



Souths let fans down

THE South Fremantle entourage let their many fans — and football in general — down rather badly when they quickly left the ground after Saturday's grand final.

The players and their support staff vanished within minutes of the final siren signalling a premiership victory for East Fremantle.

Tradition rules that the losing side stay on the ground to acknowledge their conquerors and watch the medallions being presented. Some coaches use that as a form of punishment!

While the Bulldogs were obviously disappointed at losing after going into the grand final as hot favourites, it is surely a sign of respect for the supporters of the losers to stay out on the oval.

What would have happened, for example, if a South Fremantle player had won the Simpson Medal?

Bulldogs centre-half-back Mark Hepburn played a great game and was in the running for the Medal awarded to the best-on-ground, as was skipper Ned Fimmano and veteran Brad Collard.

Souths also kept the media out of the rooms after the match and controversial coach Malcolm Brown wasn't giving interviews, either.

Final message

JUST one quarter to go — that was the same message from the two coaches at three-quarter-time, when Mal Brown and Ken Judge addressed their sides with single-minded determination.

"Run your socks off," said the Bulldogs coach.

"If we win this, it will be one of the best victories in the history of the WAFL."

Judge took the other tack as he spelt out the situation to his Sharks, who were trailing by six points. "The odds are stacked against us," said Judge.

"But if ever the Gods are going to smile on East Fremantle, it's going to be today. Let's forget about the breeze, that's not going to help us."

Top acting, guys

THERE are premiership medals handed out to the victors after grand finals — but there should be some Oscar best-acting trophies awarded as well.

East Fremantle's old-stager Neil Lester-Smith deserved one when he hit the deck like a punctured balloon after a late collision from big Craig Edwards, which was much worse than it looked.

After all, when Edwards gets his momentum up, stopping would be harder than turning the Queen Mary in Fremantle Harbour.

Sharks big-man Damien Condon put on one act that made him look like a flying swan as he hurled himself to the ground seeking a free kick.

Quick message

THERE are plenty of enterprising people around waiting for the opportunity to cash in on a good idea — and so they did when East Fremantle won their 27th premiership.

The Sharks players were proudly sporting newly printed T-shirts after the victory which thumbed their noses at the critics.

"Too old, too slow, too bloody good," was the message that echoed out after the match.

Tough Scraggers

THE demise of Footscray has finally ended a season of cynical speculation — and satisfied all those critics who continually wrote the Bulldogs off. But it took 25 weeks to get rid of the Scraggers!

Former top VFL coach Tom Hafey admitted on radio last Saturday that he was one person who continually under-estimated Footscray.

"I kept tipping against them," he said. "They've got a goal to goal line that looks like a VFA team, no stars, but they just keep on putting in; they turned out to be a real team of goers."

Part of the game

SOUTH Fremantle copped their fare share of head injuries during the season and Saturday's grand final was no exception — but club president Ric Gloede says it's all part of football.

"We believe that what happens on the field ends on the field and we won't be taking any further action," said Gloede after the match which left young Bulldogs forward Jason Spinks with a broken jaw.

Spinks left the field in the first quarter, appearing to be hit behind-the-play — and team manager Santo Pasqua was left shaking his head in disbelief.

Pasqua, escorting Warren Campbell to the interchange area as a replacement, took a short detour to see if emergency umpire Peter Repper had seen the incident.

Repper indicated that he had seen it ... but there was no report.

Support for Eagles

THE sensitive question of whether the Eagles should take part in the AFL grand final parade this Friday still hasn't gone away.

The West Coast management agreed to take part in this year's parade — under the threat of a \$25,000 fine if they didn't — and some strong support for their previous stand to boycott the traditional Melbourne event came from the Channel Seven football panel on Sunday.

The suggestion from former player and coach Ron Barassi that the Eagles were entitled to be reluctant participants because of the interruptions to their grand final routine, didn't even draw one comment of objection from the other panellists.

Different views

THE on-going battle of whether players should be eligible to drop back from the Eagles side to WAFL teams competing in the finals drags on.

Two men who come from different directions are Trevor Sprigg, chairman of selectors of the West Coasters and Claremont coach Gerard Neesham — whose strong stand last year over the forced inclusion of Mark Hepburn left a pretty bitter taste in Tigerland.

Sprigg threw out his thoughts at 6PR's football panel show last week when he said that the answer could be no rules or regulations at all.

Neesham's reaction to that was simple — "You don't have to be the person to tell the player who has to drop out of a grand final."

Bunton's prospects

THE departure of legendary coach Haydn Bunton has left a big void at the Subiaco Football Club—but don't think you've seen the last of the Little Master.

Bunton's name has been linked with a proposed South West side in the WAFL, especially with his residential life based around Mandurah these days.

Speaking on radio last weekend, he said he was looking forward to some sort of challenge in the future.

"You can learn all the time and I've learnt a lot in the last 12 months," he said. "So I'm looking forward to doing something else."


Rival versions

THERE were two distinct versions of Saturday's grand final — that is, if you listened to the radio calls.

Radio 6WF's George Grljusich, whose loyalty for South Fremantle has never been questioned, certainly had a red-and-white flavour to his commentary, while rival station 6PR had a good blue-and-white duo in action, with former East Fremantle players Percy Johnson and Trevor Sprigg calling the kicks.

Sprigg, now chairman of selectors of the West Coast Eagles, was very unbiased in his call, while Johnson — who is emotionally involved with the Sharks — did his best to keep out of the commentary, letting Frank Sparrow share the action with Sprigg.

But there was the odd occasion when Percy couldn't help himself, especially in the closing minutes — but good luck to him! If you're that involved with a club, well why not show it? Maybe a bit more open loyalty wouldn't hurt the game.

al VIC. Crowd Will stir the Eagles A FIERCELY anti-West

Australian crowd will bring the Eagles closer together in Saturday's historic grand final at the MCG, according to tough skipper John Worsfold.

The first AFL grand final with an interstate team playing at the great Melbourne sports colosseum will attract ferocious opposition from the partisan Victorian crowd.

Most Vics were hopping mad that the Eagles went within a whisker of taking the premiership last year.

And this year's assault on the nation's Holy Grail, the equivalent to yachting's America's Cup or the coveted Ashes urn, is seen as a downright insult.

Former AFL star and football critic Ron Barassi has been outspoken in his parochial desire for a Victorian win.

But West Australian football - riding on the high-flying Eagles - is on the rampage again.

