"Basically, I came back because Swans are like family to me," he said.

AT every game of football, mistakes by both footballers and umpires are highlighted by the men in the commentary box.

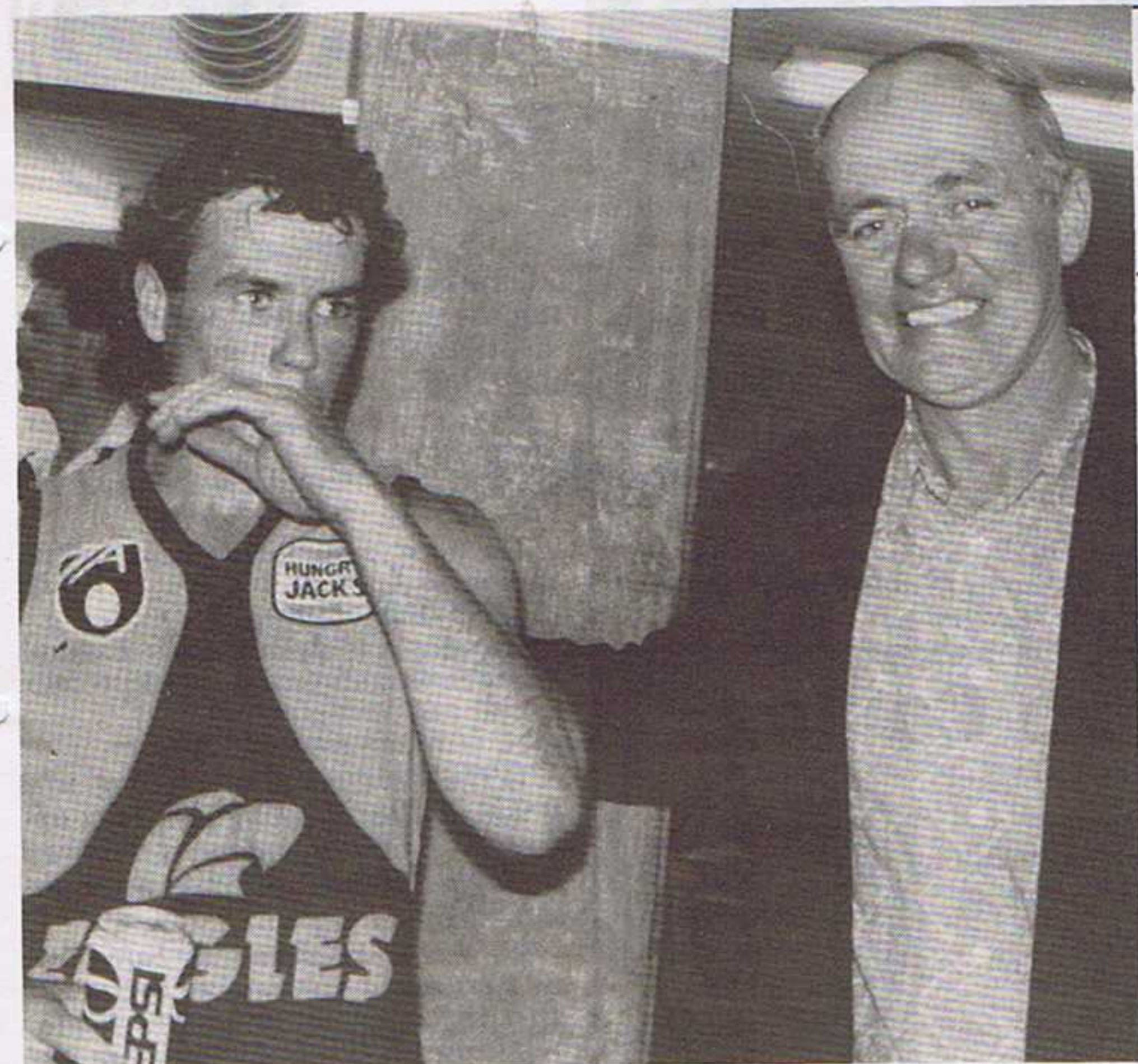
However, they are also prone to mistakes, as was the case in the match between Footscray and North Melbourne at the Western Oval last Saturday.

Renowned football identity Stan Alves was asked his opinion on a questionable umpiring decision in the first quarter when he slipped up.

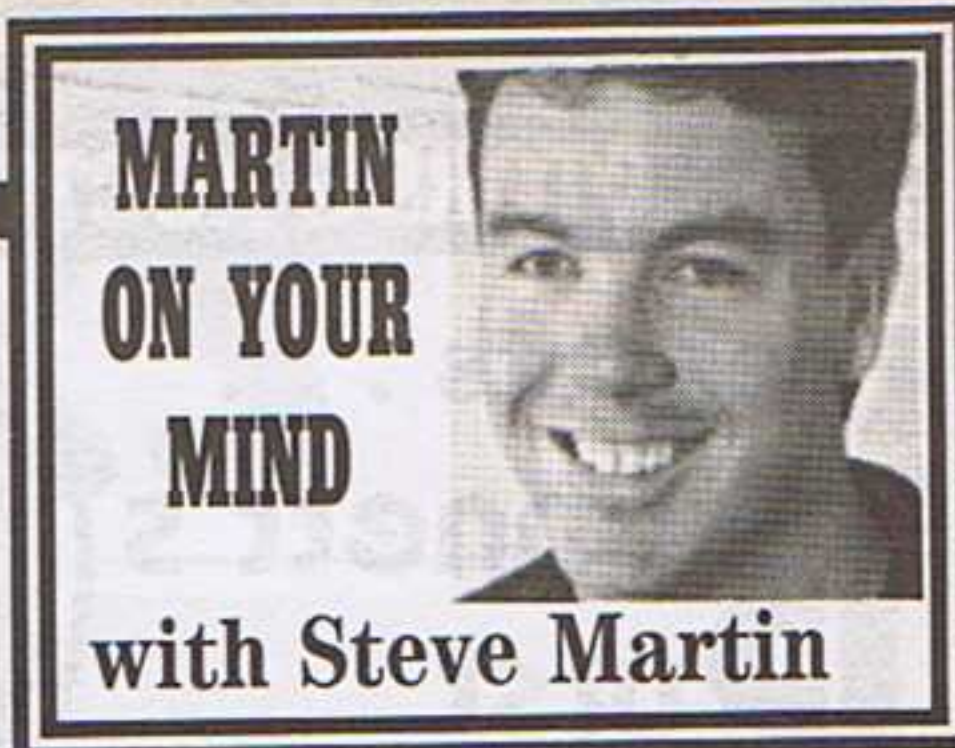

Eagles and Magpies top the class

THE AFL premiership battle shows all the signs of developing into a two-horse race.

Despite the extraordinary deeds of Wayne Carey and the trend-setting form of a resurgent North Melbourne, it's West Coast and Collingwood who look a class above the rest.

After a scratchy opening to the season, the Eagles have beaten Footscray and Geelong in fine style — teams that finished first and second on the AFL ladder after the qualifying rounds last season.

Only very good sides and teams confident in their own ability can recover from a 38-point deficit late in the game, as the Eagles did at Kardinia Park.

The Eagles are relentless as they wear down opponents and don't panic if they fall behind on the scoreboard.

The Magpies could hardly have made a more impressive start to the season.

They have come through a tough early draw in great shape and should be close to the top of the ladder after Round 15, when the teams have played each other once.

Collingwood have a similar record to the Eagles after six games, with five wins and a loss.

MIDFIELD PACE

But the Magpies have compiled their record against formidable opposition — Carlton, Footscray, St Kilda, Adelaide, Essendon and Geelong.

Collingwood have the midfield pace to at least match the Eagles, with players like Scott Russell, Graham Wright, Mick McGuane and Tony Francis.

Saverio Rocca is the Pies key forward while Gavin Brown, Tony Shaw, Craig Kelly and Gary Pert are tough and experienced players.

Importantly, the Magpies play with the same fighting spirit that marked

the Hawthorn playing career of coach Leigh Matthews.

The Magpies share the Eagles never-say-die attitude.

It may be sheer folly to suggest that ladder leaders North Melbourne will tumble, but you have to look at the quality of their opponents and ask whether they can sustain their momentum right through to the finals.

Kangaroo scalps include Brisbane, Richmond, Sydney and Melbourne — teams holding positions down the ladder.

FINALS PASSION

Last weekend's 31-point win over Footscray at the dreaded Western Oval was impressive, but the Bulldogs are yet to play with the same passion that lifted them into the finals last season.

Of the other contenders, Adelaide are stumbling, Carlton's lack of pace was exposed by Collingwood recently and St Kilda are great one week and awful the next.

Footscray and Geelong are also losing games they should be winning if they want to be part of the action in September.

And then there is Hawthorn.

The team of the 1980s seems to have burnt itself out, or maybe Jason Dunstall, John Platten and Gary Ayres have just one last campaign in their ageing legs.

The Hawks are always a danger, with Ben Allan, Ray Jenke, Darren Jarman and Darrin Pritchard just hitting their prime.

But they now lack Dermott Brerton, Chris Mew and Michael Tuck, or a key position player to match it with the best.

That leaves Collingwood and the Eagles.

Roll on Saturday, June 26, when these two excellent teams collide at the notorious Victoria Park venue.

West beats the trend

WINNING the Sandover Medal was starting to look like the end of a footballer's chances of making it in the AFL — until Robbie West came along.

Winning the Sandover was like being named captain of your club ... in the reserves competition — not quite good enough to always be in the league side, but a consistent performer at the lower level.

The careers of recent winners like Craig Edwards (1989), Mick Grasso (1990) and Ian Dargie (1991) certainly went downhill after they collected the WAFL's highest award.

Although Edwards was the dominant big man in the WAFL, he was too old to be considered for the AFL and has since retired.

Grasso was 23 and was considered an excellent chance of being drafted. Unfortunately for the Swan Districts star, the call-up never came and his career nose-dived after 1990 and for injury and personal reasons, he returned home to Bunbury this year.

Dargie was delisted from the West Coast Eagles after winning his Medal.

Mick Malthouse obviously didn't rate his efforts in winning the Medal as high enough to keep him on the squad.

In a year when his WAFL form was outstanding, Dargie played just one game with the Eagles to collect four possessions. He was immediately banished back to the WAFL.

