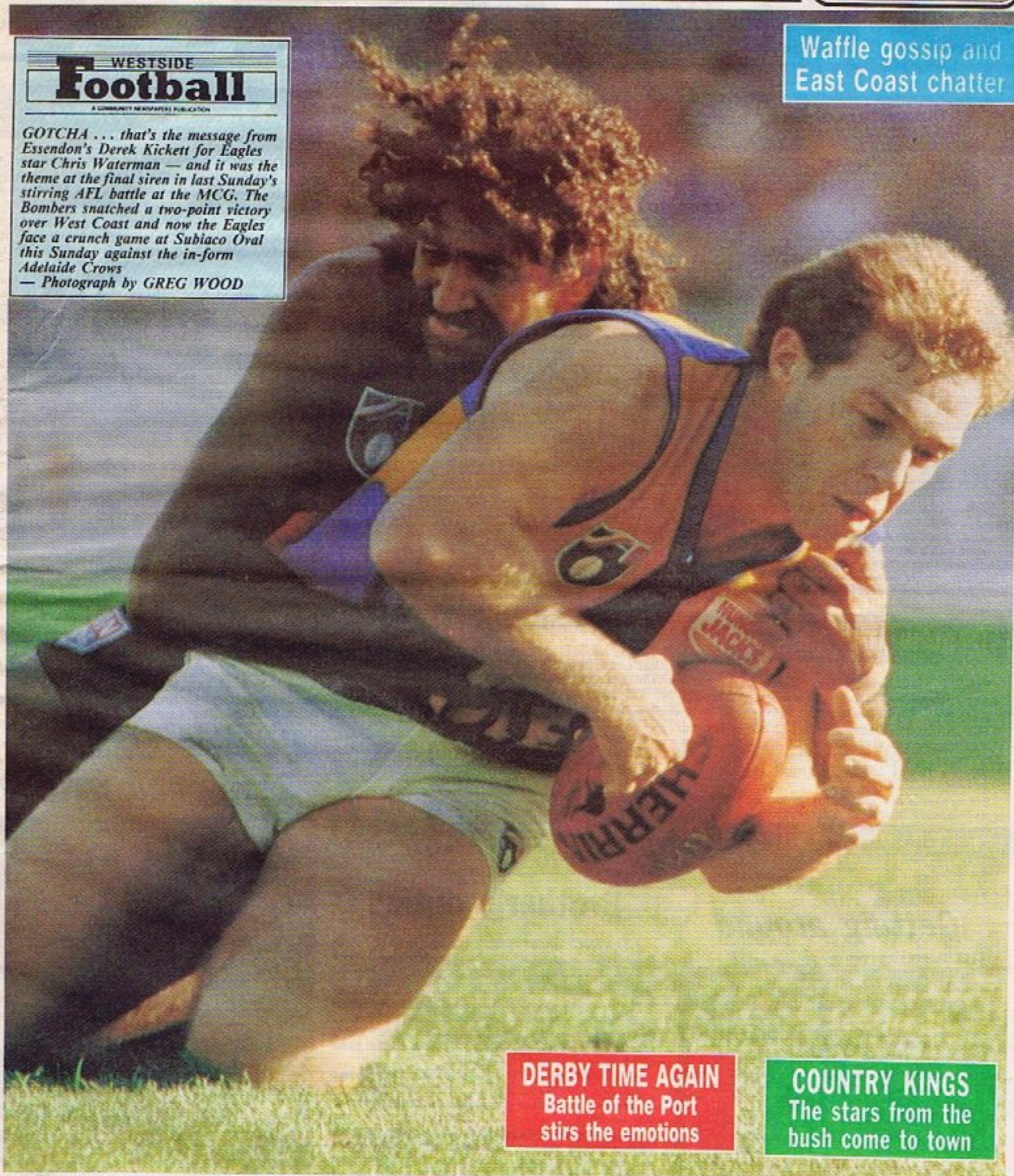

# Put wounded Lions out of misery

THE gun aimed at Fitzroy is loaded and designed to kill, but no one seems to have the nerve to pull the trigger.

Unfortunately, the Lions seem to be a lost cause and no amount of delaying by the AFL will improve the situation.

A swift end would seem to be the only humane outcome for the struggling Lions, but the AFL seems determined to make the Roy Boys suffer a slow, lingering and painfully public demise.

Every brave showing by the 20 players representing the Lions only increases the support for the true underdogs of the national competition. But the effort is not matched by the club's administrators on the balance sheet.

The Lions are deep in debt and have failed to meet the deadline for a pay-

ment to their most important creditor, the AFL.

Their presence in the competition depends entirely on the good grace of the AFL, because even the most dyed-in-the-wool Lions supporter has given up on the idea they can raise the money to get out of the red.

Fitzroy is not some third world country that can be allowed to pile up a mountain of debt.

They are a sporting club and a business and sometime, somehow, the bills simply have to be paid.

Supporters have rallied to the cause to raise money to keep the Lions afloat,

but the time has passed for rattling cans outside football grounds and running chook raffles. Someone has to pluck up the courage and make a hard and unpopular decision.

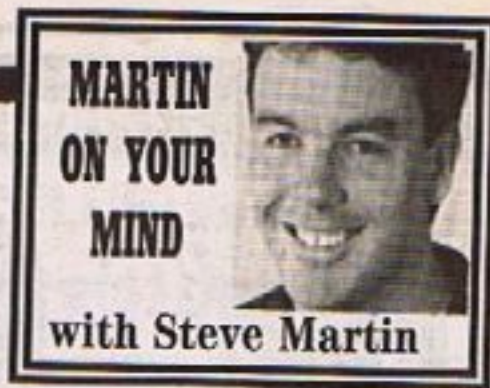
Talks between Footscray and Fitzroy aimed at getting the Lions to play their home games at the Western Oval next season only further indicate the club's desperate situation.

Anyone who has been to Melbourne will tell you that Fitzroy playing at the Western Oval and calling it a "home" game is like South Fremantle being based at Cannington.

Fitzroy have no strong traditional supporter bases like those at Essendon and St Kilda, who have moved to central locations, the MCG and Waverley. The Lions cannot hope to attract additional members from the Footscray heartland.

People have talked themselves hoarse about the benefits to the national competition if the number of Melbourne teams was pruned by two or three. Well, the AFL has the opportunity and the excuse to do something.

Think of the problems they could solve.



Sydney could be strengthened. Rumours seem to be spreading that one of the guarantees sought, and received, from the AFL by Ron Barrasi before he took the Swans job was that the Lions soon would be out of the competition and a significant number of players would move north of the border.

Another option is that the AFL could provide the playing strength for a second team in WA, although the clamour for that move seems to have died down in Melbourne.

Kevin Sheedy failed to mention it last Sunday, as he does most times when the Eagles beat Essendon.

The AFL could even let the Lions move to the Western Oval with the proviso that the two sides amalgamate by 1995.

Either of the above would eliminate the bye, which is a blight on the competition and at times makes the AFL ladder indecipherable — does anybody take any notice of the match ratio column?

Sometimes you do have to be cruel to be kind and this is one instance, but nobody seems to have the guts to put Fitzroy out of their misery.

The Lions do not have a home and quite frankly, they do not have a hope. Let the end come quickly.

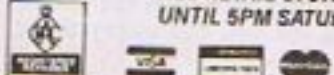

## Eagles coach bristles at the media

MICK Malthouse has never been an admirer of the media — but he apparently reads everything that is written about him or his team.

Two incidents, apart from his run-in with a Melbourne journalist last Sunday, support that observation.

The first was when he was coaching Footscray against the Eagles at the WACA Ground. The Bulldogs put in a big effort to go down by just over a goal.

At a conference after the game — the coaches used to face the media together — veteran commentator Frank Sparrow asked a simple question. Malthouse almost bit his head off and asked if he had been at the game.

The second was when he was appointed coach of the Eagles. I wrote in this column that he had been given 'the flick' by Footscray. He was on the phone almost as Westside Football came off the presses, so early that I thought someone was playing a joke.

But there was no humour in Malthouse's conversation and that has set the acid tone between us ever since.

While Malthouse appears strident, John Todd made him look a pussycat when it came to verbals with the media after the match. But while Todd could become wound up, there was never any fear of a physical confrontation after a game.

Mal Brown could be very intimidating, although he could just as easily turn a threat into a joke in the same sentence. And he does not carry grudges.

I don't know what sort of pugilist Malthouse would make, but it's a worry when he takes his blues outside a press conference.

He also believes in freedom of speech . . . as long as it isn't against him.