Most Victorians breathed a collective sigh of relief last year when Hawthorn stood firm on grand final day to prevent Worsfold hoisting the premiership cup aloft at Waverley Park.

Worsfold says crowd antagonism is just one of many things the Eagles have learned to counter in the past six years.

Leading West Coast into the club's second grand final appearance, Worsfold says the boos, jeers and focus of the Melbourne media is a spur to his team.

"We certainly never get any standing ovation when we run on to a Melbourne ground, that's for sure.

"Our guys have learned to cope with travel, different grounds and definitely the crowds.

"By the time we run onto the ground on Saturday, I'm sure the crowd response won't affect us. We'll be totally focused on the chance to win a premiership.

"Some of the treatment we get when away from Perth works in our favour.

"We have established a pretty good record in Melbourne over the years and most of our players are now very experienced in many ways.

"The lessons we learned out of last year's finals are also fresh in our minds and I think that should help us this time around."

Worsfold says he and his talented band face a unique second shot at lifting the AFL premiership.

"It's a bit of a rare opportunity to get another shot at winning a grand final so quickly after tasting defeat last year," he said.

"This sort of chance doesn't come around too often.

"After last year, we are certainly looking forward to actually winning.

"Last year was very disappointing."

Worsfold said that to beat the talented Geelong for the title would require a complete team effort, "all over the ground" on Saturday.

"We can't afford to rely on any one group of players or player," he said.

"It has to be a totally committed team effort.

"Geelong is a very good side, who deliver the ball well and run well.

"We'll have to be at our best."





Sumich, Matera the targets

WEST Coast are prepared for an ambush in Saturday's historic AFL grand final against Geelong at the MCG.

Eagles superstars Peter Sumich and Peter Matera are the prime targets.

An opening like the 1989 premiership showdown - when the Cats hit the more fancied Hawthorn with everything — is on the cards.

The Cats will claw at every physical and mental opportunity to put West Coast - considered by the Vics as aliens - out of business.

But who are the Cats with the capacity to upset the Eagles star duo?

Former Eagles defender Geoff Miles could be the man for Sumich and littleknown tagger Paul Wills could get the assignment on Matera.

Sumich, with his massive goal-scoring ability and Matera's explosive pace are two of the most influential factors in West Coast's attempt to hoist Australia's most cherished sporting cup.

It was Matera who tore the Cats to shreds in the second semi, with a sensation 35 possessions.

PUNISHMENT

In 1989 it was star Hawks, Dermott Brereton and winger Robert DiPierdomenico, who were on the end of some of the most brutal physical punishment ever handed out in the opening minutes of a grand final.

The Hawks withstood the buffeting to win the closest grand final of the '80s and one of the classic finals in memory.

Grand finals attract that intense aggression and fierce physical confrontation.

There are no prizes for second. The price that players are willing to pay will be the ultimate.

Tony Jewell, coach of Richmond's 1980 premiership team, once declared that he knew minutes before the game that his team was mentally primed to make the supreme sacrifice for club glory, when he overhead one of his

defenders ask a fellow backmen: "Are you willing to die for us today?"

To a man, his five team-mates are alleged to have replied "YES".

It is said the player who asked the question was Mick Malthouse.

HOLY GRAIL

Malthouse is unbending in his devotion to making history as the first man to lift the Holy Grail of Australian sport from Victoria.

He was a ruthless player and approaches his coaching with the same tunnel-visioned passion.

His tactics and ability to turn the tables from last year's grand final loss will play an enormous part in the Eagles prospects.

The Eagles first priority will be to restrict Geelong's awesome goal-scoring prowess.

JUGGLING ACT

Malthouse faces a juggling act to fit top defender Michael Brennan back into the line-up.

The Eagles vice-captain was forced to miss the second semi win over the Cats, because of a hamstring strain.

But Brennan is likely to replace an unlucky David Hynes.

Billy Brownless, Gary Ablett, Barry Stoneham and rover Robert Scott form the formidable Cats targets up forward.

Ashley McIntosh was an outstanding success on Brownless in the second semi, keeping the high-flying Cat to two goals.

Ablett, should be matched with tough Eagles skipper John Worsfold, while Glen Jakovich shapes as the man for Stoneham.

Scott is sure to again wear a tag from the close-checking Dwayne Lamb.

Geelong's strength lies with their po-

tential to pepper the ball at their bigmarking, long-kicking forwards.

Skipper Mark Bairstow, back to his best with 33 possessions against Footscray, Paul Couch, Scott, Peter Riccardi, Garry Hocking and Michael Mansfield are the midfield playermakers that stand between the Eagles and glory.

West Coast's strengths are more widley spread.

Malthouse employs taggers Don Pyke, Dwayne Lamb, Craig Turley, Chris Waterman and Scott Watters to close down the trump Cats, as Matera and Mainwaring attempt to exert an influence from their wings.

If the Cats have a weakness, it is their defence which Matera and Mainwaring could cut to pieces.

Sumich could then capitalise on a midfield feast with a bag of goals.

The Eagles must decide just who is the best ground support to Sumich.

ALTERNATIVES


Courageous rover Tony Evans, fiery Karl Langdon and Brett Heady have been the best crumbers when the Eagles ace forward fails to hold his marks.

Heady has recovered from injury, though a final decision on whether he is picked could be reserved until the last minute.

In-form Eagles ruckman Paul Harding also faces a big task against Geelong's inspired John Barnes, clearly best-afield against Footscray.

Cats have to stop Suma to win

STOP Peter Sumich and you'll win the AFL premiership ... that's the message in Melbourne as the long-awaited grand final showdown approaches.

Geelong coach Malcolm Blight was so worried by Sumich's eightgoal swag in the second semi-final that he gambled on the form and fitness of full-back discard Tim Darcy in Saturday's preliminary final, hoping he would measure up.

Darcy hadn't played for five weeks after breaking his left arm in a State league (reserves) match.

He had a 10cm plate with seven screws inserted just over a month ago and on Saturday wore a protective bandage over his injured arm, similar to those used this year by Carlton's Peter Dean and Footscray's Michael Mansfield.

After a nervous start, Darcy played some inspired football in Geelong's runaway 11-goal victory.

He held Footscray's leading goalkicker Danny Del'Re to just two goals.

HARD TRAINING

Blight worked a squad of fringe senior players, including Darcy, particularly hard in the lead-up to the preliminary final.

His other two inclusions, Russell Merriman (four goals) and Trevor Poole were also valuable contributors. both having a dozen disposals to retain their spots for Saturday.

