



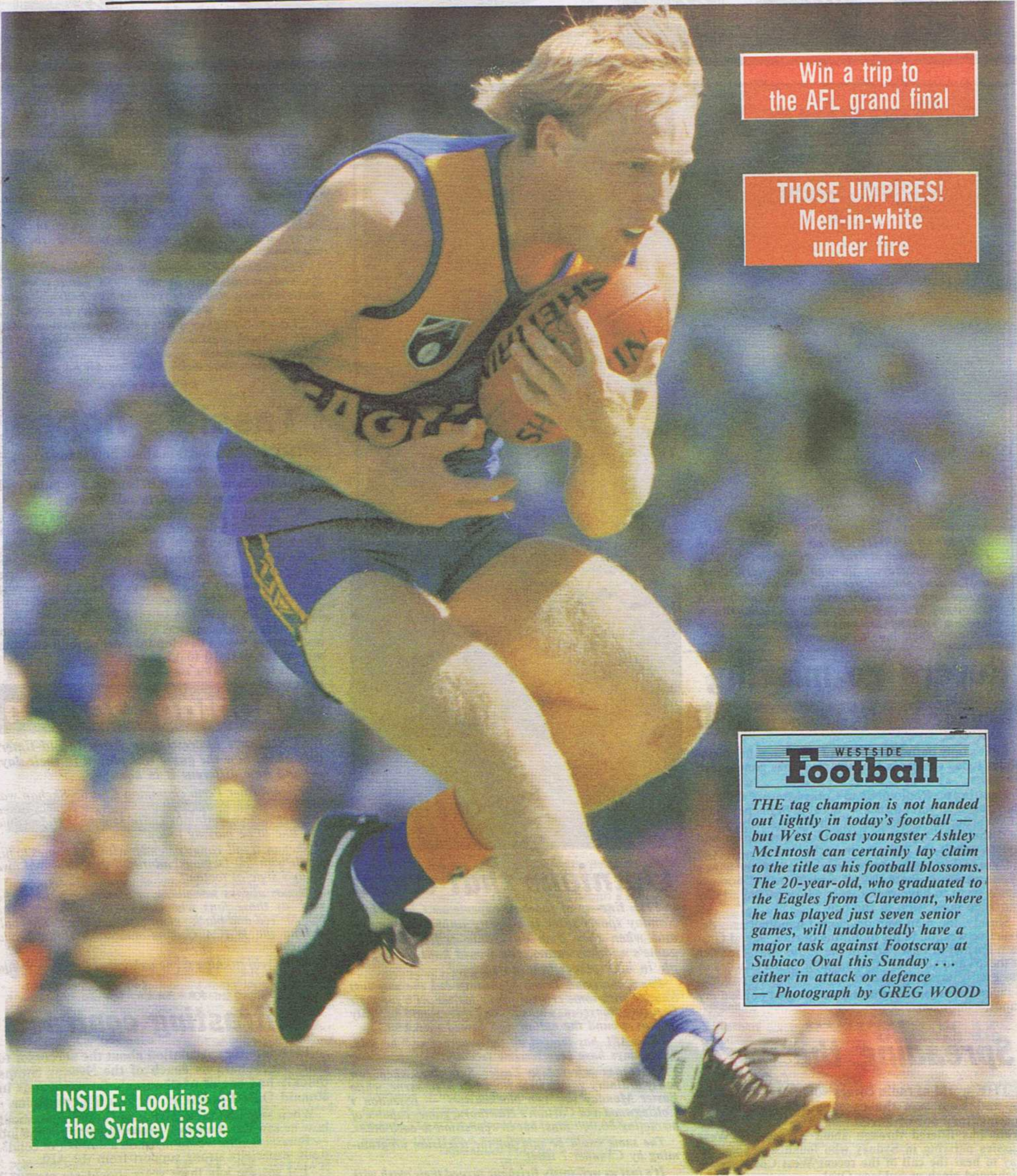

Rovers go missing

JACK Sheedy is very definitely one of the game's real characters — and a true rover from a bygone era.

So it's only natural that one of the things he misses about today's game is that the rover has gone out of business.

Chatting on Radio 6NR to Colin Minson, the man they called Reverend Jack — because of his penchant of swearing his innocence on a bible at a tribunal — said that the rapport between today's ruckmen and rovers wasn't the same as in earlier eras.

"You don't see rovers reading the ball off the hands of the ruckmen these days," said Sheedy. "Today's teams seem to have ruck-rovers who just run all day and keep possession of the ball."

Sheedy, the man who developed handball as a destructive weapon in his moulding of ruck legend Graham Farmer at East Perth in the 1950s, was a master of the art and admitted that a couple of his coaches in those early days tried to curb his love of hand-passing.

"One coach told me that I should have boots on my hands," he joked.

Spreading the word

THE world of radio covers some vast distances — and such was the case with a recent 6PR commentary out of Perth.

Word has filtered through about a group of West Aussies partying in Sydney who found an expensive way to hear the call of the recent West Coast versus Richmond clash at Subiaco Oval.

Opinions that count

THE line-up of football experts on Channel 7's Sunday sports show is a pretty impressive one — and when they dish out some criticism to the game's administrators, you would hope those people in high places take note.

Panel chairman Bruce McAvaney led the way last Sunday with some critical words for the AFL for their fixturing over recent weeks . . . and there would be plenty of fans around the nation who agreed with him.

"The AFL has messed up the programme," he said. "Saturdays have been terrible recently."

McAvaney referred to Easter Saturday, when two fairly ordinary games were staged in Melbourne, while Easter Monday saw two blockbusters — Essendon v Collingwood and Carlton v Hawthorn; games capable of attracting 80,000 fans, but in opposition to each other.

The same could be said for the television programming by Channel 7 itself.

It's just as well lowly Brisbane turned their clash with powerful Geelong into a thriller, because, on paper, it didn't have anywhere near as much attraction as the other two games last Sunday — Carlton and St Kilda, or Melbourne and Adelaide, both of which were just packaged highlights on Seven.

Real re-enactment

THE Anzac Day battle between East Fremantle and Claremont was a worthy way to celebrate 40 years of action on East Fremantle Oval.

With plenty of reminiscing before the game; heaps of fierce action and tough pressure during the match, it was only natural that the finish should be clouded in controversy, with umpiring decisions marring the final outcome.

But Radio 6PR's commentator Percy Johnson — who featured prominently in that 1953 game when Old Easts, as many still like to call the blue-and-whites, won by two points — was full of praise for the match.

"I doubt if I've seen a better AFL game in recent times with as much pressure and physical approach as that game," said Johnson — a feeling that was endorsed by rival commentator Keith Slater on 6WF.

Tassie's hopes

THE eternal question about how many teams — and where they should come from — the AFL's national league can sustain is often a popular topic on 6WF's Saturday sports talk show.

While Keith Slater continually pumps his policy of less-teams-in-Melbourne, co-critic Geoff Christian has also gone to bat for the other States.

