## Voice from wilderness

THERE have been plenty of people prepared to voice their opinions about the expansion of the WAFL — and the size of the protest is quite varied.

From the depths of the Great South comes a letter of objection from the Jerramungup Football Club — along with a couple of interesting suggestions.

Jerra, one of the traditions of the Great South region and reigning premiers in the Ongerup League, object to the introduction of two country teams to the WAFL on the grounds that it would not only weaken the eight current clubs, but also destroy country leagues.

As a compromise, they suggest the WAFL club be restructured to include country-based leagues and/or relocate existing WAFL clubs to country areas.

The Jerra boys also suggest that the second AFL team (based at Fremantle) should be a priority in terms of rationalising the current WAFL competition.

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## S-W team boost

THE prospects of a South West side joining the WAFL in 1994 moved closer to reality when Harvey-Brunswick-Leschenault directors gave the proposal the thumbs up.

The reigning SWNFL premiers have moved from a 'No' vote to a 'Yes' stand in the League's bid to field a combined South West side in the WAFL.

Their change-of-mind came about after clarification of a number of points in the SWNFL submission, especially concerning the control of the licence to be issued by the WAFL.

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## High price on Clarkson

PERTH Football Club officials will place a \$15,000 price tag on the services of classy defender John Clarkson.

Clarkson, a State player against South Australia in Adelaide this year, has held talks with Swan Districts.

The Demons are expected to insist that the classy left-footer fetch top dollars under the WAFL scheme of rating players.

As a State player and a leading vote getter in club awards and the Sandover Medal, Clarkson should attract a price tag of between \$10,000 and \$15,000.

A veteran of 85 senior games at Perth, the 23-year-old Clarkson was the Demons leading vote getter in this year's Sandover Medal.

In just 12 appearances, restricted by groin and leg injuries, he polled 22 votes — 10 less than winner Robbie West, who played in 19 games.

Clarkson is not contracted to the Demons and refuses to sign a new agreement.

Demons general-manager Trevor Riley says his club will endeavour to retain Clarkson; but he was aware of his negotiations with Swans.

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## Dean's comeback?

DON'T be surprised to see former Subiaco and Melbourne player Warren Dean back with the Lions next season.

Dean, a member of Subiaco's 1986 premiership team before heading to Melbourne, has successfully completed a comeback after suffering an horrendous run of knee injuries over the past three years.

He played last season with Quairading, in the Avon Association and at 28 years of age is keen for one last shot at league football.

## New faces at Lions

NEW Subiaco coach Tony Solin has wasted no time attracting the right personnel to his new club.

The Lions have already confirmed that former All-Australian and dual premiership player Andrew Macnish will return to Perth after spending the second half of the 1992 season with Geelong, in the AFL.

Another boost for Subiaco's hopes of resurgence in 1993 is news that former star ruckman Laurie Keene is anxious to play again.

Keene, an original West Coast squad member, has been plagued with a heel injury over the past three years and is expected to be dropped off the Eagles list next week.

But he remains confident of being able to play again some time next year and his return would offset the retirement of veteran big man Phil Scott.

The Lions, however, failed to negotiate the return of talented all-rounder Todd Broman, with the former goal-kicking star staying at Richmond for 1993.

Solin has also been busy recruiting his off-field support staff.

He has enlisted the services of his former Swan Districts premiership team-mate Jon Fogarty as chairman of selectors and highly respected physical fitness advisor Steve Smith.

Smith co-ordinated South Fremantle's fitness programme last season under Mal Brown, but has accepted a lucrative deal to move to the Lions den with Solin.

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## Richo could switch

VETERAN follower Steve Richardson could be headed back to his original club Swan Districts.

Richardson, twin brother of current Swans star Mike, has spent the past three seasons at East Perth.

However, in the twilight of a career that covers Swans, Essendon, Brisbane and Norwood (in the SANFL), Richardson is pondering the prospect of finishing up at Bassendean, where he started playing in 1983.

Richardson battled injury in 1992 to put together 10 league games with East Perth, taking his tally with the Royals to 41.

## Swans pair tipped

EXPERIENCED Swan Districts pair Danny Penny and Michael Broadbridge could be surprise selections in next week's national draft.

Penny and Broadbridge have attracted interest from numerous AFL talent scouts.

Subiaco utility player Jamie Billington, the centre of controversy last March when Essendon dropped him from their list after being drafted in November, has also attracted interest from eastern states clubs.

Perth's Scott Spalding is an experienced WAFL player in the sights of several clubs and the younger brother of Carlton key forward Earl has attracted interest from Carlton and Melbourne.

An some shock news for East Perth — their much-vaunted potential big-man star in Leigh Walker could be snapped up in the draft before he even gets the chance to don a Royals league guernsey.

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## O'Sullivan's challenge

WELL-known football recruiting campaigner Shane O'Sullivan hasn't taken long to bounce back from his recent retrenchment from the Brisbane Bears.

He has won the prestigious coaching role at Oakleigh, one of the stronger clubs in the VFA.

O'Sullivan was back at Footscray by the end of the season, filling in as a recruiting officer after a long spell in Brisbane, where he played a leading role in enticing a number of West Aussies to the Gold Coast.

O'Sullivan (40) has a long playing career behind him, starting with Caulfield, in the VFA and then stints in Canberra, Sydney and Brisbane.

He won the coaching job ahead of WA's Brad Hardie — the second time in a month that the highly-decorated former South Fremantle star has finished in the placegetters in a coaching appointment after also missing out at Werribee.



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# Tops with the news

WESTSIDE Football writer Kim Hagdorn has taken out football's top media award, the best news story of the year.

Hagdorn won the Quit-sponsored award with an article about East Fremantle threatening legal action to prevent David Hart and David Hynes from representing South Fremantle in the Pepsi Cup WAFL grand final.

Westside Football also claimed the Football Development Trust's award for outstanding contributions to the coverage of junior football, presented by Board member Geoff Christian.

