
Tasty start



WHILE the West Coast premiership stars are heroes to many young football followers, the Eagles also have their own idols.

The latest player profiles of today's Eagles reveal that some of the footballing greats of the past still stand out as players to be admired.

Former South Fremantle champion and dual Sandover Medallist Stephen Michael is rated highly by Peter Sumich, Andrew Lockyer, Chris Lewis and Dean Irving as a favourite player.

The magical Bulldog, Maurice Rioli is admired by Glen Jakovich, while Dwayne Lamb rates the veteran West Perth centreman Mel Whinnen as his most respected player of the past.

INFLUENCE

Former and current Eagles are rated highly, proving that the club's teammates can also have a big influence on individual players.

Captain John Worsfold is one Eagle who is highly respected by all of his teammates, with Matthew Burton, Dean Kemp and Chris Mainwaring rating him as their favourite footballer.

Chris Waterman lists his Eagles (and East Fremantle) co-defender Michael Brennan as his most admired player, while youngster Jarrad Schofield says he looks up to Dean Kemp and Norm Smith Medallist, Peter Matera.

Previous Eagle players are also admired as role models for today's footballers, including Ross Glendinning and inaugural coach Ron Alexander.

Some of the current AFL players from rival Victorian clubs are looked upon as players to be admired, including Hawthorn's Dermott Brereton.

Brendan Krummel, Derek Hall, Glen Jakovich, Tony Godden and Jason Ball all see the blond Hawk as some kind of inspiration.

RESPECTED

Former Hawthorn captain and champion Michael Tuck has the respect of Mitchell White, Craig Turley and Karl Langdon, while John Platten is respected for his playing ability by Trent Nichols, Ashley McIntosh and Tony Evans.

Geelong's Gary Ablett is rated highly by David Hart and Travis Burton for his ability to score uncanny goals, especially when under pressure.



Eagles are spot-on with their choice of Walker

THE West Coast Eagles decision to use their third choice in last year's November draft to call up Lee Walker could be well justified.

Walker looked set for an early entry to the AFL arena after being a dual WA Schoolboys representative and winning selection in the 1988 Teal Cup side in 1988 at the age 15.

But his progress was halted by a serious knee injury which needed a reconstruction that didn't quite work and was followed by another.

Last year Walker was shifted in his work to Margaret River and against medical advice, he lined up with the local side in the strong South West National Football League.


DOMINATED

Walker dominated at centre-halfforward in two of his five matches, but sustained a groin injury, which also needed surgery.

This did not deter the 1992 premiers, who took the punt and selected him.

Many critics felt that the choice of the 201cm Walker, who has ground skills similar to a rover, was a premature gamble. But the long-range plans of the Eagles are based on seeking out future potential.

Walker (20) has had troubles with his shins over the summer and joined the Eagles main squad for training only last week. . and they're team-mates



On Sunday at Busselton, Walker, playing in his first senior match for the Royals, showed his class in the first half at centre-half-back.

The bank officer said he pulled up well on Monday morning.

"I feel fine, but I played only a half of footy," Walker said. "The Eagles said I could play only a half, but I just wanted to get out there and play."

His skills were most noticeable on the ground, where his agility to get the bouncing ball was impressive. He also marked strongly and launched the Royals into attack a number of times.

Magnificent Seven in action again


THE Magnificent Seven ride again — even if two of them have defected to another State.

DASHING West Coast Eagles wingman Peter Matera is on the verge of a great football career . . .


... but the realisation of just how close he is to greatness caused him to be a little shocked and shaken recently.

Titans clash to kick off season A NEAR-capacity crowd at

Subiaco Oval this Sunday will be treated to a showdown between the reigning heavyweights of AFL football - last season's premiers West Coast and the Foster's Cup champions, Essendon.

The Eagles will be fired up to avenge their loss to the Bombers in the Cup semi-final on March 13.

In that match the Eagles were without six members of their premiership side - Chris Mainwaring (knee), Dean Kemp (knee), Paul Harding (knee), Chris Waterman (thumb), Tony Evans (knee) and Michael Brennan (wedding).

Harding, Brennan and Waterman are all on target for the season's opener, but Mainwaring has been ruled out, while Evans and Kemp are outside chances to be included in the final 20.

