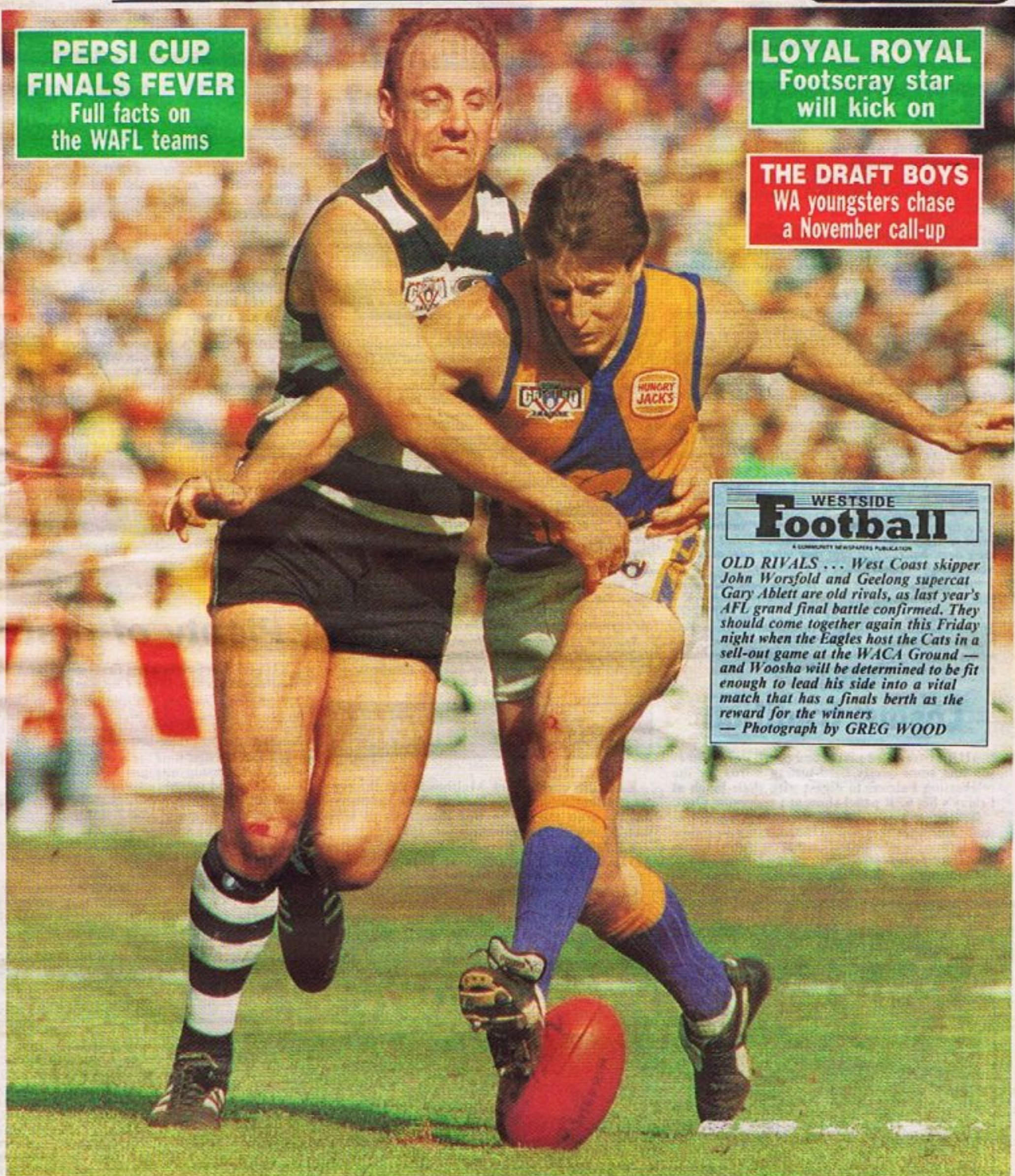

It's a fact

EAST Perth's star interstate recruit of the season, Lyle Johnstone, is keen to play another season under coach Stan Magro.

Johnstone — 26 next Tuesday — comes from Sandringham, in the VFA and lobbied at Perth Oval unexpectedly early in March, developing as one of the stars of the team's late-season revival.

The strongly-built centreman with a magnificent disposal believes that he's past the draft age and would like to give the WAFL another year.

Shark tactics

FAST-talking 6PR critic Percy Johnson had some spot-on comments about his favourite side last week as East Fremantle crushed Swan Districts to bow out of the 1993 season with a real kick.

Johnson wasn't calling the game, but when a progress score came through with the Sharks well on the way to an impressive victory, he suggested that maybe East Fremantle were playing footy — and not worrying about tagging the opposition players for a change.

Tactical backfire

ONE wonders whether the Mick Malthouse dig at Footscray's watering programme at the Western Oval backfired at the weekend?

Certainly, the 42-point victory by the Footscray Scraggers over the West Coasters was a defeat the Eagles didn't need at this crucial stage of the season.

There was a quick Footscray response when Malthouse made his quip that he hoped the ground "didn't receive any undue watering" during last week's build-up to the match.

Footscray's football manager Garry O'Sullivan was quick to reply that those sort of things didn't happen these days, but inferred that they might have occurred when Malthouse was coach of Footscray.

"We don't plan to go back to those dark old days," said O'Sullivan in a radio interview aired in Perth.

Not only did the incident bring up some of MM's former coaching tactics, but it turned the focus back on the terrible condition of the Subiaco Oval surface — with a number of Victorians dubbing the WA headquarters as the worst playing surface in the AFL.

Losing tradition

MUCH-travelled player and coach Percy Johnson had some pretty hard-hitting words for the celebrating Falcons to digest with their lunch at Friday's big 6PR panel show at Leederville Oval.

He was quite annoyed that West Perth would lose their name when they moved to Joondalup — despite claims from the administration that the club's identity would not disappear.

"Why not call them the Joondalup Cardies," he asked. "At least that would bring something of the old name back again and would be better than the Joondalup Falcons."

"As sure as anything, you'll see the name West Perth disappear," he added.

Leederville again?

THE hype that surrounded the Farewell to Leederville activities last weekend was reminiscent of football from the bygone days.

But not everyone around town believes that it is the end of football at Leederville Oval.

With the ground lease likely to be secured by the West Australian Football Commission, there is always the chance that a WAFL match could be staged there in an emergency.

And Radio 6NR man-about-town Colin Minson is predicting that West Perth might even have a game there next year, despite moving to Joondalup at the end of this season.

What with the ground surface at Joondalup still being prepared, there is every chance that the Falcons might have to play a couple of their early-season games in 1994 away from their new home — and that puts Leederville Oval back in contention.

Words of wisdom

AND talking about good advice, veteran caller Frank Sparrow — a man with ample coaching credentials — had some words of wisdom for East Perth firebrand, Nathan Brooks, during Saturday's clash with Perth.

When Brooks rushed in to show support for skipper Lucio Baroni after he was felled with a high tackle, the situation got a little hot — just the right ingredients for the aggressive Royal to find himself in hot water again.

Sparrow suggested that Brooks shouldn't over-indulge in such tactics; simply be patient and use the legal hip-and-shoulder to square up later in the game.

