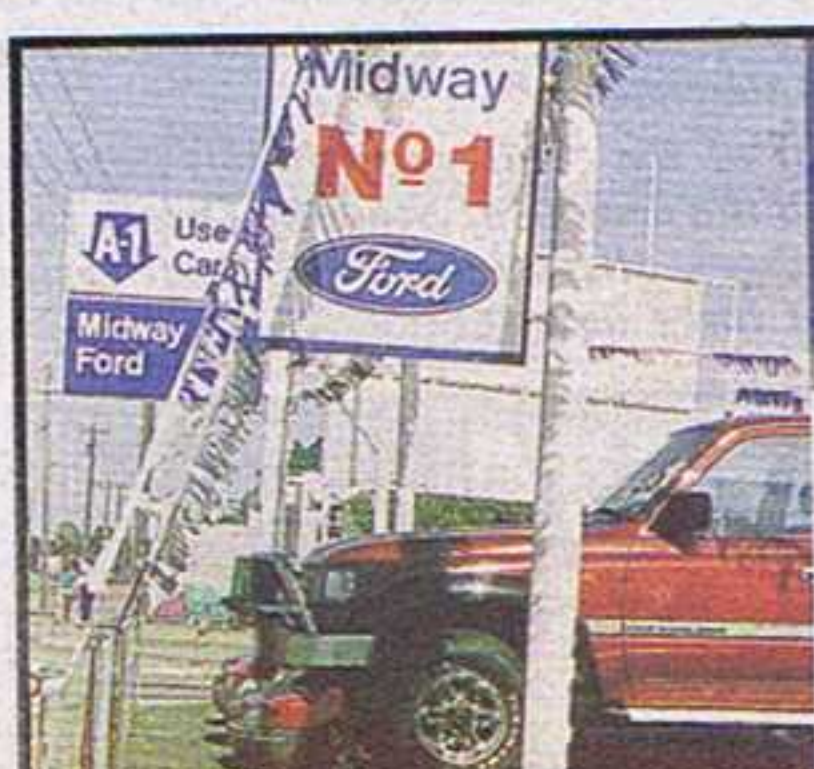

He told interviewer Ashley Dillon that he had some tremendous memories of the 1960s at Swans, with the club's first premiership — in 1961 under Haydn Bunton — a memory that hasn't dimmed.

"The '62 and '63 flags were pretty good too," he said. "But that first premiership was something special."

A relayed question from former race caller Trevor Jenkins up in the commentary boxed put Castledine on the spot — "what was better, being part of Swans first premiership or winning the 1979 Perth Cup with his horse Meliador?"

Curtis in town

FORMER East Perth and WA champion Steve Curtis was back in town last weekend to help his father celebrate a 60th birthday.

That was a good excuse for Curtis, a 215-gamer with the Royals, to get along to Perth Oval on Sunday and see his Royals surge to victory over Perth.

Curtis, who added 130 games with traditional South Australian club Port Adelaide to his career, says the push by the Adelaide Magpies to gain admission to the AFL is really picking up in SA.

"They are the state's most traditional and successful club," says Curtis. "They have produced many AFL players and this year alone there are eight or nine AFL graduates from Port."

"It's a funny situation in Adelaide, because you either love or hate Port. But it would be great for South Australian footy if they get into the AFL."

Selection sensitivity

THE sensitive question of State-of-Origin football versus club loyalty diverted the Channel Seven commentators for some time during the last quarter of the Eagles trouncing of North Melbourne.

Special comments man Gerard Healy, who is a Victorian selector, wasn't going to let the topic go away easily after it had been raised in commentary.

He was adamant that Essendon's Mark Thompson was out of order by saying that he didn't want to play for Victoria, opting to concentrate on his Bombers responsibilities.

"He was lucky to get his State game anyway," suggested Healy, who added that he believed 99.9 percent of footballers aspired to play for their state.

Good luck, mate

CLAREMONT coach Gerard Neesham actually wished an opponent all the best before Saturday's clash with South Fremantle.

In true 'old boys' style, Neesham said that he hoped young Bulldog Nick Caputi, a product of his former school CBC Fremantle, did well against the Tigers, lining up on skipper Mark Brayshaw.

"I hope he gives him a bit of stick, not too much though," said Neesham.

Magpie message

TERRY Wheeler's sacking earned more publicity in Melbourne than any other football topic and even Collingwood became involved — with a banner message at the MCG.

The Magpies message read:

"Free to good home — one pedigree Bulldog answers to Terry. Ring Western Oval."

Angry Lions

CONTROVERSIAL Fitzroy coach Robert Shaw denies that he uses an "us against them" mentality when addressing his players.

Shaw was so furious that the Melbourne print media failed to recognise Paul Roos' 250th game that he issued all reporters a press statement after refusing them access to speak to Roos.

"I've never used an us-against-them mentality — players see through that, this is the 1990s," Shaw said.

Blight's legend

GEELONG coach Malcolm Blight will never be allowed to forget his 1976 after-the-siren torpedo punt which stole victory from the jaws of defeat against Carlton at Princes Park.

Long-suffering Blues fans were reminded of the kick during Channel Seven's "The No Football Sunday" special of past home-and-away games.

Blight was quizzed by Sandy Roberts about the kick, which has been estimated at 75-metres.

"I think it has grown to about 90 metres by now," Blight joked.

Cornes query

ADELAIDE coach Graham Cornes has questioned the direction of AFL change.

The Crows mentor, their only coach since entering the national league in 1991, said record attendances and the evenness of the AFL were misleading.

"That just masks the real problems we have in Australian Rules football," Cornes said.

"The most obvious of those is that the very fibre of the game is being destroyed and torn down without being replaced by a better alternative."

Cornes was critical of the "influence of self-interested club administrators on the decline of State-of-Origin football", annual rule changes, alterations to the draft system and the imposition of three umpires.



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WHAT is the WAFL all about?

Is it about only winning premierships for your club, or is also about developing players for the next level?

Swan Districts coach John Todd made a statement at Bassendean Oval on Saturday night at the club's celebration party about how proud he was that his side was completely full of West Australians — and rightly so.

One wonders if we are going off half-cocked in WA with respect to out-of-state recruiting.

Are we stalling the development of potentially outstanding talent for a physically, more-mature handy player to give a club instant performance.

It seems that we are doing what Carlton did for so long in Victoria — neglect their own backyard and try and buy success, rather than produce their own product.

Kevin Sheedy saw the light at Essendon and we all saw the result when the 'Baby Bombers' gave Carlton the Blues in last year's grand final.

How come the WAFL was for so long the best breeding ground in Australia, reaped repeatedly by the old VFL clubs, but now suddenly WA's grass is greener on the other side of the country?

Home-grown talent neglected

The attitude of many WAFL clubs is getting to what Sunday League was about and that is 'live for today' because you can recruit fresh players next season.

Some people and clubs will reckon I'm having a shot at them — but if the cap fits, wear it.

One thing is for certain — the John Todd's of this world get the best kicks out of the game because when they get a result — either with a team or a player — it's because of the club's hard work.

Fremantle celebration must be revived

FOOTBALL has dealt itself a major promotional blow with a too-hard-basket attitude towards the celebration of 100 years of football in Fremantle.

Amidst considerable buck-passing about who is responsible, plans for some big celebrations on Saturday, June 11 — to wind-up a focus on Fremantle week — have been shelved basically because it was all too hard.

If ever the WA Football League needs to grab every promotional gimmick it can find, it's right now — with a Fremantle AFL team coming next year to make life even tougher for the domestic competition.

But no.

The eight WAFL clubs haven't been able to agree on a promotional game at Fremantle Oval — and their reasons are many, varied ... and basically pathetic.

THE REASONS

West Perth, who have enjoyed considerable benefits as the result of a couple of recent emotional promotions, want to hold a social match on the Sunday; East Perth, who have an illustrious history often buried in garden sheds; are sending their players on country PR exercises; Perth are unavailable because coach David Glascott is getting married; East Fremantle were opposed because it would involve too many of their players ...

South Fremantle, naturally, were strongly in favour as the extravaganza day would be held at Fremantle Oval.

Subiaco agreed to go along with the idea and Claremont were obviously in favour because it would have given coach Gerard Neesham another chance to plug his AFL aspirations at Fremantle level.

Swan Districts, who staged an impressive 60th anniversary last week, apparently abstained from voting, although one source says they were in favour, even though coach John Todd — a man with strong Fremantle connections — wasn't asked.

If that's the case, then at least four clubs were supportive, yet it was voted out. How?

INDECISION

That collective indecision by the WAFL general managers is indicative of why the domestic competition has often been its own worst enemy and this is a classic case where the Football Commission should step in and exercise its independent power.

The Commission cannot just accept the indecision of the clubs and handball the idea into the too-hard-basket.

To let an anniversary as important and significant as 100 years of Fremantle football — once the home of the Australian game in WA — pass by without something special is disgraceful.

The clubs concerned had plenty of notice about the proposed June 11 celebrations — after all, the vacant weekend of WAFL action was published in the original fixtures in December.

It's a weekend that has the Eagles playing at home on the Sunday to Brisbane, which isn't exactly a blockbuster from a crowd point of view.

A match that puts the best of the two Port teams — with or without Swan Districts and Claremont, who are also going to be zoned to the Fremantle AFL side next year — against the rest of the WAFL would have good appeal to the public.

OTHER PLANS

Some of the other promotions proposed for the Saturday event included a legends game between old Fremantle players and former WAFL rivals; a tribute to 25 years of Little League action and a junior development theme — all great ideas as the lead-up to a Fremantle versus the rest WAFL exhibition match.

The legends game staged at Leederville Oval last year before their gala farewell clash with Subiaco was a huge entertainment winner. There's no doubt many of the 20,000 fans went to that game to see some of their bygone heroes, as well as farewell the good old ground.