Essendon coach Kevin Sheedy could not be happier with his young charges, who have been in sparkling touch during the Foster's Cup and are fancied to return to the finals after missing out last season.

The "Baby Bombers" have seven players under the age of 21 pressing claims to make the trip west.

Stephen Allessio, Paul Hills, James Hird, Glenn Manton, Mark Mercuri, Joe Misiti and Gavin Wanganeen all played in the Foster's Cup competition with considerable success.

TOP TOUCH

Wanganeen has been in such top touch out of a back pocket that he is an early Brownlow Medal favourite.

The input of Allessio and ruck partner Peter Somerville would have caused Eagles coach Mick Malthouse some concern.

Allessio's height in particular troubled the Eagles in the Foster's Cup so the West Coast selectors are expected to rush Harding back to bolster the big man department.

"Harding put his hand up last Saturday when he played well for East Fremantle," chairman of selectors Ian Miller said.

He said the Eagles were far from devastated by their loss to Essendon in the Foster's Cup.

"The Cup is great if you make the final, but it is only a pre-season competition and the true season starts this week," Miller said.

"It's a whole new ball game this Sunday."

CRUCIAL PERFORMANCES

A highlight of the Eagles practice matches has been the excellent form of wingman Peter Matera and the crisp ball-handling of Craig Turley, who has recovered from a back operation at the end of last season.

Their performances, with that of veteran tagger Dwayne Lamb, will be crucial to the Eagles chances.

Essendon's running brigade of Hills, Darren Bewick, Kieran Sporn, Mercuri, Misiti and Sean Denham have been in great touch, collecting many possessions in solid, four-quarter showings.

"Essendon have proved by beating us and winning the Foster's Cup final last Saturday that they're in good form," Miller said.

"Kevin Sheedy has changed their style of play over the past year and Essendon have become a good running side."

Star Eagles forwards Peter Sumich, Brett Heady and Karl Langdon have been below par pre-season, but they still will command the full attentions of Manton, Gary O'Donnell and Mark Harvey.

At the other end of the ground, the Eagles defence has been as consistent as ever, with free-moving skipper John Worsfold leading the way.

He was among the best five players in each of the Eagles three Foster's Cup matches.

Worsfold and colleagues Brennan, Guy McKenna, Mitchell White and Glen Jakovich will ensure that Bomber goals are hard to come by.

Essendon were well served in attack last Saturday by Hird, Todd Ridley and Peter Cransberg, who kicked nine goals between them.

DIGBY

BEACHAM

Elusive half-forward Michael Long failed to post a major, but was instrumental in several Bombers goals.

Essendon will be one of 14 clubs trying to deny the Eagles consecutive premierships — a fact that does not concern the West Coast hierarchy.

"I think all the years are hard," Miller said.

"We set the standard in 1992 by winning the premiership, but I don't think we will be hunted any more than in previous years."




Harding's performance was highlighted by his mobility and slick ball-handling.

Second WA-based AFL team draws Eagles fire

IRONIC isn't it. The AFL has been accused of wanting to push another WA-based team into the AFL to dissipate the playing strength of the West Coast Eagles.

And the boss of last season's premiers is concerned that another Perth team would devalue the financial strength of the Eagles.

West Coast Eagles chairman Terry O'Connor's comments in last week's Sunday Times about the introduction of another WA team show that the Eagles are paranoid, but for entirely different reasons, about moves to admit another WA team into the AFL.

And they are also contradictory.

While O'Connor seems happy enough to have another team in WA as long it is a relocated AFL side, he is strongly opposed to the formation of a local club.

Many football followers believe we do not need a second WA-based side.

But if there is to be one, it should be formed in WA and it should be based in the Fremantle area.

DISASTROUS MOVE

O'Connor said that forming a team from scratch would be disastrous.

His argument is that a second WA combination would have detrimental financial implications for the Eagles and that it could affect local sponsorship. So what!

The Eagles future is assured for at least five years because of the judicious recruiting of young players and the result of winning last year's premiership.

The Eagles are a young side.

But look at the number of talented players in the camp who cannot get a look in.

