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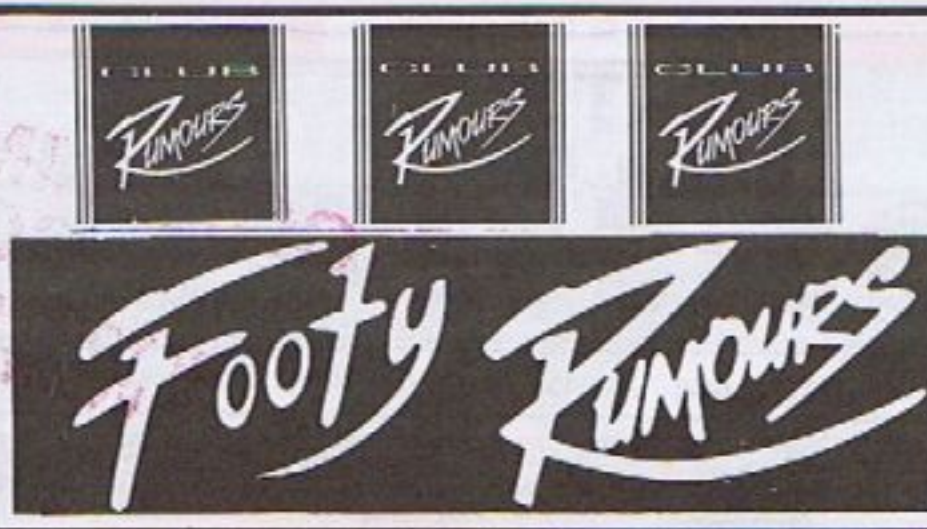

### Anzac coincidence

A RECENT caller to radio 6WF's Saturday morning show wanted to know how Perth and East Fremantle got on when they moved from their old home grounds to new venues out in the suburbs.

With West Perth winning their farewell game at Leederville last year and then celebrating their debut at Joondalup Arena, the query on Perth and East Fremantle was an interesting one.

So, for the record, here's how the two clubs featured at the time of change.

On August 30, 1952, East Fremantle played their last official home game at Fremantle Oval — the ground they shared with South Fremantle — and, naturally enough, it was a derby to farewell Old Easts. But it was a sad departure as Souths won 24.9 to 7.13.

But East Fremantle atoned when they christened East Fremantle Oval in 1953, beating Claremont 7.18 to 8.10 at their first appearance on the new ground.

In 1958, Perth played their last match at the WACA Ground, losing to West Perth 19.11 to 15.14.

However, the Demons also celebrated the opening of their new home at Lathlain Park with a 14.5 to 13.7 victory over Swan Districts.

And, coincidentally, both those debut games were played on Anzac Day, April 25 — the same date that West Perth celebrated the opening of their new home at Joondalup.

WEST Perth's move to Joondalup is certainly paying dividends.

After attracting more than 15,000 fans for their first game at the Arena against East Perth and following it up with a 3531 crowd against Perth, they topped the 5000-mark again last week when they clashed with Swan Districts.

CLAREMONT utility player Damon Lukins has retired from league ranks after failing to earn senior selection this year.

Drafted 77th by Geelong last March, Lukins opted not to go to Melbourne, preferring another season with the Tigers.

But now the 24-year-old, who played six league games with the Tigers, has returned to his home-town of Albany and will resume playing with local club Railways.

### Gastev milestone

FORMER West Perth and West Coast little man John Gastev was among the milestone men in last weekend's round of AFL football.

He notched his 100th game with Brisbane, after previously playing 30 with the Eagles.

With his 56 games at West Perth before his 1987 debut with the Eagles, the former Mt Hawthorn junior now needs another 14 games to register 200 senior matches since his graduation to league level back in 1983.

THE hard work that league coaches and their club football managers do between weekend fixtures was exemplified in a recent country trip by an East Perth car-load.

Football manager Cam Robbins and coach Rob Solin took off on a Monday morning, along with players Scott Crook and Dale Foster and development officer Ross Nash for a quick dash down South.

They took the Busselton league side for training on the Monday afternoon, in conjunction with coach Graham Pates and Tuesday saw them in Manjimup for a schools match in the Town and Country Shield, for students in years 8, 9 and 10.

In addition, they held coaching clinics with development squads in both towns, maintaining their links with the best 13, 14 and 15-year-olds in the regions.

They made sure the Royals flag was flying wherever they went and the constant communication with rising young stars has helped boost the club's country recruiting.

The group was back in town late on Tuesday night, covering almost 1000kms in just two days of football development work.

"I sooled 'em on to each other and it was on for young and old," he said, with the 'Roos going on to beat Melbourne and then Fitzroy in successive weeks.

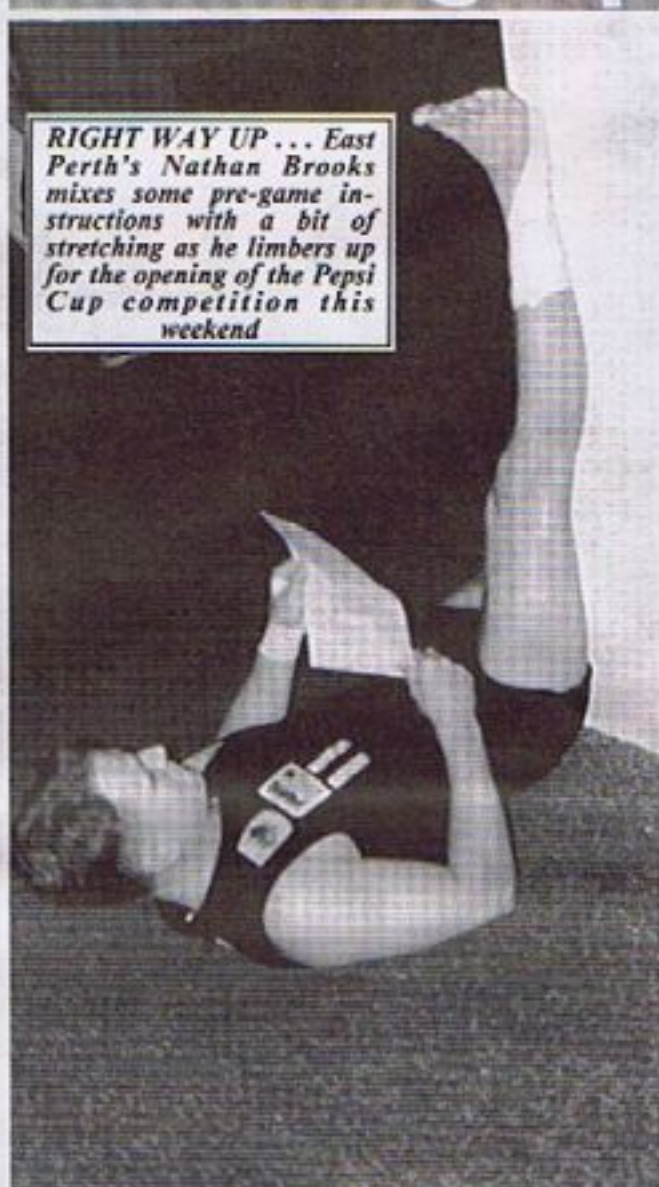
Pagan defended his tactic, saying it brought the players back to earth after three successive wins.

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# PERCY'S POINT presented by... The Perth International HOTEL

THERE has been a lot said lately about the West Australian Football Commission's thoughts on re-organising the colts competition.

Westside colleague Trevor Sprigg wrote about it a couple of weeks ago and all the WAFL clubs seem to be against it.

But that doesn't mean we should throw it out; in fact, there are good reasons why it should be introduced. Having said that, I can see some irritable reactions from Claremont, East Fremantle and Swan Districts, particularly.

They do a good job with their juniors, but overall, the development of football in Western Australia is reaching rock bottom.

Watching WAFL participants today, the general inability of sides to retain possession of the ball because of bad disposal is embarrassing.

Some clubs get the ball and then simply 'give' it to the opposition — Perth coach David Glascott would surely agree with that — while Jeff Gieschen had to teach West Perth players how to 'use' the ball before he got them playing as a top side.