There are many similarities between Dargie's Sandover season and West's performance last year.

A consistently brilliant player for the Falcons, West seemed to be always on the verge of Eagles selection, but won the nod only twice.

There were doubts about his disposal skills and his ability to handle the pace and pressure in the AFL arena.

Recruited from Wodonga in the 1990 draft, the Victorian turned 24 before this season started and must have been wondering if his chance had passed him by.

Six games in, he has proved to be one of the finds of the season. He has played every game and his 18 possessions against Geelong last Sunday indicate he could become a regular member of the Eagles line-up.

West has had luck on his side with injuries to midfielders Chris Mainwaring and Craig Turley. But he has made the most of his opportunities and it is great to see a WAFL performer persist and go on to make his mark at the next level.

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Eagles fight fiercely — off the field, too

YOU HAVE to give West Coast Eagles general manager Brian Cook 10 out of 10 for looking after his club.

Recent comments made by Cook, in newspapers and on television, indicate the Eagles have gone on the attack to convince people that not only do we NOT need another WA-based AFL side, but it would have a detrimental effect on football in this State.

It is purely a subjective, rather than objective, stance, which is most understandable.

The Eagles are cruising along comfortably, on and off the field.

If you have the cake, plus the cream on top, why share any of it?

As with any organisation that holds a monopoly, the Eagles can — and have been — dictating terms to sponsors.

I know of one major company that cannot wait for another AFL team to be introduced to WA because of the way the Eagles have applied the screws.

Another WA side would mean the Eagles would have to show far more consideration if they wanted that company to support them and not the new team.

The simple fact is there WILL be another WA-based team soon.

Rather than bristling at the prospect, the Eagles should be working to shore up their supporter and sponsorship base.

Cook would like to think that the Eagles are backed by everyone in WA, but that is not true.

That should be revealed by the three-man committee set up by Sports Minister Doug Shave to look into the operations of the WA Football Commission.

A small group of people is controlling football in WA and, in fact, since their inception, the Eagles have been something of a private club for certain individuals.

INVESTIGATION OVERDUE

Shave's decision to set up a committee to investigate the operations of WA football is long overdue.

Former Eagles chief and new AFL Commissioner Terry O'Connor is hardly in a position to criticise the move.

He is well known as a great Eagles fan; there is nothing wrong with that, as long as it does not result in a blinkered view — and there are some among us who have donned blinkers when it comes to the Eagles.

WA football has become the Eagles, with WAFL clubs becoming subservient to the AFL side.

It has become a one-way street when it comes to Eagles player traffic.

It is interesting to note that coach Mick Malthouse once made such a big issue about his charges being selected for league games when playing with their WAFL clubs, yet when the Eagles had a bye a couple of weeks ago, he released only those players who needed a run.

What a great promotion it would have been for WA football if all the Eagles players had been released back to their WAFL clubs that weekend.

Cook claims that another AFL side in WA will not be viable.

That is crystal-ball gazing.

If a new team is allowed to operate the way it should — and based in Fremantle, where it must be — it will get tremendous sponsorship support from businesses in the area.

We can only hope the Mal Atwell committee is able to have a clear look at football in WA and not have its investigation fogged up by contrary claims.

State games provide some vivid memories

THE State-of-Origin interstate battles have become a highlight on the football calendar.

Since watching Wayne Blackwell dive forward with no fear of injury to smother a Dale Weightman shot at goal to save a match against Victoria, WA fans have come to realise that these matches are fair dinkum.

Memories of the early 1980s State-of-Origin encounters are endless. Perhaps this is due to the fact that I should have been at school, but more probably because I was watching the best footballers in the nation in action.

Kevin Taylor's extraordinary high mark; Ross Glendinning's 70-metre torpedo punt at goal; the sheer brilliance of Maurice Rioli and Gary Buckenara and the skill of a youthful Gary Ablett are pictures that sit in the minds of any fan as clear as a TV screen.

EXPATRIATE STARS

The entire WA public got an enormous thrill seeing expatriate WA stars link up with the local boys to knock off the Big V.

One interesting aspect of origin football is that club teammates often are opposed.

Dermott Brereton and Rod Lester-Smith — both Hawthorn players at the time — became engaged in what could only be described as a fight, in one fiery origin game.

Brad Hardie and Brian Royal, mates from Footscray, also played on each another in a game when Royal kicked five goals, but Hardie won the Simpson Medal for best-afield — and there was no love lost in that battle.

It is also interesting to note that the rugby league administration has now based its fierce State-of-Origin games on the Aussie Rules version, first explored back in 1977 by Leon Larkin, the promotions man with the Subiaco Football Club, who were desperately searching for a fund-raising gimmick.

PINCHED IDEA

Australian representation — not only pride — is on the line when NSW and Queensland clash in these games.

The fact rugby league has pinched the idea from the AFL highlights what a fantastic concept it is.

This season's origin games promise to be more exciting than ever.

The main problem with previous games, from a player's point of view, was that no week was set aside for interstate games.

This not only detracted from the level of skill in the contests, but often star players were ruled out through lack of rest between club games.

With a full week off the AFL calendar this season to cater for the interstate carnival, this will no longer be a problem, which will enable the public to see the best footballers show their skills at peak fitness.

Let's hope these State matches can prevail even with the national competition in place.

If this year's series gives the younger supporters some memories like I have from my early days, then it will be more than worthwhile.

EVERY footballer has to live with injuries and it seems I will be spending the next couple of weeks on the sidelines after straining a muscle in my thigh.

I was a bit dicey to play anyway after hurting my left ankle against Footscray and that may have put more strain on the other leg.

The doctors say three weeks, so I'm aiming to be back for the St Kilda game in Melbourne on May 29.

For me, it is swimming, stretching and then weights on the muscle to help it heal and strengthen again.

WHAT a character-building win it was against Geelong last week after being almost out of it midway through the third quarter, when we trailed by 38 points.

We were looking down the barrel and the Cats would have enjoyed burying us as revenge for last year's grand final.

But the boys refused to lie down and with the defence holding firm, the midfield got on top of Geelong's runners, who had dominated the third term.

Ashley McIntosh, who will probably line up at full-forward for the next few weeks, Chris Waterman and Dean Kemp were superb in the last quarter.

THE Geelong supporters were giving me heaps of abuse — you name it they were yelling it — and it got under my skin.

That probably is the first time I have reacted and become involved with the crowd.

But I thought, "fair's fair, I'll give a bit back".

Opposition crowds always give you the raspberry, but not as much as Geelong's supporters were dishing out.

ONE of the great things about sport is opportunity and against Fitzroy — with Peter Matera suspended and me out — two players will get chances at AFL level.

David Hynes was superb at centre-half-forward when he came on in the second half and could force his way into the starting 18.

He has been a unlucky with selections in the past year — especially missing out on the grand final — and he grabbed his chance on Sunday.

McIntosh loves playing in attack and we are lucky to have such an exciting player to take over at full-forward.

Last year's Sandover Medallist Robbie West showed he has served his apprenticeship and will be an important part of our centreline.

Craig Turley is fit and back in form after a good run with West Perth.

For those players the next two weeks may well shape the rest of their seasons.

AFTER all the hype about "Woo-sha" lining up on again Gary Ablett, coach Mick Malthouse sprung a surprise by playing "Monkey" Brennan on the Cats star.

He did a great job on Ablett, keeping him to 4.4, after his 14-goal blinder the week before and the Eagles can only benefit from having two or three defenders who can do the job.

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Changing fortunes

THE changing fortunes of a football match were never better illustrated than in the third quarter of Sunday's clash with Geelong.

In today's free-running style of play, with loose men peeling off as soon as one side gains possession, it's often easy to develop a run-on.

Such was the case at the start of the third term when the Cats slipped into top gear and kicked five goals in 11 minutes.

The fifth came at the 14-minute mark of the term, but then the Eagles steadied and gradually took control.

The inspired Eagles free-wheeled from the 20-minute mark to kick five goals in 10 minutes and get back to within 11 points at the final change.

Geelong couldn't come back from that surge and it was 20 minutes — and nine Eagles goals — later that they kicked their next goal.

Tough start

Remembering that the little tagger got knocked out in the opening minutes of the 1992 grand final, the replay against Geelong started in equally-fierce fashion.

Opposed to dangerman Garry Hocking, Pyke copped a couple of tough blows early — and the match hadn't even started!

Brennan was superb

THE performance of Michael Brennan in Sunday's victory over Geelong should not be underestimated.

Brennan didn't know that he had the game's most unenviable match-up until Friday night — and five minutes into the action he could have been excused for seeking an early leave pass.

The speedy Ablett, with 14 goals a week earlier, had accepted a spearing pass from Cats centreman Mark Baird to goal from directly in front.

But from then on the goals had to be earned the hard way as Brennan played the supercat tightly to restrict him to just 12 more possessions for the day.

Ablett's next three goals came in differing fashion — the team's 10th from a mark in the goalsquare when Brennan had been forced into the pocket to blanket a Geelong loose man; the 12th an incredible snap on the run after a boundary line pack scramble and the 13th when Brennan unfortunately slipped at the wrong moment as Ablett sped off on a lead.

. . . and they will improve

WEST Coast general manager Brian Cook had a veiled warning for rival AFL clubs at the weekend.

In a radio interview with 3AW's Shane Healey, Cook suggested that the Eagles still had a lot of improving to do.

Cook agreed that the intensity of the team's approach to their football had only built up three or four weeks ago.

"Mick Malthouse did let the premiership celebrations go on for a while," Cook said when asked about the team's training build-up after the September grand final victory.

"But we have all seen teams make a grand final one year, only to fail the next season, so we're aware of those problems."