Out of touch

EAGLES coach Mick Malthouse was the centre of attention on 6PR's football show last Saturday — even though he was thousands of kilometres away in Melbourne.

A caller asked Gary Carvolth how come they often had the opposition coach on for a Saturday morning interview, but never had Malthouse.

Carvolth said that Malthouse had declined previous requests to be available for a Saturday morning interview and, in fact, had turned down a recent suggestion to co-host Carvolth's afternoon sports show and take calls from listeners.

Football loses stalwarts

FOOTBALL has mourned the passing of three former greats — an administrator and two playing legends.

Barney Giles, a man who truly earned the title of 'legend' when it came to administration, was a foundation member of the Wembley Athletic Club, the parent body of the Wembley Amateur Football Club, which was formed in 1926.

He was secretary of the Athletic Club for 42 years, from 1933 to 1975, earning life membership.

Giles was a strong supporter of football at all levels and after service in the World War, he was appointed secretary of the WA National Football League and was on the committee of the WA Amateur Football League, earning life membership of both groups.

Two legendary footballers to pass away have been South Fremantle's Jack (Corp) Reilly and East Perth's Ray Starr.

Reilly (73) notched 204 games with the Bulldogs in their golden era, playing in the premierships sides of 1947, '48 and '50 and representing WA seven times.

The father of three footballing sons in Danny, John and Graeme, Corp had his career interrupted by the World War — as did Starr, who played 170 games with the Royals, from 1936 to '49.

Both men were life members at their clubs and were two footballers in a rare bunch to represent WA before and after the war years.

Plenty of firsts

THERE were quite a few firsts when the curtain came down on the Pepsi Cup qualifying rounds.

West Perth snatched top spot from Swan Districts on percentage — 99.23 to 97.75 — and that's the first time in WAFL history that the two top sides have finished with less than 100-per cent.

It's also the first time the top side has claimed the minor premiership with just 13 wins from an eight-team 21-round season.

In 1960 West Perth finished on top with 13 wins, plus three draws and in 1974 East Fremantle claimed top spot with 13 victories and one draw.

Back in 1915 — the year West Perth first played at Leederville — Midland Junction actually missed the final four despite having 13 wins.

It's not the first time the wooden spooners of one season have finished on top of the table the next year — it has happened once before, in 1975 when Graham Campbell took West Perth from bottom to top... and then claimed the premiership.

DRAFT TEMPTATION

NEARLY 70 players in this year's WAFL competition have nominated for the new-look AFL national draft in November.

Surprisingly, not one Swan Districts player from the talent-laden Bassendean camp has filled out a nomination form.

However, Swans deny that they have placed any pressure on their young stars to keep out of the draft.

Swans team manager Ray Reynolds says the club's young players are aware that they have a long way to go before they are ready for the AFL.

The talented crop of youngsters at Bassendean — such as Craig Callaghan, Nathan Kelly, John Laurito, Troy Jordan, Peter Kelly and Grant Bradbrook — would have come under close scrutiny by AFL clubs.

"Those guys know they've got a long way to go," Reynolds said.

"They've still got some learning to do and they are aware of that."

Of the 67 players nominated, only Perth pair Adrian Barich and Shane Cable (West Coast) have made AFL appearances.

BULLDOG HOPES

Fifteen South Fremantle players have listed their services, with 14 East Perth players nominating.

The breakdown of other clubs is: Perth (11), Subiaco (10), West Perth (7), East Fremantle (5) and Claremont (5).

One player likely to be an early call-up is East Perth forward Paul Barnard (20), who spoke to a number of AFL clubs last year, but was overlooked.

He has overcome the disappointment and turned in an excellent season with the Royals, starting at full-back and finishing at the opposite end, kicking 53 goals.

Barnard's older brother Jeremy, who joined East Perth in the hope of getting drafted, has also nominated.

Among the other Royals in the draft are Steve Pendleton, Lloyd Haskett, Heath East, Aaron Gale, Peter Miller and Rod Wheatley.

Subiaco spearhead Jason Heatley, who posted 90 goals in just 18 matches, is expected to be an early target.

Four of his Subiaco team-mates — captain David Snow, defender Peter

Mohen, wingman Nathan O'Connor and talented teenager Scott Gooch — have also nominated.

Gooch is yet to play a league game, but has been in excellent form for the Lions colts and reserves sides.

Of the 15 Bulldogs who have nominated, 17-year-old Darren Gaspar could come under the microscope.

His older brother Damian was chosen by Melbourne last season and Darren, who stands 193cm and weighs 89kg, has impressed at centre-half-back.

Steven O'Brien, a talented Bulldogs teenager yet to play a league game, has his name under the eye of several AFL clubs.

Centre-half-back Martin Atkins announced after his magnificent game against SA at the WACA Ground, that he wanted to play AFL.

Dashing West Perth wingman Neil Mildenhall, who joined the Falcons from Traralgon this year, has had a brilliant debut season, but his age (25) could count against him.

The Falcons, last-to-first achievers this year, could also lose Mark Merenda, Geoff Valentine, Darren O'Brien and Ron Burns.

Denis Repacholi and Troy West, who were cut from Footscray's list, have also nominated.

Perth youngster Wayne Allard has been a model of consistency all season and could realise his life-long dream of playing in the AFL.

Allard, who represented Northern Territory for three years in the Teal Cup, made his debut for the Demons in 1991 and attracted the attention of Carlton and Brisbane.

Other young Demons keen to build an AFL career include Troy Davis, Troy Polak, Russell Thompson, Jeff Moore and Stephen Pears.

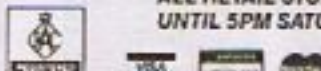

Similarities keep Eagles in flag fight

THE purveyors of doom and gloom will no doubt start to administer the last rites over the West Coast Eagles premiership chances after Saturday's walloping by Footscray.

The performance was dismal to say the least, but this season is starting to shape up as identical to last year's run to the finals.

Remember how Footscray thrashed the Eagles in the second-last qualifying game and then Carlton, like Geelong, had to beat the Eagles in the last match in Perth to make the finals?

And let's not forget how the Eagles lost to Fitzroy in the last qualifying game the previous year, yet in both seasons West Coast went on to play in the grand final.

On that reckoning, the Eagles should not be dismissed.

If you look for further reasons to support that argument, then it can be said that the Eagles may have been flattened last Saturday after playing Hawthorn in heavy conditions the previous week.

That match certainly had a telling effect on the Hawks a week later, as they stopped to a walk in the second half against Adelaide.

Ironically, the Eagles loss to Footscray could be to their advantage.

If they had won, they faced the distinct possibility of finishing second and missing out on the home ground advantage.

They can now finish third, which puts them on track for a repeat of last year . . . winning their home game final and advancing to the second semi-final.

NO EASY ASSIGNMENT

Assuming the Eagles beat Geelong this Friday night, which will be no easy assignment against a side that should not only be playing in the finals, but would be strong premiership contenders if they were, the Eagles could — for the third consecutive year — play Hawthorn in a Perth final.

And that, in itself, makes one wonder how desperate Hawthorn will be against Brisbane at the Gabba on Sunday, should the Eagles beat Geelong.

Some cynics feel that the Hawks would prefer to play a sudden-death final in Melbourne, rather than meet the Eagles at Subiaco Oval.

