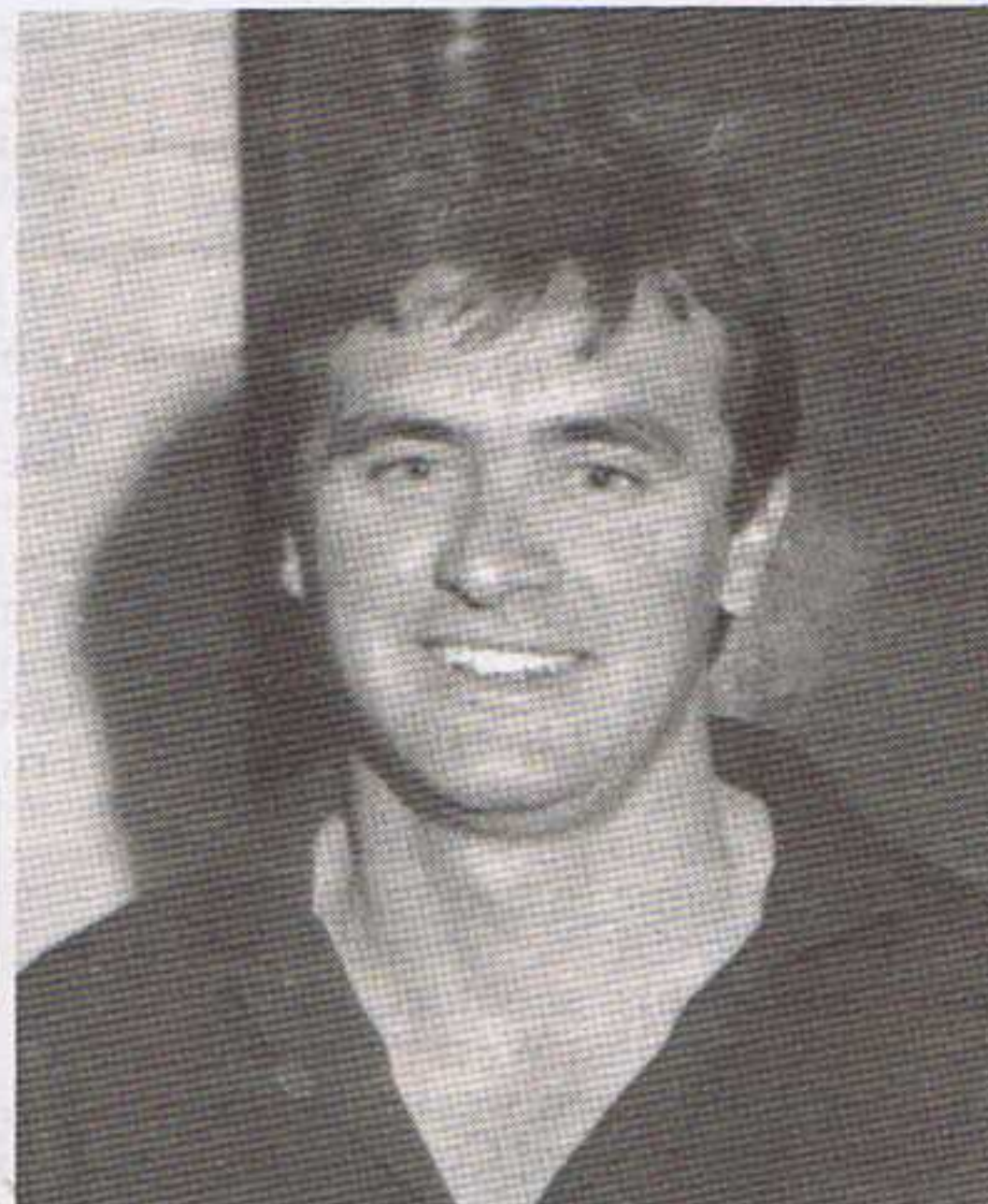

## Lee makes the transition

FORMER Subiaco player Mick Lee, now coach of West Coast Amateurs, is tasting the ups and downs of coaching for the first time this season.