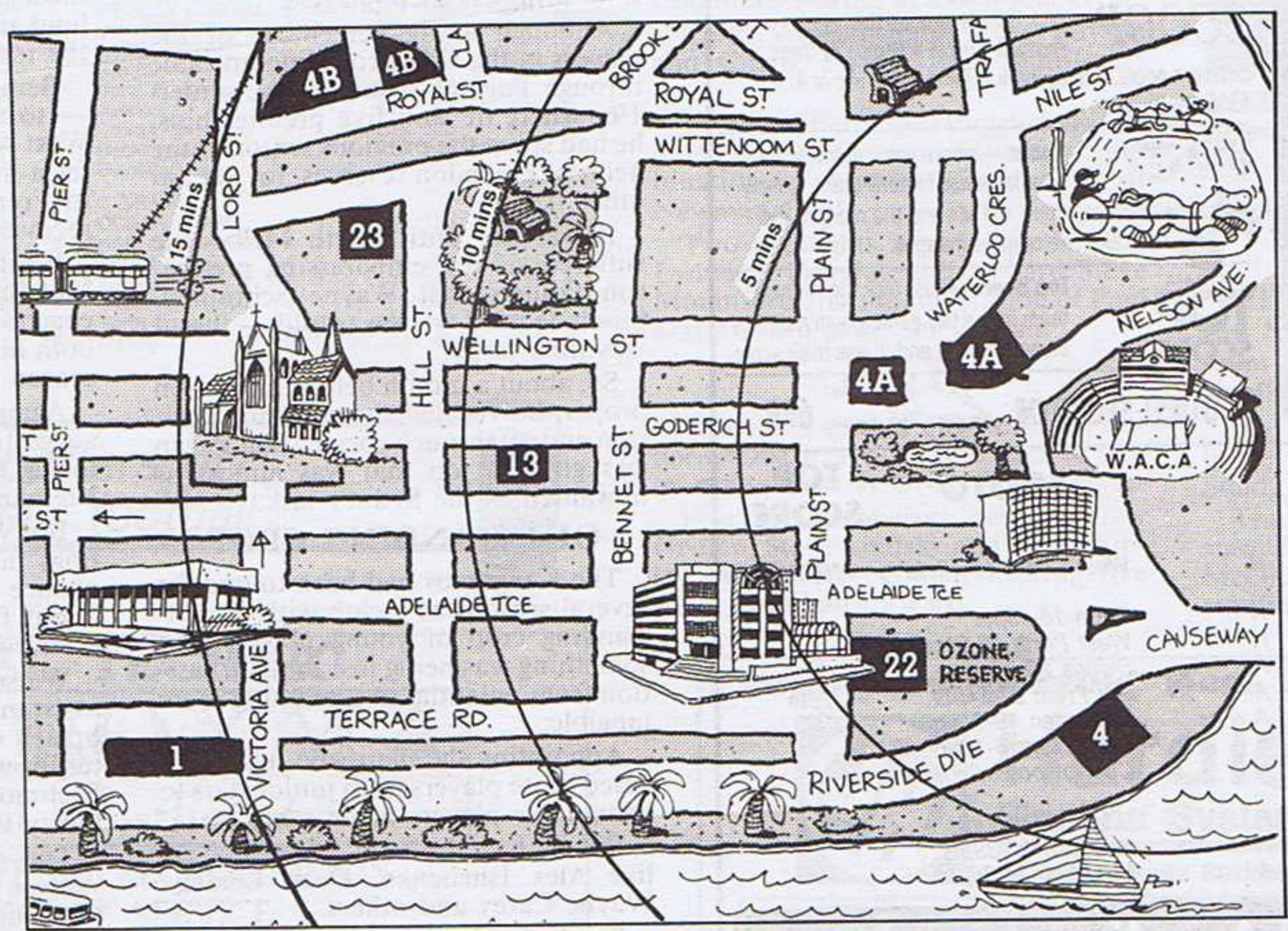
When the answer was no, only Michael Brennan's mother had to say 'oh well, good luck son'.

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Barassi in select band

RON BARASSI joined a select group of men who have coached four AFL clubs when he led Sydney for the first time on Sunday.

Barassi started his coaching career in 1965 at Carlton, where he stayed until 1971. He went to North Melbourne in 1973 for eight years and in 1981 began a five-season stint at Melbourne.

The only man to coach five clubs is Dan Minogue, who led Richmond (1920-25), Hawthorn (1926-27), Carlton (1929-34), St Kilda (1935-37) and Fitzroy (1940-42).

Tom Hafey was at the helm of four clubs — Richmond (1966-76), Collingwood (1977-82), Geelong (1983-85) and Sydney (1986-88).

BARASSI, who led Carlton and North Melbourne to two premierships at each, began his coaching career at both clubs with wins over Hawthorn.

Swans supporters will be hoping Barassi can emulate his coaching feats with the Blues and the Roos rather than mirroring his coaching record with Melbourne.

Barassi's first season at the MCG started with a loss to Hawthorn and produced only one win — by one point over Footscray in Round 3.

Barassi's coaching career with Sydney began with a loss to Carlton — but the Swans started this season with a Round 2 loss to Hawthorn, the club

Barassi made his coaching debut against with his previous three clubs.

THE West Coast Eagles final score of 16.17 in Sunday's match at Kardinia Park matched their tally in last year's grand final against the Cats.

The Eagles quarter-by-quarter goal tallies of 2, 5, 5 and 4 on Sunday were almost identical to those in the grand final, when they kicked 2, 4, 5 and 5.

ST KILDA'S Tony Lockett has become the eighth player to kick 800 career goals, with his nine against Richmond.

Lockett needed only 15 games to race from 700 to 800 goals — in the second-fastest century of goals in his career.

He took only 14 games to move from 400 to 500.

Unlikely heroes sitting on top

WITH the season only but a pup, a couple of surprise coaching heroes have already emerged.

In the AFL there is little doubt the honour as the outstanding coach in the first third of the season belongs to Denis Pagan and in the WAFL the distinction goes to Mark Watson.

Getting a handle on the idiosyncrasies of players is tough enough even with all summer to work them out.

But both Pagan and Watson were thrown in at the deep end and had little time to assess their players.

Although a big percentage of the players in the Kangaroos line-up came through Pagan's school in the under-19s, where he won five premierships, he had spent the previous season at the helm of Essendon reserves, for yet another flag.

It was not until North Melbourne suffered several embarrassing pre-season failures that Wayne Schimmelbusch decided — or was told — that it was time to go.

So, about a month before the season proper, he vacated the coaching position and after much speculation Pagan was given a job that was almost as unwanted as the Sydney task.

OUTSTANDING CROP

The Kangaroos had been touted for several seasons as a club with an outstanding crop of young players, but something was being lost in the transition from potential to something more tangible.

Appointing the man who had cultivated those players from junior stars to formidable players made sense.

But he has also won across players like Alex Ishchenko, Dean Laidley, Wayne Carey and others.

Suddenly they are sitting atop the AFL ladder and although there are those who doubt they can stay there, the Roos are growing in confidence.

Perhaps their season will be decided in the next few weeks when they face a succession of tough opponents.

The horror stretch starts with a confrontation against Adelaide at Football Park this weekend, followed by clashes against Carlton at the MCG, Colling-

wood at Victoria Park, the Eagles at the WACA Ground and Hawthorn at the MCG.

If the Roos can win two or three of those matches then the message will be loud and clear that they will be around the top six come September.

Being one of the pre-season sceptics — to the extent of suggesting in The West Australian that North would suffer a humiliating season and wind up in Fremantle — it's great to see the recovery.

While Watson had some time under Mal Brown to prepare for his role as coach, many people under-estimated both him and South Fremantle in pre-season calculations.

Again, I was one of the guilty parties, suggesting that Souths would slip after losing last year's grand final to East Fremantle.

But Watson has kept the young Bulldogs in top shape and there is every chance that they will again be battling it out for WA football's most sought after cup.

Watson spent last season as Brown's assistant and when called into the breach virtually on season's eve — after Brown had accepted a position with Richmond — he jumped at the opportunity to do a remarkable job.

The quietly spoken and respected Watson — whose acceptance speech at the Sandover Medal in 1987 is one of the great football moments of our time — gets his message across, is cool in a crisis and the players respond to him.

You cannot ask for more than that. Watson won the Sandover after Derek Kickett had been suspended and despite polling the most votes was ineligible.

With the same gracious tone of that victory speech, he has accepted his latest role and is doing the job well.

FITZROY'S WA expatriate trio Marcus Seecamp, Jeremy Guard and Michael Dunstan made the most of an early homecoming this week.

All three were given permission to head west and train with their former WAFL clubs before joining their Fitzroy teammates at their Perth hotel.

"Jeremy (Guard) had a wedding at the weekend. It went from there," said Seecamp, who saw the week as an ideal opportunity to enjoy his mother's homecooking and catch up with some old teammates.

"The main base of the guys who were playing league when I left in 1991 are still there.

"I'm still friends with them, not that I get to speak to many of them. But when we meet up, we always have time for each other."

Seecamp is looking forward to Friday night's game, especially with Fitzroy maintaining their finals ambitions with an important win at the weekend over Melbourne.

"We really have to win the next two or three games," he said.

NARROW LOSSES

After losing several close matches in the first month of the season, Fitzroy got home by just one point against Melbourne to lift their win-loss ratio to 50 percent.

On the question of whether beating the Eagles in Perth was one of football's toughest assignments, Seecamp said: "With the competition so close, any side on their night can have an upset win.

"In some weeks we've moulded together a good brand of football. If we can just keep that up, we'll be a good side and make the finals.

"Beating the Eagles is not mission impossible. All clubs are equal when you run out onto the field. Everyone has two arms and two legs. That's the way you have to attack it.

"Over the years Fitzroy have always played well when we've travelled to Perth. Hopefully, we can carry it on."

Seecamp believes that the pace of the game lifts a notch or two under lights.

"It's bound to be a good game between two likely finals sides," Seecamp said.

After figuring in all 22 matches in his debut year last season, Seecamp has again played each of Fitzroy's first six games.

WORTHY FORM

But he believes there is room for improvement.

"I feel my form has been worthy enough of keeping my spot in the side," he said.

"But I haven't been overly happy. I know there's a lot more improvement there.

"I want to work with the coaching staff to get rid of some of the bad points in my game."

Seecamp said Fitzroy's best performance this year was under lights in Adelaide where the side was beaten by just one point.

It was encouraging to beat Sydney the following week by 93 points, a match highlighted by the Lions 11-goal final term.

"For a few years Fitzroy haven't put

But he kicked only one goal on Saturday against Fitzroy and seems likely to be replaced by much-travelled West Australian Allen Jakovich, who has kicked 15 goals in his past three matches at VSFL level this year.