Blight is hoping versatile Steve Handley, who injured his shoulder in the second-semi and was unavailable for Saturday's preliminary final, will also return - providing a further defensive option in case Darcy fails.

TWO ON ONE

Whoever is given the full-back's role can expect to receive large doses of assistance with Blight deliberately dropping his No.1 ruckman deep into defence in an attempt to restrict Sumich's influence.

Playing two-against-one is a common tactic all the best full-forwards, including Jason Dunstall and Tony Lockett, have had to combat this season.

Blight will order his assisting ruckman to concentrate on filling a hole on the left side of full forward, thereby forcing Sumich to lead and take most of his set shots from his less-preferred right-hand side of goal.

Key consideration is also being given to Peter Matera's opponent, with 20-year-old Andrew Wills the frontrunner to tag him.

Blight prefers to win games with allout attack, but realises he must restrict the run of the expert Eagle midfielders for the Cats to be truly competitive.

Veteran Neville Bruns may come in for the injured Andrew Bews, while South Australian Andrew Rogers, who started on the interchange on Saturday, is in danger of losing his place to star first-year player Handley.

The Cats have not won a premiership since 1963 and so intent is Blight on keeping the player's attentions focused, that he ordered a media ban on all of his 25-man squad including captain Mark Bairstow.

DANGERMEN

Blight was also unusually non-commital at his media conference after his team's big win against Footscray.

While most Melburnians have installed Geelong as a sentimental favourite for Saturday's play-off, the Eagles are firm flag favourites.

They could start as short as 5/2-on come matchday.

Geelong's major plusses are prolific goalscoring pair Bill Brownless and Gary Ablett, who have kicked 145 goals between them this year.

Brownless has 16 goals in the finals (including 5.6 on Saturday) while Ablett has 13.

While Sumich is potentially the most dangerous forward afield, Eagles coach Mick Malthouse will have to carefully monitor both Brownless and Ablett — and Geelong's other forward line champion Barry Stoneham, who was quiet on Saturday and is unlikely to play two bad ones in a row.


While Geelong have won only two of their last 12 games against the Eagles (including one earlier this year at Subiaco) and has had to qualify for the grand final the hard way, they still have great support.

PREDICTIONS

Brownlow Medallist and Channel 7 commentator Gerard Healy is confidently predicting a boilover.

"Call it intuition, but I believe the Cats will get up," he says.

"After such a great season of football, the finals have fallen flat so far. The last two weekends have lacked a

lot, especially close scoring.

"It would be disappointing if it was a one-sided grand final on Saturday.

THRILLER

"Somehow I feel it's going to be a thriller, making up for the lack-lustre last two weeks.

Fellow Channel 7 commentator Peter McKenna agreed: "On a given day, Geelong can beat anybody.'

Earlier this year the Cats kicked 37 goals and 17 behinds against Brisbane in establishing a record score for the club.

Ablett has shown glimpses of his best form of 1989, Brownless could finish with more than 80 goals for the year, while Stoneham is one of the top five players in the country.

On the East Coast with KEN PIESSE

With so much class in their line-up, it will take a committed West Coast to repeat their great win from secondsemi final day.

BIG ADVANTAGE

A week off is a great advantage at this time of the year.

Teams which win the second-semi final invariably take the flag.

Many critics claim the West Coasters were unlucky not to win in 1991 after clearly being the best team during the home-and-away season.

This year they were struggling at one stage to make the six, but they now have the momentum when it counts.

Their midfielders will burn off their Geelong opponents. Sumich could even break Gary Ablett's grand final goals record of nine.

HIGH-profile Hawk Dermott Brereton is collecting football anecdotes for a humorous football book for 1993.

Here's a sneak preview of one of his favourites, from young Brisbane Bears star Marcus Ashcroft, who says:

"I took this girl I hardly knew out one night with a friend of mine. We had tea and went out afterwards for a while. I was dropping her home pretty early when the jealous boyfriend came around. Before I knew it, he'd put his fist through the passenger side window and as I've gone to take off, I've hit a tree on the way out!

"The police arrested him and charged him. He paid for the damage to the car and so on.

"But the story spread right around the club and Matty Rendell, who has a segment up here (Queensland) on K-Rock, put it over on the radio. Not only did the club know about it, but the whole of the Gold Coast as well!

"I haven't been out with the same girl again. In fact, I haven't got a regular girlfriend. I'm concentrating purely on my footy!"

HOW good are the West Coast Eagles? By WA standards I mean.

Over the past 30 years, WA has produced some outstanding players. But if you were to pick an allstar team over that period, how many of this year's grand final side would make the team?

Starting with the backline, who would you select to fill the back pockets out of these players - Colin Maynard, Dobbie Graham, Tony Nisbett and Mal Atwell? And who would play at full-back - John Watts, Gary Malarkey or Ross Glendinning?

How would you like to have any of these players on your half-back line - Denis Marshall, Brian France, Norm Rogers, Ken McAullay or Ken Bagley.

GREAT CENTRELINE

The centre-line virtually picks itself. You couldn't look past Greg Brehaut and Derek Chadwick for the wings and Ray Sorrell in the centre.

John Todd, despite being on one leg, still managed to make an All-Australian team and could be used on this line or in attack, while Maurice Rioli and Phil Narkle were great performers midfield.

The half-forward line is not so easy to pick.

Don Langdon, (Karl's uncle) only had a short WAFL career because of farming commitments, but was one of the most dazzling forwards to play in Perth.

How would Eagles wingmen Peter Matera and Chris Mainwaring go against Brehaut and Chadwick? Would Brett Heady be able to cope with Marshall?

Eagles IT IS time the WA Football

Commission and the eight WAFL clubs bit the bullet and lifted all restrictions on the qualification of West Coast Eagles players dropping back for WA finals.

After last week's fiasco, which proves the WAFC is no closer to finding the balance between the integration of both levels of senior football, it seems the only way to prevent controversy is to relax the laws completely.

It was ludicrous to have clubs bickering with the Commission in grand final week over who was eligible and who wasn't.

Naturally, we wouldn't want to see a situation where Peter Sumich, John Worsfold, Chris Waterman and Chris Mainwaring dropped back to the WAFL when the Eagles have a bye, but their AFL club would never agree to releasing them anyway.

Michael Brennan and Scott Watters should have been able to play in last week's derby final. That would have been in the interests of the players, their WAFL clubs and the Eagles.

Both were denied the chance to press their selection claims for what could be the biggest day in the lives of the Eagles players this Saturday at the MCG.