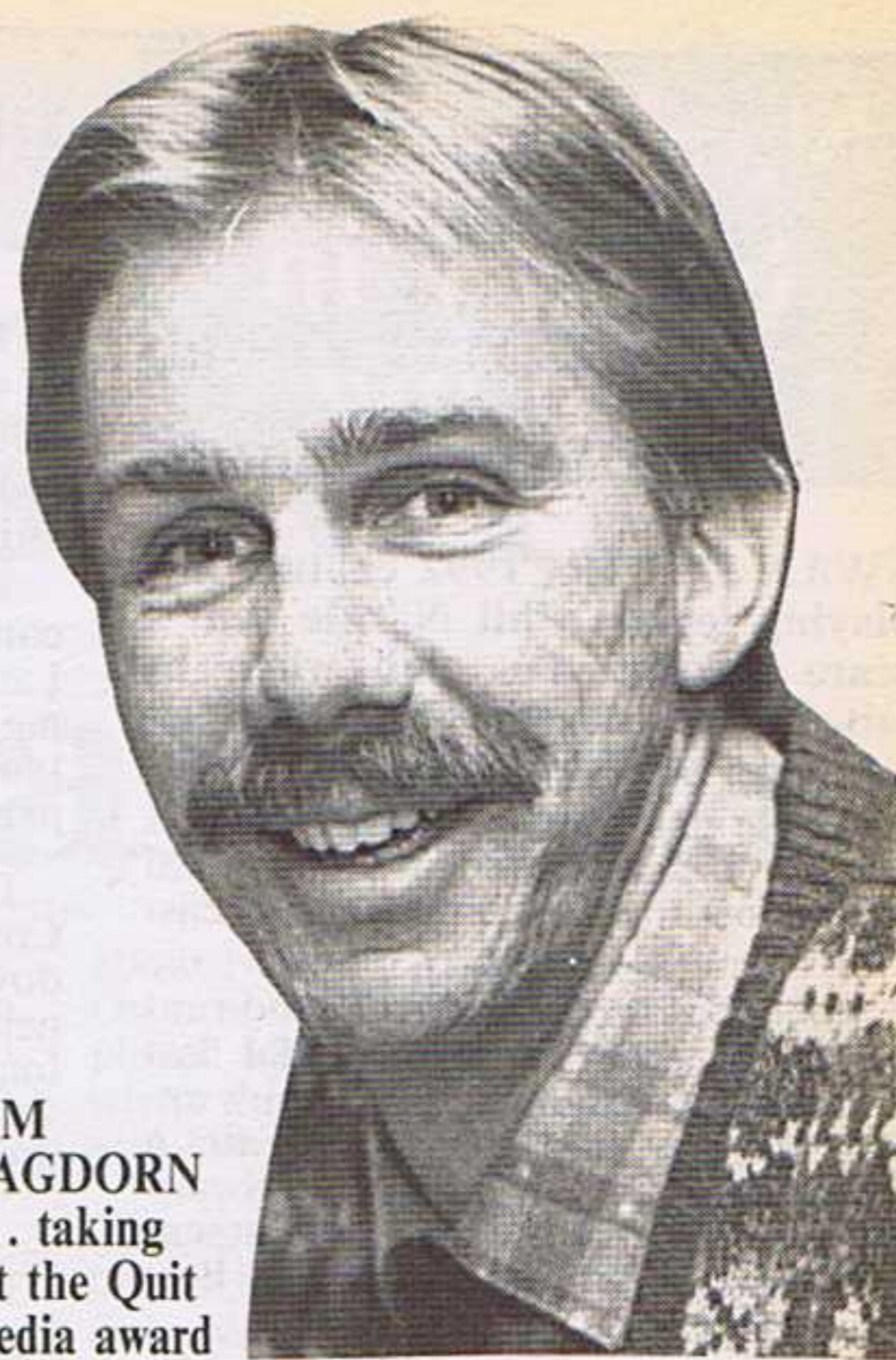

# WAFL games set for Eagles arena

HIGH-profile WAFL matches could be part of an entertainment bonanza at West Coast Eagles Subiaco Oval fixtures next year.

The WA Football Commission looks certain to play WAFL matches as curtain-raisers at Eagles games in Perth.

The concept has been thrashed out among WAFL clubs and only needs a final seal of approval from leading administrators.

An approach to the AFL is expected to request a consistent Eagles start-time for Sunday games in Perth.

In the past, Eagles games have kicked off at times ranging from 11am through to 3pm, depending on television programming on the east coast.

WAFL club officials are concerned that morning starts for the Eagles would be too early for local league players.

A regular Eagles start time of around 1pm is expected to meet the approval of WAFL clubs to combine with the AFL in presenting WA fans with a six-

hour football feast at West Coast's anticipated seven Subiaco Oval home games.

In another fixture restructure for local matches next season, the WAFC looks certain to avoid all clashes with Eagles live telecasts.

Local games will be played on Sundays, rather than Saturdays, when fans will be more intent on watching the Eagles telecast.

A vote last week among WAFL general managers resolved unanimously to avoid conflict with Eagles telecasts.

The WAFC is currently considering double-header WAFL matches and Friday night games at the WACA

Ground to split the fixture load over weekends when the Eagles are televised back to WA on Saturday afternoons.

Final decisions on next year's local fixtures will be made after this week's release of the AFL fixtures for 1993.

That announcement is expected to have ramifications for the Eagles, with expectations of a reduction of the season by at least two matches.

West Coast will have one less home game, a move strongly opposed by the Eagles.

The AFL fixtures for 1993 could leave the WAFC with a real dilemma.

It's expected that seven games will be rostered for Subiaco Oval and only three games at the WACA Ground and under the controversial agreement between football and cricket, the WAFC may have to fulfil the contract by staging extra WAFL matches there.

However, the allocation of an interstate fixture to Perth — as part of a new-look national carnival spread across the three football States — could solve that WACA problem.

## Narkle keen to stay in training

SWAN Districts 1992 captain and playing legend Phil Narkle sent a scare through the club when he failed to attend the annual fairest-and-best count recently.

Narkle has been re-considering his playing future since the black and whites lost the first semi-final to East Perth.

Winner of the Swan Medal and runner-up in the Sandover Medal last year, Narkle also missed the club's annual pay-day and the Swan Fair, a special occasion where senior Swans players fly the club flag at the Bassendean Shire Council's carnival at Bassendean Oval.

His absence, particularly from the fairest-and-best count, fuelled speculation that one of the club's all-time greats was about to retire.

However, Narkle has since declared he will take part in pre-season training up until Christmas before making a final decision.

He said work commitments, where he has been running some live-in camps for Aboriginal children, had forced his absence from the club in recent weeks.

### ENTHUSIASM

Narkle said his enthusiasm for training over the next two months will ultimately decide whether he continues his distinguished league career into a 16th year.

"If I can handle the pace of it all again and I'm enjoying the training, then I'll play again," he said.

"We've got a very young side at Swans and my role is to guide some of the players through the early stages of their careers.

"But to do it as a player will take a lot of physical effort and I have to decide if I really want to do it all again."

Narkle, restricted to just 12 league games in 1992 due to a string of ankle and Achilles heel problems, says he has discussed his position with club president Bill Walker and coach John Todd.

Club officials remain anxious about the future of the veteran of 171 senior WAFL games, 48 with St Kilda and 18 in the formative years with the Eagles and they hope he continue at Bassendean.

# Cash boost helps Falcons to move

WEST Perth have marked the start of work on their new home ground at Joondalup with the signing of one of football's most significant sponsorship deals.

The \$150,000 deal over three years comes from Joondalup city developer LandCorp, a State Government instrumentality, which confirms how important they rate the future development plans for the northern corridor.

David Hatt, the chairman of LandCorp, announced the deal as 1992 Sandover Medallist Robbie West and runner-up Derek Hall helped the Minister for Sport and Recreation, Graham Edwards, to turn the soil on the site for the complex.

### INCENTIVE

LandCorp will sponsor the Falcons for \$50,000 a year, an attractive package that includes an incentive for West Perth to move to Joondalup for the 1994 season.

"A major tenant such as West Perth will raise the profile of the complex and attract investment to Joondalup," Mr Hatt said.