The Melbourne fans would surely love to see Perth and Adelaide meet in a knock-out match.

Despite Adelaide's poor record in Melbourne, those fans would still have the thought lurking at the back of their minds that the Crows and Eagles could play off in the grand final — something that is a mathematical possibility.

But if the Eagles and Adelaide win and Hawthorn lose this weekend, the probable outcome is a final in Perth between the Eagles and Adelaide, with Hawthorn playing Essendon in another final.

A win to the Eagles and Hawthorn would put the Perth-based combination in the same finals situation as last year.

There are many permutations as to how the top-six can turn out, but the odds favour an Eagles-Hawthorn rematch in Perth.

Finals herald change for players, fans

PLAYERS at clubs involved in the AFL finals will start to notice subtle differences between the remaining training nights and their previous mid-winter sessions.

On Tuesday evenings during the season, up to a dozen players will converge on their club's physio room.

Aches and pains that often keep players off the track seem to disappear towards the end of the home-and-away series. At this time of year, the only players near an ultra-sound machine are those who either cannot walk, or who are just keeping the normally-busy physiotherapists company.

The mandatory one or two footies that players sign before training during the regular season also leaps to a figure closer to 15.

Out on the oval, the encouragement of the supporters can be heard with every precise kick or handball.

MID-WINTER SESSIONS

It seems not only the players, but also the supporters, develop springs in their step once their team gets a sniff of the finals action.

The cold, mid-winter training sessions when the coaches instructions echo around the empty stands seem light years away. Supporters spill into the previously barren seats and become more vocal with each training drill.

It is a good idea to turn up to training earlier than usual, judging by the backlog of players waiting to use the sole pen for the autograph hunters.

Every player seems to have picked up the pace from the previous weeks, obviously in a bid to impress at selection. Fewer mistakes are made and those who miskick or handball are frowned on by team-mates, coaches — and the fans.


The conditions are more ideal for football as players seem to glide across the firm turf, rather than trudge through it. Screw-in boots are discarded for the more comfortable moulded-sole variety.

Yellow footies, which are a must at mid-season training in Melbourne, are replaced by bright red Sherrins.

This improvement in training and the increased supporter involvement is due to the sudden realisation by players and fans alike that in a few weeks time, the season will be no more.

And just one club will be happy.

History favours Falcons flag

WHILE reviewing West Perth's win over Subiaco on Sunday, the words "stunning upset" appeared on the computer screen.

Stunning upset? The second side had just beaten fifth.

Perth to win the premiership.

The last time the Falcons won the flag, in 1975, they came from last the previous season.

That premiership year, they climbed to the top rung on the ladder in the last qualifying round, displacing Swan Districts and they were coached by a Victorian — Graham Campbell.

They then won the second semi-final and the grand final.

Campbell came to WA unheralded and took over from Dennis Jones when West Perth were in utter despair; their breakthrough coming as a complete surprise.

Jeff Gieschen has performed a similar miracle in his two seasons at Leederville Oval, although he has yet to achieve a flag.

Gieschen took great pains to explain, amid the joyous scenes at Leederville Oval last Sunday, that he and his players were acutely aware that the serious business was just starting.

Regardless of just how far West Perth go along the path to breaking what is the longest premiership drought in the WAFL, they, at least, did the right thing and farewelled Leederville Oval in the appropriate style.

PACKED TO RAFTERS

The sights and sounds as Falcons fans packed Leederville Oval to the rafters were heart-rending and equally satisfying were greats like Bill Dempsey, Mel Whinnen, John Wynne, Bill Valli, Alan Watling and Les Fong running around and adding to the festivities.

The game will always be recalled with reverence as the last hosted by Leederville Oval — whether it is remembered for even greater significance remains to be seen.

But no matter what happens, the Falcons have given their supporters much cause for joy this season and the prospect of players like Rick Toovey, Ian Downsborough and vice-captain Basil Zempilas being available for the finals series suggests they can only get better.

Western Oval hoodoo continues

SATURDAY'S 42-point loss to Footscray at the Western Oval was the worst West Coast defeat for more than a year.

St Kilda beat the Eagles by 66 points in their round 18 clash at Waverley Park last year.

The Eagles score of 7.10 was their eighth lowest, with three of their 10 lowest scores now at the Western Oval.

Each of the Eagles losses to Footscray has been at the Western Oval, where the Eagles record is 3-3.

EARLY in the first quarter of Saturday's match against Adelaide, Hawthorn's Jason Dunstall joined Gary Ablett and Tony Modra as century goalkickers this season.

It is only the second time that three players have topped the ton in a season.

In 1970, Hawthorn's Peter Hudson kicked 146 goals, Collingwood's Peter McKenna 143 and Carlton's Alex Jesaulenko 115.

MAT Bateman, of Kenwick, has asked whether there is any relationship between the goalkicking efforts of Peter Sumich and the performances of the West Coast Eagles.

Sumich has been the Eagles permanent full-forward since the start of the 1990 season. In that time, he has played 85 of the Eagles 96 games.

Of those 85 games, the Eagles have won 62 — a rate of 73 percent. Of the 11 games Sumich has missed, the Eagles have won six — 55 percent.

In the 62 winning efforts, Sumich has kicked 289 goals — at an average of 4.7 a game. In the other 23 matches — 21 losses and two draws — he has kicked 63 goals — averaging 2.7.

Bombers the great white hope

FOOTSCRAY'S Brownlow Medallist, Scott Wynd, favours an Essendon-West Coast grand final.

Wynd is in a good position to make a forecast — the Bombers recently ended Footscray's finals hopes and the Bulldogs handed out a cruel defeat to the Eagles last week.

Wynd says the key to the premiership cup returning to Melbourne is Essendon's younger players being able to adapt to the big occasion.

"This year is just about finished for us, but after beating the Eagles we play another top side in North Melbourne, who are trying to cement their place in the final three, so we'll be out to knock them off," he said.

He said injuries had been crucial, as were consecutive early losses to West Coast and North Melbourne.

"Those defeats put us behind the eight ball," he said.

"I had always believed we could play off in the finals, but it hasn't panned out that way.

"Last year, we took a few sides by surprise. This year, they looked at us more closely and studied our strengths and weaknesses much more."

Asked about his contribution this year, Wynd said fans expected him to produce Brownlow form each week, "and if you don't, people want to know why".

Wynd believes the club will re-emerge next season, especially with so many promising youngsters having been blooded this year.

"They talk about the baby Bombers, but Footscray have many young blokes coming up also," Wynd said.

"With all our injuries, they've been given an opportunity to cement their place in senior football.

"If those blokes can come on like the Essendon boys have done this year, we'll have a good side next season."

Trip holds no fear for Cats

THREE times this season the unthinkable has happened — the Eagles have lost in Perth.

This week it's Geelong who make the trip across the Nullarbor — and it's easy to see why they are confident of snatching a finals berth.

The Cats need a big win — and Collingwood to oust Adelaide at Football Park on Sunday — to make a last-gasp bid for the top six.

Fitzroy, North Melbourne and Carlton have made light of the Eagles home ground advantage this season and the law of averages allows Geelong — sooner or later — to beat the Eagles.

