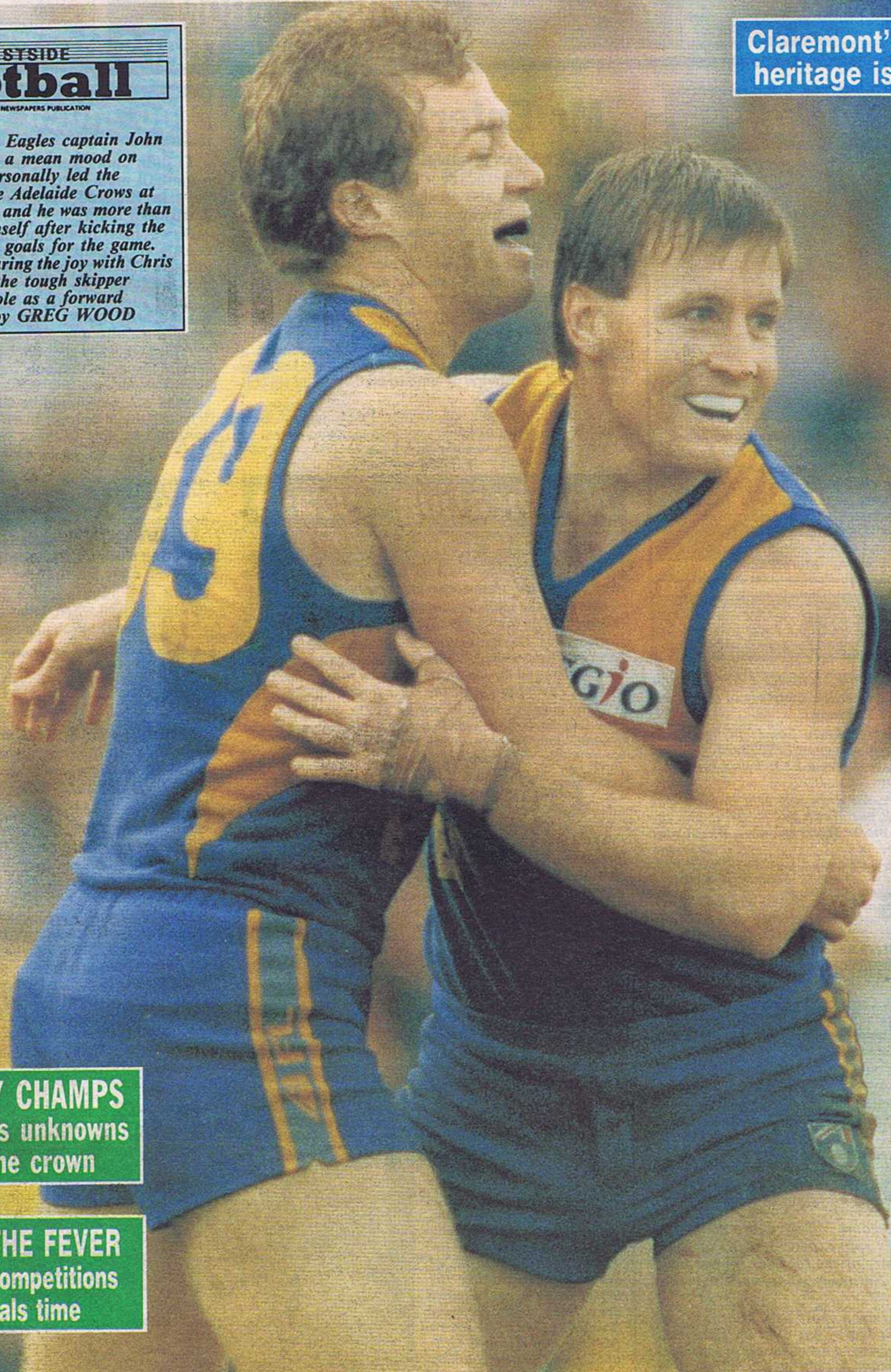

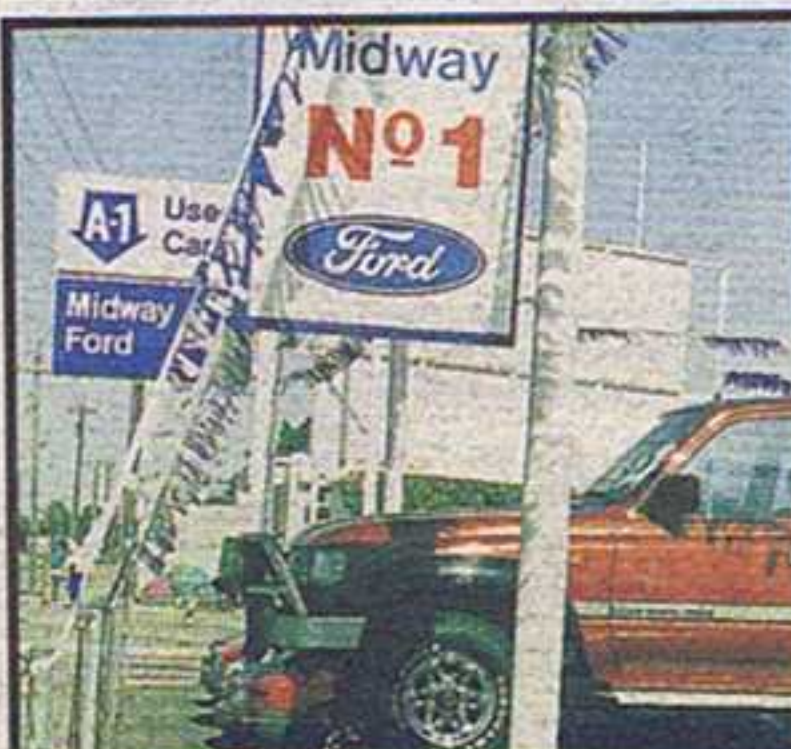

As reserves captain for the day, he was given the role of presenting the trophies to his team-mates after Saturday's big win over East Perth and he had the Tigers members in fits of laughter.

Whether it be joke-telling or story-telling about some of his team-mates, the segment was most entertaining — although top trophy winner Anthony Shields probably didn't agree.

No cheating, please

Pressure points

Too much discipline

Eagles walk taller with Woosha

WELCOME back John Worsfold.

After nearly two frustrating seasons of playing with groin injuries, Worsfold is back to peak fitness and form.

The Eagles skipper has rediscovered the form that won him the club's fairest and best award in 1988.

Worsfold, with Guy McKenna, Paul

Harding and Don Pyke, must be one of the favourites to win that honour this season.

The bruised and battered Adelaide Crows will testify to Worsfold's bone-jarring play.

His value to the Eagles cannot be over-estimated.

Every great side has at least one intimidating player capable of making his teammates walk taller and his opponents put in short strides when approaching the ball.

Kevin Sheedy's 'Baby Bombers' from the mid-1980s had the perfect babysitter in Roger Merrett.

And Hawthorn had the hard-hitting duo Dermott Brereton and Robert DiPierdomenico in their amazing run through the 1980s.

Like those three AFL strongmen, Worsfold can throw his weight around without losing track of the main game.

He achieved the perfect balance against the Crows. He picked up 27 possessions, took seven marks and still put fear into the Adelaide camp with some physical work around the ground.

Eagles fans probably will never forget Worsfold escorting Collingwood's Craig Kelly all the way to the interchange bench, clapping as he went, at Subiaco Oval a few years ago and then grabbing Kelly's replacement Craig Starcevic by the scruff of the neck to welcome him to the game.

DEMORALISING

The effect on Starcevic was demoralising and the Eagles players knew who was in charge.

Worsfold and players like him set the tone of a match, as he did against Adelaide with a great shirt-front on

Simon Tregenza after the opening bounce.

He followed that up with several full-frontal attacks on Greg Anderson that must have rattled the Adelaide wingman's teeth.

All this is well within the rules and as effective as a dashing Peter Matera run down the wing or a Peter Sumich 55-metre goal.

Worsfold has become famous, or infamous depending on which side of the Nullabor you live on, for his aggressive brand of football.

But too often his tackling and bumps have overshadowed his ability as a creative player.

The John Worsfold of 1988 was a free-running defender or ruck-rover capable of bursting open play, similar to Garry Hocking or even Darren Jarman.

The groin injury prevented him from training at top pace and restricted his effectiveness on the field in 1991 and into last season.

Gone was the dash and all that remained was the clash.

Eagles coach Mick Malthouse said after the Adelaide win that Worsfold's future use would depend entirely on the make-up of the Eagles opponents.

That is a shame, because Worsfold — now that he is running around Subiaco Oval like an 18-year-old — could establish himself as one of the premier ruck-rovers in the competition.

Whatever position Worsfold fills for the remainder of the season, he spells trouble for the other sides.

The 'woosh' is certainly back in Woosha.

Press run-in not trivial

MICK Malthouse's most notable run-ins with the press have been after defeats.

Does that say something about Malthouse — or about media treatment of the Eagles?

After the 1991 grand final loss to Hawthorn, Malthouse over-reacted to a story by a Melbourne-based journalist from The West Australian and fronted the reporter. A photographer became involved after trying to catch the argument.

After the loss to Essendon two weeks ago, Malthouse had a go at Daryl Timms, from the Melbourne Herald-Sun, which the coach says has an anti-Eagles bias.

Malthouse described the dispute as a 'trivial little thing', but also hinted that Timms was unwelcome at Eagles press conferences.

That sounds like a ban.