### WOUND UP

Football is Malthouse's life. It is a career and how he performs will determine what he will achieve in life. So it is understandable that he gets wound up, particularly after a narrow loss.

But while it may be a hackneyed phrase, it applies to him as well as anyone: "If you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen."

If Malthouse cannot hold a reasonable press conference without taking his vitriols — or giving sarcastic answers — out on the media, then he should not front them after a game.

Okay, so he may not like what some media write or say about him, but they are not part of the Eagles PR machine — just as he is there to do a job, so are they.

I watched Malthouse's confrontation with The West Australian's Luke Morfesse after the 1991 grand final. If Morfesse had so much as gone to scratch his nose, I reckon he would have been dobbed. And not just by Malthouse. By that time, players were hovering around like bodyguards itching to get into the action.

One day Malthouse is going to confront the media in a strident manner and they are not going to cop it. That can only bring football into disrepute.

Neither Malthouse nor the Eagles have the right to ban certain sections of the media because they fail to say or write nice things about them.

If Malthouse, or the Eagles, don't believe that the conduct of certain media people is up to scratch, then the AFL should be asked to step in. They have the power to cancel or suspend the media pass of a commentator or writer if they feel he has been out of order in dealing with a coach or club official.

But not simply because the person doesn't say, or write, nice things about the club.

## Retired stars stay tuned-in to the action

LAST Sunday I realised where retired footy stars go when their playing days are over — they take up radio commentary.

I had not realised before accepting 6NR's invitation to sit in their box for the Eagles v Essendon game how many former champions are on Melbourne's airwaves.

Through the glass windows on my left, I could see former Swan Districts and Footscray goalkicking machine Simon Beasley providing comments for radio 6PR back in Perth.

When other members of his team became almost hysterical in the closing minutes of the tense game, Beasley sat calmly, not wilting under the pressure just as he had during his playing days.

In contrast, Peter "Crackers" Keenan was jumping up and down to my right in the ABC box.

The close game certainly made him uneasy and I felt he would much rather have been out on the ground playing than calling the game.

### FROM THE HEART

Crackers obviously believed that if he were in the centre square, he could have won the game for his team.

His commentary, similar to the way he played, was straight from the heart.

Kevin Bartlett was almost unrecognisable in his 3AW baseball cap. The little master, who probably played half of his 403 games at the MCG, seemed to be giving new meaning to his title 'Special Comments Man.'

"Hungry" could have described every blade of grass on the vast expanses of "The G".

Phil Lamb called on all his 200-game WAFL experience during the match. His knowledge of the game is unquestionable and the clarity in which he described the lightning action in front of him was mind-blowing.

The way he worked with fellow 6NR member Michael Roach you would have thought they both played at Subiaco instead of Roach kicking goals for Richmond when Lamb was picking up kicks for the Lions.

Certainly spending time with the 6NR crew was an eye-opening experience. Judging by the way they looked at the end of the game they must have been hoping for not too many more close games this season.

And talking of the electronic media, you only have to glance at the TV screen to see a host of former champions — from my WA colleague Ross Glendinning to legends like Bernie Quinlan, Peter McKenna and Bob Davis.

There's certainly plenty of life-after-football!

That's where the game is won and lost and that showed against Essendon when Paul Salmon started getting on top in the ruck and the likes of Darren Bewick, Michael Long, Gary O'Donnell and Sean Denham were getting the ball away from the centre.

THIS Sunday certainly represents a proud moment for me as I play my 100th game for the Eagles and it's great to bring up that milestone with such a great club.

But I honestly don't care how many goals I kick as long as the Eagles win and keep in touch with the top five.

We still have a game up our sleeve on most of the sides above us, including Collingwood, Adelaide and Essendon, who all have the bye to come.

There's still only two games separating second (Hawthorn) from eighth (Footscray), so it's wide open.

PETER Sumich had a quieter day than usual against Essendon, but was still a solid contributor.

After troubling his teenage opponent Dustin Fletcher in the opening quarter with two goals, Sumich, who had kicked 18 majors in his past two games against the Bombers, was well held during the middle terms.

But he came to life in the last quarter, snaring a clever 15-metre right foot snap to post his third followed by a booming 50-metre attempt at the 11-minute mark.

His fourth goal gave the Eagles the lead until Paul Salmon sealed the match with less than a minute to the siren.

## Blue patch for McKenna

STAR Eagle Guy McKenna would have had *deja vu* in the second quarter against the Bombers.

The defender was virtually helpless as former Subiaco player Michael Symons had a purple patch, taking five great marks and kicking an important goal for the Bombers.

In the first game of the season at Subiaco Oval, McKenna had his hands full with debutant and last year's WA Teal Cup captain Tony Delaney, who troubled the Eagles 1989 club champion with his pace and elusiveness.

Coach Mick Malthouse opted to leave McKenna opposed to Symons and he responded with a brilliant second half, restricting the "Baby Bomber" to just two possessions.

EAGLES half-back Peter Wilson was rewarded for his solid effort against the Bombers when he was presented with the Jeans West voucher at the post-match presentations.

Wilson had the better of his duel with veteran Tim Watson and was one of three defenders to win awards.

Glen Jakovich (Tooheys) and Guy McKenna (Bolle) received trophies, as did Don Pyke (Newman and Brooks Prosimmon Golf) for his effort on Darren Bewick, centre-half-forward David Hynes (Puma) and captain John Worsfold (Pepsi).

## Youngster takes debut in stride

MAKING your AFL debut is always daunting, but when it happens at the MCG against power side Essendon, it is even more nerve-wracking.

That was the case on Sunday for Drew Banfield — the No. 1 choice in last year's November draft.

The solidly-built country teenager was selected for the Eagles after several excellent games for Subiaco.

Coach Mick Malthouse started the youngster in the centre square, opposed to elusive Bombers midfielder Michael Long.

After a nervous start, Banfield settled down to finish with 13 possessions in an encouraging first-up performance.

But he admitted the noisy crowd of 44,507 had been distracting.

"It was a learning experience because it was the biggest crowd I had played in front of and you couldn't ignore it all," Banfield said.

Banfield, who described the match as "unbelievable", said the step up in intensity from WAFL was significant.

"You hear people talk about it, but you don't know what it is like until you're out there," he said.

## Magical spell from McIntosh

ASHLEY McIntosh showed why he is one of the brightest prospects in the country with two special moments against Essendon.

Though he appeared to be below full fitness, McIntosh kicked two

goals, albeit in contrasting styles, in a way which makes him a vital cog in the reigning premiers' machine.

Late in the second quarter, McIntosh soared high into the air to pull down a mark in the goalsquare and kick a major to

get the Eagles within one point.

In the third term, after a brief stint on the bench, he sprinted on to a loose ball at centre-half-forward, burnt off Essendon 150-gamer Mark Harvey before converting from 25 metres.

# Coaches queue for top jobs

THE WA football system has long been recognised as one of the best breeding grounds of on-field talent in the country.

And the State would be on the verge of being accredited as an outstanding production line for coaches.

In recent years, the performances of John Todd and Mal Brown have been well documented, but a new generation of coaches is starting to forge reputations.

Ken Judge earned high praise for taking the Sharks to last year's Pepsi Cup premiership and by leading WA to victory over South Australia this year, he showed that one day he should earn a crack at AFL level.

That success came when, on paper at least, SA looked stronger than WA.

Judge has been very thorough, a quality suited to the demands of AFL coaching.

Gerard Neesham, an innovative coach involved in nine consecutive WAFL grand finals — five as coach at Claremont and four when playing for Swan Districts and East Fremantle — is one of the most successful mentors in the game.

He has also shown a capacity to coach at the highest level, but opportunities in the AFL are scarce and the jobs which have been on offer have been far from attractive.

If there was a lesson in the Gary Buckenara situation at the Sydney Swans it is that rookie AFL coaches must be selective.

Buckenara was on a hiding to nothing when he took on the biggest challenge in football and was dumped a few games into his second season.

### ANOTHER CHANCE

The problem for the former champion Hawthorn, Subiaco and WA forward is that he may never get another chance and history could cruelly judge him on an appointment which was almost impossible.

Clubs must turn over coaches to promote fresh ideas and if Neesham and Judge get opportunities in the AFL, doors will open at WAFL level.

And there is no shortage of candidates for WAFL coaching jobs.

A couple who readily spring to mind are Robert Solin and Phil Cronan.

Solin is keen to follow twin brother Tony into the senior coaching arena and like Subiaco's rookie coach, he is a deep thinker and strategist, as shown in his role as Stan Magro's assistant at East Perth.

