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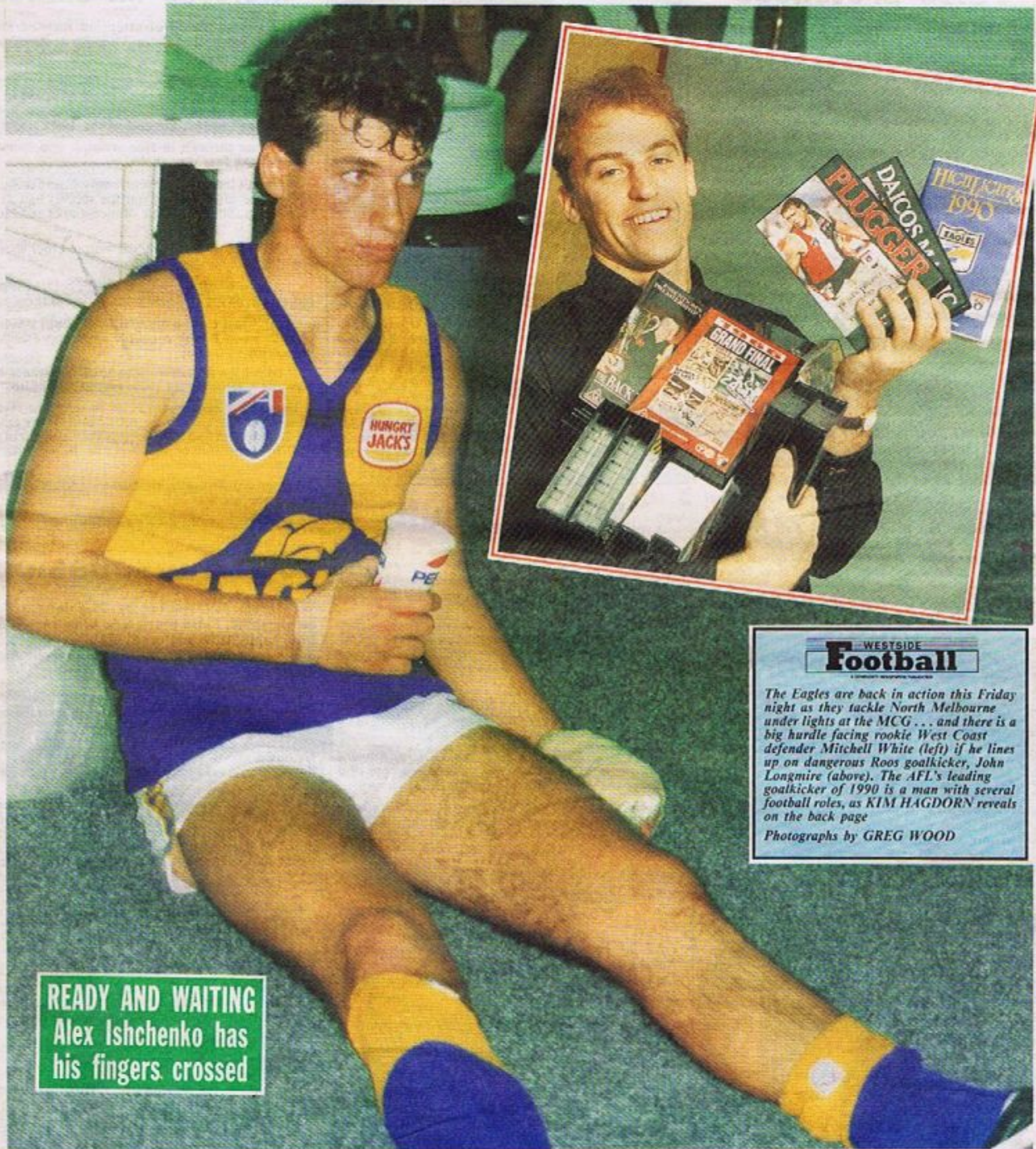

THE Past Players Association has a fairly strong representation in today's WAFL activities, especially in relation to the administration of the game.

Most of the WAFL clubs carried special resolutions at their annual general meetings seeking a restructuring of the WA Football Commission, expressing concern at how the administration was put together.

About 70 Association members were recently invited to a special meeting with the WAFC, the invitation coming from Grant Dorrington, the Commission's director of football, with the inference being that it would be a good chance to meet with the Commissioners to discuss the future of the game.

Those who attended expected to meet with some of the game's top officials, but they were greeted by Dorrington and Gerard McNeill, the general manager of the Football Development Trust.

The meeting was simply an outline of the Trust's development activities, including the showing of a video about junior coaching!

## Melesso all smiles

THERE was plenty of attention focused on the return to football of Peter Melesso at Bassendean Oval on Monday.

The former West Coast Eagles big man has won his 18-month battle against cancer and returned to football action with the East Perth reserves for his first game since towards the end of the 1990 season.

He came through in fine style — and wondered what all the fuss was about.

"It didn't feel any different, really," said a contented Melesso after playing out the second half at full-forward, grabbing a couple of nice marks and kicking a goal.

"And I reckon I was robbed with another shot that was definitely a goal," he chirped.

"I did feel a little nervous the night before the game, but on the day it was just great to be out there again.

"I can't really recall my first touch, but I was pretty pleased when I took a couple of strong marks and kicked my first goal.

"I've still got a lot of work to do on my fitness, but it was just a relief to get back into action again."

The media spotlight was at Bassendean Oval to record Melesso's return to action and it was great to see a number of Swan Districts players run out of their way to congratulate the amiable Royal after the match.

The crowd also gave Melesso a standing ovation as he left the arena.

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## Open discussion

WITH his side trailing by 29-points at three-quarter-time, Perth coach Ken Armstrong was far from happy as he addressed his players — and the usual eavesdroppers around the Demons huddle didn't improve his demeanour.

Armstrong wanted to give his players a 'blister', but wouldn't do that in front of about 90 extra listeners (he had one of his off-siders do a count).

Armstrong said after the match that he thought seriously about taking his players into the rooms during the break, but couldn't afford to waste any time.

His talk obviously worked though, as Perth fought back when they kicked the first five goals of the quarter. A goal from Robert Thomson saw them hit the front at the 14-minute mark, but that was their last major and Claremont did well to stave off defeat.

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## Support for Bears

A PLEA for help from Brisbane Bears coach Robert Walls after their eighth loss of the season received a mixed response — but he did get some support from veteran Channel 7 critic Bob Davis.

The Bears have lost their eight games by an average of 74 points and are heading for their third wooden-spoon since their 1987 inception.

Davis came out in support of Walls and said the AFL should have taken the step of suspending any player who refused to play for the Bears.

"They had the Jarmans (Andrew and Darren) and Chris McDermott on their list and they refused to go there," said Davis.

"Any player who refuses to play for the Bears should be kept out of football for two or three seasons."

# Keep Foundation Day

THE WA Football Commission will try to convince the AFL to reserve the Foundation Day long-weekend for WAFL action after the outstanding success of Monday's Derby at Fremantle Oval.