Lee, a playing coach, admitted he finds it tough to combine the two roles.

"I've got a lot to learn, but as the season progresses I'm sure that I will improve," said Lee after a recent practice game.

"Combining playing and coaching is difficult, particularly at the various intervals when you're tired and you have to talk to your players.

"During the match you not only have to concentrate on your game, but take into account the whole team's performance and make moves.

"After the game you are mentally and physically exhausted and you have that commitment to address your players. That's what I have found hard."

The former Subiaco premiership player says that by being a playing coach, it is important to have quality people assisting off the ground.

One of his off-field back-up team will be former Lions team-mate Bevan Warner.

"Bevan will be ideal in that role and already he has done a terrific job down at the club," says Lee.

### PRESSURE

Coming straight from WAFL into amateurs, Lee says the major difference between the two competitions is the pressure during the game.

"There is nowhere near as much pressure in amateurs as the WAFL and players in amateurs tend to be more individual than team-orientated.

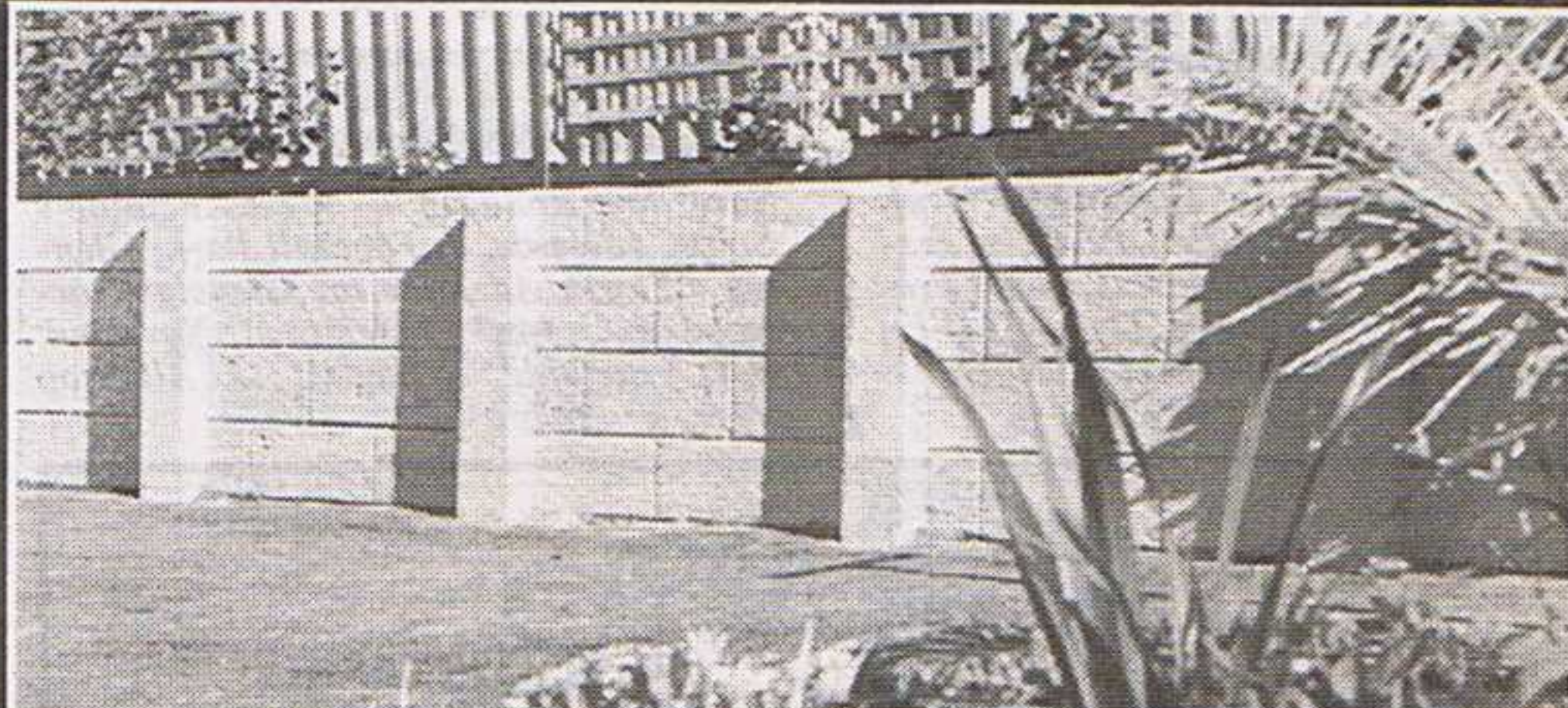
"From playing in a couple of practice-matches, I gather amateur sides rely on individual players to win a lot of games."