The clubs opposed to the June 11 promotion obviously believed they had good reason for their decision to toss it out.

But they are the losers, because football itself will miss out on a tremendous promotional vehicle.

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Be careful, Commission

"If it ain't broken, don't fix it!"

A proposal by the West Australian Football Commission to follow the AFL and establish district under-18s in lieu of colts (under-19s) needs plenty of research before being adopted.

A discussion paper is being circulated to the WAFL clubs and the final recommendations will be critical to the development strategy adopted for elite players.

In layman's terms, that is the players who aspire to play at AFL level.

In Victoria, the under-19s have been abandoned in favor of district under-18s, run under the auspices of the Victorian State Football League.

ELITE

Major provincial centres such as Ballarat and Bendigo have teams in the competition and games are played throughout the state.

West Coast draftee Fraser Gehrig last year won the best-and-fairest for the Murray Bushrangers, a team from north-eastern Victoria who play home games at Wangaratta or Wodonga.

However, teams occasionally get to play on major grounds such as Waverley, Princes Park and Kardinia Park as curtain-raisers to AFL senior games.

Gehrig, who has struggled at times with Perth in the WAFL, has taken an enormous step to play senior football this season.

Not many players can step directly from WAFL colts to league level under the present system, but Gehrig is making an even bigger move.

Initially, there were some concerns about the travelling involved for players and the standard of coaching the VSFL under-18s would receive.

RESERVATIONS

Legendary St Kilda, Hawthorn and Richmond coach Allan Jeans was not in favour of the move and his successor at Glenferrie Oval, Alan Joyce, also had reservations.

However, recently retired AFL players like former Melbourne and Essendon rover Tony Elshaugh and Hawthorn and

Proposal to abolish colts needs rethink

St Kilda utility Peter Russo, acting as coaches, have surprised their critics.

It should be remembered that 13 of last year's top 20 choices in the November national draft came from this competition.

However, the drop-out rate is such that a late-maturing player may be lost to amateurs or country football as early as 20.

While the district concept appear to be assisting development of elite players in Victoria, it does not automatically follow that it is required in this state.

Most WAFL clubs already have a strong influence over the under-17 teams in their area and form combined sides from these elite squads as preparation for them joining colts.

Obviously one of the great advantages of this system is that the young players develop some feeling for their parent club.

This creates loyalty — a commodity missing at higher levels these days.

One of the reasons offered for disbanding the colts is that the clubs can save money.

However, if it is such a heavy burden for the WAFL clubs to finance three teams, why not get rid of the reserves, forcing players to take a step from colts to league level, as has been done by South Fremantle's Peter Bell this season.

The age limit could remain at under 19, but up to five over-age players could be permitted to play in any one fixture if

they are coming back from injury or need to regain form.

Under these circumstances, WA could be used as a pilot scheme for the remainder of the country as there is now animated discussion in Victoria about abandoning the reserves competition.

Another reason given to support the new district concept is that clubs such as East Perth and Perth do not have viable junior council competitions, let alone sufficient under-17s players.

Clubs like East Fremantle (126 junior teams in their metropolitan zone), Claremont and Subiaco are providing excellent development opportunities for youth and should not be stifled just to allow other clubs to catch up.

Sumich injury repeats history

A **HAMSTRING** injury to West Coast full-forward Peter Sumich only six games into the season is a big concern.

Sumich has a long history of similar injuries and hamstring strains often stay around longer than expected.

The early diagnosis is that Suma will miss one month of action.

Last season, after pulling the same hamstring at Kardinia Park in round seven — just a week earlier than this year's re-occurrence — he missed the following match against Fitzroy, but returned too early against Melbourne the next week and did more damage.

The Eagles will be Suma-less against Carlton, Footscray and Sydney, but getting him 100 percent right could take a little longer.

Another worry for the Eagles is that Sumich, at 26, is not getting any younger.

He is far from being old in football terms and no doubt has a lot more goals ahead of him.

But has the Eagles hierarchy found an adequate replacement yet?

Last November, Subiaco recruit Jason Heatley was drafted by the Eagles after kicking 111 goals in the WAFL.

LONG TERM

At 22 years, he is considered a long term option, not just for the full-forward position, but alongside Sumich in a forward pocket.

After kicking five of the Lions 10 goals against West Perth to be a shining light in a dismal Subiaco team performance last week, Heatley will come under con-

sideration for an Eagles match this weekend.

But it is hard to imagine him matching it with Carlton superstar Stephen Silvagni so early in his career.

Jason Ball has also staked his claim for a call-up after good performances in front of goals in all of Swan Districts matches this season.

Still, the selectors are likely to give Ashley McIntosh the full-forward berth, making the Eagles forward line one of the youngest in the league with McIntosh (21), Brett Heady (24), Brett Spinks (20) and Shane Bond (18) all playing key roles.

McIntosh is a versatile player all coaches would love to have.

But there will come a day when he is required elsewhere.

He has already shown his class at full-back and what happens when Michael Brennan, now 29, decides to call it a day?

McIntosh looms as a more-than-adequate replacement at full-back, but many feel that he would be wasted there full-time — no offence intended, Monkey.

OPTIONS

There aren't a lot of other options around for full-back, though Mitchell White is a possibility when, or if, he can recover from his long-term groin ailment.

These are the sort of questions the media, Eagles followers and no doubt the West Coast hierarchy, put to each other when looking more than two years down the track.

By 1996, Brennan will be 31, Sumich 28 and a host of others like Guy McKenna, John Worsfold, Chris Lewis and Guy McKenna nearing the 28 mark.

It's still a way off yet, but bears thinking about as each draft approaches.

Fans vote against Waverley as showpiece

WAVERLEY Park is fast becoming a poor relation among Melbourne football fans, judging on Saturday's sub-50,000 crowd for the so-called Collingwood-Melbourne blockbuster.

Once regarded as the AFL's showpiece stadium, Waverley is now running a distant second behind the world-class Melbourne Cricket Ground.

The ground has been consistently criticised in recent years, especially since the League decided to push the MCG as its No.1 stadium ahead of Waverley, which is situated in Melbourne's south-east, 30 minutes drive from the city centre.

Several weeks ago Carlton president John Elliott suggested Waverley should be bulldozed, with the proceeds being equally split among the League clubs.

On Saturday, noted commentator Rex Hunt criticised the scheduling of the Melbourne-Collingwood game at Waverley, rather than at Melbourne, saying the lack of public transport would turn thousands away.

CRITICISM

Hunt believed the North Melbourne-Eagles game at the MCG on Saturday could have been played on a Friday night, allowing for a late re-scheduling of the Melbourne-Collingwood game.

Later this month, Waverley's standing with the Melbourne public will be well and truly tested for the grand final replay between Essendon and Carlton, two of Melbourne's best-supported clubs.

Mr Elliott had originally wanted the venue changed, but has agreed to the original fixtures, after a "sweetheart" deal was struck which allows all of his club's coterie supporters the same facilities they would enjoy at the MCG, or indeed, at Carlton's own Princes Park.

It is believed the AFL has also guaranteed both clubs that they will clash at the MCG next season.

Unless a near capacity crowd of

around 70,000 is attracted to the replay, some say Waverley could be in danger of losing big matches altogether at home-and-away level — as well as continuing to have the most prestigious finals scheduled elsewhere.

CRITICISM that State-of-Origin football has become dated and out-of-place in the 1990s is gaining momentum.

With only one State game scheduled this year — between Victoria and South Australia this week — many are suggesting that the games no longer have a place, given the 15-team national competition.

Others are unhappy that many of football's elite, such as Hawthorn's Queensland-born Jason Dunstall and North

Melbourne's NSW-born Wayne Carey, are ineligible when these games are played.

Dunstall suggested on Channel Nine's highly popular Footy Show last Thursday that consideration for an East versus West game should be given.

The team representing the East would consist of the best players born in Victoria, Tasmania, Queensland and NSW while the West team would come from those born in WA, SA and the Northern Territory.

★★★★★

THE lead-up to Tuesday's State game was marred by injuries to key players on both sides.

Victoria was particularly hard hit with champions including Tony Lockett, Greg Williams and Robert Harvey all dropping out.

Lockett, who has been bothered by calf problems, has played only one full game so far this season, but did return to football at reserves level on Saturday and is expected to play this weekend.

Williams says he'll probably never have the opportunity of playing State football again if it continues to be scheduled mid-week, as his battle-scarred knees do not allow him to play two games in four days.

"I just can't come up anymore," the Carlton veteran said.

Harvey, a regular State player in recent years, has had groin and hamstring problems, but is also hoping to return either this week or next.

"I've had a bad run but it's starting to feel better now," Harvey said.

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Defensive measures pull Silvagni out of shadow

IT TOOK Carlton defender Stephen Silvagni half a football life to emerge from the shadow of his famous father.

When the Marcellin College recruit debuted for the navy Blues in 1985 he was instantly dubbed "SOS" or "Son of Sergio".

Silvagni senior played 238 VFL games with the Blues between 1958 and '71 as a dogged ruck-rover not blessed with pace, but possessing an abundance of that intangible quality — endeavour.

By the time Silvagni junior had discarded his critics and proved he was a quality player in his own right, his father was also carrying a new nickname of "FOS" or "Father of Stephen".

The irony was not misplaced on opposition full-forwards, who rate Silvagni junior highly for his elasticity in the shoulder-to-shoulder positioning.

But his greatest quality is his versatility as the 1987 premiership player can be used in attack or defence.

VERSATILITY

The arrival of James Cook and Troy Bond, the brother of West Coast's Shane, in the Carlton forward line has taken the burden off Stephen Kernahan and allowed Blues coach David Parkin to use Silvagni at full-back.