Commission chairman Peter Tannock said after the lock-out match at Fremantle Oval, that big WAFL games must be scheduled to avoid West Coast Eagles fixtures.

Tannock said that future Eagles televised matches should also be prevented from clashing with WAFL matches.

The Commission chief also admitted that the WAFC will ensure that Monday public holidays will be utilised for WAFL matches.

That was not the case for this year's Easter Monday holiday, when no WAFL matches were scheduled — and games on the Anzac Day Monday holiday were only staged after a late change to the fixtures.

Tannock said that Monday's overwhelming support for local football, particularly in Fremantle, must be preserved.

Close to 20,000 fans went to the top-of-the-table Fremantle derby, while another 10,000 flocked to Bassendean Oval for the Swan Districts-East Perth match.

"Fremantle offers something very special for football," Tannock said. "That was why we carefully scheduled Monday's other match at Bassendean Oval."

"With matches at opposite ends of the metropolitan area and between clubs bordering on each other's territory, we had good drawing power. Their current positions on the premiership ladder and strong traditional supporter base all helped in Monday's success."

Tannock said the decision not to televise Monday's Fremantle Derby helped produce the biggest home-and-away attendance since 1979.

Even with a second AFL team operating out of Fremantle — as is so powerfully advocated — Tannock wants the Foundation Day Derby to remain as a showpiece to the local competition.

He dismissed the suggestion of a Foundation Day Cup Derby between East Fremantle and South Fremantle as a curtain-raiser to the West Coast confrontation with the Fremantle team.

"Looking down the track, we wouldn't want to cut across the tradition of the East Fremantle-South Fremantle Derby," Tannock said.

"I think it should be preserved as the showpiece of local football."

## Westside Comment

### Out of touch

LOCAL football got what it asked for last Monday — big crowds back at the Pepsi Cup WAFL games.

But, unfortunately, local football was so out of touch with big crowds, that it failed the test miserably.

To turn fans away from the gates — or let them storm through free of charge — defeated everything football has been dreaming about for six years.

With nearly 30,000 fans turning out for two Foundation Day holiday matches, it is obvious that WAFL games still have appeal — given all the favourable circumstances.

But there were plenty of people who went to Fremantle Oval and Bassendean Oval who won't be in a hurry to go again.

How Swan Districts could leave their main gates, in Old Perth Road, closed on a day when they had to expect a big crowd, given their premiership aspirations and East Perth's good form, was puzzling.

#### PRE-MATCH WOES

People who had parked at the Bassendean end of the ground expecting to gain admission were frustrated when they had to walk around to the other side of the oval, to be greeted by long queues at the Guildford Road turnstiles.

They were still outside as the opening siren went — and, ultimately, officials had to open the gates to let the fans in without paying.

South Fremantle had expected a big crowd at Fremantle Oval, but they, too, were over-whelmed. They cringed as surplus fans were either turned away at the gates or allowed in free of charge because of the crush.

And trying to get food or refreshments was a task tougher than what East Fremantle faced in the dying minutes; it fact, it was mission impossible.

For years, the WAFL has been trying to convince supporters to go back and watch their clubs in action. When they finally did, the WAFL itself failed to handle the revival.

## Eagles doubt on Watson

THE West Coast Eagles have abandoned hopes that former Essendon legend Tim Watson will play this year.

Watson, a shock Eagles draftee last March, has told the club he is not prepared to come out of retirement.

However, the Eagles have not given up all hope of tempting the former Bomber to play next year.

The Eagles are expected to retain Watson on their list when it is revised later this month, in the hope he may renew his enthusiasm to play in 1993.

Eagles football manager Trevor Nisbett said this week the biggest hurdle to a Watson comeback has been the prospect of relocation from Melbourne to Perth for the champion forward and his family.

### NO HOPE

The club's Melbourne-based manager Stephen Nash has remained in constant touch with Watson.

"There doesn't seem to be any hope of Tim playing this year," Nisbett said this week.

"His approach to things has never really changed. We have retained him though in the hope he might change his mind."

Under AFL regulations, a player on a club list must be registered to play by the end of June.

If Watson signs a registration form, which is lodged with the AFL by the end of this month, it remains conceivable that the 282-game veteran, who started his distinguished career in 1977, could play for the Eagles at any time this season.

To run the brilliant forward into a semblance of match-conditioning, there would be quite a race among WAFL clubs to win his services through the Eagles player allotment scheme.

THE enormous respect Eagles coach Mick Malthouse has for defender Michael Brennan could hasten his return for Friday night's clash with struggling North Melbourne at the MCG.

Brennan, troubled by back-related hamstring injuries this year, is the durable and disciplined backman best suited to mind one of North's healthy crop of big forwards.

But Brett Heady's recurring hamstring injuries may delay the dynamic forward's comeback.

Malthouse said early this week that he is reluctant to risk his talented goalkicker in the wet, slippery conditions anticipated at the MCG on Friday.

## Eagles need strength to combat 'Roos

"The history of Brett over the past two months really must be considered closely," Malthouse said hinting at the prospect of a delay for Heady.

"His position will be weighed up by the medical staff and Brett himself, before any decision is made on whether he plays. He could play for Subiaco or even have another week off.

"Michael Brennan will certainly be considered. His characteristics and injury history are slightly different and we'll look at that when selecting the side."

### DANGER MEN

John Longmire, winner of the 1990 Coleman Medal when he kicked 98 goals, Wayne Carey and Peter Mann loom as big obstacles in North's forward zone.

If Brennan's determined comeback continues to impress Malthouse, the Eagles vice-captain is likely to join Mitchell White manning those dangerous forwards.

North anticipate the return of former Eagles ruckman Alex (The Russian) Ishchenko to bolster their big-man brigade.

Ishchenko, drafted to North last March, missed the Roos loss on Sunday to Adelaide because of a hamstring problem.

Malthouse has a healthy respect for North's big brigade, though the weather conditions on Friday could sway Malthouse and Roos coach Wayne Schimmelbusch on selection.

Malthouse admits he would not necessarily use smaller, running players for the clash under lights.

However, a smaller make-up for night football is a common option.

### SMALL PLAY

Top performances from rovers Trent Nichols and David Hart in last Monday's Derby and the continued good form of Robbie West, a late inclusion for the game against Adelaide in the wet two weeks ago, adds fuel to speculation that Malthouse could opt for smaller players on Friday.

West Coast have lost three times under the MCG lights to North on a Friday night. Two of those games were under Malthouse, the most recent being round 19 on July 26 last year.

"I've always respected North as a hard side to crack, even when I was playing myself or coaching Footscray," Malthouse said.

"This will be a tough assignment for us and North are on the back foot from a succession of losses."

The Eagles go in as warm favourites. But Malthouse will hammer the message that the Kangaroos are experts under lights and West Coast's poor record at night at the MCG.

Eagles mid-field play-makers, last year's all-Australian wingers Chris Mainwaring and Peter Matera, creative forward Chris Lewis and centreman Scott Watters were all disappointing against the Vics.