Jakovich's exclusion from the senior 20 for the recent Richmond game was a surprise to many, especially after he kicked eight goals in his previous reserves match.

The charismatic goalsneak has played only once this season at senior level, injuring his hamstring early in round one against Hawthorn.

Most at Melbourne considered him one of the Demons frontline players. He kicked 71 and 40 goals, at an average of 4.5 goals a match, in limited appearances in his two league seasons, 1991-92.

His availability next weekend comes courtesy of the tribunal, who cleared him of a striking charge arising from last week's reserves match.

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History hints at a Lions upset

FITZROY coach Robert Shaw will come to Perth this weekend hoping to avoid yet another close result after the Lions snuck home by less than a kick last Saturday.

"We're a very entertaining side," Shaw said this week.

"You never leave the ground early when Fitzroy are playing, that's for sure."

Shaw made light of the Lions tight-rope-walking season, with six of their past eight outings — including two Foster's Cup matches — decided by six points or less.

"When you coach a certain number of games, there will always be close ones," he said.

The Eagles go into their first night clash at home without star wingman Peter Matera and full-forward Peter Sumich, but Shaw refused to concede their losses would help the Lions cause.

KEY PLAYERS

"They are two key players, but if you're trying to get me to say that their loss is a confidence booster, I won't," he said.

"We're not paying much attention to that because the Eagles will cover their loss very well."

In all, the Lions have won three games, sit in sixth place and with an ounce of luck could easily have been troubling the top three.

Shaw ranked their one-point win over Melbourne last week as their worst four-quarter performance of the year, but said their losses to Footscray and Adelaide were perhaps their best displays.

"We were lucky to get out of Saturday's match with the four points after a five-goal burst in 10 minutes put us back in the game," he said.

The Eagles can ill-afford to take Fitzroy lightly because the Lions have a good record against the reigning premiers, with five wins and five losses in six seasons.

The Lions have beaten the Eagles in each of the past two seasons and a win at Princes Park in the last match of 1991 was followed by further success at North Hobart Oval last May, a defeat which sparked the Eagles revival.

Fitzroy won their 1989 clash at the WACA Ground by eight points and Shaw said his side enjoyed the trek to Perth.

... but it should be tight

"History shows that we beat them about once a year, but that's history," he said.

"When we beat them at North Hobart Oval they were down and certainly not at their best.

"They were without Sumich, although we missed Alistair Lynch.

"We seem to play well in Perth. The boys enjoy playing under lights and we were probably in the match at the WACA last year until about half-way through the third term."

In an unusual pre-match move, Shaw allowed three of the club's WA recruits in Jeremy Guard, Marcus Seecamp and Michael Dunstan to come to Perth on Monday to renew acquaintances with family and friends.

"It was purely a PR exercise," Shaw said.

"Jeremy asked to go to a wedding

and there was no point him flying back to Melbourne and then back to Perth in time for Friday, so I let the others go too.

"It was a good opportunity for them to have some time off, promote the game, do some interviews and train with their WAFL clubs.

McGuane to inspire Pies

POPULAR Collingwood wingman Mick McGuane will take the field for the 100th time when the Magpies play host to Hawthorn at Victoria Park.

The milestone for the reigning club champion should be enough to spur the Pies to their third home ground win of the season with their only blemish at the hands of St Kilda in round four.

After last Saturday's 25-point win over Adelaide, Crows coach Graham Cornes labelled Collingwood the benchmark of the AFL and McGuane is one driving force behind it.

"Over here the papers are reading all sorts of things into it, with talk of the second AFL team in Perth, but there is absolutely nothing in it.

"If Kevin Sheedy or Terry Wheeler did it, people would say 'what an innovation'."

Covering the loss of the injured Sumich and suspended Matera will be the main topic of discussion around the Eagles selection table and Craig Turley's timely return to fitness and form with West Perth may solve one problem.

Turley's 42-possession game should get him the nod for a return to the line-up to help cover the loss of Matera from the midfield while McIntosh and Hynes are contenders for the full-forward position.

Last week given the role of ruck-rover, resting on a half-forward flank, McGuane continually drove the ball forward despite the tag of Chris McDermott.

He is likely to be watched closely on Saturday, possibly by Darren Baxter, but that is unlikely to faze him and the rest of his side's running division.

Others for the Hawks to counter are Tony Francis, Brad Rowe and the influence of Tony Shaw.

Hawthorn are at their best when the odds are stacked against them and after a seven-goal final term against the Bears they are capable of an upset.



TIGHT-ROPE... that's the current walking mode of Fitzroy coach Robert Shaw

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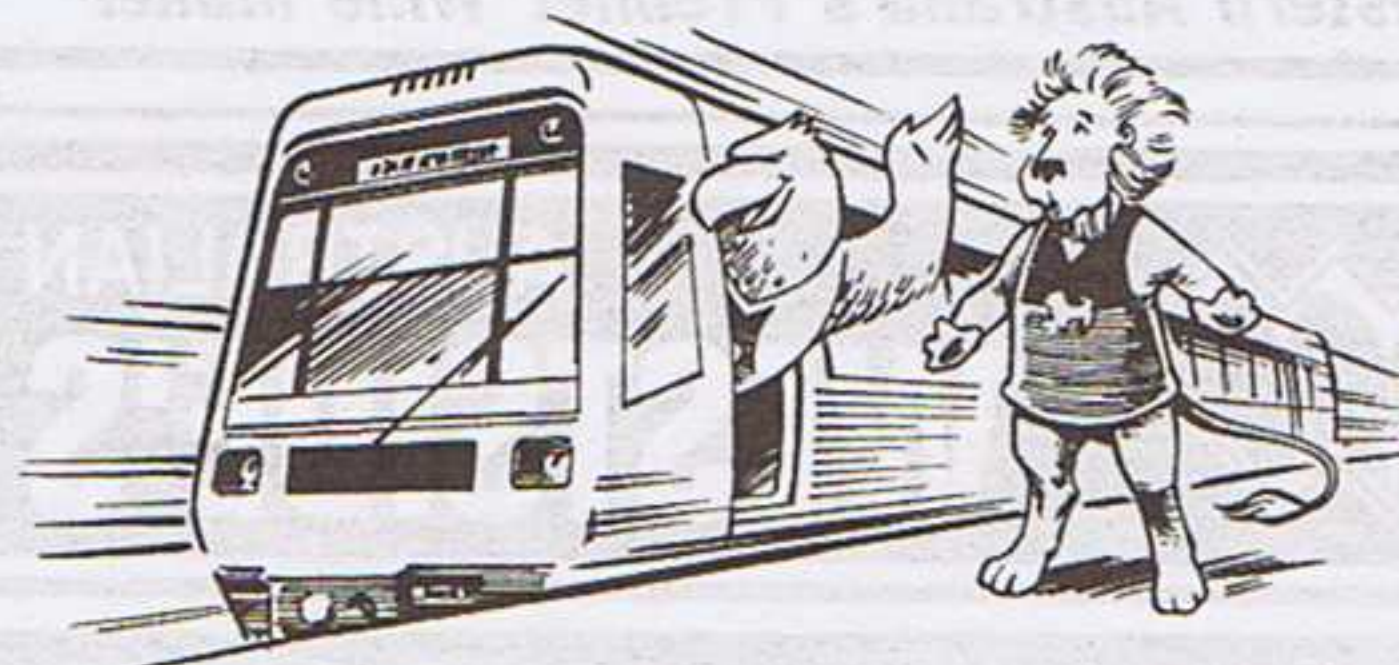

The Sharks were never allowed to get into a feeding frenzy, with the Lions leading at every change.

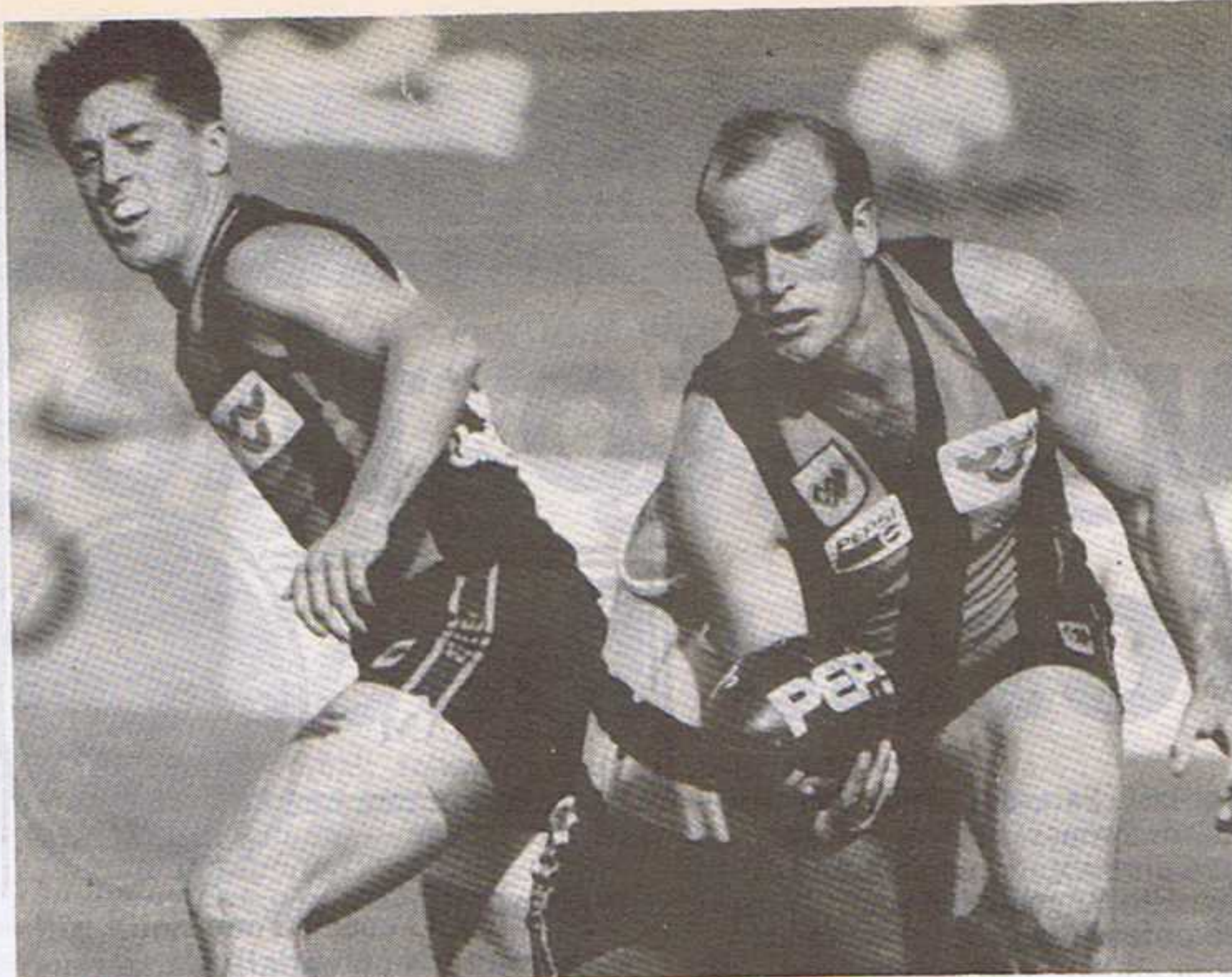
It has been suggested more than once that East Fremantle approached the game slightly over-confident.