Malthouse's relationship with the media can best be described as uneven. He is on friendly terms with certain local and interstate members of the media, but he has a long memory and holds a grudge.

The Eagles and their coach do receive intense media coverage in their home town, most of it positive. They have been winners under Malthouse, so it is no wonder there has been little criticism.

They also are the only team in town so if you do criticise them they can choose not to speak to you. Local journalists tend to tread cautiously.

After a defeat, Malthouse occasionally looks for a target, one of "them" and lets off some steam in the direction of the "enemy".

The offending article or broadcast rarely deserves the serve. In fact, the story in The West Australian that caused Malthouse to erupt after the 1991 grand final was a 'trivial little thing'. Malthouse's reaction to it wasn't. And neither was it recently when he confronted Timms.

It is easy to be gracious and friendly when you win, but a better sign of character is how a person handles defeat.

Malthouse will get tough questions and sometimes he will get stupid questions — don't coaches make mistakes too? — but that is part of the job.

McKenna lags in

goals duel

GOOD friends off the field, but fierce rivals on it, John Worsfold and Guy McKenna were at it again on Sunday afternoon.

The pair first teamed as juniors to beat the Vics in the 1985 Teal Cup when McKenna skippered WA to their only win in the national carnival.

Eight years on and the two still are team-mates, more often than not combining in defence.

Defenders love to kick goals and when Worsfold played a blinder with a three-goal effort from the middle and half-forward against Adelaide, he well and truly took the edge off McKenna in the goalkicking stakes.

Worsfold's best haul in the AFL took his season's tally to 5.2 for a career total of 20.19, while McKenna is yet to add to last season's 11.11 and Woosha

was letting him know it as they left the field together.

FORWARD HOPE

"I've almost given up hope of playing in the forward line, especially with John Worsfold kicking goals up there," McKenna told Radio 6PR's Peter Newman in his Monday morning segment.

"I suggested to coach Mick Malthouse that the only time he might put me up there is if we're 10 goals in front and there's five minutes to go, but he still wasn't committed on that."

The next to clash with Worsfold was former Essendon wingman Greg Anderson.

The hard-working left-footer bore the brunt of the Eagles skipper's aggression not once, but three times, with the final incident in the last quarter leaving Anderson short of breath.

New skills for youngsters

THE West Coast Eagles hierarchy will be seeing much more of five of their most talented youngsters after a new study and training program started last week.

In a Department of Education, Employment and Training scheme, Jarrad Schofield, Lee Walker, Brett Spinks, Jason Ball and Travis Burton will be spending part of their week at the club, helping out in administration work, as well as training and studying.

Assistant coach Robert Wiley has been working on the initiative, which Essendon have used for some time.

Comeback kids earn awards

WEST Coast comeback king David Hart returned to the side in a big way as a last-minute inclusion at the expense of Dwayne Lamb.

Hart received a standing ovation when he left the field late in the final term after months of frustration with repeated hamstring strains.

Playing his 105th AFL game, Hart was rewarded for a tight-checking performance on former South Fremantle team-mate Stephen Rowe when he collected the cheersquad award at post-match presentations.

Dean Kemp, playing his second game in two months, won the Pro Simon Golf Connection award and Drew Banfield collected the Jeans West voucher.

Other regulars to the stage were Glen Jakovich (Marlows), Paul Harding (Nissan), Guy McKenna (Vines Resort) and captain John Worsfold (Qantas).

Impressive return by Eagles duo

DAVID Hart and Dean Kemp showed their value to the Eagles with superb comeback performances against the Crows.

The pair, who were rushed into the side, showed no ill-effects from their persistent hamstring injury problems to be among the Eagles better players.

Kemp, last year's club champion, shook the tag of Mark Viska to collect 27 possessions and Hart was given the task of curbing dangerous Crows forward Stephen Rowe.

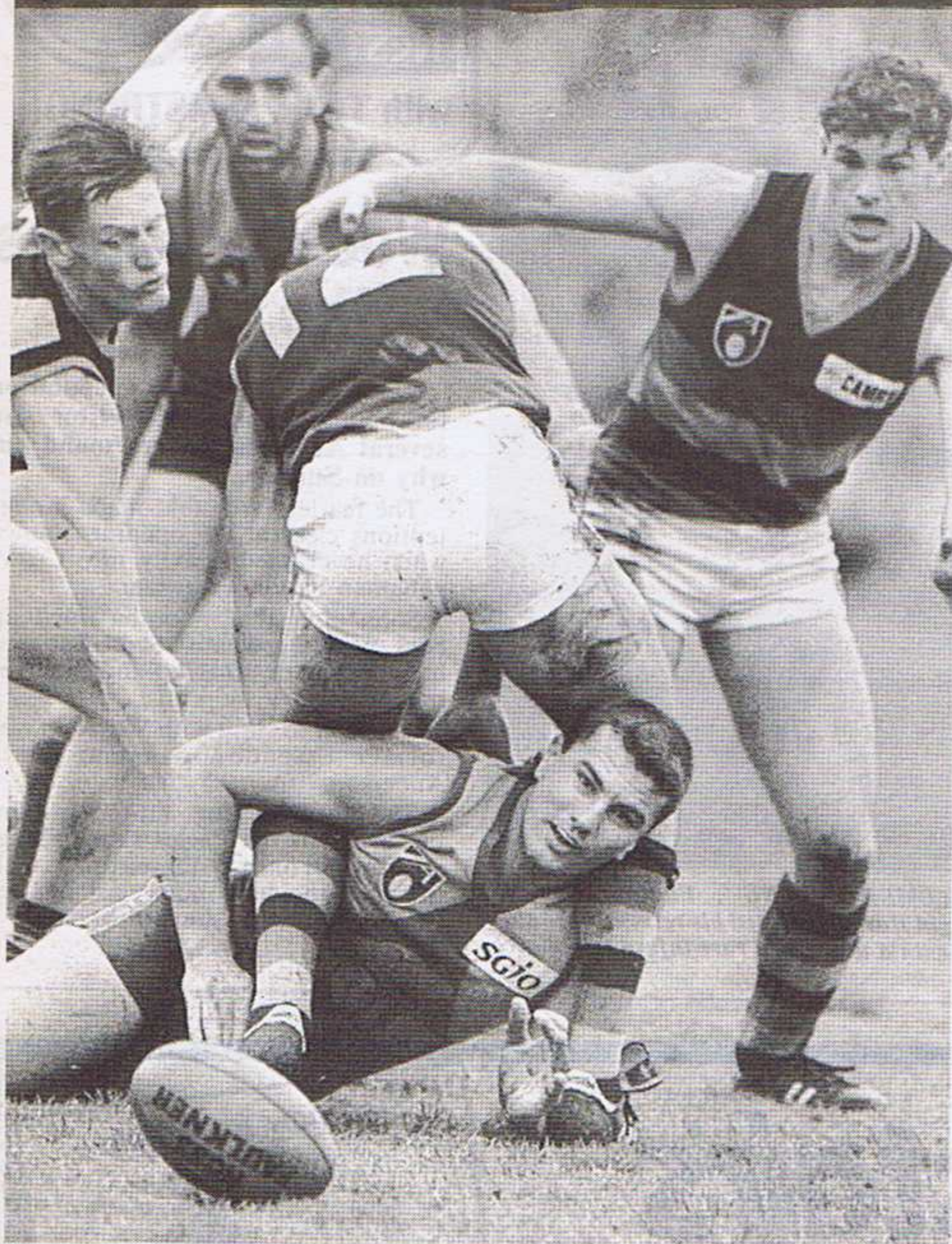

Quality players face Eagles axe

WHILE attention over the next five weeks will focus on the West Coast as they fight for a berth in the AFL top six, an equally intensive internal battle looms in the Eagles.

With AFL clubs reducing their squads by 10 players in November, the battle among the fringe players to retain their places will be on in earnest.

And the hardest-fought contest will be between WA's emerging ruckmen and key-position players.

The club cannot retain all their improving big men on the books, so one or two of them are sure to spring up at another club — and perform well.

The Eagles have seven players of key position or ruck size who are failing to win selection — Jason Ball, Matthew Burton, Travis Edmonds, Derek Hall, Dean Irving, Brett Spinks and Ryan Turnbull.

The problem for all of those very capable men perched outside the top 20 is that they are competing with quality players for a handful of places.

KEY POSITIONS

Players like Michael Brennan — possibly the best full-back in the competition — Paul Harding, David Hynes, Glen Jakovich, Ashley McIntosh, Peter Sumich and Mitchell White have mortgages on the key positions.

Brennan (28) and Harding (29) are the veterans of that bunch, but both have four or five good years left.

Hynes (26), Jakovich (20), McIntosh (20), Sumich (25) and White (20) also have plenty of time left in AFL ranks and will undoubtedly play an important role in the club's future.

When you consider that Karl Langdon has been injured for almost the entire season, the problem for the emerging big men is highlighted further.

Many people have written off Irving, but that is unfair considering he is just 23 and a player of considerable talent.

But he, like Turnbull, cannot get a look-in because Harding has been in top touch for the past two seasons.

Turnbull's WAFL form has been exploratory and he was responsible for East Perth's mid-season charge which netted them five wins in six games.

Edmonds has also produced spectacular efforts for Swan Districts and both he and Turnbull should figure prominently in the Sandover Medal count.

The Eagles would like to groom Turnbull and perhaps Edmonds as key position players, but there are few openings available.

With Ball also applying pressure for a shot at centre-half-forward and Hall keen to get a crack up forward, WAFL form in the closing weeks will be crucial.