It has been in the last line of defence so far this season that Silvagni's brilliance has returned.

He held Geelong's Gary Ablett to just three goals in round three and Sydney's Simon Minton-Connell goal-less last Saturday.

Minton-Connell, a player feted for his strong marking, managed just six possessions and two marks.

The modest Silvagni credited his return to form to the Carlton midfielders restricting the supply of the ball to his opponents.

"A lot really does depend on the on-ballers up the ground," he said.

"If they can stop the ball coming down quickly, it makes your job so much easier and in other cases, like against Adelaide in the opening round, you are doing well to restrict your opponent to four goals."

Silvagni did keep Tony Modra to four goals.

Unfortunately, he had them by half-time and the Blues shifted their adaptable defender into attack before the Crows spearhead cut loose with 13 majors for the game.

Silvagni normally gets the job on Peter Sumich, but with the Eagle absent from Sunday's Subiaco Oval showdown with a torn hamstring, his opponent at full-forward is likely to be the athletic Ashley McIntosh.

ADAPTABLE

"Suma is a great player who has probably not been given the credit he deserves," Silvagni said.

"The critics tend to get on his back a fair bit.

"He is a key to the Eagles, like when he kicked six against Hawthorn, which was a great effort because they only kicked eight, so there is no question they will miss him.

"I have played on Ashley before too, but only once and that was when I was in the forward line.

"He's quick and strong, very much a complete player."

Silvagni, centre-half-back Peter Dean and spare-parts defenders Michael Sexton and Andrew McKay have formed the nucleus of a backline that has been pivotal in Carlton's three successive wins after opening the season with two losses.

They will need to maintain the momentum when they confront McIntosh, Brett Heady and Brett Spinks on Sunday.

The Blues are confident travellers — they beat the Eagles by one-point in round 14 last season before progressing to the grand final — and will be no different this time, particularly with Barry Mitchell's return to form complementing state rover Matthew Hogg and inform ruckman Justin Madden, centreman Greg Williams and wingers Fraser Brown and Milham Hanna.

BOILOVER

But West Coast's midfield division was back to its rampaging best against the Kangaroos in last Saturday's MCG boilover and Chris Mainwaring, Dean Kemp, Peter Matera, Drew Banfield, Dwayne Lamb and Ryan Turnbull will have a say in just how busy Silvagni is in defending.

Carlton captain Stephen Kernahan has been down on form after returning from injury, but that has become a positive for the Blues.

How often has Kernahan been held goal-less in a 20-goal scoreline?

Never before, but it happened last Saturday against the Swans, due to the contributions from Cook (six goals) and Bond (five).

It is food for thought for Eagles centre-half-back Glen Jakovich.

Improving Hawks set to down the Bombers

The Bears pushed Adelaide last Sunday, but are woeful away from the Gabba and need big name players Alastair Lynch, Craig Starcevic, Craig Lambert, Troy Lehmann and Andrew Bews to exert an influence.

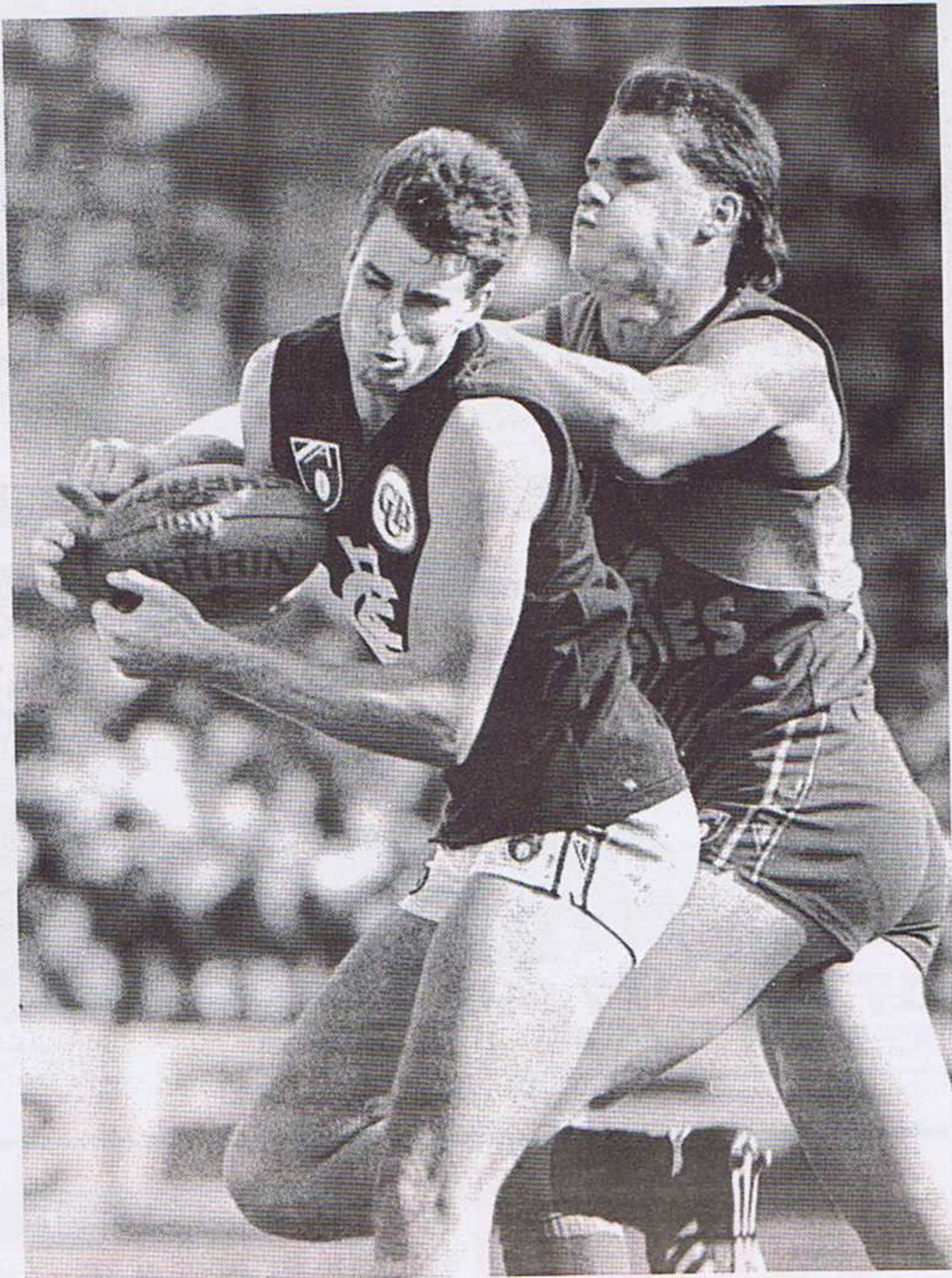

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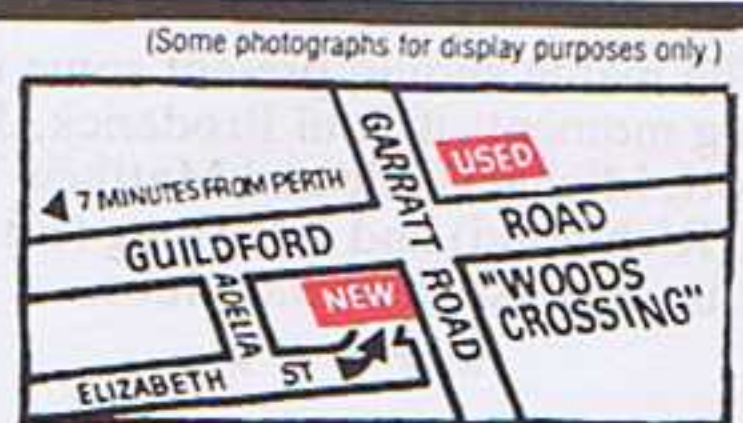


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Lamb's new spring in his step

VETERAN midfielder Dwayne Lamb is hauling in a milestone that not so long ago appeared to have slipped out of reach.

The man who has played more West Coast games than any other Eagle is closing in on the 150 game mark.

"It would be nice to get, but it's not something I'm striving for," Lamb said, just three games off the mark.

"Perhaps 200 might be something I can set myself for."

Lamb, at 31, admits the latter goal is a pipedream, but the fact he is approaching 150 has confounded critics who once suggested he lacked pace and was too one-sided to survive at the elite level.

Eagles coach Mick Malthouse swung Lamb back in for a tagging role on Kangaroos rover Anthony Rock and the solid No. 5 guernsey wearer responded with 23 possessions, including 18 handpasses.

"He has had to work hard to get in front of blokes who are in very good form," Malthouse said.

"One of the great attributes of Dwayne Lamb is durability and he has demonstrated that at the WAFL level.

"He's been tagged virtually every week

which means that his possessions are well worked for."

Lamb makes no secret of his strengths — his ability to nullify opposition players and perform in heavy conditions in Melbourne in the depths of winter.

Lamb described the difficulties in taking the next step to AFL level after playing in the lower WAFL grade.