It seemed in the middle of last week that Watters' season had been brought to a halt because of bureaucratic red

tape. Not only could Watters not play with South Fremantle, but the decision virtually excluded him from playing at the MCG this week.

Brennan, troubled by hamstring problems, needed the run to test out his legs under pressure and despite a push by the Eagles, he was not allowed to play.

It was in the best interests of all concerned if both had joined their Eagles team-mates - Trent Nichols, Andrew Lockyer and Brendan Krummel (East Fremantle), David Hart, David Hynes, Mark Hepburn and Dean Irving (South Fremantle) - in the grand final.

As fate would have it, Hart broke down in the third quarter and Watters must be on the short list of replacements. While there is no room for sentiment at this level of football, it would be great to see him get an opportunity.

His season does not deserve to end the way it's heading.

He has simply lost form at the wrong end of the season. Had he struggled to find touch earlier in the year, he would have had the chance to play with the Bulldogs and build on his confidence.

Brennan and Brett Heady will be

favoured to replace Hynes and Hart, if neither is fit to play.

The Eagles have a great opportunity to create a special piece of history and they have what it takes to achieve their goal.

The loss of Hart means the Eagles are down a tagger and that's why Watters has strong claims. But, if they elect to overlook Watters, then it could be a good move to cast Chris Lewis in a negating role.

Every week he is harassed by players who don't worry too much about getting kicks themselves and the boot could be thrown on the other foot.

Lewis could shadow one of the Cats prime movers and he could perform the task admirably. All season his form has been a contentious issue, but he relishes a challenge and handing him a defensive role could give him the opportunity to remind football fans around the country of his special talents.

It will be a big day for WA football and, hopefully, the pain of last year's defeat will remind the players of just how much it hurts to be beaten on that last Saturday in September.

Solin the new boy at Subi

NEW Subiaco coach Tony Solin had to introduce himself to every Lions player when he met his new charges at Subiaco Oval on Tuesday afternoon.

Solin won the Lions top job ahead of an impressive lost of interstate and local candidates.

He admitted he had never even met any of the current Subiaco players.

Solin (35) replaces the legendary Haydn Bunton at Subiaco - giving him an involvement with his fifth WAFL club.

The appointment of the former rugged Swan Districts and East Fremantle player - who actually started with South Fremantle - is of major concern to East Perth officials.

WORK COMMITMENTS

Solin served as assistant coach to Stan Magro this season — but Magro has expressed doubts about his ability to continue through work commitments.

Solin was the obvious candidate to replace Magro - which prompted the Lions to act quickly.

The new Lions coach believes that being a newcomer to the players will be an advantage in his endeavours to build a powerful WAFL combination.

A member of Swan Districts 1982, '83 and '84 premiership combinations, Solin won his appointment on the campaign of a fresh approach at Subiaco.

It was widely perceived among Lions officials that, as great as Bunton was, it was time for a new direction.

EXPERIENCE

With almost a decade of experience under Todd and a close affinity to long time friend, former teammate and current Claremont coach Gerard Neesham, Solin offers that re-direction.

But while the new Lions coach admits he needs a classy rover and a key position player, says he will not be making sweeping changes at Subiaco.

He says a week in Melbourne for the AFL grand final will be timely to give him room to think and plan his attack from October 1, the date he will assume his full-time post.

"It's early days and I haven't met anybody yet. But I don't anticipate any big changes in personnel," he said.

DIFFERENT STYLE

"But I do believe Subiaco can adopt a different style of game.

"You don't have to be an Einstein to work out that Subi have been pretty indirect in recent times.

"I'd like to think I can change that."

Solin says he has developed his own style of coaching in four years with Upper Great Southern club Boddington, who he took Boddington to three premierships before last Sunday's grand final loss to Kukerin.

But he admits there will be evidence of the influence of Todd, Neesham and Magro.

"There'll be a portion of each of those guys, but basically I'm my own person," he said.

"I've learnt a lot from those sort of guys, but along the way I have disagreed with a lot of things they've done. It's all part of learning I guess."

Solin said he never intentionally set out to become a league coach.

LEAGUE AMBITION

But two years into his stint with Boddington, he realised a deeper ambition to try his hand at the higher level.

He takes the Lions on at the end of the club's most successful era.

His assignment probably isn't the toughest currently confronting the eight WAFL clubs - but it's a hard act to follow.

Bunton took the Lions to five grand finals in the last eight years.



Handball is another area where both clubs are weak - Gary Hocking is at No. 16 with 223, followed by Paul Couch on 189. The Eagles best, at No. 35, is the efficient Dean Kemp with 162.

The goal-kickers tell an interesting story.

Peter Sumich and Bill Brownless have, remarkably, both kicked 76.45, but Sumich has played only 18 games, while Brownless has played all 23 - giving Sumich a better average.

Gary Ablett is seventh, with 69 goals at an average of 3.5 from 20 games.

Bairstow, Mainwaring, Hinkley and Kemp are all in the top 16 ball-getters combined kicks and handpasses.

The prolific Cats skipper is sixth with 582 touches, Mainwaring is 11th with 537, Hinkley is 13th with 530 and Kemp is 16th with 523 posessions.

The Eagles should hold ascendancy in the ruck, where Paul Harding is eighth on the list of hit-outs with 244, while Geelong's in-form John Barnes is 12th with 153.

The next best for both clubs in the ruck are Steven Handley (13th), a doubtful starter with 133 and Glen Jakovich (30th) on 67.


The Eagles are clearly the best when it comes to tackling - with six players in the top 35 to Geelong's one.

Dean Kemp (fifth) has laid 68 tackles, Peter Matera (seventh) has 63, Karl Langdon (ninth) has 55, Chris Lewis (11th) has 53, John Worsfold (43) and Chris Mainwaring (42).

Geelong's only representative in the top 35 is Robert Scott, at No. 23 with 46 tackles.

EAGLES FAN . . . former Geelong player Bryan Cousins fancies West Coast

Eagles can do it says former Cat

THE West Coast Eagles are set to create Australian football history.

That's the forthright opinion of former Geelong and Perth champion rover Bryan Cousins.

Cousins, who played 72 league games with the Cats between 1975 and 1979, is convinced the lessons West Coast players and coaching staff learned last year, will be the difference in Saturday's grand final.

History is on the Eagles side against his old team, according to Cousins.

DISAPPOINTMENT

Last year's loss continues the AFL and WAFL trend of clubs suffering the disappointment of losing grand finals before winning the coveted title.