Brett Spinks is another big man in the squad who has been most impressive, particularly in the second half of the season.

And big 'Spider' Burton has also been instrumental in helping Subiaco recover from a slow start.

All of these big men have shone in the second half of the season, but it is questionable whether the Eagles will be able to hang on to so many quality players, who are failing to unseat the incumbents.

They are all young and will improve further in the next couple of years, so the Eagles recruiting staff face a daunting task in reducing their squad to 40 come November.

Hawks soar most often

HAWTHORN'S win over Sydney on Sunday elevated the Hawks to the top of the ladder for the first time since round 1 of 1990.

Graeme Heath, of Claremont, has asked about the Hawks recent record in top position on the ladder and whether any other club has spent as much time at No. 1 in recent years.

The Hawks have occupied top spot for 59 weeks since the start of the 1984 season. They have been No. 1 for at least a week in seven of the 10 seasons since the start of 1984.

The Hawks closest rivals for time spent on top of the ladder are Essendon — No. 1 for 48 weeks and on top at least once in six of the past 10 seasons.

West Coast have been No. 1 on the ladder 27 weeks, including every week of the 1991 season.

Carlton have spent 20 weeks at No. 1 since 1984; Geelong 13; North Melbourne and Sydney 12 each.

Four other clubs — Footscray, Melbourne, Collingwood and Adelaide — have spent a total of 28 weeks in the past 10 seasons as the leading club.

Apart from dominating the top spot in recent years, the Hawks have also avoided the bottom of the ladder for more than 14 years — since round 2, 1979.

SUNDAY'S 37-point win over Adelaide was the West Coast Eagles first win since June 26 this year and

their first win at home since May 2, when they beat Footscray by 41 points.

THE Brisbane Bears broke a four-game losing sequence against Richmond to regain honours in clashes between the two clubs.

The Bears have won six of their 11 encounters with the Tigers. Sunday's win was their first over the Tigers since round 1, 1990.

HAWTHORN'S goalkicking duo, Jason Dunstall and Paul Hudson, came close on Sunday to becoming the first pair from one team to kick 10 goals or more in the same match.

Dunstall's nine goals and Hudson's eight almost emulated the feat of North Melbourne pair, Adrian McAdam and John Longmire, who kicked 10 and 9 respectively in round 6 this year.

Pair fail to achieve their goals

LEAGUE football's top two goalkickers in Tony Modra and Gary Ablett squandered opportunities last weekend to join the most elite goalsneaks in history.

In kicking 4.4 from limited chances in a beaten side on Sunday, Modra has 98 goals from his first 16 games.

He needed six for his century to join an illustrious group headed by Gordon Coventry and John Coleman, who achieved their centuries in just 16 matches.

Ablett also failed by two to equal Bob Pratt's 60-year-old record for the fastest century of goals.

In kicking five goals — all in the first half — against Collingwood, Ablett was poised to join Pratt.

But he was kept goal-less in the second half and will have to wait until the North Melbourne match — his 14th for the season — on Saturday for another chance at the century.

Ablett was restricted to just two kicks in the second half by Collingwood's rugged full-back Gary Pert, playing his 198th game.

Outscored four goals to seven after half-time, Geelong still shocked the more-fancied Magpies by hanging on for a courageous eight-point win, only their eighth of the season.

Ablett finished with 5.0 from seven kicks.

If he does pass three figures against North Melbourne on Saturday, he will be the second fastest, behind Pratt, the sensational between-the-wars goalkicker who kicked 104 goals in his first 13 matches in 1934 on his way to 150 for the season.

In almost 100 years of league football, only eight players have scored 100 goals in 16 matches or fewer.

Peter Hudson and Tony Lockett are the only two to achieve the feat twice.

WATSON ON TARGET

ESSENDON veteran Tim Watson played his most important match since his retirement in 1991, with a five-goal contribution in the Bombers big win over Carlton on Saturday.

Defying the windiest football day of the year, Watson kicked 5.3 when others were missing sitters, several from within 10 metres.

"I have been practising my goalkicking," he said.

"It's something I've never really concentrated on before because I was playing up the ground most of the time.

"If you're averaging only 10-12 kicks a game and four or five of those are at goal, you have to make sure you nail them; make every kick count."

Carlton coach David Parkin paid Watson a great tribute on Saturday night when he said the Essendon champion was the match-winning influence in Saturday's blockbuster.

"He was able to deliver the goods for them when it counted," Parkin said. "I have great admiration for him."

Three goal-getting greats, Ablett, Modra and Hawthorn's Jason Dunstall, are also likely to reach the ton this season.

It would be the first time three players have achieved 100 in the same year since 1970, when Peter Hudson, Peter McKenna and Alex Jesaulenko kicked three figures.

Ablett and Modra are two goals shy of the magical milestone and Dunstall, who is assured of playing in the finals, has 87.

Writing in Melbourne's Sunday Herald-Sun, St Kilda's Lockett scoffed at suggestions that kicking goals had become easier.

Essendon's Paul Salmon kicked 1.7 on Saturday — for 2.10 in two matches — while Eagle Peter Sumich is another star full-forward who has had conversion problems.

Lockett, who has bagged three figures three times, has just 53 goals this year, having played only 10 matches.

Eagles to pounce on vacancy

THE West Coast Eagles will have fourth place on the premiership ladder firmly in their sights as they travel to Princes Park to take on Richmond on Saturday.

With fingers crossed, the Eagles will wait on the outcome of the top six clashes between Collingwood and Essendon and Carlton and Hawthorn.

Losses for either Carlton or Collingwood and a win to the Eagles could catapult the reigning premiers from seventh place to as high as fourth.

With the fifth-placed Adelaide having the bye, the Crows are in danger of slipping from the six, along with Collingwood (sixth) — and the Eagles are ready to pounce.

With their confidence sky high after their 37-point win over the Crows, beating Richmond will be the only thing on their minds on Saturday.

With five matches to play, the Eagles are aiming for at least another three wins, although they are more than capable of snaring five scalps.

The Eagles will go into the match as odds-on favourites after seven consecutive wins over the Tigers, with coach Mick Malthouse yet to lose to his former side.

Overall the Eagles have won eight out of 11, with their most recent success being by 44 points at Subiaco Oval in round 3.

Richmond are facing their fifth straight loss, but will approach the Princes Park clash with the knowledge that their last win (over Fitzroy in round 11) came on the ground.

The Tigers main weakness is their inability to string together four quarters and they fall away badly after half-time.

The relentless nature of the Eagles defensive and midfield units will trouble Richmond, who struggle to kick

goals at the best of times.

Guy McKenna, Glen Jakovich, Mitchell White, Michael Brennan and David Hart were in top form against Adelaide, although White is under an injury cloud with a groin strain.

Tigers skipper Jeff Hogg, with 52 goals this season, carries a big responsibility in attack and is likely to be watched by Ashley McIntosh, who has had success against him.

Two-times club champion Matthew Knights is another player who must be closely watched.

Don Pyke is likely to renew acquaintances with Knights, while another opponent will have to be found for Craig Lambert, one of the most prolific handballers in the competition, if regular opponent Dwayne Lamb fails to recover from an ankle injury.

Rover Knights was best-on-ground when the sides last met and Pyke will be out for revenge.

Ranked eighth on the AFL's top possession-getters list this season, Knights has had 236 kicks and 163 handballs while no Eagles are in the top 35, though Pyke has collected 230 kicks.

Brett Heady will be given every chance to recover from the foot injury which kept him out of Sunday's clash.

Brendan Krummel, after a five-goal performance for East Fremantle, will come under consideration for a recall to play the side he made his debut against.

Robbie West is likely to return to West Perth after spending all but four minutes on the interchange bench in his last outing.

The Other Games

COACH Kevin Sheedy's 300th game at the helm is expected to inspire Essendon to big things when they tackle Collingwood under lights at the MCG on Friday night.

The Bombers will be seeking their third consecutive win without the injured Dean Wallis and with James Hird still expected to be on the sidelines.

It is a must-win for the Magpies, who are clinging to sixth spot.

They will sweat on the fitness of crucial on-baller Tony Francis, in doubt with a calf strain.

HAWTHORN can make it six consecutive wins when the league leaders play host to Carlton at Waverley Park.

Carlton's breakdown in the forward line against Essendon last week cost them the match and there is no quick-fix solution with captain and leading goalkicker Stephen Kernahan expected to miss Saturday's crucial clash.

Hawthorn had a training run against the Sydney Swans when they ran out 92-point winners and the goalkicking power of Jason Dunstall (nine) and Paul Hudson (eight) will take some stopping.

NORTH Melbourne face a danger game at the MCG when they tackle the inconsistent Geelong unit while trying to keep in touch with Hawthorn at the top of the table.

The Cats scored a memorable eight-point win over Collingwood, but the Kangaroos will be desperate to bounce back from a five-point loss to St Kilda.

North, with Wayne Carey expected to return, need to lift in the midfield if they are to match it with Geelong, whose runners were in top form for their last outing.

WITH just one win in a month of football, Footscray will be desperate for a return to credibility when they meet Fitzroy at the Western Oval.

Fitzroy have much to prove against the Bulldogs and will be fresh from the bye.

The Bulldogs are never easy to push over in the western suburbs, but the Lions can take heart from Melbourne's 13-point win.

MELBOURNE'S barn-storming finish to the season should continue when the Brisbane Bears travel to the MCG.

With the Demons hopes of a finals berth still flickering, they will be determined to bury the lowly Bears.