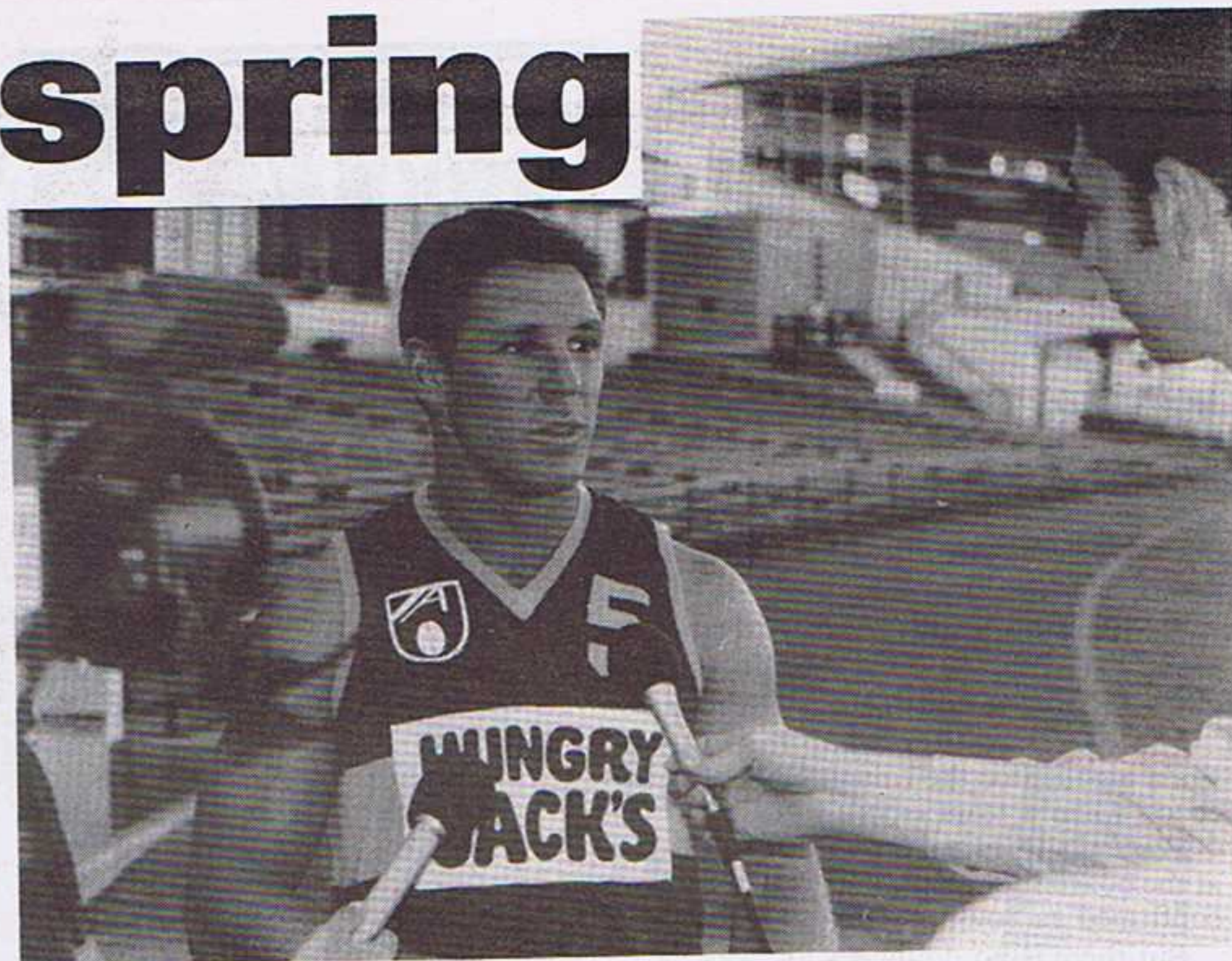
"It is difficult both ways," he said.

In fact, it took only minutes as Lamb gathered eight possessions in the opening quarter against the Kangaroos.

A repeat performance against his likely opponent, Greg Williams, on Sunday and Lamb will be only two games short of a plateau reached by few players, particularly in the modern age when the demands are far greater than ever before.

"You'll have to ask Mick... Banners (Drew Banfield) has been playing that role, so I don't know," was Lamb's coy

reply to the Williams query.

"He (Williams) is very hard at the ball, he's got great skills and close-in he's very quick so you have to be right on his toes."

Neither Lamb nor Williams are blessed with pace, but just who is quicker?

"He's very good over the first couple... but, we are probably very similar," Lamb said.

Carlton look to repeat 'final'

CARLTON'S fighting victory in last year's "mini-final" at Subiaco Oval laid the foundations for their stirring season finish, according to Blues assistant coach Colin Kinnear.

There were question marks hovering over Carlton when they arrived in Perth for their round 14 clash.

A one-point come-from-behind win, grafted without captain Stephen Kernahan, was the starting point for 12 wins from the next 14 matches including a berth in the grand final.

"By the time we got to Perth we were very much at the crossroads," Kinnear said.

"It really turned things around for us in terms of our belief in ourselves and our belief in our ability to win without Steve Kernahan."

The Blues captain left the field at quarter-time with a knee injury that kept him out of action for the next month.

"We were able to win without him and it really laid the foundations for later in the year," Kinnear said.

Kernahan, one of Carlton's icons alongside Alex Jesaulenko and Robert Walls, arrives in Perth tomorrow in the middle of a rare form slump.

It is rare that the Blues kick 20 goals and Kernahan does not register a major, but that was exactly the case in last Saturday's win over Sydney at Princes Park.

"He's a champion and the reason he is noticed so much when he is quieter is because of the huge standards he has set," Kinnear said.

CHAMPION

"But he has been providing us with great leadership and in doing all the little things that go unnoticed.

"He'll make some side pay very soon, I'm sure of that."

Kernahan is likely to be matched with West Coast's Glen Jakovich or Michael Brennan if the Blues captain plays at full-forward.

The inclusion of Troy Bond, the older brother of Eagle Shane and James Cook in the Carlton forward line has taken much of the pressure off Kernahan.

Bond, who won Port Adelaide's best-and-fairest award last season, kicked five goals as a rover-forward against the Swans, while full-forward Cook contributed six.

"Troy has given us genuine pace, which we needed, and he can play as a rover and kick goals and James is a kid who has been here since he was 16 and had a good initiation in the reserves," Kinnear said.

Arguably Carlton's most pivotal player will be Greg Williams, the centreman who turned last year's round 14 thriller.

Williams cut up West Coast tagger Dwayne Lamb and may wear a new

opponent in Drew Banfield or Dean Kemp.

Kinnear said the Blues were wary of underestimating West Coast's scoring power, despite the absence of full-forward Peter Sumich with a torn hamstring.

"They have players like (Ashley) McIntosh or (David) Hynes or (Brett)

Spinks who can kick goals and their midfielders also chip in, the likes of Dean Kemp, (Don) Pyke and (Peter) Matera," Kinnear said.

"You know when you play West Coast it is going to be a real contest and their players are going to make an effort in every issue."

WANTED: One masochist with a back capable of withstanding attacks from sharp metal instruments. Must have psychology degree, public speaking skills and willing to work long hours, with no overtime.

Perhaps that's the type of advertisement which should be run by football clubs seeking a coach.

The Mark Watson affair this week again highlighted the vulnerability of the coach when a team is struggling.

Fortunately, common sense prevailed at the board room table and Watson was confirmed as South Fremantle's coach.

But there is no doubt his job was the subject of lively discussion, with some suggestions that he should go.

Traditionally, when football clubs fail to live up to expectations, the coach is the chopping block.

And Australian football history is punctuated with men who have had their contracts cut short.

MODEST

Fortunately, Watson is not one of them; he is one of the genuine good guys of Australian football.

But being a great bloke is no prerequisite for coaching success. Indeed, it could work in reverse.

He is a modest and humble man as anyone at the presentation of WA football's highest individual award in 1987 would attest.

After winning the Sandover Medal because Claremont genius Derek Kickett was ineligible, Watson made the humblest of winning speeches.

Rather than wallow in his own success, Watson paid tribute to a man who had dominated the WAFL competition, but was left out of the running after a late season indiscretion.

He is a quiet man who achieved a good deal during his own career. While he's not in the mould of a man who perspires profusely, steams from the ears or is a candidate for high blood pressure problems when he addresses his troops, he does deserve a chance.

The Demons have now won their last five matches — their best sequence of wins since five in a row from rounds 4 to 8 of 1991.

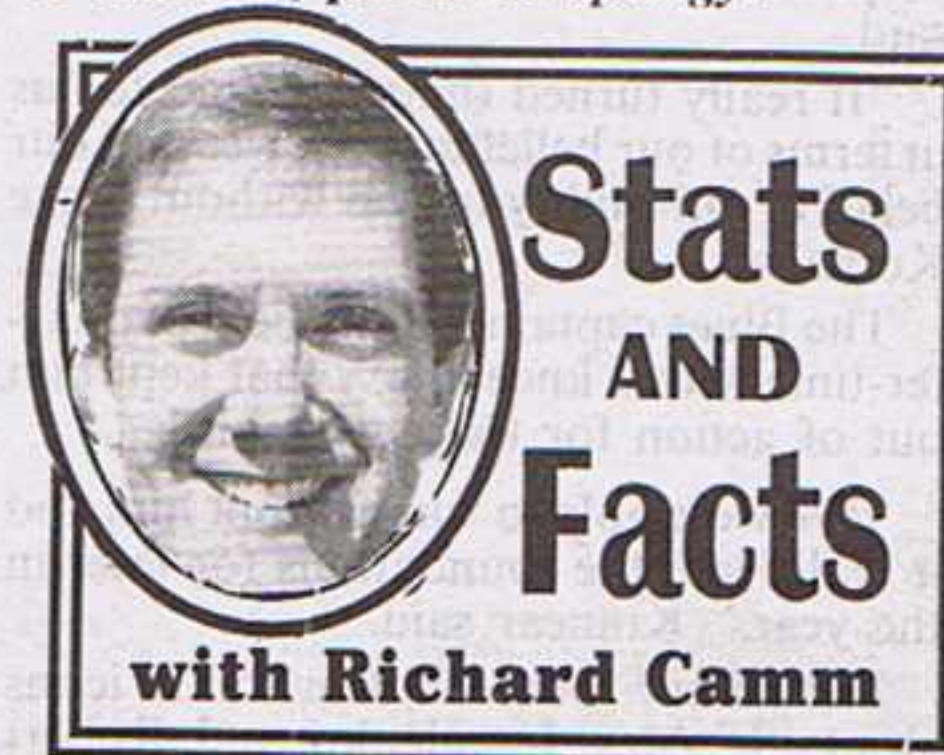
For the third time in the past seven

Swans birthday a real celebration

THE significance of Swan Districts 60th anniversary, combined with the closing of the Midland railway workshops, provided the venue for surely football's most unique sit-down function last Sunday.