Construction on the \$13 million stage one of the complex will start early next year and is expected to be completed by December.

The complex, which will have football as its major tenant, includes tennis courts, basketball courts, hockey fields, an athletic track, a multi-purpose field, a landscaped recreational area and the football oval with a grandstand capable of seating more than 400 people.

The Falcons are excited with the sponsorship deal and the prospect of being based at the most modern sporting complex in Australia.

"The relocation to the outstanding facilities in Joondalup represents a very exciting phase in the club's long and successful history," Falcons president Tom James said.

## Burton switch opens up new ambitions

THIS time last year Jay Burton was making the biggest decision of his football career — whether to travel east and join AFL club Richmond, or stay put at home?

And now, after a taste of life in the AFL arena in the latter half of the season, the 204cm-tall 20-year-old has set his sights on becoming Richmond's leading ruckman within five years.

Burton is the second son of former Subiaco ruckman and coach Peter Burton to step into the AFL line-up, with brother Matthew drafted by the Eagles in 1990, but yet to play a league game.

And younger brother Travis, a potential star with the Lions, is not far behind them.

Jay Burton, drafted out of colts football as Richmond's 77th pick, spent two weeks under coach Allan Jeans early in the year, before resuming with Subiaco in an effort to get some league experience.

But with brother Matthew and West Coast stalwart Phil Scott leading the Lions ruck, opportunities were scarce.

After talks with his father, who played 180 games for Subiaco, Burton decided to move east mid-season and gain as much experience as possible in the Tigers camp, rather than linger in the reserves.

### A WASTE

"I felt it would have been a waste of half a season if I stayed with Subiaco," says Burton. "With Matt, Scotty and Shane Piggott sharing the ruck duties, I knew I had to move if I wanted some experience at a higher level."

Burton went to Melbourne in June and had instant success, being named fourth best in his first reserves game.

Unfortunately, injuries interrupted the remainder of the season — a groin problem, then a foot sprain and finally a dislocated knee which required arthroscopic surgery.

But he still regards his first season with Richmond as invaluable, especially being under the guidance of legendary coach Jeans.

"He has an aura about him that commands respect and he taught us a lot about how to handle ourselves outside of football," Burton said.

"We are focusing on a hard pre-season to improve a couple of places next year," he says. "We don't expect to improve as much as Footscray or Fitzroy have done, but we hope to become a consistent, hard side and a contender for the top six within five years."

Burton spends a lot of time with ruck and running coaches and follows a special diet and intensive weight programme to boost his strength and bulk.

"In the current economic environment, it is fantastic to secure a major sponsorship from LandCorp, which is a commitment to the development of the Joondalup area.

"Some of the funds will be used to foster the development of future footballers in the northern suburbs through local programmes."

With the new northern suburbs railway line ready to link Joondalup with the rest of Perth, WAFL fans will experience their first trips to a new permanent playing venue since Perth moved to Lathlain Park in 1956.

# Kemp takes it all in his easy-going stride

WITH a premiership medal and a club champion award emerging from a fairy tale 1992 season, brilliant mid-fielder Dean Kemp could be excused for feeling he has done it all.

He might even be expected to become a little swollen-headed in the dizzy heights of super stardom.

But nothing could be further from the truth.

Kemp, the laid back ever-smiling and unobtrusive boy from the bush, refuses to get carried away with the outstanding success 1992 offered.

In fact, the clever blond centreman who was a tearaway winner of the Eagles sixth club champion award, is more intent on plotting a repeat performance next year.

Already back into training, just six weeks since the memorable grand final win, Kemp has embarked on special strength training in preparation for what he and Eagles match committee expect will be even greater attention from opposing taggers in next year's title defence.

## HARDER YEAR TO COME

While Kemp concedes 1992 was beyond his wildest dreams, the 23-year-old accepts that next season will be harder, both for himself and the Eagles.

"My year was a dream come true; there's no doubt it was the biggest time of my life," Kemp said.

"You won't be seeing any change in me, that's for sure. I'm just looking forward to another big year in 1993.

"Winning a premiership and the club champion award in the same season was fantastic. It sure will be something to look back on in years to come.

"But things will be pretty tough for me and the club next year.

"I know I've got a real challenge on my hands now and it's certainly no good getting carried away with any success we've had."

## PUBLIC APPEARANCES

Kemp, like his fellow heroes who lifted the coveted AFL cup for the historic first time, has been inundated with requests for special public appearances in the wake of the premiership victory over Geelong.

He remains undaunted by the attention. Kemp simply accepts it is part of the responsibilities to his status and a means by which the supportive WA public share the spoils of success.

"I don't mind the attention. It's been great the way the people have treated the Eagles since the win," he said.

Two of the biggest post grand final thrills for Kemp have been his first trip back to home town Kalgoorlie last weekend and the invitation to be part of the recording of the fast-becoming-famous "Waltzing Matara" song.

Kemp has also been recruited by the Kalgoorlie Centenary organising committee to help promote the big clash in the gold mining town between the Eagles and Adelaide next February.

The classy Eagle will appear in a series of television advertisements promoting the match.

## PLANNING FOR SUCCESS

The focus on Kemp as one of the Eagles stars in a memorable season, didn't come about without ambition.

At the end of last season, following the Eagles first grand final loss, Kemp established a plan for success in 1992.

"Last year was reasonably successful I suppose, when it's considered we played in a grand final," he recalled.

"But when I looked back on that season, I didn't feel I had contributed that much, so I decided to knuckle down to a solid pre-season and have a big 1992."

Big it certainly was.

The likeable Kemp has also recently made a change in career direction.

After eight years sharing an electrical business with brother Garry, a Subiaco premiership player, the younger Kemp has moved into the sporting trade, working as a sales representative for Leisure Wholesalers, who market a variety of sporting goods and leisure clothing, including the Reliance brand name.

# Big Alex could get top job

JUST 12 months after having his football career resurrected, Alex Ishchenko is one of the prime candidates for North Melbourne's 1993 captaincy.

The much-travelled WA ruckman was given a last chance to play senior football by North Melbourne and responded magnificently, having his best season and finishing third in the best-and-fairest.

He had been working as a labourer in 35-degree Darwin heat when contacted by North's assistant coach, Rodney Eade.

Ishchenko admitted he didn't have much of a choice — football was a breeze compared with working on road patrols!

So impressive were his early efforts at Norths, after being co-opted into the senior team in round five, there was a mid-season move to sack Matt Larkin and put Ishchenko skipper in his place.

Now Larkin has resigned his leadership role, voluntarily, giving Ishchenko and three of four others a summer in which to impress as the 1993 leader.

Norths officials say they will not be rushed into making a decision about the vacant captaincy — unlike Richmond, who recently appointed appointed Jeff Hogg captain ahead of Dale Weightman, who had stood down.

Coach Wayne Schimmelbusch says there are four or five players with the credentials to replace Larkin.

"We'll monitor them right from the pre-season start in early November, through to the practice games and then make a decision," he said.

"We don't view it with any urgency. What's more important is to make the right decision.

"The players realise the captaincy is up for grabs. There'll be a bit of competition among them for the position."