They need to lift if West Coast are to starve clever ball-gatherers Matthew Larkin, Wayne Schwass, Brett Allison and Craig Sholl of possession in the mid-field.

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# Ishchenko hopes to tackle his old Eagles mates

WHEN a footballer is de-listed and has to shift interstate to continue his career, it's little wonder that he reserves a 'special' effort when he lines up against his old teammates.

North Melbourne's biggest recruit for season 1992, Alex Ishchenko, has been keenly anticipating this Friday's game against the West Coast Eagles, building himself up to prove that he was harshly treated at the end of 1988.

However, a hamstring injury which forced his withdrawal from last week's game in Adelaide, sees him in doubt for the clash against his old side.

Ishchenko's immediate playing fate won't be known till the eve of the match. As North's most impressive recruit, he is being given every opportunity to prove his fitness.

Before his breakdown, he said: "The Eagles have changed a lot since I was there, with very few players from the original squad. I'm still friendly with a number of the original squad members and speak to them on a regular basis."

"But, you have to go out there and treat it as any other game."

## VIDEO TAPES

"Before each game, I look at video tapes of the ruckmen I'm coming up against, watch how they are jumping and where they're getting their kicks."

Ironically, Ishchenko hadn't given any thought to playing football in 1992, till Rodney Eade — his premiership reserves coach at the Brisbane Bears last year — arrived at North Melbourne as assistant coach.

Big Alex had endured a disappointing season with Brisbane, lifted only partially by his appearance in the first Bears side to win an AFL premiership, as they took the reserves flag.

Eade believed that Ishchenko, with his man-mountain physique, could be handy at Arden Street and after being drafted in November, Ishchenko has proved to be one of the Roos most consistent players.

"After last year, I was quite happily retired and couldn't have cared less if I didn't pull on a pair of football boots again," he says.

"Rodney talked me into at least thinking about having another crack at it. When the decision was made and I was drafted, I was pretty fair dinkum about it."

"It's great just being in a traditional club set-up after being at the Eagles and the Bears, which didn't have a lot of tradition."

"It was evidenced recently when they had a gathering of some of the club's greatest old players over a cup of Judy's soup in the rooms after training."

Ishchenko says he missed such grassroots and close football involvement, especially in Brisbane, a developing football State.

"They were always trying to create tradition and were up against it, where-

as it's already there at North Melbourne."

"I liked the way North Melbourne operated. Looking at their player base I really thought they had a good chance of making the finals. I thought if I'm going to play football for one more year, I might as well be at a club that had a realistic chance of playing in the finals."

"When you're switched on and motivated, it's easy to get yourself up," he said. "Last year the simple thing was that I didn't want to play football."

"A team like Norths have the ability to string together a succession of wins against virtually any side in the competition. It's a matter of playing with confidence, getting that fire in our belly back."

Ishchenko, who played 30 games with the Eagles in 1987-88 after 46 with East Perth, regards himself as being in 'the twilight' of his career, even though he is only 28.

"In our game with Melbourne recently, I was the oldest player on the ground, with Donald McDonald not playing," he laughs.

"Only a few years ago, I was being classed as a young player."

IN CASE you haven't noticed, there's an ironic twist coming up for the West Coast Eagles in this Friday's night game against North Melbourne.

It was at this point last year that the Eagles went into a fatal tail-spin after a high-flying start to the season.

The Eagles reached their peak leading up to WA thrashing Victoria at the WACA Ground in a State-of-Origin contest that featured many in-form West Coast players.

But they never reached those heady heights again after the interstate match.

After a bye, the Eagles faced North Melbourne at the MCG in a night game — and were dumped back to earth in no mean style.

To that stage, the West Coasters had looked invincible.

Some people, like Collingwood coach Leigh Matthews, were claiming the Eagles had set a new dimension in Australian Rules football.

Though somewhat extravagant, those views were understandable.

The Eagles had swept all before them and there didn't appear to be a side capable of putting the brakes on ... till the North Melbourne game.

There lies the irony.

On paper, the Eagles look the better side this week, but they are in a complete reversal of last year — and facing a team they have never beaten in Melbourne.

While last year's game marked the Eagles decline,

this match could launch their surge towards a finals berth.

Despite their indifferent form, North Melbourne are a very competitive side.

Even though they lost to Adelaide, they showed that given the run of the ball, they can be very damaging.

And, of course, they relish night games at the MCG.

Friday's match will not be easy for the Eagles, even though three successive wins appears to see them accelerating after an awful start.

Though the season won't hinge on the result, the Eagles cannot afford to lose to the cellar-dwellers in the competition.

They are also fortunate the competition is so tight.

The real significance in Friday's game is whether the Eagles have turned the corner and are on the improve.

An even bigger irony would be if the Eagles, following WA's drubbing by Victoria at the MCG (the opposite result to last year's State-of-Origin game) were to win on Friday and carry the form of the first half of last season into the finals this year.

He's right. But as far as the WAFL is concerned, Monday's outstanding performance at the turnstiles could simply hasten plans to locate an AFL team in the port city.

Brown said that was the kind of support the Fremantle team could expect each week and he's probably right.

### TOO EARLY

The power-brokers pushing for the introduction of the second team could well increase their bid to get a second AFL licence next year.

There is no denying that a second licence needs to be granted for a Fremantle club, but the timing is a problem.

Next year is simply too soon. It

would be difficult to get everything in place and operating well.

The other thing Monday's match proved is that, given time to develop, there are some outstanding young players in Fremantle who could form the nucleus of the new AFL team.

But there must be some protection for the port clubs from the AFL draft.

They can ill-afford to be ravaged and if the AFL plans to admit a club, the Fremantle clubs should be off-limits to clubs in the November draft.

It was exciting to see rookies Jason Spinks and Warren Campbell floating around the Bulldogs forward line, creating headaches for the Sharks defence. Their promise is undeniable.

# Kickett reaches the top

The former West Perth and Claremont player has run a rocky road to being widely regarded as one of the most exciting players in the AFL.

After missing out on the 1987 Sandover Medal — when he polled a record 47 votes — because he was controversially suspended late in the season, Kickett went to Adelaide, then North Melbourne, before settling at Essendon in March, 1990.

The exciting Bombers utility player added another chapter to his chequered career last week when he was Westside Football's player of the match in the State-of-Origin clash with Victoria at the MCG.

Kickett won the prestigious Leon

Larkin Medal for his courageous effort against the might of Victoria's football machine.

He was judged WA's best-afield by a panel of WA media, narrowly beating brilliant St Kilda forward Nicky Winmar.

Kickett joins Geelong and former South Fremantle Sandover Medal winner Mark Bairstow as winners of the Larkin Medal.

The Medal was instituted by Westside Football last year to honour former Subiaco promotions man Leon Larkin, who devised the State-of-Origin concept in 1977.

## Critics are united

THE Claremont Oval umpires — and the controversial 50-metre penalty — both came in for a media pasting after the match.

Radio 6NR match commentator Phil Lamb said the final 50-metre penalty that gave the Tigers a crucial goal was 'mind boggling.'