Solin has coaching experience, having filled the role in Karratha.

He has worked with some of the club's younger players and the rewards have been obvious over the past couple of months.

Cronan is serving his apprenticeship in amateur ranks and after taking Mt Lawley to the A-grade premiership last year, he is keen to progress to the next level.

Like Solin, he has the advantage of being involved at the highest level — winding down a career that began at South Fremantle, continued at West Perth, Footscray, St Kilda and Woodville, before ending up where it all started.

He played in some of those memorable State-of-Origin clashes in the early 1980s and these sorts of experiences can only be beneficial.

# Full-forwards on target with record

**FULL-FORWARDS** continued to dominate the football headlines last weekend, with three more players kicking tallies of 10 goals or more.

This season has produced a record 14 double-figure tallies, eclipsing the 11 in 1991.

Carlton's Stephen Silvagni became the 17th player still in AFL ranks to kick double figures with his 10.6 against Fitzroy at Princes Park on Saturday.

Saverio Rocca's 10 goals against Footscray was the first double-figure tally at Victoria Park since Brian Taylor kicked 10 against Richmond in 1986.

On Friday night, Tony Modra's 13-goal haul was his third double-figure bag this year and broke the Crows record of 11 goals, by Scott Hodges at Football Park in round 23 last year.

\*\*\*\*\*

*ON Sunday, Essendon recorded their first win over the Eagles since the 1990 preliminary final, taking their overall record against the Eagles to eight wins and five losses from 13 encounters.*

*The loss was the Eagles third this year by a goal or less and their 14th by a goal or less since entering the competition in 1987.*

*The Eagles have won only five games by a goal or less since 1987, including one game this year.*

\*\*\*\*\*

**HAWTHORN'S** hard-fought win over Melbourne on Saturday consolidated their position in the top six and set them up to break the record for consecutive years in the finals.

The Hawks have played in the finals every year since 1982, matching the performances of Carlton in 1978-88, Melbourne (1954-1964), and Collingwood (1901-1911).

If the Hawks are part of the September action this year they will be on their own as participants in 12 consecutive finals series.

\*\*\*\*\*

*CARLTON'S* win over Fitzroy was their sixth in a row, matching their winning sequence of six towards the end of last year.

*The Blues last sequence of six wins was from round 17, 1987, to round 4 the following year — 12 wins which included the 1987 premiership.*

\*\*\*\*\*

**ST KILDA** recorded their first win over Geelong since round 8, 1988, breaking a sequence of eight losses against the Cats.

This weekend, North Melbourne will be seeking their first win over the Saints since 1990, while Sydney will be seeking to break a losing sequence of six against Hawthorn.

# Bennett accepts relegation

AN incredible run of injuries has reduced big WA forward Darren Bennett to an average of less than a dozen games a year since his AFL debut in 1987.

But the one-time West Coast star is convinced that his — and Melbourne's — fortunes are on the improve.

Despite more injury setbacks, which this year include a broken arm and a calf complaint and a realisation that the selectors no longer regard him as their No. 1 full-forward, Bennett is enjoying his involvement at Melbourne and eyeing a place in the finals.

"We have to win five matches to do it, but we've done it before. We can do it again," he said.

Signing autographs and chatting with young admirers outside Melbourne's dressing rooms on Saturday night, Bennett appeared at ease with the world and determined that his career is not closed.

"You stiffen up a bit with the cold and all that," he says.

"I was 95 percent sure of playing last week but the medical staff didn't want to take the risk, so I didn't," he said.

Bennett (28) had recovered from his calf injury to kick five goals in the reserves and with continuing injury clouds over the club's star goalkicker, another much-travelled West Australian Allen Jakovich, Bennett may be in line for a senior recall this weekend against Footscray.

## OPPORTUNITIES

Bennett has kicked more than 30 goals in limited appearances at VSFL level.

He said his arm, which was broken in his first senior game of the year in the third round against Brisbane at the Gabba, no longer was a worry.

He had kicked four goals in a promising start before his mishap and since then, has had only one return match at AFL level.

Asked about Melbourne's chances of clinching a finals berth after Saturday's crucial loss, Bennett said the club had consistently shown its ability to win games on end when it counted.

"We did it in '87 (with five consecutive wins in the last five qualifying games), '88 (winning the last game against Carlton which decided fifth spot), '89 (to finish fourth) and '90 (fourth again)," he said.

An encouraging sign for Melbourne on Saturday was that they had 10 of the last 11 shots at goal against the second-placed Hawthorn, to reduce a 40-point deficit to 16 at the siren.

Only the continuing superb form of Jason Dunstall saved Hawthorn from becoming yet another Melbourne MCG victim this year.

Dunstall kicked 7.4 despite a jarred heel. Four of his goals came in the all-important third quarter as Hawthorn produced some of their most awesome form for the year.

Melbourne insiders hope Jakovich's injured heel will improve enough to allow him to play in Saturday's big game at the Western Oval.

If he is unfit, Bennett may be included ahead of Saturday's full-forward, Darren Cuthbertson, who kicked only one goal against the Hawks.

## AYRES CONFIDENT

HAWTHORN captain Gary Ayres remains unperturbed by suggestions that his place in Hawthorn's best 18 is on the line.

Ayres was benched for all the last half against Melbourne, after conceding two early goals to fellow veteran Rodney Grinter on Saturday.

It was Ayres' return match after injuring a shoulder in late June.

"Until hurting my shoulder I'd been pleased with the way things had been going," he said.

"It was just a team balance thing today. I'd like to have more time on the field, but that's the way the match committee see things right now."

Until this year, Ayres (32) had been a key player in Hawthorn's team, but remains determined to be a part of the Hawks bid to qualify for their record 12th consecutive finals series.

Hawthorn coach Alan Joyce also relegated Tony Hall to the bench for much of the game on Saturday, preferring to go with pacier types.

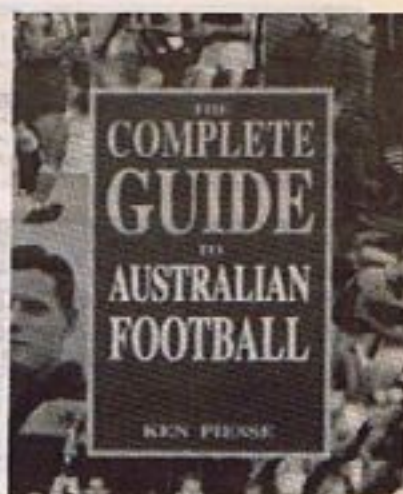



# Crows spearhead in full flight

DESPERATE for a change of luck, the West Coast Eagles will be a hungry combination when they play hosts to the Adelaide Crows at Subiaco Oval on Sunday.

With their home ground advantage blown out of the water this season, the reigning premiers will be in search of just their fifth win in eight games in Perth.

Narrow losses have a big effect on the confidence of a side and all players will be looking to get an early jump on Adelaide after losses by one point to Carlton and two points to Essendon. The Crows come to Perth win-less in

WA, but riding high in fourth place on the premiership table with four consecutive wins.

But the Crows are still suspect off Football Park, with only one of their past four wins coming away from home — against Sydney at the SCG.

The Eagles will be lifted by Peter Sumich's 100th game and the knowl-

edge that a loss could sideline them in September for the first time in coach Mick Malthouse's four-year reign.

Sumich, the side's leading goalkicker for the fifth consecutive year, has kicked 56 goals in 13 games this season at an average of 4.3 a game.

A four-goal haul against Essendon showed his good touch and his duel with exciting youngster Ben Hart will be a beauty.

But while Sumich is in sparkling form, at the other end of the ground, Crows spearhead Tony Modra has been brilliant.

Modra shot to the top of the AFL goalkicking table with a Crows record 13 goals against Richmond last Friday night and he will take some stopping.

Strong in the air and with brilliant recovery on the ground, Modra should ensure a huge crowd at Subiaco.

Averaging 6.3 in 15 games this season, Modra heads the AFL table with 94.38, an outstanding conversion rate.

Regular Eagles full-back Michael Brennan looms as a probable opponent

for Modra with back-up from Chris Waterman and Mitchell White if needed.

One thing in the Eagles favour is that if they can stop Modra, the Crows are in trouble.

With the Crows having no other player in the top 35 leading scorers, the Eagles defence will be at their most desperate on Sunday.

While the Crows kicked an awesome 26 goals to four against Richmond, the Eagles have failed to bury a side this season.

Their strength is their defence's ability to restrict their opposition and centre-half-forward Nigel Smart and Scott Hodges, in a pocket, will be in their sights.