Asked if an imported player could be a leadership possibility, he said: "If they are the right sort of person, they'll be in there with the rest of them."

"They have to be a very special sort of person who can come in, perhaps with some resentment from some of the current players, be strong enough to cope with that resentment and go on and win them over in pretty quick time."

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# Eagles dealing aims at SA target

ASTUTE recruiting management looks certain to win the West Coast Eagles the services of talented Port Adelaide premiership star Brett Chalmers.

Some clever pre-draft trading and negotiations with Chalmers and Richmond has opened the way for the 195cm key-position player to move West.

Pre-draft wheeling and dealing enabled West Coast to hold two trump cards in pursuit of the gifted big man.

The Eagles have been willing to trade experienced ruckman Dean Irving to Richmond to get Chalmers, but if that deal fell through — as was possible in the dying stages of draft trading — West Coast held the No. 1 draft pick after swapping Scott Watters and Tony Begovich with Sydney.

Chalmers, drafted by Richmond three years ago, has refused to join the Tigers, who relinquished their hold this week, making him a prime target at the national draft next Wednesday.

## EARLY PICKS

Eagles football manager Trevor Nisbett and recruiting manager Mick Moylan now have the 1st, 8th, 19th and 21st picks in the draft — Watters and Begovich giving them Sydney's first pick; Dean Laidley's move to North Melbourne gaining the eighth

call and the move of Paul Peos to Brisbane snaring the 21st spot.

Under the draft system, based on the finishing order on the table and with Sydney having 1st, 3rd and 5th and Brisbane 2nd, 4th and 6th, the Eagles first choice was 19th.

WAFL clubs will again be prime targets for Eastern States clubs, though not nearly as many youngsters are expected to be lost as in recent years.

With the two-year moratorium on drafting South Australian talent now expired, the SANFL is expecting a swoop of the magnitude WA experienced last year.

West Coast have targeted talented WAFL stars Jason Spinks (South Fremantle) and Subiaco's Drew Banfield as top priority local draft choices.

However, the recruiting staff have been impressed with a host of football stock in Adelaide and Victoria.

SA pair Andrew McKay, a classy defender with Glenelg and Robert Pym, a clever centreman with the Eagles in Adelaide, are two potential draftees.

## Draft potential

talent, the match committee must drop 10 players from the list of 52.

The club will then select eight players at Wednesday's draft, before dropping a further two players next March for the internal selection process when they select four more players.

Almost-forgotten ruckman Laurie Keene will have his six year connection with the club severed.

## INJURY-TROUBLED

Keene, an inaugural Eagle back in 1987 and one of the first 20 to represent the club in a finals match a year later, has been riddled with injury problems and appears destined for relegation from the Eagles list.

Another former finalist in Andrew Lockyer could be among the relegated group, which should also include Kane Morphett, Nathan McIntosh and Victorians Jason Disney and Tim Watson, neither of whom have trained with the Eagles.

Former club vice-captain Phil Scott and Adrian Barich have already announced their retirement.

# Off to greener pastures

**THE chance to play regular AFL football is the reason why four popular West Coast Eagles players will move to rival clubs.**

Scott Watters, who played 18 senior games in 1992, but missed the finals, Dean Laidley, Paul Peos and Tony Begovich have all accepted the opportunity to play more senior football.

Watters takes up a lucrative deal to move to Sydney, along with Begovich; Laidley won a handsome contract to join North Melbourne and Peos followed their departure by signing with Brisbane.

The quartet all agreed that they were reluctant departees from the Eagles nest, preferring to stay at home and continue their football with West Coast.

"But it got down to a matter of where I was going to play the most senior football," Watters said.

"I had to choose whether to risk playing 15 to 18 games a year with the Eagles, or a full season elsewhere.

"I'm certainly looking forward to proving a few things to a few people by playing regular league football."

Watters is expected to slot into the Swans centre spot or on the ball, with the anticipated move of veteran Barry Mitchell to St Kilda.

Laidley, regarded by Eagles team management as purely a defender, is

expected to assume a mid-field or centreline role with Norths.

"I want to prove I can play a more authoritative game at the highest level than I've been given credit for," Laidley said.

"I was always going to be up against it at West Coast, with John Worsfold and Guy McKenna the first picked half-back flankers.

## FANTASTIC DEAL

"Let's face it, they are probably the best two in the business.

"I'm happy with my deal. It's fantastic and, hopefully, I'm going to play a lot more senior football."

Peos hopes his experience will be an asset to the developing Bears.

"I've played 50 AFL games and been around for a while, so hopefully I can offer them something and play a heap of regular senior footy," he said.

Eagles football manager Trevor Nisbett said each player left with the blessing of the club and all three pre-draft deals had been amicably agreed to by all parties.

Under AFL draft trade regulations, the player's club, the player and his new club must all agree to the swap.

Nisbett said the Eagles had no intention of forcing any player to move.

"All our deals were struck with cooperation and consideration for the

player's best interests," he said.

"We were extremely reluctant to let Scottie Watters go, because he had played so much football for us in a premiership year.

"But we believe the first trade position in return for his services is a fair swap.

"It's a matter of providing opportunities for players who might otherwise not get those chances. If a player indicates he is willing to consider being part of a trade, we considered his service to the club.

"The trading of players has given us the chance to pick up a few good players in return in the draft.

"It also allows us to have a close revision of our salary cap."

Nisbett said the Eagles management were content that the pre-draft dealing left them in a sound position to collect some top players in return.

The careful pre-draft management gave them the prized No. 1 draft choice for the first time in six years.

Before this year's draft, West Coast had been allowed pre-draft priority picks that collected the likes of Peter Sumich, Glen Jakovich and Jason Ball.

However, West Coast do not have any priority picks this year, which makes their draft-choice negotiations all the more meritorious.

## Eagles run out of seats

THE huge following that has exploded around the Eagles in recent times has created plenty of administrative problems, as West Coast's lovely switchboard operator Andrea Gossage can verify.

Not the least has been the impossible task of fitting 23,000 members into 18,000 seats at Subiaco Oval.

A recent letter from Jim Malone, the Marketing Services Officer for Indian Pacific Ltd, the still-alive public company that floated the West Coast club, sums up the problem.

Talking about priority seating for Noteholders — those people who shelled out money early on in the belief that they would be guaranteed the best seats — explains why they can now only apply for two seats, not eight as in the past.

### APOLOGISED

And he also apologised to people who had recently purchased Notes under the impression that they could apply for up to six seats.

He said that there were only 5000 'quality' undercover seats available at Subiaco Oval and 3000 at the WACA Ground.

"Under the six-seats-for-one scenario, about 4500 seats would be required by Noteholders, in addition to the 2000 seats for sponsors, internal allocation and Subiaco Football Club," he wrote, confirming a total of 6500.

That obviously leaves 2000 people missing out — and that's before the ordinary members queue up for their share.

## Well-named

YOU often get some humour out of mixing the names of various players together and Claremont president John O'Connell raised a laugh at the recent Quit media awards night.

Referring back to some bygone Tiger stars, he recalled the time when Don Idle and Alan Rich were key defenders.