Jason Ball would probably walk into any other AFL side, yet he could be cooling his heels for a while before he gets a regular game, if at all, with the Eagles.

The biggest problem facing the Eagles is keeping the fringe players content.

Next season, or even the following year, is too soon for another AFL side here.

For a start, who would pay to watch Fitzroy or whoever the club may be, if they were relocated?

You could argue that the licence fee may be waived, but if a club were unloaded here, it would probably be broke and need propping up anyway.

SUBSTANTIAL COSTS

It would be much harder for an outside club to get local sponsors and the cost of moving the team would be substantial.

On the other hand, Fremantle has long been a stronghold of WA football.

If there is to be another team from WA, it should be based around the port.

As for starting from scratch, it is obvious that special dispensation would have to be made for the new team in respect of players . . . and no doubt it would seek some players on the Eagles list.

Despite having to start from scratch another WAbased side would be hard to beat over here.

No one would expect it to be an instant success just competitive. And even from scratch it would probably do better in a relatively short time than the Brisbane Bears or Sydney Swans.

To do so would protect the Eagles.


Not everyone in WA is a mad-keen Eagles fan, so a Fremantle-based side would be well supported.

The concern is not to protect the Eagles, but to protect WA football.

At least with another WA-based team many more home-grown players would stay in WA and players from the WAFL would have greater opportunities to play AFL football.

ESSENDON'S win in Saturday's grand final of the Foster's Cup maintained the recent domination of the night series by three just clubs.

Essendon, Hawthorn and Melbourne have shared the past 10 night premierships.

Saturday's win gave the Bombers their third night premiership since 1984. In that period Hawthorn won the night series five times and Melbourne twice.

The dominance of three clubs in the past decade contrasts with the first seven years after the night series was revived in 1977. From then until 1983, seven different clubs won the competition.

THE attendance of 75,533 at Saturday night's game easily broke the previous record of 50,478 for a night series grand final - in 1980 when North Melbourne beat Collingwood in controversial circumstances.

With the Magpies leading by three points, hundreds of spectators streamed onto the ground after the final siren.

But the field umpires failed to hear the siren and allowed North Melbourne's Malcolm Blight to pass to teammate Kerry Good, who marked only 25-metres from goal.

With desperate Collingwood supporters charging towards Good, the full-forward calmly kicked a goal - giving the Kangaroos victory by three points.

THE West Coast Eagles last year became the sixth club to win the AFL premiership after finishing third and then second the previous two seasons.

The Eagles this year will be seeking to emulate Fitzroy in 1905 and Richmond in 1974 by winning consecutive premierships after finishing third and then second.

The other three clubs to finish 3-2-1 in consecutive seasons are Essendon between 1940 and '42, Collingwood (1951-53) and Hawthorn (1974-76).

The Bombers finished second in 1943, Collingwood seventh in 1954 and Hawthorn third in 1977.

The Eagles will be seeking to become the ninth of the 15 AFL clubs to win consecutive flags at least once.

RICHMOND supporters will be hoping that the Tigers can carry their good night series form into the home-and-away matches - and win their opening match of the season for the first time since 1982.


Richmond have failed to win their opening round clash since beating North Melbourne by 18 points at the MCG 11 years ago.

In the 10 years since then, the Tigers have lost to nine different opponents in the opening round, by an average 35 points.

A WIN by St Kilda over Geelong would give the Saints five consecutive opening round wins - matching their club record, set in 1970-74.

ESSENDON - recent winners over West Coast in a semi-final of the Foster's Cup — will this Sunday chase their first regular season win over the Eagles since the 1990 preliminary final.



Reflections from an Eagle

MICHAEL Brennan can look forward to Sunday's match against Essendon at Subiaco Oval with some sense of relief.

The Eagles full-back is invariably given the task of minding the opposition side's spearhead and on Sunday, the Bombers will be without brilliant big man Paul Salmon, who injured his shoulder in the semifinal of the Foster's Cup.

Minding an opposing side's potential match-winner is something Brennan (27) has become used to since making his debut with the club in 1987.

And being an inaugural Eagle, Brennan has experienced many highs and lows.

Much hype surrounded the Eagles entering the VFL, as it was then, and many players have described the situation as Hollywood.