He threw in an interesting suggestion when he said that Tasmania warranted a side and while that idea has been mooted before, it's gone cold a little, what with Fitzroy failing to generate much interest in a couple of recent sorties to play in the Apple Isle.

However, Christian was also adamant that Brisbane and Sydney would develop into strong football States within the next 10 to 15 years.

Dashing Demon

IT'S always interesting to listen to old-timers talk about how the game was played in their days — and how different it is now.

When former Perth champion Charlie Skehan was interviewed on Radio 6NR on Saturday, he was asked the inevitable question by Colin Minson: "How would you like to be playing today?"

Skehan, a tall, rangy defender with 180-games to his credit with the Demons, admitted that he would love today's style of football.

"I was always something of a running player," he said, as those fans who can clearly remember the No. 23 red-and-black guernsey bouncing the ball around the WACA Ground numerous times would confirm.

"It's a real running game today and I think it would suit me."

Contrasting contracts

THE intense speculation about the successor to Gary Buckenara as coach of the Sydney Swans quickly had one of Melbourne's favourite sons in Ronald Dale Barassi as the leading contender.

When asked on radio 6NR early in the week about how he saw the challenge — assuming he got the job — Barassi said he would insist on a number of conditions, especially strong support from the AFL.

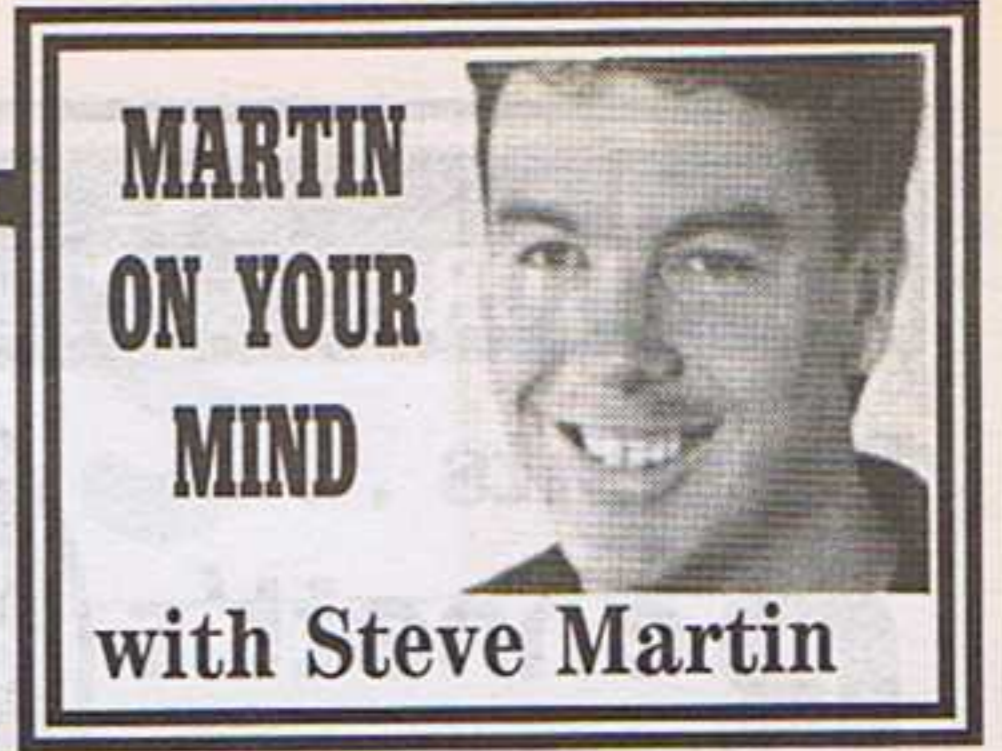
"If I got the job, three years should see me out," Barassi said. "But if we got into the finals, who knows."

Barassi said that if he didn't get the job — if it went to someone in the younger age group — they should be given a five-year contract.

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New coach must buck the odds



As soon as they retire, they head back to Melbourne so they can go to real football matches at weekends. Some — like Barry Mitchell and Ben Doolan — rush back to Melbourne even before their careers are finished. Tom Hafey, Ron Barassi, Allan Jeans and Mal Brown all rolled into one would struggle to lift the Swans out of the mire the way they have been travelling in the past few seasons. The problem is much greater than just the coach. Mick Malthouse is given much of the credit for turning the Eagles into a tougher and more disciplined unit since his arrival at the club three seasons ago. Rightly so, but would Malthouse and the Eagles have achieved such success if an equally competent management team had not arrived at about the same time as the Victorian coach.

RON BARASSI — or whoever gets the job as Sydney coach — will be hard-pressed to turn around the fortunes of the struggling Swans.

The new coach certainly won't succeed without major changes at the top of the Swans administration.

After all, the same people who gave Gary Buckenara the job are holding interviews for his replacement.

If those football master-minds thought Buckenara was capable of leading the Swans down the path to glory, then perhaps they are not up to making another important decision this time around.

Maybe Buckenara was a good coach placed in a hopeless situation.

Judging by attendances at the SCG, the Sydney public don't care much

about the Swans, the local media don't care, even the players don't seem to care at times.

The highly-paid Simon Minton-Connell has formed such an attach-

ment to the Swans that he lives in Melbourne.

A meeting of the past Swans players who live in Sydney could be held in a phone box.

General manager Brian Cook and football manager Trevor Nisbett are the behind-the-scenes men responsible for steering the Eagles.

Cook and Nisbett, with a capable and co-operative board of directors, have transformed the Eagles into a professionally run sporting organisation.

They helped turn the Eagles from a thrown together bunch of players without a home into a football club.

No quick solution to second AFL team

THE WAFL is facing a crisis and the eight league clubs have to decide whether they want to change the structure of their competition before it arrives — or after.

The crisis will take the shape of the introduction of the second WA-based AFL team, either in 1994 or 1995.

Attendance figures are likely to be even harder hit if an AFL game is played in WA every weekend.

The WA Football Commission knows the WAFL is set for another period of upheaval and is doing its best to rush country teams into the competition next season.

STRONG PUSH

Armed with a favourable independent report supporting the move, WAFC chairman Peter Tannock is making a strong push to include Bunbury and Kalgoorlie in 1994.

Tannock warned that the WAFL competition needed to spread its wings otherwise it would decline.

The report, prepared by Dalton Gooding and Graham Keys from ac-

countants Ernst and Young, makes interesting reading.

They support the introduction of country clubs because "their attraction to members, sponsors and supporters will be in areas not currently accessed to the same extent by existing WAFL clubs".

Several population centres — like Armadale-Kelmscott and Mandurah — are not represented by a WAFL team.

Both are much closer to Subiaco Oval than Kalgoorlie and both — especially Mandurah — are certain to grow.

It is ludicrous that the entire south-east region of the metropolitan area is excluded from the WAFL competition.

The WAFC says it wants to take the game to the people.

Well, if you live south of Midland

and east of Victoria Park you would have a tough time finding a WAFL match being played in your suburb.