"That might have given Claremont a backline of the Idle-Rich, but they were certainly too good for the opposition," quipped O'Connell.

## SA veteran's eighth flag

WINNING grand finals is certainly a memorable experience — just ask veteran South Australian Greg Phillips.

The 33-year-old Port Adelaide defender has just notched his eighth grand final victory — beating the record of seven held by Hawthorn's ageless champion, Michael Tuck.

Phillips, who started his senior career in 1976, has recorded his premierships from nine appearances, suffering just one taste of defeat, while Tuck's 11 grand final appearances is still the Australian record in senior leagues.

Phillips, who also played 84 games with Collingwood from 1983-86, has no apparent retirement plans, with 314 Port Adelaide games behind him, putting him in the elite 400-plus camp.

## Sport options opening up

THE changing face of sporting options for young people was never better illustrated than in the recent Geraldton Aboriginal sports star awards.

Not so many years back, the only sport where an Aboriginal youngster sought success was Australian Rules football... and there have been plenty of good proteges out of the northern port.

Basketballer Justin Mallard won the senior sports star award; surfer Ken Dann was the junior winner and boxing stalwart Sharkey Ryan was the identity of the year.

Larry Kickett and Barry Cable represented the Aboriginal Sports Foundation, joining Sports Minister Graham Edwards for the big night.

## Solin's early challenge

IT'S amazing how quickly loyalty can change in these modern football days, where players switch colours overnight, often without warning.

Newly-appointed Subiaco coach Tony Solin has worn a lot of different coloured guernseys in his playing days — and now he's shaping up for yet another strip.

But, as he admitted recently, the Lions had never been one of his favourite clubs, so it will take a bit of self-discipline initially to make his new coaching challenge work.

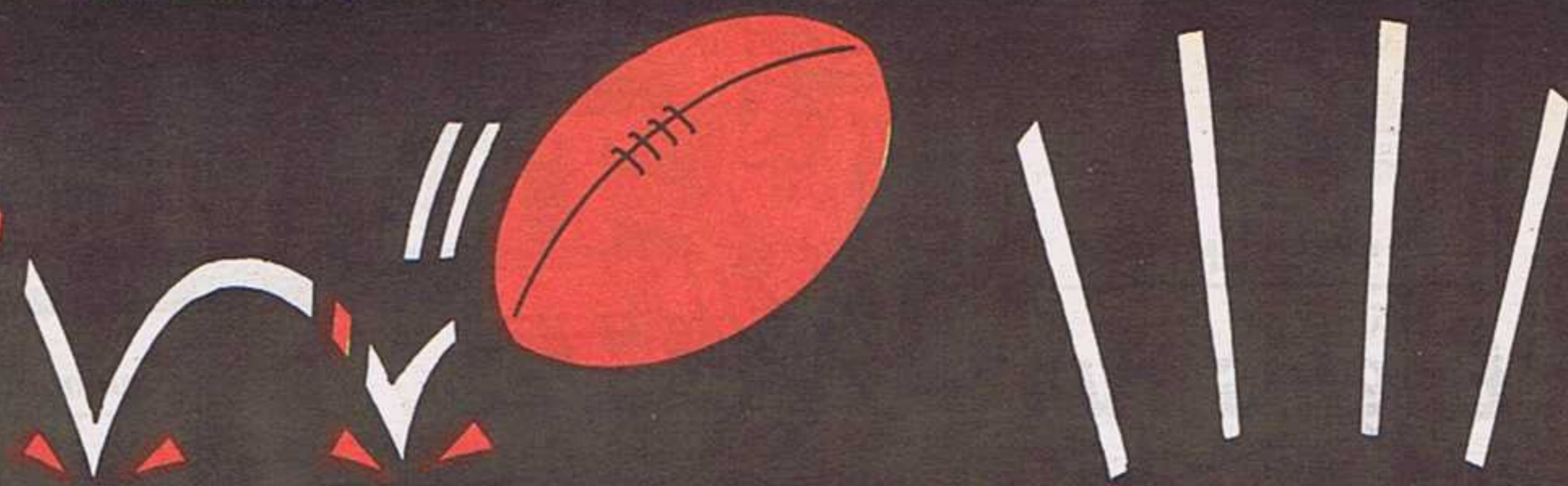

The Demons have also completed negotiations with Essendon for the return of creative mid-fielder Willie Dick, who spent the 1992 season with the Bombers after being drafted last November.

Dick made seven appearances in the Bombers seniors and finished the season as a key player in Essendon's reserves premiership combination.

Dick, the winner of Perth's 1991 fairest-and-best award, returned to WA at the end of September and is likely to settle in the city after commuting from Northam for much of his previous football with Perth.

Barich (28) announced his retirement from the Eagles late last month and was quickly in demand.

He received approaches from three AFL clubs about being part of some pre-draft trading and was spoken to by three WAFL clubs.

The veteran of 119 league games at Perth and 46 with the Eagles was also offered several amateur coaching positions.

The concerted endeavours from other clubs to secure Barich's services resulted in Demons officials acting quickly to reach a new agreement and

"We were well aware of the interest in him and knew we had to move quickly to retain his services. He's still got years of healthy service available to us."

"With his West Coast Eagles commitments now behind him, Adrian will be able to put all his energies into playing WAFL football."

"We want that type of value from him at Perth."

Riley said the Demons intend to attract even more top quality players to the club in their determined plans to qualify for the 1993 finals series.

While Perth have achieved two bonus signings, they failed in a bid to entice rugged defender Brad Fox back to WA.

Fox has played two seasons at Essendon for 17 senior games and though he showed some interest in talks with Perth officials, he opted to stick it out with the Bombers in his endeavours to break into AFL ranks on a full-time basis.

## Matera the top Bulldog

**VETERAN** rover Wally Matera celebrated his return to the WAFL by taking out South Fremantle's club champion award, the W.J. Hughes Medal, repeating his 1985 victory.

He polled 154 votes, to win clearly from Brad Collard (on 107), with Mark Hepburn five votes further back. They were followed by Craig Edwards and Mark Collins.

The reserves fairest and best went to Darryl Ballard ahead of John McDonald, while Vance Davidson won the colts trophy from Joshn Grosse.

## Triumph for Scott at Subiaco

**PHIL** Scott completed his distinguished league career in fine style when he won Subiaco's fairest-and-best award for the first time.

The genial giant was rewarded for his consistent season with Subiaco, polling 153 votes, 21 clear of the much-improved Malcolm Williams.

The two clubs have negotiated with organisers of the Goldfields Centenary celebrations to play on Saturday, February 6, with a league and reserves match.

Organisers had hoped the fixture would be an official Foster's Cup game, but the AFL ruled that possibility out, scheduling it as the first official practice match of the new season.

The games will be played at Kalgoorlie's Sir Richard Moore Oval, the venue Goldfields officials want for their WAFL-club home.