While Geelong upset the Eagles at Subiaco Oval early last season, the Eagles have won the past four encounters, including two at Kardinia Park and two finals at the MCG.

The Cats clawed their way to within a point of the Eagles in their last clash at the WACA Ground on August 9, 1991 and are running hot after consecutive wins over Collingwood, North Melbourne, Hawthorn and Essendon.

The Eagles are not running so smoothly and after a fighting win over Hawthorn, they went down by 42 points at the Western Oval.

A determined Footscray exposed many areas of concern for the match committee, the most telling being the poor form of many players and the side's reluctance to guard their men.

The Eagles rarely put together two bad performances, so they are expected to be a far more competitive unit on Friday night.

With Guy McKenna to miss the match with a knee injury, regaining the services of John Worsfold has taken on new importance.

MISSING EXPERIENCE

The Eagles skipper has not played since injuring his groin on July 31 and his experience is vital in defence.

Worsfold, who often is given the task of curbing Gary Ablett, will be under scrutiny at training.

Ashley McIntosh is another capable of taking on the AFL's leading goalscorer if Worsfold misses out.

The in-form centreline of Chris Mainwaring, Dean Kemp and Peter Matera has given the Cats many headaches in big games and if they can get on top early, they will have their Geelong counterparts chasing their tails.

The Eagles forward line had a dark day last Saturday, when they scrambled three of the side's seven goals.

The out-of-form Tony Evans can expect close attention from Andrew Bews — if he's not given the job on Robert Scott — and Brett Heady may be given a run up-field to help regain touch.

Drew Banfield and Dwayne Lamb shared the duties on Tony Liberatore last Saturday and they, along with Don Pyke, will again be given tagging jobs on the classy Cats midfielders.

Paul Couch, Mark Bairstow and Garry Hocking all had good days against the Bombers, as did ruckman John Barnes, who amassed the creditable stats of 13 kicks, 14 marks, 14 handballs and 14 hit-outs.

Paul Harding lowered his colours to Bulldogs ruckman Scott Wynd, so he will be keen to redeem himself against Essendon reject Barnes.

On the road

'Royalty' might elude Choco

IT WAS supposed to be one of the greatest days of his football career; the day he was to become the 10th Footscray player to reach the 200-game milestone.

Instead, All-Australian rover Brian Royal was hobbling around on crutches, poised on 199 games and 299 goals.

He spent the day watching his team pull off a major upset by beating the premiers, the West Coast Eagles.

After being in such demand by the media for interviews perched high in the Western Oval's John Jent stand, the suggestion that he should turn to commentating did not sound all that ridiculous.

While many players would have been devastated at the cruel hand dealt to him a week earlier, Royal wore a brave face about his snapped left Achilles tendon.

Surgery last Tuesday put his lower leg in plaster and while his team-mates warmed up in the rooms below for their clash with the Eagles, Royal contemplated life without guernsey No. 33 on his back.

"Geez, I've been lucky. I've played 199 games, which is more than many other people," he said.

"I played State footy and I represented my country in Ireland in Gaelic teams, so I can't complain.

"I was going to retire at the end of the year and with this happening I'm going to sit down and talk with the coach this week and see what happens.

"If he's keen for me to go on next year, I'll play, but if he's not, then I will retire.

"I'm 31 and it doesn't seem old, but it's old in football terms. It's just harder to front up to training during the week."

Hours later, Royal's crutches stuck out in a moving sea of Bulldogs guernseys when he shuffled onto the ground to thank his team-mates for their special effort on an emotional day.

Fittingly, he led the team off the Western Oval.

Footscray coach Terry Wheeler could not deny that "Choco" Royal had been a major factor in the side's motivation that day.

"There was no-one from the West Coast side who was going to take victory away from us," Wheeler said.

"It was to be Choco's 200th game and the commitment was made that every player would carry 1/20th of his game today; they did that well."

Royal, a late starter with the Bulldogs as a 21-year-old, will leave his mark on the Footscray Football Club.

Best and fairest in his first year, 1983, runner-up in 1988 and an All-Australian in 1986, Royal played eight State-of-Origin matches for Victoria.

The Bulldogs No. 1 rover from the day he set foot in the club until a natural progression to a forward pocket, Royal is a genuine, good bloke who

would rather remember the good times than the bad.

But he is certain to leave Footscray without a premiership and that is his biggest regret in football.

"The most disappointing thing is that I haven't been in a premiership side, but I've played in four finals and they were highlights," he said.

"Back with Mick Malthouse in 1985, we missed out (on a grand final berth) by 10 points and we had beaten Essendon twice that year.

"Essendon won it and I'm sure we would have beaten them. That's history, but it's amazing how you look back on these things."

Royal tasted premiership success in 1980 with local club Bairnsdale, in the Latrobe Valley League, in the Gippsland area, three seasons before he ventured to the Western Oval.

"I was fortunate that they didn't have any rovers and I'd played five years of senior football," he said.

"I had experience and was lucky enough to step in and start my career that way."

There was no biding his time in the reserves for Royal; playing 21 of the 22 home-and-away matches and crowned club champion.

While his AFL career got away to a dream start, Royal failed to find his groove among the country's elite until the mid-1980s.

"My best years were probably from 1984 to '87 — that's when I was playing State football and 1985-86 were special years for me," he said.

For a player who reached such great heights so early, battling through the twilight years with injury was even more frustrating.

Last year, Royal tore a hamstring in the qualifying final and missed Footscray's inspirational first semi-final win over St Kilda and the preliminary final loss to Geelong.

STAY INVOLVED

After being restricted to just 10 games this season, Royal's head is telling him to call it a day, but his heart says maybe not.

Royal is determined to stay involved in football and coaching is the obvious avenue.

"I would like to coach because I've got a lot out of the game," he said, confirming that VFA rumours weren't far off the mark.

"One of my options is that my old club Bairnsdale want me to go back to coach. That's something I'll consider in the next three or four weeks, or at the end of next year.

"I wouldn't mind going back, but whether it will be next year or in another five, I'm not too sure."

Royal, a builder by trade, has more than just football to consider before moving his family from the city.

"Times are tough everywhere in Victoria and I'll have to weigh up my options whether I take a coaching job and make them get me a job," he said.

"I work for myself and I'm busy in Melbourne, which is fortunate in these times."

Claremont's best-player list has been widespread this season, with the brilliance of Dale Kickett, the hard-work of midfielders Garry Edwards, Quenton Leach and Rob Malone, the forward line skills of Joe Smith and Kevin Mitchell and the defence of Darrell Panizza and youngster Daniel Southern.

Over the next few weeks, players like those WAFL big names — plus a host of brilliant players from top side West Perth — will all be contenders for Stephenies Stars of the Finals award.

Where have you all been hiding?

THREADING a treacherous path through the milling bodies who had extricated themselves from home duties to make an emotional pilgrimage back to Leederville Oval on Sunday, one couldn't help but ask the obvious question:

Where have you all been in the last 10 years?

As the memories came flooding back with 20,112 people enjoying the sun and the sentiment for the last WAFL

match at Leederville, it was a question with many answers.

Why, oh why, have these lovers of football deserted the WAFL scene since the heady days of the '60s and '70s?

Certainly the arrival of the West Coast Eagles in 1987 heralded a change of attendance trends.