## Time to re-examine junior development

I coach the Melville High School's Quit Cup team and that's in East Fremantle's district — one of the so-called better clubs junior-wise. But I've got news for Sharks people.

The in-built ability is great, but the skill level across the board is bad.

It's starting in junior councils and there are not enough genuinely-qualified football people in coaching roles.

It's time the Commission took over, establishing local zones, organising people to work strongly in the regions, supporting the people coaching and putting the help where it's most needed.

For instance, if Graham Melrose is coaching a club, leave him alone. But if a civic-minded, genuine — but

limited — football person is coaching, assign high profile WAFL players or former players to help him.

Kids respond to peer image and players have that image. Some clubs do public relations work, they send a couple of league players to a junior club once a year.

That achieves nothing.

The Football Development Trust was established to develop depth and skill in all junior areas and it's not working — it's time changes were made.

# Joyce gears up for the Eagles

FOOTSCRAY coach Alan Joyce, the man responsible for resurrecting the pride of Melbourne's Western suburbs, believes the bye could endanger West Coast's barnstorming momentum.

Joyce, who rates the Eagles as the current AFL yardstick, is gearing up for this week's clash at the Western Oval with the West Coasters.

The former Hawthorn premiership coach is wary of the effect the bye has on clubs, having experienced it with near-devastating results three weeks ago.

"We beat Adelaide (in Adelaide) and we were on a real high," he said.

"But then we had to sit around for two weeks and twiddle our thumbs and wait for the next game.

"We definitely came off the bye a bit scratchy and really struggled against Brisbane.

"I just don't know whether the bye is helpful or not. There are pluses and minuses with it, but it didn't help us."

### EAGLES WARY

The Eagles, who are wary of their challenge with the Bulldogs at the Western Oval, lifted the tempo at training last week in a bid to counter the break.

The metamorphosis at the Western Oval has been nothing short of astounding under Joyce, who replaced sacked coach Terry Wheeler.

They suffered narrow losses to Collingwood (one point) and North Melbourne (13 points), before bouncing

back with wins over the Crows at Football Park, Brisbane and Melbourne.

"It's been a combination of a complete effort from all the players, both the experienced guys and the younger ones," Joyce said.

Joyce nominated acting captain Mark Hunter as representative of the turnaround in form and confidence now prevalent at Footscray.

### INSPIRATION

Hunter was inspirational against Melbourne last Sunday at the Western Oval, collecting 35 possessions as the Bulldogs scratched and clawed their way back from a 22-point half-time deficit to triumph by three points.

"Our first half was not all that special, but our second half was," Joyce said.

"The pressure we applied in the third quarter was just outstanding, given that we kept them to 20-odd kicks and you don't often see that happen in an AFL match."

Joyce is under no illusions that it will take four quarters of the same persistence and endeavour to topple the top-of-the-ladder Eagles at the Western Oval on Saturday.

"They are the top side and sit in that bracket of quality," he said.

"But look at our performance against Collingwood, North Melbourne, Adelaide, Brisbane and Melbourne and you must have respect for us too," he said.

Joyce has spent the past fortnight concentrating on mental fine-tuning and instilling a belief in his players that they are capable of being more than a side which is competitive against the top bracket teams.

"The side has been up and down a bit in terms of the constant changes we have been making in order to find the right combination," Joyce said.

"The confidence factor has really been

coming to the fore over the past couple of weeks."

Visiting coach Mick Malthouse rates the Western Oval as one of few AFL arenas that offer a home ground advantage.

Malthouse should know, having coached the Bulldogs between 1984 and '89, steering them into the '85 preliminary final.

Joyce agrees, having discovered the blustery winds that shoot across the ground.

"Every night I'm on the training track it seems to be coming from a different angle," Joyce lamented.

The Bulldogs stocks will be raised on Saturday when Brownlow Medallist ruckman Scott Wynd makes a welcome return to action after a series of leg injuries. He will resume with the Footscray reserves in a VSFL match against Hawthorn.

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## The scientific game

THE average football supporter has become much more statistic-conscious in recent times.

Since the introduction of the West Coast Eagles and the publishing of the players statistics in the daily press, much more attention is focused on kicks, marks and handballs.

Some critics use the information to select best players, highlighting total possessions as the main criteria.

This method tends to ignore ineffective kicks or handballs, a statistic readily available to coaching staff.

Thanks to Melbourne-based company, Sassy Software, who market the stats-master video analysis and statistic reporting system, Eagles coach Mick Malthouse and his team have a very sophisticated data collection resource.

The West Coast Eagles Supporters Club financed the purchase of the required computer equipment software and training to the tune of some \$110,000.

The hardware is portable and is taken to each game.

### COMPUTER

A caller simply commentates the events as they occur — for example ... Jakovich marks over Carey, McKenna runs past, receives handball, kicks to Brennan and the operator enters them into the computer.

Data can then be printed and shown to the coaching staff during the game if required.

Not only are kicks, marks, handballs, tackles etc are recorded, but such information as shepherds, runs past, handballs received and the number of times in the 50 metre attacking zone are also available, especially for the post-game analysis and to assist match-strategy.

Another advantage of the system is that events can be input to the computer while watching the replay after the game and then edited video tapes reduced of say, the one-on-ones between Jakovich and Carey.

This obviously saves an immense amount of time for Malthouse and his assistant coach Robert Wiley riding the

fast forward or rewind button on the video.

It is estimated by Sassy that it would take about 20 minutes to tape a player's 20 possession game.

### SEASON TAPES

Some clubs are making tapes of player's entire season, featuring just the subjects against various opponents.

Surely, that's a great aid in self-analysis.

Imagine if Jakovich knew that Carey marked over him 90 percent of the time when he came from his left-hand side.

He would work especially hard to keep him on the right.

Analysis of successful centre breaks and the personnel involved has assisted some clubs in their set play training.

The secret of the system now used by all AFL clubs is that the computer controls the video editing of the events, allowing a coach to quickly make an educational tape, for say, the Monday night meeting after a Sunday game.

### SOPHISTICATED

Each event also has a 'lead-in and post-play period' which sometimes provides damning evidence about how much latitude an opponent was given before he won possession.

Sophisticated statistics can also be re-

corded in the system and printed out by match, season, or even the career of a particular player.

This function is invaluable for recruiting purposes and clubs are also compiling video dossiers of potential draft choices, using the Sassy system.

It requires hardware of a personal computer, preferably the note-book style used at the game, a special touch-pad keyboard to record the statistics and two VCRs — one for locating and playing the required events and one for recording.

A printer is also required to produce hard-copy reports.

Philip Barrett, of Sassy, certainly hit on a winner with his stats-master system, which is also used by large sporting associations to record membership data.

COMPETITION is a wonderful thing ... it's what separates the WAFL from the other football leagues in this state.

It's why having expatriate AFL players come back to the WAFL system is essential, rather than them staying on club lists and playing out their careers in the reserves.

Reducing club lists to 42 for this season drew many players back home to the WAFL — and they have proved great drawcards.

Jon Dorotich, Stephen Edgar, Peter Worsfold, Richard Dennis, Leigh Willison and Jeremy Silcock have all brought experience and new desire to WAFL ranks in 1994.

The majority spent last season playing VSFL football.

While they would have all been devastated at getting the chop from their clubs, the thought of coming home and possibly playing for Fremantle was a big incentive.

### TOUCH OF CLASS

They have all added a touch of class to the WAFL and a new challenge for the opposition.

Dorotich's strength and size is second-to-none in the WAFL. Each week coaches agonise over who to play on the former Carlton premiership player.

His nine goals against East Perth on the weekend was the difference between the two sides and his influence was largely responsible for South Fremantle's second win of the season.

While injury has kept Peter Worsfold from playing a lot of football since his return from Brisbane, he will no doubt prove a handy acquisition to the Bulldogs.

At only 23, he is a prime candidate for Fremantle.

West Perth's Richard Dennis is another story.