'Houdini' McIntosh fires Eagles escape

IT'S NOT often that a team facing a five-goal deficit in the third quarter — and losing a key player — can recover to escape with four points.

But that was the case in Sunday's clash at Kardinia Park between West Coast and Geelong.

When Eagles full-forward Peter Sumich hobbled from the ground in the third term, after kicking his third goal, the Eagles looked to be in big trouble.

But coach Mick Malthouse quickly swung the versatile Ashley McIntosh to full-forward and the youngster responded brilliantly.

With centre-half-forward David Hynes proving a reliable avenue towards the big sticks, the Eagles kicked three quick goals, courtesy of McIntosh, half-forward Brett Heady and Don Pyke, to be only 11 points behind at three-quarter-time.

Being so close to the home side at the final change after the Cats dominated for most of the quarter was a bonus.

Hynes' second-half statistics of six marks and 18 possessions were impressive and a major factor in the West Coaster's victory.

With Sumich likely to be on the sidelines for a couple of weeks at least, Hynes will become an integral part of a revamped attack.

The forward line will be under pressure from the likes of Fitzroy's Paul Roos, who often saves his best football for the Eagles.

Spider milestone

WHILE East Fremantle veteran Neil Lester-Smith had little reason to celebrate his 150th game for the Sharks, the new-look "hulk" of the Subiaco camp, Matthew Burton, reached his 50th game in fine style.

WHENEVER West Coast tackle Geelong on the football arena, big Ashley McIntosh knows what his task will be.

It's now almost a foregone conclusion that the youngster from Claremont will be opposed to Billy Brownless, one of the game's most skilful big men.

The 20-year-old has done the job on the high-marking Cat in the past — including a total eclipse in the grand final victory.

He lined up in defence again last Sunday in the grand final replay and conceded just five possessions to the dangerous forward in the first half.

"Geelong were pretty fired up and certainly Billy Brownless was," says McIntosh.

"He's a good player; I don't mind playing on him at all. I think he was leaving the full-forward open for Gary Ablett to lead into; so we were out of the play a bit.

"I enjoy the challenge of playing on him."

McIntosh was moved into attack in the second half in a reshuffle of the forward line with the departure of Peter Sumich through injury.

He kicked three vital goals and was inspirational with some of his marking, helping turn the game around into an impressive victory.

"I was pretty worried; I didn't know if we could do it," said McIntosh, in a typically-modest assessment of his own contribution.

"They were playing well, especially at the start of the third quarter. For about 15 minutes, they were hard to stop."

There has been considerable debate about where McIntosh, the son of a former champion ruckman, plays his best football. He is often thrown from defence to attack and generally responds to any change of position imposed by coach Mick Malthouse.

"I enjoy playing in attack, especially when the forward line is open," says McIntosh.

"It's good to play there, particularly with our good midfield disposal. A few things went my way when I went there in the last half.

"Suma is still our full-forward, but I'm happy to play there if he's out injured. I played most of my early football at centre-half-back or centre-half-forward, but I don't mind full-forward if it helps the team out."

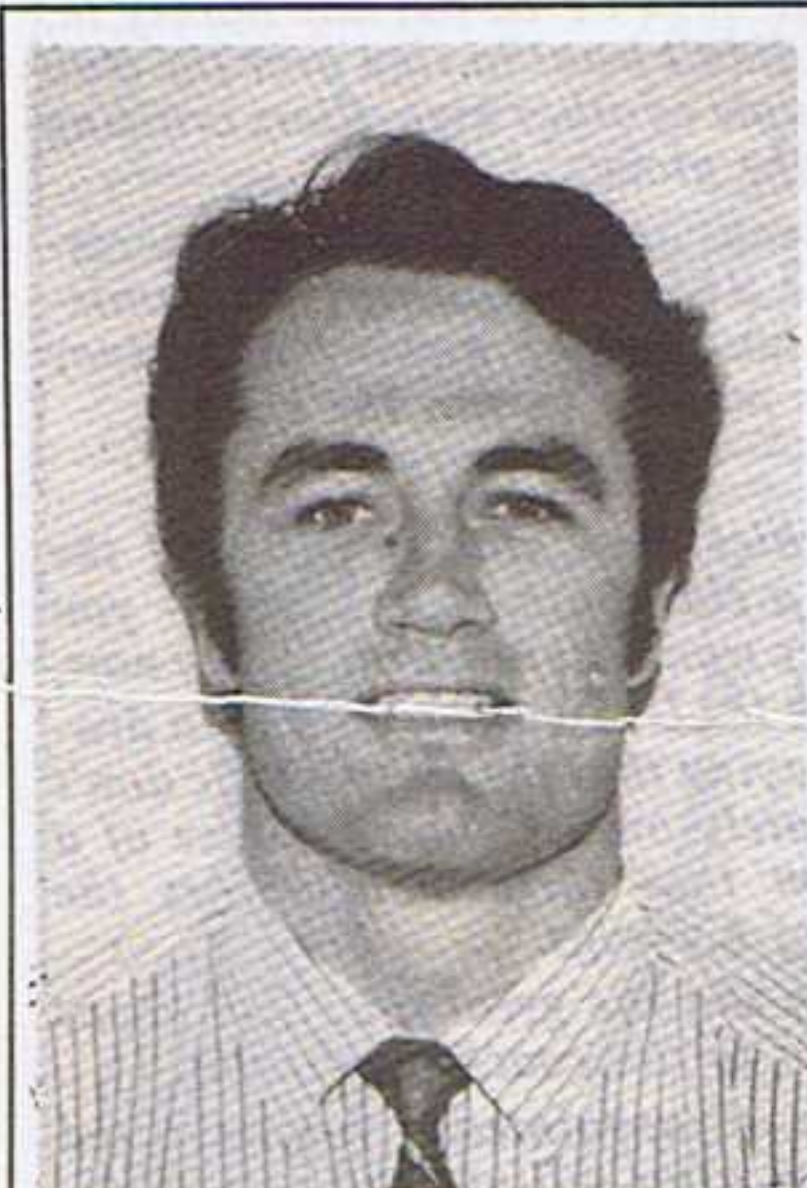
McIntosh was one of the select 20 who created history with the AFL premiership last year — and the spirit of that victory was evident on Sunday as the Eagles came from the brink of defeat to snatch the four premiership points.

"The spirit is still there from the grand final," he says.

"That was a great moment. The thing I remember most was the first bounce; I was really charged up, which was strange because I'm not normally that type of guy."

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Forwards to the fore

WAFL followers will hope that the fine form shown by forwards in last week's Pepsi Cup fixtures will continue this Saturday.

South Fremantle pair Warren Campbell and Brad Hardie kicked seven and four goals against Perth and will carry their side's hopes into battle with Claremont, at Claremont Oval.

Hardie leads the GIO WAFL goalkicking table with 20 goals, followed by Campbell (17).

The Tigers are plagued by injuries and Gerard Neesham's woes were compounded in their loss to West Perth, when promising full-back Daniel Southern wrenched his shoulder.

His expected absence places pressure on captain Darrell Panizza to hold up the defence and hope the Tigers forward line of Craig Downsborough, Joe Smith and David Muir can kick a match-winning score.

But with Claremont running players Mark Hann, Glen Symonds, Brendan Green, Jeremy Sheldrick and Matthew Gauci injured, the Bulldogs Wally Matera, Simon Taylor, Russell Williams, Greg Wootton and Tom Bottrell should provide their side with enough midfield drive to win.

EAST Fremantle coach Ken Judge would have spent all this week thinking of a way to halt Swan Districts six-game winning streak when the two sides clash at East Fremantle Oval on Saturday.

The Sharks conceded 20 goals to Su-

biaco last Saturday and the three-pronged Swans attacking division of Scott Cummings, Troy Ugle and Jason Ball, with 40 goals between them, is more potent than the Lions attack.

State squad member Simon Moss lowered his colours for the second successive week at full-back, but Judge will persist with him in defence and play Damien Condon at centre-half-back on Ball.

The Sharks Craig Doyle filled in for the injured Ian Newman and he could struggle with Swans big men Travis Edmonds and Ron Skender. They have the ability to provide in-form ball carriers Brendon Retzlaff, David Ogg, Darren Newby, Geoff Passeri and Mike Richardson with first use of the ball.

PERTH and East Perth should have no lack of motivation on Saturday when they clash for the Greg Brehaut Shield at Lathlain Park.

The match will be a tribute to the late Brehaut, who left his mark at both clubs, as a champion wingman with Perth and a coach at East Perth.

The Royals have struggled to kick winning totals this season and managed only five goals against Swan Districts last Saturday, with centre-half-forward Graeme Garnaut posting seven behinds.

Like East Perth, the Demons don't have one particular spearhead, relying more on a group of players to kick their goals.

With 12 goals from five matches, Troy Davis is the Demons leading goalkicker, but he has a hamstring injury and is unlikely to play.

However, Perth coach Ken Armstrong has other options and with Oscar Moreno, former East Perth captain Craig McGrath and Winston Abraham capable of kicking goals, they should win.