At this stage of the season, Lee believes West Coast need to improve their fitness, which was their downfall against Trinity Aquinas recently when they lost by two goals.

"We have to work on our fitness and being more competitive for the football," says Lee.

## Did you miss this...

## Family affair

**MARCH 26:** CLAREMONT coach Gerard Neesham strongly criticised the situation involving young Subiaco player Jamie Billington, being drafted by Essendon and then dumped before the season starts.

**MARCH 27:** GEELONG ruckman Stephen Hooper is expected to be sidelined for up to 12 weeks after knee surgery. FORMER West Perth full-back Brad Gwilliam played for Richmond against North Melbourne less than two weeks after being dumped from the Eagles. COLLINGWOOD included former Fitzroy champion Gary Pert in their side to play Brisbane — his first senior game in two years after knee injuries. EAGLES forward Peter Wilson injured his shoulder in the practice match against West Perth and will miss at least seven weeks. MURRAY Rance, former West Coast captain and vice-captain at Swan Districts, was reported for an alleged high tackle on Claremont forward Brian Sutherland in their practice match. SOUTH Fremantle's 17 year-old recruit, Derrick Woods, kicked five goals as the Bulldogs beat Subiaco, who had seven Eagles in their side — Dwayne Lamb, Phil Scott, Matt Connell, Daniel Metropolis, Nathan McIntosh, Karl Langdon and Matthew Burton.

**MARCH 28:** The Sydney Swans notched an upset three-point win over West Coast in Sydney, with Chris Waterman reaching his 50th game for the

Eagles. ESSENDON dropped former Perth midfielder, Willie Dick to the emergency list against Fitzroy, while WA expatriates, Marcus Seecamp and Jeremy Guard were named for their AFL debut with the Lions.

**MARCH 29:** FORMER Swan Districts player David Ogg returned to Bassendean from Brisbane after being dropped off the Bears list. STRONG speculation was raised in the Sunday Times newspaper of a second AFL team coming out of Perth by 1993 after WAFC and AFL officials met on Friday.

**MARCH 31:** A furious West Coast coach Mick Malthouse promised changes to the Eagles line-up for the game against St Kilda. AFL commissioner Alan Schwab has rejected speculation that a second Perth team would come from Fremantle in 1993. He said too many incorrect presumptions came about after the meeting with WAFL chairman Peter Tannock.

**APRIL 1:** WEST Coast defender Troy Ugle will be sidelined for two weeks after pulling a hamstring in Sunday's game against the Sydney Swans. AFL umpire John Russo admitted his mistake in booking West Coast defender Guy McKenna and faces relegation from the senior panel. FORMER West Coast Eagle Craig McGrath was appointed captain of East Perth, with Lucio Baroni his deputy; South Fremantle named Ned Fimmano as captain with Wally Matera as vice-captain; Perth gave their captaincy to Shane Renfree, with Merv Kelly as vice-captain; Craig Nelson takes on West Perth's captaincy, with Angelo Del Borrello his deputy. THE WAFL tribunal gave Murray Rance a caution after being found guilty of striking Claremont's Brian Sutherland.

Metropolis, who has maintained strong links with the Lions since his playing days and stood in as league coach at one stage during a coaching change-over, guided his son through his junior days.

"I tried to teach all the boys in the team that skills were important," says Peter. "Winning was nice at the end of the day, but they had to learn to kick both feet and use both hands."