At 27, he probably holds little hope of being selected for Fremantle, but he has provided invaluable experience to the young Falcons forward line.

But it's not just the travelling AFL players who are proving a handful to match-up.

The form of former West Coast Eagles pair Andrew Lockyer and Adrian Barich

is also causing headaches for opponents.

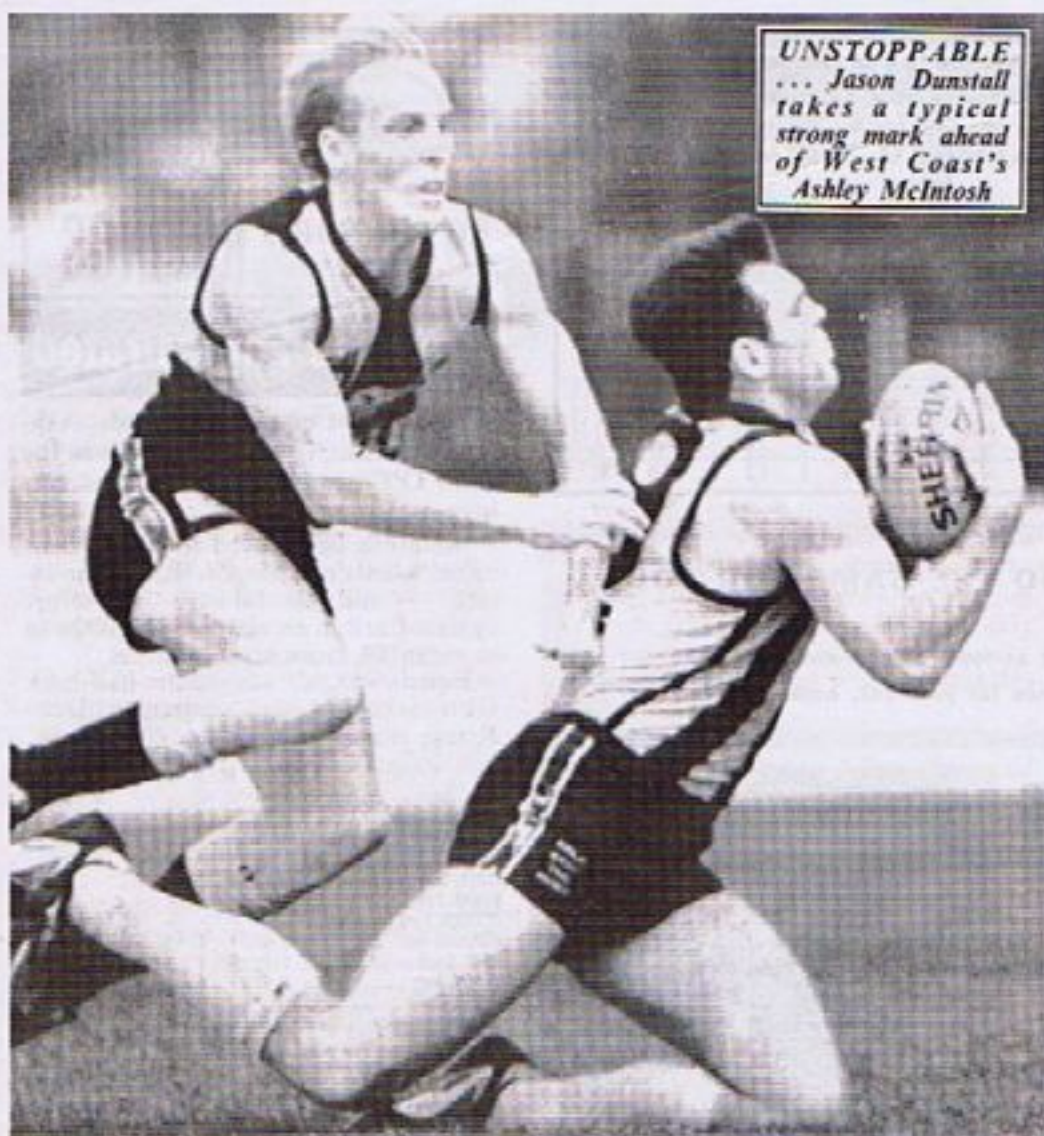
Both have up to five years experience in the AFL and use every bit of it to get a kick.

Many sceptics feel that players of their vintage and the likes of Dennis and Dorotich should call it a day because they are keeping young players out of a league position.

How wrong they are. The WAFL needs all the help it can get from these drawcards and they can teach young players invaluable lessons as well as offering advice when the annual drafts approach.

They, better than anyone, know the pros and cons of the AFL and all its offerings.

## Dunstall aims at the top

JASON Dunstall is set to become the greatest full-forward in history, according to Hawthorn's chief executive John Lauritz.

The Hawthorn champion, fast approaching 200 games and 1000 goals, has the durability, fitness and form to remain a force for another four years.

One of Lauritz's priorities in the middle of last year was to re-sign Dunstall ahead of Brisbane, who had offered more than \$1 million to entice him back to his state of origin.

Mission accomplished, Lauritz now says Dunstall can eclipse the records of Gordon Coventry (1299 goals) and Doug Wade (1057).

"He's been a phenomenal player for us," he said. "And in the form he's in and his age (29) he can go on and on."

Dunstall has averaged more than 90 goals a year since entering league ranks in 1985.

He has passed the 100 goal mark four times and this year could become the first player to reach three figures five times.

Despite missing three rounds with a calf injury earlier this year, Dunstall already has aggregated 28 goals in four matches, including 10 against Brisbane last week.

### SLUGGISH

After a sluggish start against the Bears, when he uncharacteristically fumbled his first two marks, Dunstall kicked two goals in the second quarter, three in the third and five in the last.

It was the 12th time he had reached double figures.

Only St Kilda's Tony Lockett and Collingwood's Peter McKenna have more double figure tallies in league history.

Lockett's spectacular 11 goal haul against Sydney in round six was the 15th time he has kicked 10 or more, trailing McKenna with 13 double-figure bags.

Dunstall kicked all 10 on Saturday against Brisbane's Richard Champion.

Bears coach Robert Walls said he had no thoughts of moving Champion, as honours between the pair had been fairly even until the final quarter, when Hawthorn kicked eight goals to three.

"When it was a genuine one-on-one contest, he (Champion) played pretty well," Walls said. "The floodgates opened though from late in the second quarter... the odds were against him as the game went on."

Dunstall's shoot-out with Adelaide's Tony Modra in Adelaide this Sunday will have a direct reflection on the outcome of the ninth round's major meetings.

With 38 goals in six matches, Mo-

dra lies second on the goalkicking table, five behind the competition leader, Geelong's Gary Ablett, who has 43.

After losing three of their first four games, Hawthorn have won three in a row and have a good record interstate.

\*\*\*\*\*

**GARY ABLETT'S 14 goal contribution against Sydney not only equalled his personal best tally, but his six goals in the second quarter was a high for any quarter in his AFL career.**

He kicked six goals in a quarter of a pre-season game in the late 1980s, but his best in day games has been five.

At times on Sunday it seemed that Ablett may even rival the all-time League goalkicking record of 18.

He posted five in the opening 12 minutes of the final quarter, to have 14, but was denied any further possessions by Andrew Dunkley, shifted to full-back halfway through the term.

Geelong also made a tardy start to the season, but now lie fourth with four wins and three losses.

The Cats play three of the bottom sides in the next month and could be in top spot going into the first weeks of winter.

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# Hunter prepares to fire with

# Eagles in sight

**ACTING** Footscray captain Mark Hunter is a born-again footballer.

Relieved of his normal duties as a back pocket-tagger, Hunter is relishing a new role as an attacking ruck-rover under the coaching of Alan Joyce.

A 35-possession match-winning performance last Sunday against competition pacesetter Melbourne at the MCG has thrust Hunter into the limelight.

"It's really the first time I've been playing in the midfield since my junior days," Hunter said this week.

"I played most of my footy as a centreman or ruck-rover, so it's not totally foreign. But most of my time at Footscray has been spent at half-forward or in the backline, so it's like a new lease of life."