Soapies keep fans amused

FOOTBALL has produced two real-life soap operas in recent days — the Sydney Swans saga and the Nicky Winmar war.

As a dedicated fan of Home and Away, the Winmar affair out-rated the rubbish that accompanies that TV soapie.

Suffice to say that, once again, outsiders have meddled in the activities of the on-field entertainers and the game is the loser as Nifty Nicky sits on the sidelines.

But maybe the Sydney scene can now be a winner, with the ageing Ronald Dale Barassi appointing himself as the saviour of the Swans.

After the longest three weeks in history, the plucked ducks finally had a coach to listen to last weekend — but they still had another dose of defeatism.

CHALLENGE

Even though it's been eight changing years since Barassi — the man who made guernsey No. 31 famous with Melbourne — has coached, he gladly accepted the Sydney challenge ... even though he did suggest the idea himself.

The Harbour City didn't quite go wild about Ronny — there was no ticker-tape parade, but the austere Sydney Morning Herald newspaper did write an editorial suggesting that it was time Victoria's Aussie Rules got its act together in the world of rugby.

The appointment of Barassi, premiership coach at North Melbourne and Carlton, but not at his old club, will certainly give the Swans a higher profile in Sydney — and maybe the club won't have to buy space in the newspapers ... or sack coaches (and presidents) to get good headlines.

Sunny Sydney's a bit of a toffee-nosed tinsel town, especially when it comes to rivalry with Melbourne, a cold and wet city that has long-boasted Australia's two greatest sporting events, the grand final and the Melbourne Cup. But Barassi is a man's-man; he has the ability to talk men's language or switch to the plum-in-the-gob stuff that Sydneysiders like.

The on-today-off-tomorrow drama over the coaching appointment was prolonged because of the paper work involved in the Swans giving up their private ownership and becoming a real members-club like the rest of them.

The AFL had trouble tracking down the 14 different owners, including one bloke who hasn't even put any money in, but still didn't want to sign over the club and a couple of other high-fliers cruising around the globe.

The Swans are now owned and operated by the AFL, with executive commissioner Alan Schwab moving to Sydney for three months to run the show.

JUSTIFIED

AFL chief Ross Oakley justified the move to a club-based operation — you think they would have learnt before now, what with the Dr Geoffrey Edelstein dramas — saying that the footy public don't like privately-owned clubs because of a perception that their money lines the pockets of big-wigs.

So how did the great man feel about his return to the coaching arena?

"Quite disappointed," he admitted four hours after telling television audiences around the nation that he thought the side could beat Carlton up at Sydney.

"I can't really say I enjoyed the day; it's hard to enjoy a game when you lose by 44 points and realise the formidable job that has to be done."

The major change Barassi noted was the need for a heap of helpers in the coaching box to track the moves.

"I defy anyone to keep track of what's going on out there," said the recycled coach.

"You need a panel of three or four people just to follow player movements and make sure you don't send out the runner with messages that don't really apply because something's changed that you didn't notice."

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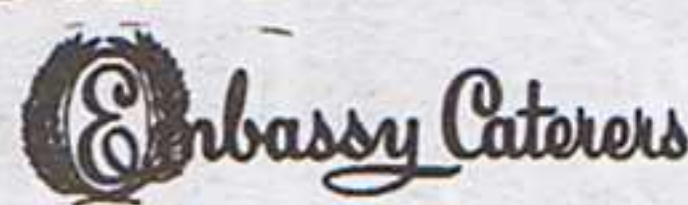

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A very special match

FOOTBALL will honour a champion and a gentleman when the Greg Brehaut Memorial match is played at Lathlain Park on Saturday.

Perth and East Perth will fight for a new shield devoted to the memory of Brehaut, who died in February.

His death, while jogging on the beach, shocked the football world and the match will become an annual tribute as a mark of respect for the former Perth and WA player and East Perth coach.

Brehaut made his debut with the Demons in 1965, playing 18 games, and his promise was instantly recognised when he won the 6IX best first-year player award and Perth's Doug Buckingham memorial trophy as their most outstanding junior.

Playing mostly on a wing, his second year of senior football reaped great rewards when he represented WA in four games at the Australian Championships in Hobart and played in the first of a hat-trick of premierships with Perth.

BIG GAMES

Champions perform in big games and Brehaut was always prominent in finals especially and also in his 16 State games.

His selection as an All Australian in 1969, after the Adelaide carnival, was an indication of the high regard in which he was held on the interstate arena.

Life membership of the Demons came after his 150th game in 1973 and his leadership qualities were recognised the same year when he was chosen as vice-captain of both the club and WA against South Australia.

A stint as playing coach with Woodville in the SANFL followed in 1974 before he returned to Lathlain Park in 1975 — his last in league football.

He retired after 157 WAFL games, plus 16 State appearances.

A Perth publication leading into season 1975 paid tribute to the man in the No. 7 red and black guernsey when it read:

"The jumper had become synonymous with all the finest attributes of the sporting world.

"Greg's love of the game, capacity for hard work and unselfish teamwork were attributes he displayed on and off the field."

Brehaut's association with the Demons continued on his retirement when he became a selector for coach Ken Armstrong for the rest of 1975 and acted as assistant coach in 1977-78.

GRAND FINALS

A desire to coach at senior level led him to the Sunday League, where he coached Wanneroo to four consecutive grand finals before taking up the post at East Perth in 1983.

reflected tough times for the Royals and Brehaut was replaced in 1986.

Current East Perth coach Stan Magro played 20 games under Brehaut in 1983-84, on his return from a 99-game stint with Collingwood.

"I played against Greg while at South Fremantle and always admired him as a player," Magro said this week.

"I got to know him well, but I never had the pace to match him on a wing."

A return to his beloved Perth was natural for Brehaut when the club hit financial difficulty in 1990 and he helped with the Demons Plight campaign before Armstrong secured his vast knowledge as director of football in 1992.

"This match will have special significance for the Perth Football Club," Armstrong said this week.

"Greg influenced so many of us in so many different ways in a comparatively short time."

The match will have even more significance for Armstrong, with their friendship stretching back to Brehaut's childhood.

After a long family association, the Perth coach first taught the 13-year-old Brehaut in year eight at Kent Street SHS in 1959, during his first appointment as a physical education teacher.

Armstrong remembers Brehaut as an outstanding competitor in athletics, cricket and football and as captain of one of his school football teams, which played regularly at Lathlain Park.

Armstrong remembers umpiring a match in which Brehaut kicked a right-foot goal from the left full-forward pocket and a few minutes later, a glorious left-foot goal from the right flank to win the game.

"In the rooms I made a point of congratulating the young man for his effort," Armstrong said.

"I can still see that young, shy face somewhat self-consciously answering 'gee Mr A — you don't miss those'."

Armstrong is just one of many members of the football fraternity who misses Brehaut's input and his love of the game.

Spurred on by his memory, emotions will run high for both clubs at Lathlain Park, with Perth players largely remembering Brehaut's off-field interest in recent years.

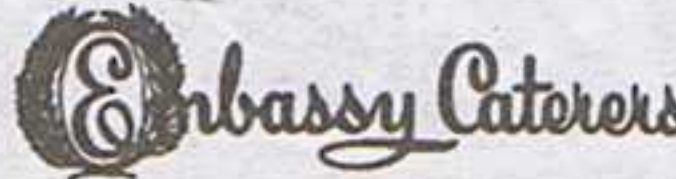

DEDICATED... Greg Brehaut was a class player and a dedicated and genuine person in everything he did in football, whether it was talking to juniors (left) or coaching at senior level

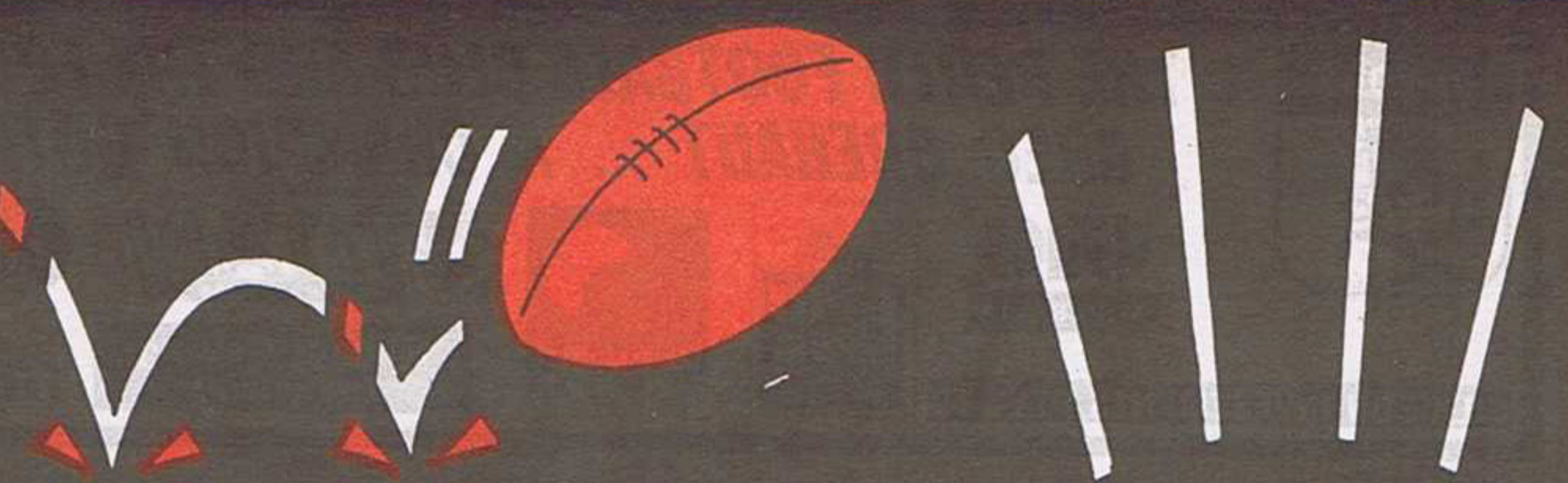

The Pagan rites . . .

VARIOUS dictionaries tell us that a pagan is a heathen, one who disbelieves or has no faith.

But this man Denis Pagan is no such disbeliever; he is a man of utmost faith . . . and top spot on the AFL premiership table is his current reward.