The report found that "WAFL clubs are finding it increasingly difficult to obtain members, sponsorship and to raise money generally".

It is difficult to see how including country teams in the WAFL will improve that situation.

But Gooding and Keys have an answer — the WAFC can simply hand over more money to keep the competition alive.

The report makes a couple of other amusing suggestions.

They admit that the "effect on the future of playing strength of the competition and of the proposed clubs is a major concern to the commission, the existing clubs, the proposed clubs and the WA Country Football League".

Their solution: "These concerns can

only be overcome by adequate consultation between all parties".

It seems like fairly simple mathematics. If you have more teams in the same population, you weaken the strength of the competition.

Surely, they do not think that talking about it magically uncovers another 50 or so WAFL-standard players running about without a team to play for.

In the long-term, having country teams to compete against will force metropolitan clubs to look harder at their local zones and that is probably a good thing.

But a 10-team competition will always be weaker than an eight-team one.

The arrival of country teams in the WAFL seems inevitable and the WAFC appears determined to have them in before the AFL further spreads its tentacles west.

Best not always most popular

PICKING the best league side over several decades is a dangerous challenge.

The combination you come up with will never please everyone, as East Perth found last year when they performed the exercise.

How could Don Langdon and Paul Seal not make the best 20 and how could Dobbie Graham be squeezed onto the interchange bench?

But as the Royals found, you cannot fit three into two, as was the case with the wingmen when Derek Chadwick and Frank Allen got the nod ahead of Seal and if you put Mal Brown at centre-half-forward, then someone had to be a casualty, in this case Langdon.

As for the back pocket, it would have been a toss up between Graham and Steve Curtis who won the approval of the team selectors.

Perhaps all three could have been included.

Seal was a creative wingman feeding off Polly Farmer handballs, Langdon was a far more skilful player than his nephew, Karl, and Graham was one of the toughest players to wear a pair of footy boots.

Claremont are about to perform a similar exercise and as one of those who has been asked to be on the panel, I'm well aware that it will be no easy task.

BEST POST-WAR

The Monts are looking to select their best post-war side.

Four separate panels will each pick 30 players from different eras, the 1940s-50s, '60s, '70s and '80s-90s.

The judges will then reduce the 120 players to 60 and the club will run a competition to select the 20 the judges eventually settle on.

The players initially chosen will be entertained at home games, with a gala function at the club before the finals when the star team and winner will be named.

The Monts, like other WA clubs, have had their memorable moments, none more so than their 1964 premiership win.

The drama started weeks before the finals as West Perth and Claremont vied for a spot in the top four.

The Cardinals, as they were then known, had a spot in the four sewn up, but lost nail-biting finishes in successive weeks by four points to give the Monts a chance to make the finals for the first time since 1952.

Claremont fans will never forget Kevin Clune's 100m dash into a howling gale at Fremantle Oval to kick the goal that sealed the match against South Fremantle.

FINALS SHOWDOWN

That set up a showdown in the last qualifying match with West Perth for fourth place.

Even more memorable were Ian Brewer's two goals after the 30-minute mark of the last quarter to snatch the grand final by four points from East Fremantle.

But these players may not squeeze into the Monts all-star side.

Two likely hot topics of conversation for Claremont's all-stars side will be the rucks and rovers.

The choices for two ruckmen would fall between Graham Moss, John McIntosh, Les McLements and Allen Mycock.

And the Tigers have never been short on quality rovers. While Jim and Phil Krakouer seem the obvious choices, Bruce Duperouzel, Les Mumme and John Parkinson were no slouches.

The 1981 premiership side will stay in many people's minds because of the Krakouers and the fiery opening to the grand final against South Fremantle when Basil Campbell let everyone know at the first bounce that he was not there to play tiddly winks.

Assessing players from different eras is never easy and picking the Monts best team over five decades should be no different.

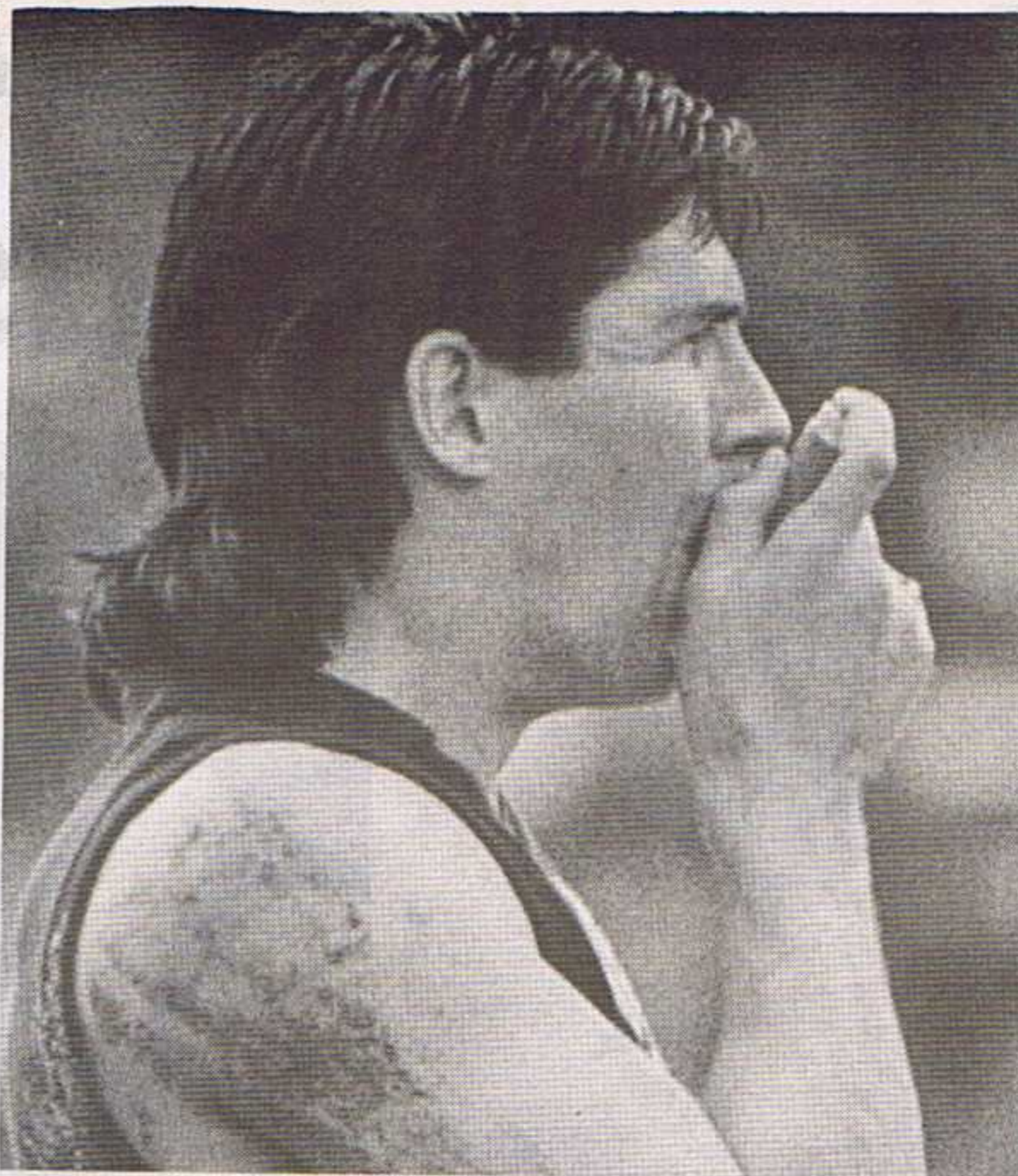
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TOP BLUE . . . Carlton's Stephen Kernahan is a man to rely on in a tight situation and a great leader on the field

Star forwards hold the keys

NOTHING is more pleasant to a supporter's eye than watching his team's centre-half-forward in full flight.