It was the brainchild of Swans stalwart Stan Moses to combine a function that said goodbye to the workshops — the employment home for many Swans footballers — and celebrate 60 years of WAFL activity for the Bassendean boys.

In the earlier years, Swans particularly reaped a rich harvest of footballers from the workshops and with some help from senior railways staff, the sprawling Midland industrial venue could generally find employment for newcomers to the city.

To mix the two functions was an ambitious project that saw Moses use all of his considerable organisational experience to pull various groups together — the full-time office staff and the huge army of volunteers.

It was yet another excellent example of what WAFL clubs can do when they

promote something with historical value — any function that stirs the memories of bygone glories is going to be a winner because football people must always remember where they have come from.

Even if the AFL dominates our media and our social conversations, the WAFL is still a proud foundation base.

With the railways providing a host of footballers over the years, it was appropriate that Swans pay tribute by naming a Midland Workshops All Stars side.

The workshops also provided a Swans coach in Leo McComish and two umpires — Ray Montgomery and Mike Ball.

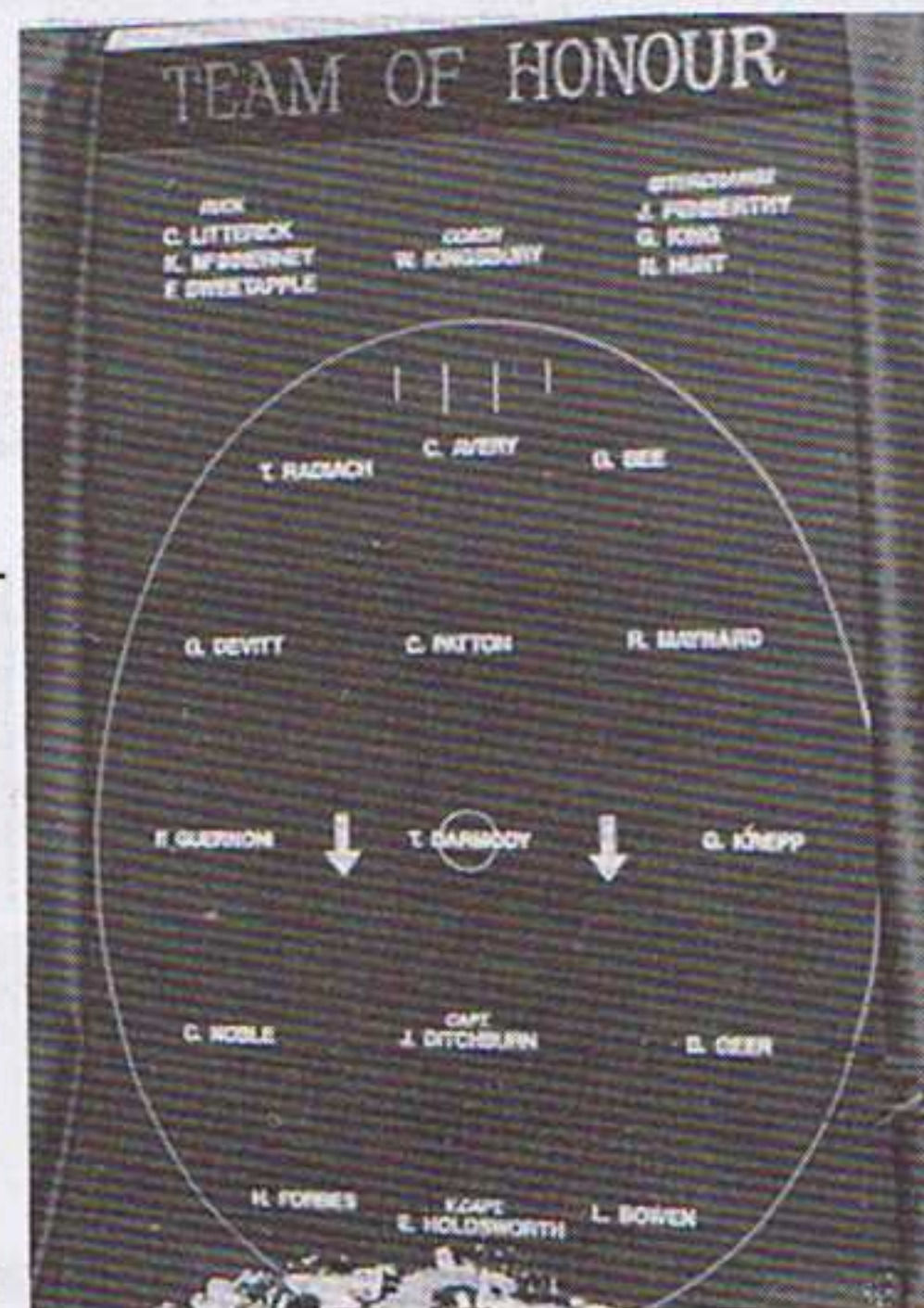

WEST Coast coach Mick Malthouse has leapt to the defence of out-of-favour utility Craig Turley.

The Eagles mentor believes Turley is not far away from regaining form, despite being dropped for last Saturday's win over North Melbourne at the MCG.

"He's very dedicated and has a terrific want to be a part of it," Malthouse said.

Ironically, it is little more than 12 months since Turley stunned the Eagles by announcing his premature retirement.

He was dropped after round two of the AFL season, played three games at WAFL level, claimed he had lost his passion for the sport and embarked on a surfing safari in the north of the state.

Malthouse said six months out of the game at the highest level had cost Turley and he was now playing catch-up.

"I don't think anyone can afford to be out of the game too long because things just change so dramatically," Malthouse said.

"He's undergoing a course just to get back to the main frame of what AFL football is all about."

Turley resumed with West Perth in last Sunday's crushing 87-point win over Subiaco.

He was restricted to five possessions by David Snow in the first half, but broke the shackles to become a key playmaker after the long break.

Turley was once the Eagles No. 1 pin-up boy, winning the club championship and gaining All-Australian honours in 1991 and playing in the historic West Coast premiership side the next season.

But, according to Malthouse, Turley paid the ultimate price for success.

"If you look at '91 when he had his great year, he carried that burden the following year of a side that played off in a grand final," Malthouse said.

"So for the next year everything changed around and instead of him being a player who could run freely, he was getting tagged and had to change his game.

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The agony of injury . . .

FORWARD line opportunist Brett Heady is rated as one of the leading players in the West Coast camp — and even though he's enjoying an injury-free start to the season, he hasn't forgotten his moments of pain.

When Heady left the WACA Ground midway through last year with a serious shoulder injury, it appeared as though his horror 1992 season had come back to haunt him.

After falling awkwardly against North Melbourne, Heady departed the arena in agony, his dislocated shoulder certain to sideline him for at least a month.

The sight of the gifted half-forward supporting his damaged shoulder with his right hand was certainly not one for the faint-hearted.

But he courageously fought his way back into the line-up, missing just one match. But even then, fate wasn't far away and two games later a foot injury kept him out of action for the next fortnight.

Again Heady came back and even though he remained 'healthy' for the rest of the season, the Eagles first semi-final loss to eventual premiers Essendon capped off a forgettable two years for the Subiaco product, who burst on to the AFL scene in 1990 after being selected 116th in the 1989 draft.

"Last year I had a lot of niggling injuries," Heady said this week, reflecting on an unbroken start.

"I had a foot injury, a couple of other little things and dislocated my shoulder.

"While it wasn't anything re-occurring, it was the little things that were keeping me out of training."

And while they were frustrating, those 'little things' paled into insignificance when Heady remembers his dreadful 1992 season.

After establishing himself as one of the AFL's premier half-forwards in 1991, with 49 goals from 26 games, he was desperately unlucky not to earn selection in the AFL All-Australian side.

But persistent hamstring injuries forced the tremendously-skilled goalsneak to watch painfully from the sidelines and miss half the season, before earning a recall just in time to be an integral part of the Eagles historic grand final win over Geelong.

"It was hard, especially in that year because the Eagles were up and down as well and it was tough watching it on TV," Heady reflected.

"But I ended up playing 11 games and the last was

in a premiership side and when you win a flag, you tend to forget about all the tough things, but it was still hard."

What made it more frustrating for Heady was that no one was able to pin-point why he was experiencing hamstring problems for the first time in his career.

"Nobody's really sure where the hamstring strains came from and we've set ourselves a special programme at Selby Street, which delves specifically into hamstrings."

Though Heady can be seen at training and during games stretching his hamstrings repeatedly, he says they are 'great' and not affecting his game.

That is certainly the case as Heady has bounced back to his dynamic best in the Eagles opening six games, re-developing his hunger and kicking 14 goals.

The 24-year-old is taking marks and hitting the ball like the 1991 Heady version and his kicking for goal has the level of accuracy every coach loves from his forwards.

"Pre-season I had a few injuries and I just decided that I wanted this season to be my year after having a fairly ordinary one last year" he said.

"I did a lot of work and plenty of running on my own and also sat down with guys at the club who work on fitness and everything is turning out really well.