But the WAFL crowds had dropped off alarmingly before that — the writing was on the wall back in 1985, when 633,866 people attended the qualifying rounds, an average of 7500 per game compared to the 1981 average of 8500.

Thousands of former lovers of suburban football — people who thrived on the inter-office or next-door-neighbour verbal jousting that tested your club loyalty to the limit — came out of the woodwork last Sunday to see what has happened in the last decade.

Sure, they rolled up to farewell Leederville Oval; sure they came to see the oldies play in the Mel Whinnen and Bill Dempsey teams; sure they got caught up in the emotion of the Fare-

well Leederville day; the sunshine and all the other hype.

But the fact is those people who gathered for such an emotional farewell are all a little guilty of deserting the game they once loved.

Sure, the standard of the WAFL has deteriorated in the last decade; that's only natural with the higher quality in the AFL.

But many of those people at Leederville on Sunday are probably not dedicated Eagles fans; more likely, they are old WAFL fans who just dropped off through a lack of interest and it's taken some good old-fashioned emotion to get them stirred up again.

It's a bit like a funeral — it takes a death in the family to renew old acquaintances.

The irony of it all is that the WAFL wouldn't need to be sending West Perth out to the sticks and away from Leederville Oval if those fans had stuck to their beloved Cardies!

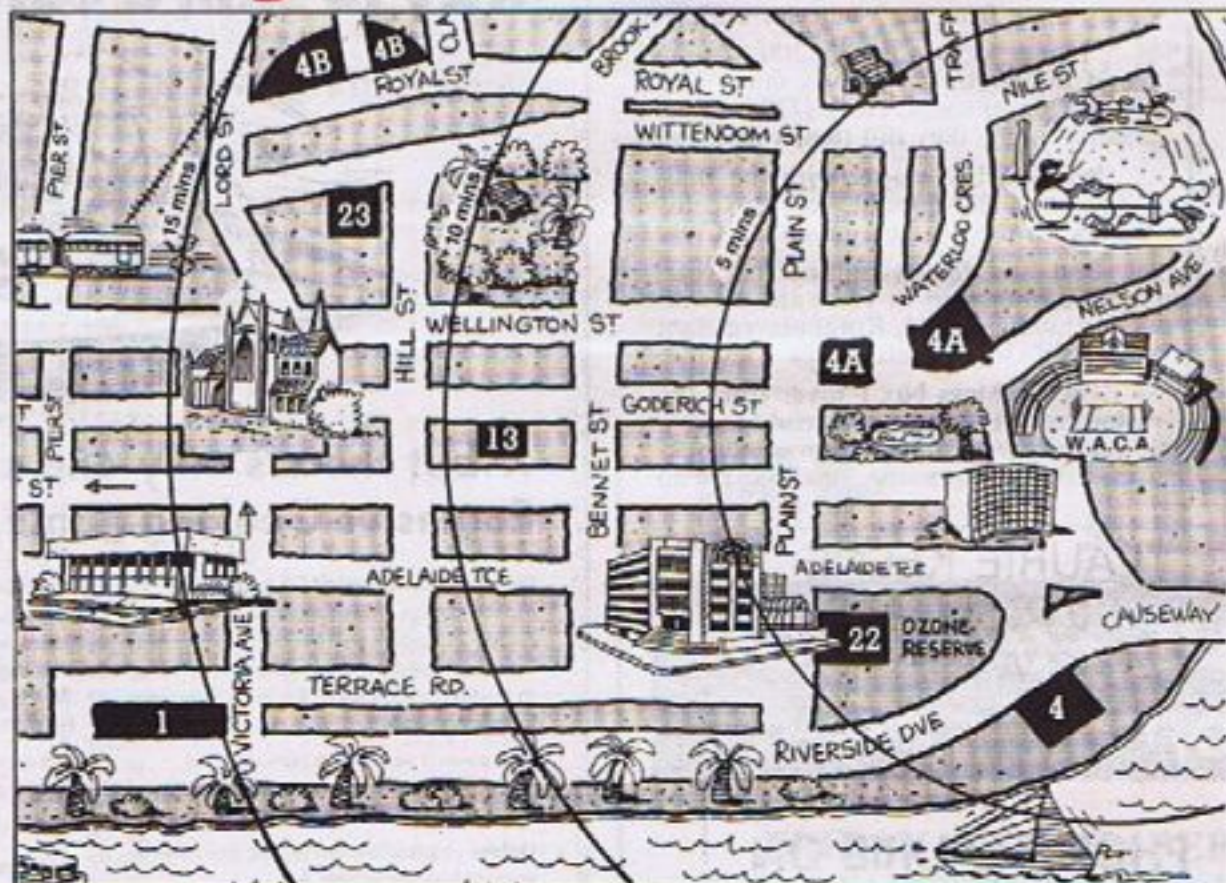

The West Coast Eagles squad member has magnificent skills and a goal sense that has netted him 28 majors this season.

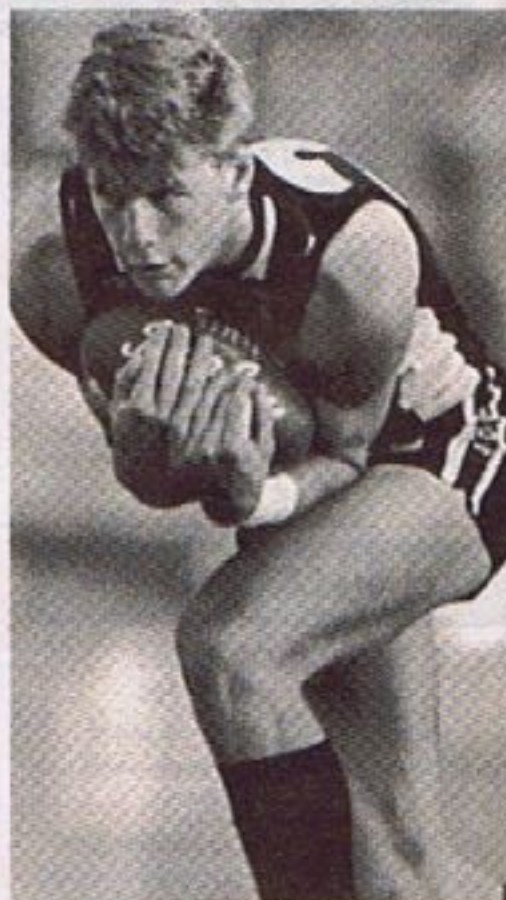
THE DEFENDERS

Tigers sitting pretty in third spot

IT MIGHT come as a surprise to know that Claremont are the favourites to win this year's Pepsi Cup premiership — despite finishing the qualifying round in third position.

In 16 matches, he has kicked 53.24, including a bag of nine against East Fremantle in round 11.

Usually placed alongside Morgan at full-forward is powerful big man Chris Gerreyn (33 goals), who has justified Hawthorn's faith in drafting him with an excellent second half of the season.

Also commanding respect is young Eagles squad member David Muir, whose tackling and bullocking work in the forward line is similar to Karl Langdon's style with the Eagles.

THE DEFENDERS

CLAREMONT'S backline is the tightest in the competition, but is still responsible for setting up many of the side's forward moves.