Two champion players who have performed near their peak in the hardest position on the field for the first part of the season are Carlton's Stephen Kernahan and North Melbourne's Wayne Carey.

Both captain their respective clubs and the pair have shown the value of an in-form key position forward.

Carey is the player behind the Kangaroos great start to the season.

Not only is he getting his hands on the football, but he seems to be able to bring Norths smaller players into the game, by using perhaps his greatest asset — strength.

He is giving his smaller teammates extra time and space in which to deliver the ball.

He has taken on the club captaincy this year at only 21 years of age, which may have been seen as a risk by the Kangaroo match committee.

But, if anything, Carey has become an even better player with this added responsibility, as his 20 goals from five matches indicates.

RESPONSIBLE

Kernahan has developed into perhaps the most influential player in the AFL.

More than once this year, he has been solely responsible for Carlton's fortunes.

His kick out of bounds after the siren against Essendon in round 2 resulted in the Blues drawing with the Dons, but his late goal the next week against Hawthorn was a match-winner.

The Blues certainly look for their champion forward in times of crisis.

Over the years he has developed an impressive resume in terms of performing well under pressure.

Blues fans will take a long time to forget his kick after the siren in the final home-and-away match against North Melbourne at Waverley Park in 1987.

The goal from a difficult angle put Carlton into the second semi-final and they eventually won the grand final.

It would be difficult to name another player who has had the ball in his grasp as often as Kernahan when the result of a game is in the balance.

He seems to thrive on the added pressure of his performance alone being the deciding factor in his team's success.

Champions of the game have all played this way and Kernahan is no exception.

Both Carey and Kernahan are central figures in deciding where their clubs finish this season.

Opposition coaches will try to curb their brilliance — few will succeed.

It's also a good chance to see close up the young talent that is coming up through the club, under new coach Mark Watson and some of the older heads, like Brad Hardie, who started with the Bulldogs when I was a teenager.

THIS Sunday is a big one for us against Footscray. They showed last year they are a top-line side.

They may not be as powerful or traditionally strong as the giants of the AFL — Hawthorn, Carlton or Collingwood — but few sides play it tougher than the scrapping Bulldogs.

They will be desperate to repeat their demolition of us on that terribly wet day at the Western Oval last year, which all of us would like to forget.

But, hopefully conditions here on Sunday will suit us a bit better than that day.

The Scraggers have started this year in much the same form as they showed for most of last year and had a good win over Essendon last weekend.

A lot of people are saying we haven't been particularly impressive so far this year and we have been playing a bit within ourselves at times.

12-year loss record on line for Hawks

HAWTHORN, after consecutive losses to Carlton and Geelong in five days, are confronted with another difficult task on Friday night when they play the Adelaide Crows at Football Park.

The Hawks last lost two matches in five days six years ago.

On Easter Monday, 1987, they lost to Footscray at the Western Oval and then by 12 points to the Eagles the next Saturday.

It is nearly 12 years since the Hawks last lost three consecutive matches in a season — to Richmond, Geelong and Fitzroy in rounds 16 to 18, 1981.

The Hawks lost to Melbourne in round 22 and the elimination final of 1990 and to the Crows in their debut game in the AFL the next season.

Hawthorn are one of six clubs yet to win at Football Park. The Crows have won 16 of the 24 games at home.

GEELONG star Gary Ablett on Sunday became only the 18th player to kick 600 goals in the AFL.

Ablett's tally stands at 601 goals from 169 games, including his six with Hawthorn.

He is Geelong's second-highest goal-kicker, with 592 goals from 163 games, second to Doug Wade, who kicked 834 goals in 208 games.

SUNDAY'S loss to Geelong was the Brisbane Bears first defeat by one point.

The Bears have only one win by a point in their 137 AFL matches — against Footscray at Carrara in round 7, 1988.

NORTH MELBOURNE are sitting in top place on the AFL ladder for the first time since round 2 of last year.

After a bye in round 1 last year, a 66-point win over Richmond lifted the

Kangaroos to the top of the AFL ladder.

The previous time the Kangaroos headed the ladder was at the end of the qualifying rounds in 1983.

ALLAN SCALISE, of Dalkeith, has asked who is the oldest player to represent the West Coast Eagles.

Assistant coach and runner Robert Wiley was 32 years, 159 days old when he last wore the Eagles jumper in an AFL game in 1987.

Ross Glendinning was two weeks short of his 32nd birthday when he captained the Eagles in the 1988 elimination final.

Dwayne Lamb, who has played 135 AFL games, is the only other Eagles player aged 31 or more.

PERTH is the first WAFL club this century to start a season with four matches decided by less than a goal.

The total margin in the Demons four games this season is only 12 points.

The last team to start a season with three matches decided by less than a goal was Swan Districts in 1962.

A five-point loss in round 1 was followed by a two-point win in round 2 and a three-point loss in round 3.


In 1944, West Perth won their opening match by four points, lost in round 2 by five points and drew with South Fremantle in round 3.

Let's blow whistle on poor umpires

FORGET about the entry of country teams; forget about a second AFL team from WA and forget about relocating WAFL clubs.

The more urgent problem of poor umpiring needs the immediate attention of the game's administrators.

The standard of umpiring in this State has reached crisis point and no longer can everyone turn a blind eye to the men in white.

Umpires are wrecking games and twice in two weeks the whistle blowers have influenced the outcomes of matches.

Last week, Westside Football editor Alan East made strong statements about the impact of the umpires after Claremont snatched a draw with East Perth.

EMBARRASSING

Luck may have been with the Tigers in that game, but it deserted them at East Fremantle Oval last Sunday.

The Tigers could justifiably feel robbed after an embarrassing performance by umpires Ray Zoch and Trevor Garrett.

Not only did they dish out a couple of dubious 50-metre penalties in the last quarter, but one glaring shove in the back in the goal square, which set up the East Fremantle comeback, went unnoticed.

With Claremont still leading by four goals, Damien Condon was caught behind Tigers defender Mark Brayshaw.