Brisbane's journey to Melbourne sees them chasing their second win in eight matches, but they should not get carried away with last week's success over Richmond.

REVIVED by successive wins, St Kilda should continue their good run when they take on Sydney at the SCG.

Sydney's forgettable season continued when they were walloped by Hawthorn and their luck is unlikely to change against the Saints.

With the Saints big guns, Stewart Loewe, Gilbert McAdam and Nicky Winmar all firing, an upset is out of the question.

Goldfields now home for old Tiger

IT'S always interesting to track down former footballers whose career highlight was a premiership victory — it's a feat many thousands of players never get to enjoy.

Lindsay Kanther is one such player.

He wasn't the world's best footballer; his skills paled into insignificance a little alongside electrifying players like Jim and Phil Krakouer.

But he was a tough, durable midfielder, whose reliability and versatility made him one of the first picked each week.

That was the case in the 1980s when Kanther was an integral part of the Claremont revival, playing in the 1981 premiership team and then suffering two successive grand final defeats.

Now settled in Kalgoorlie, working in a variety of roles, Kanther still has a keen interest in football.

TIGER TIES

He operates a newspaper delivery round, shares the running of a branch of Apparition costume hire (Claremont's major sponsors last year; a firm operated by his wife Karen's parents in Perth) and fielding as a bookmaker at the trots and the races.

And he believes that latter hobby turned part-time job would make a huge change to football.

"Bookies should be allowed to field at the football," he says. "The turnover would be terrific at an Eagles game, for example and it would create a lot of interest in the sport."

Kanther's decision to move to the Goldfields wasn't a surprise ... but it was in stark contrast to his previous home — at Rottneest Island, where he and Karen had an interest in the general store.

"My mother was brought up on the Goldfields and my father went to the School of Mines in Kalgoorlie, but they moved to the city long before I came along," he says.

He has had a small involvement in Goldfields football, acting as a runner for former Tiger Des Hindson when he was coaching Boulder one year.

"I field at the trots about 20 meetings a year and I'm on the roster for the races, getting about 11 meetings a year," he says.

RACING HIGHLIGHT

"The racing round is a real highlight, it's a pretty busy time and by the end of the week, you've just about had it."

Kanther has had a family interest in bookmaking, with two uncles involved and his quickness with figures made it an interesting hobby.

He's also had one brief taste of ownership: "All I did was sign cheques; never again!" he recalls.

Kanther started his football with Claremont in 1978, graduating from Christ Church Grammar, playing

school football one year and league the next. He went via the Claremont colts (three games) and 10 reserves games before his league debut.

Claremont won the WAFL flag in 1981, under Graham Moss, a superb captain-coach, with Kanther a regular contributor.

In 1985, he switched to Perth in search of a fresh challenge after 146 games with the Tigers — and that was a nice recruiting coup for the Demons, who were re-building after a couple of seasons in the doldrums.

FRUSTRATING

Ten minutes into the second game Kanther went down in a painful heap; his knee had gone and that was the end of his league career despite some long and frustrating rehabilitation periods.

"I needed a change and always thought that Mal Brown would be a good coach to play under," recalls Kanther. "I made the approach to them because I was a bit stale; everything been the same for a long time at Claremont."

"I'll never forget that second game, it was against East Perth and Karen's mum and dad had come along to watch because it was a split round and they had seen Claremont on the Saturday.

"Ten minutes into the game and I'm in the goalsquare picking the ball up to shoot for goal and a guy dives across to smother and snap goes my medial ligament in my right leg.

"I never saw who it was, though it was nothing vicious. I was rolling



around in pain; it's one of those things that can happen 100 times in a game and no-one gets hurt.

"I played one reserves game the following year and it went again. I later played half-a-dozen games for Boulder, but it was no good.

REJUVENATED

"What happened at Perth was certainly a blow to me because I felt that the change of club had rejuvenated my football.

"When I was talking to Brownie before switching over he asked me how many games I'd played the previous year and when I said I'd played them all he was pleased that there were no injury problems.

"Nothing was ever said, but I guess Perth weren't all that happy.

"I was nearly 25, so I had another five or six years left, but it could have happened any time."

Kanther was a modest type of footballer who was grateful for the opportunities that came his way — and he converted them into success stories.

"My first year with Claremont, I played all 21 games, but I was on the bench six or seven times," he recalls.

"I guess I got into the team because I was capable of playing in various roles, but I needed to be a little bit quicker or a bit taller.

"I liked the ruck roving role. Playing in the centre, I could run out of steam a little, but as a ruck-rover you could take a break."

So what does Kanther think of the Goldfields push for a WAFL team?

"They would have to do a lot of work in building up a competitive side," he says. "They would virtually

have to go out and get a team. From what I've seen there might be half-a-dozen young guys who would be up to scratch.

"But they would get a nasty shock when they find out what's required, with training and so forth.

"It would certainly take time to pull it all together.

"They would be competitive at home, on the sheer adrenalin of it all. But the fitness level would be a worry.

"However, it would be tremendous for the Goldfields. Kalgoorlie could certainly sustain the team financially, there's plenty of sponsorship in the town. Some of the big mining companies would back it; they like to do the right thing by the town."

WEST Coast skipper John Worsfold has put a new meaning on the image of forwards being 'pussy-foots'

After his bone-crunching, goal-kicking picnic on the park last Sunday, Woosha has stamped his claims to a spot in the forward line — and that's bad news for rival defenders; once of his own ilk.

He's a pretty ordinary-looking bloke, this Woosha; angelic someone labelled him recently.

Worsfold has now had the captain's job for 2-1/2 seasons; landing the plumb role when he was just 22 — we guess it carried a bigger Gregory Peck for all the hassles — ahead of quite a few experienced team-mates.

Woosha comes from great Fremantle breeding and was always captaincy material, even though he wasn't at Souths long enough to earn the honour.

If ever a man led by example — and he could have died by that same example if things had gone wrong at Subiaco Oval — it was Woosha. His physical approach certainly put a few Crows to flight!

You only have to remember that fabulous flying mark against Collingwood at friendly Victoria Park a few

weeks back when the Eagles beat the Magpies. He wasn't even on the TV screen when the ball was heading towards two forwards standing there waiting for the leather to drop like pennies from heaven.

Woosha — he's often been called Superman and we saw why — literally flew across the terra firma, floating above the Magpie mutts to grab a miraculous mark. The game was over then, virtually.

The scribe who nicknamed him Superman — because of his off-field mild-mannered Clark Kent style, complete with glasses, quiet voice and a meek and mild style — was spot-on.

Like the famous movie star, once he crosses that white line (the telephone box in Superman's case) he becomes a different character — a fierce fighter, standing up for his fellow men, arguing the cause with the game-controllers, running the length of the field to show his support.

He's willing to chest anyone; he takes on the giants of the footy world without any fear. To see him front blokes like James Manson, Dermie Brereton, Craig Kelly or Mick Martyn makes you want to turn the telly off; it's almost R-rated stuff.

How he never gets filled in by a rampaging idiot in opposition colours has got me bamboozled. He dishes out so much lip that he's never going to win a Brownlow — hardly even a vote — but he's going to win the everlasting love of his mates.

Most critics agree the Eagles lack a real tough guy; they don't have a Mr Nasty of the ilk of Martyn or an old-styled Roger Merrett, or even David Rhys-Jones. We only have a half-sized half-back — now a half-forward, so it seems — but boy, does he make up for the others.

He kicked a couple of rare sausage rolls against Collingwood and that's carried him to greater success, with a bag of three opposed to the Adelaide defenders. He thought the Magpies haul was great; the first time he'd ever got a pair in a game.

"It's nice to kick a goal now and then," said the mild-mannered gentleman, who was even more ecstatic about his hat-trick on Sunday.

Footy's new image

THERE'S a whole new image emerging around this game of Australian Rules.

It's based on the umpires, those whistle-blowing men in white, taking control out on the field and the officials, the men in glass cages up on high, cashing in the dollars.

In fact, the whole new mood could be the financial salvation of football.

We now have the situation where coaches get reprimanded for glaring at umpires (and maybe fined if the practice escalates); players get fined for asking questions and coaches get fined for stating obvious facts.

Surely, that's a comment and under the AFL rules must warrant a fine?