Hunter was handed his first midfield assignment in round three against Collingwood, Joyce's first game at the helm, on dangerous Magpie recruit Nathan Buckley.

### CONFIDENCE

A solid negating effort gave Hunter the confidence to maintain his on-ball form and he has been pivotal in the Bulldogs revival.

They have won their past three games after losing narrowly to the Magpies and North Melbourne.

He credits the interim captaincy, in the absence of injured ruckman Scott Wynd, as lifting his confidence.

"It is an honour, but it does not

change the way you go about playing," he said.

According to Hunter, the Bulldogs are playing as well, if not better, than 1992 when they reached the preliminary final under the coaching of Terry Wheeler.

"It is hard to put a finger on what Alan has done, but we are playing a much better brand of football than we were in round two when Geelong thrashed us," Hunter said.

"I guess he has totally up-ended the side. It's a confidence thing and if we stay on a roll like we are at the moment, we could finish anywhere."

### CRITICAL

Hunter needs no reminding about the talent of West Coast, their opponents in Saturday's critical encounter at the Western Oval.

"They are very well coached and are so even across the board that they can be matched up with anyone," Hunter said.

Hunter has a high opinion of Eagles coach Mick Malthouse.

Not surprisingly, Hunter, who is approaching 29 and the 100 game mark, served under Malthouse in 1988 and '89, his first two seasons at senior VFL level.

The Western Oval, according to Malthouse, remains one of the few home ground advantages, alongside Adelaide's Football Park, in an increasingly even national competition.

### TILTED GROUND

"It's a north-south ground from half-back to half-forward, it has no wings, it is very straight and it's tilted, so in any wet weather, it gets very wet on one side of the ground," Malthouse said.

"If you train out there and play on it often enough you get used to it... we haven't seen the ground for seven months.

"If there is a wind blowing you can bet it is going to be at the Western Oval, so we've got a few things to overcome.

"The ground is a consideration, but it's certainly not going to be the reason why we win or lose."

The Eagles last won at the Western Oval in 1990, Malthouse's first year with West Coast, when they knocked off the Bulldogs by 63 points in round three.

They did not play at the venue in '91, lost by 30 points in round 23 of '92 and last year suffered a 42-point defeat on the eve of the finals.

The Eagles believe the time is right to balance the ledger.

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# Milestone sure answer for

# Shaw critics

IT STANDS as sacrilege among the Collingwood faithful that Tony Shaw was almost lost to the black and white army.

When Shaw joined Collingwood under-19s for pre-season training in 1977, as the younger brother of senior rover Ray, he was barely given time to raise a sweat in practice matches.

Never one to hold back a verbal spray — even in his formative years — Shaw informed under-19s football manager Billy O'Keefe that he was not content to gain splinters in his posterior as a bench-warmer-for other young hopefuls:

"I told them to stick it you know where," he said this week.

Shaw returned to Reservoir Lakeside in the Diamond Valley league, played in a senior premiership side, but was lured back to the Magpie fold the next season.

He played five senior games that season, 1978, but his critics were far from convinced.

Barrel-chested, slow and unable to kick over a jam-tin, the experts were quick to write off Shaw.

## ELITE LIST

Their words will be the main course on the menu at Friday night's Collingwood-North Melbourne MCG encounter under lights when Shaw joins an elite list of VFL-AFL icons to have played 300 games.

Shaw has become a paradox in an era where pace and height are the norm.

"It would be fair to say I have been written off from time-to-time for being too slow or not being able to kick that far," Shaw said.

"But you all have your strengths and weaknesses.

"A lot of people said I wouldn't make

it, so I guess a milestone like this is nice in that regard."

A dual Copeland Trophy (Collingwood best-and-fairest 1984 and 1990), Norm Smith Medallist and captain of the celebrated 1990 premiership side, Shaw had to call on every reserve of determination and grit to play at all this season.

"At the end of last season I knew that I was going to struggle to get a senior game when we were at full strength, so it was just a matter of putting in a big pre-season and taking it from there," Shaw said.

It has surprised no-one at Collingwood that Shaw has played in every game except one, the Magpies round two clash with arch-enemy Carlton.

## OPPORTUNITY

"Although I must say I was going to be playing seconds last week, but Scotty Russell pulled out and I was in, so I had to make the most of the opportunity," Shaw said.

Shaw did just that, gathering 28 possessions in ensuring the triple century milestone is passed on Friday night.

"I don't really know what the 300 game mark means because I haven't thought about it too much, but I guess knowing that I will be in an elite group will be nice," Shaw said.

"I guess it means I am a bit of a survivor.

"But my aim at the start was to play one, then 50 then 100.

"You never set yourself a goal like 300 games."

Apart from the '90 premiership, Shaw rates Collingwood's one-point victory over West Coast in the wet at Subiaco Oval in 1992 as a career highlight.

"I just remember it as one of the great fighting efforts I have been involved in," he said.

Shaw admits he will retire at the end of the season, opening up a new range of goals.

He plans to run his second Melbourne marathon.

Having completed his first, in 1983, in 3hrs 20mins, he wants to break the three hour barrier next season.

A development coach at Collingwood, he also nurses a burning desire to coach at the elite level.

"But that is all a matter of timing," he said.

After Friday night, Shaw might have one more goal in his sights — Gordon Coventry's club record of 306 games.

"Oh no, don't even mention that," Shaw said.

With the loss of Norm Smith Medallist Michael Long for the season, some critics suggested the Bombers may lack the midfield explosiveness that can often turn a game.

'CC' has stepped straight into the vacancy and taken off in from where Long left off in the final game of 1993, to leave Essendon knockers lost for words.

For a player in only his first season of footy his consistent form is truly remarkable.

Perhaps his former club Port Adelaide can take some of the credit for the maturity and poise he has shown on the field.

# Joyce credits work ethic

A SEASON which started in a commentary booth as an expert on Melbourne radio, has turned quickly for Alan Joyce to the point where he will lock horns with the old enemy at the Western Oval on Saturday.

Just a couple of weeks into the season, Joyce dropped the headphones and was called in as the replacement for Terry Wheeler who, rightly or wrongly, was mercilessly axed by the Bulldogs.

It was interesting to hear Joyce on radio last weekend discussing the problems he first faced at Footscray.

"It was very hard, but the players accepted me well," he said. "My philosophies haven't changed. The work ethic of the players is the reason for the turnaround."

Obviously Footscray officials were more impressed with Joyce's coaching credentials than Hawthorn, who discarded him regardless of an impressive coaching record.

A two-time premiership coach with the Hawks — which doubles to four if you count Foster's Cup pre-season success — many considered Joyce was poorly treated when sacked by the Hawks after losing an elimination final against Adelaide last year.

But just as many people felt that Wheeler, replaced just two games into this season, was treated just as harshly.

## DIGNITY

It is difficult for a coach who loses his job mid-term to bow out with dignity, but Wheeler did just that.

Vowing to remain loyal to a club which had been such a big part of his life, Wheeler watched from the outer when the Bulldogs lost to Collingwood by a point in round three — and he had even gone out of his way to wish Joyce all the best in that debut.

After the Collingwood performance came a close fight with North Melbourne and then an upset over Adelaide at arguably the ground which offers least advantage to any of the visiting AFL clubs — Football Park.

They came from behind, trailing by 22 points at half-time to secure four precious premiership points, beating the Demons by half-a-goal.

## TIGHT FINISH

Followers of Footscray have been given their money's worth since Joyce's arrival with plenty of tight finishes.

Whether you agree or disagree with the principle of sacking football coaches, it seems the arrival of Joyce has had the desired affect.

He came in and immediately adopted a tough approach where past reputations counted for nothing.

He showed that at the selection table the first time when he dropped vice-captain Simon Atkins to the reserves.

Atkins was considered by most to be a permanent fixture in the seniors, but under Joyce has been made to earn his stripes over again.

Watching highlights of last week's win over Melbourne it was obvious that attitudes have changed at the Western Oval.

Players who have often been able to produce the spectacular performance, but not necessarily a second and third effort, now fight more fiercely for possession.