It was no subtle nudge out which allowed Condon to mark five-metres from goal — it was a shove with both hands in the middle of the back.

But the umpire in control either was out of position and failed to see the infringement or saw the shove, but chose to ignore it.

So it was hardly surprising that rival coaches Ken Judge and Gerard Neesham both felt the need to confront the umpires and vent their frustrations.

The inconsistency of the whistle blowers was farcical.

Just moments after the Brayshaw incident, Tigers skipper Darrell Panizza held his ground on the half-back flank, but used both hands to fend off an opponent who was backing into him.

He was pinged for a push in the back.

Both men in white turned in shocking performances and if the young umpires have that example to follow, then there is little hope.

Another worrying aspect of Sunday's umpiring performance was that David Johnson, the Director of Umpiring, said on radio 6PR on Monday morning that he was satisfied with the two umpires.

If that's the case and our men in charge don't see umpiring as a major problem, then the issue is a complicated one.

Each week coaches and players become frustrated and it was only a matter of time before one or two of their names went on a report sheet.

Only one WA umpire has been given a taste of AFL football — Grant Vernon — and heaven help us if a couple more are elevated.

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Quill grabs second

AFL chance

EAST Fremantle premiership wingman Peter Quill is headed back to Perth . . . and he's more than happy at the prospect of flying home across the Nullarbor.

Quill is certain to return to Perth as a member of the Footscray side due to battle it out with reigning AFL premiers, West Coast, at Subiaco Oval on Sunday.

And his home-coming will be most satisfying, especially as he was starting to wonder whether he would ever get a crack at AFL ranks.

Before last year's premiership with the Sharks, Quill was doubting if the AFL recruiters would ever approach him.

FRUSTRATION

After rejecting overtures to play in Melbourne at the start of his senior career, he watched with growing frustration as dozens of WA players were given their AFL chances ahead of him.

But after finishing equal second in East Fremantle's fairest and best award and playing a key role in their premiership team, he was again approached — and this time he could not accept quickly enough.

Representing his adopted Footscray for the first time last Saturday, the wingman had a dozen disposals and is now looking forward to another visit to Subiaco Oval.

"My last experiences at Subiaco Oval were great," Quill said, as he reflected on season '92, which saw him play his best football.

"It has good memories as we won two important games there last season to take the premiership.

"But I'll just have to wait and see what happens this week; it would be great to go back home."

Quill's delayed entry to AFL ranks was caused by a hamstringing injury in his first Foster's Cup game against Carlton, in February, which put him on the sidelines for a month.

His father Denis and brother Steve were at the Western Oval for Quill's first game . . . his girlfriend Kathy arrives next month.

"I was rapt to be drafted," Quill said.

"When I found out it was Footscray, I was even happier because they were very professional when I spoke to them before the draft."

BUSINESS DEGREE

Quill says his desire to finish a business degree had stopped him from moving to Melbourne earlier.

"I'd been speaking to AFL clubs since 1988 when I first started, but I was doing my degree and wanted to stay in Perth," he said.

"I guess the first couple of years after

the draft started, clubs picked only players who were keen to go straight away.

"Then it turned a full circle and clubs were interested only in 17, 18 and 19-year-olds.

"I was caught half-way between. I'm 23, not 18 or 19 like lots of guys being drafted. They can afford to stay another year or two."

If he had not been drafted, he thought playing in a Fremantle-based AFL team was a possibility.

"But who knows when that will happen?" he said.

"I didn't want to wait for that. I wanted the opportunity to come over straight away."

Quill, who went onto the ground in

the second quarter to play on a wing, was "reasonably happy" with his debut.

"I got a few touches," he said. "The team as a whole combined well. I don't think that we had any 'down' players."

He had eight kicks and four handballs in 2½-quarters.

"It was certainly different to the night game, with much more atmosphere," Quill said.

"Running out was a big buzz. The crowd made a lot of noise.

"I wasn't as nervous as I thought I would have been because I knew I was starting on the bench and not going straight onto the ground."

Only two players from East Fremantle's premiership side, Quill and Craig Treleven, were drafted last November — but the former Sharks is expecting to see more of his team-mates in the AFL next season.

"Our side wasn't the best on paper, but it was a good blend," says Quill. "Everyone did his job. I think there'll be a few more guys drafted from East Fremantle this year."

THE West Coast Eagles face their toughest test of the season against the improving Footscray at Subiaco Oval on Sunday.

Michael Brennan should return to full-back — after a stint up field — where he will take on in-form spearhead Danny Del'Re.

STRONG DISPLAY

Del'Re kicked six goals against the Bombers and collected 11 marks in a strong display.

Nigel Kellett is likely to be matched by Peter Matera and Brendan Krummel may line-up on former East Fremantle team-mate Peter Quill on a wing.

The inclusion of Chris Lewis, who has been training strongly this week, may be the only change to the Eagles side that beat the Bears.

Eagles have long memories and a win on Sunday will go a long way to erasing the humiliation handed to them when the sides last met at the Western Oval on August 23, last season, when they scrambled just 3.5 in the mud.

Being behind in the tips panel, I decided to go for the Bears, who had beaten Melbourne in their only game at their new home this year.