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# Sharks continue their up-market move

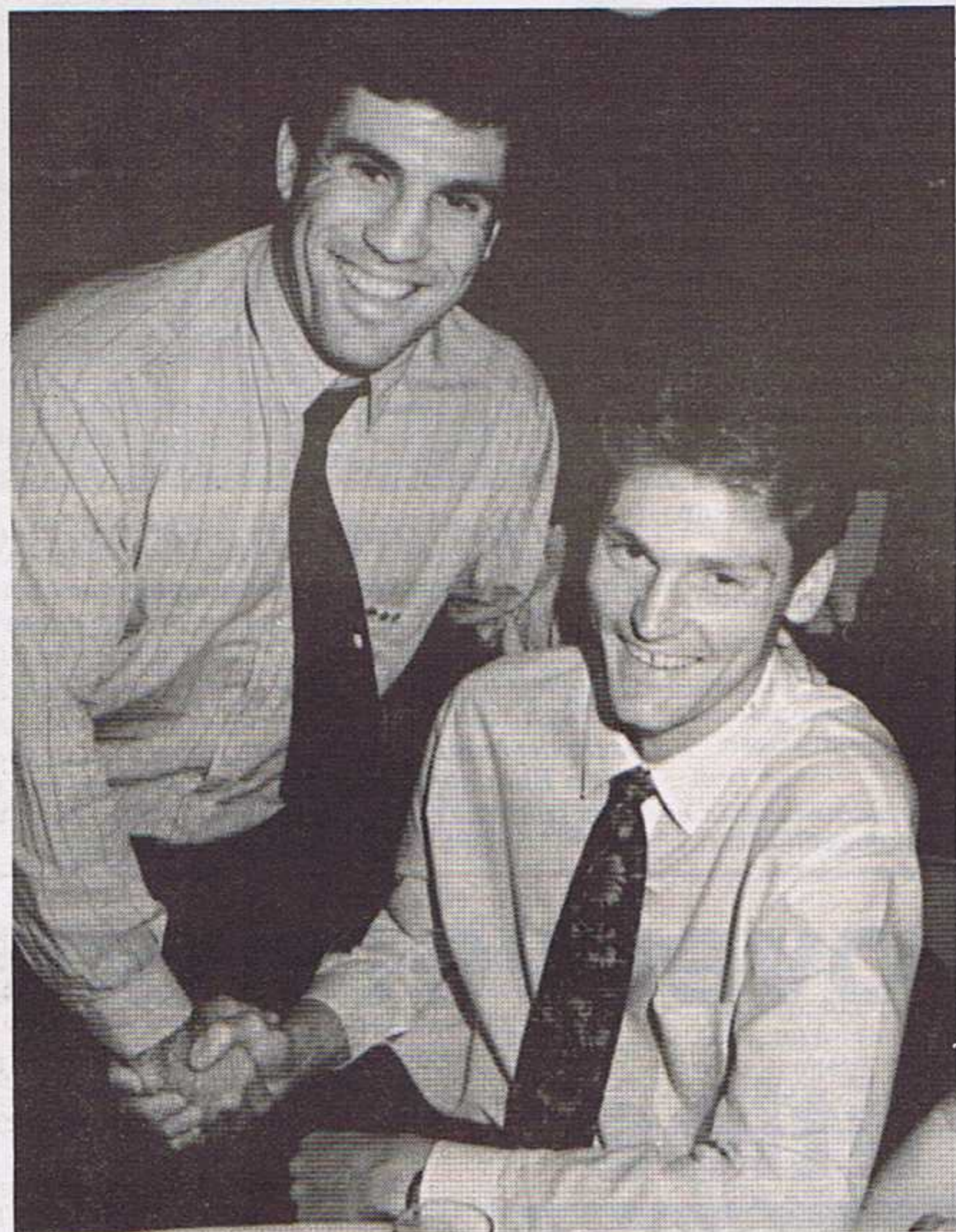

### VOTING SYSTEM

A complicated voting system, similar to that used by West Coast and Hawthorn, was introduced at East Fremantle this year, with Newman receiving 25 votes, polling in 17 of his 23 appearances, while Anderson collected votes in 16 of his 23 games.

Dashing winger Peter Quill was rewarded for his best season in league football, finishing third on a countback after he and Anderson tied on 22 votes.

Premiership captain Steve Malaxos, winner of the award last season, was fourth with 18, followed by part-time Eagles rover Trent Nichols on 16, one ahead of Mark Amaranti.

Glen Davies, who tasted league football twice in 1992, won the Henry Jeffery Medal for the reserves fairest-and-best, while exciting centreman Nathan Williams, captain of the colts premiership team, won the under-19s award, the Alan Trott Medal.

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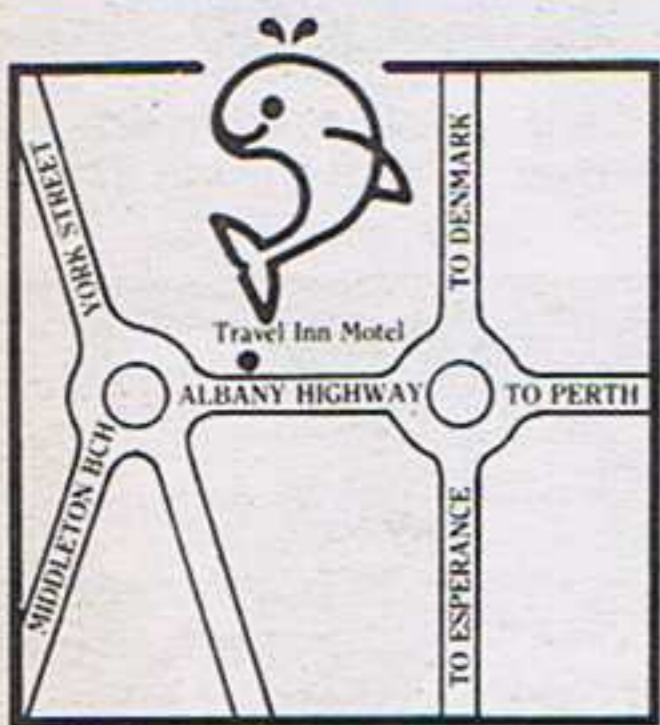

# Footballers roll on in new arena



DUAL STAR ... State representation in two sports has been the achievement of Wickepin's Keith Doncon

JOHN Rainoldi and Keith Doncon were an era apart when they strutted their stuff around the football fields of Perth.

If they had been of the same generation, they most certainly would have been opposed to each other.

But they avoided each other by courtesy of about eight years in their birth dates, with Doncon the rover returning to Wickepin from East Perth as Rainoldi the defender started out with West Perth.

However, they have now joined forces in another sporting arena — and being room mates on numerous State team trips around Australia has helped them work together as a successful team.

It's the sport of lawn bowls that the two men now excel in, both claiming a spot in the State's top players and with a host of championship victories behind them.

Rainoldi, now 41, was a State bowls team member at the age of 28 and has played more than 170 games, winning a host of State and national titles, especially in pairs.

Doncon, now 48 and still farming at Wickepin — which was one reason why he curtailed his league football career after an injury-plagued 75 games — is in his 15th year of bowls, with more than 80 State games behind him.