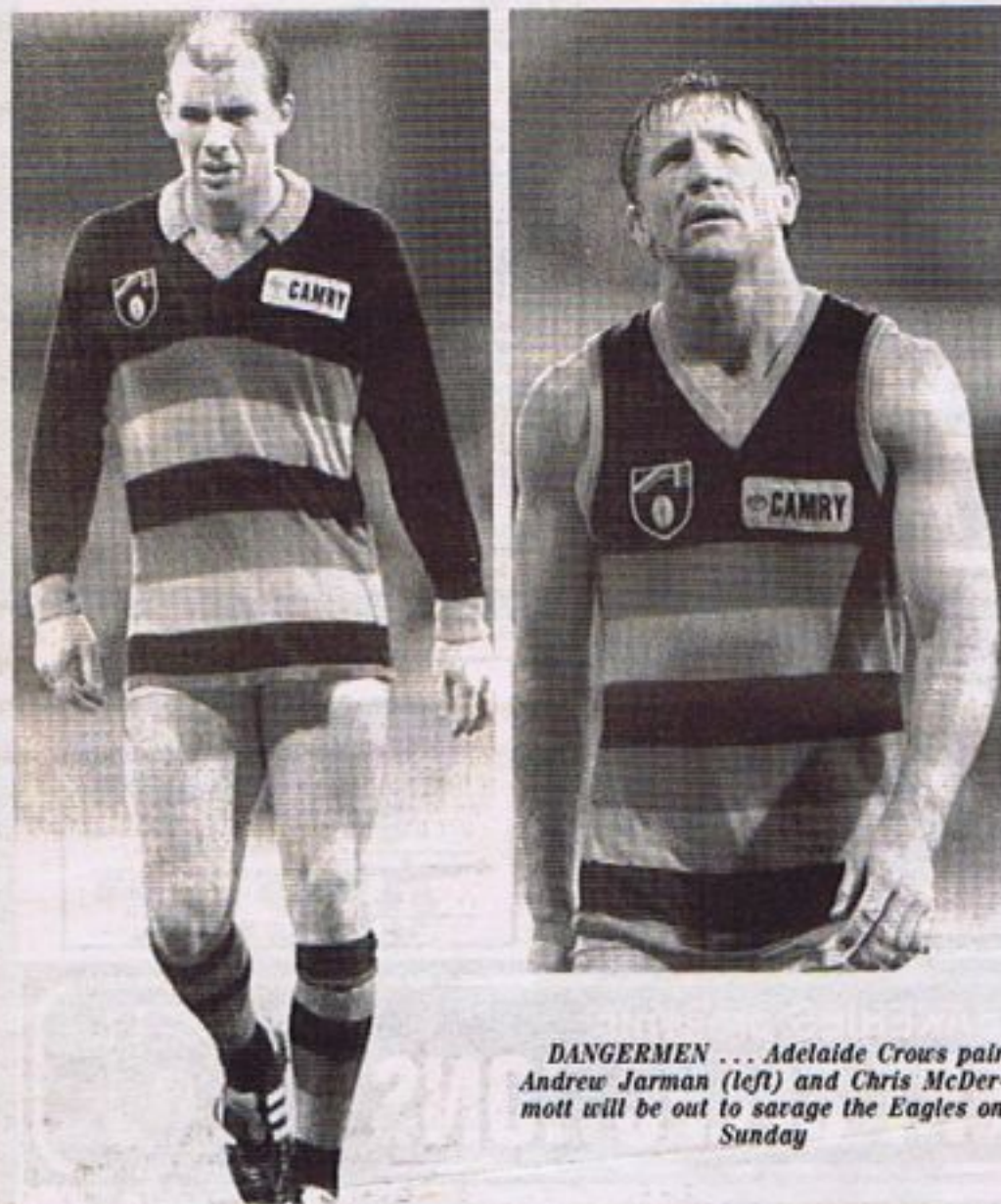
Blessed with an accomplished running division, the Crows can expect close attention from Eagles taggers.

Greg Anderson, Simon Tregenza, Tony McGuinness, Chris McDermott and Andrew Jarman are just a handful of players capable of cutting open a side's midfield.

Missing from the regular Eagles on-batters will be Dwayne Lamb, who sustained a rare ankle injury against Essendon and will be out of action for a fortnight.

Brendon Retzlaff, 21st man last Sunday, looms as a likely inclusion for the running division.

Dean Kemp again will be given every chance to prove his fitness, though Drew Banfield gave a solid first-up performance in the centre and should hold his spot.

A DEPLETED North Melbourne side will be determined to beat St Kilda under lights at the MCG to retain top spot from the fast-finishing Hawthorn and Carlton.

Wayne Carey, Anthony Rock and Adrian McAdam are all in doubt after the Roos 11th win of the season, while Jose Romero will miss two weeks with a strained medial ligament.

St Kilda bucked the odds to beat Geelong with Tony Lockett missing from the goal mouth, showing the Saints still are an unknown quantity capable of an upset.

THE disappointing Geelong, out of the finals race, would not be relishing the prospect of their trip to Waverley Park to take on the steadily improving Collingwood.

With their meekest performance of the year still fresh in their minds, the Cats selectors should wield the axe in a bid to lift the players.

The Magpies three consecutive wins have given them new heart in their quest for a finals berth and the polished work of their midfield and forward line should get Collingwood over the line.

# Kowal grieves loss that dents finals hope

NO-ONE, with the exception of coach Neil Balme and his match committee, took Melbourne's 16-point loss to Hawthorn harder than Darren Kowal.

The defeat left the surging Demons with a difficult task of qualifying for this year's finals — of which Kowal needed no reminding.

After the game, the exciting second-year player lay on his back, head in his hands and stared at the ceiling in the Melbourne Football Club's changerooms, decorated with photos of past champions.

While most players were showered, changed and on their way to the social club, Kowal still lay there, despondent and bitterly disappointed with the result.

The Demons trailed by only one point at half-time, but were overrun in the final two quarters as the Hawks machine, predictably led by champion full-forward Jason Dunstall, moved into top gear.

Kowal, like many of his team-mates, had a down day — which they could ill-afford without match-winner Allen Jakovich against a typically disciplined Hawthorn side.

Kowal, who is self-confident but far from cocky, is his harshest critic and he was well aware of the severity of the loss.

"We still have a chance to play in the finals, but we are putting our hopes in other teams' hands, depending on if they win or lose," Kowal said.

"If we had won today and the other five games, we would have been there."

## TEETHING PROBLEMS

When John Northey resigned as coach of Melbourne last year and replaced Richmond's Allan Jeans, the Demons selected successful SA coach Balme to fill his boots.

A change in coach almost always brings teething problems, but after round 4, the Demons were still without a win and a long, bleak winter was imminent.

But the players had only to adjust to Balme's different style of coaching — similar to Kowal's former mentor, Claremont premiership coach Gerard Neesham, who tells his players to hold on to the ball and wait until a player is available.

Melbourne's first win came against Adelaide at the MCG on April 25 and until their loss to Hawthorn, the Demons had won seven of their 10 games in between — with Kowal playing in all, as well as their loss to North Melbourne the Saturday before toppling the Crows.

His main role this season has been to lurk in the forward line and tidy up the crumbs — a job he has handled superbly.

"The past couple of weeks have been good, though today wasn't too flash," Kowal said.

"Neil wants me to be there to rove the packs, give another option as a lead, but make sure I try to get back to kick the goals."

Many people in the coastal town of Bunbury, 200km south of Perth, are not surprised that the 21-year-old has made the grade in the AFL.

Kowal made his debut for power South West National Football League club South Bunbury as a teenager and was a member of the 1989 premiership team that beat Harvey Brunswick.

After another solid season with the Tigers in 1990, Kowal joined Claremont.

He had little trouble slotting into the Tigers all-conquering 1991 side, playing 16 games, including having a significant part in their crushing grand final win over Subiaco.

Melbourne recruiting manager Richard Griffith had monitored the progress of Kowal, along with premiership team-mates Jason Norrish and Phil Gilbert and the trio were selected third, fifth and 19th by the Demons in the 1991 November draft.

## DRAFT CHOICE

Melbourne let ruckman and 1988 club champion Steven O'Dwyer go to Richmond for the Tigers No. 1 draft pick and with that choice, they nominated Kowal.

Unlike Norrish and Gilbert, who opted to stay in WA, Kowal went to Melbourne last year.

Last Saturday was the first time since the win against Subiaco that Kowal, Norrish and Gilbert had played together.

Kowal struggled in his AFL debut year, playing only three league games, despite encouraging form in the reserves.