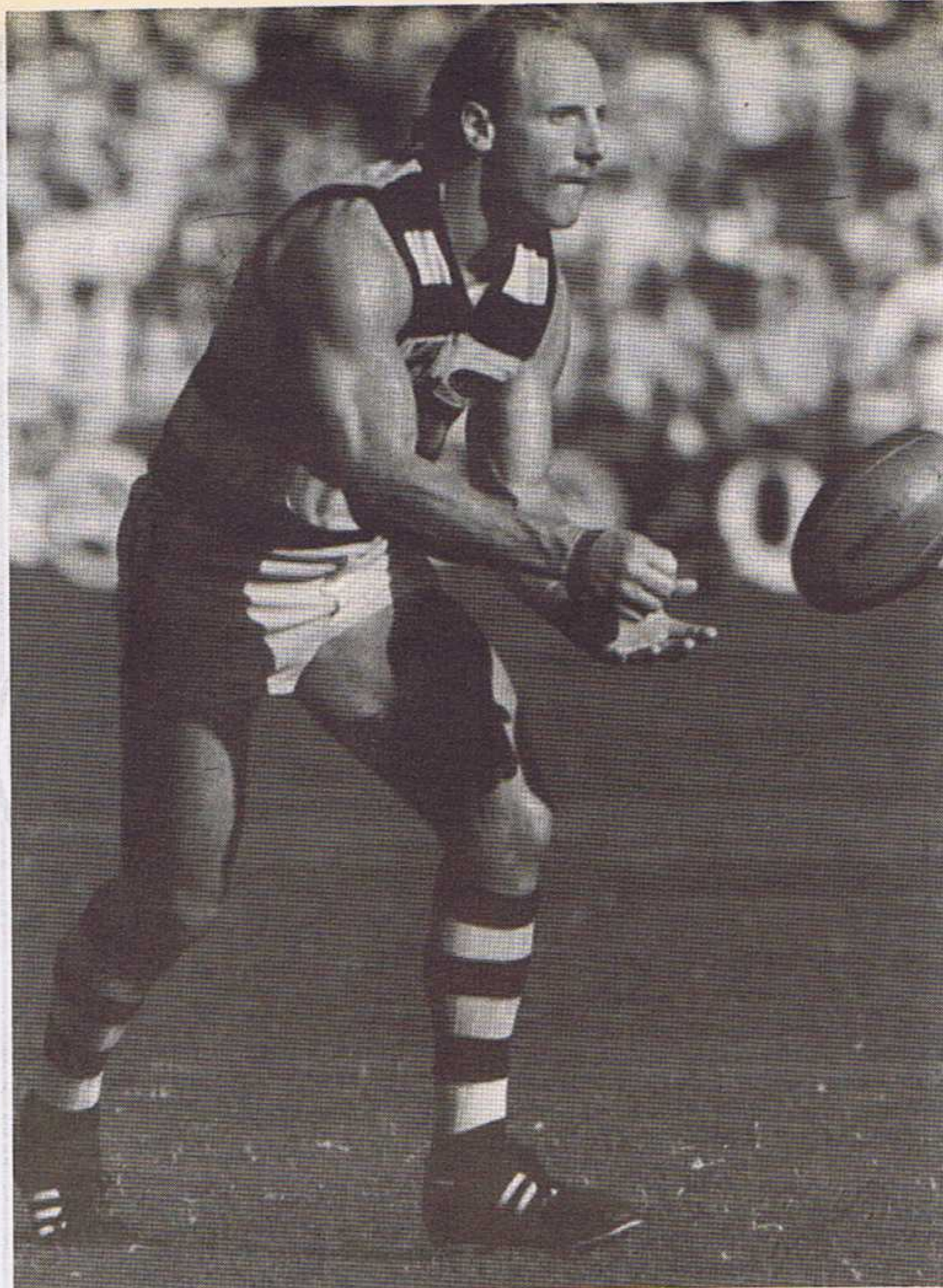
Each time the Cats got away to a handy lead, the new-look Bears fought back courageously and with only minutes to play, they looked like they were going to snatch a remarkable win.

By him standing out of football, there were many losers.

St Kilda were always going to struggle against Carlton without star full-forward Tony Lockett and exciting ruck-rover Robert Harvey, but the absence of Winmar just compounded their problems.

Their loss by 45 points came as no surprise.

Winmar's stance against playing could prove crucial at the end of the season, when the many awards, including the Brownlow Medal, are decided.

And the spectators, who thrive on watching players of Winmar's ability, were robbed of the sight of a superstar in action.

Lions show pride

DESPITE Subiaco's fourth loss in a row on Monday, coach Tony Solin could be well pleased with the endeavour of his players.

The young Lions several times looked dead and buried, but they fought back hard.

EAGLES newcomer Brendan Krummel only played one game in season 1992, but that small taste of the big time made him even more determined to succeed in his second year.

Drafted after 24 games for East Fremantle at pick No. 74 in the 1991 draft, Krummel debuted against Richmond at the MCG in round six, but spent much of the game on the bench.

The Eagles struggled home by a point and Krummel, forced back to the Sharks for the remainder of the season, had to wait until the season-opener before he was given another chance.

"The first goal I set for this season was to play the opening game," said Krummel.

"Now staying in the side and becoming a regular player is my next step."

An outstanding junior, Krummel was one of the leading goalscorers with Karoonda, playing largely in the ruck or at centre-half-forward.

Since debuting with the Sharks in 1990 he has been used in key positions in attack and defence — and in the ruck.

A versatile running player, he has also spent his share of time on a wing. At 188cm, Krummel is tall for a wingman, but he says that often gives him the edge in man-to-man duels.

In the absence of regular wingman Chris Mainwaring, Krummel has played in three of the Eagles first four matches, but he admits that there will be extra pressure for places when players like Mainwaring recover from injury.

"I'm really happy to be playing on a wing," he said.

"There will definitely be pressure on me when Mainy is fit, but that is probably a few weeks away yet," he said.

"All I can do is try and keep performing. I've still got areas to improve on, both touch-wise and with my disposal."

While most Eagles squad members were in Melbourne celebrating last year's premiership, Krummel was watching it on television at a mate's house after playing in East Fremantle's grand final win the previous week.

"The East Fremantle premiership is the highlight of my career so far," he says.

"I'm a little disappointed that I didn't go to Melbourne for the grand final, because a lot of other squad members did."

STREWTH! What are we going to do about these bloomin' umpires?

Once again we've seen the result of a football match decided by an umpiring decision.

Two games, in fact, to put the cogwash on a tremendous weekend of footy.

Those poor battling Brisbane Bears were deprived of victory when the classy Cats from Catsville stole their battle up at the Gabba.

The Cats had certainly shown plenty of class in their performance, but their win had a touch of Tijuana Brass.

Every time the Cats kicked away to a handy lead, the Bears hit back; they never caved in — as they would have done a couple of seasons back — and with just a few minutes remaining, the Brissie boys held a seven-point lead.

But three factors intervened to deprive them of what would have been successive home-town victories — the umpires; little god himself and then the class of a West Aussie.

Little god — that freak Gary Ablett (reported unfairly for laying on a terrific bump) — took a strong mark to goal and level the scores inside the last minute.

But that major came from the generosity of the whistle-blowers, with a soft 50-metres given to Billy Brownless after he had marked deep in defence, only to be hampered by Richard Champion. Anyone with a decent pair of four-n-twenty pies could see that Billy was about to play on and Champion had no alternative but to try and stop him; that's part of the game.

So, Brownless dispatched the ball from the centre instead of the last line of defence, which set up the Ablett mark for the vital sausage roll.

Then, down at East Fremantle Oval on Anzac Day, the umpires must have felt a little like those old diggers as they came under heated fire from both coaches.

Sharks spruiker Ken Judge had his say at three-quarter time — after what he thought were a few bad calls — and then Tigers coach Gerry Neesham got into the umps as his side finished four-point losers, despite leading for most of the match.

Two very dubious 50-metre penalties gave the Sharks shots at goal in the dying minutes; Brad Read missing his chance to kick the winning goal, but Brendan Krummel making sure just two minutes later.

While Neesham was furious with the umpires at being deprived of the premiership points, he must have forgotten the favours from the men-in-white a week earlier when a couple of atrocious decisions let the Tigers salvage a draw with East Perth.

But the bottom line is that there are too many matches being decided by the decision makers — not the players.

As that respected ABC commentator, Keith Slater said when he paid out on the umps in the Sharks-Tigers battle: 'Let the players play the game.'

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McGrath slips easily into new colours

JUST in case football fans needed any confirmation, the word is definitely out — old-fashioned loyalty by a player to one particular club is dead and buried.

The days of a Bill Walker, Mel Whinnen or Bill Dempsey providing their beloved club with dedicated service have been replaced by player swaps, exchanges, trades and, of course, the ferocious draft.