The Eagles will know on Saturday that they have been in a brawl.

The Hawthorn stamp is starting to shine like a beacon among the Scraggers.

# Sad Sydney still suffer

THE Sydney Swans have become the first team for 50 years to bear the brunt of double-figure goal tallies in consecutive weeks.

Gary Ablett's 14 goals at the Sydney Cricket Ground followed Tony Lockett's match-winning 11 goal performance for St Kilda in round 7.

The last time a team faced double-figure goalkickers in consecutive weeks was in 1944.

Hawthorn's Wally Culpitt kicked 10 for Hawthorn against Geelong at Glenferrie Oval in round 3 and Melbourne's Fred Fanning followed up with 11 against the Cats at Kardinia Park.

GARY Ablett's feat last week was the 11th time he has kicked 10 or more goals in a match and the third time that he has kicked 14 goals.

Ablett has kicked double-figure tallies against eight different clubs, including four against Richmond.

The Geelong supercat now holds the goalscoring record for rounds 6, 8 and 9.

Aged 32 years and seven months, Ablett is the third oldest player to kick 10 goals or more in a league match.

Fitzroy's Bernie Quinlan was 33 years and one month when he kicked his second double figure tally, in August 1984 and Collingwood's Gordon Coventry was only a few months short of his 33rd birthday when he kicked 14 against Hawthorn in round 14 of 1934.

JASON Dunstall recorded his third double-figure tally for Hawthorn against Brisbane last week and his 12th double figure tally overall.

Dunstall has now kicked 938 career goals and is fourth on the all-time goal-kicking list.

As a result of his 14 goal haul, Gary Ablett became the 10th player to kick 750 goals, lifting his career tally to 753 goals in 191 matches.

DESPITE having a weekend free from football, West Coast returned to the top of the AFL premiership table for the first time since the end of the 1991 qualifying rounds.

The 1992 premiers headed the ladder after every round of the 1991 season, but have not led the table since.

THE self-centred club complacency that has often plagued the WA Football League has raised its unwanted head again — but West Perth aren't complaining.

With the WAFL clubs — and the WA Football Commission — shelving plans for a Fremantle celebration to mark 100 years of Port football on June 11, West Perth have snared a financial bonanza.

The Falcons will now have their June 18 fixture brought forward seven days and will play Subiaco at the Joondalup Arena — with no other games, WAFL or AFL, in opposition.

That will return the Falcons more than \$20,000 in gate money as the Arena continues to outstrip other WAFL venues in terms of attendance.

Football Commission officials are disappointed that their plans for a June feast of footy celebrations — starting with a Foundation Day derby on Monday, June 6, a mid-week football ball and culminating with an extravaganza of past, present and future players on Saturday, June 11 — have been shelved.

The initial indecision by the clubs — a classic holding-the-man/holding-the ball situation where no-one wanted to commit themselves too strongly — was fol-

lowed by general apathy when it was handballed into the "too-hard-basket".

That was when the independent Commission — the umpire, so it was intended — should have blown the whistle and ordered something to happen.

WAFL general manager Trevor Howard says:

"People just weren't prepared to make commitments to team selection and the release of players. We had sponsorship support from Healthway, but if the clubs couldn't agree, what could we do?"

"We will now concentrate on the Foundation Day Derby as the most historical aspect of the WAFL's promotion of 100 years of football in Fremantle."

### FALCONS BENEFIT

West Perth were one of the clubs to vote against the Fremantle gala day — and now they will benefit, with a little help from their rivals, especially Subiaco, who agreed to the switch.

East Fremantle — also against the idea, mainly because of a suggestion that they might have had to provide up to 12 players — will be big losers, as will South Fremantle. Both clubs would have revelled in a week of football focus on Fremantle.

Commission chairman Peter Tannock says it's regrettable that the clubs couldn't agree on the Fremantle promotion.

"The project depended on some enthusiasm from all the clubs and that wasn't in evidence," he says.

"It's very regrettable that we couldn't do something and it's also disappointing that the original fixturing, which left that weekend free for a Fremantle event, was agreed to by all the clubs.

"However, the Foundation Day derby is the 100th year of derbies, so that will be a big event for football."

# Unlikely milestone for a likeable Eagle

**JOINING** football's 200 Club is a target many players fall short of in their career planning — and David Hart is one man who never thought that target could be achieved. But it happens this week and the tough little Eagles man is more than pleased, as DIGBY BEACHAM discovers

WHEN David Hart runs onto the Western Oval this Saturday to play Footscray, he will achieve a milestone that, by his own admission, never looked possible.

Hart, the once shy country kid from Bruce Rock, turned his back on league football 10 years ago — but now joins football's 200 Club.

It's an achievement the 30-year-old is still struggling to come to terms with, but one he is delighted to finally accomplish.

"I remember watching 'The Winners' on TV back home and thought if I played one or two games of VFL, it would be sensational," Hart recalled.

"But I've now played over 100 games for the Eagles and the 200 milestone is just great — I still can't believe it."

Hart debuted for West Perth in 1983, but after seven matches, life at Leederville Oval did little for him, so he returned to the family enclave at Bruce Rock.

South Fremantle coach Mal Brown knew that the nuggetty rover had 'some potential' and was quickly on the telephone in a desperate bid to lure Hart back to the city.

After some negotiations between the two clubs, a \$7500 fee was paid and Hart was a Bulldog.

"I had no doubts David would make it, because he had pace, directness and his kicking was very good," Brown said this week.

Hart admitted he was keen to have another crack in the WAFL and Brown's sweet-talking did the trick.

"I knew I had a fair chance of making it, even if I had to go to another club," he said.

Fortunately for Hart, the Eagles had the bye last weekend, allowing him time to recover after suffering concussion against Carlton the previous Sunday.

'Duel' took advantage of the break to visit his brother Ken, a 17-gamer with West Perth in the '70s, in Busselton before launching into the rest of the season.

Hart's stint at South Fremantle proved successful and his attacking skills and good ball-work attracted Richmond, who were seeking a ready-made rover.

However, the courageous little man was not keen on living in Melbourne, the city his family left when he was six.

"They were pretty keen, but Brownie persuaded me to have another year with Souths and then the Eagles were formed," he said.

"It would have been a big step because you have to live there, as well as play footy and that's important."

Hart's class came to the fore when he joined the Eagles and vividly recalls sharing the roving duties with 1980 Richmond premiership player and current Eagles assistant coach and runner, Rob Wiley.

"I use to team up with Rob and have a run in the forward line — I liked a goal," he laughed.

But the appointment of Mick Malthouse in 1990 saw Hart's role change dramatically.

Instead of trying to evade a shadow, he became one — a move which has paid handsome dividends due to Hart's discipline, good work ethic and natural pace.

"It was a big change to get used to, but one of my weaknesses was not concentrating for a full game," Hart admitted.

"But when you tag, you have to be thinking all the time, keep your mind on the job and I can really thank Mick for that."

Hart cemented his spot in the line-up and after the bitter disappointment of losing to Hawthorn in the 1991 grand final, geared himself for a big 1992.

But it turned out to be exactly the opposite.

After struggling with injuries for the bulk of the season, Hart was a member of the Eagles second semi-final win against Geelong and all but assured of a chance to play in his second successive grand final.

However, Malthouse wanted the popular veteran to catch up on some much-needed match practice by playing in the WAFL grand final for South Fremantle.

Hart will never forget that game.

"Mick said I needed another run and I said 'no worries', but in the first quarter when I was twisting I felt a little tear in my groin," he recalled.

"Then the next time, I went to kick a goal from 10 metres out and couldn't do it — I tore the muscle off the bone."

To add insult to injury, the Eagles got up and beat the Cats in the grand final and while his team-mates created history, Hart could hardly walk.

"It was great for the players, great for the club, but I would have loved to have been part of it."

His untimely injury was followed by a serious bout of glandular fever and German measles and Hart contemplated giving the game away.

"I really did come close to retiring and I had a chat with Nissy (football manager Trevor Nisbett) and the boys.