Dale Kickett has been sensational since moving to half-back, with his aerial feats and elusiveness the highlights.

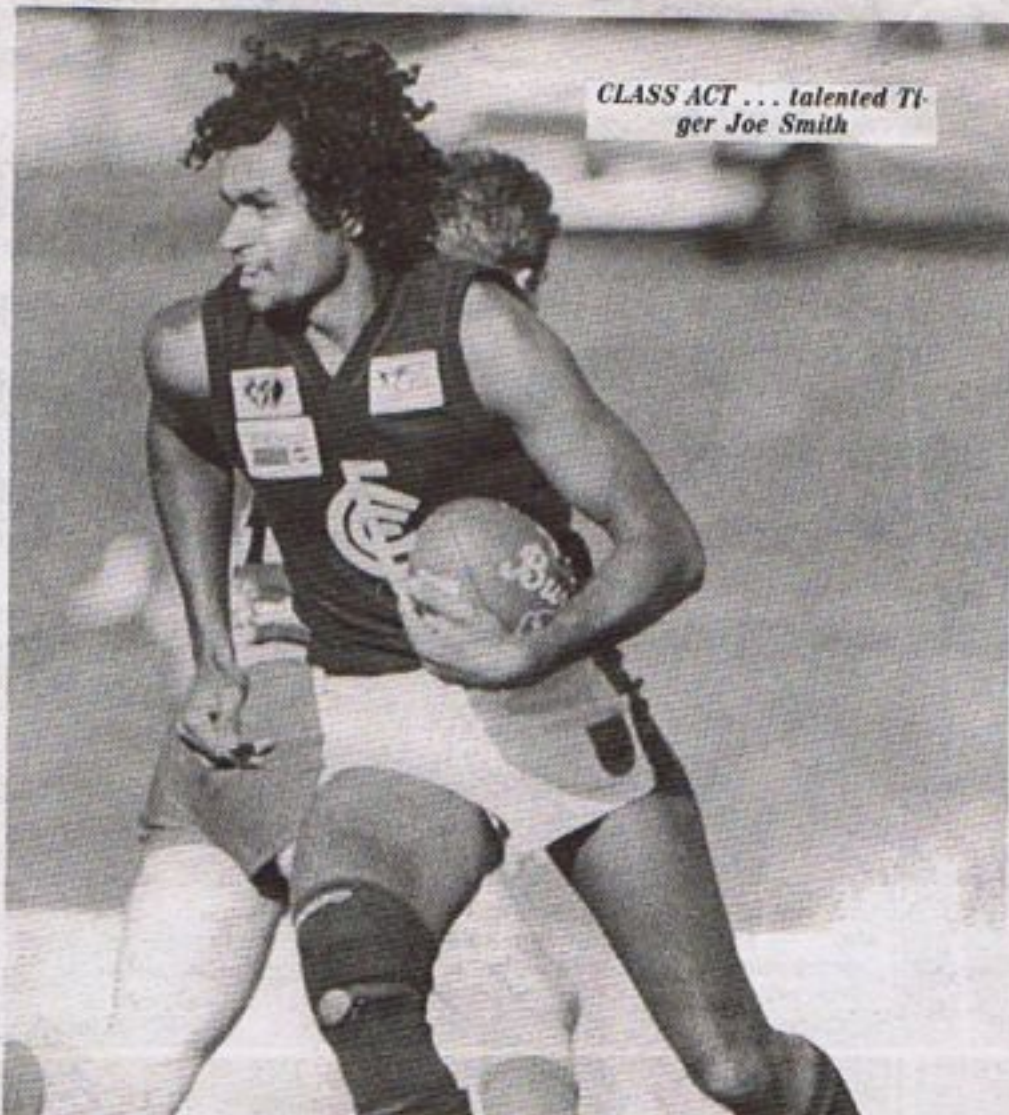
Also developing into a star is courageous small man Brendan Hendry, whose late-season form out of a back pocket has been vital in Claremont securing the double chance.

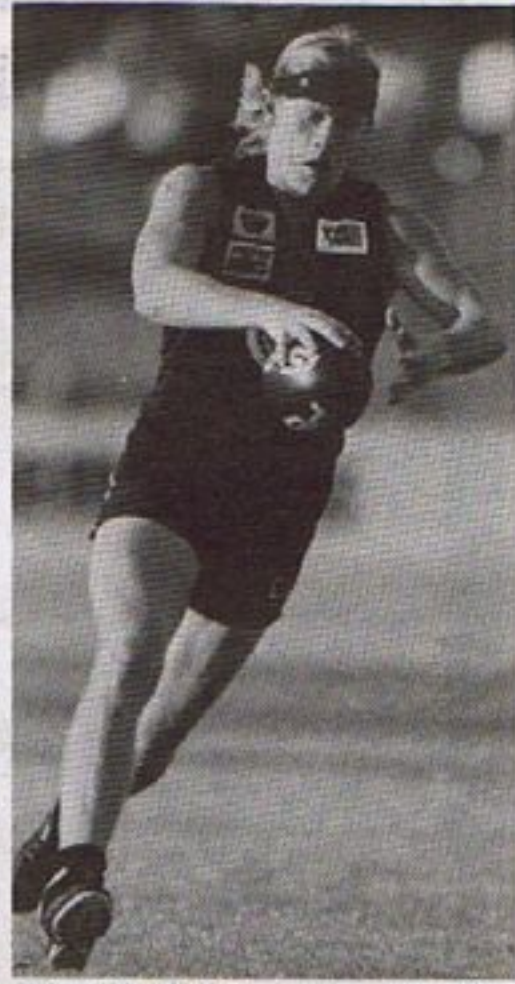
to see why the Tigers are delighted to have Darren Klemm back.