Football today is a game of uncertainty, where only the most optimistic player can predict at the start of his career what colours he will be wearing when the curtain comes down.

AMAZED

But despite this era of player rotations, even the most liberal of football followers would be amazed with the story of Craig McGrath — skipper at East Perth one season, player at Perth the next.

The 29-year-old veteran, who played 58 games at Fitzroy, 15 with the Eagles and 31 with East Perth, completed a remarkable turn of events when he debuted for the Demons against West Perth in Round 3 of the Pepsi Cup competition.

"I guess it's a bit unusual and hasn't happened too many times before," says the affable Victorian who has settled in well as a West Aussie.

Such a move may have been expected from the flamboyant Hayes, but for McGrath, who already fitted into the 'well-travelled player' category, the decision came as a surprise.

"It had become clear late last season that my opportunities would be limited with East Perth this year," says McGrath.

"But I thought it would be good to stick around, put in the work and try and prove a few people wrong by playing league football."

"After playing around with the idea for a while and having a chat to Adrian Barich, who I was friends with from our days at the Eagles, Perth appeared to be a good option."

McGrath said the decision of swapping clubs — and choosing a new home — was one that he weighed up very carefully.

"When thinking about changing clubs, you really have to look at all aspects of that club and see where you might fit into the picture," McGrath says.

"There's not much point moving to a club that's going to win every match if you're not going to get a game and at the same time there's no point joining a team where you can play every game, but they're not going to win any matches."

"In the end, Perth looked like the

middle ground, where I'd be able to fit into the side and at the same time be part of a club that should be fairly competitive."

Since making the switch to the Demons, McGrath has had little trouble fitting in, proving to be a popular member of the squad and providing plenty of help and guidance for the youngsters at Lathlain Park.

PHILOSOPHIES

Coach Ken Armstrong's style and philosophy have also made life fairly comfortable for McGrath.

"Ken's from the old school of coaching, but he is a very good teacher and certainly commands the respect of the players," said McGrath.

"He is very interesting to listen to and has a story for every situation."

Despite losing his place in the Eagles squad, mainly because of knee problems in 1991, McGrath remains on good terms with the players and follows the club's fortunes closely.

Likewise, he says he has no animosity towards the Royals and is just setting his sights on a big season with his adopted club.

"I'll be pretty keen to play well against East Perth and prove that I've still got something to offer, but really I just want to enjoy my footy and keep playing as well as I possibly can," McGrath said.

Maybe that's not his fault; no-one told him before he went on holidays that he was going to be handed Australian sport's toughest job.

But now that he's got the hot seat, let's hope he can get return quickly and put footy back on the right national road.

Latin lover

THERE is little doubt that Chilean-born North Melbourne rover Jose Romero would have been ribbed about his background throughout his football career.

He did, however, have an ally in Channel 7 commentator Peter McKenna after taking a courageous mark in front of goal in the final quarter of last Friday's match against Richmond.

"Jose Romero — he sounds like a Latin lover," the former Collingwood and Carlton champion said.

And when Romero kicked the goal, McKenna had no hesitation in singing his praises.

"The Chilean champion has kicked another one for the 'Roos," McKenna said.

THE Sydney Swans experiment is at a crucial stage of its 11-year history — and this could well be the AFL's last chance to get it right.

Origin is important

GOOD old aunty does a top job telecasting our local football, especially with those cameras lingering on the arena advertising, which is a bonanza for the WAFL clubs.

With the improving standard of the Pepsi Cup matches being beamed into many lounge-rooms around the State, the telecasts are a great advertisement for the game — even if the fans do miss the opening quarter.

But you can always improve, so here's a gentle suggestion for the people down in Adelaide Terrace.

Those little graphics that flash onto the screen every so often to tell the viewers who is doing what and where they have done it before, are very helpful.

But let's get them right.

To say that Willie Dick comes from Essendon — where he played just seven games — and not Goomalling ignores our great rural breeding record.

The same could be said of Shane Cable — he no more 'comes from Subiaco' than the playing field is square. He's as Perth as you can get and the Subiaco experiment was just a brief sleight of hand!

And what about Travis Edmonds — he's a West Coast Eagles squad member; he doesn't 'come from' there. He comes from Guildford Grammar, who are proud producers of many fine young footballers.

A sequence of stumbles and bumbles has left the Swans in a parlous state of tight-rope walking.

They have gone from private owners seeking the high life; to low-key administrators who don't really know club football; to prominent business people and to a mixture of them all ... the Swans have had the lot.

The coaches have come and gone — an original South Melbourne man like Ricky Quade; an aspiring outsider like John Northey; a true-life legend in Tom Hafey; a product from the minor grades in Col Kinnear and finally, a modern-day star turned coach in Gary Buckenara.

That's five coaches in 12 years, not forgetting Bob Hammond, who took over in 1984 when Quade departed.

A sixth coach just has to be the right choice ... and have the correct team behind him.

BIG BACKING

As the leading aspirant in Ron Barassi says, it's no good just putting another coach in there without some enormous backing from the AFL.

The whole project of converting the rugby-mad Harbour City to Aussie Rules — the game Sydneysiders are brought up to hate — was an ambitious task.

It's been left to a variety of people to promote — the local NSW Australian Football League; flamboyant entrepreneurs like the incredible Dr Geoffrey Edelstein; hard-working outsiders who didn't really know the inner-workings of Australia's second biggest city.

The onus of responsibility has been well-shared in the 12-year programme, with the AFL paying lip service from time to time — and injecting money when things got bad.

But, as Barassi says, the Sydney project needs a lot more than that. It needs

Watson survives tough comeback

COMEBACK star Tim Watson has no pre-conceived ideas about how easy — or quick — his comeback to senior football will be.

Speaking on ABC radio after his first football match in 18 months — when he had an interesting spell on Channel 7 as a comments man — Watson admitted to being nervous before the game ... despite those 282 previous AFL performances.

"The next week will be the hardest part of the comeback," he said, acknowledging that there would be some sore parts of his body in the next few days.