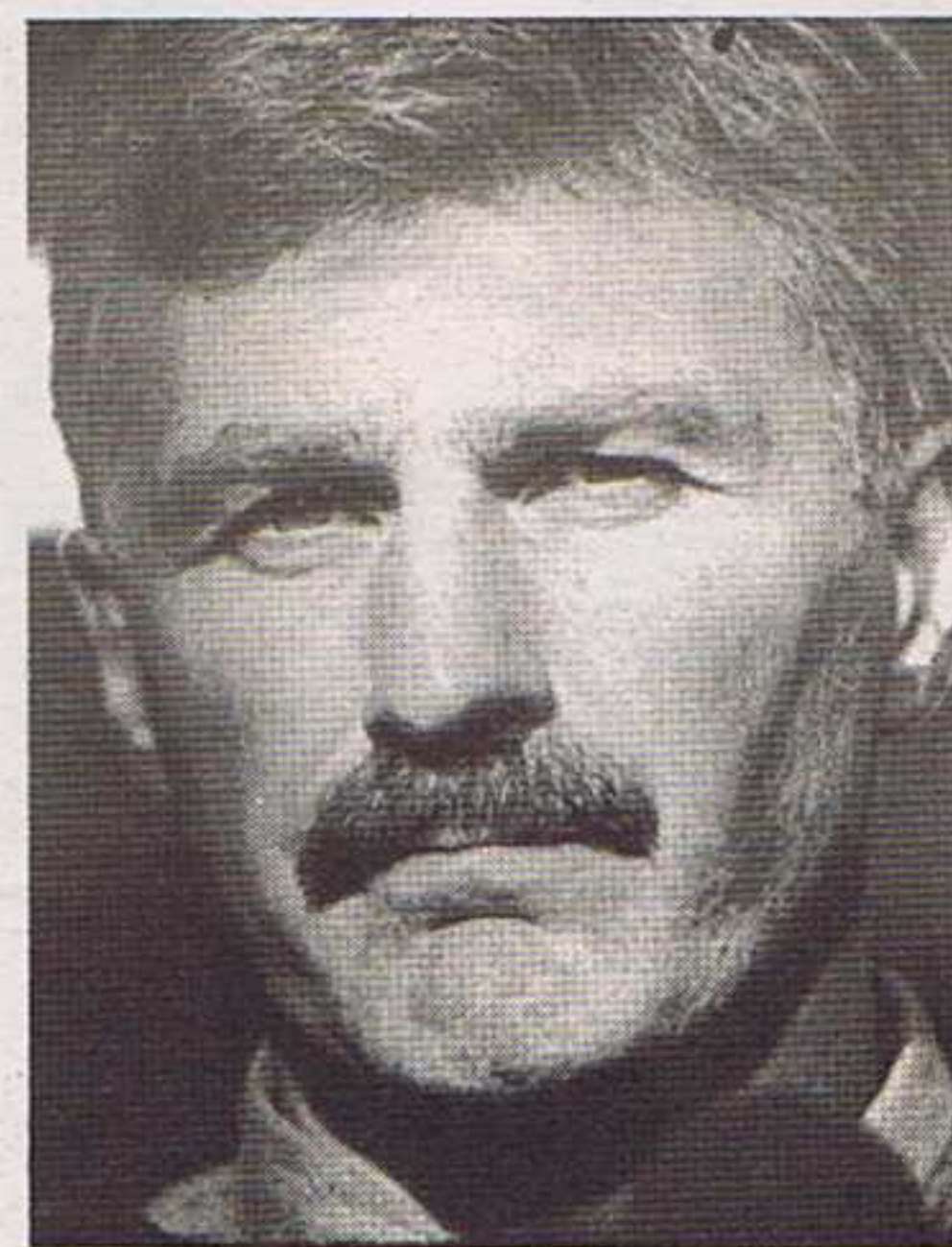
CASH BONANZA

In fact, today's coaches often send their captains into the middle to raise an issue with the umps during quarter-time breaks. That's part of the role of the on-field leader and there's nothing wrong with that.

SOUTH Fremantle coach Mark Watson is banking on last Sunday's 7am training session to bring his players back to reality.

Watson demanded the early start after his side put up little resistance in their 58-point Pepsi Cup loss to East Fremantle, at Fremantle Oval.

Cornes is confident

ADELAIDE coach Graham Cornes remains confident that his side can become as formidable away from home as they are at Football Park.

Speaking after the Crows 37-point loss to West Coast at Subiaco Oval, Cornes believed his team's poor form away from South Australia was 'a focal point of the media'.

The Crows arguably possess the most feared home-ground advantage, but this year, their only away wins have been against the three bottom sides, Sydney, Brisbane and Richmond.

"We've played some good teams away from home and they have beaten us, but if you look at the record of other sides away from home, they aren't that great.

"I think ours has been blown out of proportion and the wins will come in time."

Cornes was happy with his side's persistence against the reigning premiers and admitted he wasn't surprised that the Crows, courtesy of four goals in time-on in the second and third quarters, were within 23 points of the Eagles at the final change.

"It was always going to be a low scoring game given the conditions and if you can persist and take the opportunities as they present themselves, even the ones you don't probably deserve, you are always going to be within striking distance."

The Crows, who could have moved to second spot with a win over the Eagles, have a bye this week, before a crucial month leading up to September, with games against Fitzroy (away), Melbourne (home), Hawthorn (away) and Collingwood (home).

Cornes said Adelaide would welcome the bye, using it to allow forwards Tony Modra (calf), Randall Bone (ankle), Chris Groom (hamstring) to recover from injury worries.

THE Claremont Football Club's search for their best team from the modern-day era will come to a glittering climax next Tuesday, when the Tigers host a special Hungry Jack's All-Stars dinner.

A list of 60 players have been considered for the final line-up — and it's been a horrendous task deciding who goes in and who misses out.

The criteria for the judges has been to pick the best player for each position, which means that some champions of the past will miss a guernsey.

In recent weeks, Westside Football has looked at the on-ballers, the forwards and the defenders and this week we examine the credentials of some of the all-rounders — and other players with strong claims.

Kevin Clune is a man who ranks high in Claremont's history.

TOUGH VETERAN

A veteran of 231 games, he was a tough centreman who was seldom beaten. In today's football, his enormous stamina would make him a great ruck-rover.

Jim Davies — later to be president of the WANFL — was a Sandover Medal winning centreman at Swan Districts before joining Claremont and Gordon (Sonny) Maffina won a Sandover for the Tigers playing in the middle in 1949.

The role of a ruck-rover has changed over the years, but Claremont have had a few of the most versatile on-ball men you would want.

John Dethridge was big, strong and quick; Russell Reynolds was superbly fit and skilled, while Michael Elphick had plenty of versatility.

John Munro — later to be an original Channel Seven critic — was a classy big man who played in many key positions, while John Compton was a centre-half-forward from the premiership years of 1938-39-40.

Dalton Gooding, a stylish wingman, has claims to one centreline spot, while Brian Fairclough, Dale Edwards and an old-timer in Jim Reid also deserve consideration.

Two tough customers in defender Noel Morton and half-forward Irwin Lewis have strong Claremont links — and what about two of today's stars, Derek Kickett and Darrell Panizza?

Kickett is a star in many positions with Essendon, while the evergreen Panizza has had some magnificent seasons on a wing in his early days and now in defence.

The candidates for the coaching position are all premiership men — Jim Conway (1964), Graham Moss (1981) and Gerard Neesham (1987-89-91).

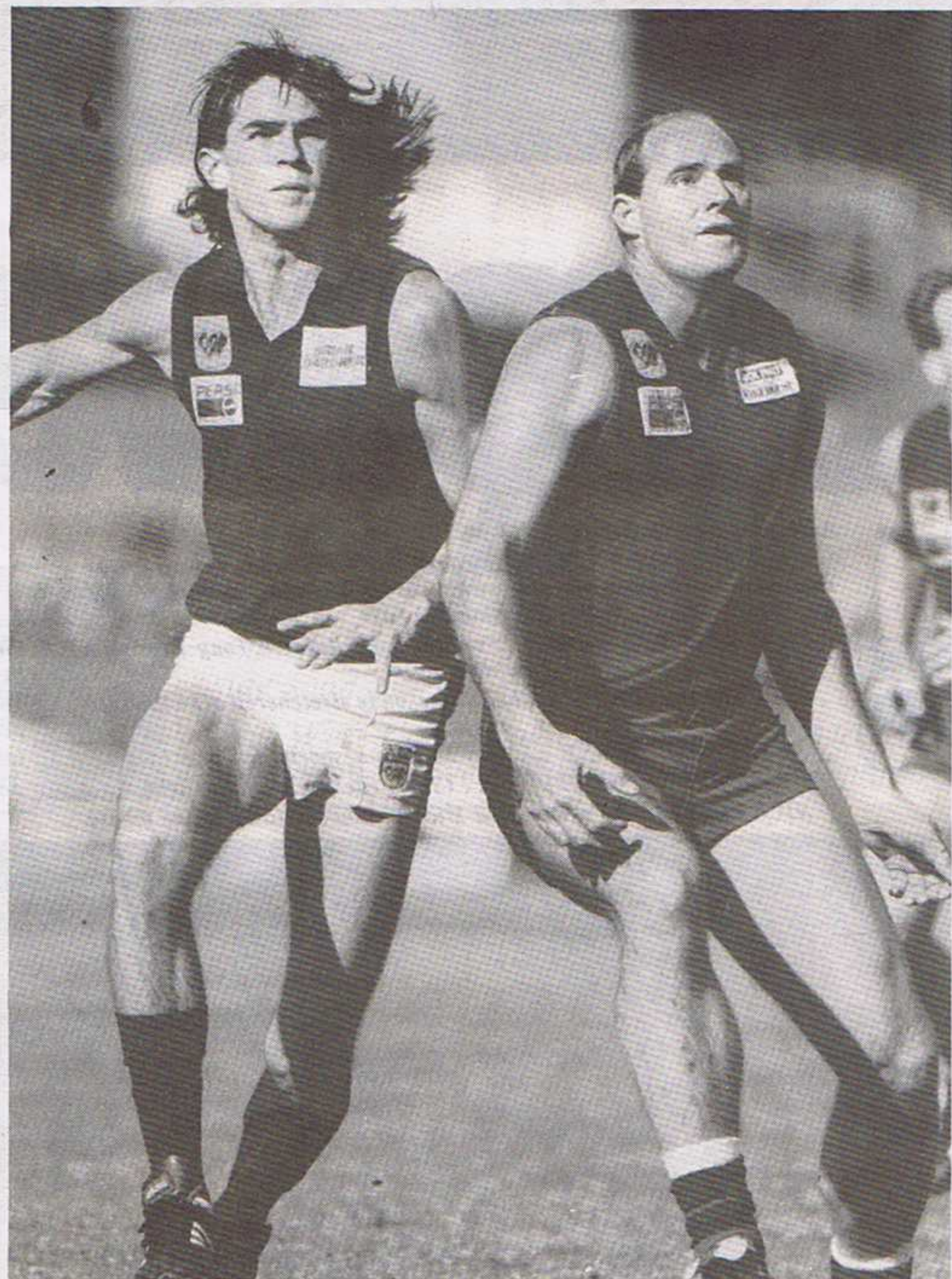

Lions hopes in other hands

SUBIACO'S destiny for season '93 is only partly in their control.