"There was obviously a lot of excitement around a new team in the VFL," Brennan said this week.

"And with us achieving the ultimate goal within six years, you could say it was a success."

After making the finals in 1988, a lot of high expectations were expected from the Eagles before the start of the 1989 season.

But they were a big disappointment and reached an all-time low at Windy Hill on July 15 when they were thrashed to the tune of 142 points by the Bombers.

"We'd received a comprehensive defeat from Hawthorn the previous week and to go to Windy Hill and receive that thrashing was certainly disappointing," the Eagles vice-captain said.

"It was humiliating and it was time to sit back and reflect on what had to be done."

Brennan, whose 120 games for the Eagles in six seasons is bettered only by Dwayne Lamb (131) and Chris Mainwaring (126), was one of the Eagles best players during 1991, when they stunned the football world by winning their first 12 games and 19 of the 22 qualifying games.

"We were considered the best team in 1991, but Hawthorn have carned respect over the years for their efforts in the finals," Brennan said.


"It was certainly disappointing, but something to learn from last season."

Brennan, who was an integral member of the Eagles premiership side, was relieved when the final siren went at the MCG on September 26 last year.

"It was great, especially for me and some of the guys who had been around the club since 1987," he said.

YOUNGSTERS LIFT CLUBS

THE continuing search for improvement by AFL clubs means that they must always find a couple of younger players to be introduced to senior football each year.

This has the advantage not only of giving new players experience, but also to put pressure on the more established players to perform at a required level.

Last season, several players showed they would make the grade.

Ben Hart (Adelaide), Tony Evans (West Coast), Jeremy Guard (Fitzroy) and Stuart Maxfield (Richmond) became important players in their respective teams.

No doubt the finalists at the end of this season will be littered with new players who will continue the progression.

Essendon unearthed a handful of new stars during their successful Foster's Cup night series campaign. James Hird, Joe Misiti and Mark Mercuri may well be prominent names come September.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All three, members of the successful Cup grand final team, have had solid groundings in the reserves competition, which may be the reason for their solid contributions to the night series flag.

One young player who should have an impact on the AFL this year is Footscray's John Ballantyne, who made his debut in 1990, but has played only 15 games.

With his great pair of hands, accurate kick and good recovery, he has all the makings of a great full-forward.

Mark Fraser, in his 14 games during his debut season with Collingwood last year, showed he has the ability to become an outstanding wingman.

...and there are plenty of stars

With pace to burn and stamina, Fraser could test the West Coast Eagles Norm Smith Medallist Peter Matera, provided his development continues.

Rookie Carlton big man Rohan Welsh also played 14 games last year, mainly in a forward pocket, from where he kicked 28 goals.

He will be aiming to improve on that total to take pressure off Blues skipper Stephen Kernahan.

YOUNG STAR

My prediction for "find of the year" is 198cm ruckman Shaun Rehn, from the Adelaide Crows.

At 22 years of age and with 26 AFL games behind him, Rehn can develop into one of the premier ruckmen in the AFL.

He has shown in less than two seasons, that he can dominate the hit-outs against more experienced opponents, enabling the Crows small men to get first use of the ball.

Without new talent entering an AFL club, a team becomes static and even predictable.

Young players can inject enthusiasm and flair into a club and can even help experienced players to become more focused on the task ahead.

With the new season about to kick off, no doubt some exciting and raw talents will emerge to become important factors in deciding the '93 flag.



Bears stumble deeper in woods

PERSISTENT calls for concessions in various forms by the Brisbane Bears should be ignored.

They no longer deserve the privilege of extra help after the shemozzle they made of the March draft.

Those who advocate the need for successful interstate clubs to ensure the future of the national competition have long supported the view that both Sydney and Brisbane deserved extra help to form a competitive player base.

Help from the AFL Commission came through extra draft choices in November and again in March, but the Bears have abused the privilege.

In their quest to secure Nathan Buckley, arguably the best player outside the AFL last season, they have lost the plot.

Understandably, they had to trim players from their list to make room for the high-priced recruit, but it is difficult to fathom the reasoning behind the axing of former Claremont century goalkicker John Hutton.

A little more than 12 months ago, Hutton was in the same position as Buckley. He was the No.1 draft pick in Australia, but after a solid start to his career, he was sent packing.