Co-critic Gary Stocks, of The West Australian, suggested that the current umpiring in WAFL ranks faced serious short-comings. It wasn't only the new umpires who were at fault, but the experienced ones as well.

The commentators on Radio 6WF were equally uncomplimentary on the question of umpires generally and the controversial 50-metre penalty in particular.

Keith Slater said that the 50-metre rule was totally unfair; umpires were virtually giving a team a goal when they awarded one.

"It has to be a very serious offence to warrant a 50-metre penalty," he said. "There are too many soft 50-metres handed out."

The ABC's man at Claremont Oval, Larry Kickett, agreed with all the Perth fans that the final 50-metre penalty was not warranted. "The umpires just aren't consistent enough in awarding that penalty," he said.

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Football officials must remove the 50-metre penalty as soon as possible. A rule that can change the result of a game is blatantly unfair.

Cats finally snatch a tight one

GEELONG, the AFL's worst-performed club in close games in recent years, improved their record by stealing victory against St Kilda on Saturday.

Before Saturday, the Cats had lost 12 out of their last 13 games that were decided by a goal or less.

Those losses — since round 22 of 1987 — were to nine different clubs, with only a two-point win over Footscray in June, 1990 breaking the run.

All clubs — except Adelaide, Brisbane, Collingwood, Footscray and Richmond — have had at least one narrow win over the Cats in the past five years.

IN SUNDAY'S loss to Footscray at the Western Oval, Hawthorn full-forward Jason Dunstall was held to just three goals for the third time this year.

Dunstall has averaged nearly eight goals a game this season, in his most impressive start to a season.

However, his performances away from Hawthorn's new home-ground, Waverley Park, have been far less imposing than his efforts at home.

Five of Hawthorn's 10 games this year have been at Waverley and Dunstall has bagged 51 goals in those games, with hauls of 12, seven, nine, 17 and six.

In Hawthorn's five games at away grounds, Dunstall's tallies are four, three, three, seven and three — 20 goals at an average of four per game.

Hawthorn play seven of their remaining 12 home-and-away matches at Waverley, which could be bad news for visiting full-backs.

THE West Coast Eagles will attempt on Friday night at the MCG to become the 11th team this year to win after having a week off.

Fitzroy maintained the good record of teams coming off the bye with their last-minute win over Collingwood on Saturday.

Only one team has lost after having had the advantage of the bye the previous week this year — in stark contrast to last season, the first with a bye included.

Saturday's win was Fitzroy's first over Collingwood since round two of 1989.

AS a result of Footscray's win over Hawthorn at the Western Oval on Sunday, honours in 124 clashes between the clubs are split at 62 wins apiece.

The results between the clubs — both admitted to the league in 1925 — suggests they are evenly matched, but the Hawks have won nine premierships to the Bulldogs' one.

The 1992 Bulldogs are doing everything right at this stage to give themselves a chance of adding another flag to their solitary 1954 premiership pennant.

MELBOURNE'S last quarter fade-out against Carlton gave the Blues their 100th victory in matches between the two clubs.

After scores were tied at three-quarter time, the Demons failed to score in the last quarter, while Carlton added 5.4 to win by 34 points.

Carlton, winners in 100 of the 177 games between the clubs, have now notched 100 or more wins against all the original members of the VFL, becoming the first club to do so.

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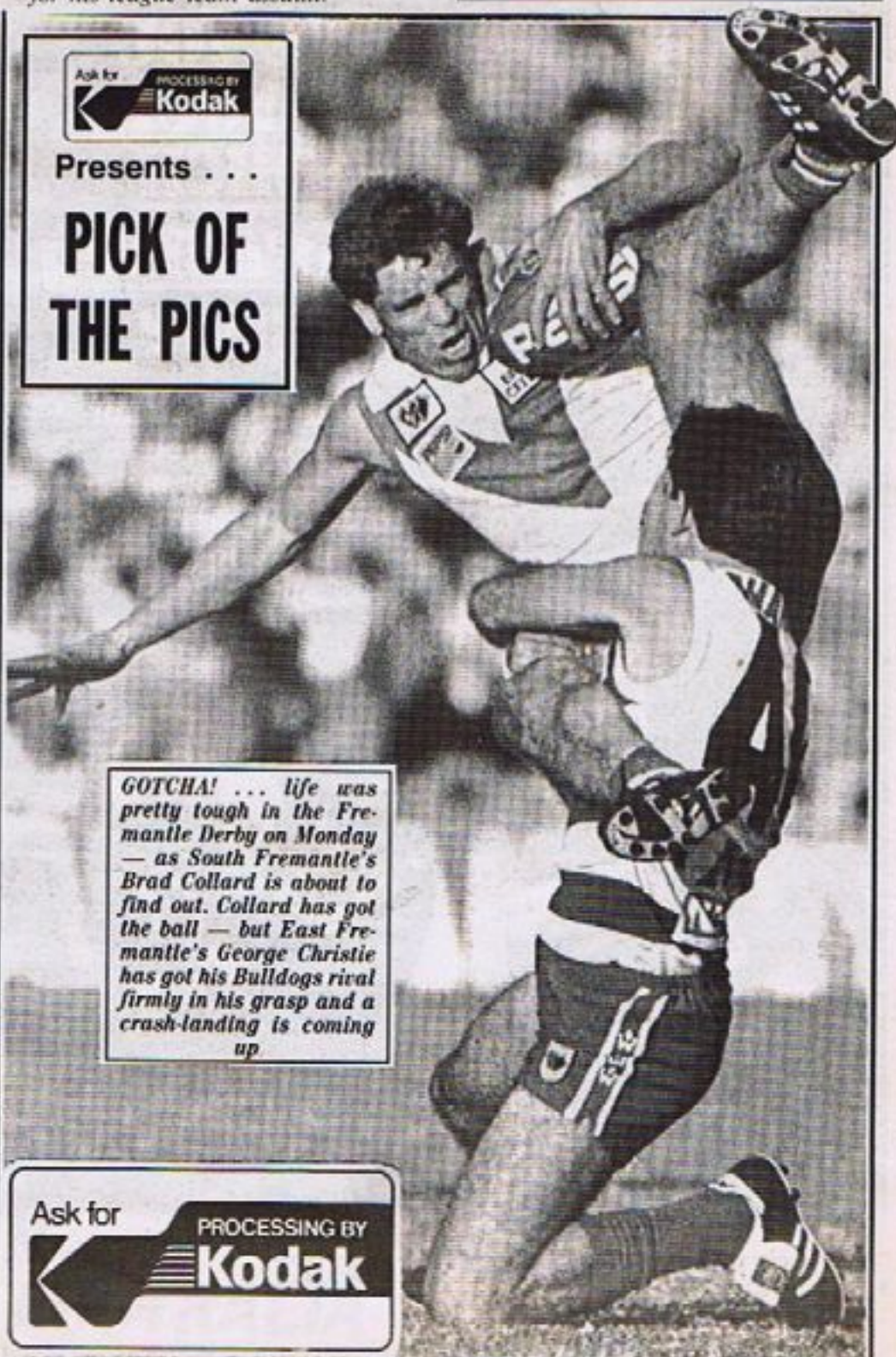

But they won't find it easy going against Claremont's defence who were in good form against Perth with Scott Edwards, Phil Gilbert and Darrell Panizza in great touch.