The Lions, who on Sunday clash with Pepsi Cup rivals South Fremantle at Subiaco Oval, must win their remaining four games to have any chance of playing off in this season's finals.

But they are six points behind fifth-placed Claremont and cannot make the top five if the Tigers win three of their final four matches.

Subiaco coach Tony Solin, whose side put up a magnificent effort only to lose by two points to Swan Districts last Saturday, knows full well that Claremont play the top four sides in the next month, starting with East Fremantle on Saturday.

The last time Subiaco and South Fremantle played, the Bulldogs thrashed the Lions by an embarrassing 128 points.

Since then the wheels have fallen off the Souths machine as the Bulldogs have tumbled to five defeats in six games, including the last four.

Another loss and they could relinquish third spot to the Sharks.

Best-on-ground in the Bulldogs demolition of the Lions was rover and captain Wally Matera, who will be missing with a broken hand.

His absence will put pressure on the Bulldogs running brigade of Simon Taylor, Greg Wootton, Russell Williams, Mark Collins and Ashley Flugge, who were down on form against East Fremantle.

They will need to lift against the Lions midfielders, Matt Connell, Tony Godden, Nathan O'Connor, Paul Miller, Errol Bourn and Jarrad Schofield, who could play after missing last week with a thigh strain.

IN TROUBLE

The influence of vital ball-carriers in both teams could rest with the respective ruckmen, Matthew Burton (Subiaco) and Dean Irving (South Fremantle).

If Burton maintains his good form and gives his smaller players first use of the ball, South Fremantle could be in trouble.

Lions full-forward Jason Heatley heads the goalkicking table with 75 and is well supported by fellow forwards Andrew Macnish (32) and Rod Willet and Kane O'Brien, with 23 each. Nathan McIntosh also kicked two goals against Swans in his first senior game for the year.

The Bulldogs will look to experienced defenders John Porter and Martin Atkins to lead from the front and curb the dangerous Lions forwards.

Newcomer Lee Sounness is a likely opponent for Brett Spinks at centre-half-back, while captain David Snow shapes as Hardie's minder.

The game carries equal importance for both clubs, with Subiaco's options in attack the possible difference.

CLAREMONT will give their supporters an indication of whether they are worthy finals contenders when they tackle the Sharks at East Fremantle Oval on Saturday.

The Tigers scored a crucial win over East Perth last week, while East Fremantle downed South Fremantle.

The Sharks are receiving great service from ruckman Justin Sanders and his tussle with Clinton Wolf will be a crucial factor in the outcome.

SWANS IN FORM

SWAN Districts should retain their recent good form when they travel to Lathlain Park on Sunday to play Perth.

The Demons should welcome back ruckman Stephen Pears and Craig McNaughton, but still face a mammoth task to topple the league leaders.

ROYALS HOPES

EAST Perth can keep alive their slim finals hopes if they beat the in-form West Perth at Perth Oval on Sunday.

The Royals, who will welcome back defender Jeremy Barnard, are two games behind fifth-placed Claremont and must beat the Falcons.

West Perth were in good form against Perth, with Derek Hall starring at centre-half-forward and Greg Jones in rare touch at centre-half-back.