"Confidence is a bit of a stepping stone type of effect, because you play good one week and kick a couple of goals and do a few good things and the next week you are a little bit more confident going at the ball.

"The guys have been good around us, the forward line is working well and there is a lot of space out there."

After two pre-season losses to Geelong and St Kilda, some critics said the Eagles would struggle because their only avenue to goal was much-maligned full-forward Peter Sumich.

Heady fights back to boost his goals

West Coast forward Brett Heady was a surprise choice in the 1989 AFL draft — but he has certainly rewarded the Eagles with some great games. However, it hasn't always been easy, as DIGBY BEACHAM reveals

However, with rookies Brett Spinks and Shane Bond showing plenty of potential and Heady and Sumich causing more than a few problems, the Eagles look far more menacing.

"We'd like to think we are not one dimensional and when all the pressure goes on Peter, it makes it hard," says Heady.

"But if others can kick two or three goals each week, we are going to take a lot of that pressure off him."

Heady has now played 82 games and in his fifth season at the club, he is a player coach Mick Malthouse looks to for leadership.

When the former promising Subiaco teenager first arrived at Eagles training, he was like so many WAFL players — boasting potential talent, but in desperate need of weights training.

Heady knew his responsibility and was a more than diligent student in the weights room.

"I came to the Eagles in November 1989 and weighed 72 kilos and by the end of 1991, I was about 80 and I've remained around there ever since," he said.

After crushing wins over Richmond, Fitzroy and North Melbourne, WA football followers are quickly linking 1994 to 1992 when the Eagles went all the way.

And while Heady believes it's far too early to gauge where West Coast are presently at, he admits the signs are encouraging.

"I think the guys are teaming together a lot better now," he says.

"We seem to be crushing sides a bit harder than we did last year, but I'll tell you in 15 weeks how we're going."

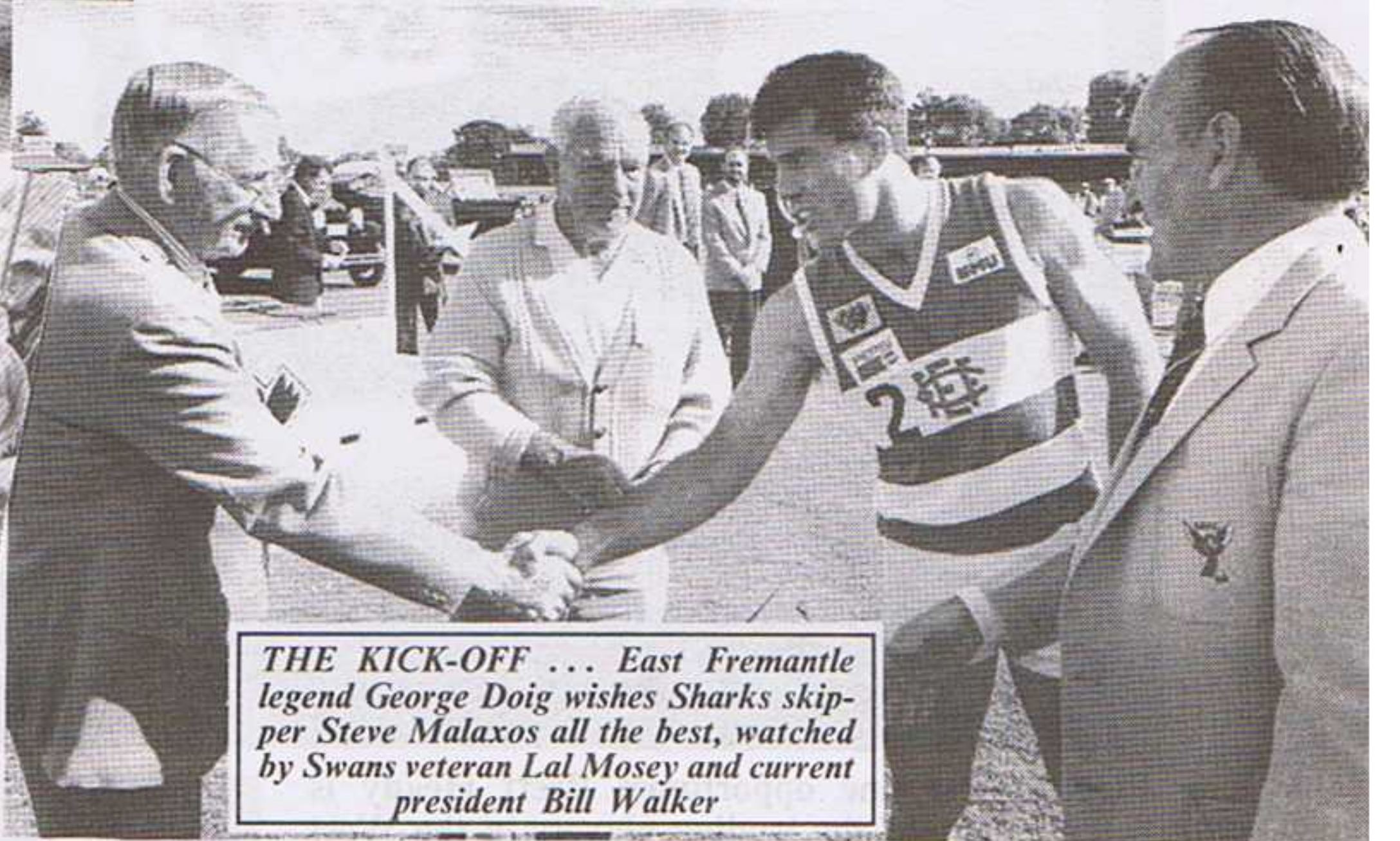

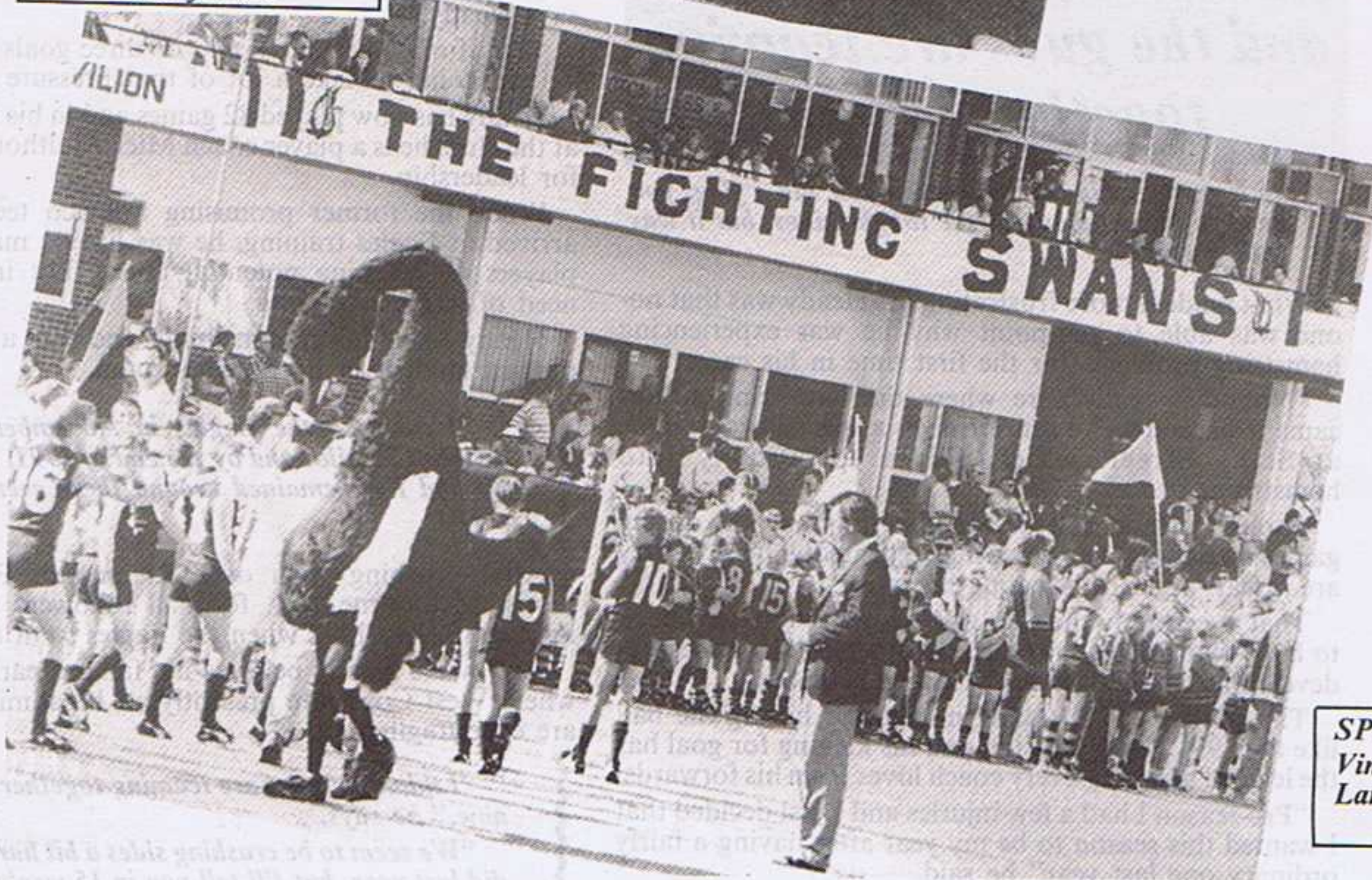

"They love the club"

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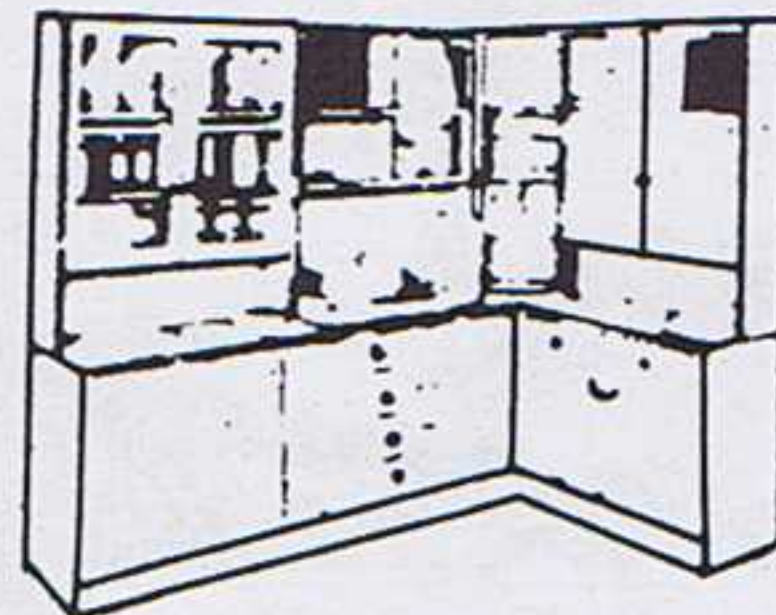

THE Solin twins, Tony (Subiaco) and Robert (East Perth) come up against each other for the first time when the two teams clash at the WACA Ground on Saturday night.