"I thought football wasn't everything, but I suppose every footballer goes through that stage.

"But after some talks with Nissy and Mick, I thought bummer it, I want to play footy."

Nisbett said Hart was at the cross-roads when he walked into his office.

"He had lost his enthusiasm for the game, lost his urge and just needed to recharge his batteries," Nisbett stated.

And after experiencing some problems with his hamstrings for the first half of last year, Hart bounced back to his bubbly best.

That sure touch has carried him into 1994 and Hart couldn't be happier with his form and the team.

"All the boys are so close now it's great," he said.

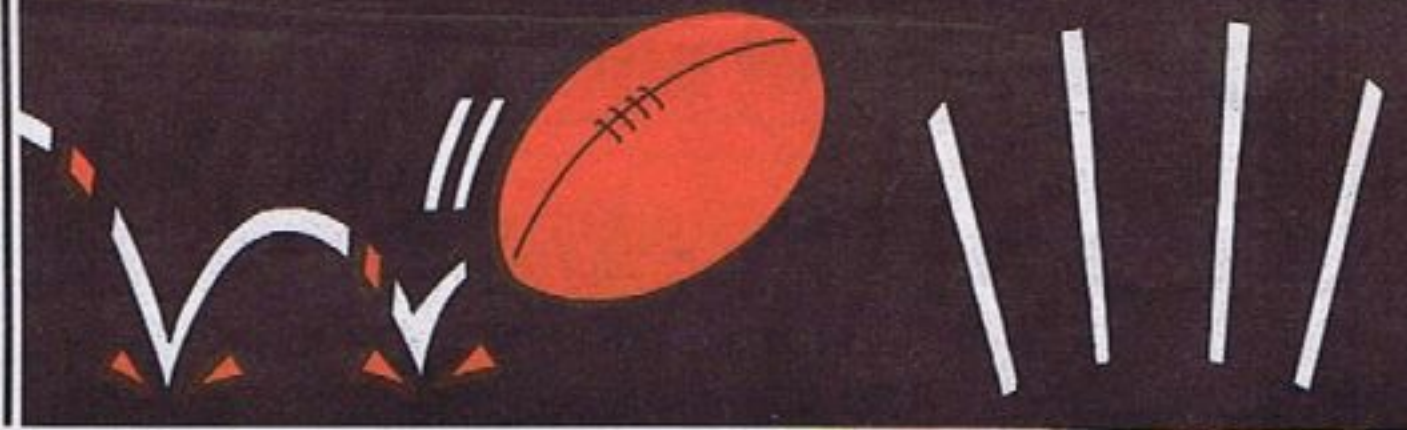
"Before, there used to be the Subiaco boys and the South Fremantle boys, but now it's a lot different.

"I've had a really good pre-season and given it my all and so far, touch wood, it's been excellent."

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# Who is the best?

IT'S football's longest-running argument — who is the best-value player in the business? The debate rages in every decade — at all football grounds; in the AFL or the bush; in bars; supermarkets; schoolyards or the office ... everywhere it's the same.

How do you judge who is the the AFL's most valuable all-round player?

Does Gary Ablett's uncanny goalkicking sense and aerial artistry rate above Wayne Carey's bullocking strength and vice-like marking prowess?

Or does Hawthorn full-forward Jason Dunstall gain the nod for his brilliance and his consistency?

To help solve the argument, Westside Football has asked four national media personalities — and the answer is Dunstall, the Hawthorn goalkicking machine who is now fourth on the all-time goalkicking list.

North Melbourne's Carey dominated Brownlow Medal betting before his two-match suspension, while Geelong's enigmatic Ablett and rugged ruck-rover Gary Hocking, Adelaide's Tony Modra and Tony McGuinness, Footscray's Tony Liberatore, Collingwood trio Paul Williams and Mick McGuane are other top prospects.

Ablett leads the AFL goalkicking with 43 after a 14-goal haul in Sydney that surely must have polled three votes from the umpires.

His grab over Collingwood's Gary Pert in round seven was referred to by many onlookers as the "mark of the century" and the gifted Cat has averaged 6.1 goals per match.

Carey is always a talking point.

Before his suspension, he had taken 71 marks from seven matches at an average of more than 10 a game and 18 more than any other player.

Dunstall sits in third place on the goalkicking table

with 28, but has played in only four matches and is averaging seven per game.

But still Dunstall rated higher for his longevity, consistency and leadership, not to mention near-faultless accuracy in front of goals.

Westside Football invited four experts to give their opinions — Channel Seven commentator Dennis Cometti; Channel Nine Footy Show anchorman Eddie McGuire; retired Hawthorn champion and former Sydney coach Gary Buckenara and radio/television commentator and Fremantle recruiting officer Trevor Sprigg.

The four were asked to name their top five current players and rate them out of 10 in five categories — speed, strength, endurance and durability, talent and leadership.

Speed entails hand and foot pace, while strength encompasses a footballer's ability to win the one-on-one tussles, his ability to hold big marks, break tackles and so on.

Endurance and durability covers a player's ability to maintain a high standard over four quarters, to carry injuries and compensate for a lack of skill.

Talent rates a player on basic football skills, while leadership relates to a player's ability to lift those around him and to lead by example.

Dunstall was the only player to rate in the top five of all four commentators.

His overall score was 178, with Carey second on 171 and Ablett third with 167.5.

Dunstall scored a perfect 50 from McGuire, a 47 from Sprigg, 38 from Cometti and 43 from Buckenara.

Ablett polled 46 from McGuire, a 43 from Sprigg, 41.5 from Buckenara and a 37 from Cometti.

It should be noted Cometti was the sterner judge of ability, awarding Essendon's Gavin Wanganeen No. 1 with 40 votes.

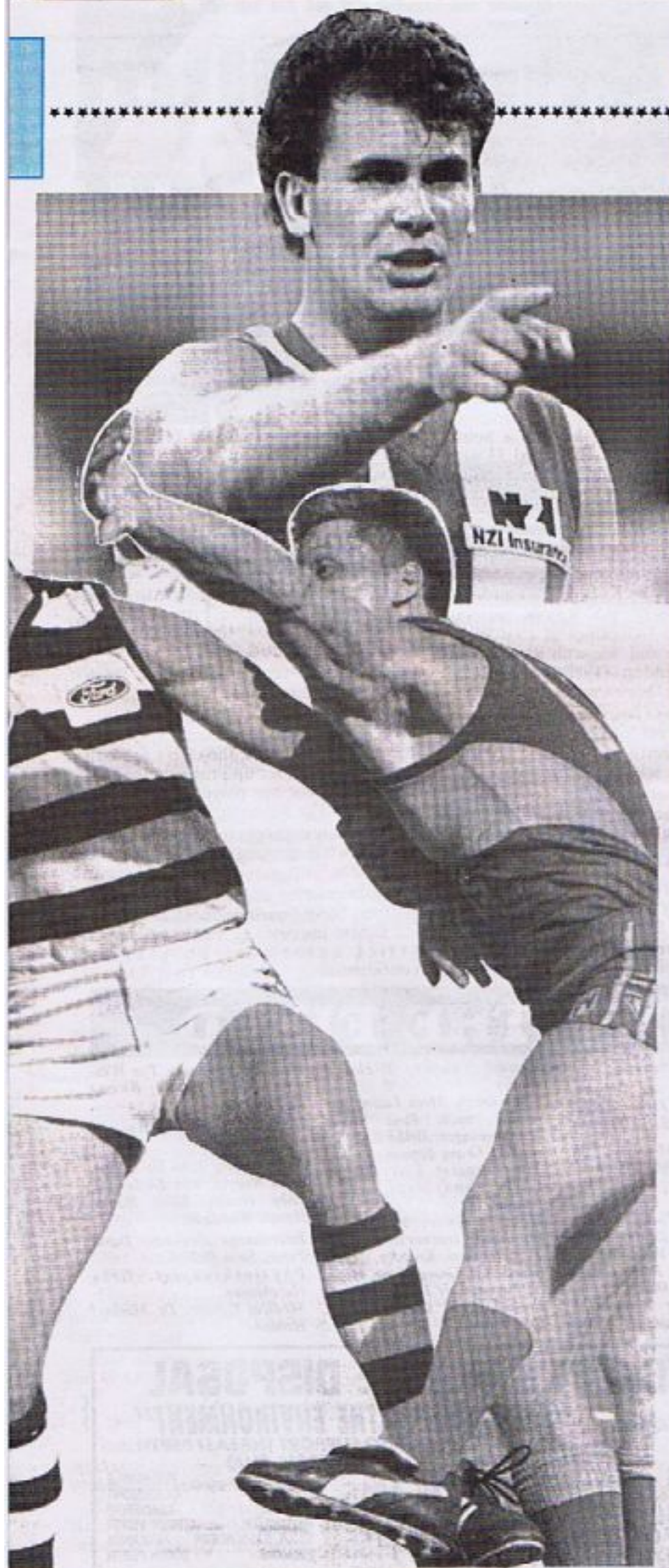

EAST Perth have produced many great players in the past — and their current junior development programme is designed to unearth many more in the future.