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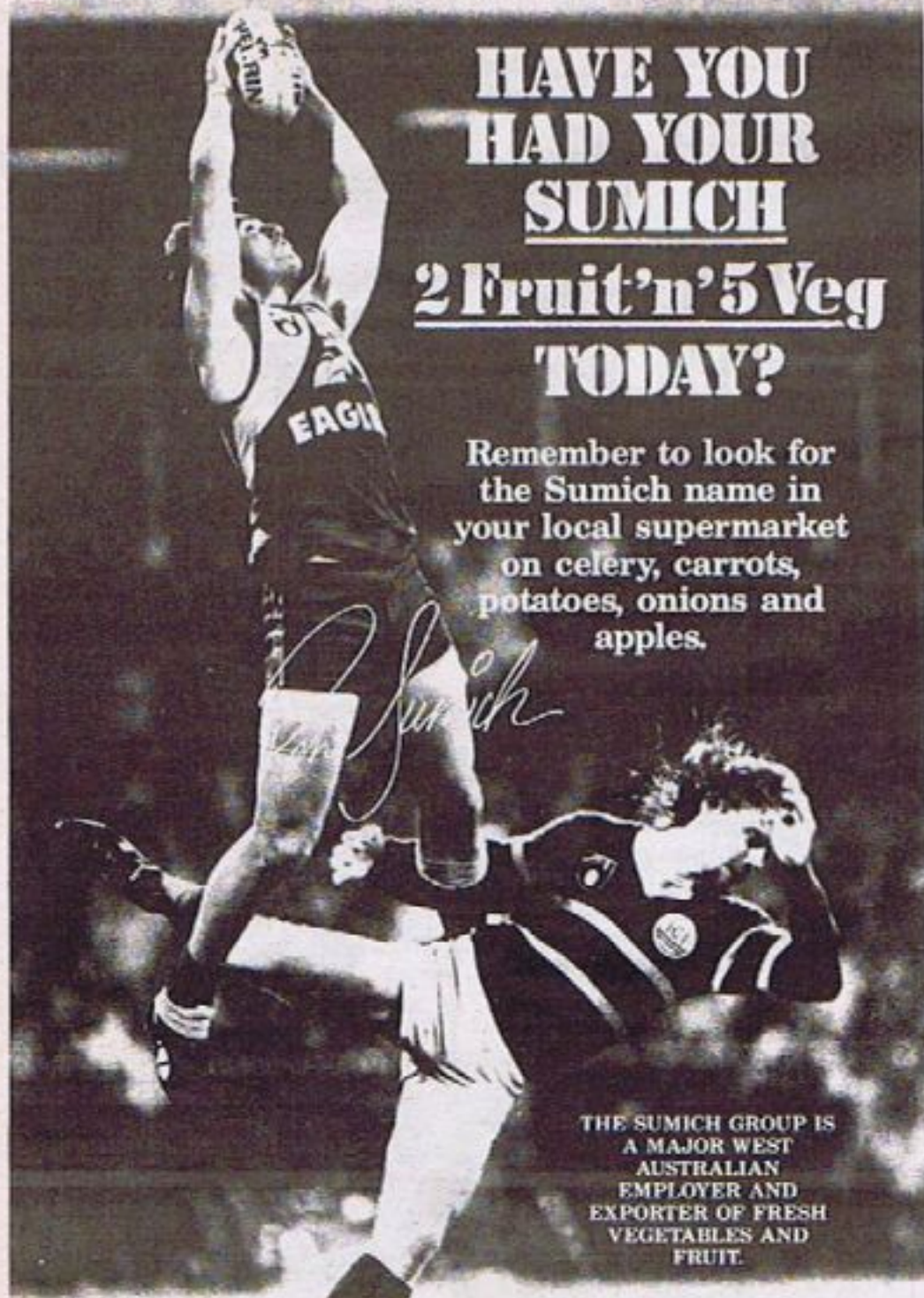

## Huge bonus for Bulldogs

MONDAY'S Fremantle derby was a huge financial bonus for South Fremantle.

The Bulldogs not only retained the Foundation Cup at the expense of arch rivals, East Fremantle, but made more than \$50,000 profit on the day.

Gate-takings alone were in excess of that figure, according to Bulldogs president Ric Gloede.

zone, ruckman-forward Nick Caputi and defenders John Porter and Nick Bolton have all caught the eye of AFL talent scouts.

Skilful big man Kurt Shepherd, a 196cm former Teal Cup forward, is also yet to make his league debut with Souths, but has been a target of AFL recruiting scouts already.

Gloede says that the club is aware of the prospect of losing a host of developing players.

### FIRM STAND

However, Souths will be taking a firm stand to retain all their players and offer them sound advice as they make decisions relating to this year's national draft.

The Bulldogs strongest bargaining power is the advent of a second WA-based AFL team, expected to be located at Fremantle.

"We will advise our players to be very careful if they choose to register for the draft," Gloede said.

"We can't stop the eastern states clubs if the big cheque books come out, however.

"A lot of them aren't ready yet for AFL ranks, but they will certainly be chased and we hope that they think carefully."

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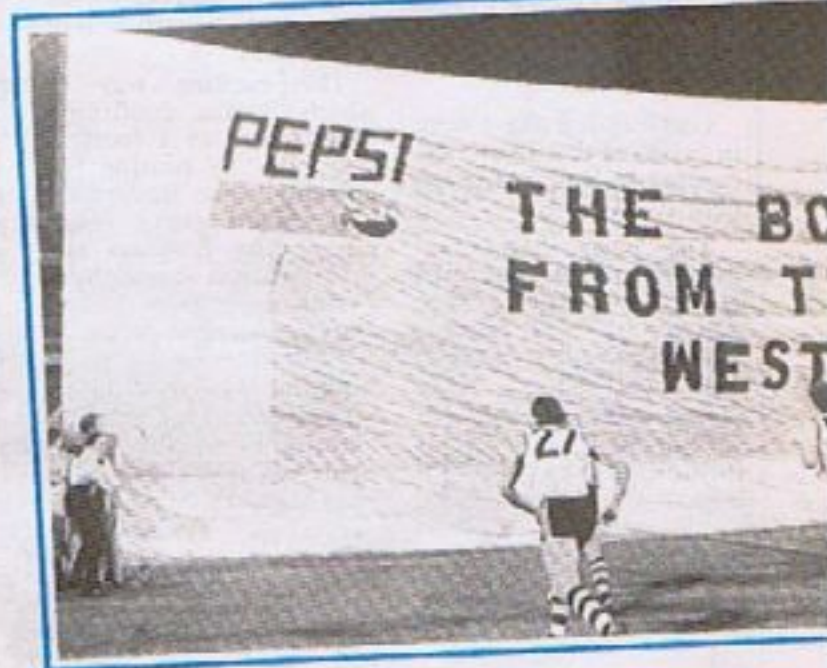