"We didn't play any footy together, but we've certainly rolled a few bowls in the same side," says Rainoldi, who now has the WA agency to sell one of the world's great lawn bowls, Drake's Pride.

"I've roomed quite a few times with Keith and we've played a lot of State games together.

"There's a few other footballers around the rinks as well, East Perth's Ned Bull is a keen bowler; East Fremantle's Rex Townsend has taken up the game and former Old Easts star Jack Clarke is pretty good."

## TITLE WINS

Rainoldi, ranked equal sixth in WA's list of top bowlers, has won five Australian titles — three pairs events teamed with the State's top bowler, Dennis Katunarich, plus a share in two fours titles.

He has won plenty of club singles titles and is currently playing top division pennants with Doubleview.

"I first took up the game when I was

about 14 as my parents used to play at Osborne Park," recalls Rainoldi, who played 35 league games at West Perth, where his cousin, Bill Rainoldi had also been a top player.

"But I wasn't allowed to play pennants till I was 21 because they were licensed premises and in those days the rinks were part of the licence and I was considered under-age.

"I started playing in a few competitions at 21, but didn't really take it up seriously till I was about 25 when I retired from cricket."

Doncon, a State player alongside roving greats Bill Walker and Barry Cable, has won State pairs titles with his Wickepin team-mate Colin Fleay.

## WELL-TRAVELLED

Now ranked 13th in the WA list, he has travelled many country miles in his quest for bowls competition and he comes across plenty of former footballing mates in his travels.

"Bob Page from Perth is farming down at Dudinin and loves his bowls and Claremont's John McIntosh is now bowling along at Dalkeith," says Doncon.

"But I'm surprised that more former footballers don't take the game up," he added.

# Summer Diary

Have you missed these football stories

**OCTOBER 3:** Port Adelaide won the SANFL grand final with a 56-point win over Glenelg, 17.3 (105) to 7.7 (49). Magarey Medal winner Nathan Buckley won the Jack Oatey Medal for best-on-ground.

**OCTOBER 6:** Centreman Dean Kemp won the West Coast club champion award with 46 votes, from wingman Chris Mainwaring (38), centre-half-back Glen Jakovich (37) and Norm Smith Medallist Peter Matera (36). Matt Clape was rookie of the year. Peter Sumich won the leading goalscorer award, David Hynes was best clubman, the Golden Eagles award went to Dean Kemp and Phil Scott received a special presentation to mark his retirement.

**OCTOBER 7:** Magarey Medallist Nathan Buckley urged the Brisbane Bears to release him from his contract and expressed an interest in joining Collingwood.

**OCTOBER 8:** West Coast players Scott Watters, Dean Laidley and Paul Peos confirmed they had spoken to other AFL clubs. Watters has received an attractive offer from a Melbourne-based club; Laidley was being sought by a number of clubs and Peos held talks with Brisbane Bears coach Robert Walls.

**OCTOBER 9:** The West Australian Football Commission opened an inquiry into an incident in the WAFL grand final in which South Fremantle rookie Jason Spinks received a fractured cheekbone. Port Adelaide sent a proposal to the South Australian National Football League asking to be considered if a second AFL licence is granted to SA.

**OCTOBER 9:** The WA Football Commission rejected a plan by structural engineering consultant Bob Pritchard to re-develop Perth Oval into a 55,000-seat stadium. The Commission said it is committed to develop Subiaco Oval as the home of football in this State.

Adrian Barich announced his retirement from the AFL after 47 games with the Eagles. Barich, a foundation member of the Eagles squad, has yet to confirm if he will continue to play for Perth in the WAFL.

**OCTOBER 10:** Subiaco Oval received the go-ahead for re-development with a promise from the Federal Government of \$8-million in funding for the WA Football Commission. Under plans already drawn up, Subiaco Oval will be converted into an

enclosed stadium capable of seating 50,000 people.

**Robbie West**, being chased by five AFL clubs, won West Perth's fairest and best award with 98 votes from Victorian recruit Darren Harris (77), Craig Nelson (63), Ric Toovey (50) and Derek Hall on 45. Perth rover Russell Thompson won the Butcher Medal with 110 votes from Scott Spalding (87) and ruckman Toby Jackson (82). Darrell Panizza won Claremont's EB Cook Medal for a record third time when he scored 151 votes. Rover Brendan Green was second (112), Adam Clark (98) third and Melbourne draftee Phil Gilbert (89) fourth.

**OCTOBER 12:** The Sydney football experiment looks doomed with the AFL's 15 club directors set to vote against a rescue package for the ailing Swans. Only Brisbane and West Coast were prepared to support a \$300,000 bail-out of the club.

West Perth announced a \$150,000 sponsorship package over three years from Joondalup developer, LandCorp. The lucrative deal was revealed at a special ceremony to turn the first sod of turf at their new home ground at the Joondalup Sports Complex, by Sport and Recreation Minister Graham Edwards.

**OCTOBER 13:** The Sydney Swans were given one week to come up with a financial proposal to allow the club to continue in the AFL. A bid by East Fremantle and South Fremantle to unite to field a team in the AFL was dismissed as premature by WA Football Commission chairman Peter Tannock. In a joint statement the two clubs said they wanted to be in a position to organise an AFL team if the opportunity arose.

**OCTOBER 15:** East Perth re-appointed Stan Magro as coach for next season, after speculation that work commitments would prevent him from taking up the second year of his contract.

**OCTOBER 16:** David Sierakowski, the son of WAFL arbitrator and former St Kilda and Subiaco premiership player Brian Sierakowski, signed with the Saints under the father and son rule. Wally Matera won the South Fremantle fairest and best award with 138 votes, from Brad Collard and Mark Hepburn. Travis Edmonds took out the Norm Thomas Memorial Medal as

Swan Districts best with 138 votes, from Mike Richardson and Steve O'Reilly. Edmonds confirmed that he would be staying with Swans next season and not transferring to Hawthorn.

**OCTOBER 17:** Seven WAFL clubs have formed the Australian Rules League Club of WA in a move to give local clubs a united voice. Only Perth did not join the group. Talented Swan Districts centre-half-back Steve O'Reilly announced he would join Geelong next season after being drafted in 1991.

**OCTOBER 18:** Fitzroy chairman Dyson Hore-Lacy attacked the AFL saying their policies were squeezing the financially struggling clubs. Hore-Lacy said the VFL's 1985 plan stressed the necessity for equalisation, but the end result had been the opposite.

**OCTOBER 19:** A charge of misconduct against South Fremantle coach Malcolm Brown was dropped when field umpire Trevor Garrett withdrew the complaint after debate at the tribunal on what defined assault. Bulldogs big man c/craig Edwards was suspended for two weeks for striking East Fremantle's Neil Lester-Smith in the grand final.

The Sydney Swans received a boost when major sponsor QBE Insurance announced a \$1-million deal for the next two years.

**OCTOBER 20:** Sydney Swans players threatened a legal challenge if they were forced to merge with Brisbane, a proposal put forward at the AFL meeting.