The Royals are looking to their youth to bring success on the field and helping build a solid development is a man who has migrated from Subiaco — public servant and football addict, Ross Nash.

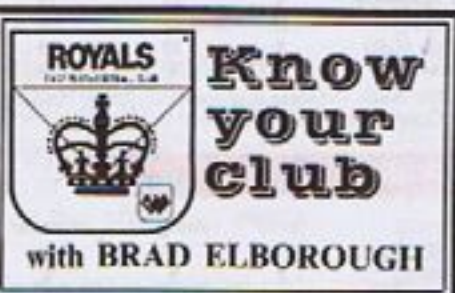
Nash, who serves as assistant coach to colts mentor and former Subiaco colleague Mick Fuller, has devoted much of his six months long service leave helping Royals football manager Cam Robbins extend their junior network.

They are working on a Quit-sponsored programme that sees juniors placed in elite squads that get them involved at the club at an early age and prepare them for advancement to colts football.

"There are a lot of kids who leave junior football a little worried about going to a league club," says Nash. "So we're making them comfortable by getting them involved earlier."

### East Perth

The various junior clubs nominate players for the 25-man squad and they go through several interviews before being included in the programme.

"A lot of kids just don't know how good football could be for them," says Nash. "It's a career path nowadays and you can become full-time footballers; if you're good enough, you might not need to work for a living; you can play footy instead."

Nash doesn't gain anything financially from his current involvement, as he's happy to fill in his long service holidays on the programme.

"After being involved in colts football for nine years with Subiaco and the last couple of seasons at East Perth, it's rewarding enough to see the boys go on to higher levels," he says.

#### COACH TRIO

East Perth have three coaches with senior football experience — and all played with the Royals.

League coach Robert Solin played 149 WAFL games, starting with East Perth

in 1981, even though he was a South Fremantle youngster. He added 33 with East Fremantle, including a premiership and finished up with 45 at the Bulldogs, with a flag as coach of the reserves side in 1991.

Solin was Stan Magro's assistant last year, after previous coaching experience with the Karratha Kats in 1987 and '88.

Wayne Otway, the Royals reserves coach, played 143 games at East Perth between 1976 and '86, with a successful stint at Essendon (1982-3) where he made 36 VFL appearances.

Otway started coaching at Nollamara, in the amateurs competition, working with former Perth goal-kicking ace and now Demons selector, Mick Rea.

Fuller is another former Royal player who is in his second year as colts coach, after spending four seasons at Subiaco.

#### FAMILY TIES

Like every club, East Perth have their share of family members working together to keep the football machine running.

Football director Chris Chadd has son Matthew running water on Saturdays as

an assistant trainer; David Prior, father of Michael, Essendon's 1992 first draft choice, is the Royals interchange steward; head trainer Bob Falkingham has son Brent assisting propertyman Pat Watson and brothers Eric and Grant Bryant also serve as trainers, with Grant doubling up as the colts runner.

A unique feature at East Perth is the location of the Aspire Fitness Centre, run by Ziggy Karow, the club's physical fitness instructor.

The private centre is based at Perth Oval, which means that Karow is always on hand to instruct the players.

"Ziggy is a well organised man," comments Cam Robbins, the club's football manager. "He's set up probably the best gym in WA for our players and outside clients to take advantage of."

"He easily manages to take care of our players, while running the business at the same time."

It's interesting to note that Karow's partner, Steve Smith, is Subiaco's physical fitness instructor — but they have a strict agreement on player-confidentiality.

# PEPSI CUP PREVIEWS

## Claws out as mates

**GOOD** mates Gerard Neesham and Tony Solin will engage in yet another tactical battle when their respective sides clash in the Pepsi Cup match of the day at Claremont Oval on Saturday.

The pair, who are at the helm of Claremont and Subiaco, were team-mates in Swan Districts 1983-84 premiership sides and have formed a close bond since then.

They often skin-dive together and when Solin applied for the Lions coaching job left vacant by Hadyn Bunton at the end of 1992, Neesham declared publicly that the former rugged defender would be a good choice.

So it comes as no surprise to see Solin model himself on Neesham somewhat — not a bad ploy when it is considered the 'Little General' has won four premierships since being appointed to the helm of the Tigers in 1987.

The Lions have struck form in the past fortnight with wins over East Perth and East Fremantle and it has been Solin's ploy to attack — a tactic Neesham has made his own over the past seven years — that is responsible for the turnaround.

When the two clubs met in round one, Claremont dealt Subiaco a severe 64-point hiding.

And while the Tigers have yet to lower their colours this season, a closer result is anticipated, with some critics even tipping a Lions victory.

"They've improved a heap since we last played them and Tony's allowed them to free-wheel, which has obviously worked," Neesham said.

Solin has a new spring in his step with the Lions having a 3-4 win/loss ratio and is eagerly awaiting Saturday's match, which he feels, should provide him with a gauge of his side.

"The whole side has a got a lot tougher and the concentration level has improved," he said.

"Things have changed around a bit now and we're reasonably confident."

Instrumental in the Lions marked form reversal has been full-forward Jason Heatley, who has kicked 16 goals in the past fortnight to give him a tally of 36 for the season.

Along with experienced campaigners Rod Willet and Andrew Macnish and the likely inclusion of West Coast pair Karl Langdon and Daniel Metropolis, the Lions boast a forward set-up that should have no trouble kicking a big tally.

However, Claremont do not lack strength in that area either — their total of 24.5 last week is proof — so a shootout could occur.

Emerging full-forward Kingsley Hunter and Chris Gerreyn have kicked more than 40 goals between them and are receiving good support from Joe Smith and Laine Spencer across half-forward.

Another interesting point in Saturday's game is the reluctance of both Neesham and Solin to apply tags — a tactic bound to add some free-flowing football considering the obvious class of each team's running division.

This places added pressure on the two backlines and that is where Claremont are stronger.

"The previous week's match against Subiaco was more important for us for our ambition of playing in the finals, but we didn't win that one either."