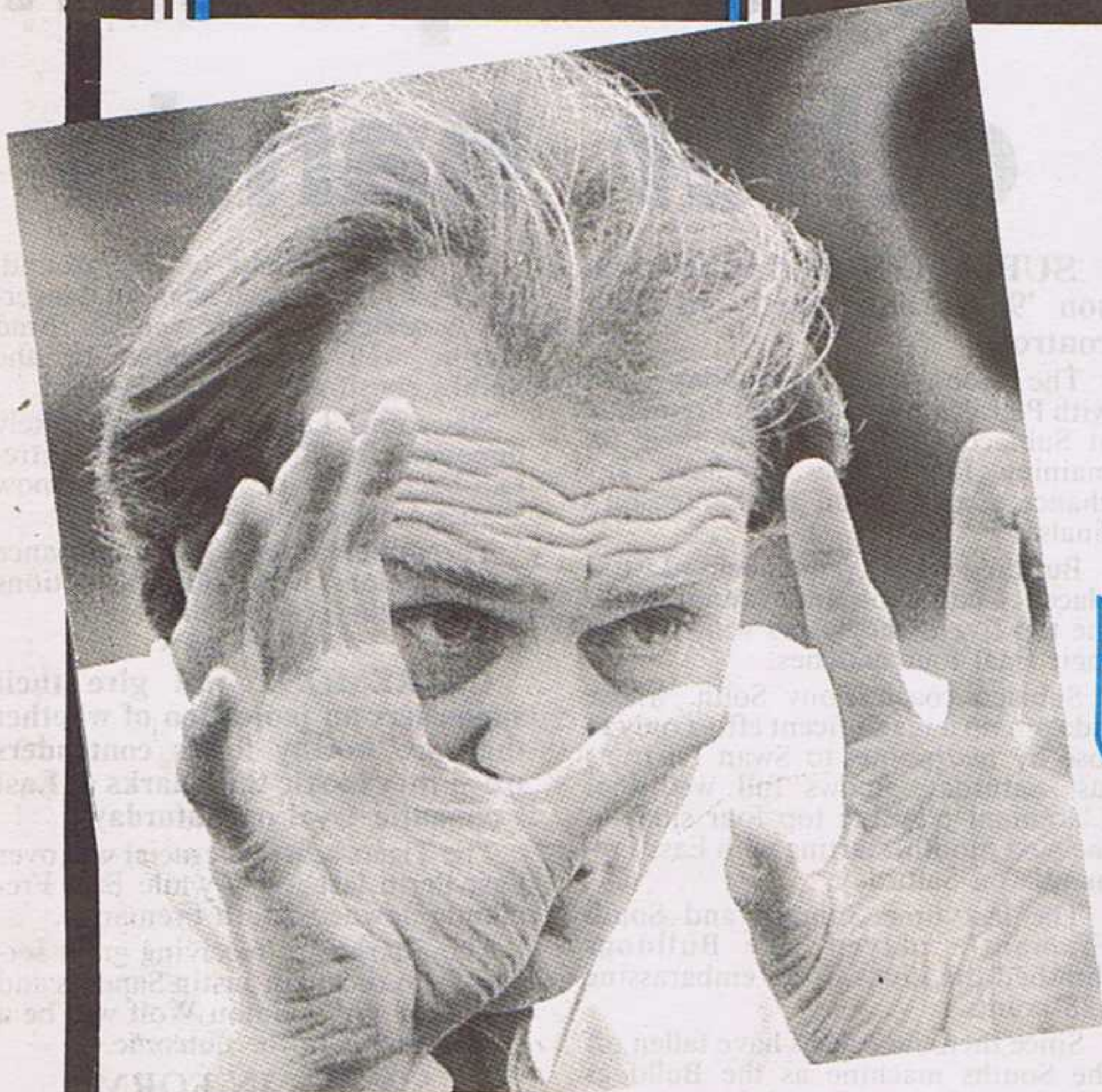

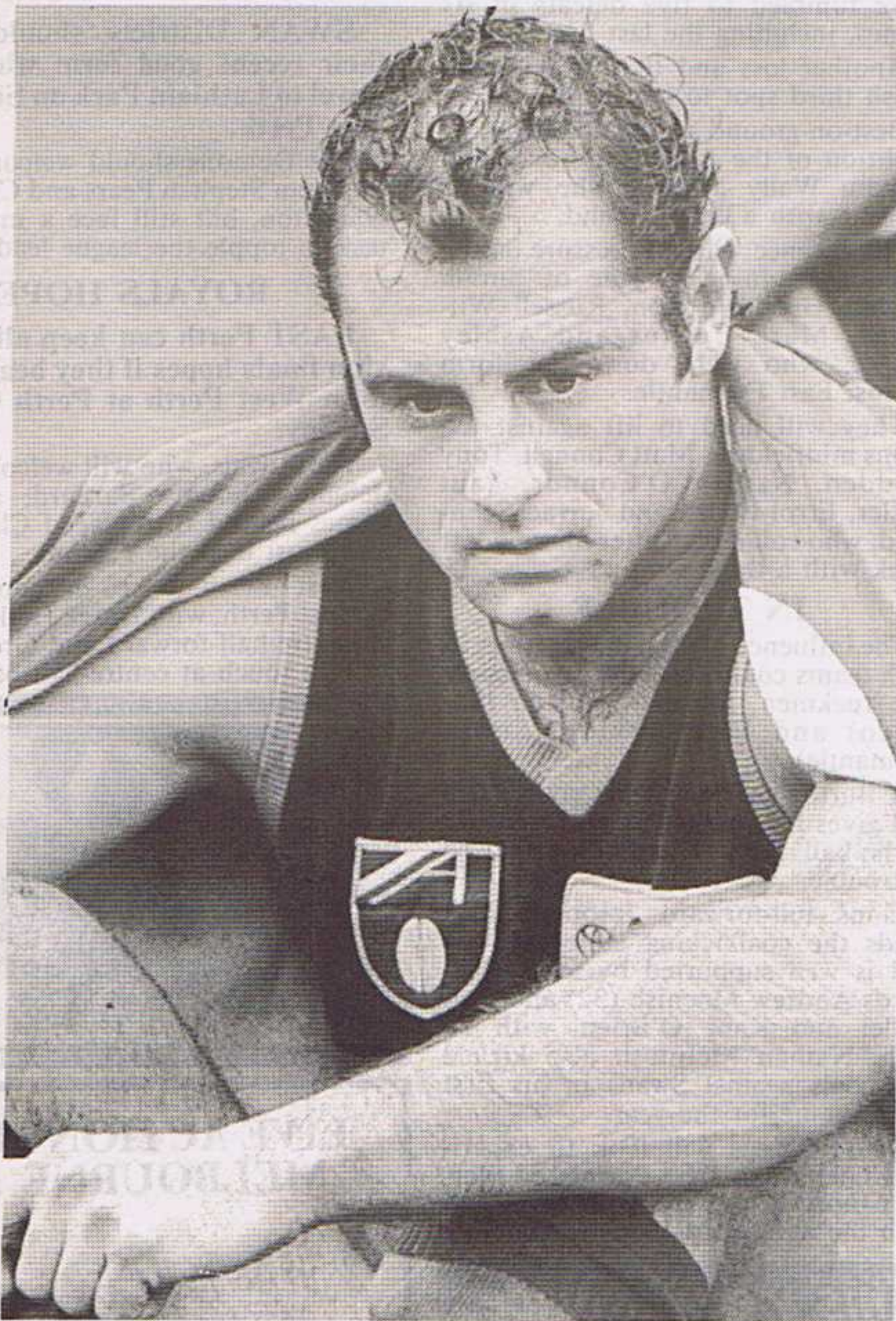

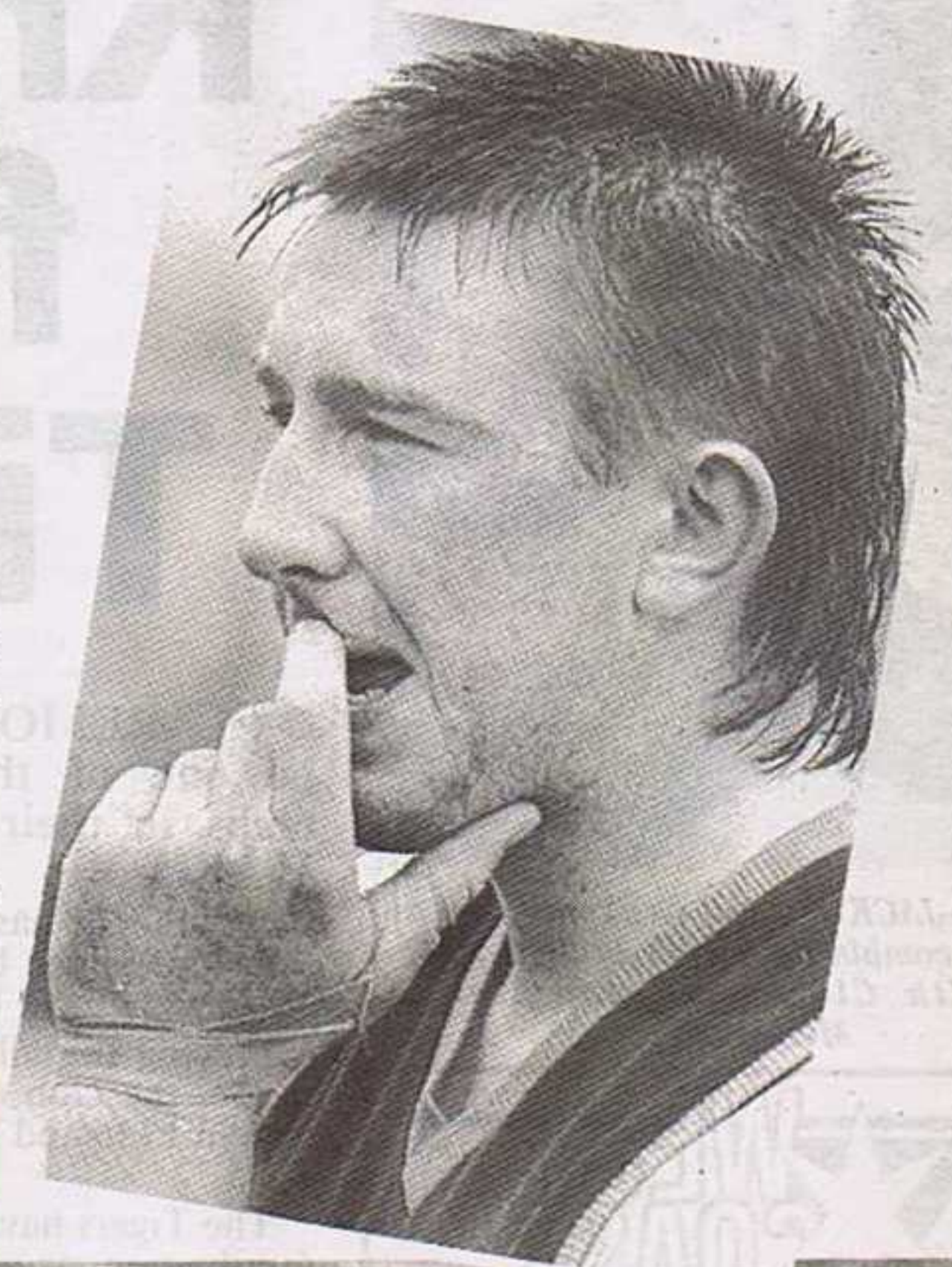

Krakouers fired at Tigerland

CLAREMONT have proved to be one of the best-connected clubs in their 68 years in the WAFL.

Whether it has been the father-son sequence or the brotherly connection, the results have been outstanding.

Playing initially as Claremont-Cottesloe, the club entered the competition in 1926 and became Claremont in 1935.

The Tigers have spawned many fine family ties over the years, but the emergence of Jim and Phil Krakouer in the late 1970s has been the most heralded.

Both made their debuts as 18-year-olds — Jim in 1977 and Phil a year later.

The brilliant Aboriginal pair were lured to the city from the small southern town of Mt Barker and excited crowds with their electrifying skills and uncanny ability to combine on the field.

After helping Claremont win the 1981 premiership — Jim also won the club fairest and best award that year — they crossed the Nullabor to play with North Melbourne, taking the VFL by storm.

Jim, the Kangaroos 1986 club champion, played 134 games and Phil 141 before salary cap restrictions squeezed them out to finish their illustrious careers at St Kilda and Footscray, respectively.

Younger brother Billy spent one season with the Tigers in 1988, before moving to East Fremantle.

Several other brothers have exerted their influence at Claremont Oval.

Michael Mitchell joined the Tigers from Carnarvon in 1982 and played 89 games, with his 1984 Sandover Medal win and a soaring mark against Subiaco two memorable moments.

The scintillating small man joined Richmond in 1987 and stayed there until 1991, playing a further 81 games.

Younger brother, ruck-rover Kevin, started with the Tigers in 1985 and has played in two premierships on his way to 98 senior games.

Irwin Lewis was a member of Claremont's 1964 premiership team and has had the pleasure of seeing his three sons, Clayton, Cameron and Chris, wear the blue and gold.

Clayton and Cameron both played for the Tigers and East Perth, with Cam playing in the '87 and '89 Tigers premiership combinations.

Chris made only three league appearances with Claremont at the end 1986 before being drafted by the West Coast Eagles, where he has excelled, winning the 1990 club champion award.

FAMILY TIES ...

Michael and David O'Connell made their debuts in 1982 and 1984, respectively, and went on to play for the Eagles, with David also lining up for Fitzroy. Their father, club president John, was a superb ruckman, playing 238 games for Claremont and Geelong from 1950-63.

Mark Brayshaw, son of 1964 premiership player Ian, is back with the Tigers after a three-year stint with North Melbourne.

His brother James, a Sheffield Shield cricket star with WA and South Australia, was a member of Claremont's 1990 reserves premiership team.

George Moloney ranks as one of Claremont's all-time greats, being the only man to top the goalkicking in WA and Victoria, but his brothers Bert and Syd also made their names at Claremont.

Robbie and Vic Melville; Russell, Wayne and Brad Reynolds; Brett and Dean Farmer; the Goodings, Dalton, Malcolm and Graham; Scott and Mark Edwards; Ken and Jeff Mann; Dennis and Warren Marshall; Rick and Kim Malcolm; Peter and Arthur Crisp; John and Michael Hutton; Kevin and Colin Clune; Steve and Michael Malaxos and Tom and Jeff Seargent are just some other brothers to have represented Claremont.

BROWNLOW RUNNER-UP

The father-son connections at Claremont are headed by John and Ashley McIntosh.

John, who was runner-up to Ian Stewart in the 1971 Brownlow Medal, played in the '64 premiership side alongside Brayshaw, Lewis, Dale Edwards and Ken Mann.

Edwards' son Scott also plays for the Tigers, while Mann's son Peter has moved on to North Melbourne after a stint with Claremont and a West Coast draft call-up.

Ashley McIntosh has played only seven games with Claremont and is starring with the Eagles.