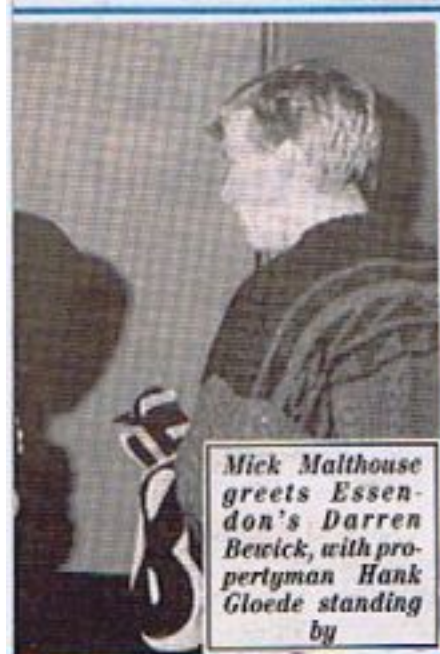

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# Sharks team fishing for a flag

EAST Fremantle, the most successful club in the WAFL, prides itself on tradition and a hard-working football environment.

The proud Sharks have not appeared in a grand final since 1985 and after their best start in many years, that is the aim of all concerned at the Moss Street headquarters.

Leading the race for a finals berth is the league's longest-serving general manager, Bob Uittenbroek.

Uittenbroek's first links with the club were back in December, 1973 when he took over as secretary, before moving to managing secretary and general manager.

He is in regular touch with president Len Hitchen, who took over early in the 1991 season when Hans Beyer resigned.

### IMPORTANT JOB

There is no shortage of replacements on hand for the top job, should Hitchen decide to call it a day. The club has the rare situation of dual vice-presidents being groomed for the job.

"They both share an important job and are in senior positions," said Uittenbroek.

"Besides, we often do things different at East Fremantle."

Len Anderson and Oscar Howard both answer to the title of vice-presidents and are supported by board members Trevor Cangemi, Stephen Waller, Matt Gill and Kim Barrett, while treasurer Ken Bateman is in his seventh year.

East Fremantle prides itself on the club's impressive social atmosphere and the man responsible is head of the social committee, John Wood, who is also on the club's and the WAFL's Past Players' Association.

The club's banquet auction is being planned at present and it has been a big money-spinner in recent years. That is set down for August 23.

Head of the marketing committee, Matt Gill, is organising the auction this season.

He is helped by full-time bar manager Mike Butterfield, in his seventh year with the club.

Former players hold pride of place at any club and the Sharks scored a coup when they enticed Rod Lester-Smith, a man with extensive football experience, back home.

Lester-Smith, a newcomer to the staff for 1992, is the new football manager, though he needed no introduction to East Fremantle Oval.

He is back at his old club after nine seasons in the east with Hawthorn and then the Brisbane Bears.

He played 109 VFL/AFL games, with premierships success eluding him with the Hawks, as he played in losing grand final sides in 1984 and '85.

Having switched to the Bears in 1988, he remained on the Gold Coast and played six senior games last season before finishing his stint as a member of the victorious Bears reserves, the first interstate team to win a premiership.

### SUCCESS

Lester-Smith first tasted success at East Fremantle when he began playing in 1978. He was a member of the 1979 premierships side on the way to 95 games with Old Easts.

Reaching that 100-game mark is not out of the question as is now back playing reserves.

Lester-Smith became friends with full-time league coach Ken Judge at East Fremantle and their playing careers followed similar paths, though Judge insists he won't be pulling the boots on again.

Judge played alongside Lester-Smith in the 1979 grand final and also debuted with Hawthorn in 1983.

He played 72 games with the Hawks, including the 1983 premiership and was a member of the losing 1984 and '85 sides.

Judge moved to the Bears for their 1987 AFL inception and played eight games in his first season and nine the following year before heading home.

After a coaching stint with West Coast amateurs, Judge took over at East Fremantle Oval early last season.

Two of the most important cogs in the Sharks wheel are office secretary Libby Thompson, in her second year with the club part-timer, Helen Fuller.

Mrs Fuller is the receptionist on Monday and Friday and is a long-time Sharks supporter, along with husband Barry, who is on the marketing committee.

Reserves coach Tony Micale is in his second season as assistant coach after stints with Swan Districts and South Fremantle, the Port club where he began his playing career.

Colts coach Ross Keagan is back at the club where he first coached the

fourths in 1972. As coach of the under-19s in 1973-74, he took the side to a premiership in 1974.

Season 1978 yielded a grand final appearance and he was a league selector in 1977 and 1991.

Hard-working league team manager is Brearley Hollingsworth, a long time servant of football, though he is new to East Fremantle.

League team managers and head trainers are the unsung heroes of football clubs and Hollingsworth and head trainer Ron Stevens and Doug Windsor are integral parts of the Sharks success story of 1992.

Current league runner is Shane Ellis, who took over when George Christie mounted his comeback to football, though another former in player David Rankin filled in for Ellis on Monday.

# Off the beaten track with ALAN EAST



## Chubby still gets plenty of footy kicks

ONE of football's most jovial characters in recent years has been Allan Stiles, a back pocket specialist whose devil-may-care attitude — mixed with a fierce love for the game — epitomises what the sport is all about.

Living with the nickname of Chubby for more than three decades and seeing football from both sides of the fence has given Stiles a thick skin that has helped him survive plenty of setbacks.

But the memories of great times at Lathlain Park, during an era when Perth were a real power in football, will stay with him forever.

Now living in Geraldton, where he has switched from sales manager at a local radio station to bar manager at the Freemason's Hotel, Stiles is still passionate about football.

His year to remember was 1970 — but for a mixture of reasons.

He won a Simpson Medal for a dashing display against South Australia, but one of his other two State games that season was the magnificent clash with Victoria on the MCG, when WA lost by a goal.

*"That was one of my biggest disappointments in football," recalls Stiles. "It was a magnificent game. I played on Billy Goggin and Wayne Richardson for a while."*

Stiles also played against Tasmania that year, but the real cruncher came in September when he was in Perth's losing 1970 grand final side, as South Fremantle triumphed.

He missed a premiership again in 1974 when East Fremantle were too good — and then he retired, prematurely, some said, as Perth won flags in '76 and '77.

"It was sad not to get a premiership, particularly when you were around that era," he says. "I retired at 27, so maybe I went out too early."

"I was lucky enough to be in thirds and reserves premierships, but it's not the same. Every player loves to represent his State, but to play in a premiership side is really the ultimate."

"For a person who was told by quite a few people that I'd be a good reserves player and never succeed in league ranks, I guess I'm happy with my achievements."

After graduating from junior football at South Perth, the nickname Chubby was given to Stiles in his first year at Kent Street High School, partly because of his portly shape, but also because singer Chubby Checker was all the rage among the teenagers, with the twist in fashion.

"And it was certainly better than little fat boy," laughs Chubby.