"If a club like the Eagles wants to experience the achievement of winning an AFL flag, the greatest sporting prize in Australian sport, it seems logical for them to go through the emotion of losing first," Cousins.

"Famous clubs like Hawthorn had to wait 36 years before winning the VFL flag a first time.

"The Eagles are primed to achieve it

in just six years. It's a credit to the club and the management."

Cousins says this week's shot at history dates back to some of the club's initial pioneers, including the much criticised John Todd.

Some of the tough decisions made by Todd during his two seasons at the helm helped forge the strong character among today's West Coast players.

"Todd had a significant impact on the Eagles to make a better football environment for Mick Malthouse," Cousins said.

"When Toddy sacked six or eight players, he was crucified by the press.

"But the character make-up of the Eagles now is superb."

Cousins believes that an intolerable impatience toward failure has been a major facet in Geelong's three-decade wait for another premiership, since winning their last in 1963.

In the late 1970s and early '80s the Cats made hasty decisions on coaches,

interrupting the process of building a premiership side.

Cousins joined the Cats in the final year of the great Graham (Polly) Farmer's three-year coaching stint at Geelong.

He recalls that Farmer, one of the greatest players of all time, did not have complete support of the Geelong committee.

Cousins returned to WA in 1980 to resume his career at Perth and went on to play 312 league games

But he kept a close eye on the happenings of his VFL club.

"Geelong's impatience for success has cost the club dearly," Cousins said.

"Rod Olsson (formerly of Hawthorn) took over from Polly and lasted three years, before Goggin, who also was dropped after taking the club to two preliminary finals in three years.

"They don't tolerate getting close down there at Geelong," he said.

PETER Featherby, who played 93 games with Geelong, is in two minds who to support in Saturday's AFL grand final.

A combined total of just 11 points prevented the 332-game WAFL and AFL star playing in a VFL grand final.

The Cats lost the 1980 preliminary final by four points and the following year by seven — both to Collingwood.

But Featherby, now living in Busselton, says a Cats loss on Saturday would not compare to the bitter disappointment of losing those two preliminary

The Subiaco 1973 premiership player retains close links with former teammates and current Eagles stars Dwayne Lamb and Karl Langdon and West Coast team-manager Trevor Nisbett.

Lamb and a young Langdon were team-mates and Nisbett the Lions football manager when Featherby played a leading role in Subiaco's 1986 premiership win under Haydn Bunton.

"Naturally I'll have a strong leaning Geelong's way on Saturday, but none of the players I teamed with are still there," Featherby said this week.

GOOD PEOPLE

"I'd like the Cats to win because of the type of place Geelong is; the good times I had in the town.

"The players have changed, but every time I see Geelong on television, I notice the trainers, the boot studder, the property men are all still there.

"It's people like that, who support a club through everything, that deserve the success.

"They do all the work and the players, that come and go, have all the fun."

Featherby admits the disappointment of his two grand final near-misses haunt his football memories.

Selection and management bungles played a big hand in Geelong missing both title play-offs.

In 1980, the Cats opted to leave out talented big man Sam Newman and were sadly undermanned for marking power up forward.

The next year, former WA ruckmanforward Garry Sidebottom wasn't told he was a starter and missed the team bus from Geelong.

REGRETS

"To this day, losing those two preliminary finals are my biggest regrets in football," Featherby said.

"I still brood over those days; to have got so close to a grand final and never to have played on the big

Featherby says Geelong fans are fanatical toward their local heroes, but not as parochial as Collingwood's black and white army of supporters.

"It's a bit like what I'd imagine the Eagles get in Perth," he declares.

"Everybody around the town knows who the players are and they feel something special for them and the team.

"They are fanatical and there sure was a different atmosphere around the town when we lost those finals; they were down in the dumps for weeks."

Featherby said he would have no hesitation recommending the Cats, his second VFL club, to any young player who was drafted by them.

Featherby played 42 games at Footscray, from 1975-79 before to Geelong.

"It's just such a great environment, great town and great club," he said.

"If I had my time over again, I wouldn't hesitate to go to Geelong."





Wiley's words keep

EVERY footballer dreads the sight of the team runner heading in his direction.

The message generally is obvious ... the coach is not happy.

But in the case of Eagles runner Rob Wiley, there is something special about the messenger — and it's not just the estimated 22kms he covers each match.

Players never like to cop a blast from the coach, via the runner, but coming from one of the great rovers of the modern era, it is delivered with a touch the Eagles accept.

As Eagles vice-captain Michael Brennan puts it: "Rob's been there and done that. We know he knows what we are going through in the frenzy of a match."

Brennan declares that Wiley's greatest influence is in the hours around match days.

EXPERIENCE

"Apart from being a good bloke, he has excellent communication levels and players accept what he says because of his experience at such a high level over a long period," Brennan said.

Wiley has been handed some tough behind-the-scenes tasks for West Coast in this year's bid to reverse last September's grand final result.

He has attempted to solve full-forward Peter Sumich's poor goal-kicking conversion rate; tried to teach outstanding rookie Glen Jakovich to concentrate for a full 120 minutes; to keep ruckman Paul Harding injury-free and pass on his special roving talents to on-ball players Tony Evans, Don Pyke and Scott Watters.

Wiley, elevated from team runner to assistant-coach this year, gives the Eagles a special weapon as they go into Saturday's AFL grand final showdown with Geelong.

A veteran of almost 300 league games with Perth, Richmond and the Eagles, the former AFL and dual WAFL premiership player is classed as the team's unofficial 21st man.

He makes no bones of his importance to the team: as Malthouse's voice to the players during a match.

Eagles players place great value on Wiley's contributions on match days and around the club, acknowledging his experience and deep respect within the camp.

"Having just recently been a player and a coach is an advantage in the role I play," Wiley said this week.

SYMPATHETIC

"A lot of times the players know full well they've made a mistake. But it has to be emphasised by the coach and his only means of communication once the game has started is through his runner.

"As a former player and coach, it helps if I can be sympathetic in most circumstances, yet at the same time still get the coach's message across."

But how does he tackle the task of solving football's most talked-about problem — Sumich's inconsistent goal-kicking?

"It was generally perceived that Suma's problems were in his run-up; he wasn't approaching the goal directly," Wiley said.

"It's to Peter's credit that he's worked hard at trying to improve that and I think the results are there.

"The goals he has missed this year have, in the main, been near-misses. Last year he was mis-firing by a long way."