"I thought I was playing all right, but I just didn't get the opportunity," Kowal said.

"Northey and the reserves coach Mark Cross had a plan and they stuck with it."

Kowal's poise, with his slick ball-handling and eye-catching turn of speed, have caused him to be likened to former brilliant centreman Geoff Raines.

## SIZZLING SHOWING

He was recently nominated for the AFL's Norwich Rising Star award after a sizzling showing against St Kilda, when his pace was too much for the flat-footed Saints, collecting 24 possessions and two goals from his forward pocket.

"Pace is something you can't combat," Kowal said.

"With height you can punch the ball away, but pace is different — you can't stop some bloke if you can't catch him."

Kowal said he would have preferred to stay in Perth to play with West Coast, but is delighted with life in Melbourne, which revolves around football.

He is working in a tyre warehouse at Clayton and living in Mt Waverley with last year's assistant reserves coach, Robert Kerr.

"He treats me well, keeps on my back and sees I eat the right things," Kowal said.

Kowal said he would be working harder over the next six weeks to help lift Melbourne into the finals and hopefully earn a chance to win the club's first premiership since 1964.

"It's just a dream to play in a premiership — plus you get to run around the oval for a while," he joked.

## Bombers unearth top pair

ESSENDON are blessed with some big names who, naturally, were expected to figure prominently against West Coast at the MCG.

Experienced campaigners Tim Watson, captain Mark "Bomber" Thompson, Derek Kickett, Mark Harvey, Gary O'Donnell and Paul Salmon and exciting youngsters Gavin Wanganeen and James Hird are idolised by the legion of Bombers supporters.

And while they all did their bit in the Dons thrilling two-point win over the Eagles, it was two of the club's lesser lights who stole the show.

Former Geelong rover Sean Denham and rookie wingman Ricky O'larenshaw were simply superb in Essendon's triumph.

O'larenshaw (20) started on Chris Mainwaring and was paid a compliment by Eagles coach Mick Malthouse, when the dashing Eagle was shifted to the forward pocket in the second term.

O'larenshaw, the Bombers 1991 under-19s fairest and best, finished with 21 disposals and Mainwaring 20.

The game was the left-footer's first since round 10, when he tore the tendons in his fingers after his hand caught in the guernsey of Fitzroy's James Manson.

For Denham, the win was further proof why Essendon boss Kevin Sheedy believes the Bombers have benefited from the Denham-John Barnes swap.

## TEAL CUP MATES

The 1986 Teal Cup team-mates were traded to their new homes after failing to produce the form they showed as teenagers.

Denham (24) was in great touch against the Eagles from the outset and worked tirelessly to gather 16 kicks and 16 handballs.

Several people have criticised Sheedy for the trade, especially after Barnes starred for the Cats in last year's finals series.

But the Bombers mentor has been delighted with Denham's form this season and praised the left-footed rover after Sunday's game.

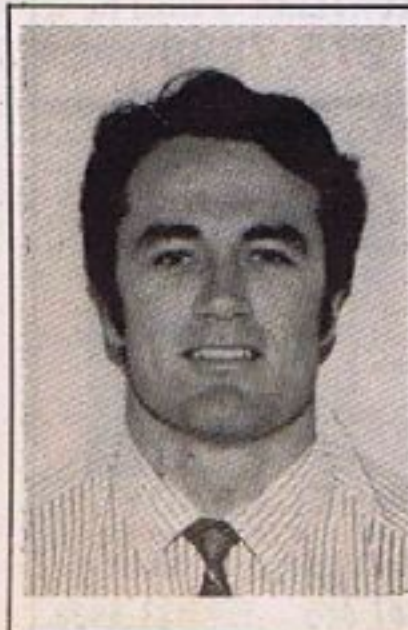

# Sheedy sets finals target

**NO, you weren't seeing things after Essendon's heart-stopping two-point win over West Coast at the MCG.**

It was Bombers coach Kevin Sheedy swinging his club jacket above his head in wild jubilation after the final siren.

And it was Sheedy who dashed on to the playing arena to congratulate 150-gamer Mark Harvey and embrace his charges.

Many fans had never seen Sheedy show such emotion, even after the Dons won premierships in 1984-85.

The experienced coach is made of stern stuff and like many of the experienced AFL mentors, rarely lets his feelings show.

But he could not hide his delight with the win, which elevated the Bombers to sixth place at the expense of the Eagles.

"It was a good win and we are pleased with the persistence of the side, when our kicking for goal could have seen the team easily drop away," Sheedy said.

"I think last week's match against North Melbourne (they surrendered a 10-point three-quarter-time lead to lose by 38) held us in good stead."

After praising his charges, Sheedy was asked if he had watched Paul Salmon's winning shot at goal.

He replied in typical Sheedy fashion: "Salmon's kicked a lot of goals for us over the years and he should kick it, that's his job."

## BREAKING DOWN

The Bombers looked in trouble at quarter-time when they trailed by 10 points, but were breaking down badly across half-forward.

Sheedy then introduced Derek Kickett, who immediately had an impact.

Kickett, who conceded six goals to Kangaroos goalsneak Adrian McAdam the previous week, gathered 14 possessions and in the final three terms kicked 2.2, including a booming 65-metre torpedo punt goal late in the third quarter.

Most spectators at the ground were amazed when the former West Perth and Claremont star started on the bench.

"McAdam got away from him late in the game last week and that cost us dearly," Sheedy said.

"You have to pay your penalty and Derek sat on the bench because of that."

"We know Derek is an exciting player, but his job was to allow no goals to McAdam, not six."

# Demon Balme has plenty of rapport

**WHEN** rugged Richmond big man Neil Balme was strutting his stuff around the playing fields of Victoria, he was the last player you wanted to tangle with.

The burly big man's straight-ahead approach and no-nonsense manner made him one of the most feared players of his era.

Balme made his debut for the Tigers in 1970 and had a successful career at Punt Road, playing 159 games, including two premierships.

Because of his strong marking and raw aggression, he was often used in attack, where he kicked 229 goals.

After leaving Richmond in 1979, Balme, who played four games with Subiaco, went to South Australia to take up a coaching appointment with SANFL club Norwood.

He guided the Redlegs to flags in 1982 and 1984 and stayed at the helm until the end of the 1990 season.

In 1991 Balme was chosen to coach the Eagles — formerly Woodville-West Torrens.

## STARK CONTRAST

He led them into the finals in their first season and again last year, before accepting an invitation to cross back over the border again.

But his success in the difficult world of coaching is in stark contrast to the way he played the game.

Without being unfair to Balme, his coaching methods are full of strategy and careful planning and his casual approach when addressing the media is like a breath of fresh air.

Balme has quickly developed a close relationship with his players, who hold the rookie mentor in high regard.

Last year's club champion Glenn Lovett recently described Balme as a "player's man".

"He is absolutely fantastic," Lovett said.

His thoughts were echoed by young forward Darren Kowal.

"He's a good coach, because he has a great rapport with his players and a good style," he said.

The "style" Kowal referred to is similar to former Subiaco coach Hadyn Bunton and Tigers boss Gerard Neesham in that the players are instructed to hold on to the ball until a team-mate presents himself, rather than blaze away aimlessly downfield — commonly referred to as a possession game.

Even after the Demons loss to Hawthorn at the MCG on Saturday, which went a long way to ending their finals aspirations, Balme stayed quiet and philosophical at the post-match press conference.

"It was always going to be hard before today and it's still going to be difficult," Balme said, after being asked about Melbourne's chances of contesting the finals.

"While there are still five games to go, I reckon if we win the five, we are going to be a fair chance."

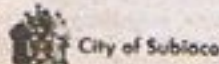

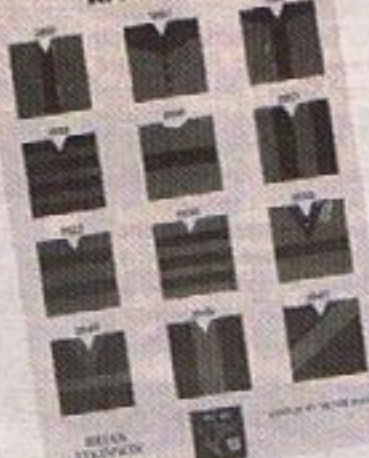

**FOOTBALL** is certainly played on emotion, that's a well-worn phrase.

But it's the emotion rising from Leederville Oval at present that obviously has a few rival clubs worried.

The West Perth Football Club, the oldest in the local industry, going back to 1885, is moving house at the end of this season — a radical decision to take up residence at Joondalup, in a spanking new sports stadium.