UNFAIR CASUALTY

A club which has struggled to win games since its inception surely must have other "dead wood" it can lop.

And Hutton was not the only unfair casualty.

Brendon Retzlaff had done little wrong in his first year in AFL ranks, Mark Zanotti deserved better treatment after a few years af dedicated service and Matthew Ahmat is a player who has shown promise.

Not surprisingly then has it been with trepidation that top-flight players have moved to Queensland after being drafted by the Bears.

It was argued that until top draftees bit the bullet and played with the struggling Bears, they would never become stronger.



during the off-season to promote stability within their ranks — they even have eroded their depth.

If the West Coast Eagles are to be

If the West Coast Eagles are to be used as a role model for their struggling interstate cousins, then Brisbane are definitely on the wrong tangent.

The Eagles have adopted a policy of recruiting youngsters with a view to the future, rather than for short-term results and that means a steady flow of quality rookies ready to take their places in the AFL arena.

By dropping a player of Hutton's ability off their list, the Bears must surely have lost support within the AFL administration.


They were correct in doing everything in their power to secure Buckley, but in Hutton they cast adrift the wrong player.

The Bears have seen quality recruits like Darren Jarman refuse to play for them and they gave up the fight, releasing to other clubs players with the capacity to put them on the AFL map.

A successful national competition is dependent on strong interstate clubs and the Bears have rarely got it right in the past seven years.

Unfortunately, they did not have the correct formula when they started with mainly rejects from other clubs as well as a handful of emerging players.

But they have been given the chance to make something of themselves after their disadvantaged start to AFL life and they have blown it.

THE 1993 Australian Football League season kicks off this weekend with seven matches in two States played over three days.

In the next 26 weeks, 300 matches will be played across five States — all seeking the one target ... a berth in the finals in September initially and then that ultimate grand final day at the Melbourne Cricket Ground on the last Saturday in September.

The McIntyre Final Six System will again sort out those last six teams as they contest the three weekends of finals to determine who will be the last two standing for the September 25 rendezvous that will produce untold elation in one of the camps.

That feeling of triumph was experienced by the West Coast Eagles and their tens of thousands of fans last season; for the first time in Victorian football history, after 95 previous grand finals, their precious premiership cup was lifted from its resting place at the MCG and taken across the Nullarbor to a new home.

Now, six months later, 14 other clubs have schemed ways and means of depriving the West Coasters of their prize.

The challenges are going to come thick and fast.

We've alreay seen what Kevin Sheedy has done to his young Essendon side, who, along with Richmond have emphasised their improvement by surviving to the final of the Foster's Cup pre-season series, while clubs like Melbourne, Footscray, Geelong and St Kilda will not be far away from the upper echelon.

The challengers are looming

And outside of Victoria, the momentum is building for the Adelaide Crows.

The league's newest kids on the block, they have now had two seasons to iron out the wrinkles and the word from the City of Churches is that Adelaide won't be showing any charity to rivals this season — at home or away.

There will be upsets from plenty of directions . . . the financially troubled Fitzroy have backed a winner with their poker machines and will be spurred on to further success on the field; Richmond have discovered a new lease of life with the return of one of their own in John Northey to coach; Melbourne have gone to South Australia to recruit a West Australian in Neil Balme as their mentor; North Melbourne have discarded one of their most famous sons in Wayne Schimmelbusch in favour of another local product in Denis Pagan to coach; Footscray showed last year that they are sick of being treated like western suburbs outcasts — and all of those sides plan to improve enough to challenge for the final six.

Geelong, the losers last year for the second time in two recent attempts, are the quiet achievers from down the Victorian coast and Malcolm Blight is happy to keep their aspirations out of the main-stream Melbourne media.

Hawthorn, the power-brokers of recent years, seem

even more disciplined under the highly-astute Alan Joyce; Collingwood's playing skill will jump up a couple of notches with some fine recruiting by Leigh Matthews and while St Kilda coach Ken Sheldon will obviously play most of his cards from the Tony Lockett pack, the Saints do have some electrifying players — mainly from the West.