Other father-son combinations at Claremont include Alf and Ian Fisher, Ian and John Grieve, Ben and Lorne Cook, Jack and Jim Hooper, Gavin and Jeremy Guard, Bert and John McPartland, Brian and David Ham and John and Maurie Bridgewood.

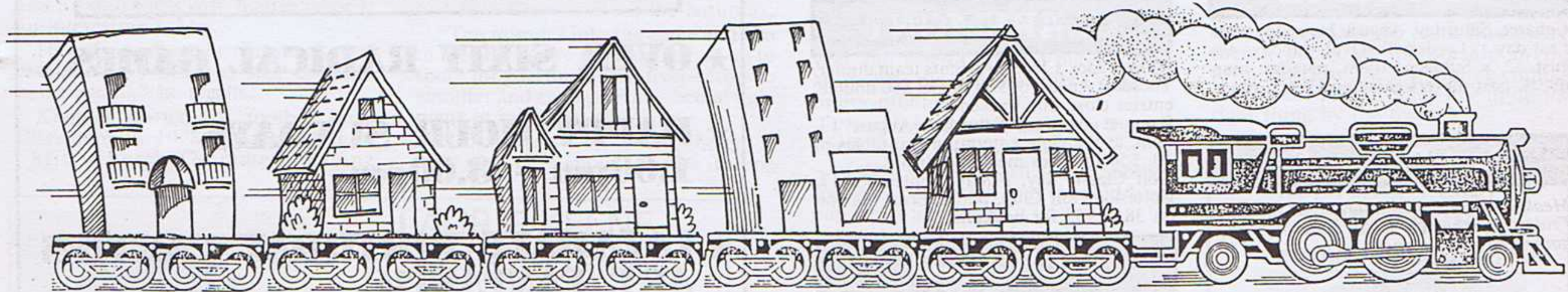

GREAT Northern took out the prestigious Wesfarmers Country Championship A-grade title with a powerful finish over favourites South West.

The virtually-unknown, but highly-talented Geraldton-based side caught most observers by surprise as they fought strongly to beat the carnival favourites.

In a low-scoring, wet-weather final played at Subiaco Oval as a curtain-raiser to the Eagles v Crows game, Great Northern ran out 23-point winners, 11.7 (73) to 7.8 (50).

They jumped South West in the opening term, with clever rover Darren Ryan in good touch and centreman Tim Varney and wingmen Alan Dick and John Cripps dominating.

With ruckmen Lance Durack and Greg Hodson in good form, South West hit the front at half-time, leading 5.4 to 5.2.

South West also had prominent smallmen in Brad Barrett and Glen Moir, who both thrived in the slippery conditions.

Moir, a former Perth and East Fremantle rover, was a member of Daniels' 1992 Goldfields side and was working hard to add consecutive titles to his collection.

In a dour third-quarter battle neither side could break away as the rival defences slugged it out.

With the game and the title up for grabs, Great Northern skipper Bruce Gillingham — superb all week — lifted his rating, along with Ryan, who had been quiet in the second and third terms.

The Collard brothers, Adrian and Gavin, sprang into life and both kicked vital goals as Great Northern stretched their narrow lead to a match-winning four goals.

Gillingham (17 kicks) and skilful ruck-rover Gary Dhurrkay relished the heavy going around the packs.

The grand final win capped off a marvellous week for Gillingham, a former East Perth player, who was best on ground in both of Great Northern's qualifying games.

Dhurrkay, Adrian and Gavin Collard and Ryan (two goals each) were all dangerous in attack on a day when goals were hard to come by.

GOOD START

For South West, who opened their championship campaign with an impressive win over 1992 title-holders Goldfields, centreman Darren Finlayson worked extremely hard and Daniels, off a half-back flank, did everything he could to lift his side.

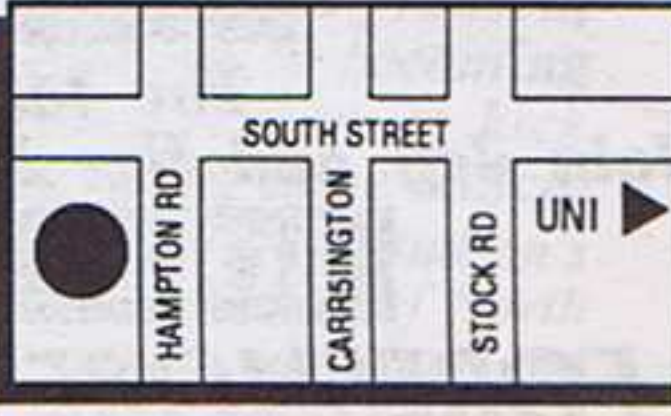

Bayswater celebrate 60th year

ONE of Perth's traditional junior football clubs, Bayswater-Morley, celebrate their 60th anniversary on Saturday, August 7 — giving them claims to be among the oldest junior clubs in Australia.

The origin of the club has been traced back to the late Charles Reibe, who founded the first team in 1933.

Known as the Bayswater Junior Football Club, they were based at Bayswater Oval and competed in the Temperance League and the Metropolitan Juniors.

Facilities at Bayswater Oval were fairly primitive, with the change rooms consisting of a small wooden shed without showers or conveniences — and many a time the players washed themselves down in the drainage channel passing alongside the oval.

In 1946, they changed colours from blue and red (Bayswater amateurs), to the present combination of green, with a red slash.

In 1964, the club moved to Hillcrest Oval and changed to Bayswater-Embleton and played in the Swan Districts council until 1970, when boundary changes came into effect.

The year of 1971 was their first in the East Perth junior council and saw a new home ground — Emberson Reserve, in Morley, which served as headquarters until 1977, when they made their last move, to Houghton Reserve, in Bayswater.

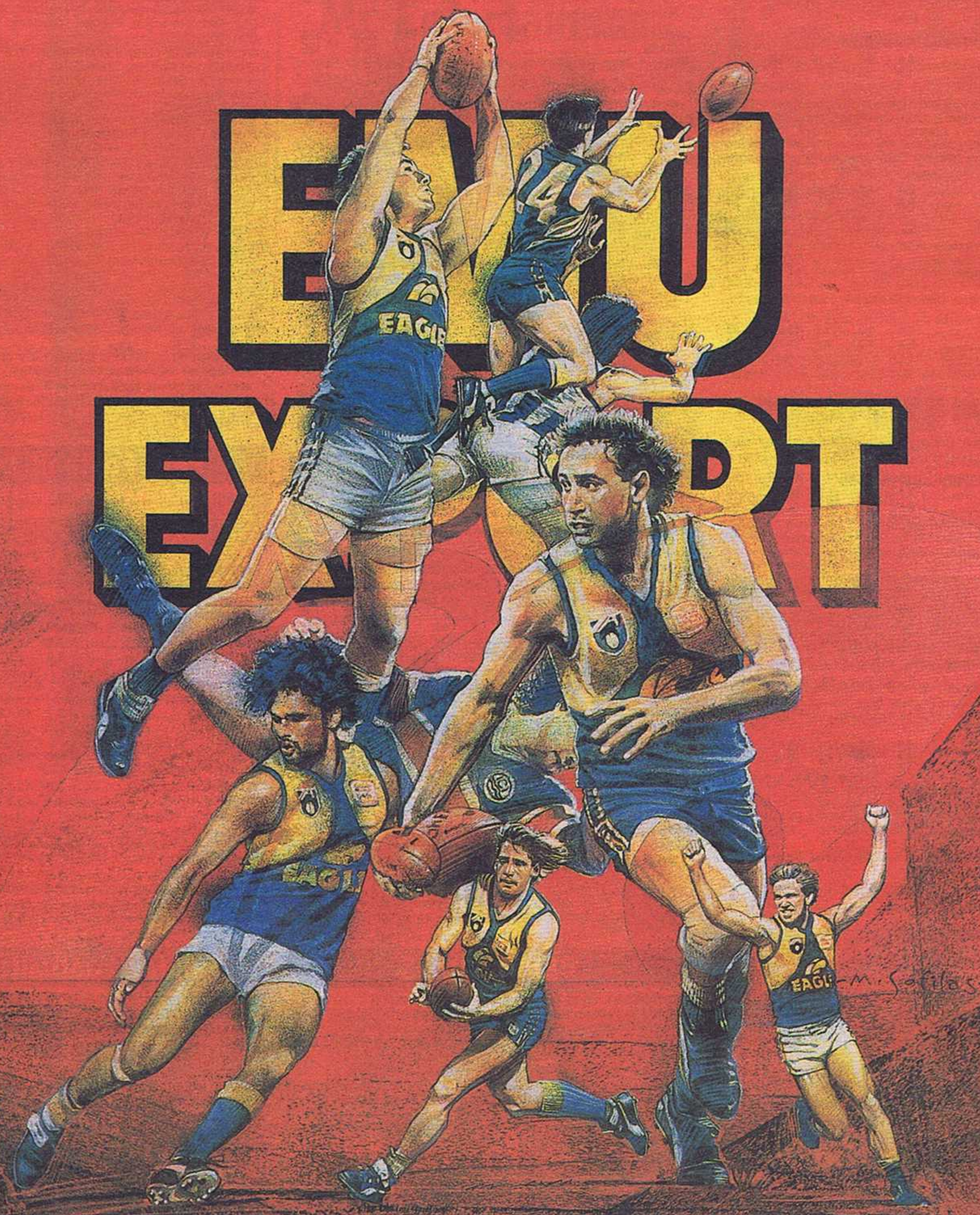