That's a huge wrench for a club that has played home games at the Vincent Street ground since 1915 . . . and they want to leave on a winning note.

West Perth hit rock bottom at the start of the 1990s, claiming the wooden-spoon for three successive years to open the decade.

The recruiting of a little-known Victorian coach in Jeff Gieschen didn't seem to help much, winning seven games to trail the field in his debut season.

Things were looking gloomy as the few remaining loyalists stuck it out at Leederville Oval preparing for their last season. But it's amazing how things can change in this game of ours.

**RECOMMENDATION**

Gieschen, a man who came with Mick Malthouse's recommendation, won everybody over at Leederville and the Falcons are now sitting pretty.

Judged on last week's gutsy come-from-behind victory at East Fremantle Oval — and a few other fighting efforts against the odds this season — the

## Falcon feeling is a real worry

Falcons are no longer the easy-beats of the Pepsi Cup league.

They are second and keen to stay in the top three, which means their first finals action since 1989, when George Michalczyk took them to a stirring elimination final draw.

The Falcons continue to defy the knockers who claim that their highly-elevated position on the Pepsi Cup table is only temporary.

**PENDULUM**

Radio 6PR chatter-box Percy Johnson summed up a lot of outsider's feelings when he said that the pendulum was starting to swing against West Perth, what with a couple of key injuries to players.

But once again the Falcons stirred the emotions — and there will be plenty of that happening in coming weeks, as well.

Renowned football journalist Geoff Christian believes the Falcons need to change their guernsey when they switch to Joondalup — and that's a touchy issue.

The former chief football writer with The West Australian — and the one-time athlete who helped prepare the old Cardinals for their 1960 premiership under coach Arthur Oliver, another Victorian.

**IDEAL TIME**

Christian says West Perth have had the same guernsey since 1946 and it was out of date — and the move to Joondalup would be an ideal time to change things.

There are plenty of other reasons why West Perth think they can win this year's flag.

Last year Robbie West — also a Victorian recruit from Gieschen's country paddock up Wodonga way — broke a 33-year drought by winning the Sandover Medal.

When West Perth's last Medal Man, Brian Foley, won the 1959 Medal, the Cardinals — as they were lovingly known then — claimed the premiership the next year.

## Anniversary for CBC boys

**ONE** of WA's most traditional football clubs, CBC Old Boys, celebrate their 60th anniversary this year.

Established in 1933, the club now has three senior sides and one colts team and is the second-oldest in the WA Amateur Football League.

The club has long been identified with the Christian Brothers College school system and also shares a special link with South Fremantle.

Based at Fremantle Park, CBC had provided many Bulldogs players over the years, particularly in the club's 'Golden Era' in the 1950s.

Among the CBC champions to pull on the red and white guernsey are legendary forward Bernie Naylor and triple premiership player, Des Reed.

During the first three years of World War II, CBC supplied Souths with their entire reserves side.

But Souths are not the only WAFL club to benefit from CBC, with Gerard Neesham, the former East Fremantle and Swan Districts veteran and now Claremont coach, also donning the green and gold jumper.

On top of this CBC, have produced 30 State representatives and six All-Australian players.

**STALWART**

Throughout the club's proud history, there is one thing that has never changed — the dedication of founding member Tom Naylor.

Naylor, a CBC and Amateur League life member, played more than 400 games for the club in over 23 years. He coached for 10 years and was the club's president for a record 16 years.

Marking this extra-ordinary contribution, he was awarded the prestigious National Football League award of merit, the highest award to football administration.

At 80 years of age, he's still making sure that things go smoothly on Saturdays.

The club's long history at Fremantle Park is coming to an end, with a planned move to Kardinya's Morris Buzacott Reserve next year.

But CBC hope to leave the old grounds on a high note, starting with a special day for past and current players and members on July 31, getting under way at Fremantle Park at noon, coinciding with the clash against Mt Lawley.

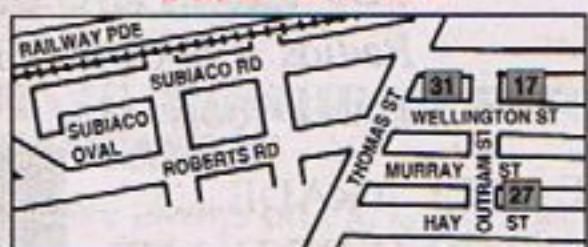

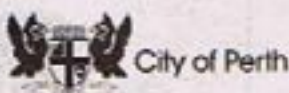
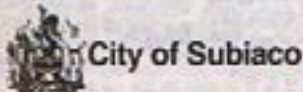

## Tigers boast some mean defenders

**THERE** have been some superb defenders emerge from Claremont ranks over the years and picking their best backline looms as a tough proposition.

Ken Caporn holds the Claremont record for games played — 273 over the 1950s and '60s — and he reigned supreme at full-back, with the ability to also play at centre-half-forward.

John Hyde, a man who captain-coached Claremont in the 1950s and won a fairest and best at Geelong, was another who controlled things at centre-half-back.

There were quite a few players from that era who were outstanding defenders — especially in the support roles.

Maurice Bridgwood was a classic back pocket specialist, Don Idle was a half-back flanker who seldom gave his man a moment's peace and Peter Jago was another back pocket player with mean credentials.

Bill O'Neill, a tough centre-half-back who played with distinction, both for the Tigers and WA, in the late '40s, was another key-position man, while Harry Price was a back pocket man with heaps of skill.

In the latter years, there would be few classier defenders than Denis Marshall, who went on to be a star in the VFL with Geelong and captain-coach of the Tigers in the late 1960s.

Another man who captained Claremont in fine style was John Lewis, a custodian with an excellent record against some of the best goalkickers in the 1970s, while Lorne Cook was a classic attacking half-back with 230 games to his credit.

Claremont's 1964 premiership half-back line of Ian Brayshaw, John Fairbrass and Michael Smart are all in the 60 contenders for the All-Stars line-up and they were a trio of versatile players, especially Smart, who went on to be an outstanding ruck-rover, one of the first of today's mobile types.

And that leaves Ken Hunter . . . a man almost in his own class!

A fearless Tiger who went on to be a star in the VFL with Carlton, winning the mark-of-the-year one season and playing with inspiration right through the '80s.

He was followed by Noel Morton, a long-serving defender who was in Claremont's 1981 premiership side under Graham Moss.

One of the modern-day players in contention is Phil Gilbert, a premiership player in 1991 who has stepped up to the AFL level in fine style, playing at full-back with Melbourne.

Current West Coast star Guy McKenna is a brilliant half-back, rating as one of the best in today's AFL line-up and it would be hard to leave him out of the side.

## History against Souths streak

EAST Fremantle's poor record in recent derbies is nothing new — they struggled against the Bulldogs even when they took the 1974 flag.

The situation was the same last year when a grand final win by the Sharks over Souths halted a four-game derby losing streak.

In one of the upsets of the season, East Fremantle took the Pepsi Cup premiership with a 24-point win at Subiaco Oval.

But South Fremantle have regained their ascendancy with consecutive wins this season.

Wins in round three and 10 have given Souths a 7-3 winning record in the past 10 encounters between the Port cousins.

In 1974, the story was much the same. Old Easts, as they were called, went on to win their 24th flag under coach John Todd, but they continually struggled against South Fremantle.

### SUPERIORITY

East Fremantle historian Jack Lee, writing in his book 'Old Easts 1948-75', recalled the trouble they had with their arch-rivals that season.

"Old Easts showed clearcut superiority over all opponents with the exception of East Perth and South Fremantle ...

"... Our heaviest of seven defeats was by South Fremantle 13.17 to 6.10 and 20.10 to 13.17. Yet Souths couldn't even get in the four."

East Fremantle beat Perth in the grand final 17.20 (122) to 15.10 (100).

South Fremantle finished fifth after an indifferent season when they lost the first two games — the second to East Fremantle — before seven wins took them to top spot.

The Bulldogs lost five of the next 11 games to topple from the final four, but

took pleasure in twice beating would-be premiers Old Easts.

Malaxos, in his second season as captain, is adamant the only way to beat arch-rivals South Fremantle is to maintain the pressure for 120 minutes.

"We need a more even performance across the board," Malaxos said.

"In our last clash we were gone for all money at three-quarter-time, but kicked seven goals in 15 minutes to get back into the game. You just can't relax like we did in a derby."

The Sharks got within seven points of Souths, at East Fremantle Oval, in that Foundation Day Derby, but were 53-point losers away from home in April.