The dogged Footscray Bulldogs will be inspired by their tenacious leader Terry Wheeler to survive just a little longer in September, while Carlton's veteran David Parkin will again rely on his coaching expertise to find the holes in the opposition defences — and he certainly has the skilled players to do that.

Fitzroy's Robert Shaw has seen several modern miracles happen at his club in recent days and even the departure of their ace goalkicker in Richard Osborne hasn't dented their enthusiasm.

Interstate, WA's proud product in Gary Buckenara is still coming to grips with life in the harbour city—and it's certainly not as rewarding as he deserves—while the genuine coaching style of Robert Walls is still failing to instil a similar approach in the players, who have moved out of their Gold Coast holiday home into the traditional Woollongabba Ground and that could instil some serious sporting moods.

In Adelaide, the weather-beaten features of veteran player and coach Graham Cornes are giving nothing away; he has copied the West Coast book of success and knows that he has the players to emulate the Eagles.

Like many interstaters, Cornes believes that the day of an Eagles-Crows grand final is imminent ... and that's an interesting challenge for current King of the Coaches, WA's adopted favourite son, Michael Malthouse.

Plenty of time for 1994 side, says Alexander

THERE is plenty of time to get a second WA-based AFL team up and running before the 1994 season — that's the confident opinion of inaugural West Coast coach Ron Alexander.

Speculation has increased recently that the AFL want a Fremantle team in the competition as soon as next year.

Alexander believes a decision before mid-year would leave organisers with ample time.

He had less than six months to pull together the fledgling Eagles in late 1986 and early 1987 and he believes a Fremantle team could be ready for the first bounce in 1994.

"There is plenty of time to put together a team providing they make a decision by about June and start the planning work," he said.

Leasons learnt from the sometimes painful introduction of the Eagles would be a huge bonus for the new team, he said.

PROBLEMS

Alexander admits the officials behind the orriginal Eagles approached the situation with a "let's get in the competition first and sort out the problems later" attitude that resulted in plenty of teething problems.

While not advocatiog that sort of rush to get a second WA team into the AFL, Alexander believes the time is right for such a move.

"They have to go ahead, there is certainly a demand for it and it would keep local players in the WAFL," he said.

Alexander and the officials behind the original Eagles mght have been treading untested waters, but they did have a few advantages over a prospective Fremantle club.

There was a relatively strong WAFL competition to draw players from, in-

cluding the remarkable Teal Cup crop from 1985 that included Peter Sumich, John Worsfold, Scott Watters, Paul Peos, Guy McKenna, Chris Lewis and Chris Waterman.

There was also a range of sponsors waiting to pour money into the team and a WA public desperate to support a local team in the big arena.

Alexander believes a generous spirited AFL would ease the birth of a Fremantle side.

"If they want the side to be viable the AFL has got to grant some concessions," he said.

They would need priority picks in the November draft for a couple of years and a ban on the recruiting of local players for a similar period.

Just last season talented youngsters Jason and Brett Spinks, Russell Williams, Craig Treleven, Wayne Hernaman and Warren Campbell were snatched from the two Fremantle WAFL clubs by the AFL.

That cannot be allowed to happen again, even if the side is not introduced into the AFL until 1995.

CONCESSIONS

Those concessions could also include the right to approach WA players coming out of contract at other AFL clubs.

Players such as Mark Bairstow, Nicky Winmar, Earl Spalering, Craig Starcevich, Jon Dorotich, John Hutton and Todd Ridley could be interested in returning to WA.

Recently refected Eagles Scott Watters, Stevan Jackson, Paul Peos, Todd Breman and Dean Laidley could also be on the recruiters list.

Although Mick Malthouse and the Eagles officials might argue otherwise,

current West Coast players shouldn't be off limits to the new club.

With John Worsfold set for a long reign as skipper, might Chris Mainwaring be interested in the captains job at a Fremantle club?

He is exactly the sort of high-profile and experienced the new club would need to build its future on.

With the planned reduction in team lists and the large number of West Australians at other clubs, there does seem to be enough talent to support a Fremantle side.

The organisational and financial considerations are the key to the suc-

cess of the new club and as the Eagles proved that is a tough battle to win.

Already the two Fremantle WAFL clubs are pulling in different directions at times.