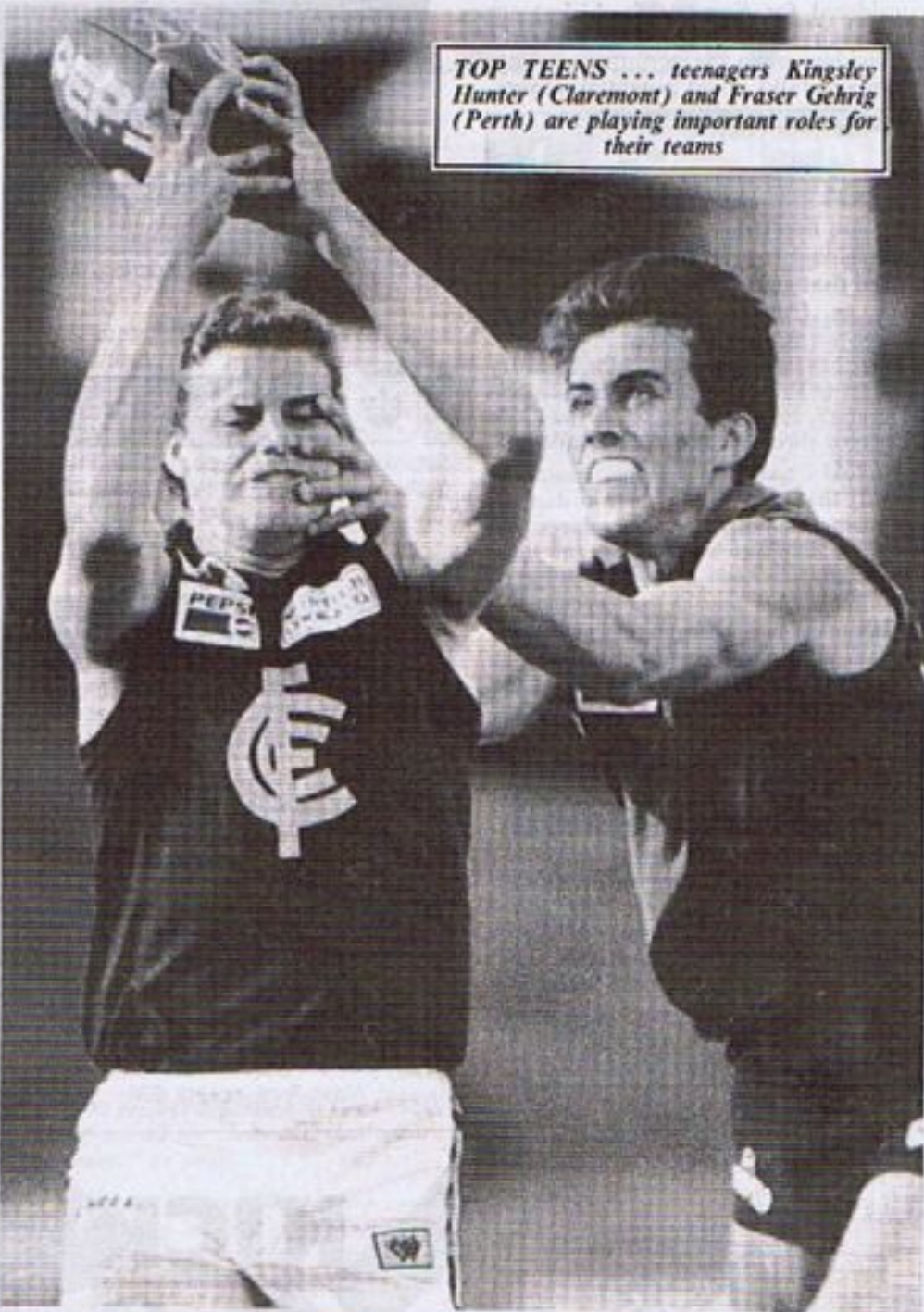
And Solin is well aware that any respite from East Fremantle, the club he played two seasons with and was a member of their 1985 premiership side, is unlikely.

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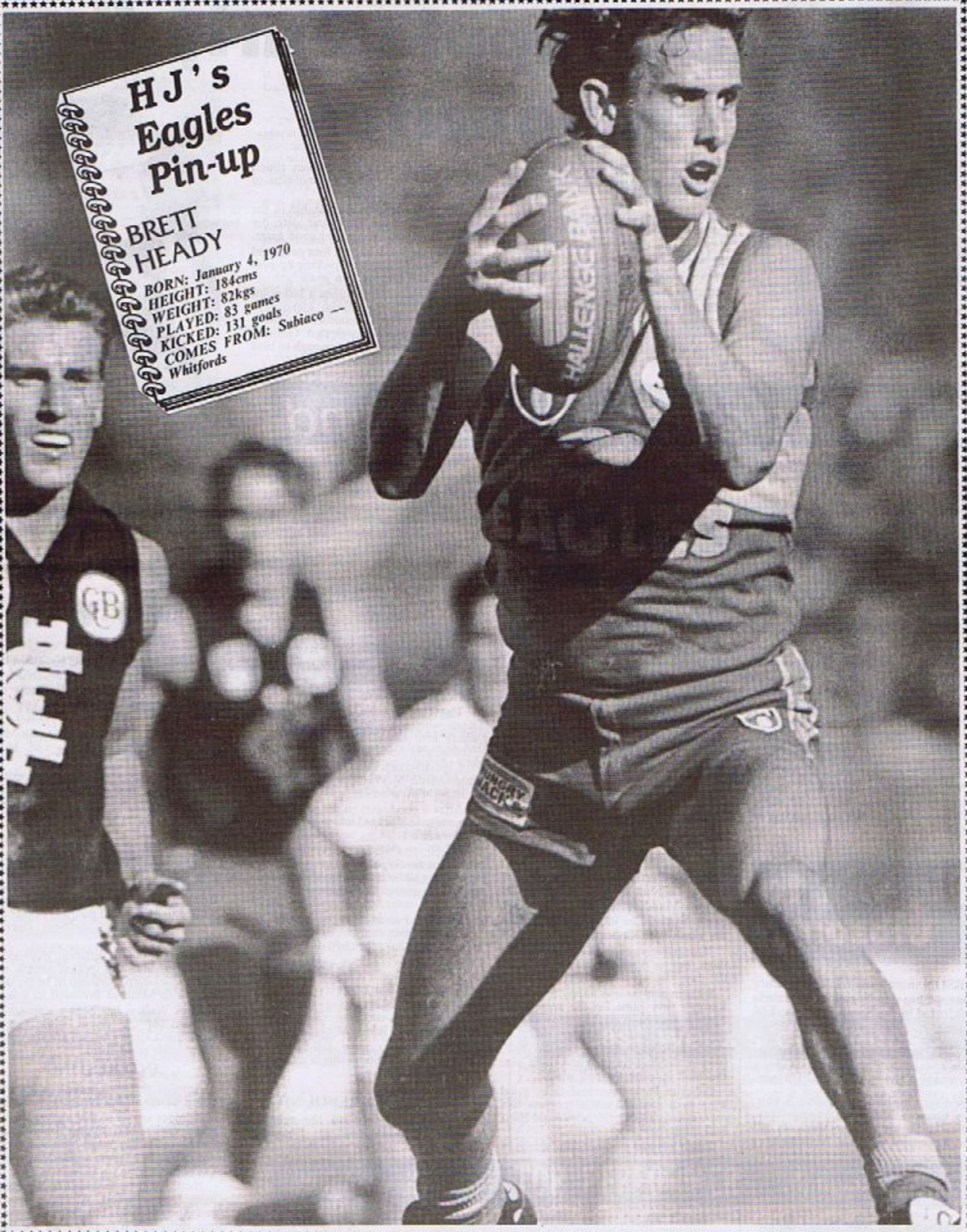

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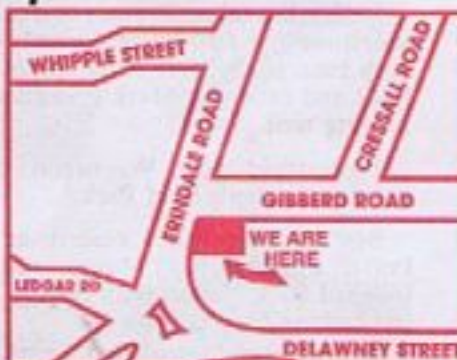

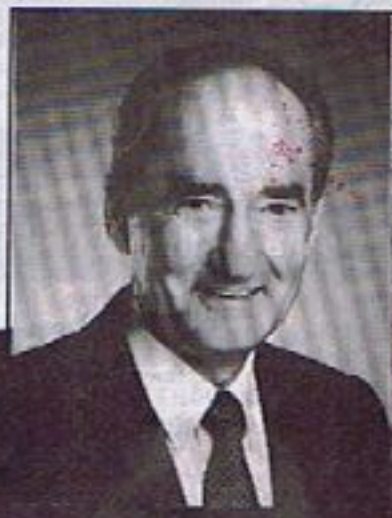