## DIFFERENT TACK

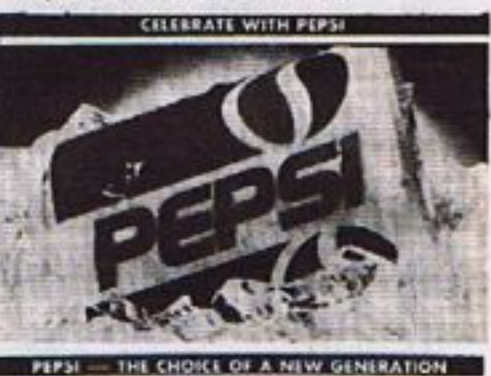

THE family connection at Subiaco is alive and well with a number of league regulars following in the footsteps of famous fathers.

Since the inception of the 'Ma-rooms' in 1901, Subiaco have prided themselves on their bloodlines and names like Burton, Kettlewell, Metropolis and Hampson are keeping the tradition alive at the club.

But Subiaco's family connections date much further back and their first premiership side in 1912 featured brothers William and Harry Bushell.

The pair were part of a determined side that made a concerted effort to justify the club's existence after they finished last or second last in nearly every year since their birth.

Both played in three premierships (1912-13-15) with William (Joe) playing 153 games between 1911-20 and Harry 151 games between 1910-22.

Bill and Frank Brophy continued the trend in the 1920s, playing 154 and 119 games respectively.

#### MEDAL MAN

Triple fairest-and-best winner (1935-36-37) and 1935 Sandover Medalist Lew Daily followed in the footsteps of his older brother Stuart, who won the club champion award in 1932.

An accomplished full-back, Lew played 92 games from 1931-37 while Stuart lies 11th on the all-time games played record for Subiaco with 202 games between 1928-40.

Haydn Bunton snr began his playing career in 1938 and his influence on West Australian football is legendary.

Sandover Medals in 1938-39-41, as captain-coach, stamped his name in club history three decades before his

son, Haydn jnr became Subiaco's favourite son.

Bunton jnr notched 59 games with the club from 1968-71, returning to coach the side to premierships in 1986 and '88.

Other brothers to leave their mark on club history were All-Australian full-back Brian Sarre and ruckman John Sarre; Robbie and George Young; Stephen and Graham Heal; Goldfields recruits Garry and Dean Kemp and two former captains, in Neil and Brian Taylor.

Elder brother Neil, who led the club between 1982-87, holds the games played record at Subiaco after reaching the 260-game mark in his last season of football in 1989.

Brian finished his career with 211 games after 12 seasons and captaincy in 1990-91.

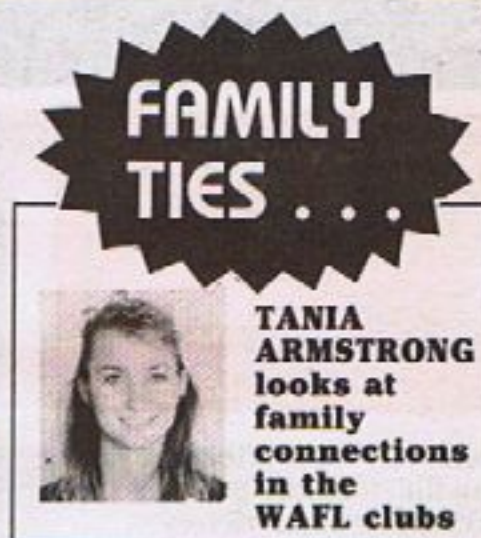
The father-son trend is now becoming obvious, with Damian Hampson and Scott Kettlewell debuting in 1989, long after their father's distinguished careers had come to an end.

Reg Hampson, now a club director, played 224 games between 1959-70 and topped the goalkicking list three times in his role as a half-forward/rover.

#### APPRENTICESHIP

Hampson jnr made his AFL debut with the West Coast Eagles this season after a 49-game apprenticeship with the Lions.

Scott Kettlewell has played 15 games since his 1989 debut, after his father

Laurie chalked up 205 games between 1954-65.

Mike Pethick, who played in the same era and finished with 130 games, saw son Jeremy Pethick have a brief 20-game career, before moving on.

Another former player with a strong involvement is Peter Metropolis, also on the board of directors and with son Daniel a key Lion.

Metropolis snr was vice-captain of the 1973 premiership side in a fine end to a 159-game career with the Lions.

#### SIX-GOAL DEBUT

Son Daniel has played 11 games since debuting in 1991 and he has also played six games for the Eagles — including a memorable six-goal debut.

Metropolis filled in as caretaker coach in 1980, after the departure of Peter Burton, a man who has fathered three footballers for the Lions.

Burton was a member of that 1973 premiership side on the way to 182 games and his eldest son Matthew is enjoying a top season leading the ruck for the seniors for the first time.

Matthew, at 23, has played 60 games since 1990, while younger brother Travis (18) has played three games since a round two debut this year.

A third brother, Jay (20) bypassed the Lions seniors when he was drafted to Richmond from the club's minor grades in 1991.

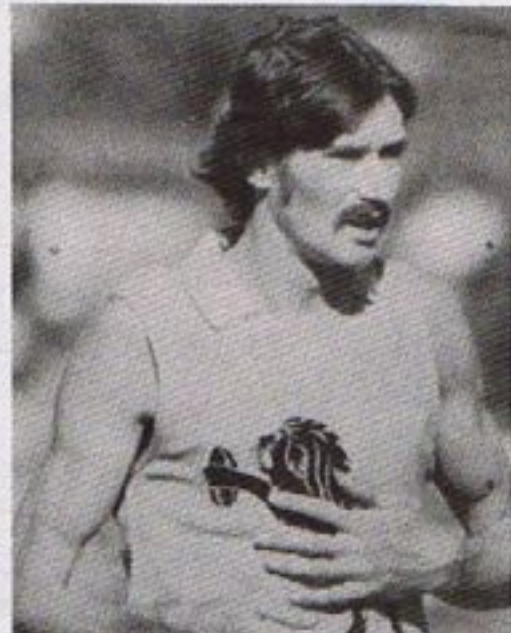

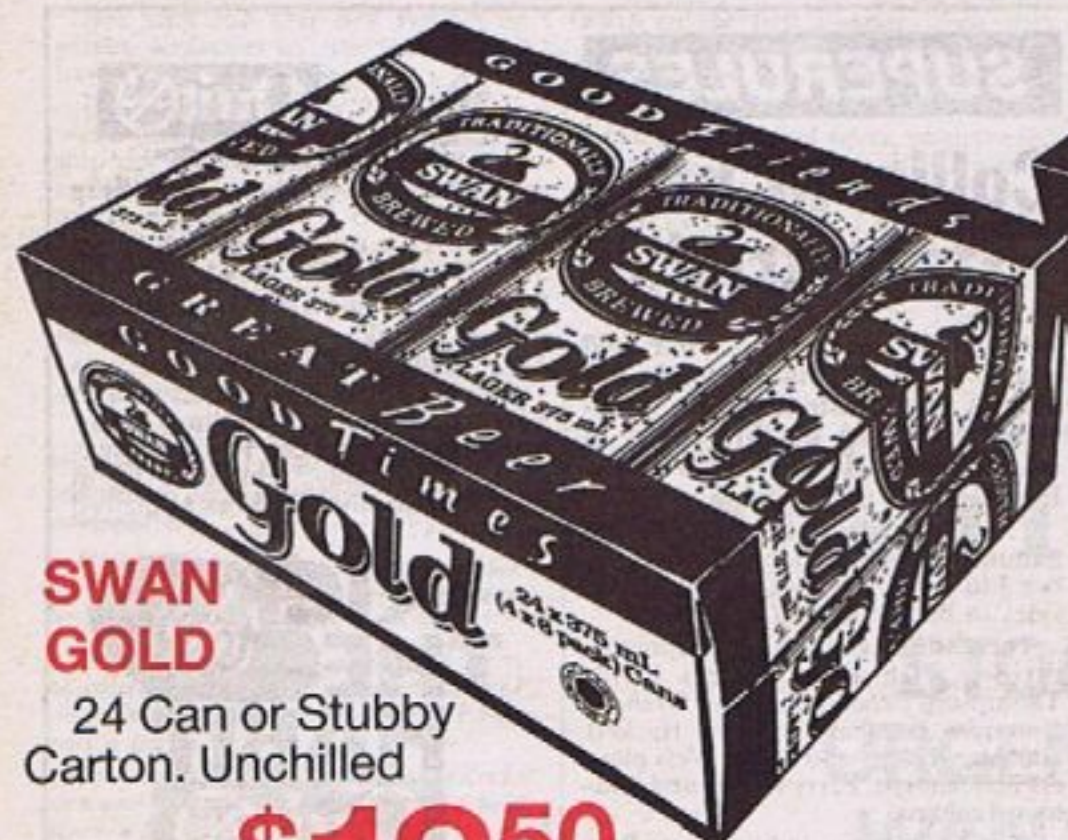

## Peel League round-up

# Pinjarra end Mandurah's run

**PINJARRA** ended Mandurah's unbeaten run in the Peel League with a spirited victory in the top-of-the-table clash at Rushton Park last Sunday.