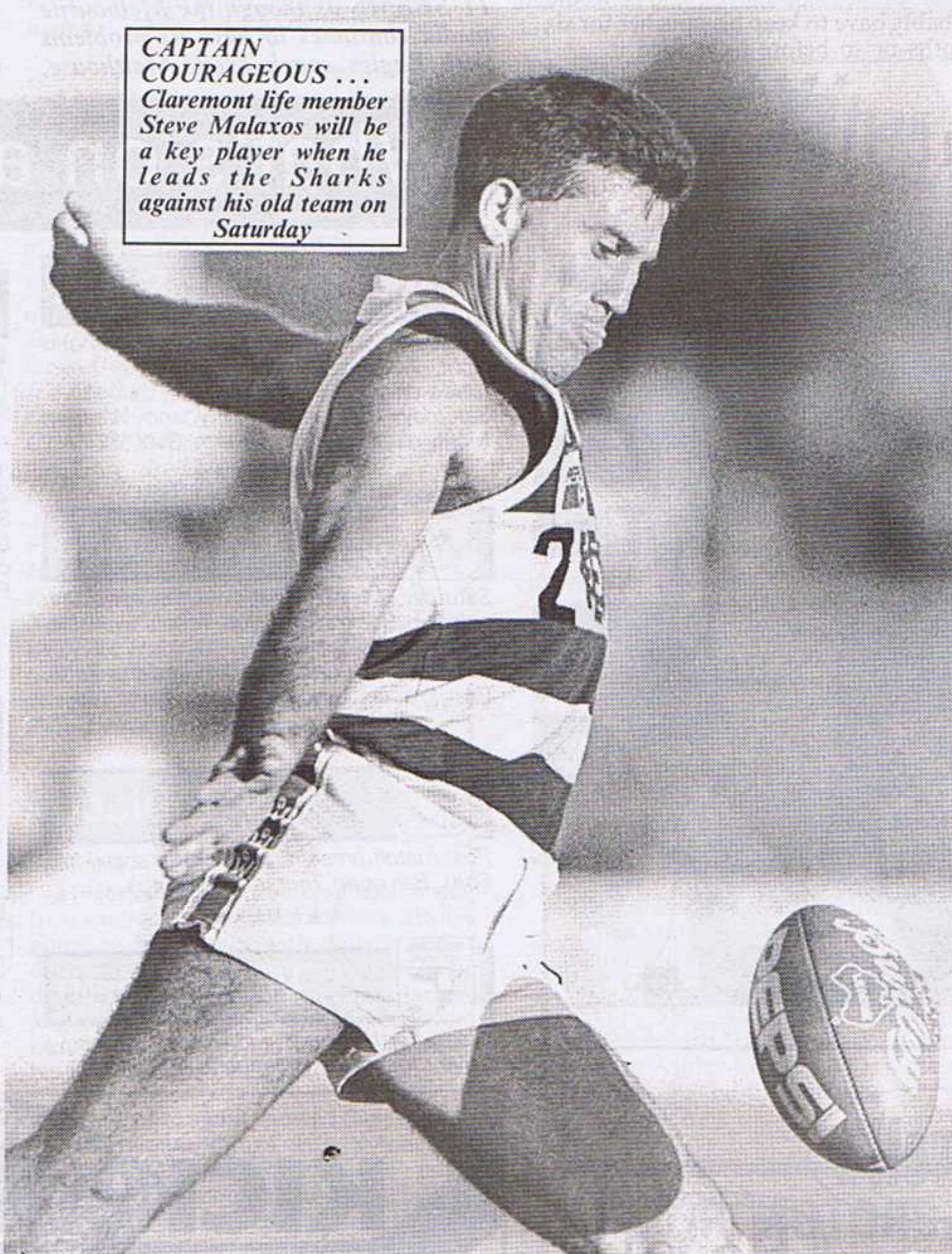
And for Tony, it is the most important game for the season.

A premiership player in 1993, Smith's good form in the pre-season earned him a berth in the WAFL combined side that played North Melbourne, where he was a handy contributor and is a strong chance to line-up for Fremantle next season.

"It was a great thrill to play against North Melbourne because I barracked for them when I was a kid — and still do," Smith said.

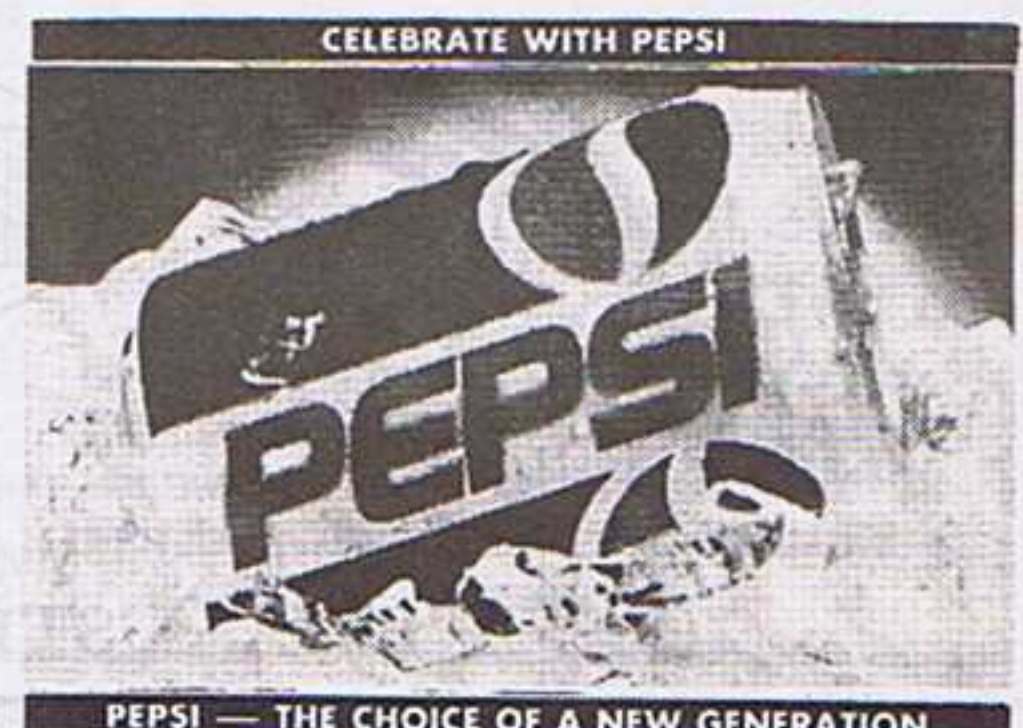
Tigers coach Gerard Neesham, a strong contender to lead Fremantle, said Smith was starting to impact on the WAFL scene.