**OCTOBER 21:** The AFL directors voted 11-0, with four clubs abstaining, to save the Sydney Swans, offering financial incentives and draft concessions. The club's outstanding licence fee of \$1.9 million will be returned after it is paid and they were awarded the 1st, 3rd and 5th draft picks, with Brisbane getting the 2nd, 4th and 6th choices.

**OCTOBER 23:** A pre-season WAFL competition, similar to the Kresta Cup which operated in 1987 and 1988, is on the drawing board for next season. The WAFL will ask the WA Cricket Association to allow some of the matches to be played at the WACA or Fremantle Oval under lights if the games clash with cricket fixtures. If a sponsor can be found, prizemoney of about \$20,000 will be up for grabs.

**OCTOBER 24:** East Fremantle re-appointed premiership coach Ken Judge for a further three years. Recycled ruckman Ian Newman capped a remarkable year by winning the Sharks fairest-and-best award, polling 25 votes to beat tagger Clayton Anderson by three votes. Peter Quill was third on a countback.

**OCTOBER 26:** West Coast officials had talks with St Kilda star Nicky Winmar, who was back home in Perth on holidays.

**OCTOBER 27:** Defender Dean Laidley became the first Eagle to be swapped in pre-draft trading when he was cleared at his own request to North Melbourne in exchange for the No. 8 pick.

**OCTOBER 28:** The Eagles agreed to swap midfielder Scott Watters for Sydney's prized No. 1 draft pick, but struck a hitch when the Swans demanded a second player in the deal.

**OCTOBER 29:** Eagles part-timer Tony Begovich agreed to join Sydney as part of the swap deal with Scott Watters and the Swans and Paul Peos became the fourth West Coast player to be traded when he signed with the Brisbane Bears. In return for Peos, the Eagles received the Bears pick in round two of the draft; in effect, the 21st player choice overall. The Eagles have now added the first, eighth and 21st picks to their 19th choice.

**NOVEMBER 1:** East Perth's fairest and best award went to centreman Peter Miller, with 195 votes, 30 clear of recruited ruckman Richard Graham, with midfielder Shawn Colbung third on 155.

# Katunarich a top WA sports star

TALK lawn bowls in WA and you have the name Dennis Katunarich at the top of your list.

Long-recognised as the State's leading exponent on the rinks, the 42-year-old has bowled his way around the world and claimed plenty of titles on the way.

The next world indoor championships at Preston, in England, in February will see four Australians competing for the first time.

Katunarich will team up with world indoor singles champion Ian Schuback, Rob Parrella and Cameron Curtis.

Schuback, the first man outside of Britain to win the world singles title, teamed up with Parrella, the current Commonwealth Games singles titleholder, to be runner's-up in last year's world pairs title.

Katunarich qualified for next year's world titles by winning the Australian indoor event at Tweed Heads, in October, beating a field of 16 of the nation's top bowlers.

The fully-televised world indoors takes place on a portable rink set up in a hall at Preston and will be played before packed houses. The 32-man field contests a knockout competition and world-renowned names such as David Bryant, Tony Allcock, Richard Corsie, Hugh Duff and Andy Thompson will be in the field.

Full bookmaking facilities operate throughout the event and the crowd are lined up right alongside the rinks.

Schuback, who has played in England for the last five years, has enjoyed plenty of success in the world indoors, with a singles and pairs win, plus twice runner-up in both events.

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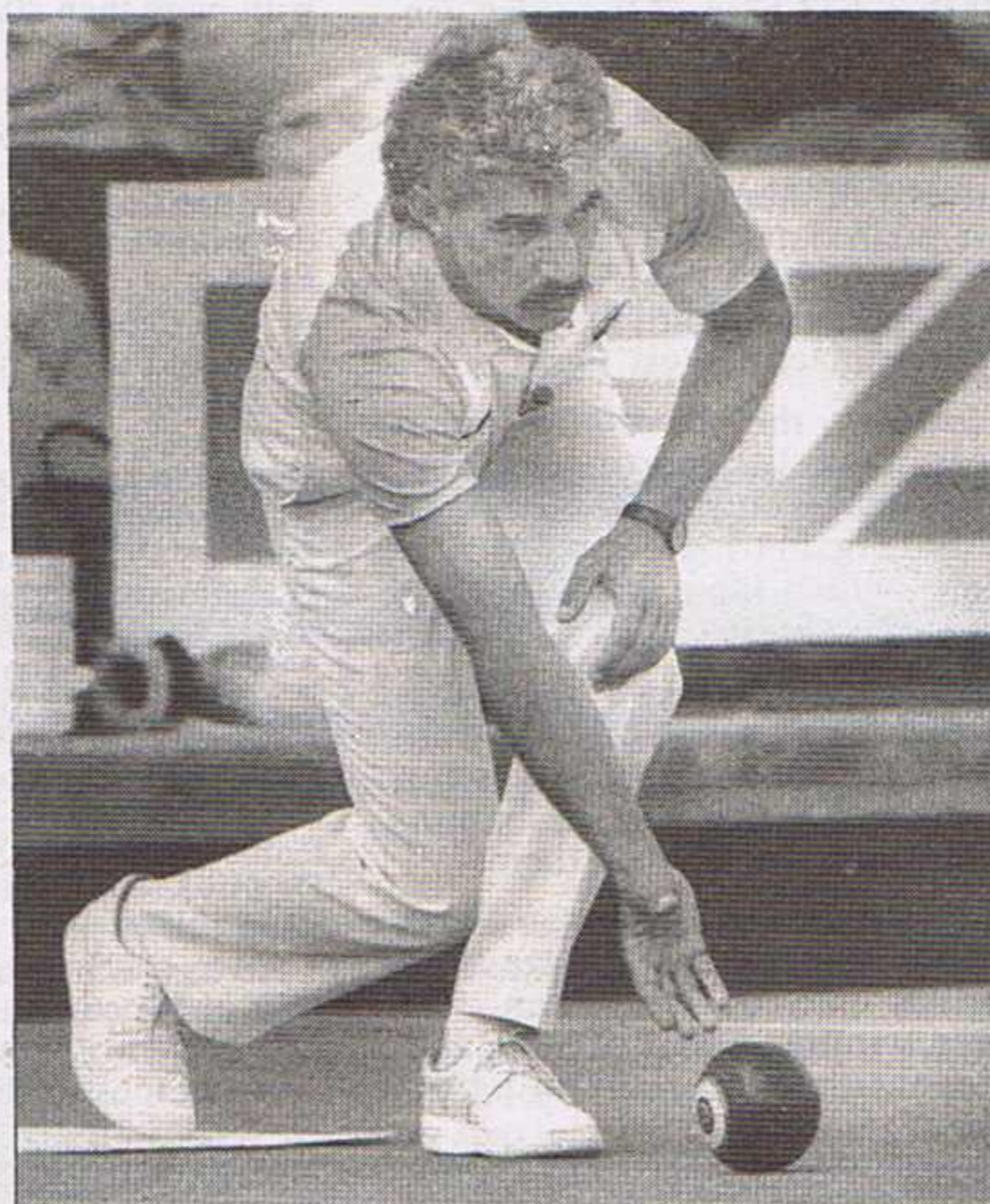