# Williams back to lead Hills

**FORMER** Swan Districts and Footscray ruck-rover Ian Williams (36) is coaching Hills in their return to the Wesfarmers Country Championships.

Williams, an explosive mover in his day, is one of the forgotten men of Swan Districts' rise to power in the early 1980s.

He first appeared at Swan Districts in 1978, coming from the Swan Valley club, but left the black and whites the year before the first of their three premierships.

### MISSED REVIVAL

Williams, a tenacious goalkicking ruck-rover, was part of that revival, but he missed the glory of the 1982-83-84 premierships.

After four years with Swans and about 70 games, Williams headed east to join Footscray.

Williams, a gardner at King Edward Hospital, said he played "about 40 games" with the Bulldogs, first under former Scraggers ruckman Ian 'Bluey' Hampshire, then Eagles coach Mick Malthouse.

"I enjoyed my footy with Footscray and was there under Malthouse in 1985 when Brad Hardie won his Brownlow Medal," he said.

"But I copped a bad knee injury and came back to Swans and had another year with them (1986), but the knee didn't stand up to league football."

After bowing out of the WAFL, Williams had a couple of seasons with the powerful Mundijong side, a force in the Mandurah-based Peel League, before returning to Swan Valley.

For Williams, who grew up in the hills and lives at West Swan, the move back to his football roots certainly has agreed with him.

Swan Valley have won the past two premierships and Williams, in his first year of coaching, is looking for a hat-trick.

More immediately, Williams, still getting a kick despite his ageing legs and suspect knee, is aiming for Hills to make an immediate impact on the Wesfarmers Country Championship.

He is hoping the younger members of his squad can do the job for Hills, who open their campaign against Lower South West at South Fremantle Oval on Thursday.

But, if not, the boots might come on for Friday's game.

"I usually play every second game. I'm still in reasonable shape, but the knee is a bit suspect," he said.

"But the carnival is for the younger guys and if they play well they could be picked up by a WAFL club, with so many talent scouts there."

# Cable names his best country side

**BARRY** Cable, rated as the best country footballer to ever make the transition to the top level, has looked back at some of the champions who have come through the annual Wesfarmers Country Championships.

Cable, who hails from the Upper Great Southern town of Narrogin, won three Sandover Medals and played 403 games with Perth, North Melbourne, East Perth, WA and Victoria.

In a special article in *The Countryman* newspaper, the champion left-footer and State coach picked a glamour side that graduated through the tough country carnival.

Cable noted that more than 100 quality footballers have made the grade from Wesfarmers ranks.

His star-studded side of 22 players includes 15 who have played AFL football, 15 who represented WA and five Sandover Medallists.

## BAIRSTOW CAPTAIN

He named Mark Bairstow as captain, ahead of dual Sandover Medallist Stephen Michael (1980-81).

Bairstow, the 1986 Sandover Medallist, is currently captain of Geelong.

Another Sandover Medallist in Murray Wrensted (1985) took the centre position, ahead of Bairstow and South Bunbury's Leon Baker, who went on to be a premiership star with Essendon.

Cable rated Bairstow and Baker as better centreman than Wrensted, but

preferred to have their versatile talents available on the ball. Wrensted then gave the team better balance in the centre.

The other two Sandover Medallists

are East Fremantle centreman David Hollins (1971) and East Perth wingman Phil Kelly, winner of back-to-back Medals in 1978-79 before heading to North Melbourne.

The Cable team was selected purely from players who have competed in the country championships.

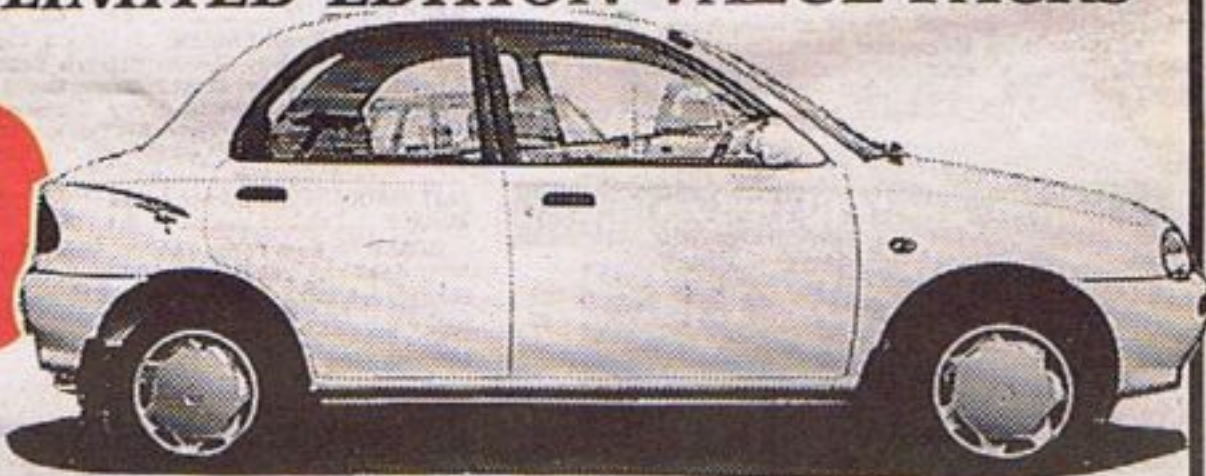

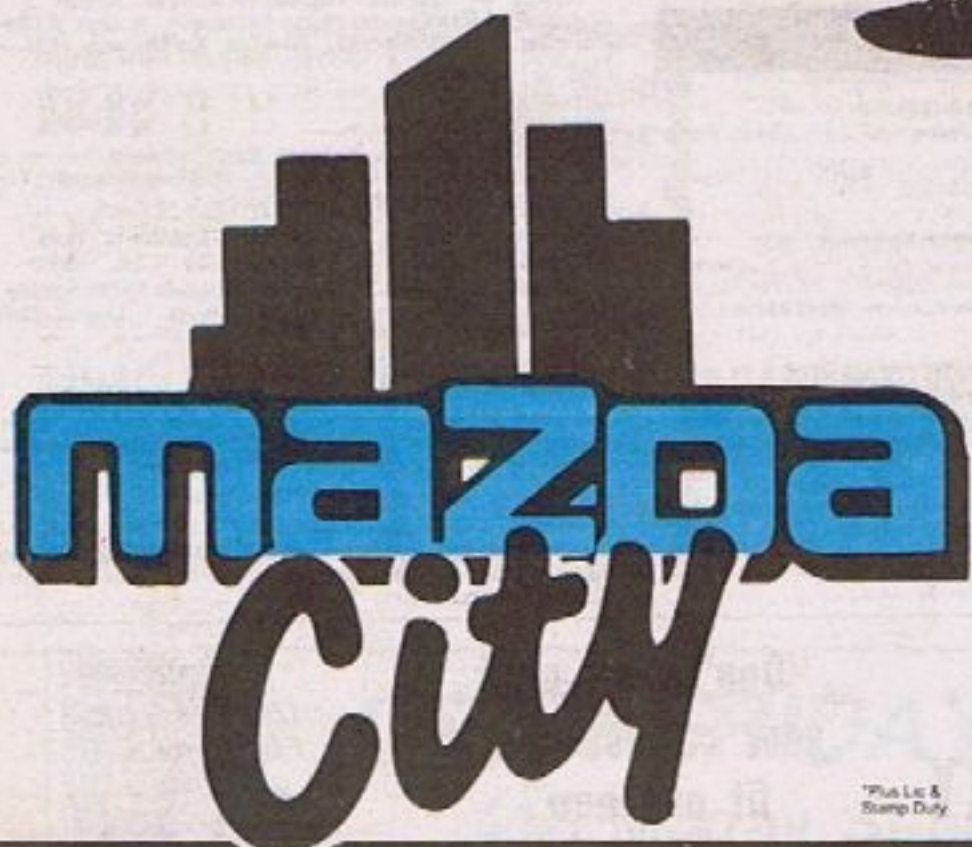