East Fremantle continue to make the odd claim that the club should be based at East Fremantle Oval when the obvious home has to be Fremantle Oval.

And they also went ahead with the registering of the Fremantle Football Club — a strange move for two clubs about to seek wedded bliss in the sporting world.

MALCOLM Blight's awesome Cats — twice bridesmaids, but not yet brides — are looking to go one better this year.

And to do that the club which rewrote the goalkicking record books in 1992 has made a concerted effort to try and bolster its defence.

Conscious of the Eagles tremendous running power through their ruckrover types, Geelong have also recruited in that direction.

Blight, starting his fifth year as Cats coach, has reached two grand finals—1989 against Hawthorn and last year against the Eagles—and he must be desperate to take that important final step.

Another strategy Blight has employed is to give his men a slightly easier pre-season, conscious that a few senior players struggled at the important end of last year.

Part of Blight's defensive plan is to use the versatile 194cm Barry Stone-ham at centre-half-back and give young Western Australian recruit Stephen O'Reilly the job at full-back.

A half-back line of All-Australian Ken Hinkley, Stoneham and the ruthless Tim McGrath would test the best half-forwards in football.

To counter the loss of Stoneham at centre-half-forward, Blight intends to use former Swan Districts man Steven Handley in the key forward job, with fast-leading Bill Brownless at full-forward.

John Barnes, one of the Cats stars of the finals, will lead the ruck after the retirement, due to constant injury, of Damian Bourke.

Former East Perth ruckman Stephen Hooper missed last year due to knee surgery, but is back with the Cats as possible support for Barnes.

ESSENDON coach Kevin Sheedy — in charge for the 13th year in a row — openly admits his excitement at leading a new crop of Baby Bombers into action.

Sheedy must be experiencing a comforting sense of de jevu, watching his youthful squad show some of the qualities of the Bombers of the early '80s.

That team went on to dominate the decade, playing in three successive grand finals from 1983-85, for two premierships.

Already the Bombers have stamped their mark by winning the pre-season Foster's Cup, after convincing wins over the Brisbane Bears, Adelaide Crows, West Coast and Richmond in the night final.

And one of the heroes of that era, Tim Watson, has re-discovered his hunger for the game and is back with Essendon.

THE FACT that Fitzroy are even in the AFL this season is nothing short of a minor miracle.

"Everyone knows we were five minutes off losing our jobs," said coach Robert Shaw, referring to the mad days in December when the club was facing exctinction.

But the Lions know the best way to stay viable is to win.

Driven by Foster's Cup prizemoney, the Lions dumped Geelong and Footscray before losing to Richmond in a tough semi-final.

They have recruited tireless Collingwood ruckman James Manson, who will add strength to the following division and North Melbourne forward John McCarthy.

The unpredictable McCarthy is capable of wild swings of fortune, but Shaw reckons he is worth the gamble.

After two years learning the hard way, there is a strong feeling in the Crows camp that there is a new, tougher attitude at Football Park.

They have a host of unknown youngsters, but the Crows are expecting big things from tough former Essendon wingman Greg Anderson and former Hawk Matthew Robran.

Anderson and Robran, just 22, are both quality players proven at AFL level, who Cornes can use in a number of trouble spots.

Their acquisition, along with skipper Chris McDermott, and the emerging Shaun Rehn, Jonathon Ross and Mark Bickley, gives the Crows a broader power base to work with.

Robran played just seven games with Hawthorn before standing out of football last year and will obviously be desperate to prove his ability for his home State.

Robran, a former SA defender, could give vital support to Nigel Smart, Ben Hart and Rodrey Maynard, plus the injury-prone Stuart Wigney, recruited from Sydney as a key defender.

Anderson could team up with Andrew Jarman and Simon Tregenza to give the Crows a powerful centreline. Up forward, Scott Hodges — brilliant at times but inconsistent — needs to kick more goals, or his spot could be taken by Tony Modra.


With damaging midfielders Gavin Brown and Tony Francis, the 'Pies have a talented on-ball powerhouse.




The former Falcons captain played strongly in defence and, along with fellow veteran defender Wayne Dayman, adds some experience to the backline.

club systems, with many benefits for members, especially at Subiaco Oval, where car park reserved bays include Eagles matches. The club offers attractive discounts for pensioners.