Stiles had grown up as a South Fremantle fan, an idol of Steve Marsh and then John Todd and John Gerovich and always dreaming of wearing a red-and-white No. 7 guernsey.

But he was zoned to Perth, so it was Lathlain Park in 1965 that he tried out: played the first game of the season in fourths and then the rest of the year with the colts, winning a premiership and collecting the team's fairest and best.

He graduated to league ranks at the end of 1966 for a game when veteran defender Bill Leuzzi was injured and got allocated No. 6 — simply because it was as close to seven as he could get.

"I wanted a low number because I was superstitious," says Stiles, whose introduction to league ranks was to be brief — and the next few years were frustrating ones.

Legendary coach Jack Ensor had a big influence on Stiles in those early days at Lathlain as he turned the nuggetty rover into a back pocket specialist.

"He made me more of an attacking defender," says Stiles, who won the reserves team's fairest and best in 1965 and the Prendergast Medal in 1968, a season when the reserves team went premiers, as well as the league.

"I did play seven league games that year," he says. "But I couldn't hold a place in a pretty good side. Going into 1969, I had played only 11 senior games in three seasons, but I wasn't feeling disillusioned; we had some pretty good players at Perth."

"Basically, I never did enough pre-season work; I wouldn't push through to the next level. Now you push people over the hill; in those days, you probably didn't know what that really meant, or maybe you knew, but didn't want to endure the pain. Now it's part of training."

"Ted Mellish was the bloke who got to me; he told me that I just didn't train hard enough. If I trained like I played, really full-on, then I'd make it. Richie Rigg was injured, so the opportunity came to get into the side and once there, I wouldn't let him get back in — I got fit and kept the back pocket

spot. By 1970, I was fit and that obviously helped me have a good year."

Stiles enjoyed that era of success at Lathlain and says it taught him a lot about life.

*"Footy taught you how to grow up," he says. "In those good days at Perth, you were taught discipline and you learnt to mix with people from all walks of life."*

"From kings to paupers, you met everybody in footy. The great part about football is the enjoyment that comes from being with your supporters; they are lovely people. You have your knockers and that, but you don't worry about them, everyone is allowed to have their own opinion, so you just enjoy the good ones."

Stiles had to prove himself under tough-man Mal Atwell, who ruled Lathlain with an iron fist — but as a coach with three premierships, he had every right to be king.

"A lot of people had the wrong impression about Atwell," says Stiles. "He wasn't a stern task-master; he just wanted discipline. But he also wanted the players to learn how to achieve that themselves. He would show you how to do things; it was up to the individual to see how far they could push themselves."

When Stiles retired at the end of the 1975 season, with 150 games behind him, there was an ironic twist to his next assignment — linking up with former coach Atwell on television.

"Channel 9 had just started in football in 1976," says Stiles. "We did a Saturday morning show with Malcolm Atwell and then came back for a spot in the news after the game. I also did a segment in the Friday night news, talking about the games the next day."

"Radio 6KY — who were linked with Nine — went into football the same year, so I worked with them as well."

Stiles became something of a multimedia megastar over the next few years as he followed the football radio circus on its merry-go-round, working with 6PM, 6IX, 6PR and 6NR.

"We had some good times on radio," says Stiles, who basically worked with the same group of people under the chairmanship of Tim Flynn. "At 6IX I think we were the first station to

actually interview players before the games."

After a life-long involvement in the film industry in Perth — his father, A.A. Stiles, was a pioneer of the movie-house scene — Stiles moved to Sydney in the mid-1980s with a film and video distribution organisation.

He missed football a little, but the company got involved with the Sydney Swans as a sponsor, so his football diet was well-fed.

Then, when the Eagles came into being in 1987, the company had a Melbourne base that required fortnightly visits, so Stiles made sure they fitted in with Eagles matches — a factor that helped renew his WA radio links, with 6NR as a special comments man.

His firm, Video Ezy, also had a lot to do with the Canberra Raiders, in the NSW rugby league competition.

*"It's an amazing game once you get to know the rules and the players," he says. "They are a great bunch of guys and it's easy to really get involved."*

Stiles identified with rugby league; he was a typical tough backman in Aussie Rules, a player who went straight through and left bodies scattered in his wake.

But he denies that he was over-aggressive.

"I wasn't rough or dirty," he says. "I liked it tough. I played it hard and fierce, but fair."

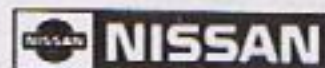
"The only time I ever got reported was when Geoff Blethyn kicked a goal for Claremont and I was in the goal square and it definitely came off Richard Peel's legs. It meant the difference between us going six points clear in fourth spot or just two points clear. The goal made the difference in the result and when the goal umpire gave it a goal, I argued pretty heatedly with him. I got reported and I pleaded guilty under provocation!"

Now aged 44, Stiles is still very much involved in football in Geraldton, as chairman of the Geraldton Umpires Board and a director on the Great Northern Football League.

He has a daughter Nicole (17), living in Sydney, but sons Shane (24) and Todd (22) are in Perth.

Kiernan (26) reads the play exceptionally well, is a strong mark and a boasts a long kick at goal.

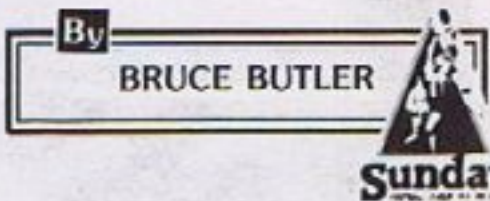
## GOOD DOZEN

## Coach monitor scheme has many positives

THE WA Amateur Football league is setting new standards in coach education by instigating a coaching support scheme in 1992.

The scheme, sponsored by the Quit Campaign, is in its infancy, but already many clubs are taking advantage of the opportunities offered.

The programme's co-ordinator, Paul Rafter, recognises the difficulty in establishing the new and challenging scheme.

"Our initial problem is convincing clubs and coaches that the coaching support personnel have been put in place to offer help, advice and guidance — we are not policemen," Rafter said.

Seven monitors, all with playing and coaching experience, have been appointed to lead the programme.

Three of the monitors — Barrie Pearson, Max Stewart and Steve Arnot — have played at WAFL level, while Phil Cranage, John Bennetts and Phil Hayes are directly involved with football at the grass-roots level.

The monitors are familiar with the difficulties associated with coaching at the local level and can readily relate to the frustrations which may be experienced by amateur coaches.

"We certainly can't evaluate a coach's contribution by watching his team or hearing him talk on a given day," he said.

"On the other hand, we can often gain a good idea of what he's trying to do. We look at how a coach uses his players, their level of skill development, the on-field discipline and any strategies evident during a game.

"We are looking for positive signs in the way our coaches educate their players. What use the clubs make of us is then up to them. Essentially we are a service."

The monitors, who cover up to 20 games each week, at all levels, are available to conduct training sessions or informally discuss a team's performance.

When attending games, they identify themselves with club officials and record their impressions for discussion should that club initiate contact.

A further step in the programme is the supplying of a fortnightly coaching newsletter which concentrates on training exercises, coaching strategies and practical coaching tips.