Wiley also spends plenty of time firing up big man Harding to sustain his challenge against the toughest opponents the game offers.

Wiley will often be seen running alongside the No.1 ruckman barking instructions and encouragement, just like his roving days at the heels of Wim Rosbender (at Perth in the late 1970s), Mark Lee (at Richmond) and Alex Ishchenko at West Coast in 1987.

Rookie big man Glen Jakovich has also been an Eagles prodigy benefiting from the Wiley's wisdom.

"I've given Jako a few big sprays," Wiley admitted.

"Jako has been one to drift away from the task at hand from time to time and it's my job to hammer home the importance of concentrating on an opponent.

"Michael (Malthouse) has trusted me with a bit of latitude in what I do on the ground too, which helps how we operate and generally benefits the side.

"If I'm on the ground and see something happening or there is the need for change, I have the scope to do that. I then check with Michael as soon as I can and we discuss it.

"It's worked pretty well and it means we can generally be a step ahead of things."

What the papers say

THE Eagles will go into the AFL grand final as favourites — with the bookies that is — not the Melbourne media or public.

Both Melbourne's Sunday papers, The Age and the Herald-Sun, ran front page stories proclaiming Geelong as the saviours of Victorian football.

Under the headline "Finally, Geelong becomes a city of hope, not despair' the Sunday Age said:

"Geelong, long regarded as the sleepy hollow of Victorian football and more recently the epicentre of our economic woes, is suddenly shouldering the State's grand final hopes. After downing Footscray in yesterday's preliminary final, the Cats are Victoria's last chance to stop the AFL Premiership Cup going west."

The Herald-Sun was equally parochial, saying

the Cats carry the hopes of all Victoria when they meet the West Coast Eagles.

NOT THE CUP!

The Sunday Age's sport supplement ran a picture of a Karl Langdon look-a-like holding the premiership cup out of the Eagles team bus as they headed west. The caption read: "They can have the Sheffield Shield and the NBL championship — But please, not our cup!

"Geelong, long regarded the sleepy hollow of Victian football and more cently the epicentre of backed Geelong.

After Geelong beat Footscray in the preliminary final, Bulldogs coach Terry Wheeler openly backed Geelong.

Tim Watson was one of few Melburnians game enough to support the better balanced Eagles, saying: "The flag is now set to fly in the west."

Hawkins said: "I hope the cup stays in Melbourne. I hope they (Geelong) do a great job."

But the critics thinking with their heads — not their hearts — have selected the Eagles.

Mike Sheahan (16 points), Rohan Connolly (24 points), Richard Hinds (20 points) and Gerard Healy (comfortably) picked the Eagles, while only Gerard Wright (13 points) went for Geelong.

The final educated word on the feeling in Melbourne belongs to the Age's chief football writer Rohan Connolly.

STEPHEN Nash is in hostile territory this week, but the Eagles Melbourne manager loves every minute of it.

Based in the club's office in the heart of the MCG's Great Southern Stand, Nash is one of the few Victorians hoping for an Eagles win — along with general manager Brian Cook and coach Mick Malthouse.

While his phone has been running hot with ticket and training inquiries, Nash wouldn't have it any other way.

"I'll spend the week taking a million phone-calls and making sure everything is right for the boys at the Hilton Hotel," said Nash. Nash says the mood in Melbourne is low-key on the eve of football's biggest

HYPE IS MISSING

"A bit of the hype is missing, that's for sure," he said.

"Because Geelong is where it is and we're in Perth, there's no direct involvement from Melbourne's point of view."

Nash said he was amazed at the Victorian public's reaction to Geelong's playerimposed media ban.

"Everyone has come out in favour of it over here saying what a great idea it is. Last year everyone said it was a disgrace when we did it. Now they're saying isn't it great?"

On the previous 46 occasions, one team has beaten the same opponent twice in 26 years, with the result being reversed 20 times.

Since the introduction of the final five. in 1972, 11 out of 21 finals re-matches have been won by the team which had won the earlier game between the two clubs.

BEFORE last Saturday's Geelong-Footscray clash — a re-match of the qualifying final, which Geelong won by 61 points — there had been only four instances of a team beating the same team twice in a finals series by a combined margin of over 100 points.

The record aggregate margin in two games in one finals series was 118 points — by Essendon over Hawthorn in the 1985 second semi-final (40 points) and grand final (78 points).

On Saturday, Geelong became the first team to beat another team twice by over 10 goals in the one finals series.

to continue finals trend

THE Eagles will be hoping to maintain the record of teams which make the grand final after claiming places in the previous seasons.

The Eagles are the seventh team to win a grand final berth after finishing third and then second.

Of the previous six teams, five won the premiership, the last being Hawthorn in 1976.

The Hawks lost both the 1974 preliminary final and 1975 grand final to North Melbourne, before turning the tables on the Roos in the 1976 final.

The only team to lose a preliminary final and then two consecutive grand finals is Collingwood. The Magpies lost the 1978 preliminary to North Melbourne then the 1979 and 1980 grand finals to Carlton and Richmond.

FOR the sixth consecutive year, the premiers this year will be a team which lost its opening game of the season.

Geelong lost to Hawthorn at Waverley by 20 points in Round one and the Eagles went down by three points to Sydney in Round two.

Geelong are seeking to become the first team since Footscray in 1954 to win the flag after losing their opening two games of the season.

SINCE the McIntyre finals system was introduced in 1931, the winners of the second semi-final have won 40 of the 61 premierships.



"It will be unusual watching on for two grand finals in two weeks," he said on Saturday, at Subiaco Oval.







EAST Fremantle premiership coach Ken Judge has wasted no time setting his sights at another flag in 1993.

Judge, the first home-grown East Fremantle coach to win the title since Jerry Dolan in 1946, says the toughest aspect to emerge from Saturday's victory will be repeating the effort next year.

"I knew though, that we would have to put everything together for an entire game. We didn't do that in any of the four derbies before last Saturday."





Bulldogs coach Malcolm Brown traded information on Newman's whereabouts to Judge in return for Derecourt's release a week into the home-and-away matches for the season.





DUAL East Fremantle premiership player Clinton Browning couldn't believe he had won the Simpson Medal as best-afield in Saturday's grand final victory over arch rivals South Fremantle.

A veteran of 209 league games with the Sharks, Browning was one of the surprise packets in East Fremantle's stirring victory.

He surprisingly lined up at full-back, where he totally eclipsed dangerous Bulldogs full-forward Craig Edwards.