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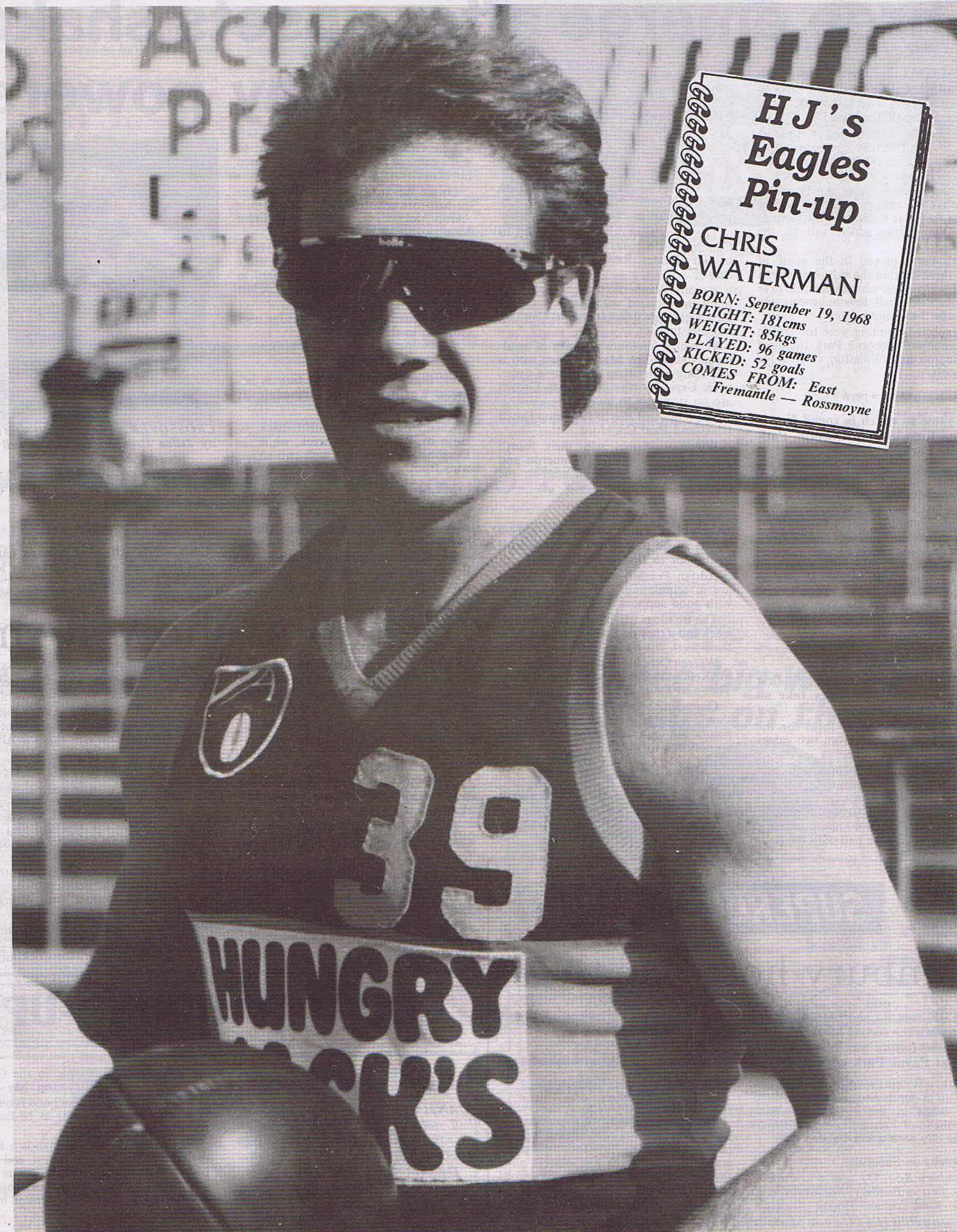
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Three emerge after upsets shake

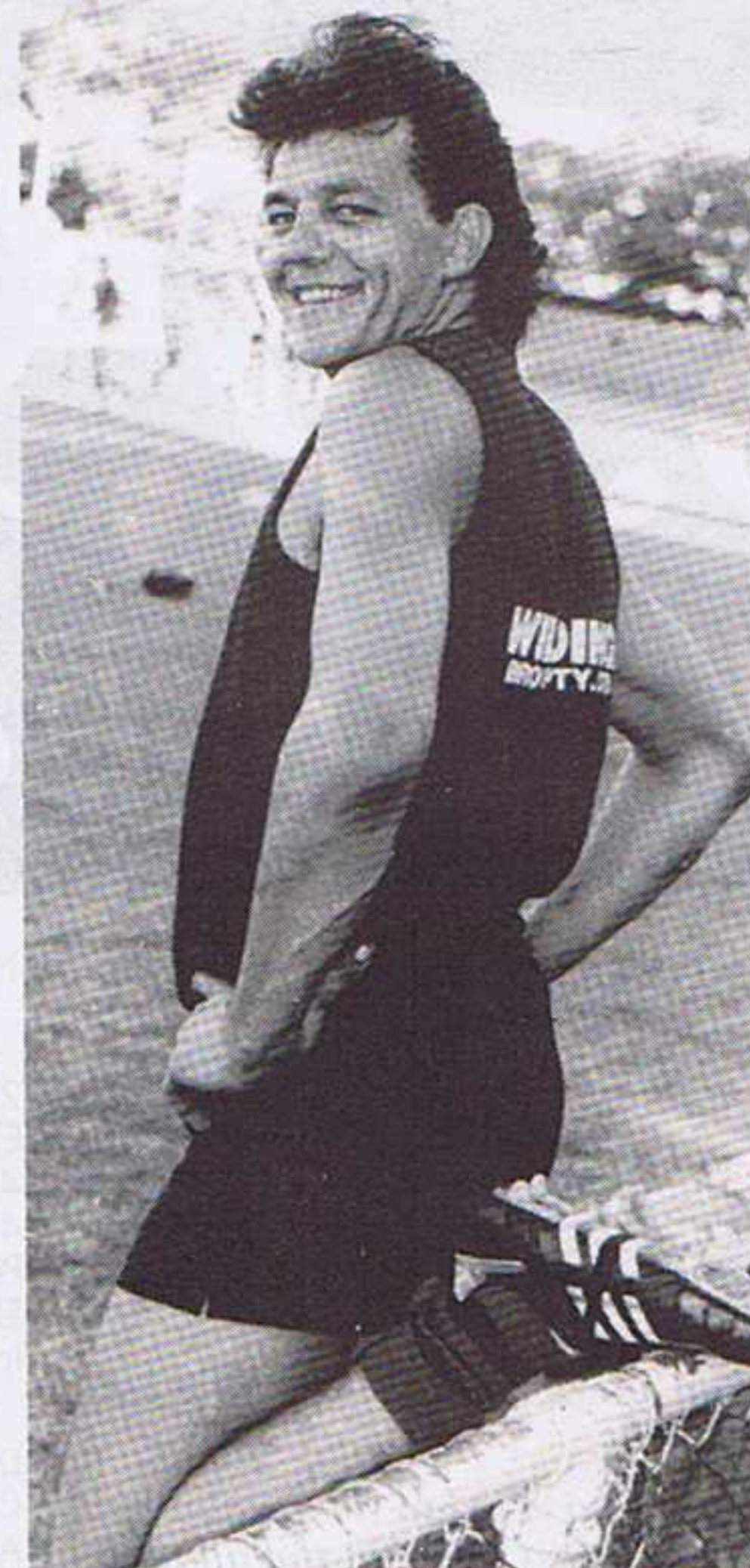

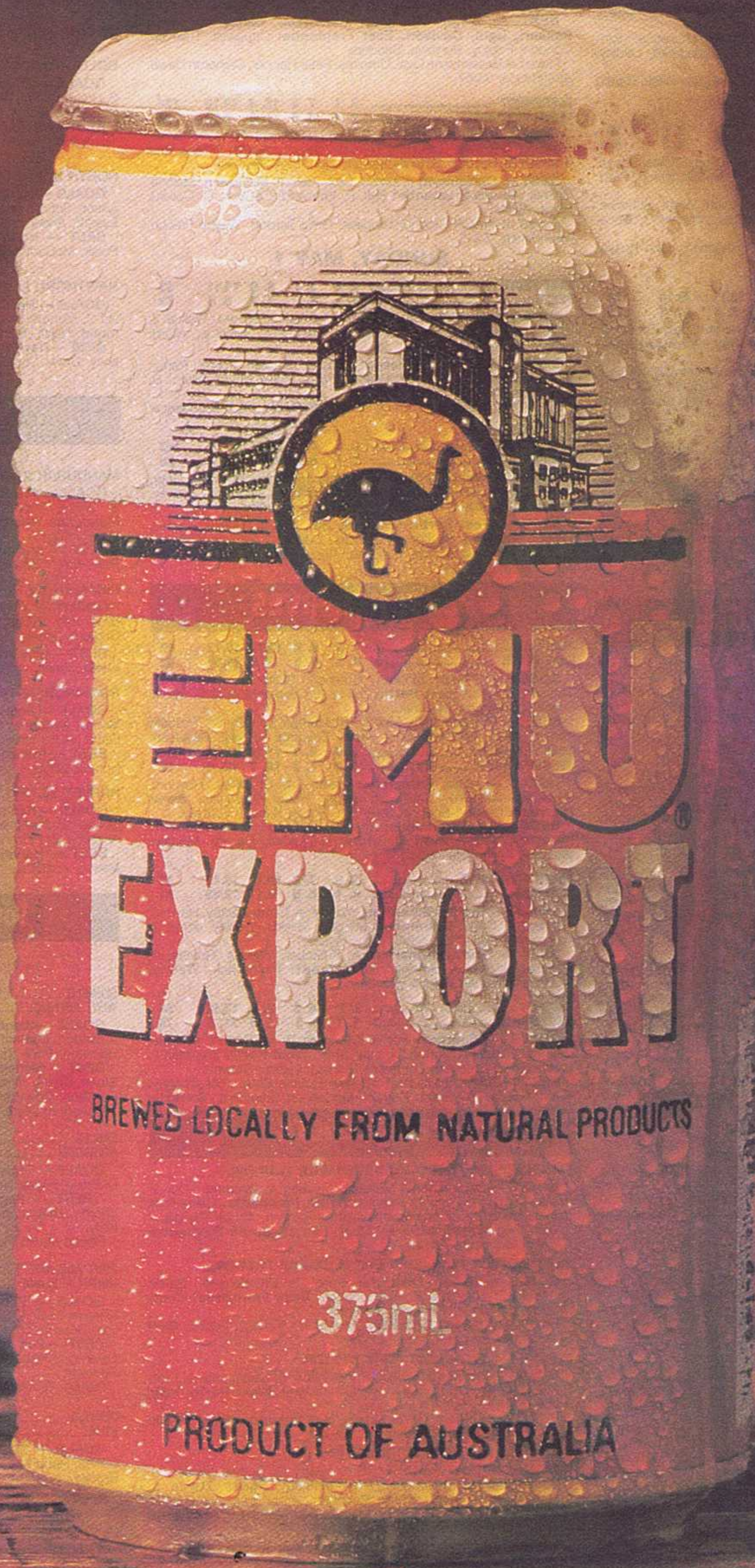