PREPARATION

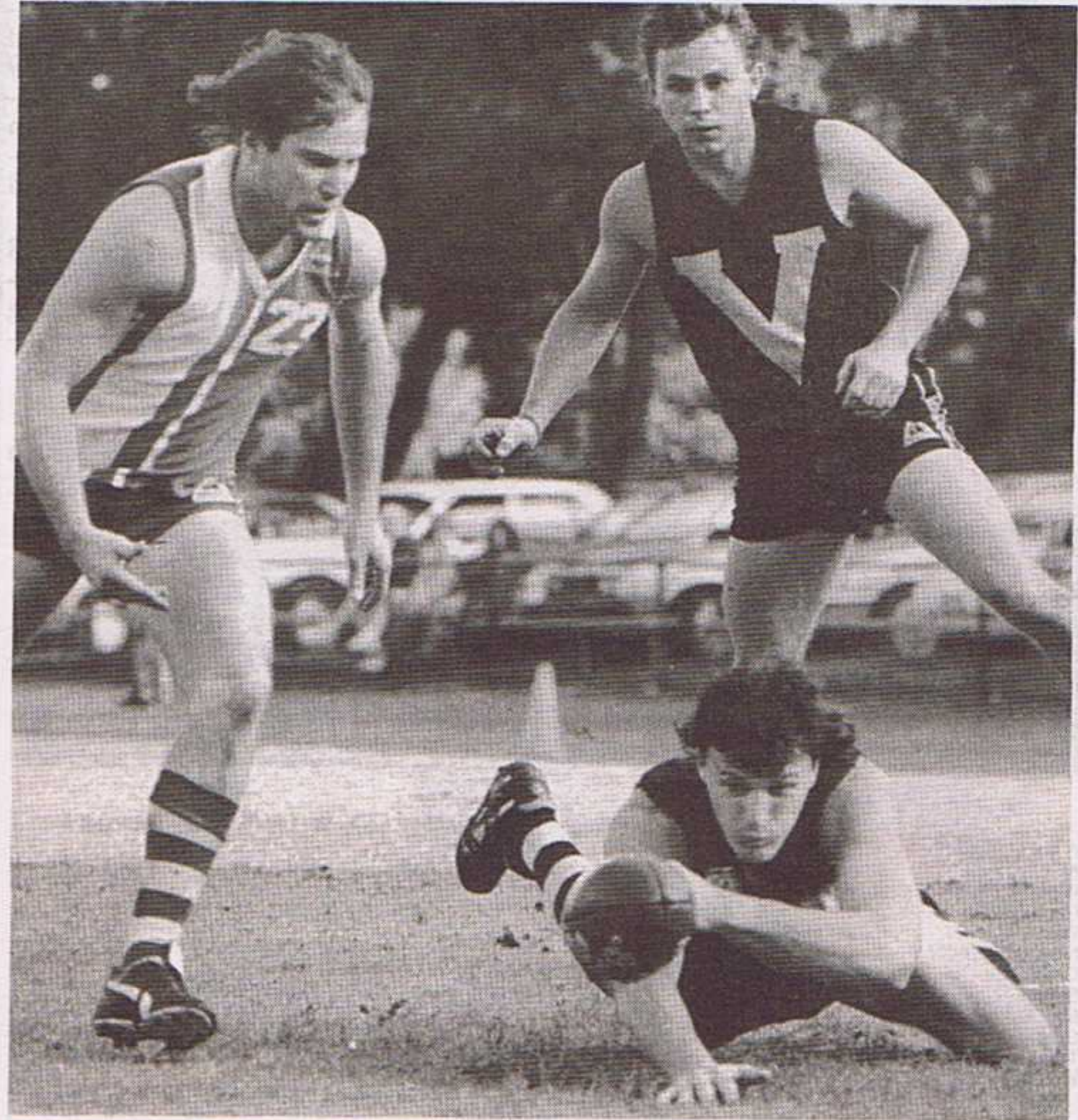
SAINTS GET UP

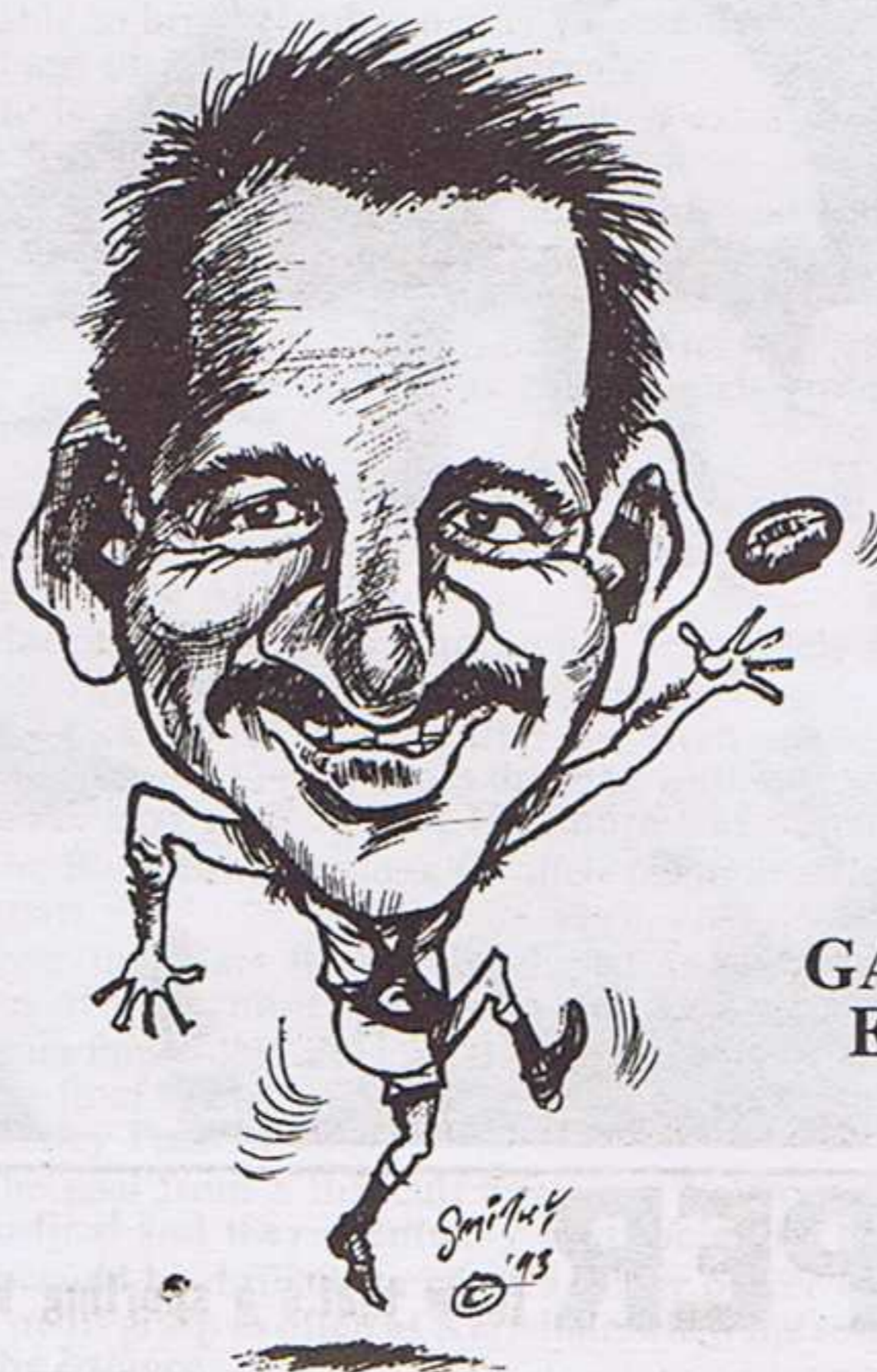
IF every AFL side had a Paul Harding, they would win more games than they lose.