Rafter says he is also looking to conduct practical coaching clinics or seminars aimed at the appropriate level of football.

"We are seeking to professionalise the conduct of football at the community level," he said.

"We believe the role of coaches is an influential and vital one. We want to ensure our coaches feel they have somewhere to turn for advice or guidance when it's needed.

"In addition, we want to co-operate with clubs in eliminating conduct which may bring that club, or indeed the competition, into disrepute."

Rafter says in turn, coaches and umpires have an opportunity to participate in shaping the direction of Amateur Football in encouraging them to record their own views on game conduct, skill development and talent identification.

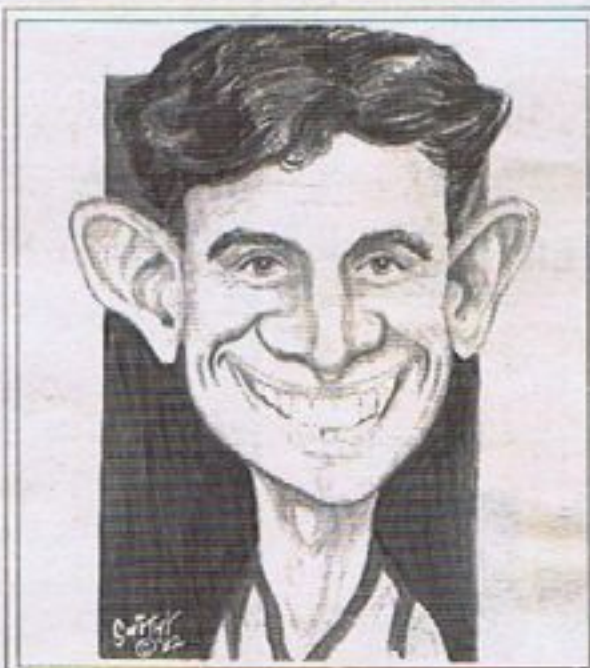

## Longmire can stand the heat of battle

THERE is little that could happen in the heat of a tough AFL encounter that would throw star North Melbourne forward John Longmire.

As a fresh-faced 16-year-old, straight from the family farm at Corowa, just over the NSW border, Longmire was thrust into the thick of one of the roughest AFL encounters for years.

His first taste of the big time was the infamous North Melbourne-Carlton exhibition match in London at the end of the 1986 season — the "Battle of Britain" it was.

Fierce fights broke out in the second quarter, resulting in many reports and casting grave doubts on the future of overseas showpiece matches.

"I was sitting on the interchange bench and saw all the fights erupt," Longmire recalled. "Two minutes later the phone rang and John Kennedy said get out there and have a go, son."

Longmire's tough introduction faded somewhat as he chased his own place in AFL history.

Going into the last qualifying match of the 1990 season, against Collingwood, the Roos ace needed just four goals to become the youngest player to reach 100 in a year — but he finished with 2.8.

"Being youngest to kick a 100 goals would have been great," he says. "But I'm still the youngest to win the Coleman Medal, so that's one thing, I suppose."

"Maybe in 15 or 20 years, I'll look back and wish I'd kicked better. I felt more sorry for my teammates; they were more shattered than I was."

"We couldn't get into the finals, so they helped all game as I chased the four goals and I stuffed it up for them."

Before his flirt with Norths on that UK trip, Longmire had no dreams to play AFL football.

"A lot of kids want to play AFL footy from the age of five or six," he says.

"But I was happy to stay on the farm and drive the tractors among the sheep. But I realised that the farm is always going to be there and I'm content to play league football for a few more years."

Ironically, Longmire settled into the Roos camp early in 1987 with one of the current Eagles big men in Mark Hepburn, who was among five recruits housed together for their inaugural season.

"It was a case of sink or swim," says Longmire.

"They were all really good blokes, but we were competing against each other to make a good impression."

### MERGER TALKS

Longmire says that suggestions about the club merging, relocating or even folding, don't worry the players and cannot be used as a reason for their inconsistency.

"It doesn't worry the players, more the supporters," he says. "Obviously it would be better if no-one was talking about it, but that's the way it is."

"There were big expectations last year after we had finished strongly in 1990 and we were in the six for the most of the season, only to just miss out again."

"This year we were all fired up for a big season after a solid summer. Practice match form was good, with only one loss to Fitzroy in the Foster's Cup."

"But since then we've fallen away. I can't put a finger on it."

Longmire believes that responsibility for the Roos hopes rests with the more experienced players.

He says skipper Matthew Larkin, a triple club best-and-fairest winner and vice-captain Ben Buckley carry the bulk of the leadership responsibilities.

But he says the burden must spread wider.

"It's really up to blokes like myself and Wayne Carey and a few of others who have played 70 to 90 games to accept leadership," he says.

AN after-match conversation with ardent North Melbourne fan Mike Dolbey opened the way for John Longmire to join the fast expanding Australian Sports Video company.

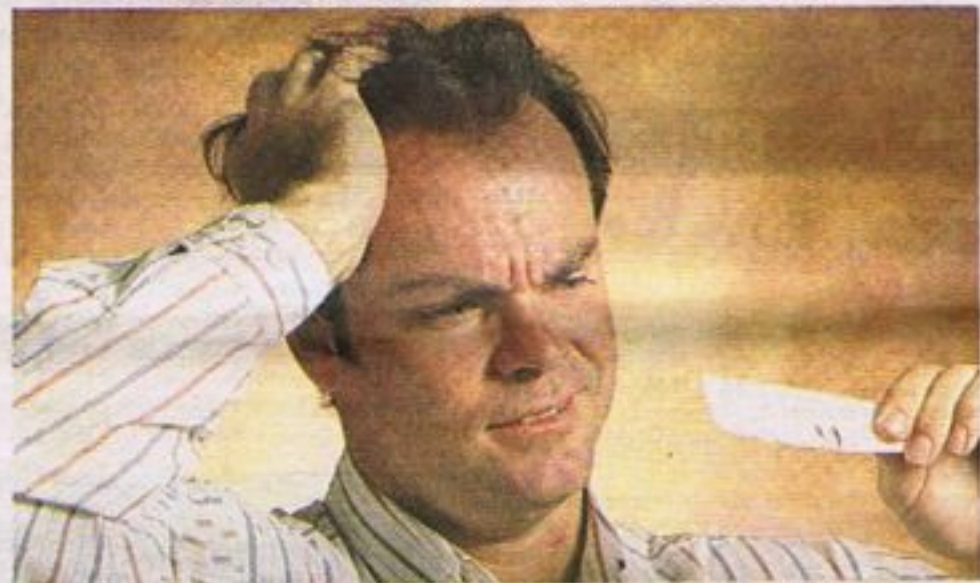
Videos on games and documentaries on Australian football's greats can be obtained from the Toorak-based company.

"It started after the 1990 Collingwood grand final, when so many fans wanted a video of the game for posterity," Longmire said.

"We have got grand finals going back to 1961 and each week put together three qualifying games that are on sale."

"It's good for people who can't get to the footy, or fans who want to put together their own library of players or games."

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