The unheralded coach of North Melbourne, sitting surprisingly six and one after seven rounds, is yet another back pocket specialist to stamp a tough mark on the coaching arena.

This week the full circle turns for North Melbourne.

It was back in February that Norths suffered a 147-point Foster's Cup thrashing by the red-hot Adelaide Crows . . . so hot that one of Norths most-favourite sons in Wayne Schimmelbusch dropped the coaching reins.

Enter Pagan, the man who just 18 months earlier had left North Melbourne rather disillusioned at having continually missed out on senior coaching jobs around town. He had become typecast as a coach of under-19 players, forging a reputation as a man who could relate to the younger guys and impose his will and discipline. Five premierships from nine under-19s grand finals are testimony to his ability.

He didn't promise a lot; no hot gospeller this man. Just an earnest type who believed that North Melbourne, the club where he played 121 senior games from 1967-74, should be performing a lot better.

He simply vowed to turn things around; to change the image of a club that had promised so much, but given so little.

"Everyone has talked about it," he said. "This time action is going to speak louder than words."

So this weekend the jumping Kangaroos hop over the border for a return visit to Football Park and another meeting with Adelaide. It would appear to be a case of the Christians returning to the Collostium simply to see if things have changed.

But the way Norths shattered the illusions of the cynics last Saturday by venturing into the inhospitable Western Oval to down Footscray in no mean style indicates that Pagan's men are firm believers in his gospel.

What has he done to turn the North Melbourne fortunes around?

Not a lot, according to the insiders. He's simply got the players believing in themselves more and being positive in their approach. He does have the players running in a straight line and not shirking any issues; maybe that's the difference between a back pocket player coaching compared to a skilful wingman like Schimmelbusch; no disrespect to the club's all-time games played record holder.

Pagan is down to earth. With a face like it was chiselled from granite, but a firm, direct and always polite voice answering post-match questions, he is the low-key coach.

He doesn't take credit for what Norths have achieved in recent weeks; he naturally says the players have turned things around out on the field.

And players he does have in a nice quantity — not forgetting the quality.

Take Wayne Carey, the 21-year-old captain of the Roos this season. He's blossomed into the best footballer in the competition, a centre-half forward with the class of a Stephen Kernahan, the strength of a Tony Lockett, the agility of a Gary Ablett; the marking power of a Stewart Loewe and the finishing off touches of a Jason Dunstall.

Not a bad lot wrapped up into one key forward . . . and then there's John Longmire, the full-forward who topped the AFL's goalkicking ladder in 1990 and is more than a handy back-up. It's a double act, what Carey misses, Longmire gets.

And the hat-trick is a surprise card — Adrian McAdam, a little roly-polly around the middle and, one would suspect, rather lazy on the training track; maybe lazy on the field also. After all, he didn't venture further than 25-metres from goal throughout last Saturday's victory, opting to stand almost hidden right on the goal-line, contrasting with two white posts and the white-coated flag waver.

But he still kicked six and maintains his record as the highest goals-per-game player in AFL/VFL history, albeit three matches for a total of 23 goals.

Pagan has got players like Ross Smith, Brett Allison and Peter German back to their best; youngsters like Glen Archer and Anthony Stevens performing miracles in defence; big Alex Ishchenko playing like an enthusiastic rookie and Mark Roberts — still a little overweight — back in action with tons of determination.

The critics expected the North bubble to burst last weekend; it was their first real test up against a top-six side, so they said. And Western Oval was not.

But Pagan prepared his players well. He told them to expect the worst conditions imaginable — fierce winds, rain, slippery underfoot, a biased crowd on the Doug Hawkins wing and a distinct disadvantage for visiting teams.

"Anything better than those bleak conditions would be a bonus," he said.

"They prepared themselves for the elements. I told them to simply play one-on-one and ignore the Footscray propaganda."

So when the Roos ran out onto a firm, dry ground with a touch of the sun peeking through and a gentle breeze, they were uplifted.

Pagan didn't over-react when the media asked the inevitable question at the after-match conference: "Do you feel as though you proved something to the critics today?"

No, he simply said that the players had performed well, that the team's objective was still to make the six.

"We don't want to put the cart before the horse," he said, indulging in a rare cliché. "We'll aim for the finals and take things from there."

On the question of the return trip to Adelaide, he said: "It's a real hard one that, we'll leave no stone unturned. We'll prepare ourselves the best we can."

Pagan's step up the coaching ladder to join the big boys has certainly been an impressive one. But he's not taking the credit. In short, he's got the players believing that footy can be fun again . . . and winning sure helps.

Laidley thrives in new colours

THE football triumph of Dean Laidley is the classic case of never giving in — even when the cards are stacked against you.

The thimble-thin, but totally fearless former West Perth half-back is proud to be part of the AFL's leading team at this stage of the season.

He is holding down a permanent spot in the defence of North Melbourne, the magic-making club with the most potent forward line in the business — a free-scoring department that is fed with supply from a horde of unheralded, but highly-effective midfielders and defenders.

RESURRECTED

"We work pretty well as a team out there," says Laidley, whose career has now been resurrected twice in two years.

"I had a fair bit to prove coming to Norths; I was determined to give it my best shot."

Laidley's career was virtually destroyed in 1990 when he shattered a knee and there was more than a touch of emotion when he fought his way back to league level last season.

His courage and dash off the half-back line saw him play 15 games, only to be squeezed out of the side before the historic premiership.

Considered to be "a little too loose" Laidley was released by the Eagles — but quickly snapped up by Norths, whose defence was brittle and needed a fearless touch.

"I figure that if I've got the ball, then my opponent hasn't," says Laidley, whose effort in the victory over Footscray was highlighted by a strong seven-kick third term.

DANGEROUS

He had opened up on dangerous Bulldogs rover Scott West, who posted an early goal — and Laidley was called to the interchange bench.

But he was only there for a few minutes before coach Denis Pagan had him back on West, who was restricted to just 15 possessions for the game.

"The coach wanted a word in my ear," said a grinning Laidley on his quick visit to the sidelines. "He wanted me to tighten up a bit."

SECOND-time around success stories are many and varied — but big ruckman Alex Ishchenko goes one better.

Despite one retirement and a knee injury that forced premature departure at least twice, the big man from Maylands is thriving at his third AFL club — and it's no coincidence that North Melbourne are on top of the table.

Ishchenko accepted the option to try one last time when he switched to North Melbourne in the March draft of 1992, after having declared his AFL career over.

He had played 42 games for Brisbane after joining the West Coast exodus to the Gold Coast in 1989, with 30 games and two fairly erratic seasons with the Eagles.

But he never really strode the arena like the colossus he should have been; Ishchenko was a victim of his own laid-back attitude, the fast lane on the Gold Coast and troublesome legs.

Russian helps 'Roos revolution

When he switched surprisingly to North Melbourne, he felt that the softer Melbourne grounds would help his legs, but there were no long-term plans.

The surprise of the '92 season was his continued good form, so much so that he finished third in the 'Roos fairest and best count and is now clearly established as the No. 1 ruckman in a team that has performed a football miracle.

"It's great," says the amiable giant of Ukrainian descent, but born within kicking distance of Perth Oval. "There's a tremendous spirit here now and they're a great bunch of guys."

"The tradition of the club is fantastic, that's one of the things I missed after leaving East Perth; it just wasn't there at the Eagles or the Bears."

Ishchenko concedes that his future was a short-term proposition when he accepted the North Melbourne invitation and no-one really rated his future highly. But the encouraging '92 season led to a solid summer preparation and now Ishchenko is a new man — even to the extent of sporting a haircut that's almost short-back-and-sides.

"Yes, I'm feeling really great these days," he says. "The knee is fine and even though it needs a bit of precautionary ice after a game, it's not giving me any trouble."

Not only was Ishchenko's knee standing up well against Footscray last week, but his hands were in fine touch.

He took nine strong marks around the ground and had 10 effective tap-outs, statistics that compared more-than-favourably with his Brownlow Medal opponent, Scott Wynd, who had 17 hit-outs and five marks.

"I was pretty happy with my effort against him," added Ishchenko.

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Famous names a top team at Swans

TWO of Western Australia's greatest footballers continue to play a significant role in the progress of WAFL club Swan Districts.

President Bill Walker and league coach John Todd, with four Sandover Medals between them and enormous experience when it comes to winning premierships, are major reasons why the Bassendean camp is one of football's toughest hurdles.

Swans are the newest club in the competition, being admitted in 1934.

But they have won seven premierships — hat-tricks in 1961-1963 and

1982-84 and a follow-up in 1990 ... with Walker a player in the first three and Todd coach of the next four.

The two men have combined to figure in the finals for the past two seasons and look like remaining a power throughout the 1990s.

Walker is in his 11th year at the helm at Bassendean and is naturally held in high esteem.

The former champion rover won three successive Sandover Medals, received the Simpson Medal in 1967 for his brilliant display for WA against South Australia and played a club-record 305 games.

His photograph hangs proudly in the entrance hall as one of the club's six Sandover Medal winners.

TRIUMPHS

The name Todd, like Walker, is famous at Swan Districts, in his off-field triumphs.

It was obvious Todd had more than average ability when he made his debut for South Fremantle in 1955 as a 17-year-old — the season he won the Sandover Medal.

Todd played 132 games for the Bulldogs, his career interrupted by a crippling knee injury.

Todd began coaching Swans in 1977 and stayed there until 1987, before he was appointed coach of the West Coast Eagles.

After two years in charge of the West Coasters, Todd returned to Bassendean in 1990 and had immediate success, with a premiership win over Claremont.

Walker's deputy for yet another season is John Farris, while Alec Abbott,

Alan Raynor, Peter Carter, Steve Gillespie and Ian Foss make up the board of directors.

Playing a vital role at Swans is long-serving general manager Brian Close, who has filled the position of both a player and league runner during his years at Bassendean.

Todd's loyal assistant is hard-working team manager Ray Reynolds, who has been heavily involved with Swans since the early 1980s.

Todd's assistant coach for the fourth year is former Subiaco and Claremont player Alan Walker, who is in charge of the reserves for a fifth term and searching for the club's first reserves flag since 1979.

His team manager is Ron Lorimer, while Raynor doubles up by managing the colts team, coached by former Swans premiership full-back Tom Mullooly.