Browning (30) believed that any one of a host of good Sharks players on the day could have collected the coveted individual award.

Captain Steve Malaxos and ruckman Ian Newman were singled out by their former captain as worthy medal recipients.

"I couldn't believe I'd won it,"
Browning said after the match.

"But I was always confident we could win; we didn't do anything spectacular; just stuck to the tasks that had been set for us.

"I didn't have a lot of kicks. I was one of many guys who just did their job. I set myself to keep Craig goal-less and I was pretty satisfied with that."

It was more than a decade of devoted service to East Fremantle — plus the incentive of the special "Edwards assignment" — that influenced coach Ken Judge to give Browning his chance on Saturday.

Browning had battled a late season loss of form and was a doubtful starter after a disappointing effort against East Perth in the preliminary final.

But at 6.30 on Friday night, Judge gave Browning the news he needed to hear — ending a long and anxious week.

Browning joined big Andrew Lockyer as the only survivors of East Fremantle's 1985 premiership side — and he emerged a clear winner, justifying Judge's faith.

Now Browning says he is looking forward to a shot at historic successive premiership wins next year.

"I know it's a bit early, but it's sure tempting to keep going and try for back-to-back flags," he said, dismissing talk of retirement.

Fitness plays its part

THE day that Ken Judge was unexpectedly thrust into the East Fremantle coaching job early in the 1991 season, a succession of changes occurred at the Moss Street headquarters.

Now, some 18 months down the track, the achievement of a premiership has made all that drama and crisis seem worthwhile.

Judge took over from a shattered coach in Ron Wilcox; president Hans Beyer resigned, leaving the tough top job to Len Hitchen, one of the board members and later in the year, Rod Lester-Smith was to return to the fold and take up the football manager's role in place of Clinton Pike.

Many other changes took place, especially within the football responsibilities and the foundation for revival was structured under a tough task-master in Judge.

Included in those early decisions was the recruiting of physical fitness expert Merv White, an experienced football person who had worked successfully with coaches like Mal Brown and John Todd.

A typical behind-the-scenes man, White pulls no punches when he talks about fitness — or the lack of it — among today's footballers.

"It was obvious back in May, 1991 that the East Fremantle players simply weren't fit — physically or mentally," said White, as he enjoyed Saturday's victory celebrations.

"It really was a question of making them believe how much work the body could do.

"We started training for this season on November 4 last year — three times a week. They are obviously fitter in a physical sense, but the big difference is their mental attitude; we made them realise that they could push themselves harder and it was that sense of discipline we instilled into them; helping push them harder and further."

Davidson worked on

IT TOOK a pain-staking week of preparation — mixed with normal work duties — for Peter Davidson to be fit enough to play in East Fremantle's premiership side.

The 29-year-old pulled up sore from the preliminary final, suffering a hamstring strain and a broken little finger on his left hand.

But he wasn't going to miss the chance of a premiership medallion — especially playing alongside his younger brother (by five years) Jeff, which had been a long-held ambition.

So he mixed work with rehabilitation, wearing a special battery-operated thigh pad that helped treat his hamstring strain as he went about his business driving for Courier Australia, a firm run by the Morgan family of East Fremantle fame,

"I was lucky that I could actually receive treatment on my leg as I worked; I was determined to come up okay," said Davidson, whose 10-year-battle with thigh injuries has affected him virtually every season since his graduation from Collie to Claremont in 1983.

His career spread to the inaugural West Coast Eagles team and then the Brisbane Bears without tasting a suc-

his fitness

cessful grand final, so Saturday's match was a priority for Davidson to be fit for.

So what happens next season for the injury-plagued Davidson?

"I'll see how I pull up," he said. "I just can't seem to put a string of games together. Every time I get fit and feel good, something else goes wrong. But I'll see how I feel over summer."


The Davidson double at East Fremantle produced a brilliant result for father John, a stalwart of South West football and a former president of the Collie Football Club.

Davidson was originally a Swan Districts supporter, but when Peter first went to Claremont — opting to join cousin Allen Daniels in the Tigers den — he switched allegiances. Then when Jeff took up an East Fremantle invitation, another change of loyalty was required.

For a man who travels up weekly from Collie to see his sons play, Saturday was a weekend well worth the journey.

THE jubilation of a premiership victory is something special — no matter whether you are a rookie or a veteran.

There were few East Fremantle people more excited about the Sharks flag than Steve Malaxos, their newly-adopted captain and a man who has experienced the joys before.

It was back in 1981 when Malaxos kicked five goals for Claremont out of a forward pocket and shared in the Tigers premiership victory over South Fremantle.

Eleven years later, South Fremantle were again victim of the Malaxos determination as the man who switched unexpectedly from Claremont midway through last season was suddenly leading his new club from the front-line.

"I've certainly enjoyed the move to East Fremantle, though I've been a bit frustrated with injuries. But this victory makes up for all that."

Grand final sidelights

QUESTION marks about the nervousness of South Fremantle's young players going into the grand final was never more evident than in the opening quarter.

When 18-year-old rookie of just 11 games, Russell Williams, lined up from 15-metres out dead in front, even hard-ened Bulldogs fan George Grljusich spelt out the danger warnings on 6WF.

The shot came from a free kick, but Williams sprayed it so wide it almost went out of bounds!

But nerves aren't just restricted to rookies. Veteran East Fremantle and Eagles player Andrew Lockyer missed an easy shot from about 20-metres in front a few minutes later.

THERE was a sad touch of irony for the Bulldogs in the third quarter.

After a week of controversy over the eligibility of South Fremantle pair David Hart and David Hynes, the two men played only minor roles in the grand final.

Hart was unfortunately stretchered off in the third term with a bad groin strain, while Hynes was limping around on one leg.

There was plenty of courage in the Bulldogs camp at that time, with Jason Spinks out of action with a broken jaw, Paul Mazurek on one leg and a couple of others looking the worse for wear.

IT'S frustrating being a coach, that's for sure — and South Fremantle mentor Mal Brown must have been shaking his head in the crucial final term as full-back Wayne Hernaman twice kicked out to the wrong side.

With the wind coming over the scoreboard and blowing right into the threetier grandstand, the last place a ball should have been kicked was out on that flank; the boundary line in front of the two-tier stand was the place to bog play down.

Both times Hernaman's kicked was claimed by Sharks players, the second of which resulted in an immediate goal.