EXCLUSIVE

There are also exclusive membership package deals within all clubs, offering the business man extra privileges.

West Perth have a Golden Falcons club, which has full membership for two people, use of the VIP function room and two undercover seats with prime viewing.

A pre-match luncheon and afternoon tea, after-match socialising with league players, one car park bay and four special guest passes for the social hall is included and costs \$650.

Permanent or lifetime membership is also available from most clubs.

East Perth offer a range of exclusive memberships, especially with their Loton's Club, formerly the Businessmen's Association.

Loton's Club options include reserved car parking, two season tickets for all home games, two reserved seats in the VIP area, bar facilities, afternoon tea at home games and personal badges, starting from \$250.

Business people can also have extra club memberships, internal or ground signs and additional reserved car parking bays.

Swan Districts have an exclusive membership called Silver Swan for \$500.

It includes a full membership to the club with membership ID card, invitations to watch the game from the Percy Bright-Haydn Bunton Lounge, car parking, lunch, pre-match drinks, afternoon tea and post-match drinks.

The Silver Swan package also includes an undercover reserved seat at the WAFL final series.

EAGLES DEAL

Swan Districts also offer a joint Swan Districts-Eagles membership which includes admission to all Swans and Eagles home games, plus membership to both clubs.

Clubs have special fund-raising groups such as Claremont's brick donations wall, where you can have a bronze (\$100), silver (\$200) or gold (\$500) plaque with your name in the members' lounge.

Perth have a Rovers Club (\$300), which includes two memberships and home game season passes, reserved car parking, seats in the sponsors lounge and two invitations to the president's luncheon and pre-match drinks.

South Fremantle also have gymnasium membership, including use of the changerooms for \$169 a year, or \$10 a month for members, \$20 a month for non-members.

THE old days of country zoning loyalty are certainly being shifted around as obvious changes to those rules and regulations loom on the rural horizon.

So it was interesting to read his recent comments about the AFL draft, when he revealed behind-the-scenes wheeling and dealing with clubs, so far un-named.

Sheahan implied that there had been the usual "arrangements" between clubs, including a planned St Kilda move to call up Essendon veteran Tim Watson thwarted by just four draft picks as the Bombers recalled their hero.

Sheahan suggested that the draft was "an exercise in shocks, intrigue, money, drama and folly".

He also said some things never change in football!

Go to a modern primary school on a Friday afternoon and you will see girls and boys having a go at basketball, netball, softball, tee-ball, hockey, soccer, tennis, softcross, kanga cricket or Aussie footy. This is, of course, a very good thing.

The challenge for the national game is to maintain a position of prominence in a crowded field.

INNOVATION

Last year saw the birth of the Scooter's Shield, an innovation of the Football Development Trust aimed at promoting football in primary schools.

The idea is simple — neighbouring schools of similar size got together to play home-and-away games in groups of two or three or more.

This sort of thing has been going on for years. However, the differences are subtle, but important.

Firstly, the Scooter's Shield is backed by the FDT and sponsor, Healthways and has the support of the WAFL clubs.

The second important ingredient is the points system.

Points are awarded in each game for presentation, sporting behaviour and the result. Points are deducted for poor behaviour.

An example of the emphasis is that

winning a game is worth three points, while the penalty for a team who has a player sent off is four points.

The results have been encouraging, teachers have been very positive in their responses, while kids have mentioned that playing Scooter's Shield is fun and that it's good to play in games where there are no arguments or fights.

The success of the Shield's implementation has caused many in the football world to began thinking aloud. One of the ideas that has been raised is that schools could take a more pivotal role in junior football, possibly even replacing community based situations in some cases.

The use of high schools as focal points in junior football cells has also been muted. WAFL, amateur and Sunday clubs could all be linked to high schools and thus give kids an idea of where they can go in the game after their junior years.

Some refinments have been made to the organisation of the Scooter's Shield for 1993, but it essentially remains the same.

About 200 schools are expected to be involved — a rise of around 30 from last year.

While some accomplishments in junior football can go unnoticed, the Scooter's Shield has been notable.

It's worth remembering that kids are the future of the game, if they understand and enjoy it now then the future will be bright.