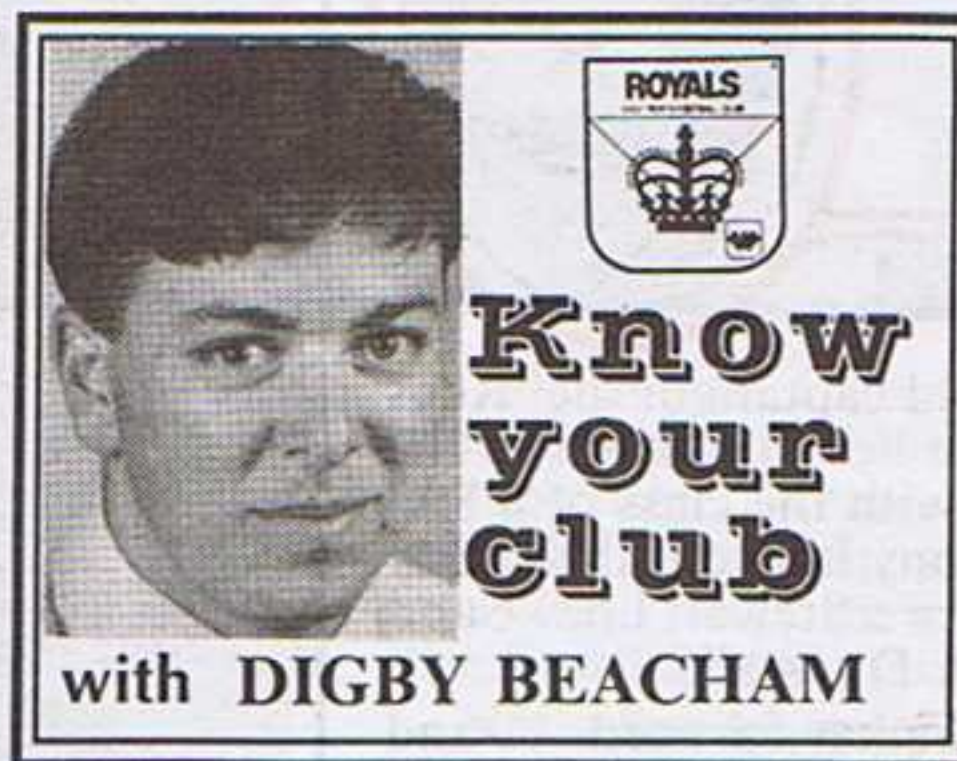
Mullooly stepped in as coach last season and did a magnificent job, taking the side to the preliminary final.

One of the hardest workers at Bassendean is office secretary Carol Taylor, who became involved with the club when her husband Ross, who now holds the position of head trainer, began serving as a trainer more than decade ago.

Taylor's assistant head trainers are Jim Byrne, Jack Hickling, Ian Taylor and Ken Ball, while Stuart Meldrum, Steve Thistleton, Gary Baker, Arthur McHugh and Gary O'Donnell are also dedicated workers.

Matera case arouses local bias

IT IS pretty easy to adopt a biased attitude towards the West Coast Eagles when you live in WA — and there was no shortage of people crying foul at the suspension of Peter Matera.

There is little doubt WA fans have often felt that there was a certain amount of jealousy coming from Victorians — and that was before we stole their precious trophy.

So it comes as no surprise that thousands of West Australians claimed that the two-week suspension handed down to dashing wingman — and Brownlow Medal fancy — Peter Matera was a pay back.

Dedicated football follower Peter Newman was quite outspoken on his 6PR breakfast show — and he had no shortage of support from listeners who considered Matera unlucky to receive a holiday.

In view of the way players like Gary Ablett and Tony Liberatore escaped penalties despite fairly incriminating TV evidence, one could have felt that Matera deserved a break.

But it didn't happen, so stop the moaning.

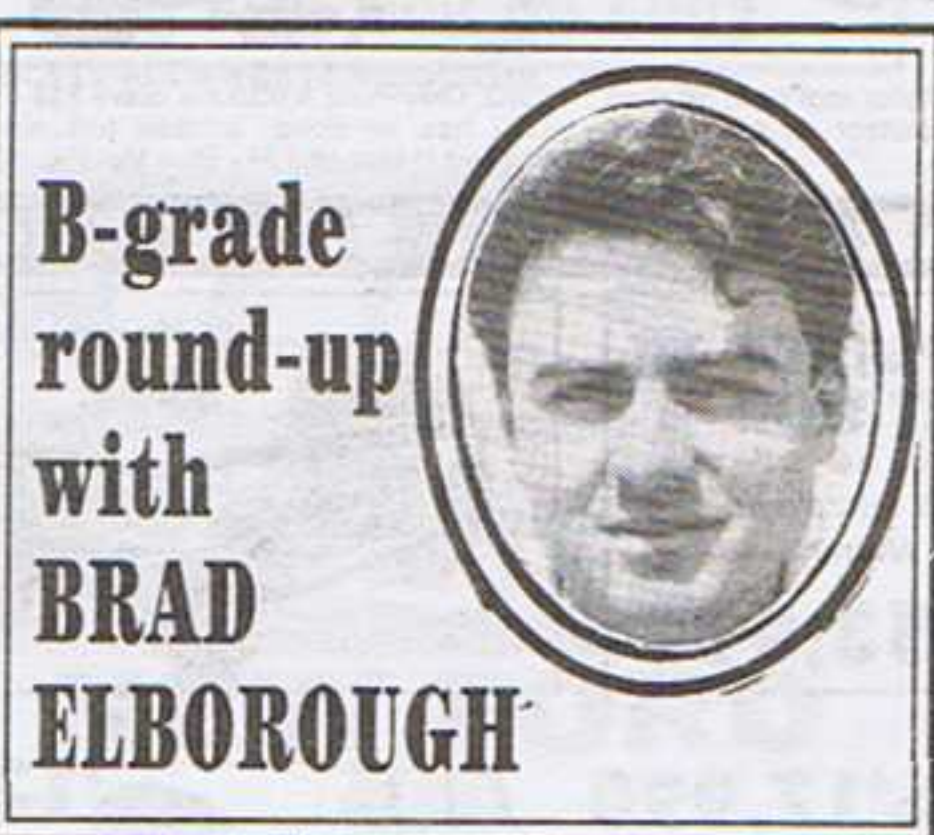

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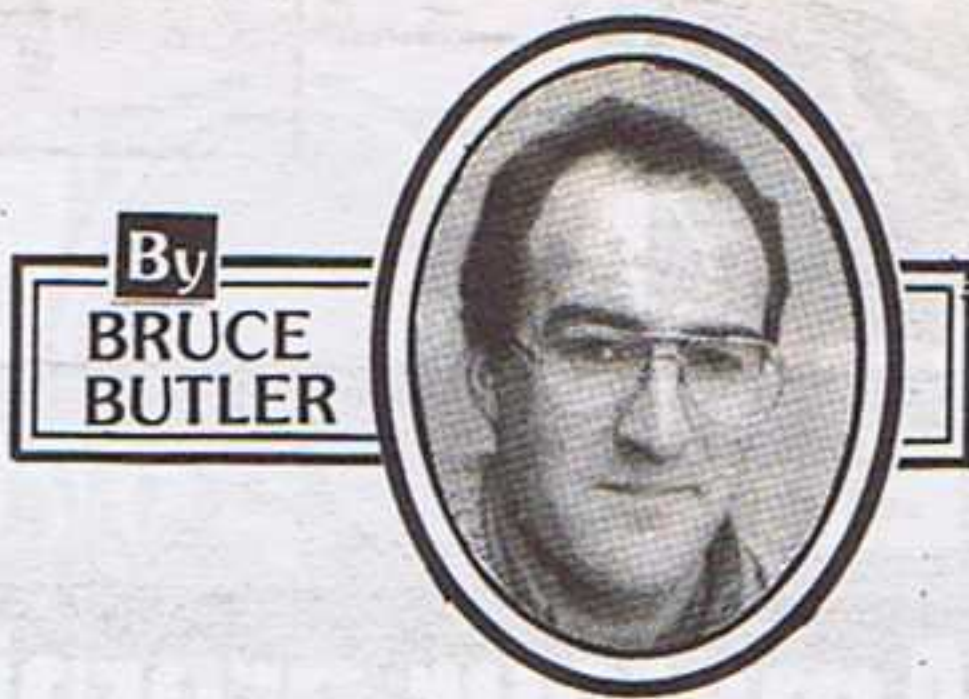
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Late miss is costly for Gosnells

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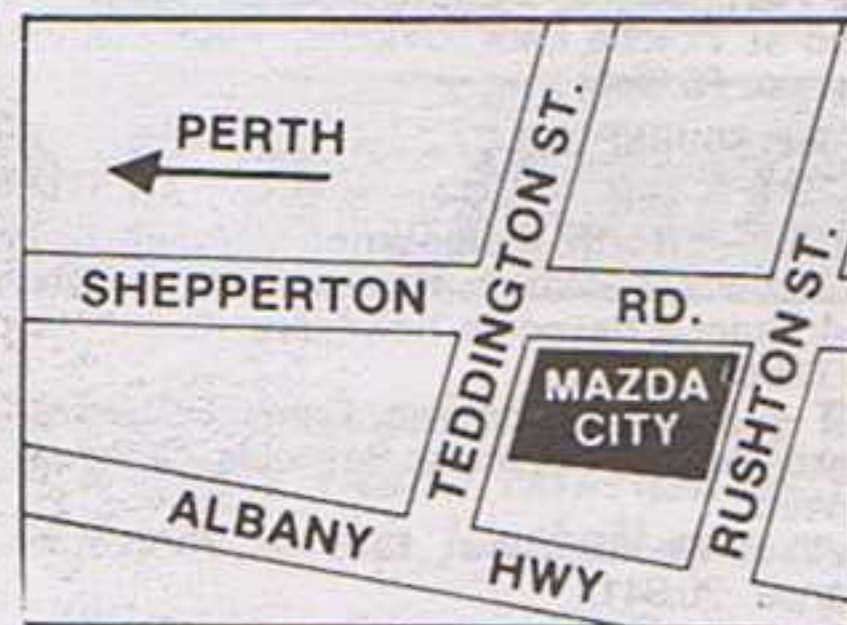


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