THERE was plenty of mutual admiration when East Fremantle coaches Ken Judge and Ross Keegan enjoyed premiership moments at Subiaco Oval on Saturday.

Keegan was in charge of the Sharks colts side that upset odds-on favourites Claremont in the morning, while Judge followed suit in the afternoon, reigning triumphant as the Pepsi Cup league underdogs.

This is Keegan's third stint as a minor grade coach at East Fremantle and back in 1974 it was the developing coach who gave a curly-headed youngster from Palmyra a game in the under-19s... Ken Judge was his name — and he was headed for the top.

Keegan coached the Old Easts fourths side in 1972, the thirds in '73 and '74, returned to the colts in '78 and was back again this year for the colts.

Caton, who represented WA in Adelaide in May, kicked 48.35 in a season, which was indifferent by his standards.

pick.





Candidates for the two forward pocket positions are easy to find with an abundance of small, goalkicking players.





Players in an emotional mood

EAGLES coach Mick Malthouse took the unusual step of calling on four players to motivate his squad before training last Monday night.

The theme: "The importance of winning a grand final."

Veteran full-back Michael Brennan, classy half-back Guy McKenna and rovers Don Pyke and Tony Evans all gave emotional appraisals of their own grand final experiences.

The Eagles take a host of finals experience into Saturday's premiership showdown with Geelong.

West Coast coach Mick Malthouse concedes that his combination is more experienced than the Cats, when it comes to finals.

Since taking the Eagles reins for the start of 1990, the Eagles have made an impressive 10 finals appearances.

Malthouse has also had the wood over his coaching adversary, Malcolm Blight, in the past three seasons.

In eight head-to-head contests against Geelong under Malthouse, the Eagles have won seven.

The only Eagles loss in three years under Malthouse, was in Round Four on April 12, when the Cats - inspired by Gary Ablett - inflicted a 24point loss on West Coast at Subiaco Oval.

The overall record between the clubs is also stacked heavily in the Eagles favour. In 13 meetings, the Eagles have won 10 times since their first confrontation on June 13 1987, when the Cats won at Kardinia Park.

"I think we go in probably with more experience than anyone, in terms of finals football, which is surprising in a lot of respects," Malthouse said this week.

"Geelong are going to be in the same boat as we are. Obviously you try to get the element of surprise.

"Geelong may throw their side around and we've got to be ready for that.

"Our players have got to have in their minds that on the day they may have different tasks to do.

"We've got to be prepared for all eventualities," the coach said.





Sharks open with upset win

EAST Fremantle started off a day of upsets when they beat minor premiers Claremont by 40 points in the grand final of the Pepsi colts competition.

Captain Nathan Ahern celebrated his 50th colts game with a fine display in the centre.

One of the highlights of the match was the epic ruck duel between Shark Craig Doyle and Tiger Leigh Kirk. Doyle, who won the clash on points, played a significant role in East Fremantle's victory.

Claremont's better players were Matthew Gauci, Tim Johnston, at fullforward and aggressive All-Australian defender Daniel Southern.

Richard Hughes was another who tried hard, but found that the vital support from other team members was lacking.

After the match an ecstatic East Fremantle coach Ross Keegan said he understood how Claremont coach Larry Kickett and his players felt — but there could only be one winner on the day.

"This is fantastic," Keegan said. "I thought we would win, but certainly not by that much."

Keegan returned to the club this season after previously coaching the colts in 1973-74, the fourths in 1972 and the colts again in 1978.

Claremont had no excuses after the game; they were simply beaten by a better side on the day.

"They beat us at our own game," Tigers team manager Kevin Xanthis said. "They outplayed us in most areas and ran much harder than we did.

"Larry was still proud of the boys after the game, congratulating them on finishing ahead of six other teams and reminding them that this was all part of the learning curve that came with playing colts," Xanthis said.

SOUTH Fremantle won the first WAFL grand final to be forced into extra time when they beat Claremont by six points in the Pepsi reserves contest on Saturday.

After four quarters of football, the minor premiers and the Tigers were tied together at 13.12 (90) and 10 minutes of extra time was needed to determine the grand final.

The Bulldogs scored three goals to Claremont's two, giving them a victory which had seemed unlikely early in the match — and certainly in time-on as they trailed by a goal.

Claremont, with first use of the strong breeze, went to an early lead, 25 points up at quarter-time. With former Souths player Paul Morgan providing a reliable avenue to goal, Claremont looked capable of running away with the game.

A late goal by Souths forward Derreck Woods levelled the score and when the siren went, officials had to scurry to the middle of the ground and give the field umpires instructions about five minutes extra time either way.

"One of our officials handed me a fax earlier in the week which outlined the procedure if the game was drawn," Vasoli said after the thriller. "I took one look at it and said we won't be needing this — and threw it in the bin."



coach Ross Ditchburn produced a spectacular seven-goal effort to help clinch the Upper Great Southern grand final.

Ditchburn combined superbly with another former Claremont star, centreman Tom Pearce, to destroy reigning three-time premiers Boddington at Narrogin on Sunday.

Kukerin, undefeated until the second semi-final, romped home in the second half to win by 44 points, 14.6 (90) to 5.16 (46).

Boddington, favourites to take their fourth consecutive flag, were completely outclassed after half-time, when they failed to kick a goal.

SPECTACULAR

Boddington, easy victors in the second semi-final, started badly when they managed just 1.6 in the first term with a handy three-goal wind.

Kukerin posted two goals and turned at quarter-time one point in front.

But Boddington, with Claremont

Kukerin sealed the win with a brilliant five-goal third term against the breeze. Pearce continued to dominate, driving Kukerin into attack where Ross Ditchburn continued in great style.

Boddington — apart from Neesham - were blitzed and managed just 0.1 at what was thought to be the scoring end, to trail by 27 points at the final change.

They were in disarray in the final term, as Kukerin added 4.2 while they peppered the goals for 0.9 in a wasteful effort.

Harvey win historic HARVEY-Brunswick-Leschenault pennant created history on Sunday when they beat Boyanup-Capel-Dardanup by 21 points in the South West National Football League grand final.

The 17.7 (109) to 12.16 (88) win gave the Lions their third successive SWNFL premiership — the first team to do so since the league was founded.

The win also gave Harvey-Brunswick-Leshenault coach Terry House special reason to smile.

He is the first coach to win two backto-back pennants and the only man to coach four successul premiership teams.



PRESSURE


Mt Lawley turned on the pressure from the start of the second term when Victor Lowe kicked their first goal in the opening 30 seconds.