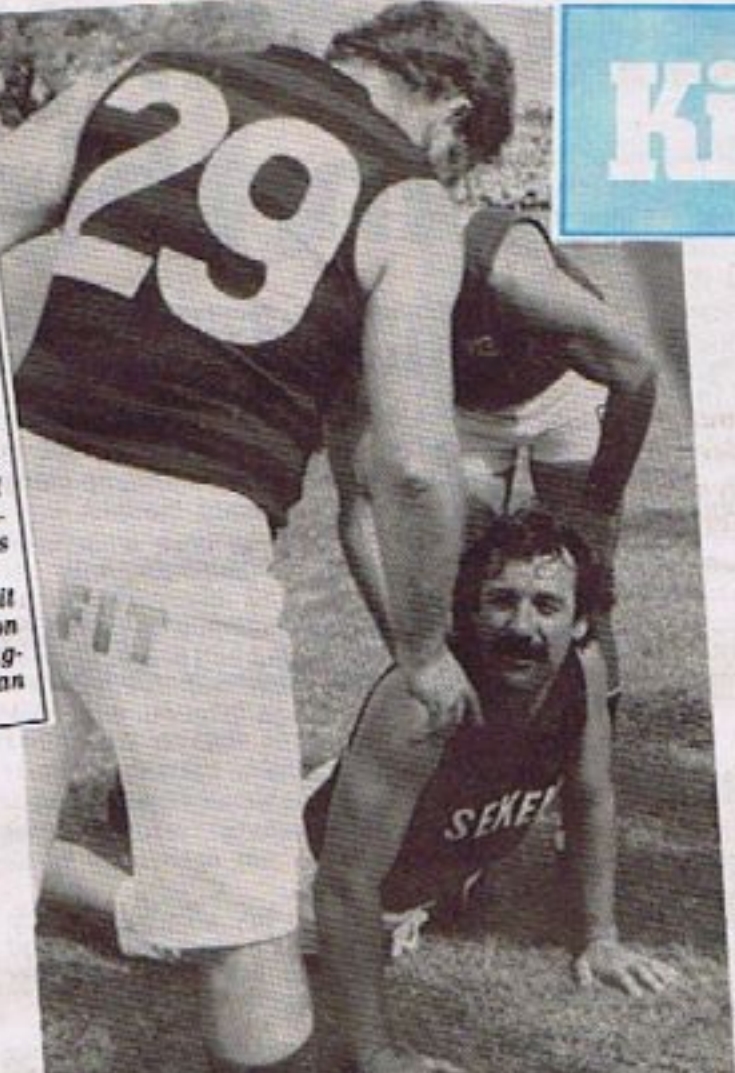

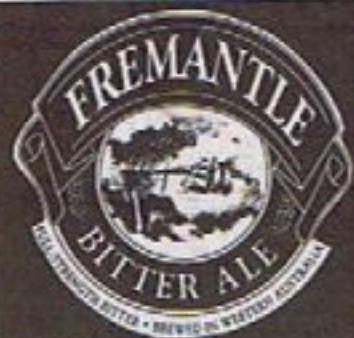

If they can regain that touch and confidence, starting this Saturday, they can go all the way.

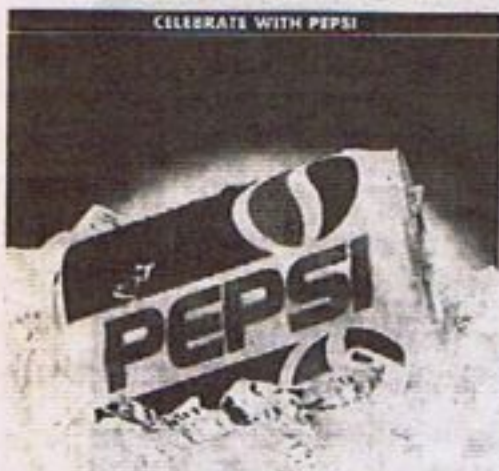

THE ATTACKERS

BRAD Hardie has commanded close attention since he returned to Fremantle Oval at the start of the season and this Saturday will be no different.

Burton has had support in recent weeks from youngster Andrew Donnelly, who has done well despite being only 184cm tall.

Drafted by Sydney last November, Donnelly is one of the most spectacular marks in the league.

THE ATTACKERS

THE most productive forward line in the league is handy to have on the end of any kick and Subiaco have kicked 27 more goals than their nearest rivals.

The Lions have averaged 18 goals a match with their Victorian trump card — and the league's leading goalscorer — Jason Heatley, the focal point.

Heatley has kicked 90.36 in 18 games; an impressive debut season that makes him a prime AFL draft target.

Centre-half-forward Rod Willet has had an outstanding season and will hold down the crucial attacking position despite injuring a knee late in last Sunday's match against West Perth.

Willet has 30 goals this season, just seven behind another dangerman Andrew Macnish, who has been dangerous across half-forward and on the ball and his finals experience will be valuable.

THE DEFENDERS

WHILE the Lions attack has dominated, the side's defence has the worst record in the five and they will be wary of that fact.

While they have had many consistent performers, Solin has tried several new faces as he has searched for the right formula.

Bill Monaghan has had a good season at full-back and will be matched against a Souths key attacker, either Brett Spinks or Nick Caputi.

Developing defender Gavin Keyser

kept Brad Hardie to three goals last time the sides met and he may be given the task again.

Sandover Medallist Ian Dargie was welcomed back to the half-back line last weekend and gave the side a burst of energy out of defence.

Troubled by hamstrings for much of the season, he will be better for the run and should exert more influence against South Fremantle.

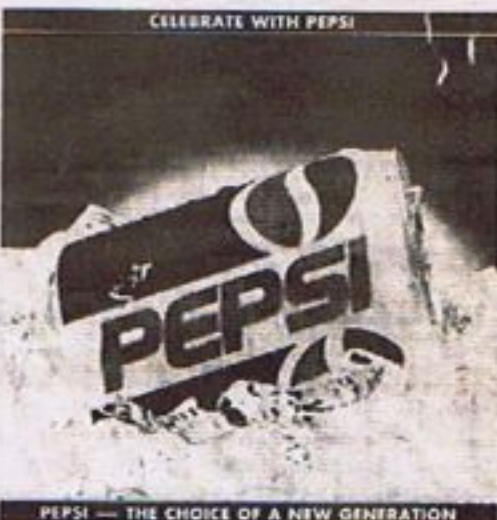
TRAVELLING to Melbourne is hardly the ideal preparation for a game, so Matt Connell's poor performance against West Perth can be excused.

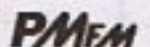
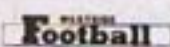

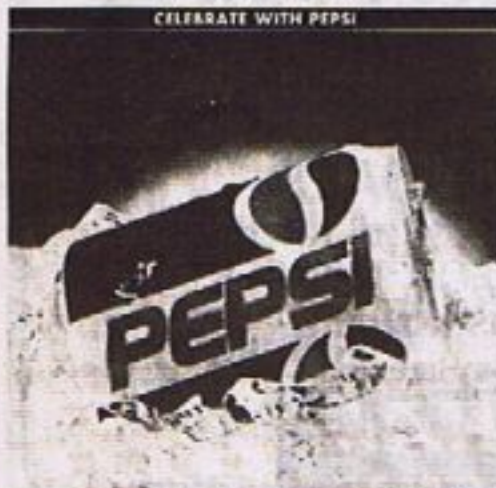

Canning topple the favourites

CANNING charged into the Sunday League second semi-final with a powerhouse win over early-season favourites Armadale on Sunday.

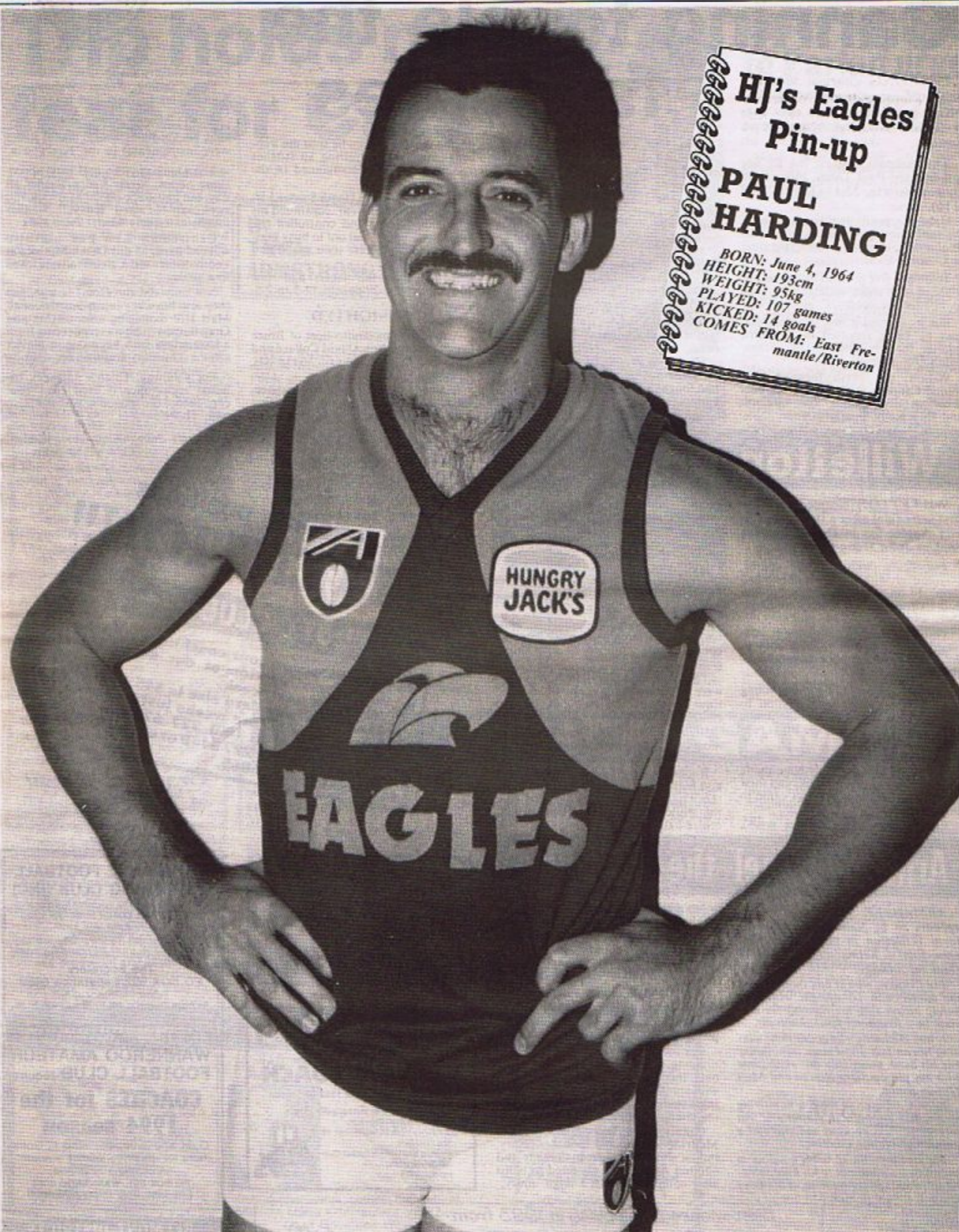

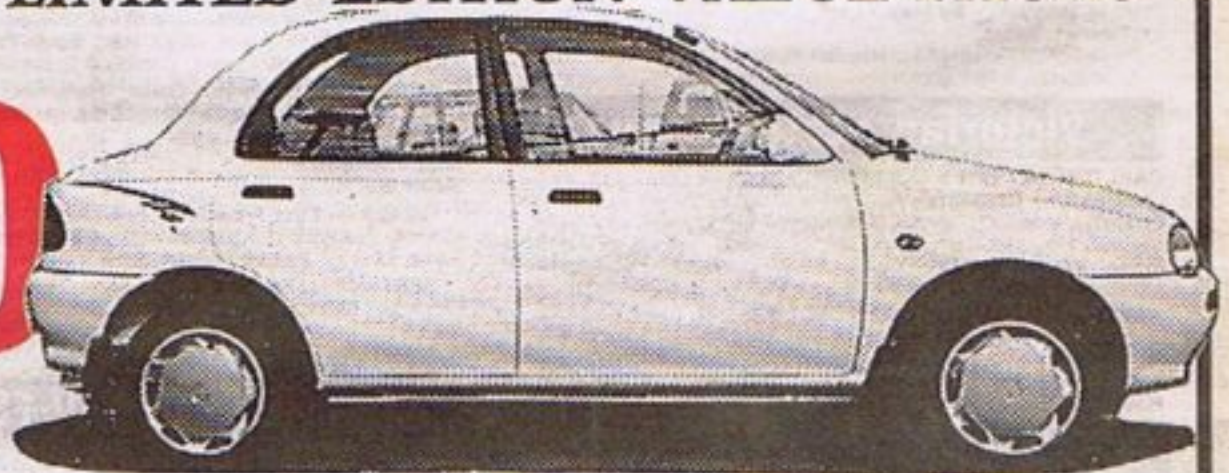

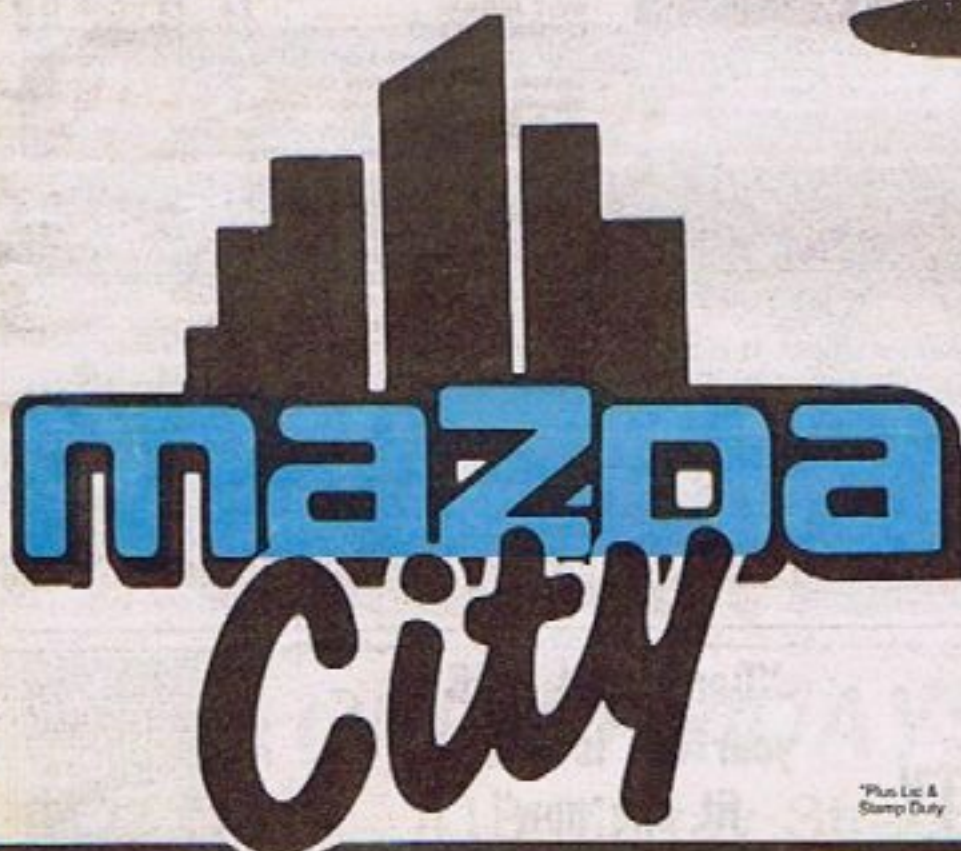
